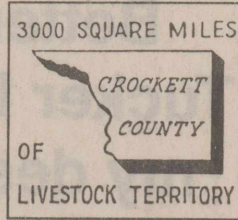

## Lions barbecue 29-14 Buffalo burgers

The fighting Ozona Lions showed their real stuff Friday night in Stanton, trouncing the Buffaloes 29-14 for their third straight district win.

The Lions racked up 219 yards rushing and held the Buffs to only 24. Ruben Borrego led his teammates in rushing for a total of 96 yards in 22 carries. He kicked a 35-yard field goal and was successful with two P.A.T. boots.

In the first ten minutes of play of the first quarter, both teams were scoreless with each having two offensive rounds. Ozona gained two first downs compared to Stanton's one.

The Lions' first score ground-work was laid down by the defense as Albert Talamantez sacked Stanton quarterback John Barry at their own 4-yard line, and Lion tackle Aristeo Duenes recovered a fumble for the Lions on the next play.

On a second down play, Michael Ybarra powered his way over the goal line, giving Ozona first blood 6-0. Ruben Borrego's attempt at a P.A.T. failed.

Stanton's next series of offensive plays yielded only one first down, ending the first quarter of play.

Ozona's second score of the game came from a beautifully executed 35-yard field goal by Ruben Borrego with the clock showing 4:53 left in the half, topping the scoreboard for the Lions 9-0.

Stanton's next series of offensive downs totaling seven passing and three running plays put the Buffs into position at the 3-yard line for their first score of the game by running back Sherman Bryand with 2:29 left in the second quarter. Quarterback Barry's 2-point conversion pass to Jim Bob Kelly was good, putting the Buffs back into the ballgame with a score of 9-8.

The Lions again found pay dirt in the next series of downs on a 5-yard pass from Danny DeHoyos to Randel Wilson with :23 seconds before the half. DeHoyos' 2-point conversion pass attempt to Michael Ybarra failed, stretching the score board to 15-8 at the half.

Stanton returned from the field-house after half time activities only to again meet head on with a tough Lion defense and a punting situation after three unsuccessful first down yardage plays.

After taking possession of the ball at the Buff's 46, Ozona drove past Stanton's defense to the 21. This time Ruben Borrego's foot missed the mark on a field goal attempt.

The Lions' next T.D. was again set up by good defensive action when Michael Ybarra intercepted a Buff pass at the 32-yard line. Ozona's first play out of the huddle quarterback Danny DeHoyos held on to the football and rushed 30 yards to the Buff 2-yard line. Two more quarterback keepers paid off for the Lions as DeHoyos scored their third T.D. for the night, and Ruben Borrego's golden foot added the extra point to make the score 22-8 with 2:56 remaining in the third quarter.

The visitor grandstands vibrated with excitement with 7:20 remaining in the fourth quarter when Danny DeHoyos hit Mingo Perez with a 35-yard T.D. toss, and Borrego's aim was on the mark widening the gap to 29-8 for the Lions.

In a desperate attempt to level the scoreboard, the Stanton Buffaloes went to the air, throwing 10 passes and completing only four. They finally scored on a 5-yard run by Sherman Bryand with 1:13 left in the game, and with a 2-point conversion failure, the scoreboard showed 29-14 and remained unchanged for the rest of the game.

The Lions' final possession yielded rushing gains by Ruben Borrego for 10 yards and Oscar Gutierrez for 8.

Defensively, Ozona held the Buffs to only 13 first downs compared to their own 20.

Coach Jim Green said, "I was very proud of our defense. They responded well to the Buffs' no huddle offense. Coach Rod Schmieder said "I am happy to say the team is now functioning as one."

Stanton falls to 0-3 in district play and 0-6 overall. The Lions improved their record to 3 district wins and face the McCamey Badgers who are licking their wounds from a 34-6 defeat by the Wall Hawks. Game time is 8:00 Friday night in Lions' Stadium.

## Board plans renovation of welding building

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, Oct. 9, approved the employment of Rod Miller as computer science teacher in the district. Mr. Miller is a 1987 graduate of Angelo State University, where he majored in computer science and mathematics.

Superintendent Jim Payne presented proposed guidelines for the school volunteer program for board review and discussion, and the guidelines were approved as presented. "Volunteers in our schools can be a very positive step toward building support and understanding of the educational process, and we welcome their participation in the school program," Payne said. "The guidelines are available at each school for anyone who would like to volunteer their time and services to the school district."

### Chamber plans Halloween Parade

The Halloween Carnival parade sponsored by Ozona Chamber of Commerce will have four categories for people, one for pets, one for wagons, and even a category for all kinds of pumpkin items this year.

### Producers reminded to file report

Jerry Harris, chairperson of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said wool and mohair program participants who have planted any grain crops are required to file a 1990 crop report to verify conservation compliance and swampbuster provisions. (Form ASCS-578)

"The report must be filed before producers can receive their wool and mohair price support payment," Harris said.

He said there will be no charge for the late-filed crop report if producers do not wish to receive history credit. A fee will be charged if farmers have grown an agricultural commodity and request history credit.

