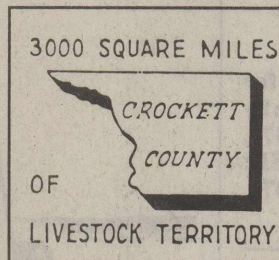

## Parent to Parent training slated for next week

The long-awaited Parent-to-Parent program will begin next week on Thursday, Jan. 16, and Friday, Jan. 17, with training of 16 group leaders by Kary Jones from Pride Parent Training of Atlanta, GA.

The Parent-to-Parent program is sponsored locally by the Drug Abuse Prevention Education program, which was made possible by a grant from the federal ACTION agency and by local funding from the Crockett County Commissioners Court, Crockett County School District, Ozona Lions Club, Ozona Women's League, Double T Ranch, Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Las Guadalupeas, Knights of Columbus, Orlando De Hoyos, Temple Beatusita Jerusalem and the Crockett County probation office. The DAPE project in Crockett County is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

County Extension Agent-Home Economics Tedra Ulmer, who serves as coordinator for the project, says a few of the 16 volunteer facilitator slots remain to be filled. "We're asking volunteers to give up just a few days in the next six months—approximately three days—to be trained and then present the materials to at least two groups of up to 16 friends, family—people you know," the agent said. Ulmer noted that you don't have to be an experienced teacher or public speaker to help with the program. "The workshop is video-based and you're basically there to direct discussion and serve as host," she explained.

"We chose the Parent-to-Parent program because it was community-based and run by the people most important in the fight against the drug epidemic—parents here in Crockett County," she said.

Parent to Parent consists of three mini-workshops presented in eight individual segments. The segments develop parents' awareness, help parents learn to "put themselves in the way" and become a more effective parent, and prepare a parent to act if it becomes necessary. "This program provides a support network for us as parents—gives us a forum to discuss concerns and exchange ideas," Ulmer said.

Who should attend the workshop? Ulmer says the workshop is great for

anyone who cares about kids—parents, teachers, grandparents—and is especially valuable for parents of young children.

According to Pride Parent Training's information, the workshop benefits three types of parents—those who don't know about the problems caused when kids, drugs and alcohol mix; parents who know about the problems but don't know what they can do to prevent them; and parents who know the problems and are already working to prevent them.

The system was developed by Bill Oliver, a parent who experienced

dramatic family problems brought about by the chemical dependency of his oldest daughter. The tapes used in the Parent to Parent training feature Oliver, who became the executive director of one of the largest adolescent treatment programs in the world before joining PRIDE in 1987.

"Oliver is a dynamic and personal speaker—those of us who have already previewed the tapes have been extremely pleased and found the information to be excellent and practical for parent use," noted Ulmer.

If you are interested in being a facilitator and would like more infor-

mation, call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 before Tuesday, Jan. 14. This program is designed to reach all persons in the community, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

"Remember, only 16 persons will be training in this first, elite group," said Ulmer, "and this will be a first-come, first-serve session with Ms. Jones, the training person from PRIDE in Atlanta—I'm sure it will be a very informative and special event."

## Filing date extended to Jan. 10

The extension of the filing date for the primary election from Jan. 2 until Jan. 10, Friday, has not drawn any more candidates to the Crockett County Democratic Primary.

At least two potential candidates are awaiting Department of Justice preclearance of the county's proposed redistricting plan. According to Democratic Party chairman Al Fields, "there is no telling when" word will finally be received from Washington.

The Jan. 10 deadline is expected to allow preclearance of pending redistricting submissions in most Texas counties.

Candidates who had filed with Fields for a place on the ballot as of Tuesday morning included: Pct. 1 commissioner - Leo Cervantez, Tom Bingham, Bill Harris, Alfredo Tobar, David Perez, Jess Marley and Frank Tambunga.

In the Pct. 3 race are C.E. Light and Freddie Nicks.

Martha Gries has filed a letter of intent with Judge Kathryn Mayfield to run as an independent candidate on the November ballot in the general election.

Incumbent Raymond Borrego has filed for the constable race as has Ray Shelton.

Incumbent Jim Wilson has filed for re-election as sheriff. J. P. Allen

has also filed in the sheriff's race.

Unless notification is received of another extension, filing deadline for

the primary is Jan. 10. The March primary may be extended to April 11 in Texas.

## Methodist celebrate centennial

Ozona United Methodist Church will celebrate its official founding date on Jan. 30, 1991; however, each Sunday during January will have special activities leading up to the big day. Each church member has been involved in some way toward this important event.

The building itself has undergone many renovations during the past few months. The church youth will contribute their talents. The young children will sing during Sunday morning worship services on Jan. 5 and 26. The junior and senior high classes will conduct the worship service on Jan. 19. On Sunday, Jan. 26, 42 persons who have been members of the church 50 or more years will be honored in a special ceremony during morning worship. Following a church dinner in the fellowship hall, each member will receive two special books. The first will contain the church history, including vignettes and memoirs of some of the members. The second book will be a pictorial directory of current membership. Thursday, Jan. 30, the Official Centennial Day, a tea will be held

at 4 p.m. in the fellowship hall to welcome all visitors. Various types of church memorabilia will be on display at this time. A special worship service will be held at 7 p.m. with the message delivered by Bishop Eugene Slater. Bishop Slater was the pastor for Ozona in 1936; he now lives in Dallas. A reception will follow the service.

