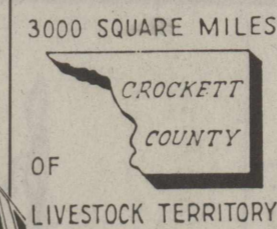

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS education is critical to the success of a free society; and

WHEREAS the vast majority of the men and women who served in the United States Armed Forces during the Persian Gulf War were educated in the free public schools of the United States, including those in Texas; and

WHEREAS the ability of the American forces to master the complex technology used in advanced weapon systems was a critical factor in the successful campaign to liberate Kuwait; and

WHEREAS the education that our troops received as children in our public schools from dedicated, well-qualified school teachers and administrators provided them with the level of knowledge, skill, and ability necessary to master this technology and successfully liberate the nation of Kuwait in the face of very difficult odds; and

WHEREAS General Omar Nelson Bradley, one of this country's most outstanding military commanders, once said that the teacher is the real soldier of democracy, that others can defend it, but only the teacher can make it work; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Texas State Board of Education recognize the contribution that our school teachers and school administrators have made to help preserve the democratic principles of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, upon which this state and country are founded; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this resolution be transmitted to all school districts in the State of Texas and that a copy be included in the permanent records of the State Board of Education.

WITNESS our signatures this eighth day of March, nineteen hundred ninety-one, in Austin, Texas.

## State school funding bill affects Ozona adversely

Under the finance plan signed into law Monday, Ozona schools stand to lose \$847.00 per student next year based on average daily attendance.

The reform plan places school districts in larger education taxing districts to balance money available between poor and more affluent schools.

Crockett County is in a county education district with Jeff Davis, Presidio, Pecos, Val Verde and Kinney counties.

Under the plan, all school districts in the state are required to set a tax rate of 72 cents per \$100 valuation for 1991-92, increasing to \$1.00 by 1994-95. The property tax revenue is pooled within the county education districts and redistributed equally, based on the average daily attendance.

Districts may tax above the minimum up to \$1.50 and do not have to share money raised above the 72 cents.

Ozona schools this year spend \$5,035 per student based on average daily attendance. To recoup and maintain the same level of funding next year under the finance plan, the school tax rate would have to increase from 90 cents per \$100 to \$1.05, Supt. Jim Payne said Monday.

Local property taxes provide \$4,586 of the \$5,035 with the balance coming from the state.

"If there was a change in the way we evaluate property, we wouldn't have to raise taxes that much (15 cents); we would only have to raise taxes two cents," Payne said.

The current school tax rate in Crockett County is 90 cents per \$100. The disparity between this and the 77 cent tax rate shown in an article in Sunday's San Angelo Standard Times results because not all property in the

county is valued at 100%, Payne said.

The dollar amount would be basically the same for the taxpayer whether he was paying 92 cents per \$100 on 100% market valuation or \$1.05 on 60% valuation, Payne explained.

Total valuations are shown within the county at \$477 million while the State Property Tax Board shows \$505 million, Payne said.

"Now we will pay out (into the county education district) on what the state says our values are and take in on what we say they are."

A printout from the State Property Tax Board shows taxes assessed in this county at the following percentages of total market value:

"Needless to say, we're not very happy with this bill. It affects our school system very adversely."

How to make up for the lost funding is a problem the board of trustees and Payne will have to wrestle with during the next few months while setting the budget.

"I hope the citizens realize there's going to be higher taxes because the state mandates a tax rate." People need to realize local taxes will have to be raised to fund education because the legislature doesn't want to raise state taxes.

## Spc. Dale Perry returns from six month stay in Saudi Arabia

First graders at Ozona Primary School welcomed Desert Storm veteran Dale Perry home last week. Perry, brother of teacher Jeannine Henderson, visited the school to tell the students about the Gulf War and how important their support was to him and other soldiers.

Perry, who is stationed at Fort Hood, spent six months in the Middle East. Pointing to a map of the region, he explained to the youngsters how his assignment took him from Dharhan to the field near Riyadh before camping near the border of Kuwait for two weeks. The troops then moved on to Basra to hold that part of Iraq.

The children were filled with questions about the weaponry, deaths, terrain and way of life in the desert.

"It was like camping out for six months, but we had cots," said Perry of Army life in the desert. After the war started, field showers were made from cans with holes in them. "Everywhere we went, we made foxholes."

"The movies you see about war on television are completely different. This was not people against people."

"I never got in where they were bombing," said Perry. Although there were U. S. servicemen killed, Perry told the children that he never saw any. "I never had to shoot," he explained, saying that they never got to practice. His personal weapons included M-16 and M-60 machine guns.

A humorous account of watching a herd of camels crossing the road one by one after stopping at a camel crossing sign and looking both ways also interested the little listeners.

"It was scary; everybody missed their families. I'm glad to be back, and I appreciate the support you gave me while I was over there," Perry told the children.

The youngsters sent letters, birthday greetings and care packages to Perry.

He is the son of Willa and Jerry Perry of Ozona.