All farmers participating in ASCS programs are required to certify that they will not violate sodbuster and swampbuster provisions during the program year. Wool producers who plan to break out any land should contact the ASCS office. If the land is highly erodible, farmers must have a conservation plan before a crop is planted. (Form AD-1026).

Sheep and goat producers in Texas received price support payments totaling about \$55 million last year. The

to cost approximately \$13,000, and, following board discussion, members voted to advertise for bids on the project.

federal support price for 1990 shorn wool marketings is \$1.82 per pound. Mohair marketings will be supported at \$4.532 per pound, according to Jerry Harris.

The ASCS official says sales slips for 1990 marketings may be turned in any time before the Jan. 31, 1991, deadline.

### Absentee voting begins Oct. 17

Absentee voting by personal appearance in the Nov. 6 General Election begins Oct. 17. Mail-in absentee ballots are being mailed out to applicants from the office of County Clerk Debbi Puckett.

Oct. 30 is the last day applications for mail-in ballots may be received, and Nov. 2 is the last day to vote absentee.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Nov. 6. Pct. 1 voters will vote at the courthouse. Those registered to vote in Pct. 2 will cast their ballots at Ozona Junior High. Pct. 3 votes at the civic center and Pct. 4 at Ozona Primary School. Voters in Box 36 cast their ballots at the WTU power station.

### Boswell's contract amended

During a special meeting of the Crockett County Hospital Board Monday night, an agreement was reached with consultant Bill Boswell to amend his contract.

Although no details of the amendment were released in a statement to The Stockman, board member John Daniels said "we expect that he (Boswell) will be with us up to six months."

"The board feels he has performed in an acceptable manner. We have need of his services in the immediate

future."

Board members attending the meeting included Armando Arredondo, Concha Zapata, Martha Gries, Fred Deaton and Daniels.

At an Oct. 11 meeting of the board, a personnel search committee was formed to seek an additional lab technician and nursing staff.

"We met in special session to comply with the commissioners' request that we form a committee," Daniels said.

Committee members are Mrs. Gries, Mrs. Zapata and Daniels.

### Childress and Williams re-elected to SWCD

Pleas Childress III and Larry Williams were recently re-elected to the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on Oct. 9. Childress represents zone 2 of the district while Williams represents zone 1.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

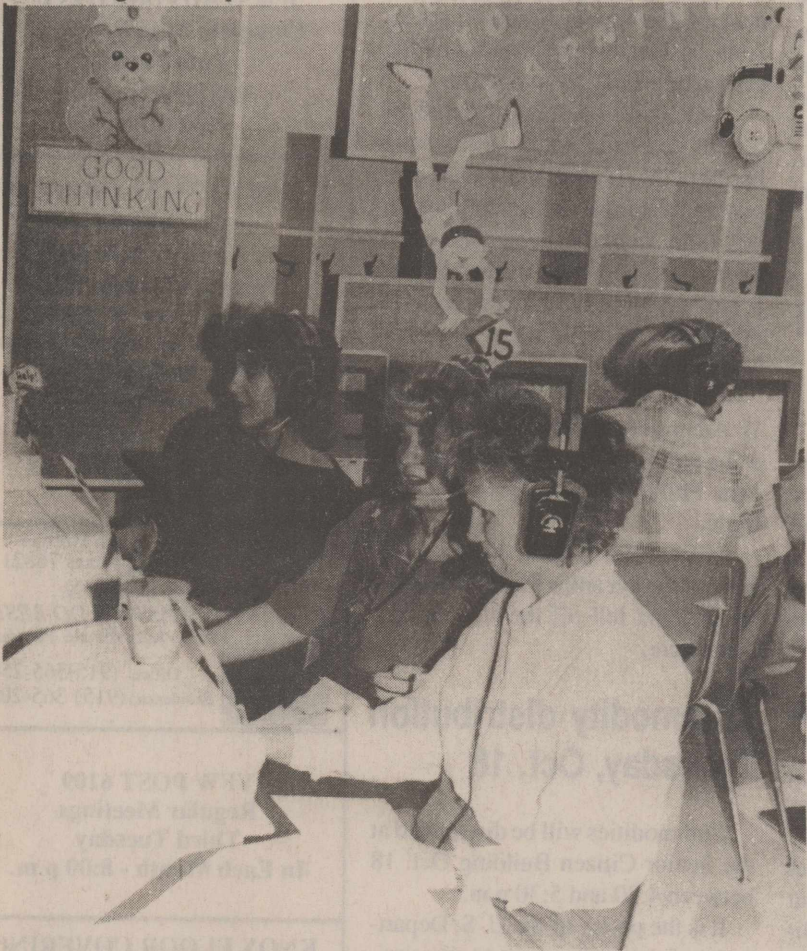
The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As two of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Childress and Williams will be re-

sponsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners within the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Organized in 1950, the Crockett SWCD was instrumental in coordinating the Johnson Draw watershed protection project after the flood of 1954. The district continually identifies resource concerns and promotes the wise use of these resources.

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## Letter to the Editor

This letter is to express my opinion on the new rule set by commissioners and whoever else is involved concerning letting people work after they have resigned or quit. I think it is ridiculous! Why does anyone have to be on the "part-time" list when we are so short of help in the first place? Why would anyone want to go out and look for help to staff the hospital when you already have people who are familiar with the routine, the place and the people, and are willing to help out in an emergency? It doesn't make sense to me.

