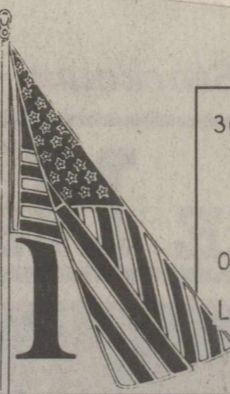

Board adopts new calendar

During their regular monthly meeting last week, the Ozona School Board adopted a new school calendar for next year. The calendar reflects 180 days of classes and three teacher preparation days, both of which are new requirements as a result of the passage of Senate Bill 351 by the Texas Legislature.

Significant dates in the new calendar include: August 16 (teacher preparation day); August 19 (first day of classes); November 28-29 (Thanksgiving holidays); December 20 (end of the first semester); December 23-January 3 (Christmas and New Years holidays); January 6 (teacher preparation day); March 9-13 (Spring Break); April 17 (Easter holiday); May 9 (first bad-weather make-up day); May 16 (second bad-weather make-up day); May 21 (end of the second semester); and, May 22 (teacher preparation day and graduation).

Ozona wool houses sell half-million pounds

Sealed bid wool sales held at both Ozona warehouses dispersed a total of more than half-million pounds May 15.

Ozona Wool and Mohair sold a

total of 370,000 pounds according to manager Terry Criner. There were few no sales, Criner said.

He reported an average of 82 cents for the short wool and \$1.05 for the

average on 70,000 pounds of 12-month wool.

Wool from Del Rio Wool and Mohair, West Texas Wool and Mohair at Mertzon and Southwestern Wool and Mohair in Eden was also included in the sale.

"It was a pretty good sale. The market is still holding better than a month or two ago," Criner said.

Major buyer at Ozona Wool was Provoust Lefebvre and Co. with 144,700 pounds of short wool and 39,300 pounds of 12-month wool.

Also buying short wool were: A. H. Helmig, 36,000 pounds; Ford Oglesby Wool Co., 37,400 pounds; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer and Co., 43,500 pounds, and Anodyne, 57,800 pounds.

Additional buyers of 12-month wool were: Burlington, 7,800 pounds and Anodyne, Inc., 21,000 pounds.

Wool Growers Central Storage sold 204,000 pounds of 12-month wool and 97,800 pounds of 8-month, paint-free wool.

The wools looked good and light, said manager Eddie Stewart. Stewart was pleased with the sale. "We're glad to get as much money as we did for them," he said.

Prices for his 12-month wool varied from 85 cents to \$1.39 a pound grease basis. The bulk of the 12-month offering sold from \$1.05 to \$1.20 per pound.

The 8-month wool sold from 75 cents to 88 1/8 cents per pound. The bulk of the short wool brought from 80 to 87 cents per pound.

Provoust Lefebvre and Co. bought 141,200 pounds of 12-month and short wools.

Also buying 12-month wool were:

Anodyne Inc., 43,300 pounds; Burlington Industries, 74,900 pounds; and Forte, Dupee, Sawyer and Co., 9,900 pounds.

Buying eight-month wool were: A. H. Helmig and Co., 15,200 pounds; Anodyne, 10,580 pounds, Forte, Dupee, Sawyer and Co., 14,300 pounds and Ford Oglesby Wool Co., 3,180 pounds.

A four-year member of the Lion Band, Kelley has been a Flag Corps member three years and was captain last year.