The Ozona Methodist Church was organized Jan. 30, 1892, by the Rev. J. J. Rape with nine members. The first church building, constructed in 1906, served the congregation well for a quarter century. Following World War

## Hunting accident fatal to East Texan

Deborah Taylor of Rockwall died Jan. 3 following a hunting accident south of Ozona. The 37-year-old woman was shot in the chest by a 7mm Magnum rifle according to Sheriff Jim Wilson.

The rifle, held by a family friend, is believed to have gone off accidentally, Wilson said. Mrs. Taylor, her husband, daughter and a friend had arrived just a short time before the accident at the hunting lease they shared with friends on the Bill Clegg Ranch. The men were loading a vehicle to go hunting when one opened a case and took out a rifle to show Mrs. Taylor.

Mrs. Taylor was brought to Crockett County Hospital where she was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne.

"At this point there is no reason to believe it was anything but an accident," Sheriff Wilson said. The body was sent to San Antonio for an autopsy, and medical examiner's findings received Monday at Wilson's office were consistent with statements given by witnesses, he said.

Results of the investigation will be presented to the grand jury as required by law.

## Ramirez continues to improve after accident

Gregorio Ramirez continues to improve from injuries received in a car/pedestrian accident Jan. 1. The 49-year-old man received a broken collarbone and pelvic bone when he was struck by a car about 6:40 p.m. while crossing the street in front of Elma's Roadside Grocery on Hwy. 163. Ramirez was thrown over the top of the car.

Ramirez will remain in Angelo Community Hospital for about four weeks according to his daughter, Matilda Onofre.

The 45th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Premium Sale will be held Jan. 9-11 at the County Show Barn. There will be 78 4-H members exhibiting some 237 market lambs, 42 commercial ewe lambs, 32 Angora goats, five steers and 82 rabbits.

Judging begins Thursday, Jan. 9, at 5:30 p.m. with the rabbit show. Friday the judging begins at 5:30 p.m. with the steer show, followed by the first year feeder show at 6 p.m. Commercial ewe lambs will be judged at 7:15 p.m. with the Angora goat show beginning at 8:15 p.m. On Saturday, Jan. 11, the market lamb show begins at 8 a.m.

A barbecue lunch will be served at noon by the 4-H Parents and Leaders

Association. The meal will cost \$4.50 and take-out plates will be available. The concession stand will be open on Thursday and Friday nights, starting at 5 p.m., and will be open all day Saturday, beginning at 7:30 a.m.

Presentation of awards begins at 1:30 p.m. Saturday followed by a drawing for a color TV and the premium sale.

Dr. Carl Menzies of San Angelo will judge the market lambs, commercial ewe lambs, Angora goats, steers, and showmanship. Matt Keivil of Weatherford will judge rabbits and showmanship.

"Everyone is encouraged to come out to see some great Crockett County youth and livestock," said County Agent Billy Reagor.