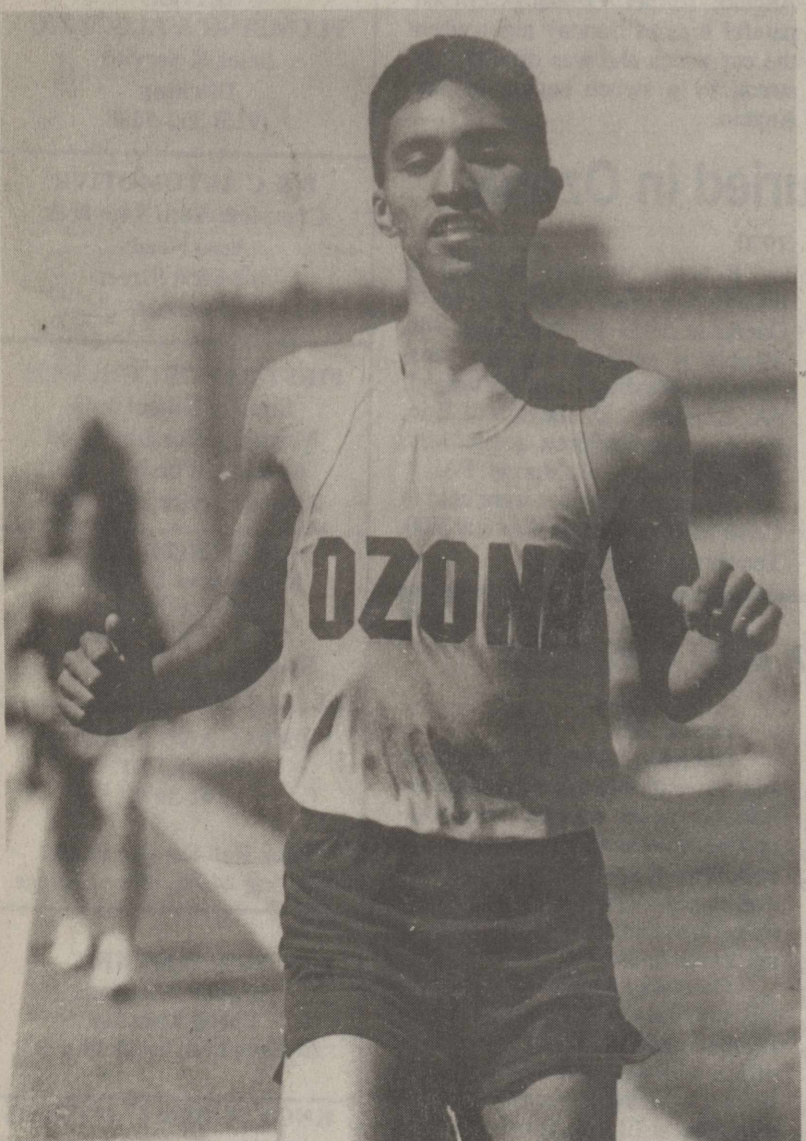

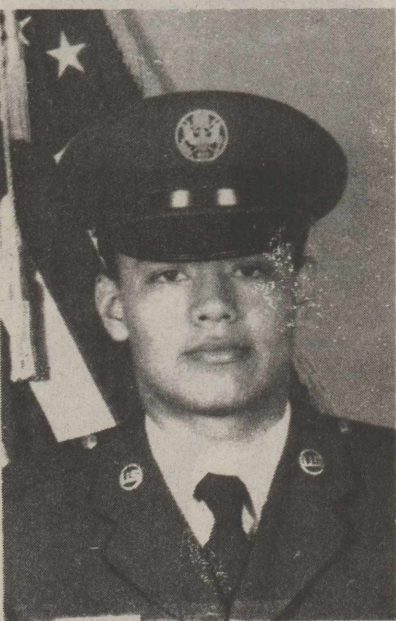

During the six weeks of training the airman studied Air Force mission, organization and customs and received special training in human relations.

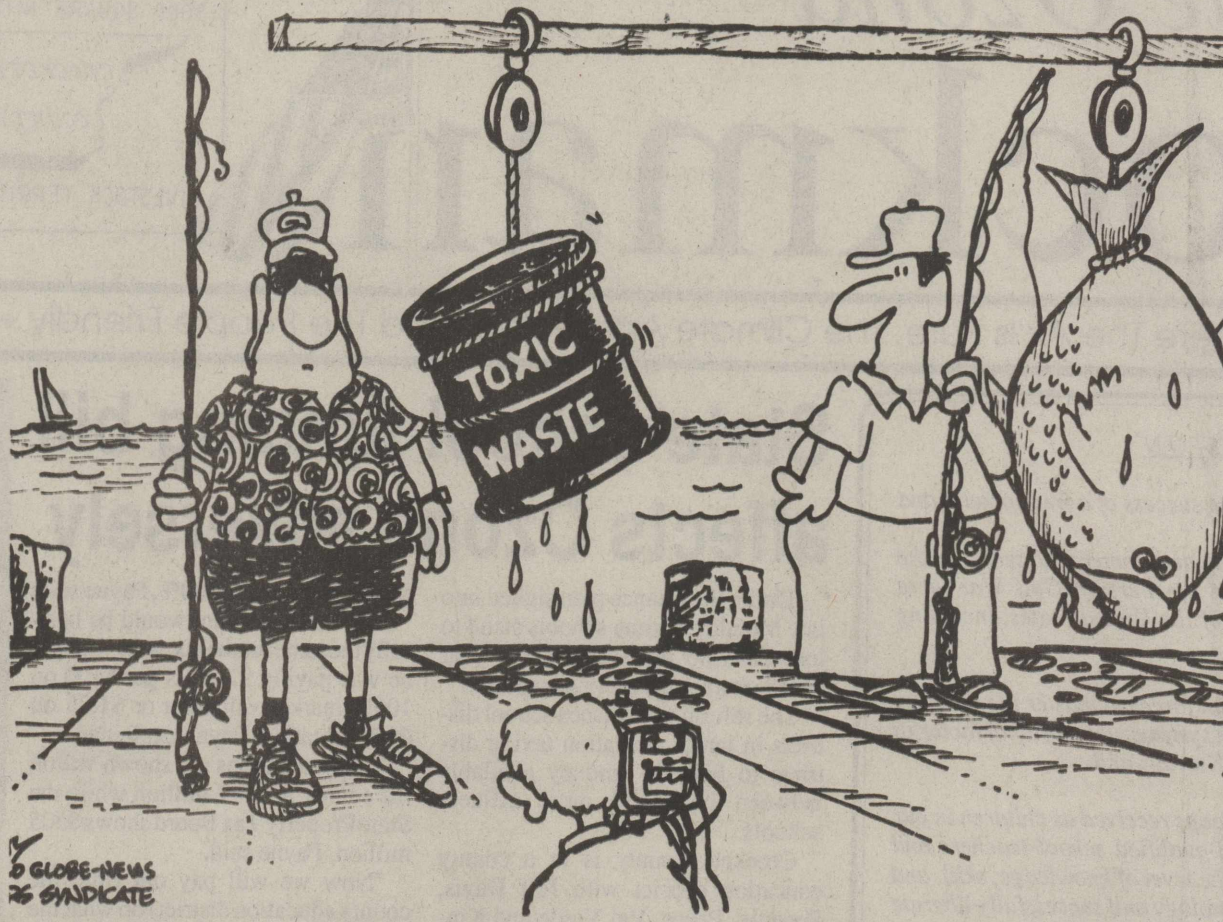
In addition, airmen who complete basic training earn credits toward an associate degree through the Community College of the Air Force.