What would you, the commissioners do in an emergency, if you were the ones training some strange person and a person in cardiac arrest came in? That person would not know where any of the supplies are, they might even not know how to run the cardiac monitor and with our new computerized EKG machine, there are not too many people who know how to run it in the first place. It would all be left up to the one person who does know, and in an emergency such as that, it takes more than one person to handle that emergency room. So why even mess with the system when it's working just fine as it is? Is this some show of power we're seeing here? Is it "we're in charge, our word is the last say-so and you do as we say"? That's sure the way it's coming across to not only me, but to a lot of people here at work. If you all think you're going to go out and pluck nurses off the street, you've got another think coming. Nurses are in great demand and short supply-has anyone heard of the nursing shortage nationwide right now? It's been this way for a while! I think you should appreciate the fact that we want to continue helping the hospital even if we won't be employed here any longer.

I also want to say that there are a lot of people here who will be losing a lot of vacation and sick leave due to the proposed policy changes. That is not fair considering that a lot of them have come in to work when they were sick, out of respect to fellow employees because we were short-handed in the first place. We have part-timers who usually end up working 8-10 days a pay period and aren't getting any benefits at all! You cannot run the hospital like you do the road department or any other county agency. We

do not close for holidays. We either take Christmas or New Year but not both-we don't ever close-we are open 24 hours-a-day, seven days-a-week. We don't have the option of planning big family get-togethers on special holidays like other county employees do. We chose nursing as our specialty because that's what we like-it is a very stressful job-don't make it any more stressful with policy changes. Be thankful that we do have coverage, even if it's barely.

Last, but not least, I have a request to make. This is my own opinion, nobody else's. I find it very disturbing when patients come in to Dr. Sim's clinic and call him by his first name. The man spent at least 10 years of his life training for what he is today and the least you can do is show him a little respect and use his title which is Dr. Sims, Not Marcus! He has never complained, but I don't ever hear anyone call Dr. Owensby Robert or Bob. Even Mrs. Owensby calls him Dr. Owensby.

In closing I wish to say I will miss Crockett County Hospital and all of its staff. I do plan to return to Ozona and hopefully find employment here again after I finish R.N. school. We are all like one big family and I will miss each and everyone of you.

Another thing . . . .  
I hope someone will open their eyes soon and replace our morning shift nurses aide they took away because of "budget". We are the busiest shift of all because of clinic and with all the terminally ill patients we have had lately and still have we don't need cutbacks. That only cuts back on our patient care no matter how you look at it. When you run the emergency room, the clinic and patients on the floor with only one R.N., one L.V.N. and one nurses aide for the whole thing, we're leaving our selves wide open for a lawsuit because we NEVER KNOW what kind of emergency will walk in the back door, and being so close to I-10, we've had some serious emergencies where it has taken all of us to handle it, leaving patients on the floor without any nursing personnel available. We do have a housekeeper that goes out of her way to help us. We do appreciate you Lelia. People-let's help the hospital, not hinder it-it may not be much, but we could save your lives one of these days, regardless of some public opinion.

