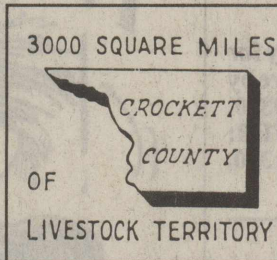

Outstanding 4-H'ers saluted at banquet

4-H members, parents and leaders enjoyed a salute to past, present and future 4-H'ers with the "Blast to the Past" Tuesday, Oct. 8 at the Crockett County Civic Center.

Katharine Durham took top honors as the 40th annual Mother Davidson Award winner. Durham, who is county council chairman, senior club president, District VI 4-H Council public relations officer and state 4-H Teen Fashion Board chairman, was named outstanding Crockett County 4-H member. A 1990 Gold Star recipient, she attended National 4-H Congress after a state win with her Home Economics Achievement record book. Competing twice with demonstrations at state Roundup, she has completed both phases of state leadership training.

Durham, a teen leader in clothing, foods and nutrition and housing, has excelled in Home Economics projects, twice advancing to the Texas 4-H Fashion Show. She has taught over 1,200 persons and was one of three Texas representatives to the Southern Regional Textile Symposium in North Carolina this summer. This spring she will attend National 4-H conference in Washington, D.C.

Whitney Vannoy, 16-year-old daughter of Gary and Nancy Vannoy, was twice honored Tuesday night with the Dan Bean Memorial Scholarship and the I Dare You award.

The Dan Bean Scholarship is presented annually to the 4-H member with outstanding agricultural projects. Vannoy has excelled in her market lamb, ewe lamb and Angora Goat projects, winning many awards at local and major shows, including the coveted Regina Everett Award.

champion and reserve champion mohair fleece at the annual Crockett County show.

Also selected as one of three recipients of the I Dare You award for 1991, Whitney has excelled in the 4-H clothing project and the foods and nutrition project, advancing to state in foods in 1990 and clothing in 1991. She was a member of the 1991 Share-the-Fun act from Crockett County, has been a teen leader in her main projects for several years, and has served as a district council delegate for two years.

I Dare You awards have been given since 1941 and were instituted by the founder of the Ralston-Purina company to challenge youth to lead productive lives. The other recipients from Crockett County this year are Jennifer Davidson and Terry House.

Davidson, an eight-year 4-H member who has excelled in foods and nutrition, method demonstrations and range judging, has been to State Roundup three times and placed third in this year's state 4-H food show. Her methods demonstrations, presented with partner Julie Childress, have

promoted the production and use of lean lamb. A teen leader who has taught over 300 people in the foods and nutrition project, she helped organize food drives for the past two years which have netted over 400 pounds of food for Helping Hands. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Davidson IV.

House, the son of Jim and Jill House, is also an eight-year 4-H'er who has been successful with a wide range of projects, from sheep to steers,

Court changes retirement plan contribution

Commissioners selected a retirement option which will increase the county's participation from seven to eight percent when they met Monday. The employee portion of the retirement funding will continue at seven percent.

This option results in a 10.81 percent decrease in future benefits. Benefits to those who have already retired or who retire within the next one to two years will not decrease according to Sandy Stokes, county auditor.

To remain at the present funding rate of seven and seven percent would result in a decrease of 24.5 percent in benefits, Stokes said. The decreases are caused by the relatively low turnover of county employees and early retirements, according to Stokes.

Commissioners voted to amend the 1992 budget to reflect a recommendation by the salary grievance committee to adjust Justice of the Peace Jim Hearn's salary and travel expense to a "combined compensation" of \$32,400 beginning Jan. 1, 1992.

Action on a county-wide personnel policy, which has been two years in the making, was tabled until further information can be gathered regarding accrual of sick leave and vacation time.

The court approved a resolution supporting passage of Proposition 4 on the Nov. 5 ballot granting authority to the state to issue bonds to build new prison beds and substance abuse beds.

Commissioners also approved a request from Allison and Associates for special assessment to secure passage of criminal justice legislation and completed a ballot from the firm for the assessment. Cost was \$150.

A resolution to join the state purchasing contract at an annual cost of \$125 was also approved.

Advertisement for bids for fire and extended coverage and airport coverage, cars for the Sheriff's Department and a suburban for the Extension Office were authorized. Advertising for bids

on a street sweeper was tabled until more information is available.

A vote was taken to amend line items in the 1991 budget in the following departments: district court, district judge, county court, sheriff's office, jail, county and district clerk, building and maintenance, parks and pools, public library, welfare, youth center, hospital and care center.

Martha Villarreal and Dora Bentley appeared before the court to talk about recent vandalism at the cemetery. Mrs. Villarreal read the following letter from her husband:

"To whom it may concern,
"On Saturday, September 28, 1991, my father, Azael Villarreal, passed away. We buried him on Tuesday, October 1, 1991. On the following Saturday, my mother went to spend

some time at his gravesite. To her dismay, she found all the flower arrangements destroyed and scattered throughout the gravesite. All the arrangement stands were missing. She just stood there and sobbed.

"Since then I have found that this has happened numerous times before. People have just failed to report it, so it continues. I realize what has happened is irreversible, but I believe it was wrong and something should be done about it. I feel stronger measures should be taken to keep this from reoccurring.

The letter was signed by Ismael Villarreal and Dora Bentley.

Warehouse sales move wool

Wool Growers sold all of 77,412 pounds of paint free ewe wool at its sealed bid sale Oct. 9. Prices ranged from .83 per pound to .92 5/8 with the bulk of the wool going between .86 and .89.

Paint ewe wool went at .66 per pound for 5,000 pounds.

Warehouse manager Eddie Stewart reported 14,000 pounds of paint free lamb wool averaged .70 with bulk prices from .60 to .75 1/2 per pound. One lot of paint lamb went at .60.

Buyer participation included A. H. Helmig & Co. 55,000 pounds; Anodyne, Inc. 24,000 pounds; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer & Co. 16,200 pounds; and Ford Oglesby Wool & Mohair Co. 2,500 pounds.

Ozona Wool & Mohair Co. offered 145,304 pounds of paint free fall ewe

wool at its sale on Oct. 9. Prices ranged from .65 to .91 on good type fall wools. Average price was .87 per pound for fall ewe wool.

Prices ranged from .65 to .75 per pound on the lighter type paint free fall lamb wool. Average price was .70 for the 25,567 pounds of fall lamb wool offered.

The 34,481 pounds of 12-month wool (average to lower grades) offered sold for prices ranging from .60 to .80 per pound going up to .85 on the lighter type wools with an average price of .70 for all types of 12-month wool.

Buyer participation totals released by warehouse manager Terry Criner are: Ford Oglesby Wool & Mohair Co., 4,030; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer & Co., 37,122; Anodyne, Inc. 60,407; and A. H. Helmig & Co. 106,496.

