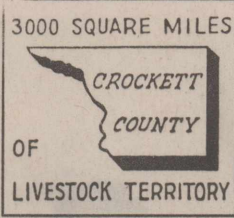

Crockett County Commissioners Court PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS Each year, roughly 6000 Americans die in fires. In 1988, more people died in fires than in any year since 1981. Four-fifths of those people died in their own house or apartment; and

WHEREAS The people most in danger in home fires are the very young and the very old; and

WHEREAS The most frequent single cause of fire deaths in American homes is the careless use of smoking materials. Even more fires are caused by heating equipment, particularly wood stoves, other space heaters, chimneys and portable heaters that have been designed or installed incorrectly, maintained poorly, or misused and the largest number of injuries happen in fires that start in the kitchen; and

WHEREAS Teaching appropriate firesafety behaviors to children has proven to save lives; and

WHEREAS The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department is dedicated to the safety of life and property of the citizens of Crockett County from the devastating effects of fire and recognize the value of fire safety education, particularly for the very young;

THEREFORE, We, the Crockett County Commissioners Court, do hereby proclaim the week of October 7-13, 1990, as Fire Prevention Week. This week commemorates the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which killed 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, and destroyed over 17,400 buildings.

We called upon the people of Crockett County to participate in activities at home, work and school, and to remember as the 1990 National Fire Prevention Week theme suggests: "MAKE YOUR PLACE FIRESAFE: Hunt For Home Hazards."

In Witness hereof, We hereunto set our hands this the 8th day of October, the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and ninety.

Hospital Board responds to commissioners veto with emergency meeting

An emergency meeting of the Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Board was called Tuesday morning in response to a veto by commissioners court of board action approving additional pay for the lab technician.

Connie Arredondo, who has been the hospital's only full-time technician for six months, met with the hospital board Oct. 4 requesting compensation for nights she is on call and does not get called back to the hospital.

In her written request to the board, Ms. Arredondo stated that she is on call 65 hours per week in addition to her regular 40 hours. She must be available to return to the hospital within a few minutes.

Each time she is called back to the hospital after 5 p.m., she receives payment of \$7.50 plus time worked. On nights when she is not called, she receives no compensation.

Ms. Arredondo's three point proposal requested pay if not called back or on Friday afternoon when there is no clinic to remain at home

and be paid for the four hours, and, on other days when there is no clinic, to come in at 8 a.m., calibrate all machines and do any lab and x-ray work needed, then go home and stay on call and get paid for the rest of the day.

Board members voted at their regular meeting to pay Ms. Arredondo \$10 each night she is on call and is not called back. This payment was voted down when commissioners met Monday.

After approximately 45 minutes in executive session Tuesday morning, board members voted to seek a meeting with commissioners as soon as possible, preferably later in the day.

"We're going back to commissioners for your benefit," board member John Daniel told Ms. Arredondo. "We feel very strongly about this and feel you have been unfairly treated."

Ms. Arredondo agreed to stay on at the hospital "until they make their decision".

Efforts of several months to secure a second lab technician have not been successful.

Court reverses stance on lab tech pay

Commissioners, in a joint called meeting with the hospital board Tuesday night, reversed a vote taken Monday to deny a hospital board request for pay to lab technician Connie Arredondo. The vote was taken after an executive session to discuss personnel.

Under the terms of the motion, Ms. Arredondo will be paid \$10 for each night she is on call but not called back to the hospital for up to 60 days effective

with the pay period which began Monday.

The hospital board is to form a committee to actively seek an additional lab technician and nursing staff personnel.

Members of the court and hospital board unanimously voted to approve a joint resolution of "no-confidence in our hospital consultant/administrator".

In other matters pertaining to the hospital, commissioners voted Monday to table action on leasing a portion of the Pomer Building for ambulance storage until the next meeting and asked that the board determine all costs involved before renting the area for ambulance storage, authorized hiring two full-time licensed personnel, and approved three individuals as part-time staff to fill in when needed.

Board members had voted to rent the building for a period of one year when they met Thursday.

The two employees to be hired are to replace one nurse who has transferred to the care center and one who has resigned.

Commissioners spent approximately three hours Monday hammering out a counter offer to the lease agreement presented last month by Crockett County Fair Association.

Court members voted in favor of a counter offer involving several changes, additions and deletions.

Crockett County has maintained the fairgrounds since the expiration of the lease two years ago. A lease between the fair association and Ozona schools expired in 1981 and has not been renewed, according to Auditor Sandy Stokes.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield read from

an opinion by the Austin law firm of Lynch, Chappell and Alsup stating that a lease between the county and the fair association "does not violate any constitutional provisions so long as lease and improvements thereon serve a public purpose, the county retains sufficient control over the leased property to ensure the public purpose is achieved and the association does not unreasonably benefit from the lease".

