Voters approve creation of water district in January 26 election

Voters gave the nod to creation of Emerald Underground Water District in an election held Jan. 26. Voting for the measure were 42 with nine against. Also approved was a tax levy of .05 per \$100. Thirty-eight voters approved the levy with seven opposing. Elected as directors were: Larry Williams 43, Johnny Jones 45, Reid Holmsley 44, Wade Richardson 45 and George Bunger 46. Emerald Underground Water District encompasses all of the county which lies outside the boundaries of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1. The district had its beginnings in 1987 when a group of interested persons began deliberations to create such a district. Local rather than state or

regional control of the county's underground water was the desired outcome. Public meetings were held, a steering committee formed and legislative action authorizing the formation of the district sought. In September 1989, the Governor signed legislation authorizing the formation of Emerald Underground Water Conservation District. Directors plan to meet the first Monday of each month at 7 p.m. at Crockett County National Bank. Immediate plans are to organize and determine the needs of the district. "We'll just have to get into it and find out what problems we have," said Johnny Jones.

Centennial events being planned

Plans for Crockett County's centennial are escalating as evidenced by a recent meeting of the event committee and other interested persons. Chairman Becky Childress outlined events already scheduled, and dates were finalized for a trail ride and tennis tournament. The trail ride was set for June 22 and 23, a Saturday and Sunday. Tentative plans include Saturday departure from Barnhart with night camp at Midway Lane. Persons interested in participating should contact Jim Wilson or Rick Hunnicutt. June 28 and 29 were suggested as

tournament days. Tim Brewer will organize a tennis tournament and Rick Hunnicutt a washer tournament. Also suggested was a domino tournament. A repeat of the Woman's League bathing beauty contest on July 3, Fourth of July activities in the park, fireworks and a dance sponsored by the chamber of commerce, a day of reunions on July 6 ending with a pageant, and a Sunday ceremony in the downtown park round out centennial week. Organizations planning additional special events during the week are asked to contact Mrs. Childress to be included in the schedule.

Rally Monday in support of troops

Postal rates increase February 3

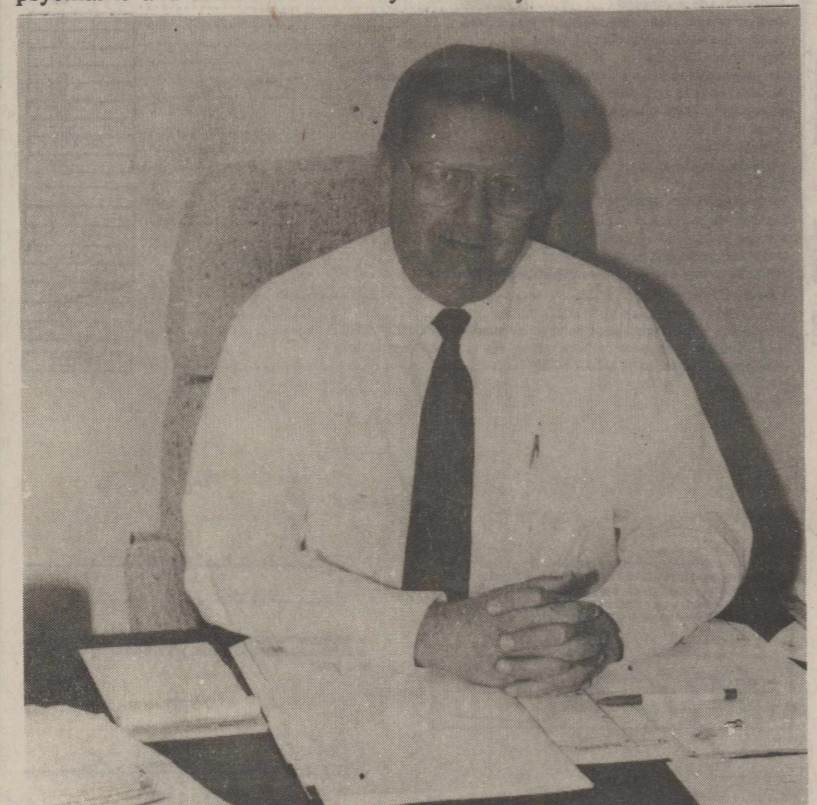
New postage rates which go into effect Feb. 3 increase the cost of a first-class stamp from 25 to 29 cents for the first ounce. Each additional ounce will be 23 cents. New "make-up" stamps can be used with your remaining 25 cent stamps explained Postmaster Floyd Hokit. The new 29 cent stamps are F denomination stamps and bear a flower

picture and the words For U.S. addresses only. Postage for first class letters to Canada is 40 cents for the first ounce. Mail going to Mexico requires 35 cents postage up to one-half ounce and 45 cents up to one ounce. The international airmail letter rate up to one-half ounce is 50 cents. The rate for postal cards changes from 15 to 19 cents.