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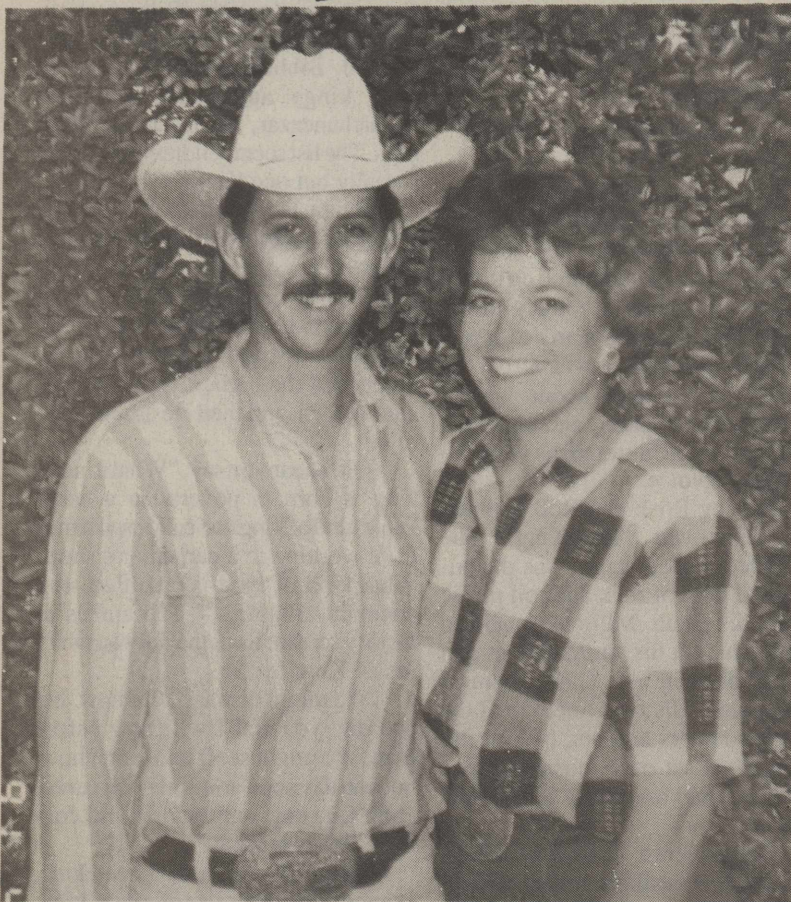
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## Acton, Renfroe wedding plans told

