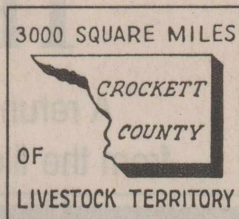

Bidding procedures followed

State prescribed bidding procedures allow officials to do business with the entity they are associated with under local government code section 171 said County Auditor Sandy Stokes last week.

The code section requires that an official file an affidavit of business association with the county clerk and abstain from voting on paying of bills or awarding bids.

Stokes' comments were made to explain the process by which House Fuel Company, owned by Commissioner Jim House, was able to bid on a county fuel contract.

The bidding process begins with

authorization by commissioners' court to advertise for bids. The court then writes specifications for the material or item needed and advertises twice for bids. Complete bid specifications are available for review at the auditor's office as part of the process.

Bids are sent sealed to the auditor, and they remain sealed until the county judge opens them in court at the time specified in the advertisement.

"The law says take the lowest or the best bid," Stokes said.

Any purchase in excess of \$15,000 has to be let out for bids. "There is nothing in purchasing or bidding laws which prohibits anyone from bidding," Stokes said.

EMS Week, Sept. 16-22

Sept. 16-22 has been designated as National EMS Week giving communities everywhere an opportunity to honor these dedicated volunteers.

Emergency Medical Service attendants in Crockett County train at their own expense and receive little monetary compensation for their work. An EMS volunteer's greatest reward is the satisfaction a job well done while being of service to others.

There is more to being an EMS volunteer than answering emergency calls. The unit works to educate the public through the schools and by having a booth at the annual health fair.

Ozona has 17 active Emergency Medical Technicians, one EMT/Special Skills, one EMT/Paramedic, one Emergency Care Attendant and six drivers.

EMTs deliver pre-hospital emergency care at the scene of an accidental injury or sudden illness. They care for patients by using basic life support skills such as CPR, bleeding control techniques, fracture care, treatment of shock and assistance in childbirth. Some are trained to provide advanced life support.

Ozona's volunteers are among more than 40,000 individuals certified as

Emergency Care Attendants, Emergency Medical Technicians, Emergency Medical Technician-Intermediates and Paramedics in Texas. More than one million emergency ambulance runs are made every year in the state.

Last year Ozona volunteers made 198 ambulance runs. As of Sept. 18, 1990, 140 runs had already been made.

Dr. Marcus Sims is medical director for the unit.

Dub O'Bryant is certified as EMT/Special Skills.

