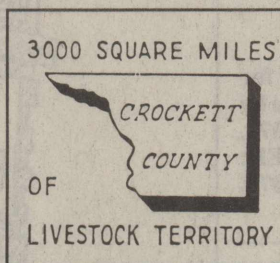

Fighting Lion Band warmed up for state

Despite high winds and near freezing temperatures Saturday, the Ozona Lion Band captured first place at the UIL Area B marching competition, earning its second consecutive berth in the Texas State Marching Contest.

Overcoming a wind chill factor of 12 degrees at Abilene's Shotwell Stadium, the Lion Band performed a show which contest judge Linda McDavitt, director of bands at San Antonio's MacArthur High School, called "exciting, aggressive, and full of energy." "You had a well controlled and exciting show," she commented. "Your marching fundamentals have been extremely well taught and your execution in this performance was excellent."

Eldorado took second place and also qualified for the state competition to be held Monday, Nov. 11, at Memorial Stadium on the University of Texas campus in Austin.

Ozona will be among 14 of the finest conference 2A bands from across Texas to perform in the preliminary round of competition beginning at 12 noon. The top five bands in the pre-

liminaries will perform again in the final round beginning at 7:30 p.m.

"I am very proud that our band members had the character to play so well despite the bad weather," said Kelly Glaze, director of the Lion Band. "As cold as it was, many bands had a hard time concentrating on their performances."

Being selected for Area B, which includes bands from as far north as Wichita Falls and Fort Worth, south to Big Lake and Ozona, and east to Fredericksburg, Ozona will represent the largest area in the state. "We are thrilled that Ozona will represent such a massive portion of Texas at the state contest," said Glaze. "This is quite an honor for the entire community."

Assistant band director Norman Carroll added that he appreciates all of the support the Lion Band has received this year and encourages all band fans to back the group in Austin.

A recent UIL rule change allows 2A bands to advance from region marching contest on odd number years (1991-'93-'95). Next year only 3A and 5A bands will advance.

Fuel deliveries questioned

Pct. 3 Commissioner Jim House said Monday he welcomes an investigation of his activities as a county commissioner. House stated emphatically that he wants a full scale investigation into allegations against him.

"Just remember, no matter what you hear about me during the next few weeks, that there is more to this than meets the eye," House said.

The investigation began after County Auditor Sandy Stokes discovered discrepancies between fuel deliveries to the county and billing by the commissioner's company, House Fuel.

A joint investigation is underway by the Sheriff's Department and the office of the district attorney. Results will be reported to the grand jury.

Helbing challenges permit renewal

Validity of a hearing for renewal of a waste water discharge permit by Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has been challenged and a new hearing set.

Landowner Arthur Helbing Jr., whose property lies south of the Ozona wastewater plant, maintains that he was not notified of the first hearing by The Texas Water Commission. The commission is supposed to notify former complainants of hearings.

The permit granted at the hearing in question is good until ruled otherwise according to Dan Davidson, president of the water board.

The second hearing is scheduled for Nov. 13 in Austin. The water district will be represented by counsel through the firm they used during a suit filed by Helbing to prevent construction of the wastewater plant.

The discharge permit must be renewed every five years according to Doug Meador. The system is subjected to a once a year inspection from the Texas Water Commission, and the district sends samples for testing each week. The Texas Water Development Board also inspects once a year until the bond indebtedness is paid.

"Every inspection we've had a real good report," said Meador.

Scouts begin food drive

For their part in one of the nation's largest volunteer collections of food, Ozona Boy Scouts of Troop 153 will distribute food collection bags this weekend. The canned food collected will be used to help feed the hungry in the community.

This year's Scouting for Food drive begins Saturday, Nov. 9. Scouts will go door-to-door, leaving food collection bags. They will return the following Saturday, Nov. 16, to pick up the filled bags. Scouts are asking residents to place bags outside their doors by 9 a.m. to be collected. The food collected will be distributed locally.