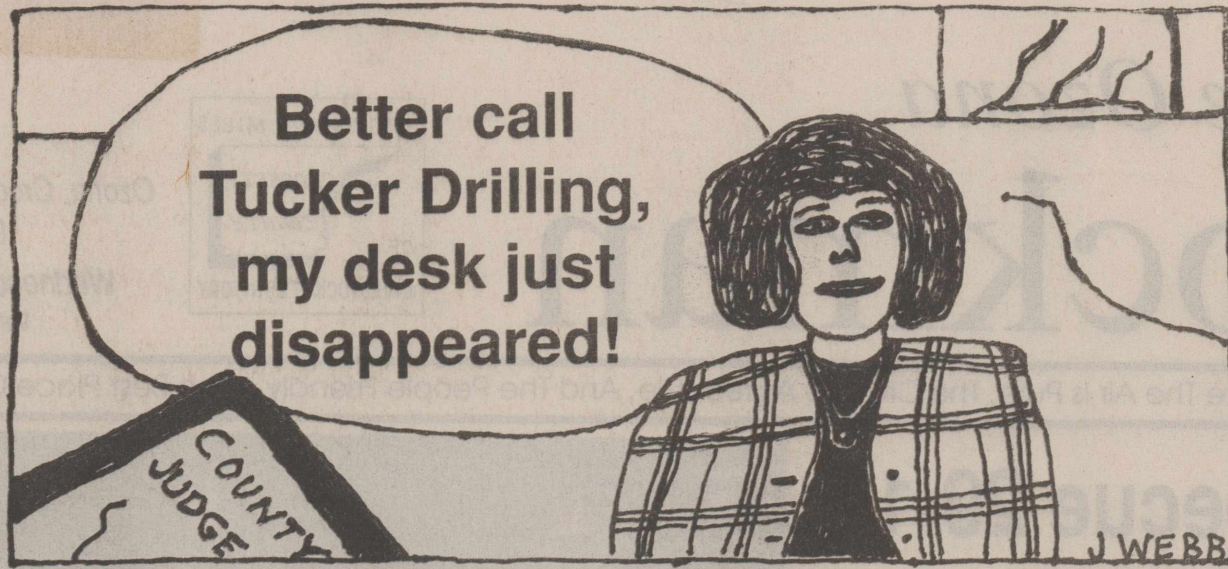

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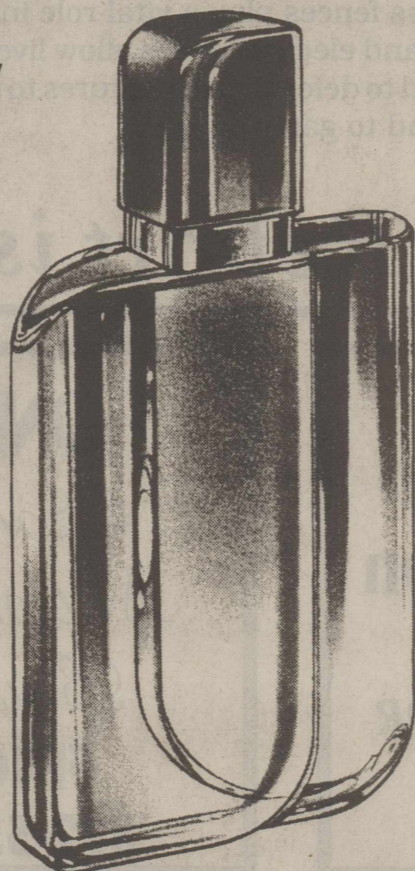
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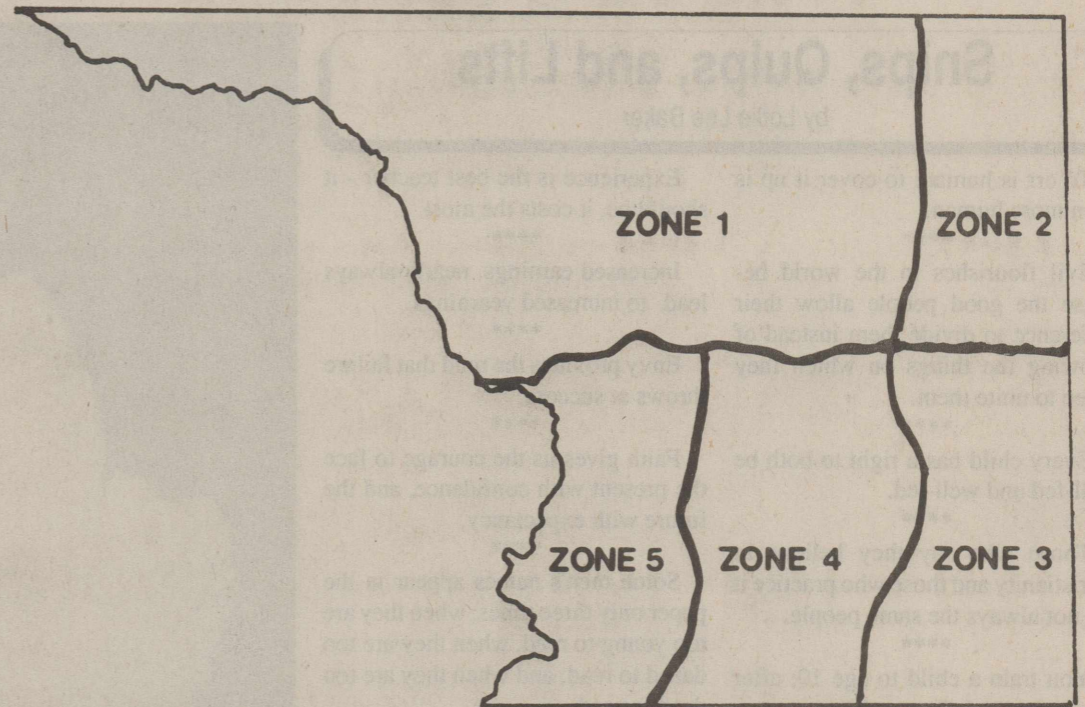

### District

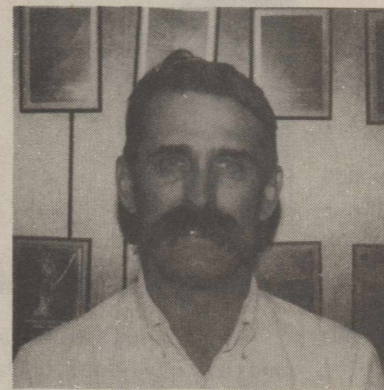
The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was established in 1950 to identify and prioritize resource concerns within the county and to serve as a medium for local ranchers in coordinating assistance from federal, state and local agencies. Agencies providing assistance include the Soil Conservation Service, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and University of Texas Lands.

A Memorandum of Understanding between the USDA-SCS and the District allows the SCS to furnish technical assistance to ranchers, farmers and other interested individuals in order that conservation plans can be developed to meet the needs and capabilities of the land and the objectives of the landowner.