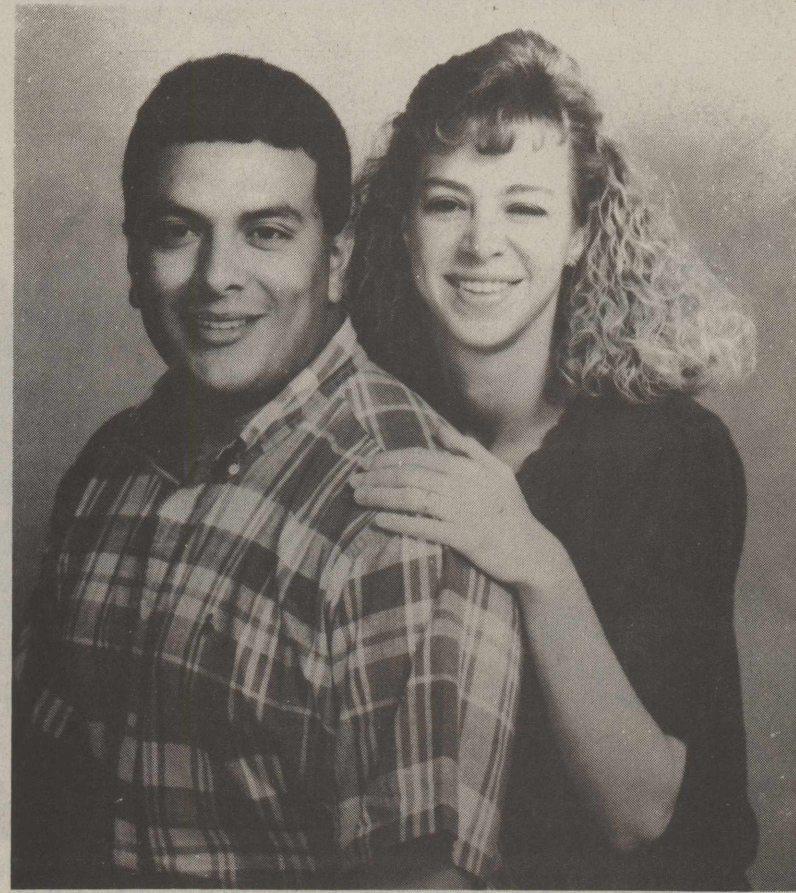

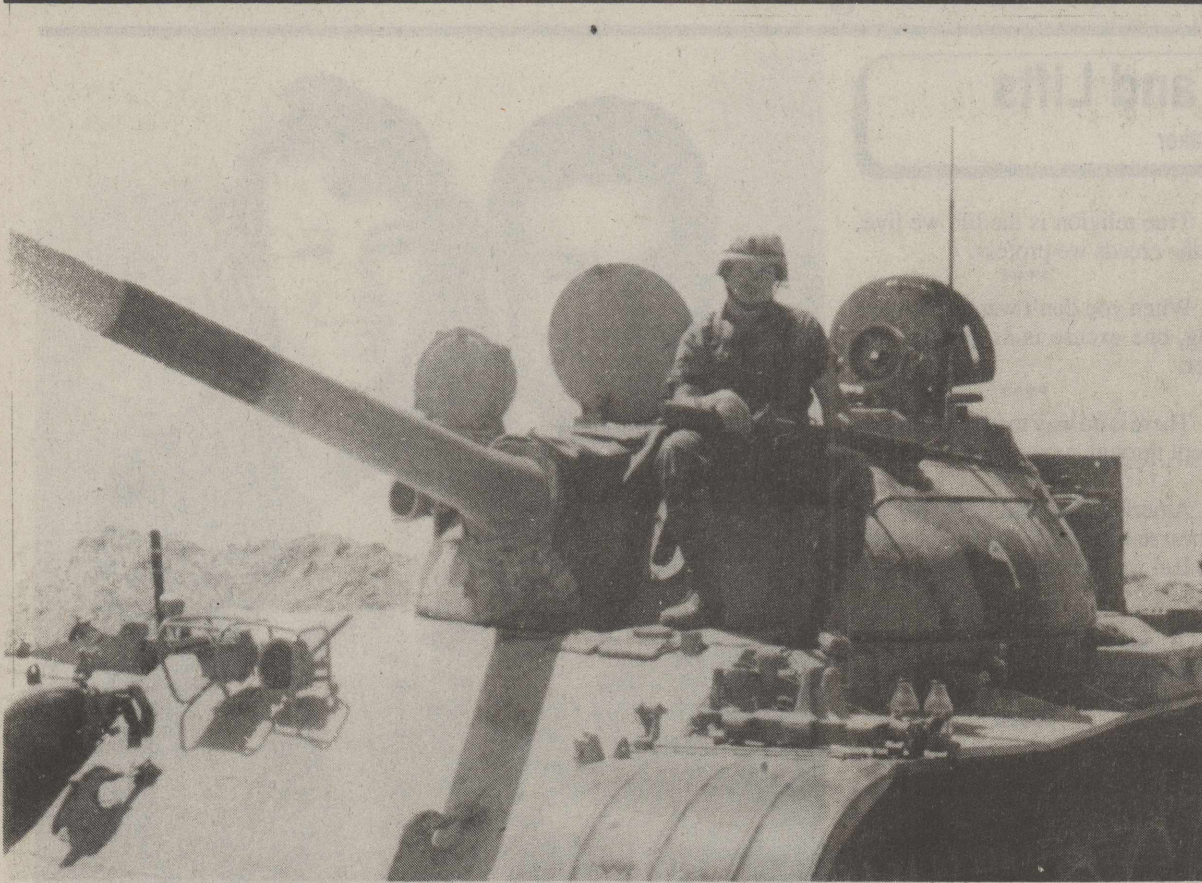

From his tomb, he seems to still have a voice.

Among Rock and Roll enthusiasts, Elvis was "The King." The swivel-hipped singer was the undisputed king of rock and roll music before his death. Millions sought to touch him, get his autograph, or just get a glimpse of him. Girls screamed and fainted. His fans lined-up at the record counters and box offices. Indeed, Elvis sat on a musical throne that none had ascended before, and few since.

Controversy followed Elvis. There were questions about his techniques, his friends, his family, and his untimely death. Even today, some say he is still alive. There have been reported sightings of him from Minnesota to Florida. Graceland, his home in Memphis, makes more money now than it ever did. From his tomb, Elvis still seems to sing to a melancholy public.

Oh, the world's kings. From England, Syria, and Siam came mon-

archs that decreed and demanded. From the tennis court (Billie Jean) to the boxing ring (Don), Kings have reigned. Biblical archives are filled with kings and their activities. Nebuchadnezzar, Ahab, David, Solomon. The list seems endless. But, there is really but one King!

