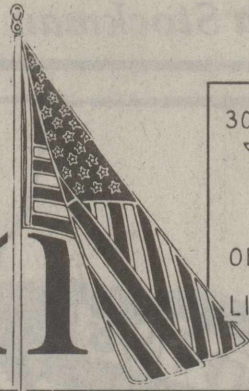

## School joins suit challenging education bill

Crockett County Consolidated Common School District trustees, in a called meeting May 6, passed a resolution to participate in a suit challenging the state education finance bill.

The district and other schools, in association with the Budget Balanced School Association, filed suit to have Senate Bill 351 declared unconstitutional.

"We do not think the bill is constitutional on two grounds," said Supt. Jim Payne. Payne cited Article VII § 1 of the state constitution which says in part, "it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the state to establish and make suitable provisions for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of free public schools." Education is the only thing mandated by the constitution to be financed by the state.

The second reason the plaintiffs believe the bill is unconstitutional is Art. VII § 1-e of the constitution which says "No state ad valorem taxes shall

be levied upon any property within the state".

Originally the local ad valorem tax was intended for schools to supplement the funds provided by the state to each school district, Payne explained. "Now more and more percentage of the money for education is provided from local ad valorem taxes."

The education bill provides for establishment of county education districts which must levy taxes at state prescribed levels to fund education. This "in fact becomes a state ad valorem tax no matter who levys and collects," Payne said.

Ozona schools are in a county education district (#18) with Jeff Davis, Presidio, Pecos, Val Verde and Kinney counties.

Under S.B. 351, trustees of the CED must levy taxes at a rate of 72 cents per \$100 valuation for the 1991-92 school year, increasing 10 cents per \$100 through the 1993-94 school year and remaining at \$1.00 per \$100 thereafter.

The tax revenue is pooled within the CED and redistributed equally based on the average daily attendance.

The suit maintains that the Legislature has enacted the tax and set the rate to fulfill a state function. No unit of local government has any discretion regarding the tax. "The tax is thus a state ad valorem tax in violation of Art. VIII § 1-e."

"Nobody has said who is to organize these districts or how to determine values so they are uniform throughout the CED," Payne said. The office for CED #18 will be in Del Rio. The location for the first year must be in the largest district based on average daily attendance.

Local districts cannot set their tax rates until the CED tax rate is set. School boards may not appoint members to the CED board until Aug. 26. The CED must set its tax rate by Sept. 1.

Most schools with no fund balances will have to borrow to operate for the first two months, Mr. Payne