During a report from Eddie Moore, road supervisor, the court voted to repair the 1972 motor grader and in a separate motion, approved repair, with complete overhaul if necessary, of a 1982 dumptruck and a 1980 dumptruck.

Moore was instructed to have a sign placed at the south dump stating the facility is closed to the public if no attendant is there. He was also asked

Lions ruffle the Eagles' tail feathers 20-8

The Ozona Lions played the Eldorado Eagles before a large homecoming crowd in their second game of District 6-2A action Friday night, Oct. 5. Except for losing two fumbles and having one pass intercepted, the Lions were near perfect in their successful bid in whipping the Eagles to bring their district record to 2-0.

Coach Don Payne said the Lions were plagued with injuries during their first three bouts of non-district play, but, "we are on the road to recovery which has been reflected in our last two district play victories."

In first quarter play both the Lions and Eagles played hard with the Eagles scoring from a 15 yard run. The TD was erased by a holding penalty.

The Lions first score of the game came with 7:04 remaining in the second quarter when Jimmy Williams found pay dirt from a 21 yard pass from quarterback Danny DeHoyos. Ruben Borrego's P.A.T. attempt was blocked, topping the scoreboard for

the Lions, 6-0. Defensively, the Lions held the Eagles scoreless during the first half of play.

"I think our defense just played an exceptional game because we gave them lots of opportunities," Coach Don Payne said. "Danny DeHoyos has been our man all year. He makes a lot of good decisions."

Third quarter action was successful with two scores for the Lions with a 31 yard touchdown run by Ruben Borrego with 7:53 left on the clock and Adam Alba's interception of an Eagle pass and 31 yard run back touchdown with 7:37 remaining. Danny DeHoyos' pass to Lonnie Martinez was good, adding a two-point conversion topping the Eagles 20-0 on the scoreboard.

In fourth quarter action the Lions were scoreless, giving up one touchdown to the Eagles from a 5-yard run by Eagle fullback Justin Paxton with 3:40 left in the game.

The Lions gained 187 yards rushing and added 51 yards through the air

compared to 179 yards on the ground and only one completion for a two-point conversion for the Eagles.

"They just kept coming back week after week," Payne said. "We've not started the same offensive line all year. Our tough schedule (non-district games with 3A schools Reagan County, Crane and Sonora) is starting to pay off a little."

Both Coach Payne and Danny DeHoyos stated, "we need to work on mental mistakes, but our defense is working together very well." Coach Schneider is very excited about the return of center Cody Morris and tackle Aristeo Duenes. He stated, "with the return of these two players we will be looking down the road to district."

This Friday the Lions tangle the Stanton Buffaloes who are 0-5 overall and 0-2 in district. The Lions will play the Buffs in Stanton at 8:00 p.m.

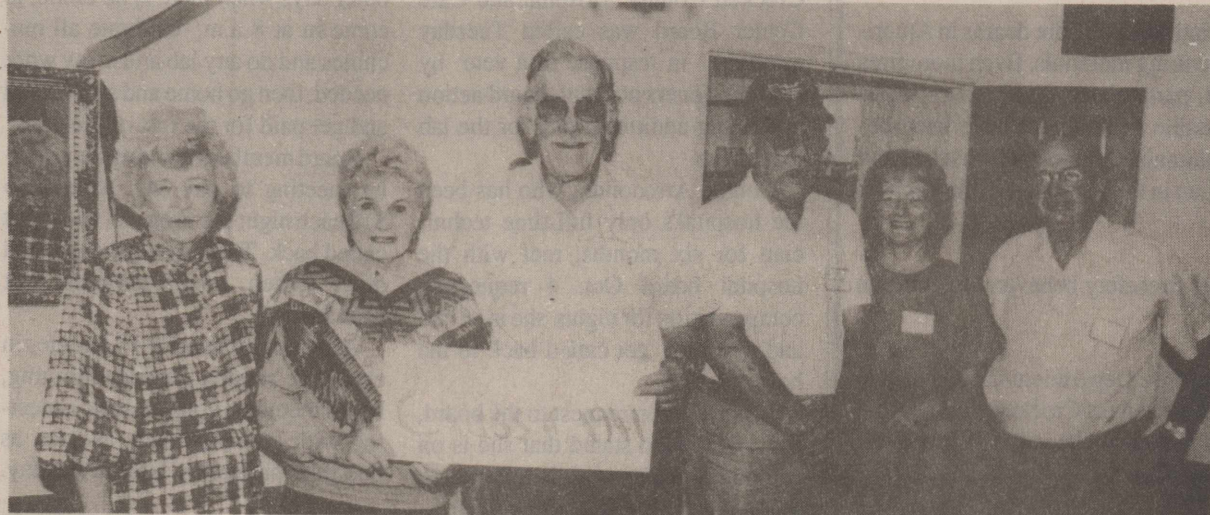

Many cuts of beef have under 200 calories per cooked, 3 oz. serving. These cooking tips will help you keep calorie and fat content down.