When the noise of the world's yesterdays and tomorrows is silenced, there will be one King. No tomb holds Him. Death could not wrap its cold arms around Him. Christ is King! Of righteousness, glory, and honor. He descended the highest throne to live among men, and then He ascended to rule.

"No one pours new wine into old wineskins; otherwise the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and skins will be lost. Rather, new wine has to be poured into fresh skins." - Mark 2:22

As was demonstrated before the religious leaders of His day, so our Lord Jesus would remind us in the 20th century - that the new and abundant life He brings through the Gospel cannot be confined to our own ideas and formulas. Rather, like new wine bursting old wineskins, the power of life in Him will 'Blow Sky High' the self-made forms and notions we sometimes parade as Christianity.

And what are some of these home-

made formulas which would 'Bottle-Up' Christianity today? One is a GOD-IN-A-BOX concept that's adopted by many religious people. In other words, they try to trim the Almighty God down into something or someone they can comprehend, package, or box-in; in such a way as to no longer be a threat to their way of life - someone they can take or tolerate as it suits them. Another formula is the BIG-THUMB IN THE SKY concept. When the pressure is intense or the pain is severe, many people are quick to seek for and latch on to some kinda god. However, when the clouds clear away the blue skies dissolve into broken promises - the true God is left 'High & Dry.' In other words, there are so-called Christians who are unwittingly trying to pack Christ's powerful truth into the old bags or bottles of their

self-made and bigoted notions, or who think Christianity is just a 'Have' in times of storms - instead of the real meaning and motivation for day-to-day living.

It is pretty risky to allow Jesus Christ to have His way with us, because it will result in some bottle-breaking and bag-bursting; as He embraces, cleanses, redeems, and fully claims us for Himself and His purposes. But when this happens, beauty will be restored where there once was ugliness, forgiveness where there was once sin and guilt, power where there once was weakness - and our Christian faith will become vitally real and joyful!

Prayer: Gracious Lord, forgive us for using You to make us more successful or content, while You have chosen and pointed us to carry out Your purpose and program in and through our lives. Amen.

The Lewings made their home in Todd Field for 23 years before moving into Ozona. Their three sons are Ray of San Angelo, Eddie Of Germany and J. D., an 8th grader at Ozona Junior High School.

Representatives of the Institute of Cognitive Development Inc. Family Outreach Shelter were here for a luncheon meeting April 11 to explain shelter services and possibilities for Ozona.

Leslie Perry serves as outreach coordinator out of San Angelo for a 14 county area. According to Ms. Perry, the San Angelo shelter housed 15 abused women and 23 children at the time of last week's meeting.

The shelter program sets up a safe haven in each community and trains volunteers to tell women about the San Angelo shelter and resources available. Volunteers are scheduled so that someone is always on call from a list kept at sheriff's offices, Ms. Perry said.

Although meetings between the client and volunteer take place at the jail, victims do not have to file a charge, and no report will be made, Ms. Perry said.

Much of the time the woman goes directly to San Angelo after meeting with the volunteer. "We want to make sure the ladies are safe. We can come get them if necessary," Ms. Perry said.

If shelter is needed during the night, the victim and volunteer are escorted to the local safe haven until transportation to San Angelo can be arranged.

Once in the San Angelo shelter, referral for other services and counseling is available. There is a three-month limitation on residence at the shelter, explained Valerie Tillery, program director. Extensions are considered on a case by case basis.

The shelter is funded by the Texas Department of Services and is a United Way Agency.

Residents at the shelter are from all income brackets, Ms. Tillery said. The shelter is also available to men and their children and to the elderly.

Becky Talley, children's program coordinator at the shelter, outlined programs which benefit the youngsters.