believes. "Ozona will not be put in this situation hopefully due to "good

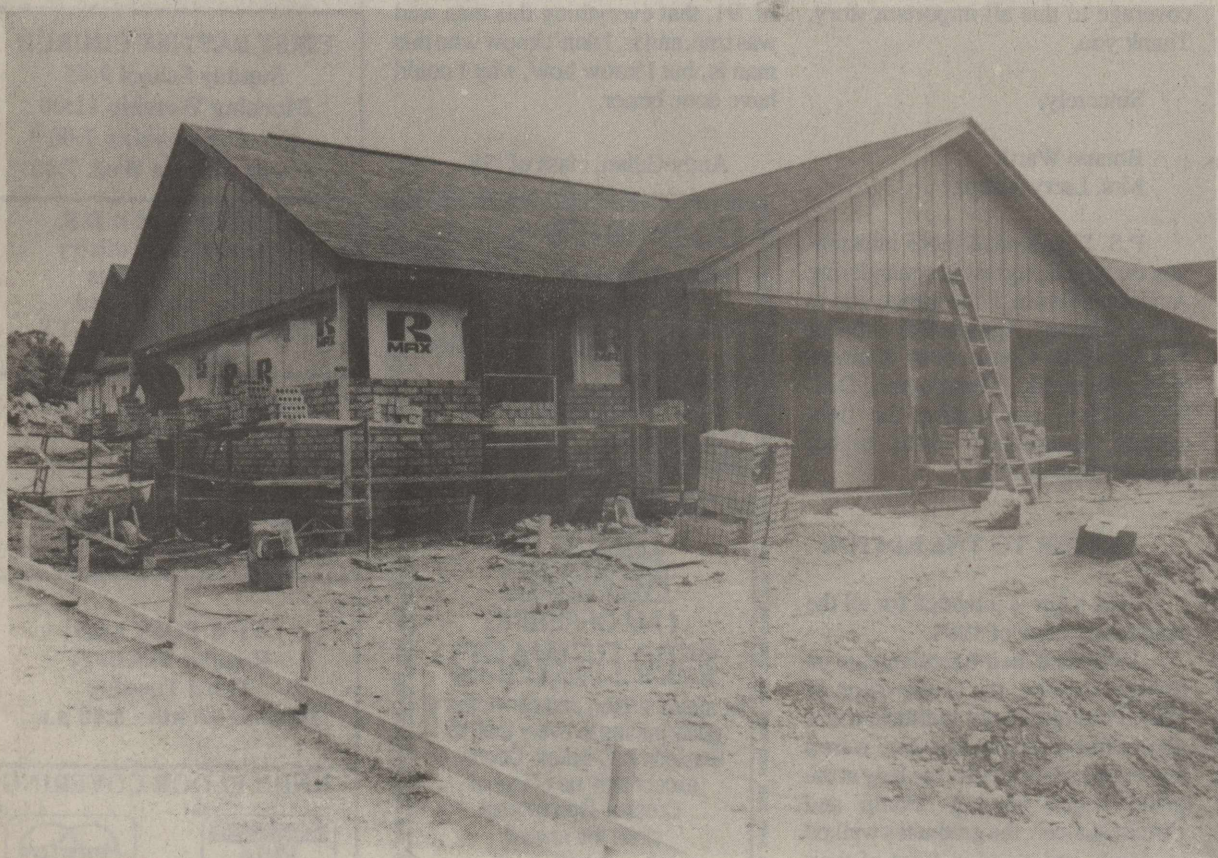
Names of contributors will be included on a plaque to be displayed on the bandstand.

Donations will be accepted at the chamber office until 5 p.m. June 7.