Absentee voting by personal appearance in the Nov. 5 special election begins today, Oct. 16. Nov. 1 is the last day to vote absentee by personal appearance. The place for absentee voting is the courthouse between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on weekdays.

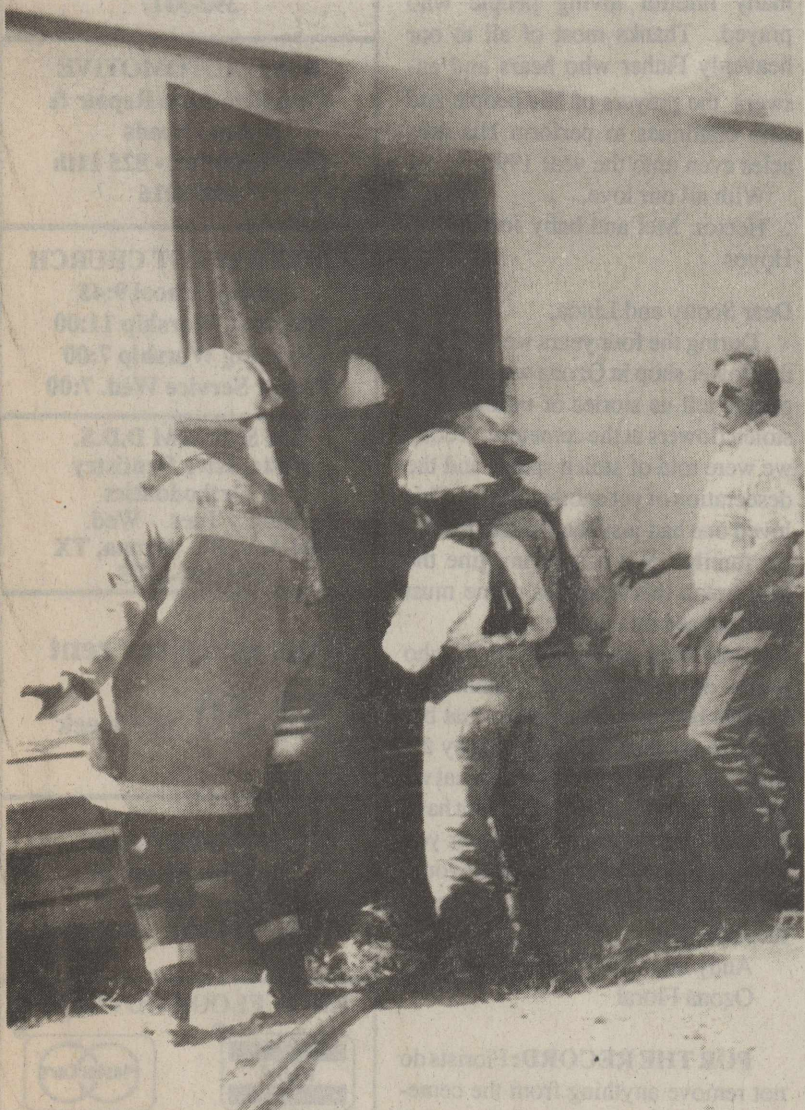

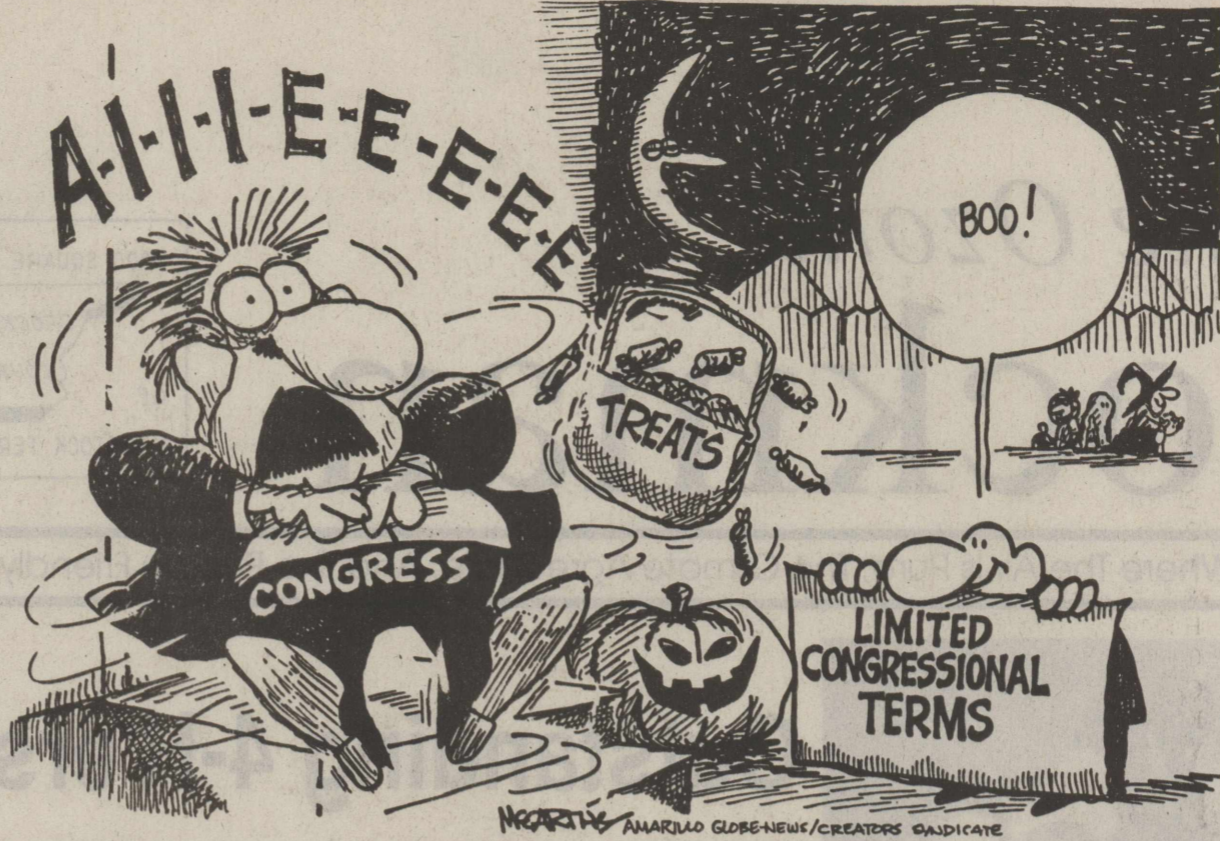

Letter to the Editor

Dear Scotty and Linda,

We would like to share an experience that we survived two weeks ago. Our 16 month old boy, Jordan, started what seemed to be a tragic experience, by choking with a piece of caramel popcorn. We, the parents, tried to give him aid but the situation got worse. Jordan stopped breathing, we rushed him to the hospital and aid was quickly given. Jordan was restored with breathing but did not respond to any visual or hearing activity. Doctor suggested that we rush Jordan to San Angelo. In a matter of moments we were on our way. Seven miles out of town the EMT's demanded the driver to turn back, due to Jordan not breathing. They immediately started CPR on baby Jordan. When we arrived at the hospital, EMT's had successfully restored breathing in Jordan. We then reloaded the ambulance and departed to San Angelo, this time a registered nurse accompanied us. Everything was okay till we passed Mertzon. Jordan started having constant severe seizures. Nurse and EMT's got to work immediately on Jordan. They fought hard all the way to Community Hospital. When we arrived help was awaiting us and took over the situation. They managed to control the seizures and had proper breathing restored. Contact was made with specialists in Fort Worth and arrangements were made for a possible transfer if necessary. Jordan had a 50-50 chance of survival. Doctor advised us there was nothing we could do but wait and pray. Word spread quickly and in no time friends and relatives were praying all over Ozona, San Angelo, Fort Worth, Odessa, Midland, Sterling City, Dallas and Sonora. Our Good Lord was bombarded with prayer. The uniting of all people as one body in faith and prayer strongly encouraged the good Lord to graciously and lovingly bless us with a miracle. Jordan had no chance but to snap out of this nightmare. He woke up with a burst of life, pulling all tubes that were hooked up

to him and wanting Mom and Dad. Due to the time Jordan spent without breathing throughout this experience, he was expected to have some brain damage. All testing came out normal, absolutely no harm was done. Jordan is now at home, very healthy and active. He is very active and full of life.

Our love and many thanks go to these very special people who are a part of this great miracle: Doctor Owensby, Penny Shoush, Felix Trujillo, Alice Martinez, Nurse Peggy McWilliams, EMT's Sandra Gonzales, Pat Griffin, C.E. Light, the entire San Angelo medical staff and to the many, many faithful loving people who prayed. Thanks most of all to our heavenly Father who hears and answers the prayers of His people and who continues to perform His miracles even unto the year 1991.

day is an obstacle. There must be two licensed personnel on each shift and one must be an R.N. The hospital needs two more L.V.N.s and one R.N., Denson said.

Staffing problems at the care center during the evening shift were addressed. There are six people on staff during the 7 a.m.-3 p.m. shift and only four on from 3 until 11 p.m. The board voted to hire someone to work from 3:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Marilee Robertson and Diane Myers of the care center staff talked to the board about increasing the capacity of the center by eight rooms. This would be done by moving the fire doors in the hall between the care center and hospital to take in more rooms from the hospital side. Other modifications would be required to pass inspection. Mrs. Myers presented

