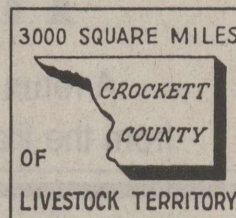

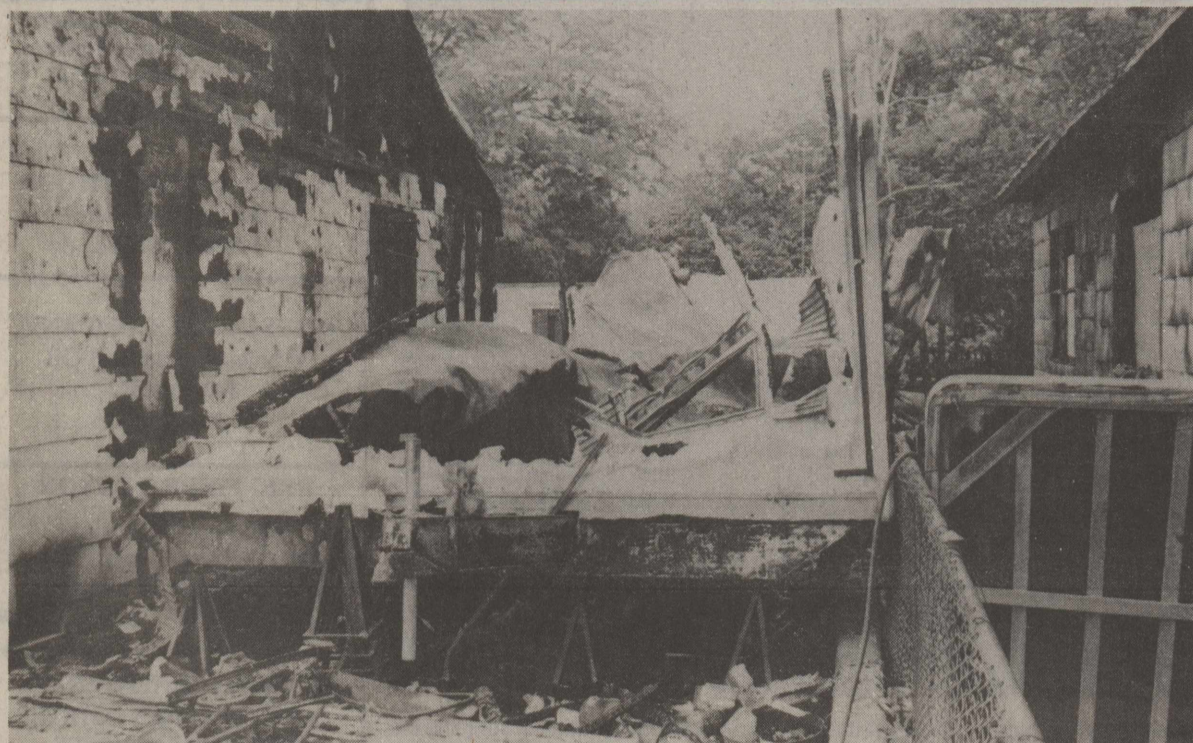

Damages adjacent homes Fire destroys mobile home

The barking of a family pet awoke Tony Gomez early Saturday morning, alerting him to a fire at a neighbor's mobile home which soon spread to his own house.

When firemen arrived at the scene at 6:25, four minutes after receiving the alarm, a mobile home adjacent to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Weddle was fully involved, said Fire Marshal Steve Kenley. The kitchen and attic of the house were on fire, and two bedrooms of the Gomez home were burning.

After being awakened by his insistent dog, Siva, and discovering a fire, Gomez rescued his three granddaughters who were asleep in the front bedroom. When he returned to the house to alert the rest of the sleeping family, the bed where the girls had been was ablaze.

Approximately 20 minutes elapsed before the fire was called in because the blaze disrupted telephone service, Gomez said.

Both the Gomez and Weddle houses received extensive damage with the mobile home being a total loss.

The Weddle family primarily lost kitchen appliances, washer and dryer. 17-year-old T. J. Weddle, who usually occupies the mobile home, was out of town at the time of the fire. Most of his clothing and some of his brother's clothing was destroyed.

T. J. wears a size 15 or 15 1/2 shirt and 28-34 pants. Justin wears size 14

slim pants and 14 shirt.

The most immediate need for Mr. and Mrs. Weddle and their five children is lodging, she said Tuesday.

