Letter to the Editor

This letter is to express my opinion on the new rule set by commissioners and whoever else is involved concerning letting people work after they have resigned or quit. I think it is ridiculous! Why does anyone have to be on the "part-time" list when we are so short of help in the first place? Why would anyone want to go out and look for help to staff the hospital when you already have people who are familiar with the routine, the place and the people, and are willing to help out in an emergency? It doesn't make sense to me.

What would you, the commissioners do in an emergency, if you were the ones training some strange person and a person in cardiac arrest came in? That person would not know where any of the supplies are, they might even not know how to run the cardiac monitor and with our new computerized EKG machine, there are not too many people who know how to run it in the first place. It would all be left up to the one person who does know, and in an emergency such as that, it takes more than one person to handle that emergency room. So why even mess with the system when it's working just fine as it is? Is this some show of power we're seeing here? Is it"we're in charge, our word is the last say-so and you do as we say"? That's sure the way it's coming across to not only me, but to a lot of people here at work. If you all think you're going to go out and pluck nurses off the street, you've got another think coming. Nurses are in great demand and short supply-has anyone heard of the nursing shortage nationwide right now? It's been this way for a while! I think you should appreciate the fact that we want to continue helping the hospital even if we won't be employed here any longer.

I also want to say that there are a lot of people here who will be losing a lot of vacation and sick leave due to the proposed policy changes. That is not fair considering that a lot of them have come in to work when they were sick, out of respect to fellow employees because we were short-handed in the first place. We have part-timers who usually end up working 8-10 days a pay period and aren't getting any benefits at all! You cannot run the hospital like you do the road department or any other county agency. We

do not close for holidays. We either take Christmas or New Year but not both-we don't ever close-we are open 24 hours-a-day, seven days-a-week. We don't have the option of planning big family get -togethers on special holidays like other county employees do. We chose nursing as our specialty because that's what we like-it is a very stressful job-don't make it anymore stressful with policy changes. Be thankful that we do have coverage, even if it's barely.

Last, but not least, I have a request to make. This is my own opinion, nobody else's. I find it very disturbing when patients come in to Dr. Sim's clinic and call him by his first name. The man spent at least 10 years of his life training for what he is today and the least you can do is show him a little respect and use his title which is Dr. Sims, Not Marcus! He has never complained, but I don't ever hear anyone call Dr. Owensby Robert or Bob. Even Mrs. Owensby calls him Dr. Owensby.

In closing I wish to say I will miss Crockett County Hospital and all of its staff. I do plan to return to Ozona and hopefully find employment here again after I finish R.N. school. We are all like one big family and I will miss each and everyone of you.

Another thing

I hope someone will open their eyes soon and replace our morning shift nurses aide they took away because of "budget". We are the busiest shift of all because of clinic and with all the terminally ill patients we have had lately and still have we don't need cutbacks. That only cuts back on our patient care no matter how you look at it. When you run the emergency room, the clinic and patients on the floor with only one R.N., one L.V.N. and one nurses aide for the whole thing, we're leaving our selves wide open for a lawsuit because we NEVER KNOW what kind of emergency will walk in the back door, and being so close to I-10, we've had some serious emergencies where it has taken all of us to handle it, leaving patients on the floor without any nursing personnel available. We do have a housekeeper that goes out of her way to help us. We do appreciate you Lelia. People-let's help the hospital, not hinder it—it may not be much, but we could save your lives one of these days, regardless of some public opinion.

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



The 1988-89 Public School Dropout Report, which was presented by T.E.A. to the State Board of Education in May, listed Ozona with a 1.23% dropout rate as compared to the statewide dropout rate of 6.1%.

During the 1988-89 school year, Texas school districts reported 82,325 dropouts through April 13, 1990. The final count for the 1987-88 school year was 91,307. Of the total number of dropouts in 1988-89, 52,263 (63.5%) dropped out during the regular school year, an additional 21,376 (26.0%) dropped out over the summer after having been promoted to the felt they were too old.