Robert Denson at helm of hospital and care center

Robert Denson, new administrator for Crockett County Hospital and Care Center, began work Jan. 23. Denson comes to Ozona from Cortez, CO, where he was assistant administrator at a 61 bed hospital and 76 bed nursing home. Employment by health care companies has offered Denson the opportunity to develop his expertise in numerous areas. His experience includes work in acute care, long term care, psychiatric and addictions recovery

facilities. He is experienced in the management of both rural and large urban hospitals and care facilities. Denson says he plans no drastic changes initially. "I intend to work together with physicians and staff, and as a team we will make the changes," Denson said. One of the first things he expects to do is begin work to recruit a third doctor for Ozona. Both physicians and the board concur that this step is necessary.

Denson is interested in the possibility of resuming delivery of babies here and hopes to find a family practitioner who likes obstetric work. "We will have to research and see what statistics develop on charges versus costs. If we can't deliver babies here, we might develop an O.B. clinic." Other specialty clinics are also a possibility for Ozona through cooperation with large area hospitals. Development of a committee composed of hospital board members and members of commissioners' court to discuss various aspects of health care in the community and serve as a conduit of information is another proposal Denson would like to see implemented. Goals of recertification as a medicare hospital and vigorous attention to accounts receivable are receiving immediate attention. Mary Denson and the couple's daughters, Marissa, age 16, and Krista, 12, will join Denson here during spring break in March. Mrs. Denson teaches third grade in Cortez. She plays piano and organ at the Baptist Church. Both daughters are also musically inclined. Marissa plays a quad drum set in the high school band. Krista plays trumpet and is drum majorette of the junior high band. Hunting and camping are among Denson's hobbies. He looks forward to fishing at Lake Amistad and in the Kingsland area where his parents live. Mrs. Denson's parents make their home in San Antonio.

Cubs win second at Reagan County tourney

The Cubs poured in 22 points in the first half of the game and held the Badgers to 16. The Cubs added 21 points in the second half to claim the win 43-34. After a victory over the Badgers the Cubs found themselves facing the home team for the championship. They knew there would be lots of home team advantage and they would have to play their best. The first half of the game the Cubs trailed by six, 11-17. The third quarter the Cubs became serious and racked up nine points in the quarter, as well as the Owls. The fourth quarter found the Cubs within two points of the Owls, but the young