the situation and indicated that county employees working at the cemetery will be told to watch for and report signs of this type vandalism. Families whose cemetery lots are vandalized should make a report to the Sheriff's Office.

An employee's problems with workman's compensation were discussed. No action was taken.

The court went into executive session to discuss an agenda item listed as "potential purchase or lease of land for landfill". No action was taken when the officials resumed open session.

Monthly reports were heard or read from county departments. Appearing before the court were: Robert Denson, administrator at Crockett County Hospital and Care Center; Sandy Stokes, auditor; Eddie Moore, road supervisor; Onecimo Ortiz, parks supervisor; Sheriff Jim Wilson; Louise Ledoux, librarian; and Curtis Keith representing the civic and youth center. Helping hands and fire department reports were read by Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

Eddie Moore gave a progress report on assigning cost figures for

a list of persons interested in becoming residents if rooms were available.

Denson commented that the same rooms could be used for long-term care patients on the hospital side at lesser cost and recommended against considering care center expansion at this time.

Mrs. Myers also reported on special activities being planned at the care center encouraging families of residents to "join us for the holidays".

The board voted to change a budget line item from repairs and maintenance to building improvements in order to purchase cubicle curtains for two rooms being renovated and for recovering of dining chairs and other upholstered furniture at the center.

Before adjournment, the board met in executive session. No action was taken.

During his report, Ortiz told commissioners the restrooms at the fairgrounds park have been vandalized for the third time. He was instructed to report any further incidences to the sheriff's office.

Sheriff Jim Wilson's report for September included 38 prisoners, 296 calls for assistance and five civil papers served. He asked that crumbling plaster in the upper portion for the jail be monitored. Structural problems were also mentioned at the library. Louise Ledoux said the roof there continues to leak despite repairs.

Helping Hands served 864 meals in September. Commodities were distributed to 66 families representing 236 people, Judge Mayfield said.

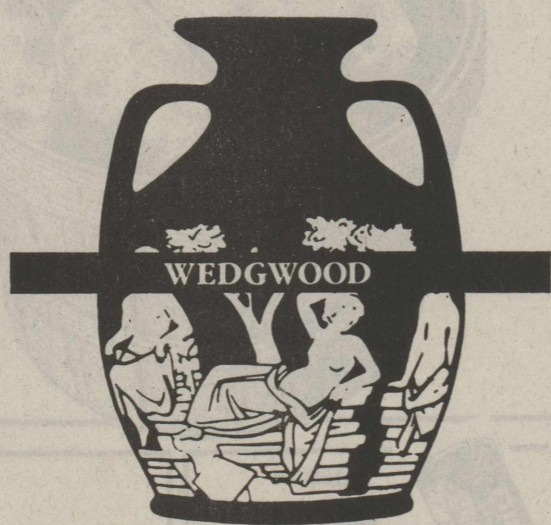

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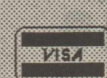

from horses to Angora goats. He attended State 4-H Roundup this summer as a member of the wool judging team and competed this year in the district and state horse shows. His agriculture record book placed fifth at state in judging this year, and his commercial Angora goat project is one of the strongest in the county. He's been successful with his animals at major shows, but hasn't neglected the citizenship aspect of 4-H — he made hoof picks for prizes to be given at the 1991 Crockett County 4-H Horse Show.

The highest honor available statewide in 4-H, the Gold Star Award, was received by Chad Upham and Martha Mayfield.

Chad's eight years of experience in the beef project paid off this past year, when he won the Regina Everett award for the most placings at major livestock shows by a county 4-H member. His project has now developed into a breeding program. He's also been involved in the sheep project, wool and livestock judging, shooting sports and horse projects. For the past two years he's been a member of the Crockett County wool judging team at State 4-H Roundup. Upham serves as one of Crockett County's district council delegates and is enjoying making use of leadership skills gained at two TU Electric/West Texas 4-H Leadership workshops and the 1990 State 4-H Congress. He is the son of Randy and Elizabeth Upham.