Mr. Gomez expressed appreciation for Sammy and Paula Hester who have offered the use of their mobile home for his family. This was the second fire in 12 years for Mr. and Mrs. Gomez.

"I'm glad to be living in a friendly town like Ozona," said Gomez who was full of praise for the Hesters and others who have offered assistance. "I was born and raised here and glad of it," he said.

An official determination of the cause of the fire had not been made by Tuesday night, Kenley said. Wiring shorting out against the outside of the mobile home may have caused sparks which set window curtains on fire, he said.

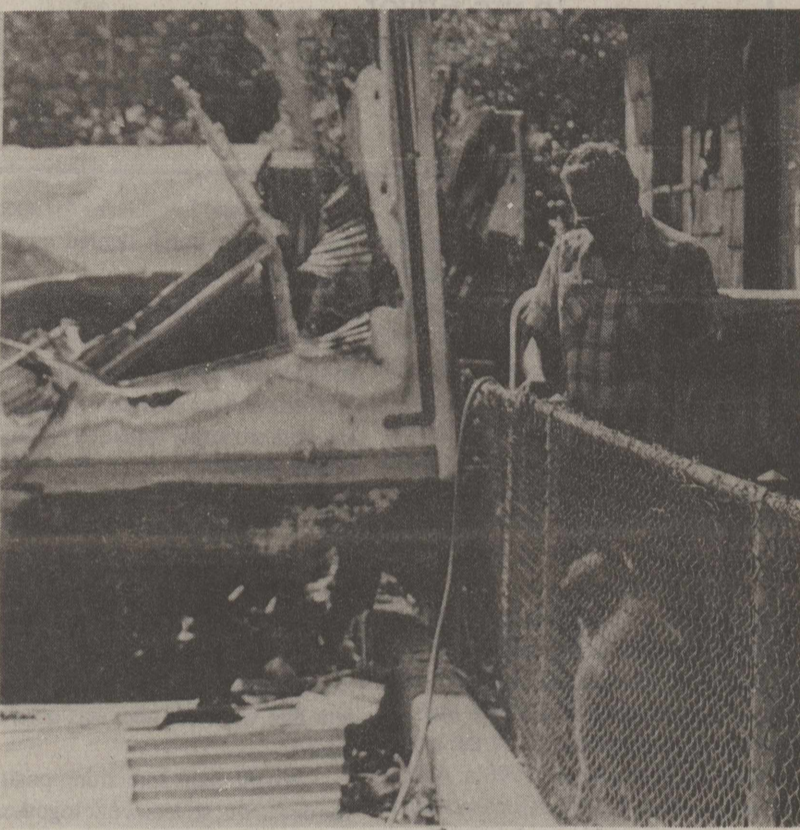
"This was our most serious fire as far as other buildings exposed." The mobile home was located 10 inches from the Weddle house and six to eight feet from the Gomez residence.

"Firemen did a remarkable job" in containing the fire, Kenley said. The blaze was confined to the kitchen and attic of the Weddle home which is owned by her mother, Myra Jones.

Firemen extinguished the fire in the hall outside the burned bedrooms of the Gomez house.

Hoses were taken into both homes while other hoses were trained on the front and back of the mobile home.

The 17 volunteers responding had the fires under control by 7:08 and were able to leave the scene at 8:29 a.m. A small fire in the mobile home had been extinguished by the time volunteers responded to a 12:52 p.m. call back.

Public hearing held on airport improvements

The first of a series of public hearings concerning airport improvements was attended Sept. 5 by 22 persons, most of them local pilots. Mark Orbeck of West Texas Consultants, Inc., Midland, talked about a master plan his firm is preparing for the airport as a preliminary step in seeking grant money for the improvements. The master plan itself is being financed through a \$42,000 Federal Aviation Administration grant.

The FAA will fund construction grants for a qualifying airport on a 90%-10% basis, Orbeck said. Crockett County's 10% could be covered through possession of the land.

Jimmie Thompson has met with FAA officials and assured them he will deed airport land to Crockett County. The FAA is not favorable toward granting funds for use on leased property according to Orbeck.

"We want to work with you any way we can," Thompson said Wednesday night.

According to the consultant, December will be the earliest a master plan could be approved by the county and the FAA. Once the plan is approved and an agreement finalized between Thompson and the county, application could be made for a construction grant. Construction funding could possibly be approved by October of 1991, Orbeck said.