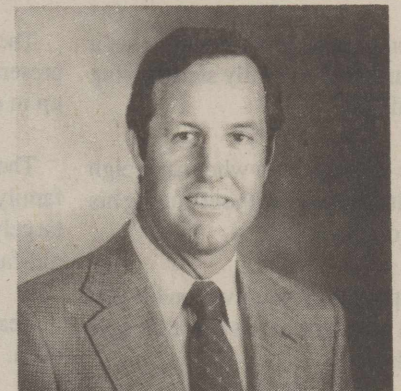
The District is governed by a five member board of locally elected directors. These directors serve as a voice for landowners and operators within the District. Directors for the past year include Earl Acton, chairman; Bud Hoover, vice-chairman; Gene Perry, secretary; Pleas Childress III, member and Larry Williams, member.

Improper grazing management, brush infestation, conserving soil, water, plants and related resources and improving wildlife management on rangeland as a secondary land use are the primary concerns outlined in a long range program and plan.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District realizes these concerns need to be addressed and steps taken to solve these problems in order to protect our resource base.



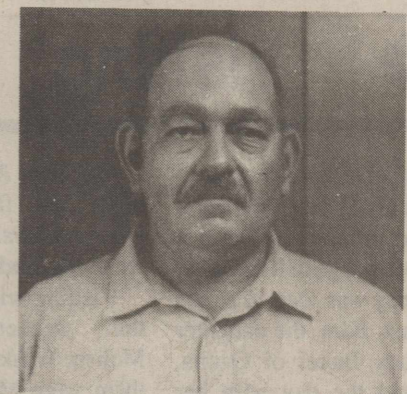

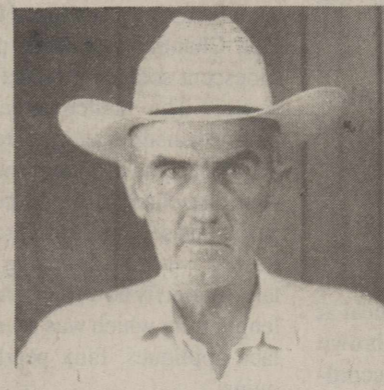

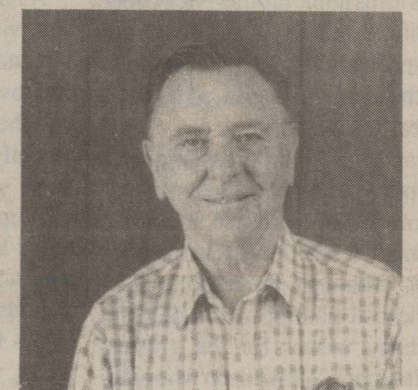

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## Conservation Rancher

Bob Bissett was selected by the district as the Outstanding Conservation Rancher for Crockett County the past year and was honored at an awards banquet in San Angelo. Bob operates approximately 27,000 acres in the northern portion of the County.

As all good ranchers do, Bob has set goals to improve the overall ranching operation. Increasing the amount of desirable forage by maintaining safe stocking rates is one of his main objectives. Reducing the amount of undesirable brush species through the use of various control methods and sound grazing management practices is also a high priority.

Bob runs a combination of cattle and sheep. He has a thorough understanding of plant responses to livestock grazing and practices the take half - leave half rule and closely monitors key grazing sites to assure proper grazing use on key plant species.

Bob has carried out brush control practices on approximately 14,400 acres. Over 10,000 acres has been treated chemically. He was one of the first ranchers to implement prescribed burning into a brush management program and has spent the last several years carrying out prescribed burns to control pricklypear and associated cactus species.

Bob has worked closely with the Soil Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Extension Service and the Texas A&M Experiment Station. He has promoted range management by demonstrating his ability to apply sound grazing management practices on the ground.

Because of dedication in conserving and improving the range and wildlife resource, the Crockett SWCD was honored to select Bob Bissett as the County's outstanding conservation rancher.

## Brush Management



These noxious species rob valuable moisture from more desirable vegetation thus reducing the amount of grazeable production.

Periodic deferments in combination with proper grazing use on forage species are key components to any successful brush management program. The District feels that a combination of sound management practices and timely brush control will allow producers to improve range and wildlife resources.

## PSAT/NMSQT test offered to juniors

This fall nearly 1.8 million students across the United States who take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will have a special opportunity to familiarize themselves with the testing format also used on the scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

This year the PSAT will be offered Tuesday, October 23rd, at Ozona High. Students need to see Mr. Probst, to sign up and pay their \$6.00. The number of tests are limited, so it is on a first come first served basis. Registration began on October 10th and will run through noon on Monday, October 22nd.

Through the PSAT, eleventh grade students (Juniors) are selected for the National Merit Scholarship Program, which enables academically talented students, nationwide to compete for scholarships. Hispanic students are also considered for the National Hispanic Scholar Awards Program, funded through a \$2.1 million grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. In addition, students can use the test as a guide to see how they rank nationally with other Juniors.

As preparation for the 100-minute, two-part test, students receive a Student Bulletin containing a complete sample test with an answer key and scoring instructions.