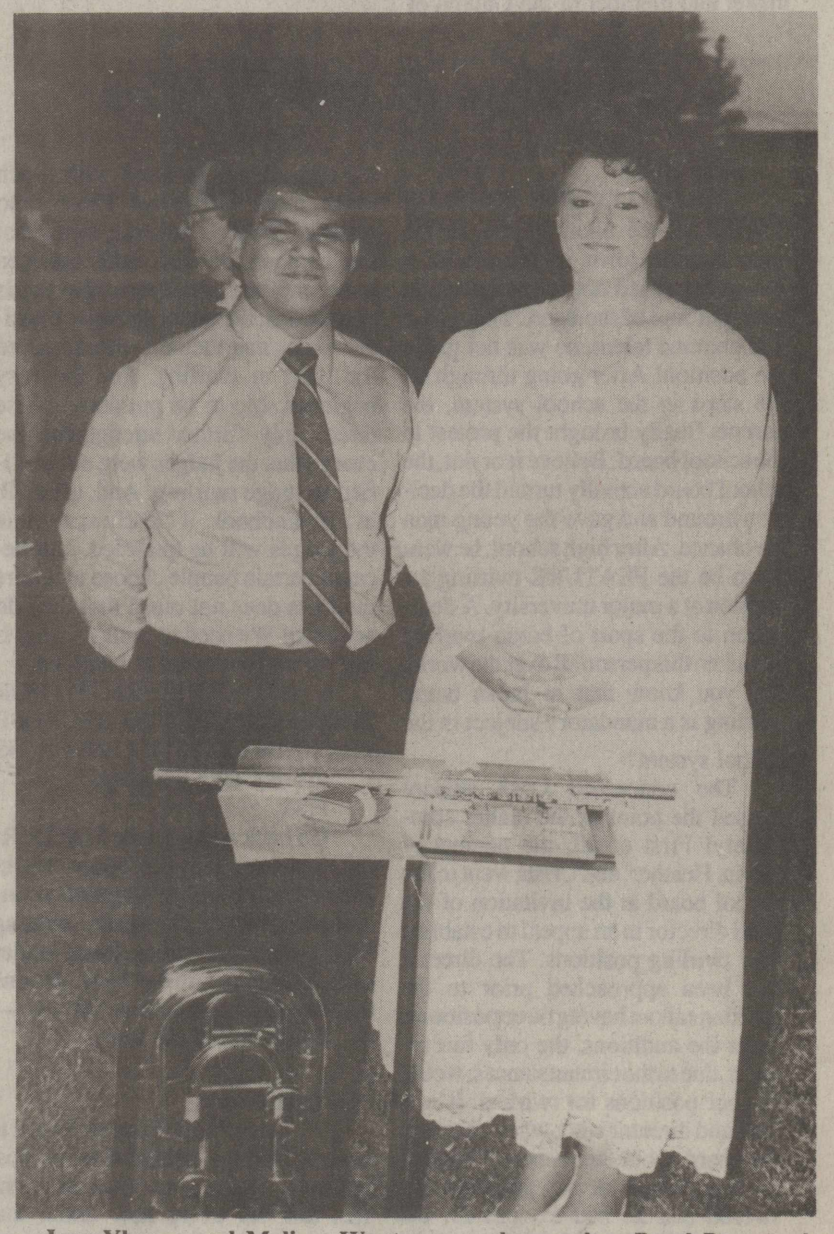
## Reception honors retiring teachers

What is absurd is that a simple beginner routine was judged best on

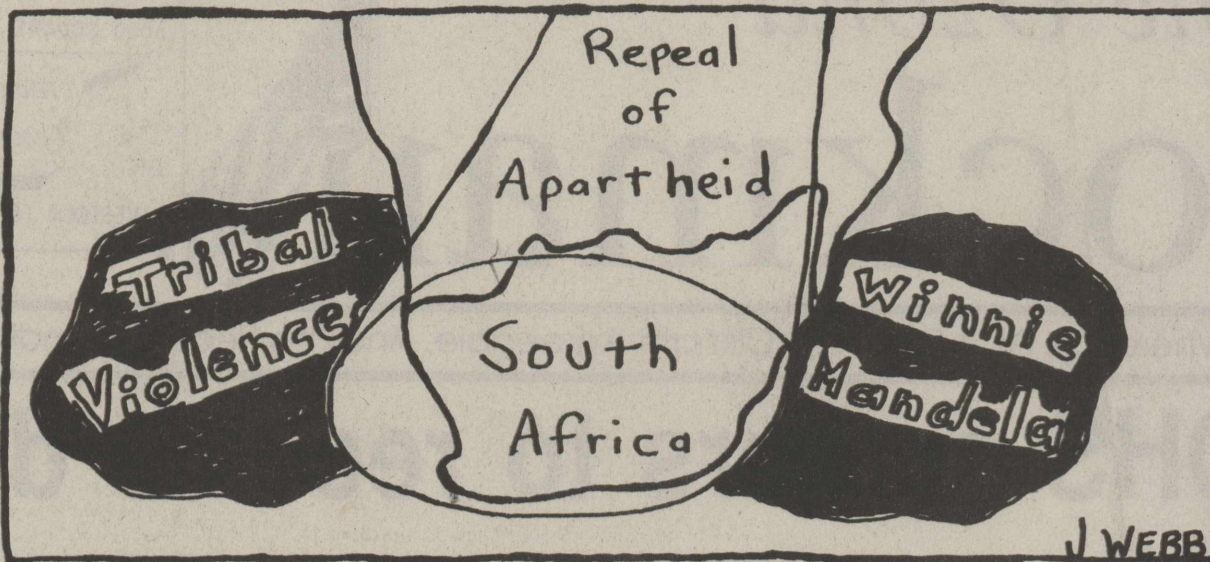

Tragically, the American people and the news media bought the "this budget agreement will reduce the deficit" story hook, line and sinker. And now we are paying the price in higher taxes and higher deficits. I urge you to expand your coverage and report important facts such as:

1. Congress enacted the second largest tax increase in history;
2. Congress increased spending by \$111 billion;
3. Congress enlarged the deficit by \$100 billion to an all-time record of \$320 billion for FY 1991 alone;
4. Congress pushed the national debt to a new record and increased the annual interest payment on the debt to a staggering \$254 BILLION; and,
5. Congress destroyed the Gramm-Rudman Deficit Reduction Act and all other effective controls on future congressional wasteful spending.

As Citizens Against Government Waste has pointed out repeatedly, we have this skyrocketing deficit today not because of the recession but because congress refuses to stop its reckless spending. The bridegroom is a computer consultant. He earned a business degree from Southwestern Univer-

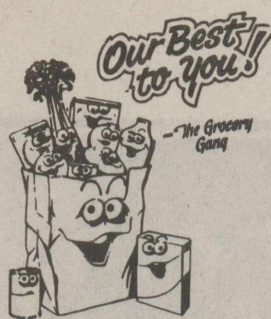

## Memorial marker placed at grave of Methodist minister

The grave of Charles Hardy Peele, Methodist minister who died while serving the Ozona church, was the recipient of a special marker May 24, 1991. The marker was placed by Dr. Tim Brewer, pastor of Ozona United Methodist, and Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Harrell, as part of a program of the Historical Commission of the United Methodist Church at the national level.

Charles Hardy Peele was born in Cass County June 25, 1866. His early life was spent in Hunt County. He was converted in childhood under the pastorate of the Rev. M. Featherstone, and baptized in infancy by the Rev. S. W. Jones of Cass County.

Rev. Peele was licensed to preach May 20, 1884, in Waxahachie while attending Marvin College, and received on trial into the North Texas Conference at Denison Nov. 17, 1888. He was received into full connection at Texarkana, Nov. 1890, ordained deacon at Denison Nov. 18, 1888, by Bishop Key and elder at Sherman by Bishop Hargrove Dec. 4, 1892.

His first pastoral charge was Clarksville Mission where he spent two years, then DeKalb one year, Pattonville one year, Deport one year, Dodd one year. In November of 1894, he took a supernumerary relation and went to West Texas in search of health. He traveled the Paint Rock and Menardville Circuit as supply minister.

When he died at Ozona April 3, 1896, he was responsible for the Ozona and Sonora charge, West Texas Conference.

Rev. Peele married Miss Sallie Love of Lamar County Nov. 13, 1889. They were the parents of three children, one who died in infancy.

"No more consecrated young man ever lived or died among us," it was said of Rev. Peele. "Thoughtful, studious, and prayerful, he was a superior preacher for his age. His chief desire was to do faithfully all the work of an itinerant preacher. We console ourselves and his heart-broken wife with the message he sent us by his presiding elder: 'Tell the brethren I died at my post.'"

Graduation is such a special time for the high school seniors; it culminates an arduous twelve year journey, and it places them in the foyer of their future. Whether they go on to a chosen field of work or to college, they can be proud of their accomplishment.

Graduation should be a joyous occasion. Surrounded by family and friends as they reach this milestone, these youngsters are excited. They are happy, optimistic, and care-free.

It is this care-free aspect that concerns me. Across the country, the weeks that mark graduations also imprint many tombstones. Despite the warning, "Driving and drinking don't mix," literally hundreds of our youth will be maimed for life or killed. In each case, they didn't think it would happen to them.

These weeks of graduation also bring about the conception of countless children. Again, it is often that care-free attitude, and thought, that everyone deserves some "fun" that leads to tragedy. Passions run deep in the festivities of graduation - so do heartaches. Unwanted pregnancies result in abortions, stained reputations, or circumstances that alter career plans or college.