According to Dr. William F. Bartosh, Council Scouting for Food

chairman, "the greatest need is for nutritional canned food items, such as baby formula, soup, chili, fish, meats and vegetables."

A recent study revealed that as many as 11.5 million children in the United States are threatened with hunger every month. The national report also found that hungry children are more likely to be sick and thus absent from school more often than children who are adequately nourished.

"The real tragedy," says Carl Cummins, Scout Executive for the Concho Valley Council, "is that widespread hunger is completely preventable. When communities work together with programs like Scouting for Food, hunger can be eliminated." Nationally, the drive is expected to collect 87 to 89 million cans during this year's drive.

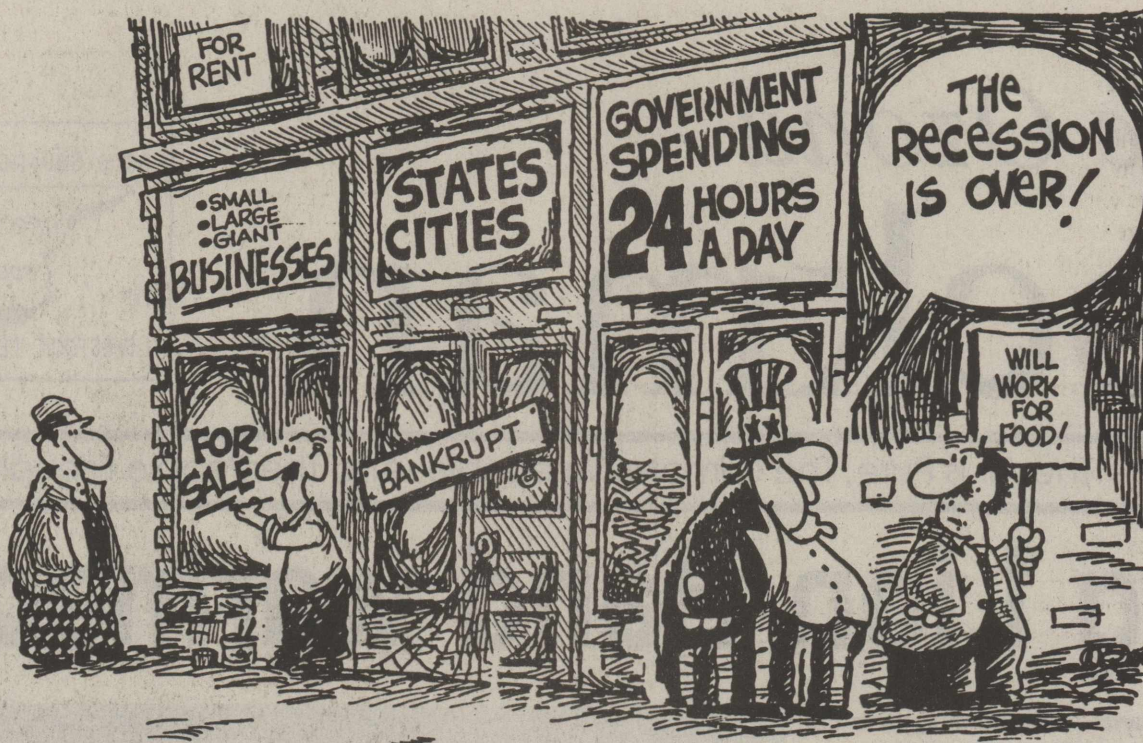

On April 16, 1991, GTE Corporation ("GTE") and Contel Corporation ("Contel") filed a joint petition for declaratory relief with respect to the obligations or requirements of GTE or Contel and/or any of its subsidiaries relating to the merger of GTE and Contel. GTE and Contel have requested a ruling from the Public Utility Commission of Texas that neither GTE nor Contel is required to report the merger of GTE and Contel pursuant to Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"), TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. art. 1446c (Vernon Supp. 1991), that no investigation of the merger by the Commission is required. In the alternative, GTE and Contel seek a determination that the merger is consistent with the public interest.