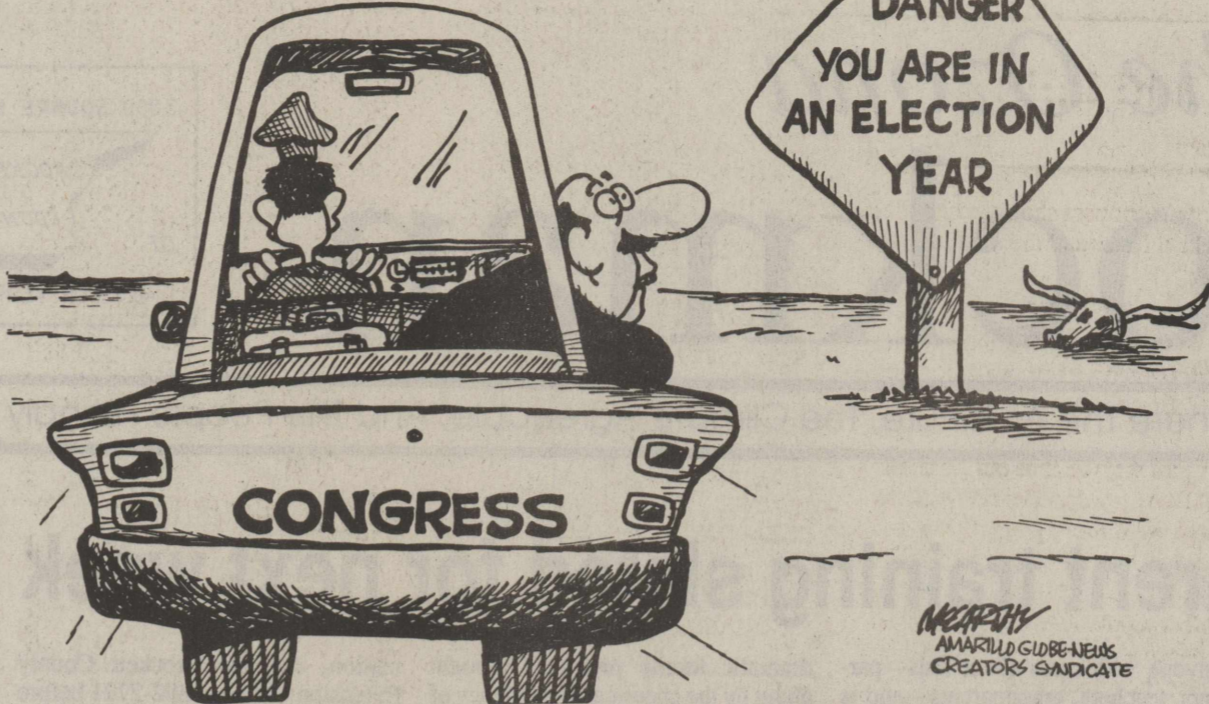

I, it was felt that a new building was needed. A building site adjacent to the county courthouse was purchased, and building was completed in 1926. A disastrous fire on March 8, 1942, left little more than the outer walls of this building standing. Because of World War II, rebuilding at this time was difficult, and the property was sold to the county and rebuilt as a hospital. Today this building serves as an annex to the county courthouse.

The cornerstone of the present church building was laid on Oct. 20, 1948. The building was completed on May 27, 1949. An adult Sunday School wing and chapel were added in 1970. Recent renovations include installation of new heating and cooling systems and carpeting.

The Ozona church has been served by many able ministers over the years and is presently under the pastorate of Dr. Tim Brewer. Sunday School classes for all ages are held each Sunday at 9:45 a.m. Worship services are held at 11 a.m. Junior and senior high youth meet on Sunday evenings for special programs. The United Methodist Women meet monthly for inspirational programs

and to plan church projects.

The Ozona Community Center has been a vital part of the community for 53 years. Ozona United Methodist Church is a major sponsor and contributor to the community centers, with the help of many organizations and businesses in Ozona.

The Ozona United Methodist Church invites everyone to join in celebrating the centennial of the founding, and looks forward to being a part of the spiritual growth of the Ozona community for another 100 years.

## C.C. Hospital to sponsor breast cancer detection unit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the regional breast care center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically

reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art X-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the

cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not

diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Monday, Jan. 20.

The mobile unit will be parked at Crockett county Hospital, Ave. H & 1st, Ozona. Appointments may be made by calling 392-2671.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Linda and Scotty:

I am writing to make readers aware of the tragedy that is about to happen to breast cancer patients and those who might someday be breast cancer patients—which today includes one woman in nine.

Spurred by a few self-styled "consumer advocates", the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is apparently planning to ban the use of breast implants in the U.S. After January of 1992, breast implants may no longer be available.

Thirty years ago I had silicone breast implants—THE FIRST IN THE WORLD. The surgery did wonders to my deflated ego. I gained confidence in myself which enabled me to seek employment and become self-reliant enough to support my six children and provide a home for them. For thirty years I have had no problems relating to my breast implants and have had no regrets.

Every year more than 35,000 women in the U.S. seek breast reconstruction after mastectomies using breast implants. If implants are banned these women will mostly have nowhere to turn but the old fashion prosthesis or the perils of surgery in a

foreign country. They will be denied the safe use of this proven medical device—and the restored bodily wholeness and well-being it provides.

All the scientific studies show that the implants are safe. I would hope by going public that more women who have had no problems would read this and be encouraged to write the FDA.

Let every woman make her own decision. But don't let the FDA choose for every woman. Breast cancer patients need to have this option. I appeal to my fellow readers to stop this ban before the FDA denies a woman the right to make her own informed decision. 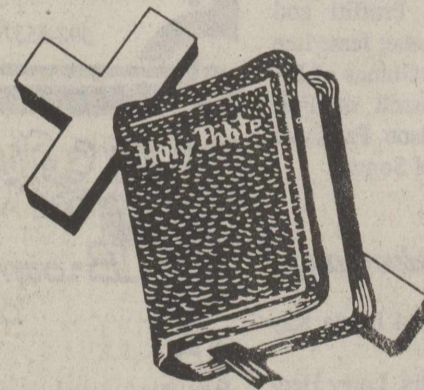

air and water. Snacks, drinks and clean restrooms are also provided for the weary traveler and local clientele. Business hours will be from 7 a.m. until 11 p.m. seven days a week.

## Old tires a new Texas industry

How many people have come across a couple of old tires when cleaning out their garages or storerooms? Plenty, I'll bet. The tires may have some tread left, but you know you'll never use them again. The garbage pickup people won't take them in most cities. A call to a tire dealer tells you it costs him 50 cents apiece to dispose of old tires and soon the cost will go up.

Landfills charge \$1.50 plus per tire to take them to be cut up and buried. They have to be cut up; otherwise they work their way to the surface.

Disposing of old tires is one of the most exasperating environmental problems we face in Texas and elsewhere. Millions of discarded tires clog our landfills and overflow into vacant lots and roadsides. Many are dumped illegally on state lands.

Americans produce one waste tire each year for every man, woman and child in the United States — 260 million tires.