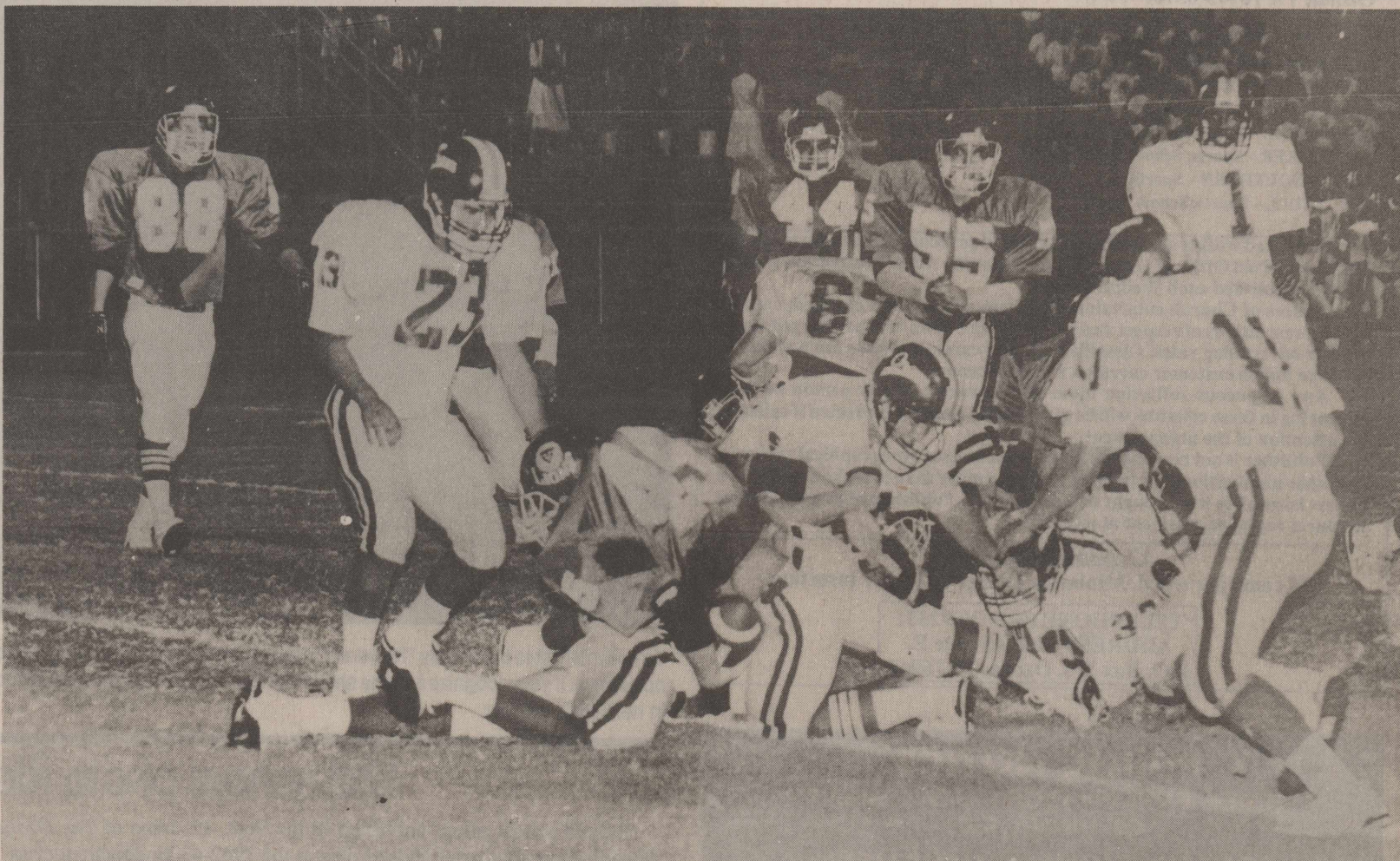

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1990

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

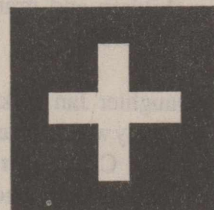

Substitution Solutions

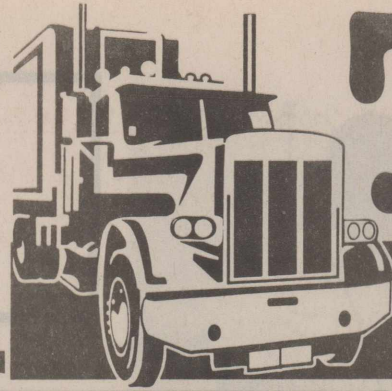
When a baking pan the one listed in a particular recipe is in your cupboard, chances are you have another that may work just fine. The volume of the food determines the recommended pan. Save this chart for reference.

Approximate volume: 1 1/2 quarts
8 1/2" round pan
10x6x2 dish
8x4x2 loaf pan
9" pie plate
9x1 1/2" round pan

Approximate volume: 2 quarts
8x6x2 pan
11x7x1 1/2 pan
9x5x3 loaf pan
12x8 1/2x2 pan
two 8x1 1/2 round pans

You may need to add or subtract 5 to 10 minutes baking time, if the depth of the food in the substitute pan varies greatly from what it would have been in the one called for in the original recipe.

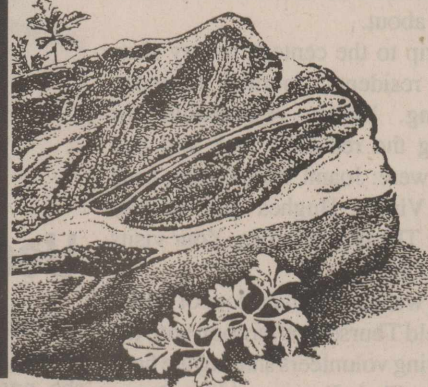

Profanity

I sat in a coffee shop the other day and listened to a man use one curse word after another. I don't think he even realized that he was doing it. Profanity has become one of our major languages. Most of us are bilingual in that we speak English and Profanity or Spanish and Profanity. Some, like the fellow in the coffee shop, speak Profanity with a little English or Spanish.

After nine years in the Navy, I have heard and said every profane word that there is. If it escaped my hearing or using, it probably hadn't been invented. I say that not proudly but shamefully. At one time I thought it was cute, then macho, then it became a habit so strong I didn't even know I was doing it. In essence it is dumb, cowardly, and degrading.

The occasional use of a word considered "profane" is somewhat understandable. I'm certainly not condoning swearing or cursing, but let's be realistic, there are not many of us that escape a misguided word ever now and then. Somewhere in our subconscious is buried a profane word, heard or uttered at one time, that comes forth no matter how saintly we try to avoid it.

I've heard people who have been given an anesthetic cursing like the proverbial sailor as they were coming out from its influence. A lot of elderly people, especially men, curse frequently in their rambling senseless dialogues.

But the habitual conscious use of profanity is a different story. Our society accepts foul language as being as natural as corn flakes. Recently, I saw a statement by a psychology professor who has researched foul mouths. He said that women are now catching up to men in the use of pro-

fanity. TV language is profane, music is interlaced with vulgarity, on and on it goes. Wherever you are, profanity is usually spoken there.

Taking the Lord's name in vain is wrong. Cursing shows a rottenness of the heart. Fresh water and salt water do not spring from the same fountain. Swearing is a sign of stupidity not smartness. Those who curse regularly have a limited vocabulary and are to be pitied not praised.

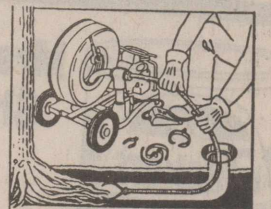

On the other hand, if we show love,

Job wrote in the Old Testament, "Can anyone understand the spreading of clouds, the thunder from His canopy? God thunders marvelously with His voice. He does great things which we cannot comprehend" (Job 36:29 and 37:5).