Martha Mayfield's involvement in conservation on a personal level helped her earn a trip to National 4-H Congress when her record book won first place at state competition. Each 4-H officer was called on stage and presented with a candle. As the officers lined up on stage and down the center aisle, the lights were turned out and the candles lit one by one, with the senior county council officers beginning the ceremony by lighting two candles from a single candle. Each person in the room soon held a lighted candle, to signify the way 4-H members can pass on their talents and good deeds from one to another.

"We really appreciate all the 4-H members who turned in awards applications and we especially appreciate Wade and Jane Richardson for making our meal so easy and delicious," said County Extension Agents Tedra Ulmer and Billy Reagor.

"The senior 4-H members who planned and took part in the program are to be commended for their enthusiasm and their professionalism. Many adults would be hard-pressed to do such an outstanding job of announcing awards and conducting the skits," said Ulmer.

Jesus Knows All Men

John 2:23-25
While Jesus was in Jerusalem during the Passover Feast, many believed in Him as they saw the mighty works He did. But Jesus did not trust Himself to them, because He knew all men well. There was no need for anyone to tell Him about men, because He knew what was in their hearts.

JESUS AND NICODEMUS
John 3:1-21
There was a man named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews, who belonged to the party of the Pharisees. One night he went to Jesus and said to him, "We know, Rabbi, that you are a teacher sent by God. No one could do the mighty works you are doing unless God were with him."
"How can a grown man be born again?" Nicodemus asked. "He certainly cannot enter his mother's womb and be born a second time!"
"I tell you the truth," replied Jesus, "that no one can enter the Kingdom of God unless he is born of water and Spirit. A man is born physically of human parents, but he is born spiritually of the Spirit. Do not be surprised because I tell you, "You must be born again."
"The wind blows wherever it wishes; you hear the sound it makes, but you do not know where it comes from or where it is going. It is the same way with everyone who is born of the spirit."
"How can this be?" asked Nicodemus. Jesus answered, "You are a great teacher of Israel, and you don't know this?" I tell you the truth: we speak of what we know, and tell what we have seen, yet none of you is willing to accept our message. You do not believe me when I tell you about the things of this world; how will you even believe me, then, when I tell you about the things of heaven except the Son of Man, who came down from heaven."
As Moses lifted up the bronze snake on a pole in the desert, in the same way the Son of Man must be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life. For God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, that everyone who believes in him may not die but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to be its Judge, but to be its Savior.
Whoever believes in the Son is not judged; whoever does not believe has already been judged, because he has not believed in God's only Son. This is how the judgment works: the light has come into the world, but men love the darkness rather than the light, because they do evil things. Anyone who does evil things hates the light and will not come to the light, because he does not want his evil deeds to be shown up. But whoever does what is true comes to the light, in order that the light may show that he did works in obedience to God.

JESUS AND JOHN
John 3:22-30
After this, Jesus and His disciples went to the province of Judea. He spent some time with them there, and baptized. John also was baptizing in Aenon, not far from Salim, because there was plenty of water there. People were going to him and he was baptizing them. (John had not yet been put in prison.)
Some of John's disciples began arguing with a Jew about the matter of religious washing. So they went to John and told him, "Teacher, you remember the man who was with you on the the other side of the Jordan, the one you spoke about? Well, he is baptizing now, and everyone is going to him!"
John answered, "No one can have anything unless God gives it to him. You yourselves are my witnesses that I said, 'I am not the Messiah, but I have been sent ahead of Him.'" The bridegroom is the one to whom the bride belongs; the bridegroom's friend stands by and listens, and he is glad when he hears the bridegroom's voice. This is how my own happiness is made complete. He must become more important while I become less important."

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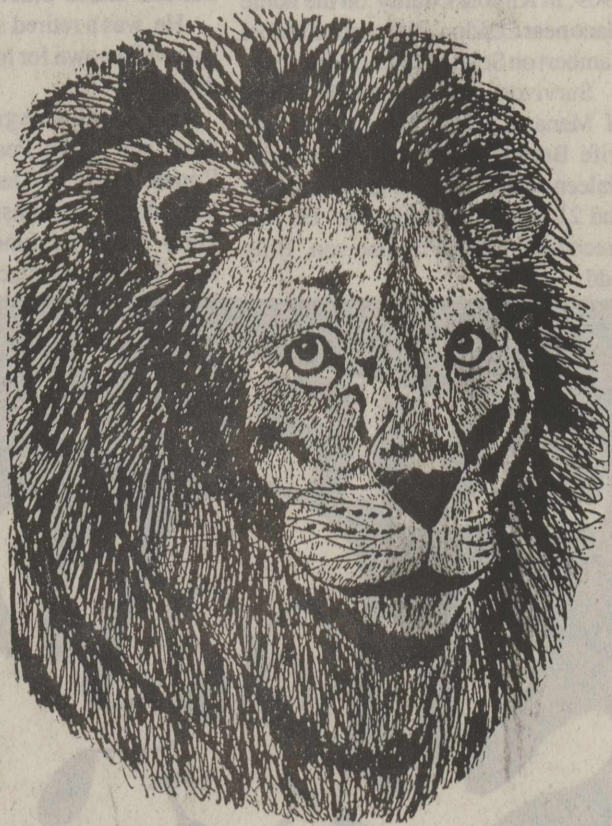

