## School board reviews TAAS test results

evening, the Ozona School Board approved a proposai presented by to conduct a field survey of the high school campus to determine accessibility needs for the physically handicapped. The survey will consist of a campus, measurement of clearances at selected exterior and interior loca tions, and shooting of grades at selected locations to determine elevational differences and possible ramp configurations.

The survey data will be analyzed and then presented to the school board for review and comment prior to the Plan for Handicapped Accessibility required by the Texas Education Agency. After the plan has been Agency. After the plan and
adopted by the local board and approved by T.E.A., the district will have two years to remodel existing facilities to comply with physically the other three school campuses are already to compliance with handicapped accessibility rules.

William Ward said, "No person is strong enough to carry a cross and
a prejudice at the same time." Henry Fosdick said it a litle stronger, "Race prejudice is as thorough a denial of the Christian God as atheism. "I think they are right. One cannot follow Christ,
diced. diced. This nation has laws that grant
liberties to all. The Constitution gives oo every ciitizen certain rights that others can not take away without just
cause. It is true that justice is often cause. It is true that justice is often altered, but when it is - it goes beyond the intent of our founding fathers,
and, more importantly it goes against the degree of the Almighty.
Prejudice is, in my way of th ing, a clash. It is most often a collision of races, religion, or riches. There has always been prejudice, and only a naive person would think that all tinges of discrimination will vanish. But, we
must strive for the ideal and lament must strive for the ideal and lament
the fact that some folks think that they are better than others.
Prejudice in religion has a long and turbulent history. The Bible itself
is testimony to man's intolerance of other's religious practices. Christ came to obliterate the insidious practices of men on these grounds and His plea fell unnoticed by prejudiced men, and they nailed Him to a tree. At this very hour, in most parts o the world, religion is a violent clash between people as to who is closest to
God. Protestants and Catholics fight in Ireland, Hindus and Muslims battle in India, and our present war in the tween Christian and Islamic minds. While religion is strife-torn on the global scene, itis also battle weary in small-town America. Can we deny
that churches often ridicule others because they see themselves as God's elect and all others as blatant sinners?
Prejudiced minds often see their way as the only way. Now, before you blow your religious preference top, please know that God, in Christ, pleaded for unity among believers. God has a way that is right, true and just. God has one way - but it is found in Him, not in the weakness of men. Religious bias is a pretty good
indication that one doesn't understand the basic premise of Jesus Christ and His body, the church. Mark it down God loves all men and desires tha they come to acknowledge of His truth.
Ethnic groups clash. Black browns, whites, reds, and yellows al
fight to some degree fight to some degree because each
sees themselves as superior. All of us know the hatred expressed in racial

lurbulence. From aparthcid in South
Africato segregation in Hhe Old South we are made aware of the prejudices that races display.
In the South during the 1950s and 1960s, since I was white, I was privileged. In the Orient and in Africa,

Disapproval of family or friends and the belief that premarith sex is mor ally wrong.
The other important statistic concerning the communication proc
ess between teens and their parents is that children who talk with their parents about sexuality and their values regarding it are less likely to be sexually active.
Sadly, many teens say they never
or rarely talk to their or rarely talk to their parents-both mothers and fathers-about the same
topic.
"It's not that way here!" you say? Wrong. In our 1989 survey, we were able to see a direct relationship between abstinence for teens who said their parents had a strong influence on their sexual behavior-and between those who were sexually active who
said their parents had little orno said their parents had little or no influ-
ence. r? How do you suddenly become "sexpert". Well, thankfully that's not necessary. The main thing is to make the effort to open lines of communication between yourself and your teen about the subject.
hat may seem a difficult task, parent relations are a bit strained in these years. Building a good relationship and talking about sexuality before they're teens is the key. After all, statistics show boys tend to have their first sexual experience in the seventh
grade; girls a year later. This means if grade; girls a year later. This means if with your child by the sixth grade, you could be walking a tightrope blindfolded.