Lions set the Owls to the line twice and the Owls sunk two of three. The Owls defeated the Cubs 33-25. Valencia led the team with nine points and Sanchez added eight. This loss to Big Lake brings the Cubs' record to 8-1 and they will try to make it 9-1 this Thursday in McCamey. This will be their last game of the season. Come out and support the mighty Cubs. Claiming third place over the Badgers were the Greenwood Rangers. Stanton claimed consolation. The Cubettes also competed in the tournament. 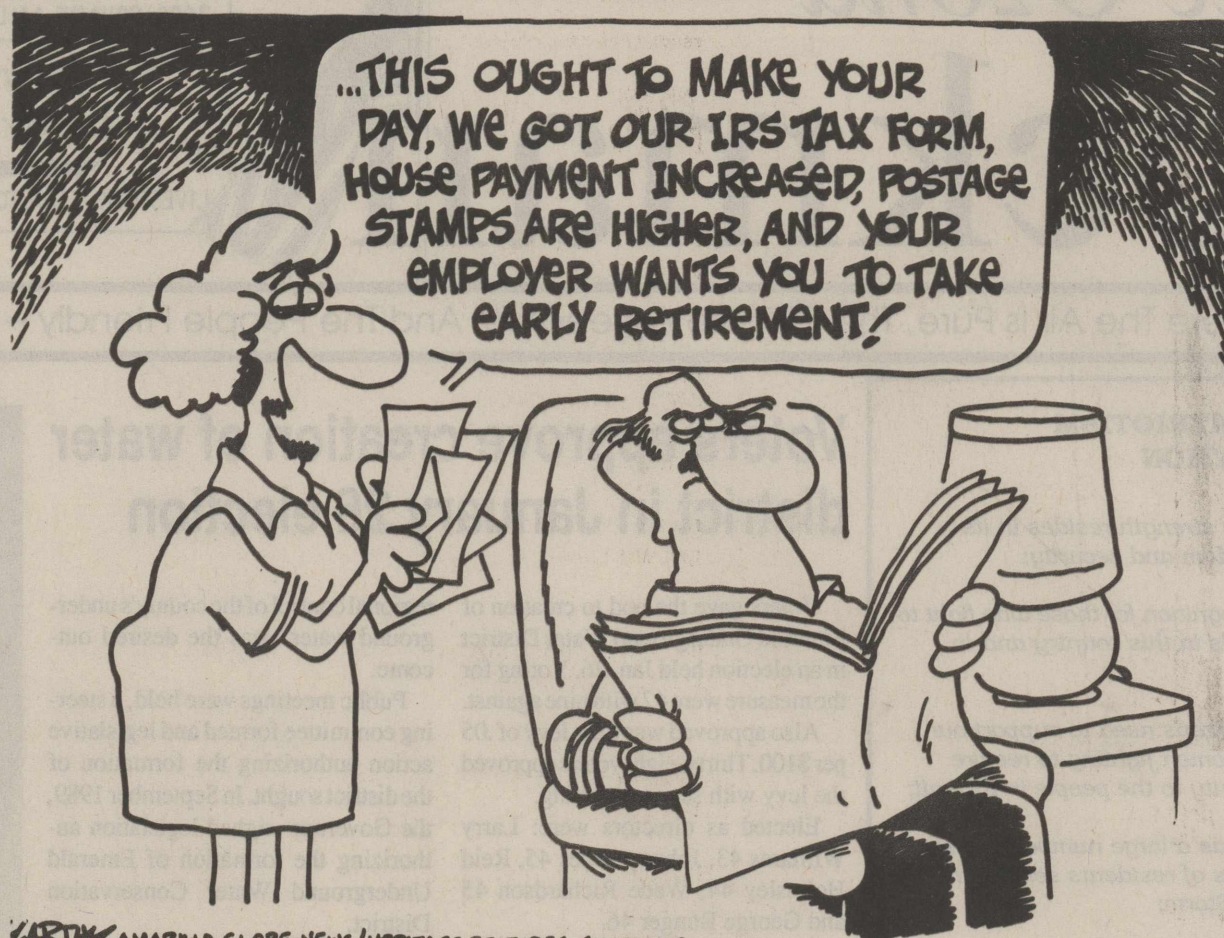

Cathy also enjoys adapting favorite stove top recipes such as her chocolate pie recipe to microwave use.

"Even our 6-year-old, Amanda, uses the microwave to fix cocoa," Cathy said. Cathy and Billy's older daughters, Julie and Haley, are also good cooks.

"Relax in the kitchen; don't be afraid to try a recipe," Cathy advises new cooks. "There are so many good cookbooks out." Cathy collects cookbooks and is distribution chairman for the League's Diamonds in the Desert cookbook.

Other community activities include being president of the Ozona Community Center board, historian of the P.T.A., and co-chairman with husband Bill of the all-school reunion planned for July. Cathy is also hospitality committee chairman at Ozona United Methodist Church.

CHOCOLATE PIE

- 1 9-inch pie shell, baked and cooled
- 1 c. sugar
- 2 squares (1-oz. each) unsweetened chocolate, chopped
- 2 Tbs. cornstarch
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 c. milk (lowfat)
- 3 slightly beaten egg yolks
- 2 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- 1 tsp. vanilla

In 1-quart casserole, blend together sugar, cornstarch and salt. Gradually stir in milk, mixing well. Add chocolate. Microwave at high power 5 to 7 minutes, stirring every 3 minutes until mixture is smooth and thickened.

Stir a small amount of hot mixture into egg yolks. Return egg mixture to hot mixture, mixing well. Microwave at medium 1 to 3 minutes, stirring after 1 minute, until smooth and thickened.

Add margarine and vanilla. Stir

until butter is melted. Allow to cool to room temperature and pour into prepared pie shell. Top with sweetened whipped cream or meringue. For meringue, beat 3 egg whites with 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar and 1/2 tsp. vanilla until soft peaks form. Gradually add 6 Tbsp. sugar, beating until stiff peaks form and sugar is dissolved. Spread on top of chocolate pie, sealing to pastry. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes.