It's in everybody's interest that we solve this problem, and solutions are in the works. I recently attended a demonstration of a process that recycles used tires into valuable components, including oil, steel, carbon black and methane. The machine,

owned by Tire Recycling technologies of Albuquerque and invented by Floyd Wallace of Michigan, uses a low-heat catalytic process to vaporize tire chips.

In one day, a full-scale machine can process 100 tons of tire chips (about 10,000 tires) to produce 300 barrels of oil, 8-10 tons of steel, 20-25 tons of carbon black and 200,000 cubic feet of methane gas, some of which is used to fuel the machine, the remainder to be sold to a gas utility. When you consider that the machine can produce 300 barrels of oil a day and oil is selling at \$20 a barrel, that's more than \$6,000 a day tied up in old tires. All that oil locked up in 3 billion tires amounts to a staggering 90 million barrels valued at \$1.8 billion. The machine is one heck of an oil well.

The omnibus recycling bill passed by the 72nd Legislature will help turn those lurking health hazards into a new Texas industry. The Law provides that businesses that can recycle tires or otherwise deal with them in a way that does not degrade the environment are entitled to 85 cents a tire. The State Health Department will provide oversight. The money comes from a \$2 per new tire fee. That's only fair. Tires mean mobility which this society must have. Worn out and stacked in unsightly piles, they become fire

hazards or breeding grounds for mosquitos and other pests. Proper disposal must be considered a part of the true cost of the tires. Now we have the means to recycle the tires and create economic growth. That's good news in anybody's book.

## West Texas Utilities to increase kilowatt hour rate to collect state tax set by legislature

Customers of West Texas Utilities may notice two new items on their electric bill beginning in January. Both result from changes required by state officials and affect every investor-owned utility in Texas. "One item will not cost customers any more money but the second item will slightly increase bills" according to Robert Bryson, WTU's area manager.

The first item involves the customer charge which has been part of the electric bill for several years. By order of the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas it now must be listed as a separate item. The charge includes basic costs such as reading meters and processing the bills. It does not change each month and is currently set at \$6.50 for residential customers. The customer charge has not increased and this change does not affect the amount of a customer's bill.

The second new item involves the tax increase bill passed by the Texas Legislature in 1991. The PUC recently decided how utilities should collect the new state tax. The tax will be collected for each kilowatt hour a customer uses. The total tax for a month will be listed as a separate item on the bill.

A typical WTU residential customer who uses 600 kilowatt hours will see about a 30 cent increase on their monthly electric bill as a result of the new tax. The factors used to collect the tax will vary according to the type of customer. For example the amount of tax a commercial and a residential customer pays will be different.

These recent actions cap off a year of activity involving the PUC and WTU. Most of the activity was initiated by WTU and centered around

reducing customer's bills or stimulating the West Texas economy.

In June and October customers received good news from the company in the form of reduced fuel factors and a fuel credit. These reductions were a direct result of the company's efforts to reduce fuel costs.

In December the company filed a request to offer three new services designed to attract new business and help existing businesses. The three new services were in the form of tariffs or rates which cover economic development, interruptible service and curtailable service. If approved by the PUC, these services would strengthen efforts to maintain a viable West Texas economy.

WTU serves almost half a million people in a 52,000 square mile area that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

## Early notice on retirement now more important

People who plan to retire in 1992 may want to call about their plans soon. A 1991 change in the Social Security law that may limit the start of benefits to the month the person actually retires will make it more important than in previous years to notify Social Security of plans to retire.

Depending on their earnings, some people may still be able to get additional benefits by applying for Social Security early in the year, even though

they won't be retiring until later in the year.

If Social Security is contacted early in the year, your current earnings and benefit information can help you choose the most advantageous time to start your benefits.

In choosing the best retirement date, some things you should consider are your age (the earliest you can start collecting Social Security retirement

benefits is the month you turn age 62), expected earnings for the year, estimated benefits, and whether family members will also receive benefits. How these factors will affect your benefits can then be discussed with you.

