

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

Rankin child facing bone marrow transplant

Trace Gipson is a six-year-old child of Rankin, Texas and if things don't change for him, he won't live to see his 7th birthday. Trace is afflicted

He is in need of an expensive bone-marrow transplant. However, what's lacking right now, even as Trace is undergoing extensive chemotherapy treatments in Cook-Ft. Worth Children's Medical Center, is

Lots of it.

Trace is the son of Rev. and Mrs. Randy Gipson, pastor of the Faith Assembly of God Church of Rankin and has been in Rankin for only two and one-half years. He has two sisters, Tori, who is eleven, and Trista, who is three. Both of his sisters are compatible for the transplant, but the test results are not back yet as to which one is the best suited to be the donor.

This disease was found the last part of June of 1990, and he has undergone chemo treatments since that time. The treatments he is currently taking will cost \$1500 per quart and he will require five quarts for a total of \$7500. The hospital cost is approximately \$1000 per day.

This last stay in the hospital lasted seven days and after being dismissed, he had to return the next day due to an infection and will be required to stay

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(Reprinted from the Rankin at least another four to five days. He will then have to return to the hospital for another five days of extensive chemo treatment before the transplant can take place.

> The family has already undergone several months of these treatments, and before this last stay in the hospital, had a medical bill of \$35,000. However, the real mind-boggling expense will come from the bonemarrow transplant that is to take place in about four weeks. The cost of this surgery is going to run about \$300,000 with the family facing the real dilemma of having to raise \$100,000 before the day of the transplant.

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

Sharp increases in rabies in SW Texas

Annual veterinarian vaccination drives are having special significance in Texas as a rabies outbreak grinds into its sixth month in the worst flareup in the state this year.

Uvalde and Edwards counties alone—counties which usually report only 1 or 2 cases per year—reported almost a third of the cases statewide reported in February.

Dr. Catherine Tull, a veterinarian with the Texas Department of Public Health Region 6 office here, said 21 confirmed cases of rabies and more than 20 clinical cases in domestic and feral (wild) animals have been reported in her 21-county region since January. Most of these cases have been in foxes and most were in Uvalde and Edwards counties.

In February alone, 25 cases of rabies were confirmed by the Bureau of Veterinary Public Health statewide. Eight of the cases were in Tull's re-

Four confirmed cases of rabies out of 9 animals tested have been reported in rural animals in Crockett County since January 1, 1991. One skunk, one fox and two stray cats tested positive.

Reagan County which does not have veterinary service has sent the Ozona Veterinary Clinic one stray cat which tested positive.

Coming up second in number of reported cases for January was Region 6 (North Texas) with seven cases reported. The largest number of cases—three—in that region were reported in Denton County. No figures were available by region for February, but Denton County had reported three positive cases in skunks.

Uvalde County reported four cases in January, five in February, and four so far in March, and Edwards County reported two cases in January and February and three thus far in

Sutton County—just north of Edwards County but in a different public health region—reported two cases in January and four cases in

Rabies is one of the oldest diseases known to man. A highly fatal disease for wild and domesticated animals and man, it affects the central nervous system. The highest incidence is in wild animals, particularly skunks, foxes, bats and racoons, said Dr. Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

Rabies is endemic in Texas, with the disease being more prevalent in some counties than in others. Areas of outbreaks change each year and some counties may report no problems at



Where do you get your nutrition information? I hope it's not from a national periodical where husbands are found to be vampires and 190year-old women give birth to alien babies. You get the point.

Advice on nutrition has become almost as common as advice to the lovelorn in popular magazines. Most people wouldn't think of experimenting with their health - yet that's just what happens when they indiscriminately follow the advice given in many of these magazines.

The Food and Drug Administration surveyed the nation's newspapers and magazines for one month several years ago - and came up with a total of 435 questionable ads in publications ranging from the smallest of weekly newspapers to multi-million circulation magazines.

But those 435 ads hardly scratch the surface of the true volume of dubious advertising in that period. After all, with more than 10,000 daily and weekly newspaper and generalcirculation magazines in the U.S., any such search is going to miss a lot!

Unfortunately, many Americans cling to the mistaken notion that if something's wrong with your body, food either caused it or can fix the problem!

Magical thinking about food is as old as human mythology and is not easily overcome by the relatively new science of nutrition. Our minds may recognize that moderation is the key to a healthy diet, but our hearts are often swayed by the extravagant by the Texas Agricultural Extension promises of nutrition extremism.

We need to make our own informed judgements about the accuracy - and usefulness of - nutrition advice. Dr. origin or handicap.

-- Be wary of anyone who uses only anecdotes to support a claim. Testimonials don't prove a treatment works. Look for controlled studies.

-- Adopt a healthy lifestyle. Eat a balanced diet; maintain a reasonable weight; and exercise appropriately.





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NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CROCKETT COUNTY WATER CONTROL & IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, P. O. Box 117, Ozona, CROCKETT COUNTY WATER CONTROL & IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, P. O. BOX 117, Ozona, Texas 76943-0117 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10059-01 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 500,000 gallons per day from the Main Wastewater Treatment Facilities. The permittee is also authorized to dispose of the treated effluent by irrigation. The plant site is approximately 3,000 feet west of State Highway 163 and approximately 2.5 miles south of Interstate Highway 10 in Crockett County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Johnsons Draw; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge and whether the proposed discharge will cause significant degradation to any high quality waters in the area. The unclassified receiving waters of Johnsons Draw have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are contact recreation, exceptional quality aquatic habitat, and public water supply. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit except that effluent limitations for minimum dissolved oxygen concentration have been added and provisions for the disposal of sludge have been made more stringent. The renewed permit has also added application rates not to exceed 4.5 acre-feet/acre/year for the irrigated land. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the <u>Texas Water Code</u> and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the <u>Rules</u> of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application.