The Commission is investigating the merger between GTE and Contel Corporations to determine whether the merger is consistent with the public interest. In reaching its determination, the Commission shall take into consideration the reasonable value of the property, facilities or securities to be acquired, disposed of, merged or consolidated. If the Commission finds that the merger is not in the public interest, the Commission shall take the effect of the transaction into consideration in GTE Southwest Incorporated's and Contel of Texas, Inc.'s next rate-making proceeding and disallow the effect of such transaction if it will unreasonably affect rates or services.

This filing has been assigned Docket No. 10212. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. On October 18, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to add a new optional service offering called SmartTrunk™ Service. The application has been assigned Tariff Control No. 10687.

SmartTrunk Service provides access between the customer's premises and the serving Southwestern Bell central office for circuit-switched voice and data communications. This communication capability is provided where facilities are available using Integrated Services Digital Network architecture. ISDN services available with SmartTrunk Service use Primary Rate Interface (PRI) technology. SmartTrunk Service requires PRI ISDN compatible Private Branch Exchange (PBX) customer provided equipment registered under FCC Part 68 Rules. SmartTrunk Service employs a 1.544 Mbps facility (denoted as SmartTrunk Interface) typically divided into twenty-three B channels and one D channel. B channels are used for voice and data communications while the D channel provides out-of-band signaling.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for each SmartTrunk Interface facility will be \$1,110 per month under a 36-month service contract or \$1,010 per month under a 60-month service contract. The proposed rate for the use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each B channel depending on the rate group classification which is determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.8 million from this offering during the first year.

Upper age limit raised for blood donors

United Blood Services has raised its upper age limit for blood donors to 80, adding years to the lifesaving impact of committed volunteer blood donors. The limit used to be 75, with a number of restriction on donors between the ages of 66 and 74.

Results of a new study show that older blood donors are no more likely to develop health problems than non-donors in the same age range. In fact, regular donations may actually help keep them healthy. That's because each donation includes questions about the donor's current health and a check of temperature, pulse, blood pressure and blood iron level. This "mini-physical" has even given some donors an early warning of possible health problems, prompting them to see their doctor.

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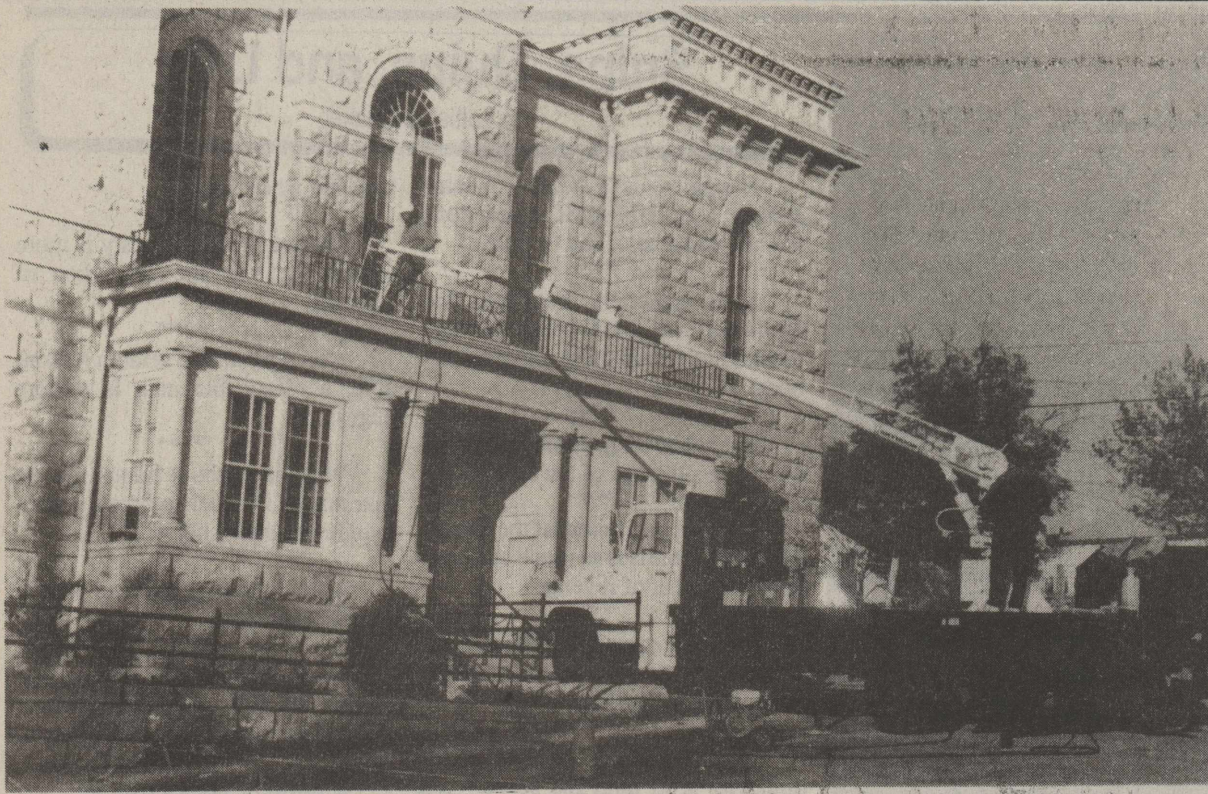