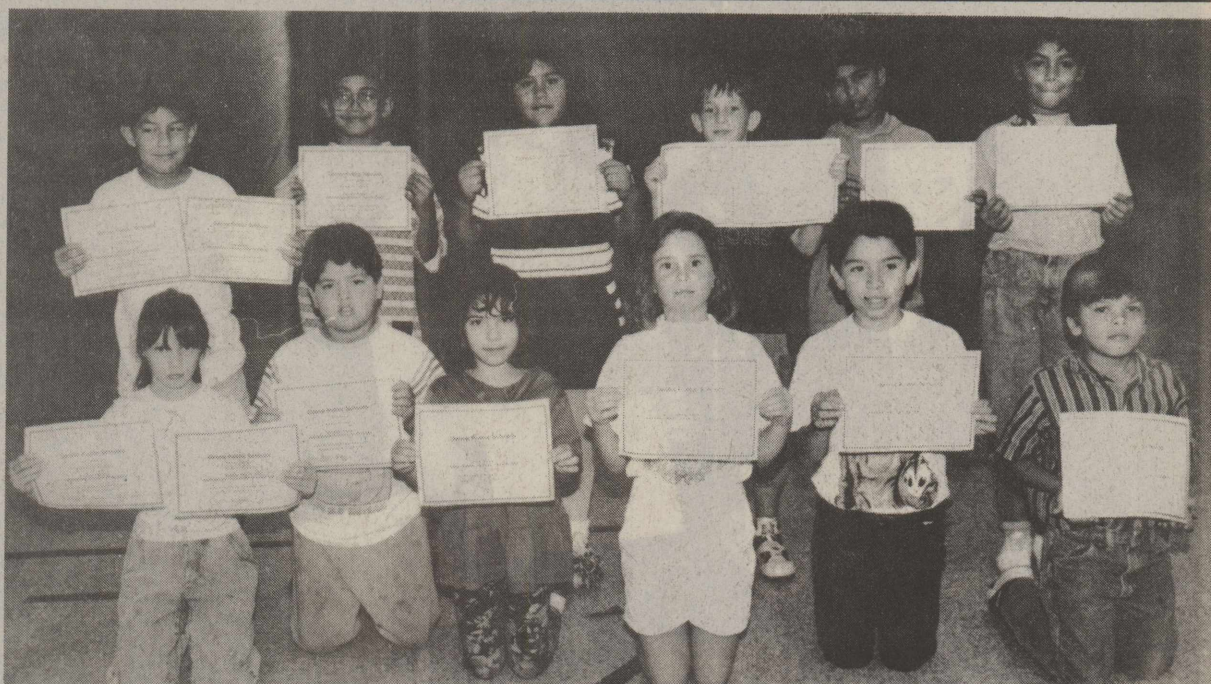

Schools to participate in Red Ribbon Campaign

According to Mrs. Barbara Wallace, Tuesday, Oct. 22, will be the official "Wear Red Day" at Ozona Primary School. At 2pm Corby Wallace from Angelo State University will speak to the student body. The McGruff program will be presented in all physical education classes. Color-

ing books titled "Just Say No" from the Department of Public Safety will be given, along with red ribbons, to each student. Teachers will incorporate drug units and show videos throughout the week.

Mrs. Darla Jones, teacher at Ozona Intermediate School, reported that students on that campus will not only be presented with red ribbons to wear, but they will have guest speakers from the PAL program in San Angelo to talk with students about their responsibilities in preventing drug use. On Wednesday, each student will wear red to proclaim "I'm Happy to be Drug Free!". A multi-media contest will also be sponsored. Each student will be responsible for original entries such as bumper stickers, jingles, posters, couplets, and tongue-twisters.

Principal Don Howard at Ozona Junior High School spoke to the PTA on Oct. 15 on the subject of drugs and will make a presentation to the Lions Club on Oct. 31. Teachers are being encouraged to incorporate anti-drug awareness information into their lesson plans.

Statistics show that every 20 minutes a student is killed in a drug-related accident. To provoke awareness of how these statistics would affect

Ozona High School, a student will be "pulled" from class every 20 minutes throughout the day; their faces will be painted white to signify their death. Throughout the day the number of "deaths" will increase presenting a very graphic picture for all to see. The traditional red tag for the head gear of the Ozona Lions will be distributed along with the red ribbons to every student. Drug related posters will also be on exhibit in the halls of OHS. Teachers will be incorporating drug education into their lesson plans for the week.

By wearing a red ribbon, individuals can create positive peer pressure about drug-free choices. It is the rallying point for millions of children and adults who share the commitment to live healthy lives unhampered by substance abuse.