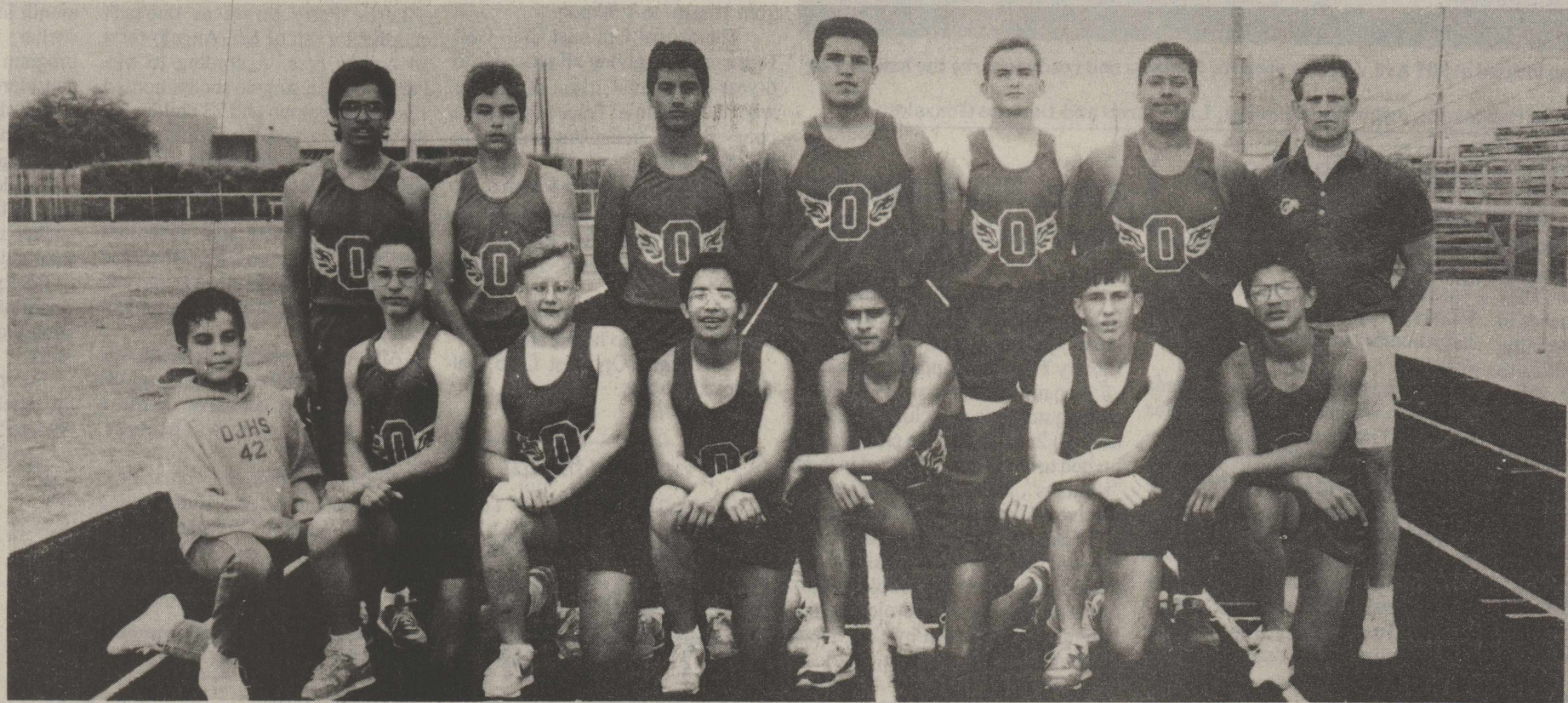

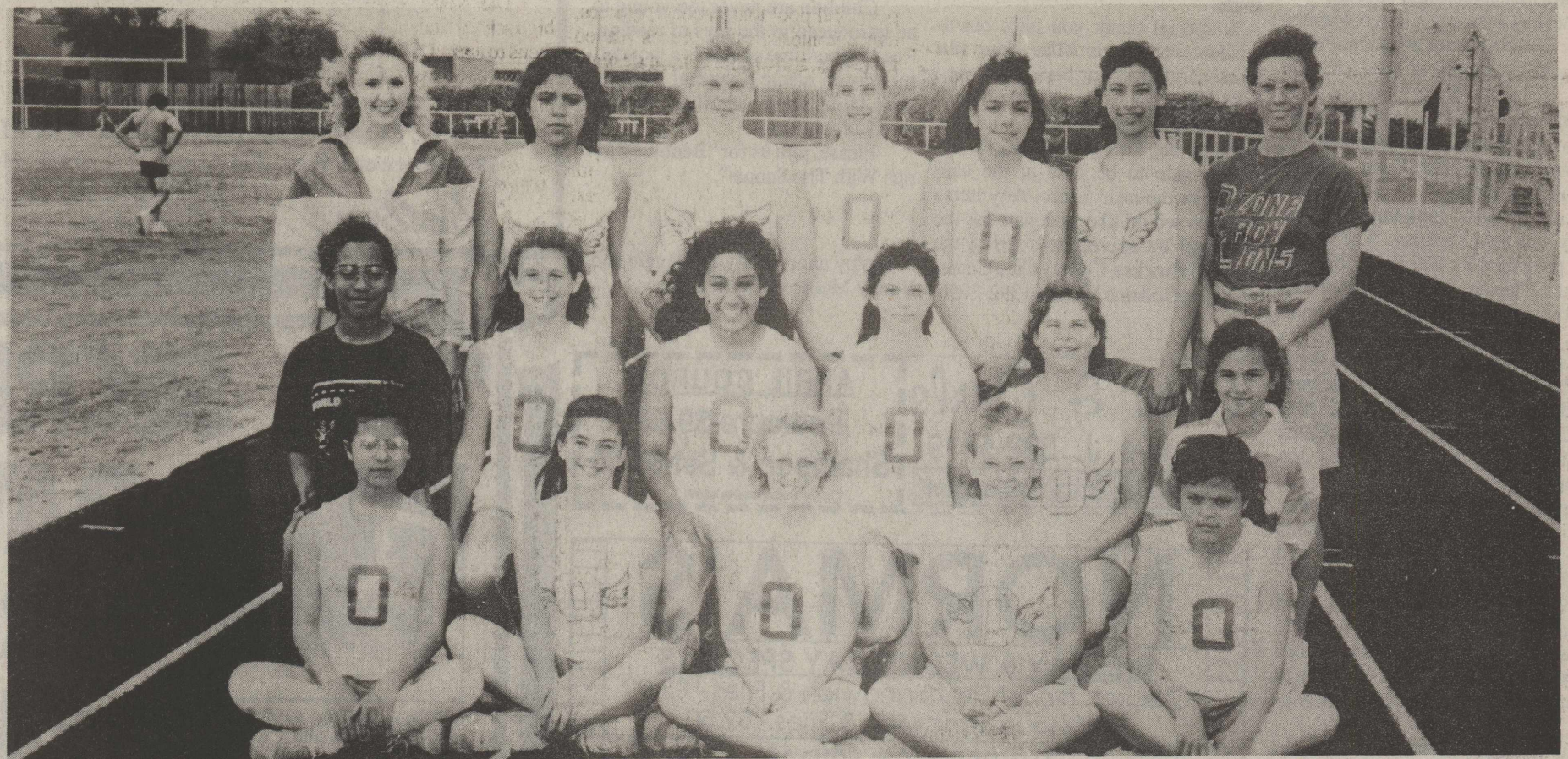

## Four qualify for regional in Abilene

Mark Ramirez qualified for regional in the 1600m and 3200m runs last week in district at Iraan. He will be joined by pole vaulter Lee Galan and Mike Kennison and James Tambunga in the shot put April 26 and 27 at Abilene Christian University.