- Avoid adding extra cooking fat by using a non-stick frying pan, wok or Dutch oven for broiling, stir frying or pan broiling beef. Remove the drippings as they accumulate.
- Flavor and tenderize beef with reduced fat marinades and bottled saunas or use freshly squeezed lime or lemon juice seasoned with fresh or dried herbs.
- Select fresh flavoring ingredients to complement beef that do not contribute fat. Tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, onion, garlic and ginger are good partners for beef.
- Substitute lower fat versions of ingredients when possible. Use reduced-fat sour cream or low-fat plain yogurt in place of sour cream in stroganoff, soups and sauces.

Religion?

Religion is the reverence and recognition that one gives to the Supreme Being. It comes in various forms and is practiced in diversified manners. What one thinks of God, whoever or whatever that might mean to him, will determine the actions of his life. "Religion," Tolstoy said, "reveals the meaning of life."

Reactions to religion differ, sometimes drastically. The gamut is usually run from the devout to the sacrilegious with many variations in between. Then too, religion often depends on one's circumstance (ie. sickness raises one's awareness of God while prosperity lowers one's need of Deity).

Many people don't have a faith of their own. Their response to God is sort of neutral. Since belief in God is deepened by the Word of God and sustained by the Spirit of God, those who do not have contact with the Word or imbibe the Spirit cannot know Him. These people float along thinking religion is useless and basing that thought on what they are told or observe.

Many times their listening or observation is distorted by pretenders of faith or bizarre events. Just think for a moment about all those who think religion is a sham because some TV evangelists got greedy. The avarice of a few preachers, as bad as it is, is not reason enough to abandon religion.

If one is looking for excuses to avoid or ridicule religion, he can find them in abundance. There are hypocrites, liars, and cheats in religion as in other aspects of life. There are also deceptions, larks, and schemes as there are in other enterprises. These things produce skeptics, and they give up on religion.

To a casual observer, religion might even appear stupid. Let me give you two examples of religious asininity that occurred recently. In one case, a dog (half-Pekingese and half-Poodle) was ordained as a minister, and, in the other instance, a group of church leaders were found guilty of trying to beat the devil out of some members of their congregation.

The ordained dog is owned by an Illinois detective who investigates scams. He sent his dog's name in to the mail-order American Fellowship Church in Rolling Bay, Washington. "Fluffy" received his ordination papers. I've heard that preaching is going to the dogs, but I didn't think I would live to see it. If you think your preacher barks and snaps - you could be right.

The other situation happened in Devine, Texas, where a pastor and two church elders were found guilty of imprisoning a church member to exorcise demons from him. They could get up to ten years for that escapade. Here again, I know that some members probably do need the devil beat out of them, but it's best to let the Lord handle them.

Stupid isn't it? Oh, there are many such things that happen in the name of religion. When people ignore or depart the Word of God, the door is open for them to belittle, mock and slander the name of the Holy. Take time to read Romans chapter one. See what happens to men when sin captures their minds and leads them to both stupidity and wickedness.

Well, ordaining dogs and beating the devil out of members are not the only ways of debasing religion. We can all do it by saying, "Lord, Lord" while living as we please.

Think about it!

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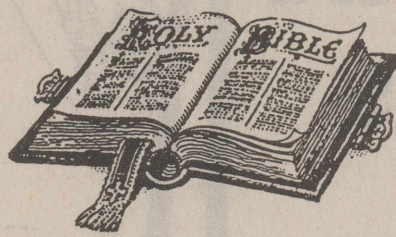

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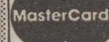

Cook of the Month



Mrs. Ruby Olson

Cook of the Month for October, Ruby Olson, likes to cook and bake, but admits she doesn't do as much of it since the children left home.

Being of German descent with a husband who is Swedish, Ruby has a wealth of recipes to share. Among her favorites are Ostakaka (Swedish cheese cake) and Spritz Swedish Cookies always served at the smorgasbords at the church she and George helped with when they lived at Stamford. The smorgasbords there were an every two-year fund raiser at the church and gave the entire community a chance to taste the delicious Swedish cooking.

In addition to joining ladies at the local Faith Lutheran Church in preparing cookies for care center residents and and cooking for the church bake sale, Ruby makes and sells some of her specialties. Gardening, canning, making jelly and quilting keep her busy when she isn't preparing rich desserts. She is also organist at Faith Lutheran.

