Under the plan, all school districts what we say they are." in the state are required to set a tax rate of 72 cents per \$100 valuation for 1991-92, increasing to \$1.00 by 1994-95. The property tax revenue is pooled ages of total market value: within the county education districts and redistributed equally, based on the average daily attendance.

Districts may tax above the minimum up to \$1.50 and do not have to share money raised above the 72 cents.

Ozona schools this year spend \$5,035 per student based on average daily attendance. To recoup and maintain the same level of funding next year under the finance plan, the school tax rate would have to increase from 90 cents per \$100 to \$1.05, Supt. Jim Payne said Monday.

Local property taxes provide \$4,586 of the \$5035 with the balance coming from the state.



"No one pours new wine into old wineskins; otherwise the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and skins will be lost. Rather, new wine has to be poured into fresh skins." - Mark 2:22

As was demonstrated before the religious leaders of His day, so our Lord Jesus would remind us in the 20th century - that the new and abundant life He brings through the Gospel cannot be confined to our own ideas and formulas. Rather, like new wine bursting old wineskins, the power of life in Him will 'Blow Sky High' the self-made forms and notions we sometimes parade as Chrsitianity.

And what are some of these home-

made formulas which would 'Bottle-Up'Christianity today? One is a GOD-IN-A-BOX concept that's adopted by many 'religious' people. In other words, they try to trim the Almighty God down into something or someone they can comprehend, package, or box-in; in such a way as to no longer be a threat to their way of life - someone they can take or tolerate as it suits them. Another formula is the BIG-THUMB IN THE SKY concept. When the pressure is intense or the pain is severe, many people are quick to seek for and latch on to some kinda god. However, when the clouds clear away the blue skies dissolve into broken promises the true God is left 'High & Dry.' In other words, there are socalled Christians who are unwittingly trying to pack Christ's powerful truth

into the old bags or bottles of their

self-made and bigoted notions, or who think Christianity is just a 'Have' in times of storms-instead of the real meaning and motivation for day-today living.

It is pretty risky to allow Jesus Christ to have His way with us, because it will result in some bottlebreaking and bag-bursting; as He embraces, cleanses, redeems, and fully claims us for Himself and His purposes. But when this happens, beauty will be restored where there once was ugliness, forgiveness where there was once sin and guilt, power where there once was weakness - and our Christian faith will become vitally real and

Leslie Perry serves as outreach coordinator out of San Angelo for a 14 county area. According to Ms. Perry, the San Angelo shelter housed 15 abused women and 23 children at the time of last week's meeting.

The shelter program sets up a safe haven in each community and trains volunteers to tell women about the San Angelo shelter and resources available. Volunteers are scheduled so that someone is always on call from a list kept at sheriff's offices, Ms.

Although meetings between the client and volunteer take place at the jail, victims do not have to file a charge, and no report will be made,

Ms. Perry said. Much of the time the woman goes directly to San Angelo after meeting with the volunteer. "We want to make





Ranchers labor association plans to file H-2A ranch worker applications after May 1

The Texas Ranchers Labor Asplans to file 1991 H-2A sheep and and directors meetings within the after the first of May. These applications will allow Texas sheep and goat ranchers, under the H-2A program, to import the alien ranch workers of the rancher's choice where there is a demonstrated shortage of available, willing and able US. workers for the ranch jobs.

The Labor Association was created in 1987 in response to the Immigration Reform and Control Act which prohibited the employment of illegal aliens. The H-2A program allows qualifying employers to employ nonimmigrant aliens, known as "H-2A workers", in agricultural jobs. The H-2A worker may only work for the sponsoring employer and is not allowed to work for any other employer. The H-2A worker must be paid a monthly wage set by the U.S. Department of Labor, which was \$529.00 per month in 1990-91, and the employer must also provide certain benefits, such as room, board and workers' compensation insurance.

Since 1987 the Labor Association has processed three sets of H-2A applications for Texas sheep and goat ranchers. Those three sets of H-2A applications involved a total of eightyone (81) ranch worker jobs of which sixty-six (66) were granted certification to import H-2A ranch workers, In almost all cases, the H-2A ranch worker was a ranch hand who had previously been employed by the rancher and the great majority of the H-2A certifications were for an employment period of ten months.



MONITORING VIOLATION

In February 1991, the Crockett County Water Control & Improvement District #1 collected water samples for coliform analyses. Analytical results indicated the presence of coliform bacteria. Water supply officials were directed to collect a specified number of repeat samples to isolate and confirm the previous analytical results. These repeat samples were collected in an improper manner.

The presence of coliform bacteria indicates a potential for disease causing microrganisms to be present in the water supply.

The chlorine residuals in the repeat samples were well within the range of .02 minimum and 2.0 maximum. The repeat samples were tested and proved to be clear of coliform bacteria.

Crockett County Water Control has received a letter from the Texas Department of Health stating: "This Department believes that a result is due to conditions or circumstances which do not reflect water quality in distribution".