Airport improvement recommendations were drawn up by the Airport Advisory Board in March of 1989. The board's priority at that time was for an overlay of the existing runway and ramp area, preferably with hot mix material.

Other recommendations included rebuilding the existing runway to accommodate heavier planes and extending the runway by 400 feet, construction of a taxiway and a crosswind runway and installation of an instrument landing system.

A second hearing is planned for Sept. 25 at 6:30 p.m. in the civic center.

Commissioners approve tax rate, 1991 budget

A total tax rate of .615 per \$100 valuation for Crockett County and .90 for the school district was approved by commissioners Monday. An increase of 3.5 cents from the county's 1989 rate of .58 was offset by the school's drop from .96 to .90. The 1990 combined tax rate of \$1.515 per \$100 valuation is a decrease from the 1989 rate of 1.54.

Of the county's .615 rate, .52 is earmarked for the General Fund, .01 for the Road and Bridge Special Fund, and .085 for the Farm to Market Road Fund. The finalized county budget for 1991 is \$5,528,409 in expenditures with revenues projected at \$5,154,041. The deficit will be made up through a dip of \$374,368 into the county's reserve of \$1,171,712. This should leave a cash balance of \$797,344 at the end of the year.

"We're fortunate that we have a little time. We're not in as bad a shape as some of the other counties around," said County Auditor Sandy Stokes in reference to the continued use of reserve funds. County income is up nine percent, but disbursements are up 28 percent, he pointed out.

A summary of receipts, disbursements and balances (see below) prepared by Stokes tracks the county's finances from 1986. A second summary shows the 1991 budget breakdown by funds.

Stephen Williams moves to Abilene

Bryson new manager of West Texas Utilities

New West Texas Utilities manager Robert Bryson began duties in Ozona Sept. 1, moving here from Presidio. Bryson replaces Stephen Williams who left Ozona to become editor of the company's monthly

employee magazine, Electric Times. Bryson held the position of manager in Presidio for three years, moving there from Alpine. The El Paso native believes in being an active member of the community no matter where he lives.

In Alpine he was president of the Big Bend Livestock Association, the Alpine Baseball League and active in American Legion. He was Alpine's Citizen of the Year in 1988.

He helped organize Presidio's first chamber of commerce and served as its president the past two years. He was voted the chamber's citizen of the year two years in succession. He helped establish chamber tourism, travel and business promotion materials and publications and was the catalyst for the growing annual Presidio Onion Festival.

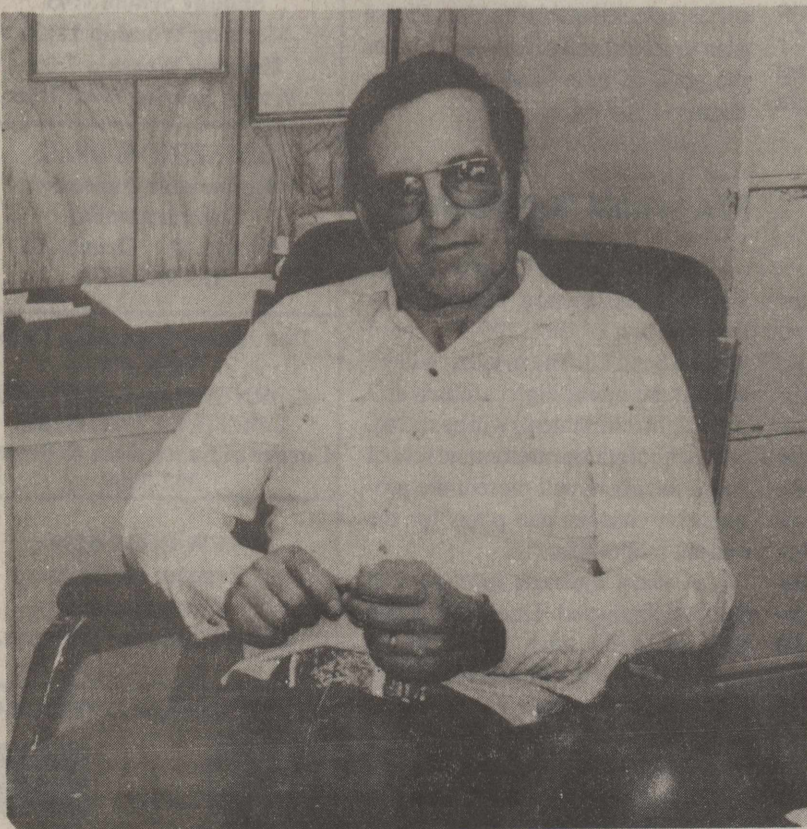
Bryson is credited with being one of the first in the Presidio area to see the economic benefits of maquiladoras, twin plant manufacturing operations that are located in Texas and Mexico, and pursue them for the area.