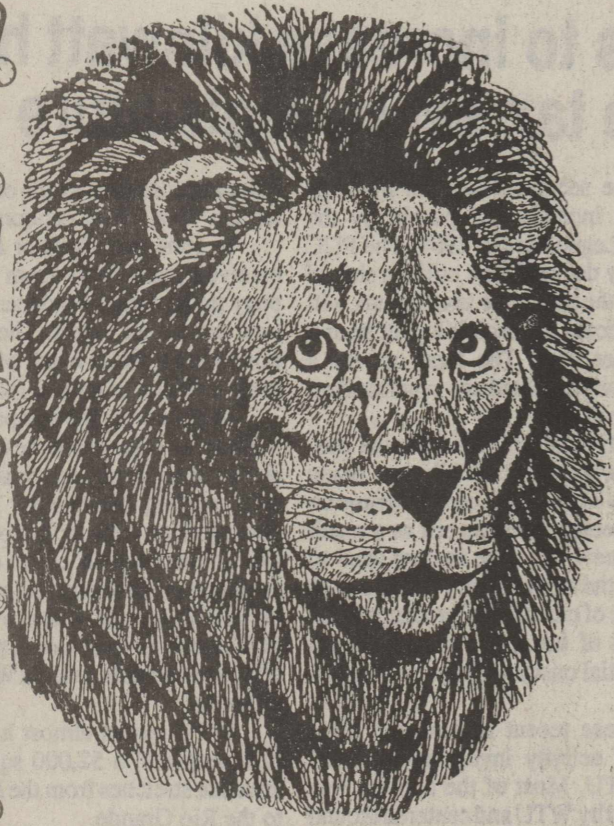

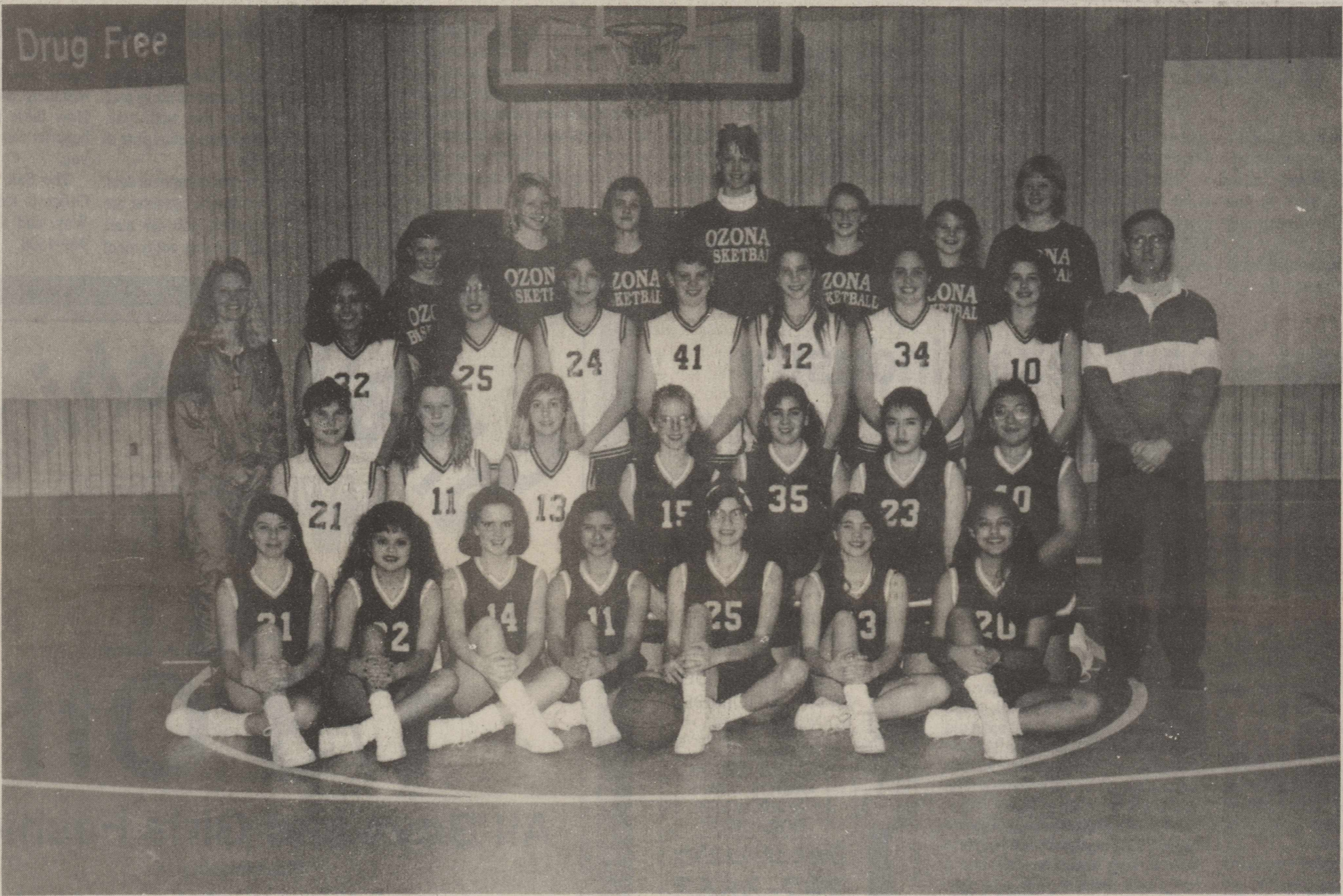

## Medical update .... chlamydia pneumonia

Chances are that neither you nor your doctor has ever heard of chlamydia pneumonia. Chances are good that you have both been infected with it at some time.

Unrelated to the sexually transmitted strain, this recently identified organism is one of the top five causes of infectious pneumonia worldwide, said Dr. B. Rusty Lang, a research associate in microbiology and immunology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Our awareness of the diseases it causes is growing daily," Lang said. "Many physicians have not heard about it, so many patients do not get the correct diagnosis or treatment."

The bacterium is highly infectious and difficult to isolate in the laboratory. The techniques to culture and identify it were only developed in the past couple of years and are not widely available, he said.

The initial symptoms of chlamydia pneumonia infection, such as a sore throat, coughing and chest congestion, are the same as those of a number of other respiratory infections. It can lead to a flu-like infection or "walking" pneumonia, Lang said. Some people may have no symptoms at all, but children and health-impaired adults can develop life-threatening pneumonia.