After taking the test, students will receive a booklet, About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores, a descriptive explanation of the test results. Students will also be able to compare their individual answers with the correct answers by consulting the Report of Student Answers, another valuable guide they receive. Actual test booklets will be made available to allow students to spot and work out answers correctly.

### Halloween

As a child, like all children, I looked forward to Halloween. It was a night of costumes and candy. It was fun! As I grew older, wearing a false face and collecting a sack full of treats were not nearly as much fun as soaping windows and turning over garbage cans. That, too, became old hat with the passing of years as more dangerous and destructive behavior became appealing. Anyhow Halloween was a night to do mischief.

Let me say up-front that I am not opposed to children having fun on a Fall evening. Dressing up like Ninja-Turtles, E. T., or Miss Piggy and canvassing houses for favors is innocent fun. Only a grouch would frown upon such activities. Surely, there is no harm in bobbing for apples, making pop-corn balls, and playing games.

The problem is Halloween, for many people, is not game playing. I can hear some saying that since I'm a minister I object to Halloween on religious grounds. Well, I do, and for good reason, but let's drop the religious basis and talk practicality for a moment.

Times have changed. Trick or treating on Halloween, however innocent it might appear, has turned into a virtual nightmare for many children and their parents. Apples with implanted razor blades, or candy interlaced with bits of glass or poison, cannot be dismissed lightly. But, these are common occurrences in many cities and towns across the country on Halloween. Saying that "it won't happen here" is absurd.

Many communities recognize the

dangers associated with Halloween and promote preventive measures. Hospitals offer their x-ray machines to examine treats. They prefer to do that than have children in their Emergency Rooms for stomach pumping or stitches. Police Departments step up their efforts to warn parents to accompany their children in door-to-door collections. Schools and churches open their facilities for special activities. All of these are precautionary measures - and for good reason!

I really don't know why some people want to harm children, but I do know that it is an escalating problem. For some instance reasons, many people delight not only in horrifying children but harming them as well. These psychotic personalities find Halloween a perfect opportunity to vent their delusions on innocent, unsuspecting people.

Halloween is, after all, a time to scare people. Perhaps there is nothing wrong in a childish "Boo", but remember, times have changed. The means and methods of scaring people have been sophisticated by Hollywood. Axes, chain saws, and midnight massacres with a profusion of blood and guts are common-place on the big screen and tube these days. Some folks think that these happenings are real - and they often become just that.

I saw a child in this town that had

become frightened because a witch was supposedly in the draw one Halloween. The child had been told that, innocently enough I presume, at school. Nevertheless, it was a frightening thought to a youngster who might be alone for a while in the afternoon. When fear replaces fun, it's time to evaluate what we are doing to our children on Halloween. The intensification of scaring children can result in a lifetime of phobias.

Vandalism increases on Halloween. While one might not object to having a house wrapped in toilet tissue, or having a window soaped, he would protest having property spray-painted, barricades in the streets, broken windows, etc. There is much destruction done, in the name of fun, on Halloween night each year. That should tell us that childish pranks are becoming more belligerent.

These thoughts have come from a practical rather than religious viewpoint. If you want to talk religious reasons, I'll be more than happy to accommodate you with a deluge of Scripture. If you want proof about the dangers of Halloween, I can give you an abundance of both sacred and secular testimony. But I'm not preaching here, I am pleading, on systematic grounds, for a demur recognition that Halloween is a dangerous night of the year.

Think about it!

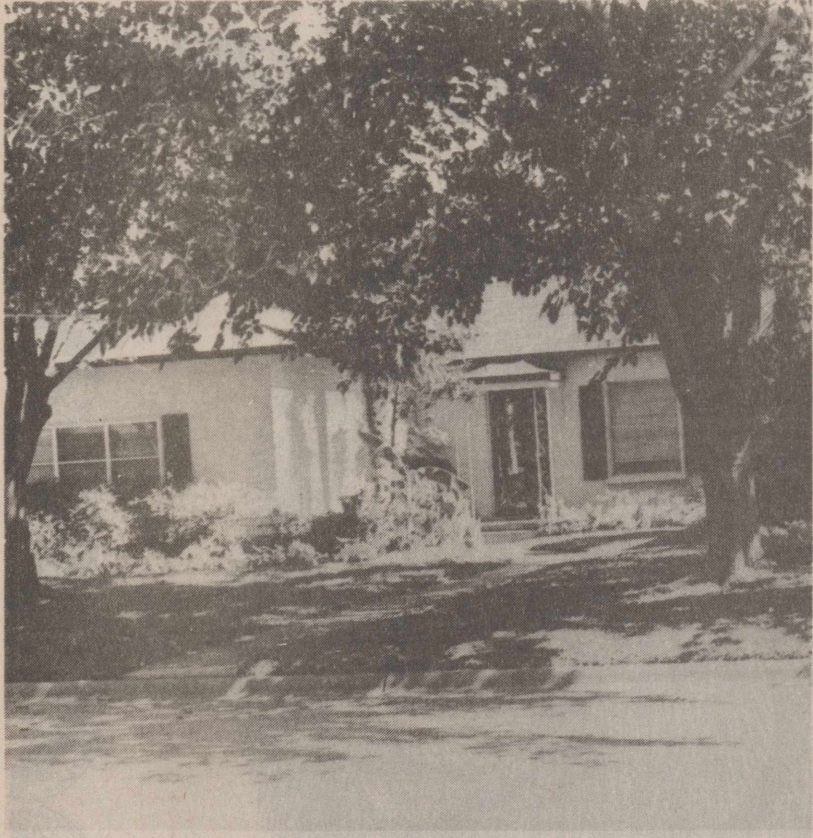

## Texas school students tested for higher level academic skills

Texas public school students will be tested on their higher-level academic skills and on more of the essential elements of the curriculum under a new student assessment program approved by the State Board of Education in May of this year.