Ozona boys finished fourth in the District 6-AA meet with 66 points. Top ranked Wall amassed 110 points, Iraan 108.5, Stanton 68, Ozona 66, McCamey 63, Eldorado 52, Coahoma 48, Forsan 37.5.

Ramirez' time in the 3200m run was 10:43.80. He has the best time in classes A, 2A, 3A and 4A in West Texas and has consistently beaten 2-mile West Texas leader Luna of Sonora every time in head to head competition.

Ramirez ran the 3200m in 10:02.18 March 29 for first place in the San Angelo Relays.

He holds the best mile time in West Texas classes A through 5-A. He ran second in the 1600m in district with a time of 4:45.63 behind first place Jeremy Stallings of Stanton. Stallings had a time of 4:44.05.

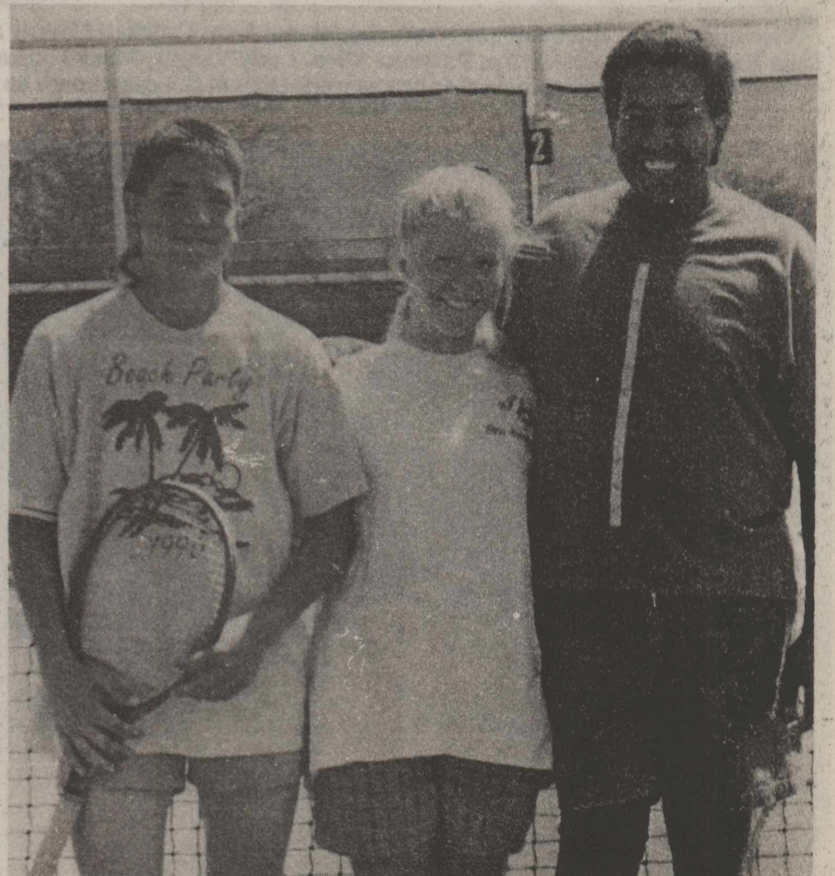

On the afternoon of May 8, symposium participants will travel to a local brush pasture where brush equipment will be displayed. Joe Wilson, Taylor County extension agent, will moderate the day's three concurrent sessions beginning at 1 p.m.

Topics are broadcast control methods, individual plant control methods, and improving quail loafing cover.

**Archaeologist to speak at Crockett Room during archaeology awareness week**

Area archaeologist J. A. Jaquier will present a slide program on historical archaeology, Thursday, April 18 in the Ozona National Bank's Crockett Room. The public is encouraged to attend this informative discussion which will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Jaquier's presentation is entitled "Archaeology at Ft. Concho: Why, How, and What Did We Learn?" This program shows the role of the Talented and Gifted Program of San Angelo, which provided the students who did much of the excavation at Ft. Concho.

J. A. Jaquier (or "Jaq", as he prefers to be called) is a charter member of the Archaeological Steward's Network of the Office of the State Archaeologist, organized in 1984. In this role, he has been responsible for education and information programs and for investigation of potential archaeological discoveries for a radius of 100 miles around San Angelo, his hometown.

Jaq began his archaeological career with the excavation of the foundation of the Post Surgeon's Quarters at Fort Concho in 1969. He attained a Master's equivalency from the University of Texas at San Antonio and has been a research associate with UTSA's Center for Archaeological Research since 1974.

As a professional archaeologist, Jaq has been fortunate to participate in prehistoric surveys and excavations from north to south Texas, including Stacy Reservoir. Historic excavations were performed at the Alamo and Fort Mason. At Fort Concho, he voluntarily directed recovery and preservation efforts at the Post Hospital, the hospital cisterns, the "buffalo walls", Enlisted Men's Barracks #4, and the ongoing excavation of the messhall foundation of Enlisted Men's Barracks #3.