Statistics reported from the Texas next grade level, and 7,578 (9.2%) Education Agency and received last dropped out over the summer after having failed to be promoted. The cate that Ozona is doing an excellent balance of 1.3% was made up of twelfth grade students who failed T.E.A.M.S. and did not return to

Information regarding the reasons students gave for dropping out provide valuable insight and understanding of the dropout phenomenon in Texas. Reasons for dropping out were available for 28,245 dropouts. In general terms, the most frequent reason students (11,059) dropped out was due to poor attendance. Additionally, 4,353 dropped out to pursue a job, 2,580 dropped out and were in non-state approved GED programs, and 2,471 dropped out because they



District

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was established in 1950 to identify and prioritize resource concerns within the county and to serve as a medium for local ranchers in coordinating assistance from federal, state and local agencies. Agencies providing assistance include the Soil Conservation Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and University of Texas Lands.

A Memorandum of Understanding between the USDA-SCS and the District allows the SCS to furnish technical assistance to ranchers, farmers and other interested individuals in order that conservation plans can be developed to meet the needs and capabilities of the land and the objectives of the landowner.

The District is governed by a five member board of locally elected directors. These directors serve as a voice for landowners and operators within the District. Directors for the past year include Earl Acton, chairman; Bud Hoover, vicechairman; Gene Perry, secretary; Pleas Childress III, member and Larry Williams,

Improper grazing management, brush infestation, conserving soil, water, plants and related resources and improving wildlife management on rangeland as a secondary land use are the primary concerns outlined in a long range program and plan.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District realizes these concerns need to be addressed and steps taken to solve these problems in order to protect our resource base.

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Conservation Rancher

Bob Bissett was selected by the district as the Outstanding Conservation Rancher for Crockett County the past year and was honored at an awards banquet in San Angelo. Bob operates approximately 27,000 acres in the northern portion of the County.

As all good ranchers do, Bob has set goals to improve the overall ranching operation. Increasing the amount of desirable forage by maintaining safe stocking rates is one of his main objectives. Reducing the amount of undesirable brush species through the use of various control methods and sound grazing management practices is also a high priority.


Bob runs a combination of cattle and sheep. He has a thorough understanding of plant responses to livestock grazing and practices the take half - leave half rule and closely monitors key grazing sites to assure proper grazing use on key plant species.

Bob has carried out brush control practices on approximately 14,400 acres. Over 10,000 acres has been treated chemically. He was one of the first ranchers to implement prescribed burning into a brush management program and has spent the last several years carrying out prescribed burns to control pricklypear and associated cactus species.

Bob has worked closely with the Soil Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Extension Service and the Texas A&M Experiment Station. He has promoted range management by demonstrating his ability to apply sound grazing management practices on the ground.

Because of dedication in conserving and improving the range and wildlife resource, the Crockett SWCD was honored to select Bob Bissett as the County's outstanding conservation rancher.

Brush Management





Periodic deferments in combination with proper grazing use on forage species are key components to any successful brush management program. The District feels that a combination of sound management practices and timely brush control will allow producers to improve range and wildlife resources.

PSAT/NMSQT test offered to juniors

Texas public school students will be tested on their higher-level academic skills and on more of the essential elements of the curriculum under a new student assessment program approved by the State Board of Education in May of this year.

The new program, called the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills secondary students because the exam (TAAS), will replace the state's existing minimum skills testing program in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 and will be given for the first time on October 16, 17 and 18.

Adoption of the program means that the Texas Education Agency will move from testing only minimum level skills in reading, writing, and mathematics to testing more content, including higher-order skills, such as critical thinking and problem solving. The new tests will also be broader in scope than the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test in that they will measure more of the essential elements of the public school curriculum.