"Penicillin will not help," Lang said. "Patients need a high dose of tetracycline or erythromycin for at least two weeks. Even then, incomplete cures and relapses are common."

Researchers have identified links

between chlamydia pneumonia infection and other respiratory illnesses, such as bronchial asthma, Lang said.

"We could be seeing just the tip of the iceberg," he said. "We may discover ties between this organism and illnesses for which no known cause has been previously identified."

Minor epidemics of chlamydia pneumonia infection were seen in Europe and other areas of the world. The bacterium was initially known as the Taiwan Acute Respiratory strain (TWAR).

"Researchers in Europe originally thought the pneumonia they were seeing was related to a chlamydia strain found in birds and transmissible to humans," Lang said. "They eventually discovered that this was a completely new species found only in humans. In Scandinavia, researchers initially identified pneumonia cases that were caused by chlamydia pneumonia during tuberculosis screenings."

Until the techniques for blood testing and tissue culture of chlamydia pneumonia become available outside research laboratories, physicians and other health-care providers will have to rely on their clinical skills to diagnose the infection and treat patients, Lang said.

"Doctors need to be aware that chlamydia pneumonia is one of the most frequent causes of atypical pneumonia and other respiratory infections," Lang said. "That awareness will aid in proper diagnosis and treatment."

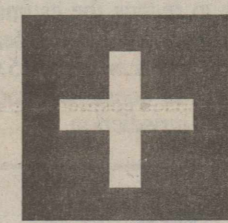

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

AUSTIN—Senator Bill Sims, D-San Angelo, now stands third in the line of succession to the governorship of Texas as a result of his election as President Pro Tempore of the Senate on the opening day of the third called special session of the Texas Legislature which convened Jan. 2.

In making the nomination of Senator Sims to the position, Senator Chet Brooks, Dean of the Texas Senate, hailed Sims as a person of great integrity who truly represented the views of the people in his district.

Sims has represented District 25 in the Senate since 1983. The district is the largest in area of any in the state and includes 38 counties, including parts of El Paso and Bexar Counties.

As president Pro Tempore, Sims will preside over the Senate in the absence of Lt. Governor Bob Bullock. Also on those occasions when Governor Ann Richards and Lt. Governor Bullock are out of state at

the same time, Senator Sims will serve as the State's chief executive during their absence. Tradition is that the state's leaders provide at least one opportunity for the President pro Tempore to serve as Governor during which the residents of District 25 will be invited to attend a special celebration at the State Capitol.

Senator John Montford of Lubbock administered the oath of office during the opening session of the Senate. In taking the oath of office, Senator Sims expressed his gratitude to his Senate colleagues for the signal honor and voiced his pride in having the privilege of representing the people in District 25.

The agenda for the Special Session set by Governor Richards is that of drawing new boundaries for Senate and House of Representative districts. General expectations are that the session will be concluded within 10 days unless new items are added to the agenda.

Our public buildings will be comfortable and will answer all purposes until we can do better.

owe a cent. This is certainly an inducement to home seekers who wish to make for themselves a home among people who are free from debt with light taxes, they are bound to be prosperous.

Our public school will commence about October 19, is we can get a teacher by that time as the trustees have not yet employed a teacher. Applications will be received from teachers desiring the school for the next twenty days.

They say none but holders of first grade certificates need apply.

### Micro-Dome food preserver recalled

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) in cooperation with Micro-Dome of San Ramon, CA, recently warned consumers of certain safety hazards associated with the use of the "Micro-Dome Food Preserver" manufactured by Micro-Dome and sold and distributed to consumers after Aug. 1987.

The CPSC urges consumers to destroy all food that has been preserved using a Micro-Dome Food Preserver, and to call 1-800-736-2330 for instructions on how to receive a \$50.00 rebate for returning the food preserver.

The Micro-Dome Food Preserver is used in microwave ovens to preserve fruits, vegetables and prepared dishes. The appliance is a plastic container that can process one standard metal lidded canning jar at a time. Generally priced at \$50.00, approximately 18,600 units were sold to consumers.

Micro-Dome informed the Commission that the top of the plastic container may blow off in the microwave if the vent stem or safety release becomes plugged. The pressurized plastic container may also explode during or after removal from the microwave, or if the container is hit or dropped. Furthermore, the plastic container may also crack and/or develop lines (called crazing) that could increase the risk of explosion. Explosion of a pressurized Micro-Dome containing hot water and food could cause severe injuries such as blindness and burns from flying fragments and liquids.

Micro-Dome reported 29 incidents involving the cracking and/or crazing of the plastic container, eight incidents of the top blowing off, and four incidents of the vent being plugged without the blow plug releasing. One injury was reported involving a user who sustained burns when the top of the container blew off. The CPSC recommends that consumer not use the Micro-Dome Food Preserver. It should be returned to Micro-Dome for the rebate or destroyed and disposed of in such a manner that it cannot be used in the future.

CPSC is also concerned about possible food poisoning in certain foods prepared using the Micro-Dome Microwave Food Preserver. While CPSC is unaware of any incidents of food poisoning, it is concerned that the product and its accompanying recipe and instruction booklet do not adequately ensure the safety of certain canned foods. In addition to possibly failing to kill bacteria while the food in the Micro-Dome is cooked in a microwave oven, food also can be contaminated after cooking. Eating improperly preserved food can cause serious illness such as botulism. The toxin which causes botulism is the

most potent natural poison in the world. Even one taste could be fatal.