The Olsons grew up in the Stamford area and transferred here in 1964 with the State Highway Department. George retired in 1986.

They are the parents for two sons, Donald, who makes his home in Sunnyvale, and Gerald, who lives in Denton. The Olsons have four grandchildren.

OSTAKAKA

2 1/3 c. powdered milk
3 1/2 c. cold water
4 1/2 c. hot water
1 rennet tablet
2 eggs
1 c. flour
1 ctn. whipping cream (4 oz.)
1 c. sugar

Mix powdered milk with cold water, add hot water in a saucepan. This should be lukewarm. Beat eggs, add flour with a little of milk mixture. Mix until smooth, add to milk mixture. Be sure this is lukewarm, then add 1 rennet tablet which has been dissolved in a little cold water.

Let set 1 hour or until it curdles; cut, drain. Dip into baking dish. Place in 350-375 degree oven. As this bakes, remove whey. Keep dipping until they doesn't form - about 1 hour. Take carton of whipping cream, mix

1 c. sugar into this, pour over cheese cake. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake until brown. Do not stir. Swedish cooks serve Lingonberries with this, or it may be served with a favorite jelly or sauce. Lingonberries are prepared into a sauce and taste much like cranberries.

SPRITZ SWEDISH COOKIES

1 lb. butter
1 c. sugar
1 white and 2 yolks of eggs
4 1/2 c. flour
pinch of salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs, flour and flavoring. Dough will be very thick. Use cookie press - form cookies in "S" shape on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 or 12 minutes.

POTATO REFRIGERATOR DOUGH FOR ROLLS

1 c. sugar
1 1/2 tsp. salt
2 pkg. dry yeast
1/4 c. lukewarm potato water

Mix together these ingredients. Stir to dissolve. In small mixing bowl, beat 1 c. lukewarm mashed potatoes, 2 eggs, 1 c. oil, 1 1/2 c. lukewarm potato water. Add this to first mixture using spoon or mixer. Then add 7 or 8 cups sifted flour. Mix last flour with hand. Let rise once before placing in refrigerator over night.

When ready to use, shape into rolls or loaves. Let rise again until double in size. Bake at 350 degrees until brown - about 20 minutes for rolls - 30 to 35 minutes for loaves.

CINNAMON ROLLS

Use potato refrigerator dough. Use about 1/3 recipe at a time and roll into oblong shape. Brush with melted butter, cover with cinnamon and sugar and sprinkle with chopped pecans. Roll as jelly roll and slice. Let rise double and bake at 350 degrees about 20 minutes - until golden brown - drizzle with powdered sugar glaze. This can also be made into a coffee ring.

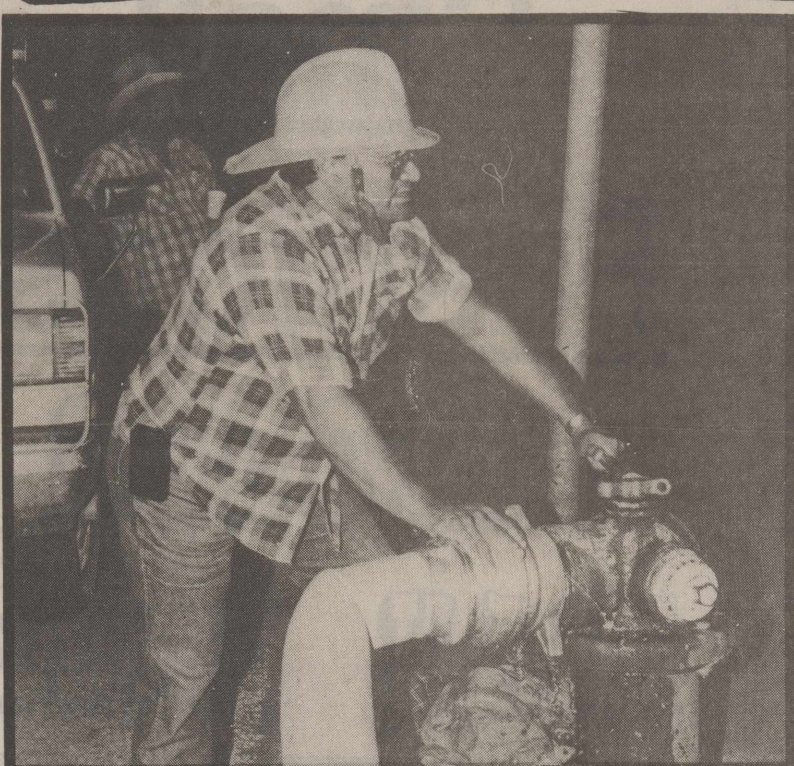