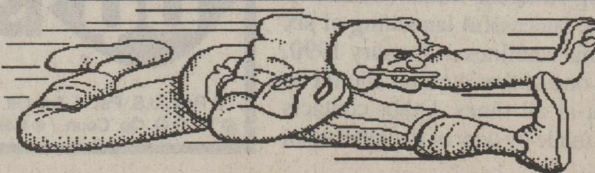

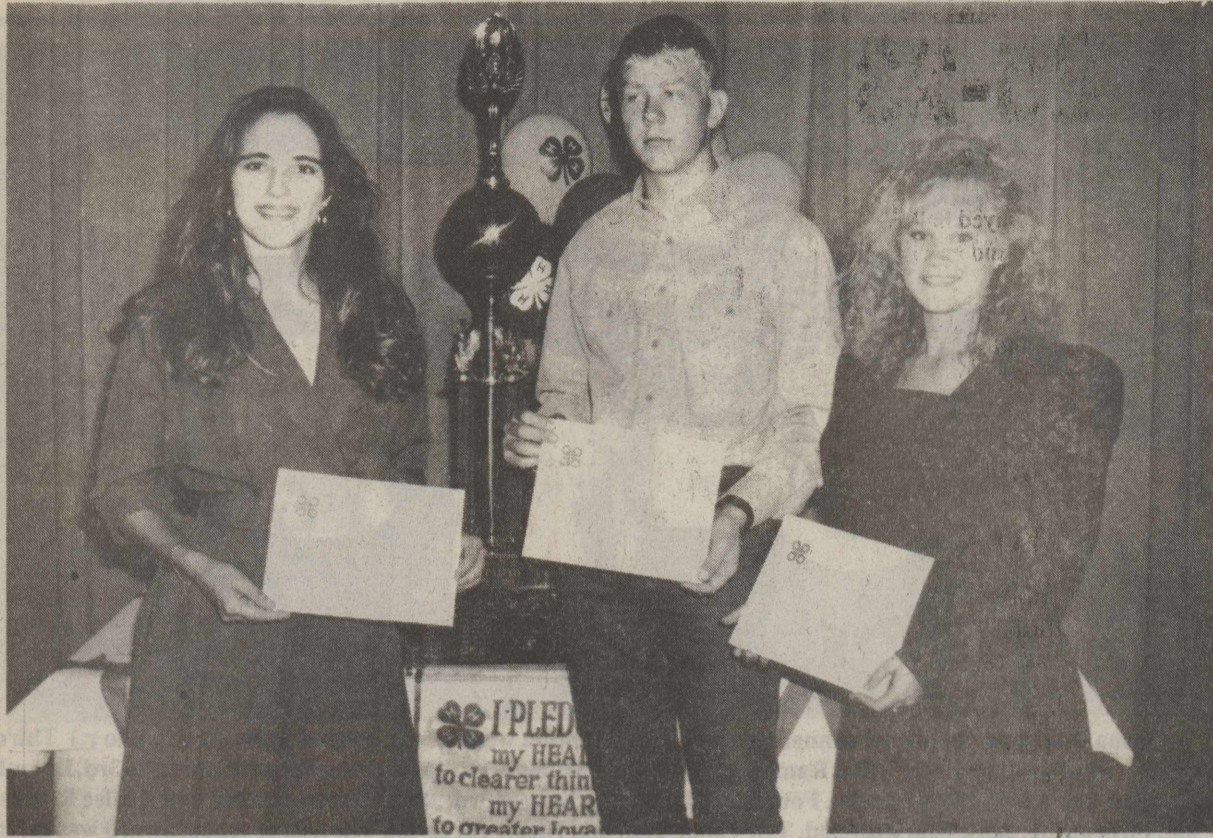

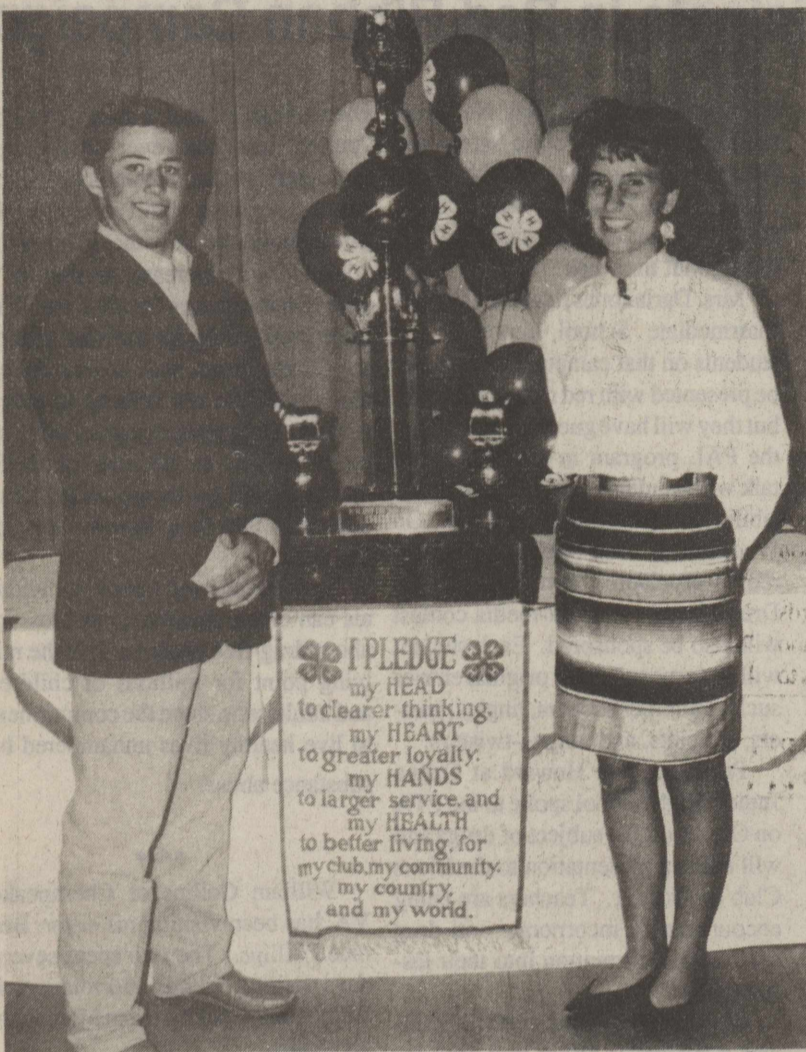

Local Scouts to participate in 34th Scout Jamboree-on-the-Air

Boy Scouts from Ozona will be participating in the 34th Scout Jamboree-on-the-Air this Saturday on the Jack Baggett Ranch south of Ozona.

Jamboree-on-the-Air, or JOTA, is an annual Scouting/amateur radio event sponsored by the World Bureau of the World Organization of the Scout Movement.

Friday afternoon, Dr. Tim Brewer, pastor of Ozona United Methodist Church, and eight Scouts will hike from Ozona to the camp headquarters on the Baggett Ranch approximately 14 miles south of town. Scotty Moore (N5S JL), local amateur radio operator, will set up the station equipment early Saturday morning and supervise the Scouts as they build and erect their own antenna systems for the JOTA.

Thousands of stations around the globe participate. If propagation is right, it is common to contact 100 Scouting countries during the weekend. In past JOTAs, Scouts in some remote areas like Antarctica, Ascension Island, Christmas Island, Falkland Islands, and Seychelles were heard.

In the United States of America, many Boy Scouts of America councils and district hold camporees to coincide with JOTA, where amateurs set up field-day-type operations, giving campers a chance to exchange greetings with Scouts everywhere.

Generally, the exchanges include typical information: name, location (QTH), Scout rank, hobbies, etc. Some exchanges lead to long-lasting pen pal friendships and the exchange of photos, badges, pins, and patches. Specialized communications such as Slow Scan TV (SSTV) and Amateur TV (ATV) can give some the opportunity to see the other person. This year, many will have an opportunity to talk to others via Orbiting Satellite

Carrying Amateur Radio (OSCAR). With the successful launching of six additional satellites in January 1990, at least one of the satellites should be in sight at all times. Other contacts will be made by way of Packet Radio,

Radio Teletype (RTTY), and Earth-Moon-Earth (EME) Contacts.

Varsity Lions nip Buffaloes 25-23

The Ozona lions survived a fourth quarter rally by the Stanton Buffaloes to win a District 6-2A football contest 25-23 Friday night in Lion Stadium.

Stanton scored first in the game as a result of recovering an Ozona fumble. After a four play drive was stopped by the Lion defense, the Buffaloes kicked a 25 yard field goal with 8:20 left in the first quarter to take a 3-0 lead.

The Lions fumbled again on the ensuing kickoff and Stanton had the ball again. After three defensive plays by Chad Upham, the Buffaloes were forced to kick.

Adam Alba returned the kick to the 37 yard line. Finally, after almost 7 minutes were gone in the quarter, the Lions went on offense for the first time.

Following a seven play drive, which included a 34 yard run by Jason Yeager, the Lions scored their first touchdown of the game when Owen Powell scored from three yards out. Adrian Vargas' kick was good and Ozona took the lead 7-3 with 3:07 left in the first quarter.

Stanton scored again with 31 seconds left in the first quarter after a six play drive. The extra point attempt was good and the Buffaloes led 10-7 at the end of the quarter.

The Lions' next score came as a result of a good defensive play by Randel Wilson. He blocked a fourth down punt by the Buffaloes, and Ozona had the ball on Stanton's 31 yard line. The Lions moved the ball on four plays down to the Buffalo one yard line. Included in this drive was a 23 yard screen pass play from Upham to Michael Fay. With 6:53 left in the second quarter, Jason Yeager scored from one yard out. Vargas' point after kick was blocked, making the score

13-10 in favor of Ozona.

Neither team could move the ball on their next possession. However, a good kick by Vargas on fourth down pinned the Buffaloes on their three yard line. On Stanton's second play from scrimmage, Michael Kenison crashed across the line and tackled the Buffalo ball carrier behind the goal line giving Ozona a safety and two points on the scoreboard. This made the score 15-10 in favor of Ozona with 2:34 left in the second quarter.

Penalties killed the next Lion drive. After a run by Andy Borrego and a pass play from Upham to Borrego, the Lions were inside the Stanton 10 yard line. A major penalty pushed the ball back. The Lions tried again and scored on a pass play from Upham to Borrego. But another penalty nullified the score. Stanton's defense held and the first half ended with the score 15-10 in favor of Ozona.