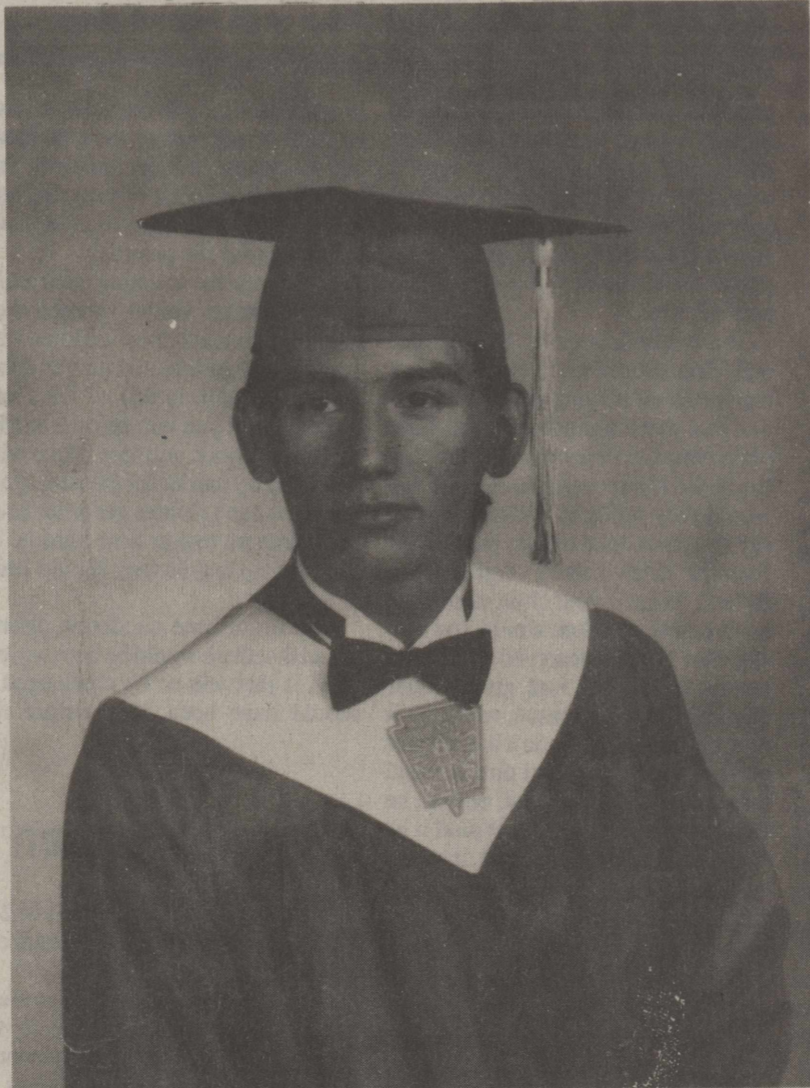
She plans to attend Angelo State University as an elementary education major.

Kelley is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David H. Porter.

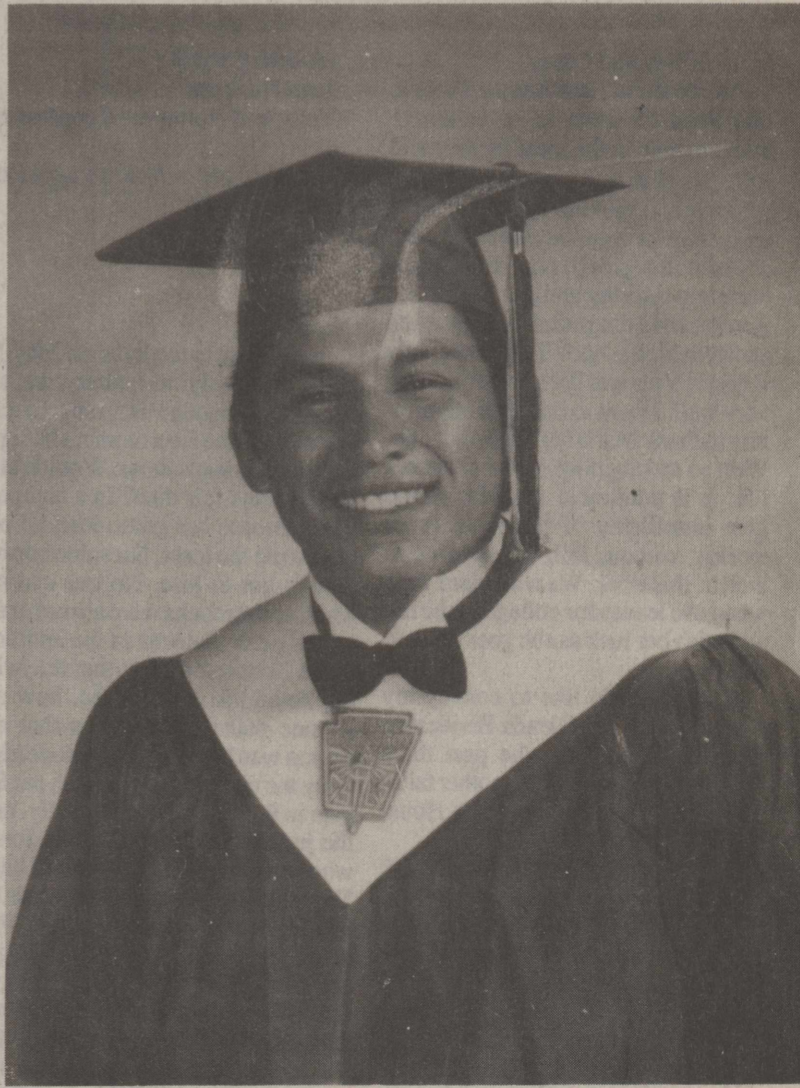
Teena Tambunga holds a grade point average of 6.4146. She earned a place on the yearly honor roll throughout high school.