The new program, called the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), will replace the state's existing minimum skills testing program in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 and will be given for the first time on October 16, 17 and 18.

Adoption of the program means that the Texas Education Agency will move from testing only minimum level skills in reading, writing, and mathematics to testing more content, including higher-order skills, such as critical thinking and problem solving. The new tests will also be broader in scope than the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test in that they will measure more of the essential elements of the public school curriculum.

As part of the expanded program, a written composition will be added to the exit-level or eleventh grade test for high school juniors who take the examination for the first time. High school seniors who failed to pass both sections of the TEAMS exit-level examination as juniors will not be required to take the exit-level TAAS. Students who fail any section(s) of the TAAS or TEAMS exit-level exam will have another opportunity to retake the failed section(s) in April of 1991.

At its July meeting, the State Board of Education set the minimum passing standards for the academic skills level on TAAS for the 1990-91 school year. For grades three and five, 65% of the test items answered correctly in Mathematics and/or Language Arts Reading will constitute mastery of that subject area. In Language Arts Writing, 65% of the test items answered correctly and a score of at least 2 on the written composition will indicate student mastery. In grades seven, nine, and eleven (exit-level), 60% of the items answered correctly will indicate mastery of each test, and in these grades, students will also have to obtain a passing score of at least 2 on the written composition.

The State Board rejected a Texas Education Agency recommendation to delay setting passing standards for this month's TAAS exam until the results for the entire state could be analyzed and to gradually increase the passing standard to 70 percent by 1991-93. "We suggested the phase-in because of uncertainty over whether students have been prepared for the

much harder task," Education Commissioner W. N. Kirby said.

The board members also voted to raise the passing standard to 70 percent of test items answered correctly for all students taking the exam as of the 1991-92 school year.

The standard was set lower for secondary students because the exam is more rigorous in all grade levels but particularly in grades seven, nine, and eleven (exit level). A field test of the exam taken by 210,000 students in 784 school districts last year indicated that no more than about half would pass in many of the categories tested even if the lower standards of 60-65 percent were established.

In grade nine math, for example, a total of 37 percent would have passed using the 70 percent passing standard, while 54 percent would have passed using the 60 percent standard. Only 18 percent of black 9th graders and 28 percent of Hispanic ninth graders would have passed using the 70 percent standard. But under a 60 percent passing standard, 33 percent of the black and 47 percent of the Hispanic ninth graders would have passed.

Although the test is to be used primarily for student remediation purposes, the scores will likely play a significant role in the accreditation of school districts.

The TAAS exam will be administered on Tuesday (writing), Wednesday (reading), and Thursday (mathematics), October 16-18. In Ozona the TEAMS exit-exam will be given on Wednesday (English language arts) and Thursday (mathematics), October 17-18. Student results will be received by the first of January.

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# J. V. Lions ride Stanton Buffaloes 34-0

Stanton J.V. Buffaloes' quarterbacks threw the ball up for grabs all night long, and Ozona J.V. defensive backs came down with it for four interceptions, one good for a touchdown Thursday night in Lion Stadium.

Stanton opened the fourth quarter only to be forced to execute a desperate tactic in order to stay alive. Their fake punt pass was intercepted by #24, Joe Hernandez, who returned it for a 48 yard touchdown. Mark Quiroz came up with the two point conversion pass to help Ozona lead 28-0.

Stanton tried to come up with something with the kick-off. Several plays later Stanton quarterback went to the air to his receiver deep in Lion territory, but was stopped by Manny Munoz. Again with another pass, #11 Matt Marshall latched on to his first interception of the night.

With 5:49 left in the game, Matt Marshall found Owen Powell for an 82 yard T.D., but Ozona couldn't find the upright and led 34-0.

Both teams exchanged fumbles before the ending whistle sounded, leaving the Ozona J.V. Lions on top 34-0 over the Stanton Buffaloes.