GREEN BEAN BUNDLES

- 2 cans whole Blue Lake green beans
- Bacon
- 1/2 c. Italian dressing
- 1/2 tsp. sugar

Drain green beans. Wrap enough beans for individual servings in 1/2 slice bacon. Secure with toothpicks. Place beans in casserole. Mix dressing and sugar. Pour over beans. Marinate overnight or several hours before serving. Pour off marinade, leaving a little in bottom of casserole. Bake at 400 degrees for 20-25 minutes. In the microwave cook on high until bacon is desired degree of brown.

CREAMY ZUCCHINI

- 6 small zucchini, cut into 1/2 inch slices
- 2/3 cups sour cream
- 1 Tbsp. butter or margarine
- 6 Tbsp. grated sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 Tbsp. fresh bread crumbs

Cook zucchini until crisp-tender and drain. Combine sour cream, butter, 1/4 c. cheese and salt. Heat and stir until blended. Pour over zucchini. Top with bread crumbs and remaining cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes or in microwave until cheese melts. Let stand for 5 minutes.

OVEN FRIED CHICKEN

- 2 1/2 to 3 lbs. chicken, cut-up, washed and drained (skin if desired)
- 3/4 c. milk (lowfat)
- 1 egg or equivalent egg substitute
- 1 c. flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 2 tsp. paprika

Combine milk and egg. Combine flour and seasonings. Dip chicken in first mixture and then flour mixture. Shake off excess. Place pieces skin side up and not touching in greased (I use a non-stick spray) shallow roasting or jelly-roll pan. Bake at 375 degrees for one hour.

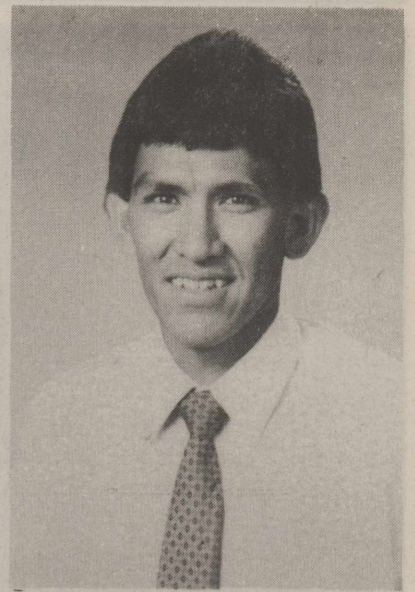
Hernandez awarded Baptist scholarship

Bosworth writings tell of life in early day Texas

Beginning with this issue, The Stockman will serialize the last works of former Ozonan Allan R. Bosworth, author of *Ozona Country* and other books. The writings are being published by The Stockman as part of Crockett County's centennial year events. The manuscripts were entrusted for publication to the late Bosworth's friend and fellow Ozonan, Roy A. Harrell, who has written the following introduction for the series.

INTRODUCTION

In the early sixties following the conclusion of a week of graduate school examinations in Baltimore, Maryland, I purchased a copy of *The New Yorker* so as to unwind and get my mind thinking about other things. Thumbing through the issue I read a story by a retired Navy Captain - one Allan R. Bosworth - which described in detail how his family had travelled in a Studebaker wagon via the Twin Mountains and ultimately to Ozona. Reflecting back on my childhood I could not remember ever having heard of Captain Bosworth so I called my parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Harrell. My father immediately said "Oh, Allie, well he was in my high school class." I then discovered that Captain Bosworth lived in Roanoke, Virginia, where I went deer hunting each year. So I went down to see him and found that he was a lot in common.

Almost immediately I found Allie Bosworth (he told me early in our acquaintance that all Ozonans called him Allie so I readily obliged) was true patriot. He expressed this many times as he filled the air with smoke from his pipe and spoke in very learned tones about the affairs of the world and the events which he had witnessed since "leaving our home town in South West Texas." He delighted in cooking good thick steaks and talking to me about an article or a book he was writing. At the time I first met him, he was in the process of completing *New Country* of which the article in *The New Yorker* was an excerpt. In addition *The Lovely World of Richi San* and *The Crows of Edwina Hill* were all being planned. In addition there were other ideas going through his mind, and we discussed until the late hours a novel which he entitled *Storm Tide*. From the time we first met he would use me as a sounding board and bounce ideas around to obtain my reaction. I spent many delightful days and evenings at his country home near Roanoke listening intently to tales about the Navy, Japan and most importantly, South West Texas. One of his neighbors told me that in talking with Allie, he quickly learned that Allie Bosworth was no ordinary Texan, but rather a South West Texan, and that there was never any doubt that Allie considered the words Southwest as one and not two words. He said that he was repeatedly told by Allie that Southwest Texans were different - and infinitely better - than all other Texans. Indeed Allie would point with pride to the fact that the World War II commander of U. S. naval forces in the Pacific-Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz hailed from Fredericksburg "which is on the eastern edge of Southwest Texas."