Ted White services held Tuesday

Ted M. White, 85, of Ozona, died in his sleep Sunday, May 19, 1991, while visiting in San Antonio. He had suffered major heart problems for sometime.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3 p.m. in the Ozona United Methodist Church, led by Dr. Tim Brewer. Burial followed in Cedar Hills Cemetery. Arrangements were made under the direction of Preddy Funeral Home of Ozona.

Ted White was born Sept. 17, 1905, in Grandfalls, Texas, to T. M. and Mary H. White. He was one of six children.

He was married to Jessie Ray of Bangs Aug. 16, 1930, and she preceded him in death Feb. 4, 1987.

Recently, Ted and Mae Cauthorn Ward of Sonora had made plans to marry in June. He spent his last day visiting her in San Antonio where she is hospitalized.

White was an athlete, a coach and an educator. He was a rancher and a conservationist, a storyteller, and a Christian.

After graduating from Daniel Baker College in Brownwood, he taught and coached for 13 years starting in Sudan and then three years in Sonora where the last year he also served as assistant superintendent. Then he went to Ozona where he was head coach for nine years.

In 1939, Ted and Jessie bought a ranch on the Pecos River where they ranched for 40 years as an active part of the Pandale community. He was dedicated to the land. On his death he had ranching interests in Sutton, Schleicher and Crockett counties with his son and grandson.

He was active for many years on the board of the Devil's River Soil Conservation District. He served as board chairman and was also on the State Education Committee.



He was a member of the Ozona United Methodist Church for 60 years, serving on the board many years including two terms for chairman. He also was a delegate to the Southwest Texas Annual Conference for several years. He was a 50-year Mason and a member of the Ozona Masonic Lodge.

He is survived by his only son, Mark White, and wife, Patsy, of San Angelo; and grandchildren K. Lynn White of Fort Worth (currently moving to El Paso) and Ted M. White III of Ozona; and his sole surviving brother, John S. White of El Paso.

Pallbearers were Dr. Wm. O. Walker Jr., Mark Kuhn, Emory L. White Jr., Dr. Jim Martin, Don Ray, J. T. Langley, Albert Ward, Edgar Walker and Eugene Miller.

Honorary pallbearers were his nephews: Ted S. White and T. M. White, all of his ball players and members of the Ozona Methodist Men's Class.

Rhett loved people and people loved him. He never met a stranger and always had a contagious smile.

Helen Montgomery Studt, a resident of Hartsdale, N.Y., died of heart failure Friday, May 17, at White Plains Hospital. She was 79.