"Helping my community is my pastime," said Bryson of his activities.

Cooking on a barbecue rig that can prepare for 1,200 is one way Bryson spends his spare time. Although his rig is not in Ozona yet, it soon will be, he said.

Bryson and his wife Bobbie Jean, a native of Alpine, have two children, Robert Jr. who is a freshman and Bobbie Jean, a fifth grader.

Replacing Bryson in the Presidio office is former Ozonan Roland Pena, son of Ernestina Pena. He transferred to Presidio from the Big Lake office.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

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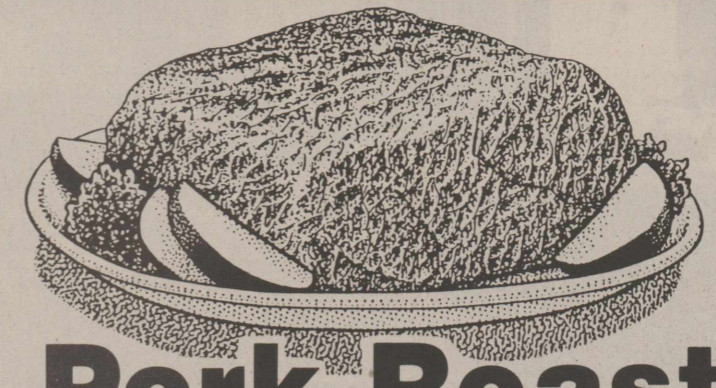

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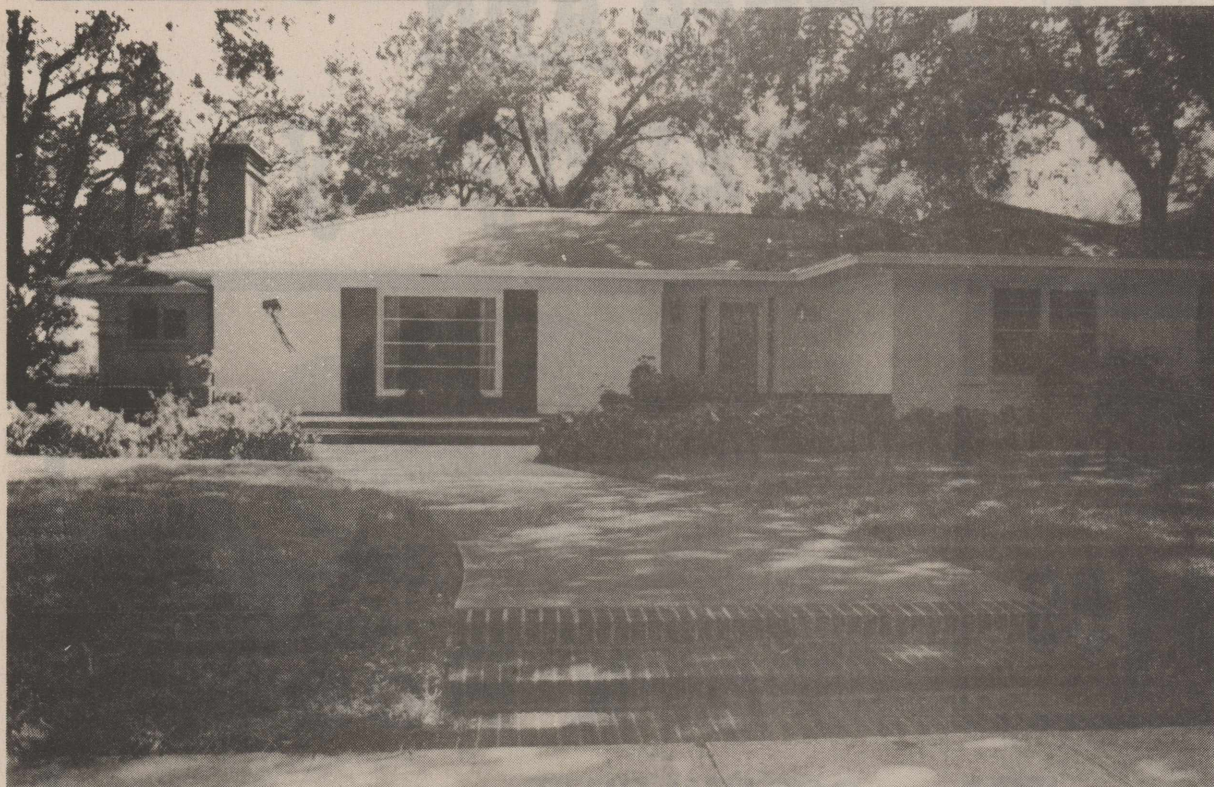