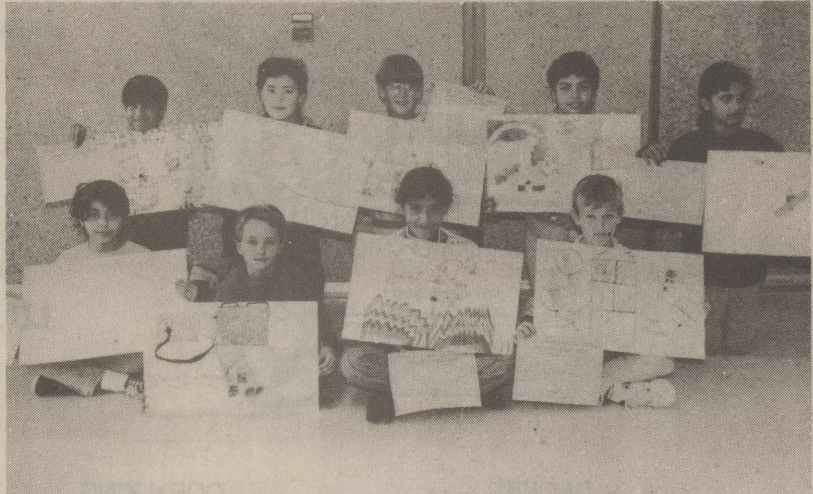

The monthly rates for Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are \$1.00 for residence customers and \$3.00 for business customers. The monthly rate for subscribing to both services is \$1.75 for residence customers and \$4.00 for business customers. During this experimental offering period the installation charges will be waived.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$752,000.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer will be offered on an experimental basis in selected areas throughout the state for 12 months. The availability of these services after that time will depend on Southwestern Bell's decision of whether to offer the services on a permanent basis.

## Extension Connection

### Health insurance supplements

Medicare pays for a large part of health care expenses, but it does not pay them all. There are limits on Medicare payments for some covered medical services, supplies and equipment. You must also pay certain amounts called deductibles and co-payments. Before you buy insurance to supplement Medicare, you should familiarize yourself with your Medicare benefits. Check with your Social Security office for information about current Medicare coverage.

Not everyone needs private health insurance in addition to Medicare. If you are a Medicare beneficiary enrolled in a prepayment plan, such as a health maintenance organization or a competitive medical plan which has a contract with Medicare, you may not need a Medicare supplement policy. Low-income people who are eligible for Medicaid generally do not need additional insurance. However, whether you need health insurance to supplement Medicare should be discussed with someone who understands insurance and your particular financial situation.

If you find you need additional health insurance coverage, follow these 12 tips:

-Shop carefully before you buy. Policies differ widely as to coverage and cost. Contact different companies and compare the policies carefully before you buy.

-Don't buy more policies than you need. Duplicate coverage is costly and unnecessary. A single comprehensive policy is better than several policies with overlapping or duplicate coverages.

-Consider your alternatives. Depending on your health care needs and finances, you may want to consider continuing the group coverage you have at work.

-Check for pre-existing condition exclusions. In evaluating a policy, determine whether it limits or excludes coverage for existing health conditions. Many policies do not cover

health problems that you have at the time of purchase.

-Beware of replacing existing coverage. Be suspicious of suggestions that you give up your policy and buy a replacement. New policies may impose waiting periods or have exclusions or waiting periods for pre-existing conditions.

-Be aware of maximum benefits. Most policies have some type of limit on benefits. They may restrict either the dollar amount that will be paid for treatment of a condition or the number of days of care for which payment will be made. Some insurance policies pay less than the Medicare approved amount for hospital outpatient medical services or service in a doctor's office even when they pay for the same services provided to a hospital in-patient.

-Check your right to renew. Beware of policies that let the company refuse to renew your policy on an individual basis except for failure to pay the required premiums.

-Re-instituting Medigap coverage. If you formerly had coverage under a Medicare supplement policy but discontinued it during 1989, you may have the right to re-institute that coverage. The new law which repealed the Catastrophic Coverage Act directs that Medicare beneficiaries who have Medicare supplement policies in effect on Dec. 31, 1988, and who terminated them during 1989, must be notified by their insurers that they have the right to re-institute substantially equivalent coverage.

-Be aware that policies to supplement Medicare are neither sold nor serviced the state or federal government. State insurance departments

approve policies sold by insurance companies but that only means the company and policy meet the requirements of state law.

Don't believe statements that insurance to supplement Medicare are government sponsored programs. Anyone trying to sell you an insurance policy and saying he or she is from the government is in violation of federal and state law.

-Know who you are dealing with. A company must meet certain qualifications to do business in the state of Texas. Agents must be licensed by the state and must carry proof of licensure showing their name and the company they represent.

### Little Miss, Mr. Holiday Pageant Nov. 10

An Ozona Little Miss and Mr. Holiday Pageant will be held Nov. 10 at 5:30 p.m. in the Ozona High School Auditorium.

According to pageant director Bonnie Hartman, there will be seven age divisions for girls and two for boys.

Girls may compete in divisions 0-18 months, 19-36 months, 3-4, 5-6, 7-9, 10-12 and 13-17. Boys will compete in ages 0-2 and 3-6.

Phases of the competition include a close-up interview, sportswear and holiday wear. Girls ages 13-17 will model evening wear instead of holiday wear.

This pageant will not include talent competition.

Winners will receive crowns, banners, trophies, flowers, Olympic medallions and surprise gifts.

Our Little Miss is the first children's pageant ever established. The first pageant was held in 1962.

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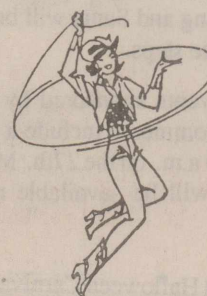