The Lions controlled the ball for most of the third quarter. Stanton's first possession ended when they fumbled the ball and Ozona's Rey Rivera recovered it on the Buffaloes' 20 yard line. A pass from Upham to Borrego moved the ball to the 10 yard line. Jason Yeager scored on a 10 yard run with 5:38 left in the third quarter. Vargas' kick was good and Ozona led by a 22-10 score.

Stanton's next possession was also stopped by a fumble. The Lions were unable to move the ball and forced to kick.

Great defensive plays by the Lions' Mario Mendoza and Michael Kenison stopped the next Stanton drive. After the Buffaloes had begun to move the ball down the field, the Lion defense stiffened. On a third down play by the Buffaloes, Mendoza tackled the ball carrier behind the line of scrimmage for a big loss. Stanton was forced to kick and Kenison blocked the kick.

The third quarter ended with Ozona in possession of the ball and leading 22-10.

The Lions could not move the ball on their first possession of the fourth quarter. Stanton's first possession ended when they fumbled a fourth down punt. This gave the Lions the ball on the Buffalo five yard line.

Again a penalty played a major part in keeping the Lions from scoring a touchdown. With second down and goal, a five yard penalty moved the ball back. Following two incomplete pass plays, the Lions had to settle for a field goal. Vargas' field goal attempt was good making the score 25-10 in favor of Ozona with 8:09 left in the game.

From this point on the quarter belonged to Stanton. On their next possession, the Buffaloes put together a seven play drive and scored with 5:37 left in the game. A two point conversion attempt failed and this made the score 25-16 in favor of the Lions.

Stanton stopped the Lions on Ozona's next possession and then scored their final touchdown after a six play drive and two Ozona penalties. The extra point attempt was good

The Stanton JV Buffaloes, with the help of seven Lion turnovers, defeated the Ozona JV Lions 22-15 last Thursday in Stanton.

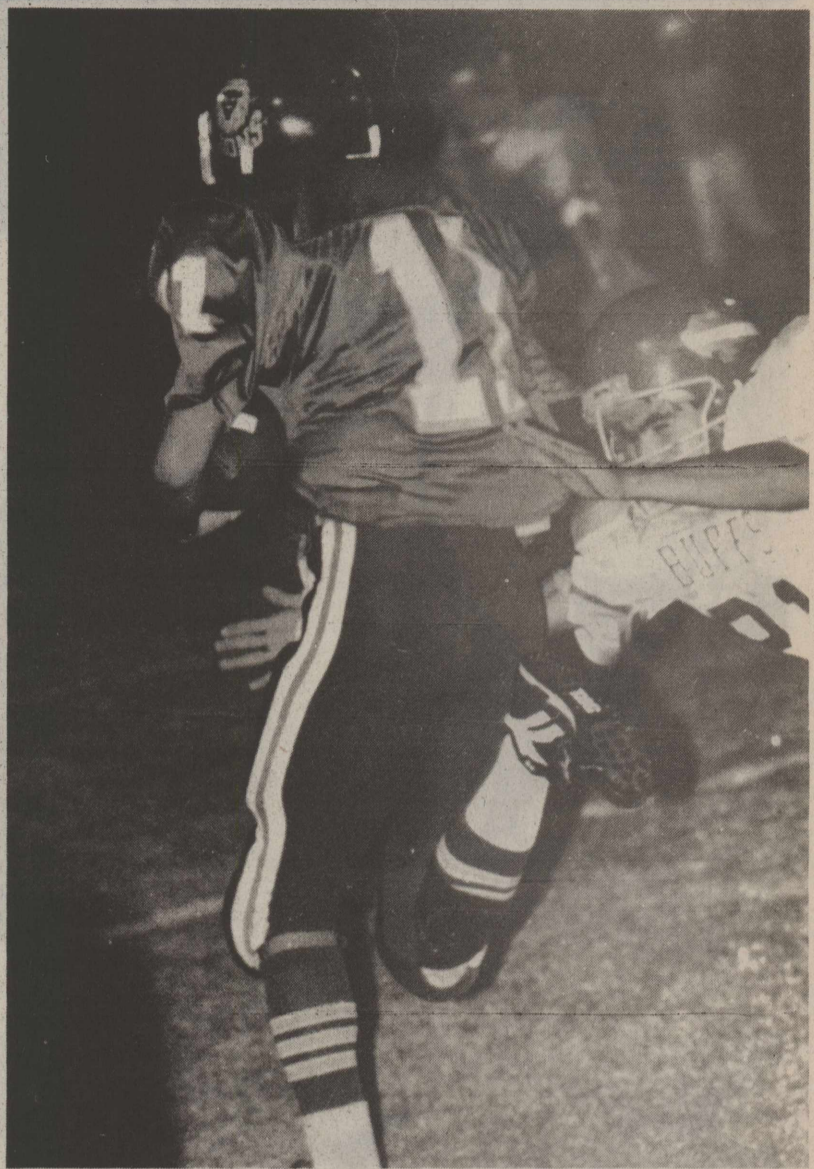
The Lions had 16 first downs but they also lost three fumbles inside Stanton's 20 yard line.

Herbicide stops winter weeds and grasses

Most annual winter grasses and weeds that plague lawns in late winter and early spring are ready to germinate now. The best way to stop them in the lawn is to apply a preemergence herbicide promptly, before their seeds germinate.

One of the worst pest plants that needs to be targeted now is henbit - a common lawn invader that brightens up the lawn with blue, but seldom-appreciated blossoms in late winter and early spring. Winter grasses, including winter rye, also germinate now. Most of our most beautiful spring wildflowers also sprout in the fall and need to be targeted now if they are considered to be weeds in a well-manicured lawn.

Preemergence herbicides are chemicals that kill weed seedlings as they germinate. They are ineffective against weeds and grasses once they grow beyond the seedling stage. Apply

a preemergence herbicide as a uniform, broadcast treatment to problem areas of the lawn. At least 1/2 inch of water - irrigation or rain - is needed after application to move the herbicide into the soil where it is activated.

Labeled preemergence herbicides for lawns include XL, Betasan, Balan and Princep. All of these materials will do a reasonably good job of stopping winter weeds and grasses if applied accurately and in time.

All of these herbicides are available in granular formulations while Betasan, Princep and other preemergence herbicides labeled for lawn use also are formulated for spray application. Most home gardeners can do a more accurate job by using a granular formulation and broadcasting it as they would fertilizer. Spray application of a preemergence herbicide should be attempted only if you have a sprayer that is capable of applying a uniform, blanket spray (a hand-pump sprayer is not acceptable). The sprayer also must be accurately calibrated.

Read and follow herbicide label directions carefully. Under application can result in no weed control while over application may risk damage to the lawn.