The Food Safety and Inspection Service of the U.S. department of agriculture (USDA) has warned that the Micro-Dome needs more extensive testing. There are some problems. According to University of California researchers the micro-Dome canning process was not successful. Bacteria survived. Micro-Dome denies there is a food poisoning problem.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety commission is announcing this warning as part of its mission to protect the public from unreasonable risks of injury and death associated with consumer products. The commission's objective is to reduce the estimated 28.5 million injuries and 21,600 deaths associated each year with the 15,000 different types of consumer product under CPSC's jurisdiction.



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### Does quitting smoking send weight control up in smoke?

Afraid to quit smoking for fear you will gain weight? It's a legitimate fear. Many surveys find people who quit smoking do put on some extra pounds. But it's also a problem that can be minimized.

One reason for weight gain is that many ex-smokers substitute eating for smoking. That's often the case if smoking helped ease boredom or stress. Try substituting something harmless and low calorie. Sugarless gum or sugarless hard candies can be good choices.

Or look for activities that can help relieve that boredom or stress, or at least occupy yourself with something besides eating when the urge to smoke strikes. Creative crafts, home repairs, letter-writing, even working crossword puzzles may help.

Also be aware that your urge to snack may just be a reaction to the lack of cigarettes, not a real indication of hunger. That snack urge will often disappear if you just wait a few minutes, rather than reaching for some food as soon as it hits.

If you find yourself eating more at meals because of giving up your former after-meal smoke, work on eating more slowly. Try sipping water frequently through meals to help you. Get up from the table immediately after meals.

Actually, weight gain after smoking cessation is not only due to increased eating. Researchers say several hormones that influence body weight and fat storage might be affected by smoking.

One step that may help counteract the metabolic effects of smoking cessation is exercise. Establish a habit of moderate aerobic exercise such as walking, biking or swimming at least four days each week for at least 20 minutes. In addition to helping fight the physical effects of stopping smoking, exercise may also help you work off some of the stress that makes you want to smoke.

And make sure you eat three regular meals each day. Meal-skipping tends to slow down your metabolism, making it harder to maintain your weight.

Dietary guidelines from the Ameri-

can Institute for Cancer Research form an excellent basis for healthy eating that can also help you fight weight gain. Avoid too much fat in your diet. At each meal, eat plenty of grain products, as well as fruits and vegetables; most Americans eat too few of these, and surveys often find that smokers tend to eat even less than non-smokers.

If you happen to gain weight as you quit smoking, don't go back to smoking. Experts say there is no question that smoking poses far more danger to your risk of cancer, heart disease and many other health problems than do a few extra pounds. And if you patiently persist with the above recommendations, even those pounds may come off. So go ahead, quit the habit!

**Q:** I love pizza. Must I give up to follow a low-fat diet?

**A:** All pizzas are not created equal. Whether you eat out, take-out, or make your own at home, several steps can make pizza a reasonable part of nutritious eating.

The best way to limit your pizza's fat content is to skip the double cheese and high-fat meats such as pepperoni and sausage.

If you're making the pizza at home, reduce fat content by using a lowfat cheese, such as part-skim mozzarella. For variety, feta or reduced-fat versions of cheddar or Swiss can be fun.

For the healthiest and lowest fat pizza, load up on vegetables. Order extra vegetables on your pizza, or order a plain cheese pizza and add lots of vegetables at home. You don't have to limit yourself to the traditional peppers, onions, and mushrooms. Broccoli, sliced tomatoes, and zucchini are all great!

Limit the number of slices of pizza you eat. For most sedentary adults, two standard slices is reasonable; more active people may need and want three slices. If these amounts are not enough to fill you, add some low-fat food to round out the meal: breadsticks, salad with lowfat dressing, and fresh fruit for dessert can all work well.

With nutritious toppings and sensible portions, pizza can easily be part of a healthy diet.

Week of July 18, 1891

J.W. Henderson has purchased the ranch of Porter Kimble one mile above town. We have not learned as yet where Mr. Kimble will move to.

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## Beecher Montgomery honored at Orange Bowl

Beecher Montgomery and 17 fellow teammates were honored last week at the Orange Bowl game in Miami. Montgomery was a member of the TCU team which met the University of Georgia in the Orange Bowl in 1942. Twelve Georgia players were present for the ceremony.

These players were introduced on the field before the game and at a Coaches and Hall of Honor luncheon on Dec. 30, 1991 inductees into the Hall of Honor were also recognized at the luncheon.

Selected for inclusion this year were Frank Broyles, Charlie Pittman and J. C. Watts. Broyles is the Georgia

Tech quarterback who threw for a record 304 yards in 1945. Pittman's all-around offensive play led the Nittany Lions to a pair of Orange Bowl wins in 1969 and 1970. Watts quarterbacked Oklahoma to wins in 1980 and 1981.

This is the fourth year the Orange Bowl committee has invited teams who played there 50 years ago to return for the bowl game and festivities.