She was born Jan. 20, 1912, in Comanche, Texas, to George and Camille Montgomery. She attended Goucher College and receive her MSW from Southern Methodist University in Dallas. In 1946 she received her law degree from the University of Chicago.

She received a Presidential certificate of Commendation from President Truman for work and support given the Selective Service System. An accomplished pianist and vocalist, Mrs. Studt was an active participant in USO for many years during World War II.

On May 3, 1944, she married Alfred H. Student of Elgin, Ill. They moved to El Centro, Calif., in 1947 and to Irvington, N.Y., in 1953. In 1955 they moved to Westport, Conn., and lived there until 1964 when they were transferred to Paris, France. In 1966, they returned to the United States and settled in Hartsdale, N.Y.

Mrs. Studt was an active member of Pi Beta Phi sorority and the Westchester Panhellenic, of which she served as treasurer for many years.

She is survived by her husband of Panama City Beach, Fla.; a daughter, Jean Gunnell of San Marino, Calif.; a sister, Carolyn Collins of San Angelo, Texas; a brother, Beecher Montgomery of Ozona; two grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Think About It!

Loneliness

Loneliness is defined as "a condition of being lonely." It is a condition that is usually associated with gloom and doom rather than gaiety and freedom. Loneliness is either dreaded or directed depending on the mindset of its bearer.

Edward Gibbon, in his *Memoirs*, said, "I was never less alone than when by myself." He enjoyed solitude, and so do many others. They find it soothing when they are away from a crowd. These type people are alone - but never lonely.

Others find being alone unbearable. Samuel Coleridge wrote of a loneliness so bitter that even God didn't seem anywhere near. That kind of loneliness is tragic. It bites at the soul and devours, even in a crowd.

It depends upon how one views it. Not everyone who is alone is lonely, and some who are continuously in a crowd are very desolate. The condition of loneliness is really neither a positive or negative but a neutral that is enacted by attitude rather than whereabouts.

Some people have to have someone with them every moment for happiness sake. They can't find contentment. Others seek solitude, and when they are by themselves they are the happiest. There are both public and private personalities, and they view loneliness from different poles.

I think that one's view of God might be the deciding factor as to how he or she looks at loneliness. If our realization of Deity is strong and present, loneliness will never be a problem. On-the-other-hand, if our realization of God is only there in emergencies or times of our liking, we will be lonely a great deal of the time.

King David, Elijah, and the Apostle John are numbered among the many biblical examples of people who were subjected to loneliness. David, despondent because of his sins, called out for God to help him saying, "I am lonely and afflicted." Elijah rode the crest of loneliness in Kerith, and his only company were ravens who brought him food. On Patmos John, lonely in exile, did have the spectacular visions of Christ.

Christ is surely the model for us to follow in our dealings with loneliness. His was a mission that none understood and very few appreciated.

In bearing our sins, He experienced total isolation as He tried the winepress alone. But the Master also sought lonely place to pray. His closeness with the Father gave Him company wherever He went.

Older people are often lonely. They might live alone and have few friends or family who visit. I know many elderly people who have long days and nights but strong faith. They understand the company of God.

Many teens are lonely. Research shows that many youngsters who seek companionship in illicit sex, drugs, or other things that "the crowd" does often crash in a world of loneliness. They are used for a time, then left behind. What they must know is that God seeks and loves them.

The Beatitudes might give us some insight to overcoming loneliness if we feel vacated and distant. The blessedness, or happiness, that comes to those who have encounter with God, is internal not external.

Have you ever seen smiles on faces of people who were poor or broke? Have you ever noticed that some can still laugh even when some "rain" breaks up a planned event or outing? If our happiness and contentment comes only through outside sources, we will be bitter often.

A Christian can cope with all sorts of problems and pressures because he has the Spirit of God in him. As a song says, "There is always a light in the window" of a child of God. He might be alone physically, but spiritually he enjoys the company of heaven's best.