Remember that preemergence herbicides can't distinguish "good seed" from "bad seed". Don't use them in a lawn or garden where you intend to plant seed this fall or next spring. The rate of the herbicide breakdown varies. Balan deteriorates rapidly and seed can be planted within two months after application, while XL deteriorates slowly and can prevent seed germination as long as a year after application.

New Library Hours

Due to maternity leave for our library aide, the public library will observe temporary hours during October and November. The library will be closed for lunch and supper breaks, but we will try to keep as regular hours as we can. The library will be open from 9am to 6pm Monday through Friday, but will be closed from 1pm to 1:30 pm for lunch every day. The library will be open from 6pm to 9pm on Monday and Thursday nights, but will be closed from 5:30 to 6pm for supper.

Library System Membership

Crockett County Public Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System for fiscal year 1991, according to William D. Gooch, director and librarian of the Texas State Library. "We are pleased to award a certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services," said Gooch. "It is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

CCPL is a renewal member of the Big Country Library System and serves citizens of Ozona and Crockett County. CCPL had to meet strict criteria, according to Librarian Louise P. Ledoux, such as hours of access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Public libraries must apply and qualify for system membership annually. CCPL has been a member of the Big Country Library System for eight years.

Membership benefits include collection development state funds, a microcomputer and software and audio-visual equipment, free loan of films and videos, and inter-library loan program for books. We also get literacy materials and workshops, professional and technical help with budgeting, book selection, cataloging and much more, plus library skills training through special workshops for county librarians. System membership is vital for a small community library like

ours.

Authorized by the Library Systems Act of 1969, the Texas Library System was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts. Comprised of 10 regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of both their resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made possible through state and federal funds appropriated to the library development program of the Texas State Library. This year the Texas State Library will distribute about \$8 million to the 10 library systems.

Mrs. Lou Deaton is our lay representative to the Big Country Library System and represents our library in planning system programs. Mrs. Deaton was selected this year to serve on the system council and will attend all regional and state meetings of the Big Country Library System. 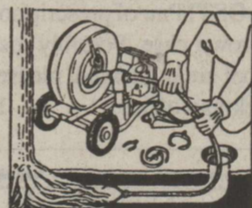

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Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

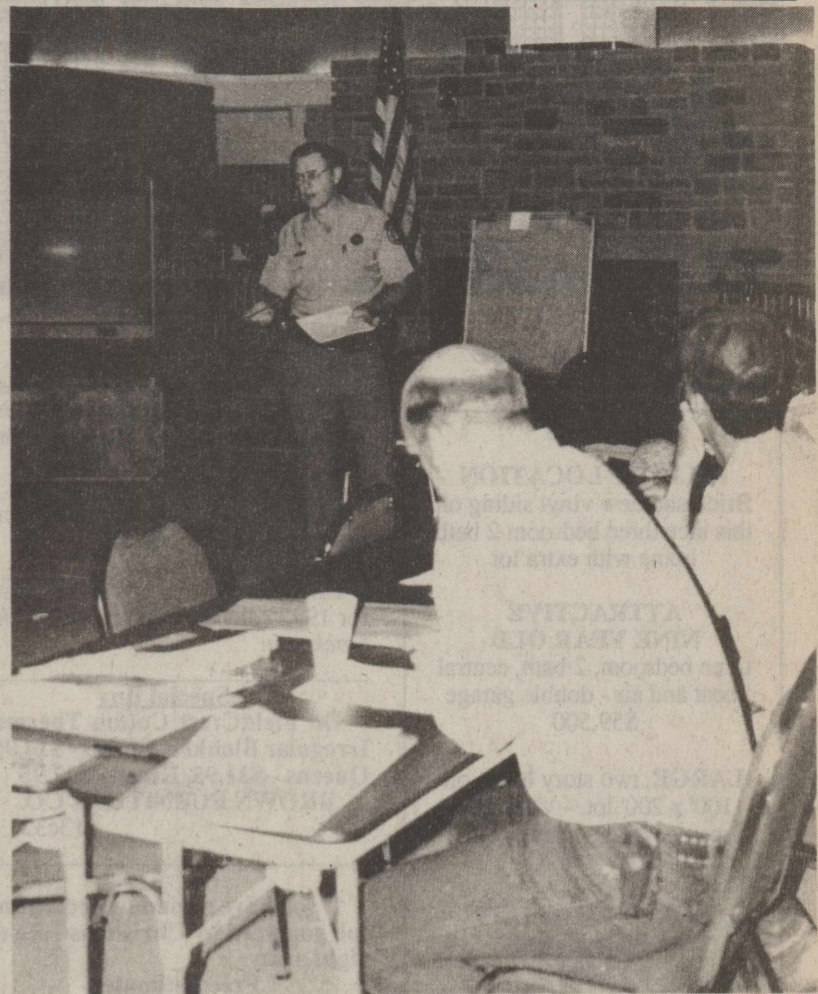
Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991. 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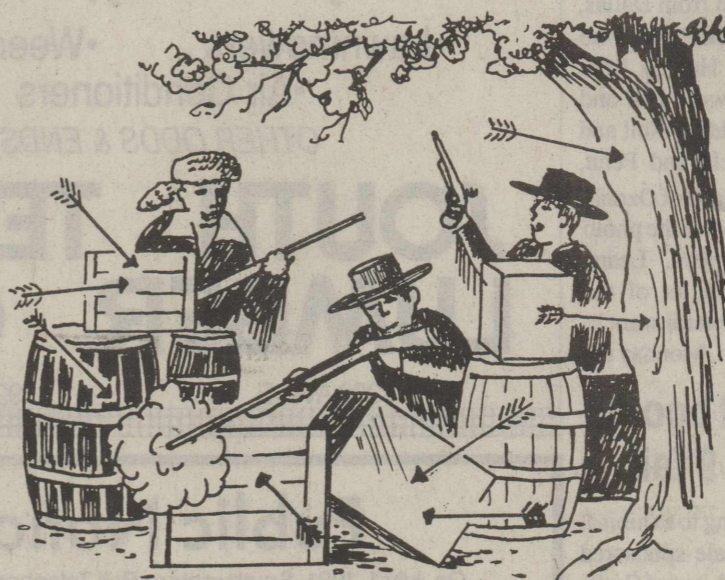
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Did You Know...



JIM BOWIE'S OTHER FIGHT...
Alamo hero, Jim Bowie, had a close scrape in 1831 when he and 10 other Texans were attacked by Tehuacana and Caddo Indians. Outnumbered with 15 to 1, the Texan's dug in to fight. After an all-day battle, with half their forces dead, the Indians withdrew. In 1836, Bowie wasn't so lucky. Outnumbered 27 to 1 by Santa Anna's forces, 181 Texans died at the Alamo.

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