CELEBRATING BANNED BOOKS

CCPL is celebrating the freedom to read in 1990 during Banned Books Week Sept. 24-28. Nat Hentoff, author and 1983 winner of the American Library Assn. Intellectual Freedom award, says, "Censorship is the strongest drive in human nature. Sex is a weak second." All through history, thinkers have stirred people's minds with an interchange of ideas, knowledge and opinion. The same free interchange has bred a suppression of the freedom of expression: censorship. Censorship can undermine and even destroy the development of ideas. Recently, censorship reached a frightening extreme with a death decree against a novelist. Every free public library is a potential bastion against censorship.

CCPL challenges our patrons to read a banned book from our display of books that have been censored at one time or another over the years. Censorship takes many forms. Some of the most recent examples include

Soviet control of information, censorship of movies and music, erotic literature and the role of the press. Libraries are particularly concerned with the FBI's Library Awareness Program. The freedom of speech and freedom of press, rights guaranteed by the First Amendment of the Constitution, are continually challenged by groups and individuals attempting to restrict what others can read or see. In the 19th century, "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" was challenged for poking fun at conventional morality and for bad grammar. Today, the novel is attacked by civil rights groups for its alleged demeaning portrayal of blacks. The freedom to choose and the freedom to express one's opinion even if that opinion might be considered unorthodox or unpopular is the message of Banned Books Week. The Constitution speaks - today more than ever - that it is only when all speech is protected for all citizens that everyone's rights are guaranteed.

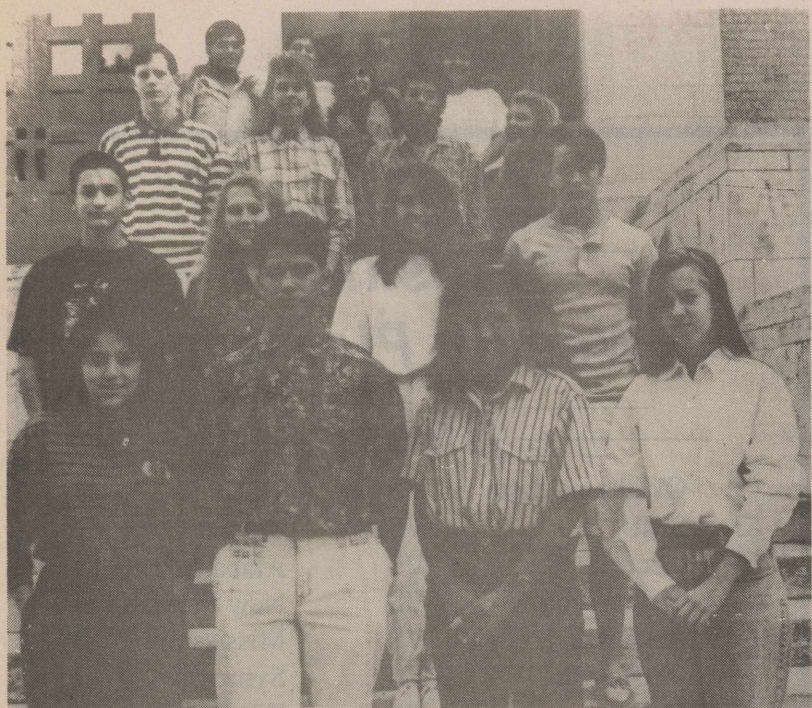

Safety first is the order of the day for groups participating in the Adopt-a-Highway program. Preparing to clean their two miles and plant wildflower seeds are 4-H members and adult sponsors.

Crockett County Adopt-a-Highway groups joined more than 25,000 volunteers across the state in the Great Texas Cleanup-Greenup Sept. 15.

After clearing away ugly waste, each group planted a half-pound of wildflower seeds on its adopted right-of-way. Given plenty of moisture this fall, the plantings should yield 2,000 square feet of blooms along 2,800 miles of Texas roadway.

The seeds are also symbols of what the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation hoped to accomplish this summer in its partnership with Anheuser-Busch Inc. Both organizations share the goal of getting their messages to the same target audience - males 18 to 34 years old.

When the brewer came calling, eager to intercept the beverage containers being tossed onto Texas highways, the highway department saw an opportunity to talk to Bubba where he lives. The planting of the wildflower seeds caps the summer-long effort by both organizations to continue building the state's successful Adopt-a-

Highway program.

The corporation donated \$5 million in goods and services to remind Texans to take care of their highways. Three Texans - Tanya Tucker, Morgan Fairchild and Bum Phillips and a wanna-be Texan, Terry Bradshaw - demonstrated Adopt-a-Highway cleanup activities in television commercials sponsored by Anheuser-Busch. The stars also supported the program in a promotional radio series underwritten by the company.

The effort paid off. Another 160 volunteer groups pledged to keep more than 300 miles of Texas highways clean for the next two years. Mileage is still available across the state and in Crockett County.