As part of the expanded program, a written composition will be added to the exit-level or eleventh grade test for high school juniors who take the examination for the first time. High school seniors who failed to pass both sections of the TEAMS exit-level examination as juniors will not be required to take the exit-level TAAS. For grades three and five, 65% of the test items answered correctly in Mathematics and/or Language Arts Reading will constitute mastery of that subject area. In Language Arts Writing, 65% of the test items answered correctly and a score of a least 2 on the written composition will indicate student mastery. In grades seven, nine, and eleven (exit-level), 60% of the items answered correctly will indicate mastery of each test, and in these grades, students will also have to obtain a passing score of at least 2 on the written composition.

The State Board rejected a Texas Education Agency recommendation to delay setting passing standards for this month's TAAS exam until the results for the entire state could be analyzed and to gradually increase the passing standard to 70 percent by 1991-93. Health insurance supplements

Medicare pays for a large part of health care expenses, but it does not pay them all. There are limits on Medicare payments for some covered medical services, supplies and equipment. You must also pay certain amounts called deductibles and copayments. Before you buy insurance to supplement Medicare, you should familiarize yourself with your Medicare benefits. Check with your Social Security office for information about curent Medicare coverage.

Not everyone needs private health insurance in addition to Medicare. If you are a Medicare beneficiary enrolled in a prepayment plan, such as a health maintenance organization or a competitive medical plan which has a contract with Medicare, you may not need a Medicare supplement policy. Low-income people who are eligible for Medicaid generally do not need additional insurance. However, whether you need health insurance to supplement Medicare should be discussed with someone who understands insurance and your particular financial situation.

If you find you need additional health insurance coverage, follow these 12 tips:

-Shop carefully before you buy. Policies differ widely as to coverage and cost. Contact different companies and compare the policies carefully before you buy.

-Don't buy more policies than you need. Duplicate coverage is costly and unnecessary. A single comprehensive policy is better than several policies with overlapping or duplicate coverages.

-Consider your alternatives. Depending on your health care needs and finances, you may want to consider continuing the group coverage you have at work.

-Check for pre-existing condition exclusions. In evaluating a policy, determine whether it limits or excludes coverage for existing health conditions. Many policies do not cover health problems that you have at the time of purchase.

-Beware of replacing existing coverage. Be suspicious of suggestions that you give up your policy and buy a replacement. New policies may impose waiting periods or have exclusions or waiting periods for preexisting conditions.

-Be aware of maximum benefits. Most policies have some type of limit on benefits. They may restrict either the dollar amount that will be paid for treatment of a condition or the number of days of care for which payment will be made. Some insurance policies pay less than the Medicare approved amount for hospital outpatient medical services or service in a doctor's office even when they pay for the same services provided to a hospital

-Check your right to renew. Beware of policies that let the company refuse to renew your policy on an individual basis except for failure to pay the required premiums.

-Re-instituting Medigap coverage. If you formerly had coverage under a Medicare supplement policy but discontinued it during 1989, you may have the right to re-institute that coverage. The new law which repealed the Catastrophic Coverage Act directs that Medicare beneficiaries who have Medicare supplement policies in effect on Dec. 31, 1988, and who terminated them during 1989, must be notified by their insurers that they have the right to re-institute substantially equivalent coverage.

-Be aware that policies to supplement Medicare are neither sold nor serviced the state or federal government. State insurance departments

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approve policies sold by insurance companies but that only means the company and policy meet the requirements of state law.

Don't believe statements that insurance to supplement Medicare are government sponsored programs. Anyone trying to sell you an insurance policy and saying he or she is from the government is in violation of federal and state law.

-Know who you are dealing with. A company must meet certain qualifi-'cations to do business in the state of Texas. Agents must be licensed by the state and must carry proof of licensure showing their name and the company they represent.

-Keep agents' names, company names, addresses and telephone numbers. Write down the agent and/ or company names, addresses and phone numbers or ask for a business card that provides the information.

-Take your time. Do not be pressured into buying a policy by an agent who tells you there is a limited enrollment period. Allow yourself time to think through your decision.