Every parent cringes at late night phone calls during this time of year. The news is filled, literally, with calamities that come upon youth during this special time. Our youngsters, the cream of the crop, the hope of the country, the pride of families, the carriers of the future's torch - are often carried themselves to a final resting place.

Every generation hears the warnings, every generation ignores them. Youth is such a time of exuberance that life, and happiness, seem eternal. Graduates are often deaf, dumb, and blind to the dangers that surround them. At best, we can all only hope and pray that the Grim Reaper doesn't visit our community.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Williams.



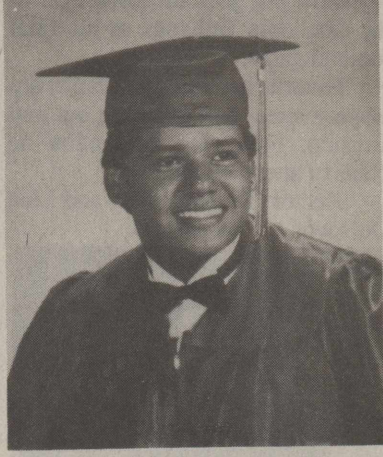
**NATALIA R. ARREDONDO**

**SUMMER CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS**

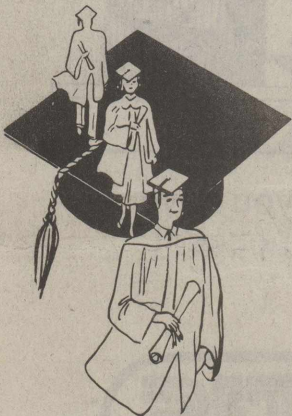

prudent planning" by trustees.

"We are entering the suit not to keep schools from raising the amount they spend. We feel it is the duty of the state to provide for all and not put the burden on the shoulders of local taxpayers.

"We are entering because we feel an obligation to our students who will be provided with \$600-\$700 per student less at the same rate we've been taxing. We feel an obligation to taxpayers who will want students to continue to have the advantage of an excellent local school system."

Even though the majority of additional funds for the district would come from mineral valuations, some increase would also be on local citizens.

"Many students in the district require special help in education. It is to our advantage to keep the teacher/student ratio low because many students do not have the benefit of a strong educational background. Therefore it requires additional funding over the basic allowed by the state.

Payne emphasized that the trustees do not want to change the amount of funding anyone else gets but rather wants to change where the funds come from.

"We want the money to come from state funds. Keep the amount set at the level they said with the state to fund and leave ad valorem taxes to individual districts to provide the supplemental funding as their local taxpayers and school board deem necessary."

Each district participating in the suit, with a minimum of 28 districts, is contributing \$10,000 to cover its share of the cost of legal representation. Other West Texas districts involved include Crane ISD, Denver City, Irion County and Sterling City.

The Iraan-Sheffield and Loving districts are party to a separate suit, Mr. Payne said.

The suit involving Crockett County is one of at least three filed that will be considered by Judge McGowan in Austin June 17.

## TDA predator management training session in Sonora

The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Thursday, May 30, at the 4-H Barn in Sonora. The training session will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The program will include identifying causes of predation, alternative methods of predator control, M-44 sodium cyanide application, and Livestock Protection Collar training and testing. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in conducting this training session.

The program is designed for individuals interested in using M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs, and foxes that prey on livestock. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be certified. The training for M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free and will be completed by noon. Individuals who would like certification for the use of Livestock Protection Collars for taking coyotes that prey on sheep or goats must attend the entire training session and score 70 or above on the Livestock Protection Collar category test.

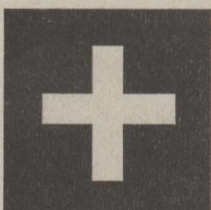

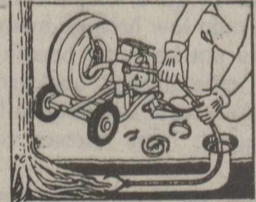