Wherever you are, whatever you are doing just now - I hope that you have a good day. You will never experience loneliness if you rely on the presence and Spirit of God. Think about it.

".....The Ark of God Was Taken!"

The name usually associated with a church that's either dwindling or has lost its enthusiasm for its intended purpose is "Ichabod"; (1st Samuel 4:19-22) meaning "The Glory of the Lord Has Departed".

As an imperfect people, our churches are made up of imperfect people and therefore by the very nature of all things concerned, our churches are in fact "imperfect".

Our Lord recognized this in Revelations chapter 21 and 3; and He spoke authoritatively concerning their respective state.

Why are some of our large and small churches losing membership and/or attendance - Apathy!

People tend to grow cold and indifferent after a period of time, sometimes towards the minister, music director, Sunday school teachers and the list goes on - but why? The main reason the lack of personal commitment to Christ is often the Main Culprit within the church body.

Granted, there are times when the minister and/or some of the staff workers should indeed be replaced - but done in a Biblical manner as not to disrupt the main function of the church.

The apostle Paul, addressed similar situations in 1st and 2nd Corinthians concerning church behavior and attitudes that can lead to eventual decline; through apathy in complacency.

The central issue usually is derived from, as he states in 2nd Corint. 12:20-21 and closes out in chapter 13.

Some of these major points as warning signals, are strife jealous, angry tempers, disputers, slander, gossip, and general disturbances."

Too many times we are quick to say "Satan did it", we more often than not are to blame due to our sin nature and we pass on the "Blame" onto Satan. Convenient cop-out. We allow it to happen.

We too often give Satan more credit than he is worth!

His powers are limited—as children of God; born again believers, if so, we have the power to resist but so often don't.

These tools used by Satan when allowed by God's own people will tear down or seriously affect, even a spirit filled church—how much more severe in one already weak and less spiritual.

"God is not a God of confusion but of peace," "God is not mocked" He will not stand for slackness when it comes to this church.

However, we—yes—we allow, at times, these very things that God's word warns us about—so many times, to come in and ravage our places of worship.

Satan delights in this type of behavior!

It's little wonder why non-Christians; non-church goers stay away from our church institutions, and we are bold enough to criticize them for not attending.

This ought not to be—but the plain truth is—it's a fact! We often times give them an excuse to stay away.

Our actions reflect our hearts, and the testimony we present as Christians too often does not match our Christianity (our work does not match our talk!) Christ himself referred to this behavior as hypocrites (Matt. 23:13-39).

We are much like the Pharisee, as Jesus describes in Matt. Chap. 23—

he said, "You blind guides, who strain out the GNAT and swallow the camel!" plus, he spoke out against another potential hazard that attacks our churches in Mark 7:1-23; speaking on "church traditions" that can undermine even our best churches.

God's churches are his extension of us; Jesus Christ is the head of our churches—a place of worship, comfort, learning and discipline—not a hot conversation subject that non-Christians and non-goers hear about and stay away from—is it any wonder?

When we as a church allow the true meaning of its designed purpose to diminish and put ourselves first—God can and has written "ICHABOD" across the front door—The glory of God has been taken away". He can do just that! He has done it before!

He can remove what is most precious to us Psalm 39:11 A.B.

Churches that preach and teach the Bible—the true Bible and Gospel, are divine properties of God our Father and of our Lord Jesus Christ; and when we, as God's people misuse his symbol of holiness and commandments, this house of God, then He takes action.

The church is His possession, as was the case of the Ark of the Covenant, it can be taken away from us—just as his Ark was removed from Shiloh. (1st Samuel, Chap. 4) Where it had been for 400 years!!

Our God means what He says, and says what He means; Jere. 48:10 (B) says "Cursed be the one who does the Lord's work negligently"—That's serious!

The answer to God's judgement in such cases as apathy and complacency in our churches is clearly stated in 2nd Chronicles 7:14 and 15.