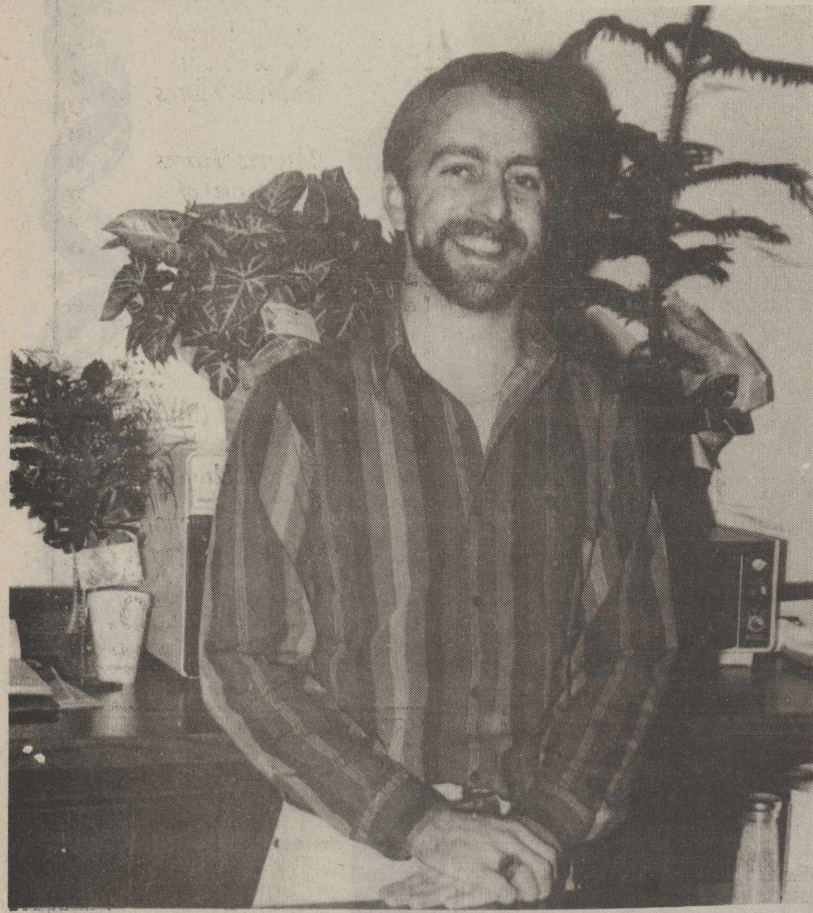

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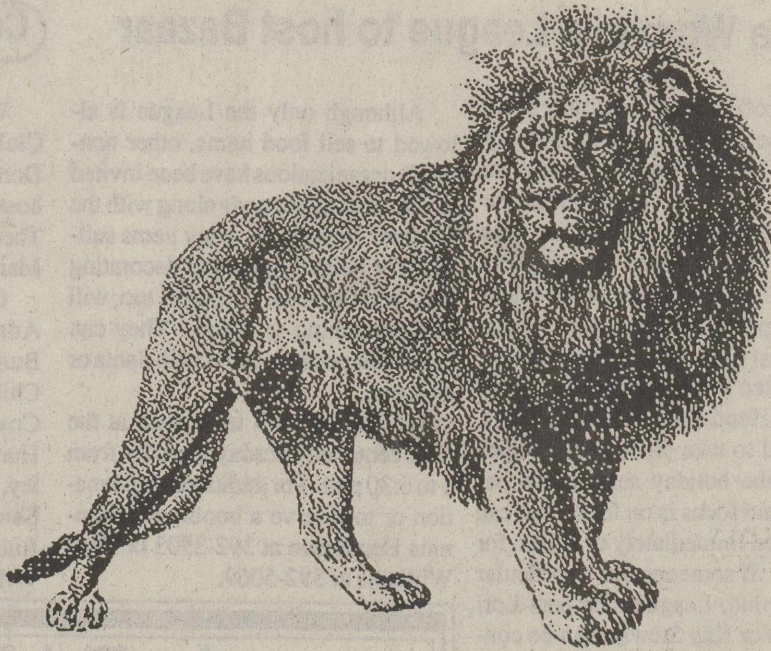

Parenting program sponsors named

Hunting season is a much anticipated time for many Texans — but often a dreaded time for electric co-op linemen.