Crockett County commissioners examine 1989 delinquent tax rolls in regular court meeting

Commissioners took action on a number of agenda items Monday in addition to approving the 1990 tax rate and 1991 budget. (See related story)

A \$5.00 per day increase in Medicaid payments for care center residents' rooms will necessitate a \$5.00 per day increase in the charge for private pay rooms, administrator Doris Hull said Monday. Facilities are not allowed to charge less for private pay patients than for Medicaid patients, she explained.

Commissioners voted for the increase which will bring care center rates to \$62 a day for private rooms and \$42 per day for semi-private.

A list of parttime hospital and care center help was approved by the court with deletions. Commissioners Sostenes De Hoyos and Jesus Castro voted to approve the list. Commissioner Janet Hill abstained and Commissioner Jim House voted against approval.

A previous motion by House to deny a request for parttime help other

than LVNs and RNs died for lack of a second.

Bill Boswell, hospital administrator, was questioned at length regarding bookkeeping methods and efficient use of office personnel at the hospital during his report to the court.

Tax Assessor Collector Tommy Berry presented the delinquent tax roll to the court for examination. After reviewing the information, the court voted to certify that the 1989 delinquent tax roll was examined and charged the tax assessor with the taxes shown.

Court members voted to: set sheriff and constable fees at the existing rate, renew a contract with the juvenile detention center, purchase a new flashing light for replacement near the primary school, approve Cynthia Berry as new civic and youth center board member, approve purchase of a grassblower for the civic center.

No action was taken on an agenda item to review the policy of employees taking county vehicles home.

Present to give reports from their departments were: Garland Young, civic and youth center; Louise Ledoux, library; Onecimo Ortiz, parks; Eddie Moore, road; Doris Hull, care center; Bill Boswell, hospital.

Janet Hill presented the Helping Hands report and Judge Mayfield read the fire department report.

Gifted and talented program new at OHS

In order to provide alternatives which are appropriately designed to meet the differentiated learning styles, talents, interests, and special needs of students, a gifted and talented program has been implemented in to the curriculum at Ozona High school this year. This program will focus on experiences that supplement, enrich, and extend learning beyond the standard curriculum.

Currently there are eight students who have been identified and placed in the G/T program at the high school level. A multi-dimensional teaching approach is being used in the language-arts based program. This curriculum will enable these students to prepare for higher education and for leadership roles in society.

Extensive development through independent study, problem solving, and a mentor program will be utilized. The students will be participating in the Texas Future Problem Solving program in which they can imaginatively explore possible futures. Working in teams of four, students research topics that have implications for the future. Topics for this year include school drop-outs, transportation, censorship, and ozone depletion.

These "situations" are not futuristic in nature, but rather pose present-day difficulties these students must often resolve.

Three computers (an IBM, a Macintosh, and an Apple Iigs) will also be used in the classroom by these students. The students will participate in independent study with the help of

a mentor, someone who is knowledgeable in their particular field of interest.

Students participating in the class are: Christa Chalmers, Adrienne Dickerson, Sammy White, Jennifer Davidson, Mike Kenison, Jennifer Lee, Chandra McKinney, and Marandy Keith.

Mitchells appointed Round-up chairmen

Wildlife Symposium set

This year's Trans-Pecos Wildlife Symposium is set for September 13 in the Alpine Civic Center in Alpine. Registration runs from 8:30 a.m. - 9:00 a.m.

The symposium is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Brewster-Jeff Davis, Culberson, Hudspeth, Pecos, Presidio and Terrell Counties in cooperation with their local Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the USDA Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The morning program will open with the presentation: "Human Dimensions in Wildlife Management" by Dr. Clark Adams. Adams is an Associate Professor with the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries at Texas A&M University.