After that first contact with Allie, I frequently ventured to Roanoke. Just prior to being sent abroad to West Africa, to launch my career in the U. S. Foreign Service, Allie called me one evening and said, "Roy, Evert White just called today. They buried Houston Smith today. I have just got to take some time out to tell the story of Ozona." Prior to departing, I took some photos of Ozona to him and made suggestions about organization, supplied some tales for the book. We collected all of the research possible, but Allie decided he just had to take a trip to Ozona. The rest is history and well known to every Ozonan. Allie told me many times that *Ozona Country* was his gift to the home town that he loved with his whole being. From West Africa I consulted with him about the book just prior to publication. Following publication of *Ozona Country* I worked with him on *America's Concentration Camps*

which demonstrated his admiration for Japan and for the Japanese Americans who had been so badly treated by the United States during World War II. But *The Crows of Edwina Hill* came out before either *Storm Tide* or *America's Concentration Camps*. Allie told me that his aim for the rest of his life was to publish one serious book and one fictional book each year. He solicited and received my help with these endeavors. These tasks were imposed on me despite a busy career in the American diplomatic service. But these were never onerous tasks but just labors of love and the chance to work with an Ozona boy was just thrilling.

In the early seventies Allie suffered a light stroke. He had driven into Roanoke to mail the manuscript of his seventeenth *My Love Affair with the Navy* to New York. Next to his association with Ozona and with Southwest Texas, Allie loved the Navy. He felt that the Navy is and always has been people. He told me "The Navy is made up of a gallant, fighting, seagoing outfit which has never lost a war." En route from delivering this labor of love he was sure he saw another driver approach in his lane on the winding mountain road leading to his farm. He wrote me in West Africa that he had "experienced a stupid double vision." The upshot was that his head went through the windshield. Shortly thereafter he was involved in other mishaps culminating with a broken hip. He was then consigned to a nursing home where he spent the remainder of his life.

It was at the nursing home that I visited Allie for the last time. I had taken to him some of my home-made chili which he had drunk like a cup of water, much to the shock of the doctors and nurses in attendance. I was about to leave when he came out of his semi-coma and requested me to please sit down as he had something he needed to discuss with me. His mind and voice were clear and he began to describe in detail a manuscript which he had "hidden from the world." That manuscript consisted of two sets of stories. The first dealt with Texas and the second dealt with the Navy. I was also told about some incomplete prefaces and given his suggestions for their completion. He then gave detailed instruction about a general introduction entitled "Wagon Wheels Woke Me," which was itself about Allie's

own boyhood in Ozona. Apart from this "kickoff" as he called it, Allie set out to edit and interpret a collection of letters, all of which have one common ingredient. Those who came to Texas had the compulsion to tell the folks back home about their adventures and about the land in Texas. Allie describes these people as "invaders" because those who went to Texas in the days of its allegiance to Mexico were invaders indeed - so much so that Mexico finally had to try to halt immigration altogether. And those who went later under the Lone Star or even the Union were doing no less, because this far off land still belonged to the Comanches, the Choctaws, Apaches and other Indian tribes.

The sketches about the Navy and tangentially about Japan which Allie came to know because of his career in the Navy, also are fascinating. Allie felt that people are the nuts and bolts of the Navy. He explains this, including the occupation of Japan. Allie says that these stories show "just what can happen to an Ozona boy who goes off to see the big city and in so doing serves his country."

Despite his vast store of knowledge and his worldly travels, Allie always felt a part of Ozona and wanted *The Ozona Stockman* to serialize these last writings. He felt that there was some possibility that

all of these writings could and would eventually become a part of another book, thus getting me to write down some of my thoughts and ideas about the diplomatic service and putting these in a book. Allie told me that during his recuperation from the automobile accident, the collection and chronicling of these writings had provided excellent therapy but he felt that perhaps time was running out. "I wouldn't want just anyone to locate and work with that manuscript and perhaps getting it in shape will push you into writing yourself." He said that Navy ships are christened, launched and commissioned but a book is commissioned, christened and launched. He realized that this last literary effort might make no splash at all, unlike a big ship. Indeed he said this or any of his other pieces of writing could well sink without a trace but he still wanted Ozonans to stand by for the launching. His last thoughts centered around this topic. He especially wanted to be sure that my father, Evert White and T. A. Kincaid could all know what had transpired in the mind of this "Ozona boy who went to town to make good and did something for his country and for Texas." He then lapsed into sleep and died peacefully three weeks later.