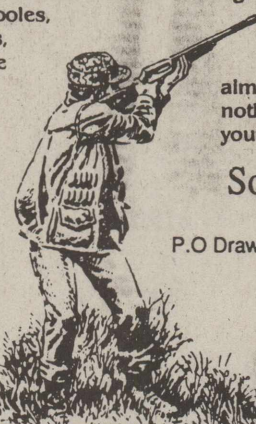

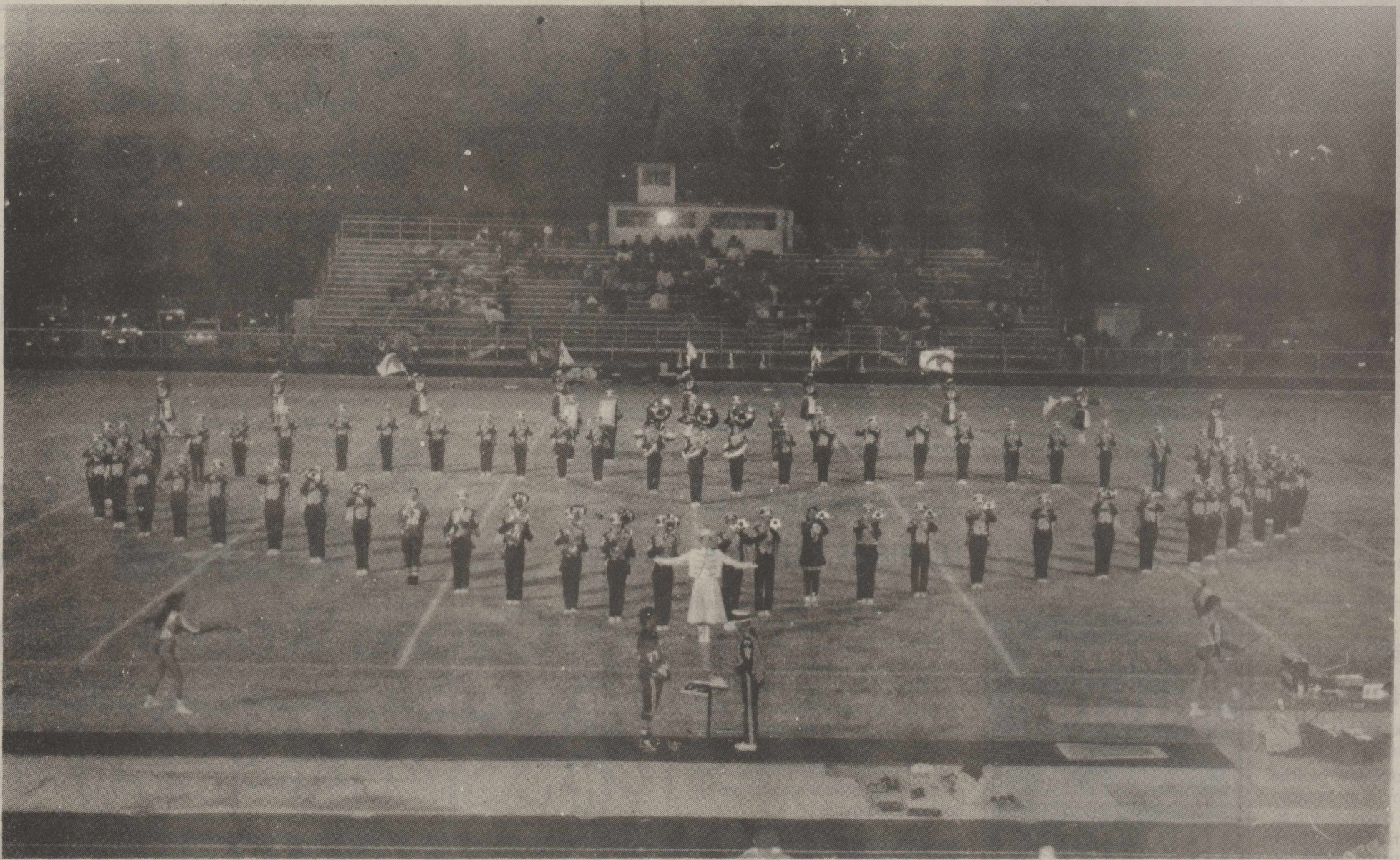
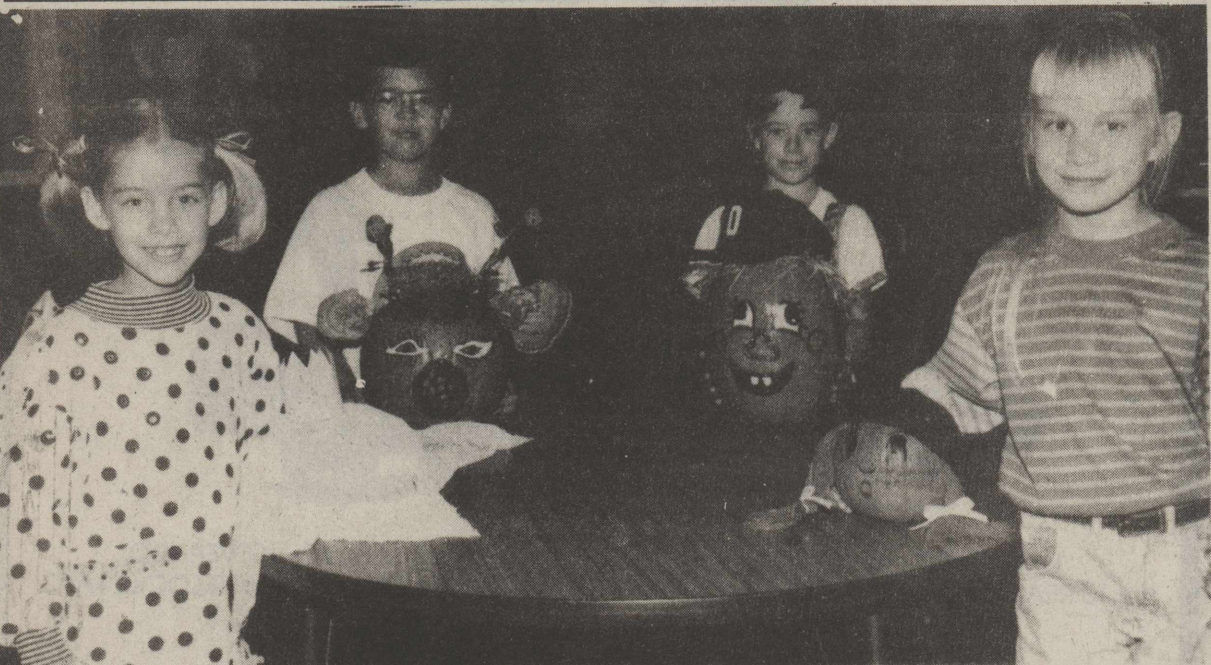

Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 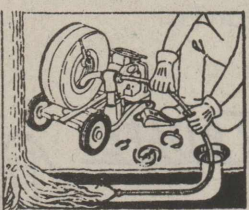

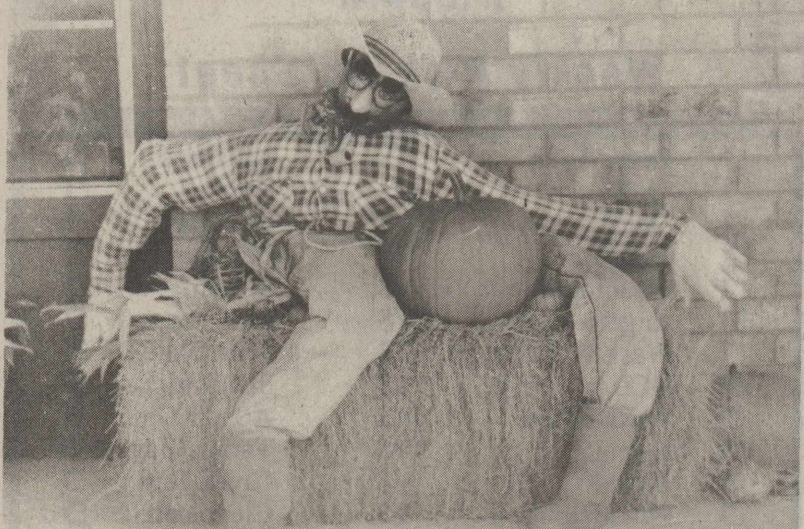

Helping children choose holiday gifts

Yes, Virginia, it's almost Christmas...and if your family is like most, the holiday season can really put a pinch in your pocketbook! Families with children probably feel this pinch more than others, because children are often not aware of the financial cost associated with holiday gift giving.

Setting and following a budget for gifts reduces the stress and strain caused by holiday overspending. Costs can add up quickly when buying is done on impulse, so before buying gifts, have the whole family sit down together and discuss the amount of money available for holiday spending.

Decide how much of your total budget will be spent on separate expenses such as gifts, travel, special food, hosting and attending social events, home decorating and party apparel. Write down your expected expenses and estimate their cost—the total may be more than you expect!

There are a number of ways to work out gift-giving. Draw names so each person purchases only one gift, or set a maximum cost per gift. Consider using homemade decorations or newspaper for wrapping to save money in those areas which can be spent on gifts.

Remind your child about the limits that have been set and help him/her calculate how much to spend on each gift. Using mail-order catalogs as price guides may help the child understand realistic prices for items.

Children also need to learn that the cost of a gift may not reflect its actual value—a thoughtful gift that's not highly priced may be treasured more than an unwanted, expensive one.

They also need to realize that the cost of a gift should not be based on the cost of the gift they receive from a person. Setting and following a budget helps a child understand that the amount spent on gifts depends on his or her own situation—not the amount someone else spends.