Next is scheduled a talk by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Bob Short, entitled "Surviving with Endangered Species". The subject of endangered plant and animal species is one that potentially affects a growing number of producers throughout Texas. It is already affecting many in the Trans-Pecos region and is becoming a growing point of concern in that area.

Following a break set for 10:15 a.m., the morning portion will resume with talks and speakers including: "How Wildlife Recreation Impacts Land Value", Dr. Jim Stribling, Extension Recreation Specialist, College Station; "Update on Texas Wildlife Association", Dr. Sam Beasom, Director, Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute and Vice-President, Texas Wildlife Association. Beasom will also present a second talk on the comparative ecology of white-tailed and mule deer in the Trans-Pecos.

After a noon lunch, the afternoon session will begin with Dr. Larry White, Uvalde-based Extension Range Specialist, speaking on accomplishing ranch goals with wildlife.

There will be a \$10 registration fee for those pre-registering prior to Sept. 10 and a \$15 registration fee for those registering at the door.

TEXAS LIBRARY SYSTEM

The Texas State Library System is composed of 10 regional systems and is a cooperative program designed to help meet the informational, educational and recreational needs of all Texans.

CCPL is a member of the Big Country Library System headquartered in Abilene. For system membership, a public library must meet certain criteria in the areas of collection size, per capita tax support, staffing and hours of service. Each member library selects a local citizen as a representative to the system. Our representative is Mrs. Lou Deaton.

Services available to member libraries include — collection development funds for books, a microcomputer and software, a 16mm film projector and film-strip projector, and most important, a voice in planning future system programs. We also get professional and technical help with library operations, library training through special workshops, literacy materials and workshops, and loan of

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films and special collections of books - such as Spanish language and large-print books.

As you can see from this impressive list of services, System membership is very important to our small library.

Mrs. Deaton and I have just returned from the annual system meeting in Abilene on Sept. 11. We heard reports from the staff of the BCLS on programs and budget, all of which are looking good for 1991. We learned about two new programs that will begin in 1991 for audio cassettes and video cassettes. Member libraries will receive packets of audio cassettes that will be rotated among the libraries. The video cassette program will replace the old 16mm film program and the videos will be available for spot-booking for specific showing dates just as the films were. These two programs will greatly expand the materials available to our local patrons and I urge all clubs, organizations and individuals to take advantage of these new programs.

Iron—who needs it?

Okay...so some rock and country music singers don't like red meat! But they could be missing out on an excellent source of an important nutrient—iron.

Everyone needs iron, especially growing children and adolescents, and menstruating women and pregnant women (who have the greatest need).

Iron is needed for growth of new body tissue and increasing blood volume. It's also required for replacement of blood cells lost through menstruation.

Iron is essential—a mineral which plays a role in a variety of body functions, especially to carry oxygen and carbon dioxide within the red blood cells from one body tissue to another. It's also necessary to produce energy and support the body's immune system.

To help your body absorb more iron from the foods you eat:

Include Heme Iron sources. There are two types of iron in foods: heme iron and nonheme iron. Meat, poultry and fish contain heme iron, which is much more easily absorbed by the body than nonheme iron, found mainly in plant food.

Remember the Meat Factor. Meat, poultry and fish also contain a special quality called the Meat Factor, which helps the body absorb more nonheme iron. For example, if you eat meat and vegetables together, you absorb more iron from the vegetables or breads/cereals if you eat them alone.

Include Vitamin C sources. Foods containing Vitamin C such as fruits and vegetables help the body absorb

more nonheme iron. For example, if you eat citrus fruits along with your cereal, you will absorb more iron from the cereal than if you eat the cereal alone. (That goes for those fancy enriched cereals as well; you know, the kind you only need one bowl of to stay healthy!)

Be alert to iron Absorption Blockers. Some foods block the absorption of iron. Coffee and tea both regular and decaffeinated, whole grains, bran, legumes (beans), spinach and a high fiber intake in general are a few examples of iron absorption blockers. These foods are best eaten with heme iron sources and/or Vitamin C sources to help the body absorb more iron.

Some foods, like refried beans and tortillas, can block absorption of iron; but when combined with beef, pork, lamb, poultry or other absorption helpers such as grapefruit, strawberries or oranges, can actually help the body absorb more iron.

So take these radical singers with a grain of salt—or serving of beef or lamb! Don't miss out on a vital nutrient you need to stay healthy just because someone decides "beef is smelly."

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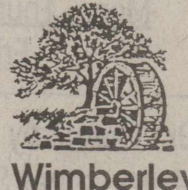
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