Next week, "Wagon Wheels Woke Me", Allan R. Bosworth's Introduction to his final work.

Sheep dog trials draw 52 entries

Despite inclement weather, the first annual Crockett County Classic Dog Trial, held Jan. 18 and 19 at Weir-Perry Kennels on Taylor Box Road, was deemed a big success. Fifty-two dogs were entered in the two-day event, their handlers coming from Minnesota, Ohio, South Dakota, North Carolina, Florida and Colorado, as well as several regions of Texas. Judging was Thompson McKnight of Dumfries, Scotland, three-time winner of the International Sheep Dog Trials.

Economic injury disaster loan application filing deadline nears

A Presidential disaster declaration was made in May 1990 for Texas as a result of damages from severe storms, flooding and tornadoes which occurred April 15 through June 4, 1990. According to Small Business Administration (SBA) District Director, Julio Perez, of the San Antonio District Office, the filing deadline for economic injury disaster loan (EIDL) applications on Feb. 4, 1991. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for these SBA loans. The following counties are among those which were declared for EIDL assistance.

Crockett, Dimmit, Irion, Jackson, Kinney, Lampasas, Maverick, McCulloch, Menard, San Saba, Schleicher, Tom Green, Uvalde, Webb and Zavala.

Eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives in these counties must have sustained substantial financial losses from the effect of the severe storms, flooding and tornadoes. The loans do not cover physical losses. This program is available only to businesses that are considered small by SBA size standards

and do not have credit available elsewhere.

Reusing products to eliminate waste

The idea of being wasteful makes many people uncomfortable. Yet most of us continue to waste because we can't think of anything better to do with last year's phone book, draperies that are too short or a closet door that was scratched by a favorite pet. We are conditioned to think of things that are old, empty, worn, broken, ugly or marred, as useless so we throw them away without much thought to the consequences.

Most Americans buy far more than they can use effectively which is evident by bulging attics and garages.

The process of reusing is started with the assumption that the used materials that flow through our lives can be a resource rather than refuse. Waste, after all, is in the eye of the beholder. What is one person's trash is another one's treasure. If we really look to see items as raw materials, they can be reused to help solve everyday problems and needs.

Most of us, however, haven't even begun to exploit the resources in our trash. Once you have your mind set you can use trash for positive uses, you can begin to brainstorm and generate ideas. Reusing saves money, conserves resources and it satisfies the human urge to make things.

These strategies can be helpful:

- *Reuse containers at home or for school projects.
- *Reuse wrapping paper, plastic bags, boxes and lumber.
- *Give outgrown clothing to friends or a charity.
- *Buy beverages in returnable containers.
- *Try repair before you consider replacing lawn mowers, tools, vacuum cleaners, TV's.
- *Donate broke appliances to charity or find out if a local vocational school can use them for parts for students to practice repairing them.
- *Offer furniture and household items no longer needed to people in need, friends, or charity.

- *Sheets of paper that have been used on only one side can be used for note-taking or rough drafts of material.
- *Old, outdated furniture can be reupholstered or slipcovered. Add padding to the furniture to give it a new look. Often the frame can be modified slightly to change the way it looks.
- *Old pieces of furniture can be repaired or finished with special finishes such as splattering, sponging or rag painting which takes very little time and skill.
- *Old towels and sheets can be cut in small pieces and used for dusting and dust clothes.
- *Plastic bags and wraps can be used for storing items. They can be used for packing items for mailing.
- *Books and magazines can be donated to public libraries or to nursing homes.
- *Newspapers can be donated to pet stores.
- *Packing materials such as polystyrene, plastic quilting and similar packing materials can be saved and reused for the same purpose.
- *Carry a reusable tote bag or take bags to the store when you go shopping. There are attractive nylon mesh bags available that can be stored easily in the glove compartment of your car. And durable canvas bags that take up little space when not in use.
- *If you buy pre-prepared microwaveable dinners, save the plates for use when planning outside parties or for children.
- *Reuse containers. Many containers can be used in school projects. Ask your school what they would like you to save.
- *Old tires can be used in the garden and in the play yard.
- *Save items that are used in schools, day care centers, by scouts and senior citizens. Examples of these materials include: Carpet scraps, Christmas cards, cloth scraps, coat