Most TCU players went into service immediately after their game. For a time it was uncertain if the game, which came 25 days after Pearl Harbor, would even be played.

Until eight years ago, Montgomery held the Orange Bowl record for

the longest punt return, 65 yards.

The former Georgia and TCU players and their wives were treated to a whirl of activities after their arrival in Florida. Their vantage point from the special guest section at the Orange Bowl Parade gave them an exciting view of the proceedings. Burt Reynolds and Loni Anderson hosted the parade with Joe DiMaggio serving as grand marshal. Special entertainment was provided by the 5th Dimension and 18 bands from all over the nation.

Dorothy and Beecher joined others from the TCU group for a tour of Miami and Miami Beach, a trip to Parrot Jungle and luncheon at the home of Federal Judge and Mrs. Peter Fay.

## Railroad sale keeps line in West Texas

Railroad service along a 349-mile route from near Coleman to Presidio will continue for at least two years as a result of the purchase of the line by an 11-county rail district which includes Crockett County. Approximately one-half mile of the line purchased from Santa Fe for \$5.5 million runs through Crockett County.

Funding for the purchase came from the Texas Department of Transportation and a Dallas investment group called South Orient Railroad Company Limited. The TDT provided \$3 million with the investment group putting up \$2.5 million.

The sale agreement provides that the district will lease the line to South Orient Railroad Company which will contract with Kiamichi Railroad based in Hugo, OK to operate the line.

The investment group has an obligation to operate the line for two years,

but investors and district hope and expect the line to be operated a lot longer than that according to Robert Post, chairman of the district. The investment group has a 50-year lease with an option for an additional 50 years.

Should the line or portions of it be scrapped or sold, the state would receive its money back first and then the investors would have the right to take other monies out after that.

Santa Fe announced plans to get rid of the line in 1990. After Santa Fe announced plans in November of that year to sell the line to a company with connections to a railroad scrapping firm, West Texas efforts to purchase the line began. The first orders toward creating the rail district were signed by Tom Green County commissioners in December of 1990, and other counties along the line soon followed suit.

## Harris chairs Texas State ASC Committee for 7th year

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm stated, "these leaders bring a wealth of farming and ranching experience to ASCS. Jerry Harris has established an impressive record, combining years of experience as both a family farmer and a federal program administrator. Hope Huffman, Dale Hunt, and D. V. Guerra all have done splendid work on behalf of Texas farmers and ranchers."

Jerry D. Harris is a member of the National Cotton Council, the Lamesa Cotton Growers, the Texas Food and Fiber Protein Commission, and the Texas Cotton Ginners. He is active in cotton ginning, warehousing, and marketing, as well as operating a 7,000-acre family farm and serving on the Board of Trustees of Lubbock Chris-

tian University. Scott McGarraugh operates 11,000 acres spread over Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Gray, and Roberts counties in Texas as well as Texas and Beaver counties in Oklahoma. He is active in the Texas Wheat Producers Association, the Texas Wheat Producers Board, and the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Hope Huffman raises row crops, grain, and cattle in McLennan and Coryell counties. She is an active member in the McLennan County Farm Bureau and the Waco Chamber of Commerce's Agricultural Committee.

Dale Hunt is a recognized leader in the rice industry and has served as president of the Texas Rice Research Foundation.

D. V. Guerra is active in soil and water conservation. He served on the Governor's Task Force on Rural Development and was named "Man of the Year in Agriculture" by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

The State ASC Committee oversees farm program activities of the ASCS throughout Texas. ASCS employs a staff of 1,400 in Texas and supervises the distribution of more than \$1.5 billion in federal farm program benefits to the farmers and ranchers of Texas.

## Knowledge is key to aids diagnosis

A 1989 survey revealed that most Texans don't know the symptoms of AIDS - and with good reason, says the Texas Medical Association.

The symptoms of acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) vary with the individual and can be confused with everything from flu and tuberculosis to the Friday afternoon droops. Stated simply, the body begins to lose its ability to respond to infections.

Richard Grimes, PhD, principal investigator of AIDS regional education and training centers for Texas and Oklahoma, lists the following complaints that should begin to raise one's suspicions:

- diarrhea, occurring several times a day and lasting longer than a month, especially if accompanied by unintended weight loss of more than 10 percent;

- unusual sores or lesions inside the mouth or a white coating on the tongue;
- night sweats;
- unexplained fever lasting more than a week;

- confusion or slowing of mental functions;

- loss of feeling in the feet, legs, or hands, especially great pain in the legs;
- difficulty in breathing; or
- constant fatigue or general malaise

The symptoms may be different in men and women, with women possibly having pelvic infections. Suspicions should increase if one has a previous history of sexually transmitted disease, has had sex since 1977

with multiple partners or high-risk partners, has been an intravenous drug user, or has had a blood transfusion since 1977.

The only way someone can find out whether they've been infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is to get tested. However, said Dr. Grimes, the test will not pick up infection that has been contracted within six months.

One who tests positive may not develop AIDS, but that person's high risk behavior and suspicious symptoms may eventually lead to a diagnosis of AIDS.

"Early diagnosis is useful," said Dr. Grimes, "because treatments are available to preserve the immune system and prolong life - even a fairly high quality of life."
