lion people in the United States have diabetes, and half of them don't know it. More than 800,000 Texans are hought to have diabetes.
Weight control is something most diabetics are used to handling because it's crucial to their health.
However, fighting the temptation of delicious treats can be a challenge to anyone when it comes to eating out. "Just like the average dieter, many people with diabetes panic when they are served so-called forbidden foods," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz
nutritionist with the Texas Agriculnutritionist with the Texas Agriculholidays and restaurant menus can uin sincere efforts to follow a meal plan."
 ate foods that fit into their meal plans help prevent wide blood sugar swings, ielamowicz said. For dieters, stick-
ing tocertainchoices keeps them away from high-calorie foods.
"Nowadays, it's more acceptable to call the hostess or restaurant manage ahead of time to discuss the best way good idea is to make a dish using a diabetic or low-calorie cookbook and take it to help out the hostess." Also,

Parenting styles can predict kid's behavior
All parents have their own
"style"...and that style, along witheach child's temperament, personality and life experiences, are just some of the hings that affect the way that child responds.
Three f
Three family atmospheres have been identified which may affect
behavior. Researchers say a family may be either authoritarian, permissive, or authoritative.
Authoritarian parenting includes
gid, controlling practices. rigid, controlling practices. Parents often expect unreasonably adult be-
havior from their children, regardless havior rrom their children, regardess
of the child's age. They make all the decisions, discouraging the child's independence.
Usually, one parent is the dominant disciplinarian, and little encouragement or praise is given. Under hese circumstances, predictions of ho chility's rebellion by strong-willed children or timidity by complacent children, low self-esteem, dependency, fearfulness, difficulty in establishing close relationships, rejection of parental values and beliefs, and a high rate of anti-social behavior. The other extreme is permissiveoften in today's society. In this type of family, parents avoid exercising control of any kind, there is inconsis tency, little structure and few expectations set. The parents make few demands for responsibility, orderly behavior or social rules.

However, this type of family has a lotof nurturing and communication. Realy, the parent acts more as a friend and behavior.
How does a child feel in these families? Basically, they may feel insecure an unloved, have low selfconcept and find difficulty adjusting to structure in school and other social
settings. They practice little self-consettings. They practice little self-contion and thoughtulnessof others. They see no need to follow parental standards (there are none!) and have a high rate of antisocial behavior. Even though most families practice some of each of the authoritarian and permissive parenting, the ideal
atmosphere for children to develop capability, confidence, competence and healthy independence is the authoritative. In this environment, parents are clearly in charge and have set firm, well-defined guidelines, yet are flexible in establishing boundaries. There is mutual respect for feelings,
ideas and emotions, with acceptance
$f$ the uniqueness of each individual.
Reasonable expectations allow for mistakes and give appropriate encouragement and praise. There is healthy role modeling, nurturance and affection.

Children from these families have high self-esteem, adopt family values and beliefs and exhibit lower rates of antisocial behavior. They tend to be cooperative, friendly and are good decision-makers. They are achieve ment-oriented, creative and secure. All parents want to be good parents. Though few families achieve al the goals they like in the area of child hood behavior, these parenting style
guidelines can help families achieve that goal.

Just remember that many factors er than parenting style-environment, temperament, personality - can affect how our children turn out, but it's probably the most significant.