Jaq is perhaps proudest of his

direct participation in Fort Concho's award-winning "Digging History" program. Over 500 6th grade students in the San Angelo Gifted Education (SAGE) program have been introduced to the thrill of professional excavation and laboratory work over the last nine years. These youngsters have left with true understanding of the critical need to protect and preserve our fragile cultural heritage.



## Aerial application of herbicides for mesquite control

Due to the good moisture conditions we have recently experienced and hopefully with continued rainfall, this year could provide excellent opportunities for ranchers to control mesquite with aerial applications of herbicides.

Optimum spray time is approximately 40-90 days after first sign of leaf development, prior to pod elongation, when leaves turn from light green to dark green in color or after pod elongation when the conditions are favorable. Application during seed pod elongation should be avoided. The key to obtaining good results is to make sure there is adequate moisture present for mesquite growth and soil temperature is at least 75 degrees (F) at 12-18 inches. Research has proven these two factors are extremely important in the success of application.

Spray applications consisting of triclopyr and picloram, clopyralid and picloram, clopyralid and triclopyr are some of the more common combinations recommended for mesquite control. Clopyralid or triclopyr alone mixed with diesel fuel and water have also shown to be effective.

Average cost will vary on aerial mesquite control from about \$11.50 per acre to \$29.00 per acre depending upon chemicals and rates used. These chemicals and various mixtures of these chemicals can also be used for ground broadcast and individual plant treatment at a somewhat reduced cost.

A non-grazing period of about 90 days following application of herbicides for brush control allows desirable forage plants to regain vigor, replenish food reserves, produce seed and encourage seedling establishment, thus improving rangeland. Good grazing management is necessary to obtain the greatest return from a brush management program. Therefore a rancher should first develop a sound grazing management program before attempting brush control practices. This should include a planned grazing system to allow no-grazing periods for each pasture.

More information on aerial or ground applied application for mesquite control can be obtained through the Soil Conservation Service. The SCS provides assistance to local ranchers through the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District.

## Ranchers labor association plans to file H-2A ranch worker applications after May 1

The Texas Ranchers Labor Association, Inc. is announcing that it plans to file 1991 H-2A sheep and goat ranch worker applications shortly after the first of May. These applications will allow Texas sheep and goat ranchers, under the H-2A program, to import the alien ranch workers of the rancher's choice where there is a demonstrated shortage of available, willing and able U.S. workers for the ranch jobs.

The Labor Association was created in 1987 in response to the Immigration Reform and Control Act which prohibited the employment of illegal aliens. The H-2A program allows qualifying employers to employ non-immigrant aliens, known as "H-2A workers", in agricultural jobs. The H-2A worker may only work for the sponsoring employer and is not allowed to work for any other employer. The H-2A worker must be paid a monthly wage set by the U.S. Department of Labor, which was \$529.00 per month in 1990-91, and the employer must also provide certain benefits, such as room, board and workers' compensation insurance.

Since 1987 the Labor Association has processed three sets of H-2A applications for Texas sheep and goat ranchers. Those three sets of H-2A applications involved a total of eighty-one (81) ranch worker jobs of which sixty-six (66) were granted certification to import H-2A ranch workers. In almost all cases, the H-2A ranch worker was a ranch hand who had previously been employed by the rancher and the great majority of the H-2A certifications were for an employment period of ten months.

The Labor Association will hold its fourth annual general membership and directors meetings within the coming month. All members and other ranchers interested in the H-2A program or the Labor Association's non-alien ranch worker program, called the *RanchHand* program, are encouraged to attend these meetings. The date, time and place for these meetings will be announced at a later date.

The Labor Association will collect the names of interested ranchers and decide shortly after May 1st whether to file H-2A applications for the 1991-92 period. Any rancher interested in filing an H-2A ranch worker application for 1991-92 should call Allen Moody as soon as possible at the Labor Association's operations office in Rocksprings: 512/683-6129.

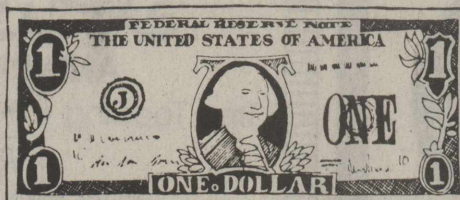
In February 1991, the Crockett County Water Control & Improvement District #1 collected water samples for coliform analyses. Analytical results indicated the presence of coliform bacteria. Water supply officials were directed to collect a specified number of repeat samples to isolate and confirm the previous analytical results. These repeat samples were collected in an improper manner.

The presence of coliform bacteria indicates a potential for disease causing microorganisms to be present in the water supply.

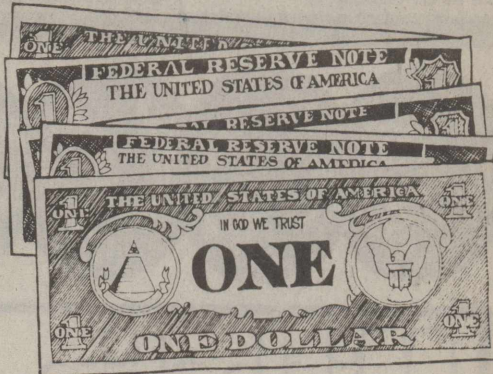
The chlorine residuals in the repeat samples were well within the range of .02 minimum and 2.0 maximum. The repeat samples were tested and proved to be clear of coliform bacteria.

Crockett County Water Control has received a letter from the Texas Department of Health stating: "This Department believes that a result is due to conditions or circumstances which do not reflect water quality in distribution".