Inexpensive gifts could include food items, handpainted notecards, service coupons for help such as car washing, dog bathing, babysitting, yard work or housecleaning. Of course, parents may need to follow through on the gift and make sure the child provides the promised service.

Even very young children can take part in gift giving by wrapping gifts themselves in a gift bag and precut length of ribbon. Getting involved in the planning, choosing, making, wrapping and presentation of the gift increases the meaning of the gift for both the child and the recipient.

Staying within budget over the holidays can be treated as a family challenge, making the year-end season playful rather than stressful. Planning and working together to keep gift expenses affordable can make the

holiday season more enjoyable for the entire family.

In the family category, hobos Gary Yeager and children were first place funniest followed by Monica and Adrian Bendele as a spider and web.

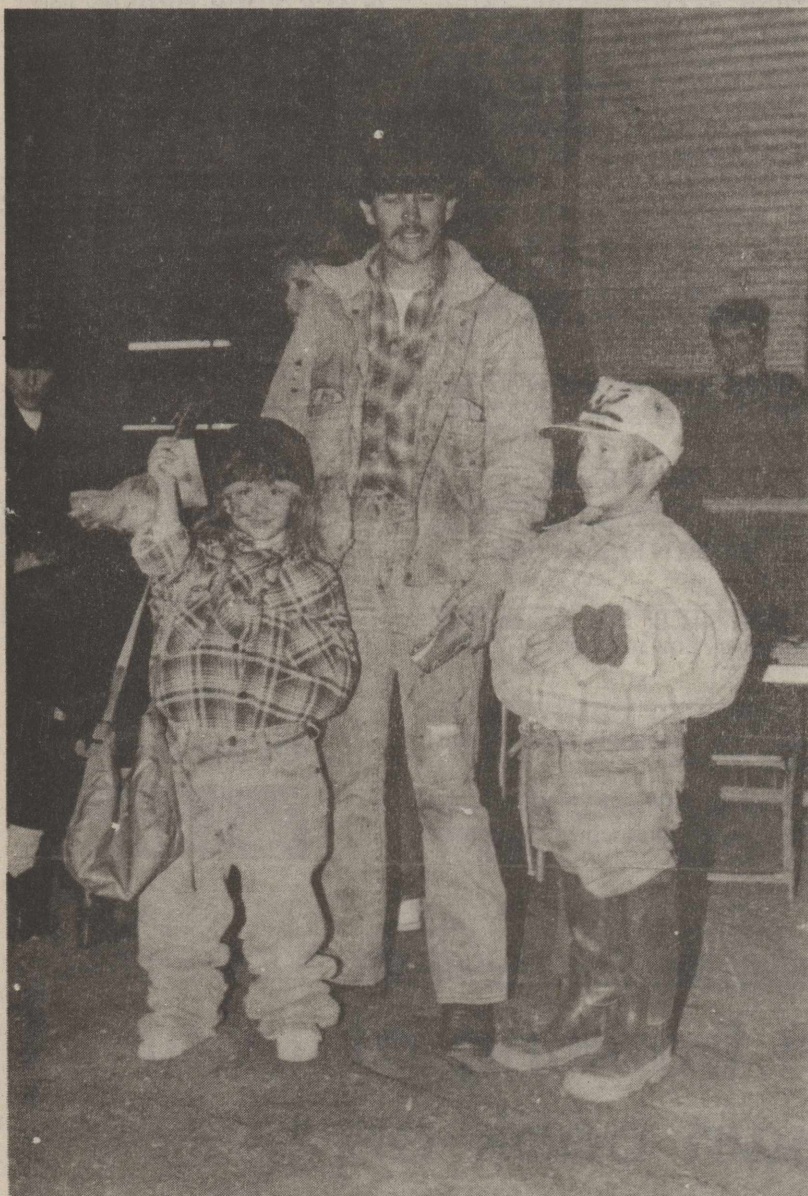

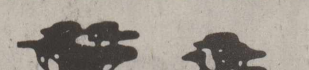
