

Town & Country buys Thornton's Supermarket

Thornton's Thriftway became T&C Village Market Jan. 5, increasing the number of T&C supermarkets to nine. T&C Village Markets are a division of Town & Country Foodstores. The San Angelo based chain owns 136 convenience stores in addition to the supermarkets.

Town & Country stores are located in communities with populations ranging from 600 to 4,000, said Ray Bishop, director of the supermarket division. The company has been in business for 26 years.

"We've looked forward to coming to the Ozona market for a number of years," Bishop said. "We plan to continue the same fine service offered by Thornton's."

Bishop is a member of the board of directors of Affiliated Food Stores, Inc. of Keller, primary supplier of the Ozona T&C, and chairman of Affiliated's retail support committee. He is executive director and a member of the board of West Texas Food Industry Association.

Linda Sherek, a 16-year employee of the store, continues as manager. Ozona's T&C has 20 employees.

Store hours have expanded to 7 a.m.-8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Sunday.

In the near future the store will undergo minor remodeling and upgrading, Bishop said. T&C will continue to sell cooked meats. "We also intend to continue the garden department."

Thornton's had its beginning in 1973 when Bill Thornton and his father-in-law, Jack Rotan, bought the store from Jack Ferguson. The business moved from its downtown location to a new building at 305 Ave. E 13 years ago.


Kirby appointed to fill Pct. 3 commissioner

Dick Kirby retired from the post of county auditor Sept. 1, 1988, after 33 years.

Hospital board elects officers

Local organizations pledge \$15,000 for ambulance building

Martha Gries was elected president of the Crockett County Hospital board when they met in regular session Thursday, Jan. 9. Other officers elected were Jack Baggett, vice president and Diane Schwertner, secretary.

The Ozona Lions Club has pledged \$5000 toward construction of a building to house the ambulances. John L. Henderson stated that the Deerfest Association will pledge \$10,000. Mr. Henderson presented a sketch of the proposed 50'X50' southern facing facility. The board voted to accept the pledges. Brief discussion was held regarding the remainder of funds required. Maintenance of the facility would be taken out of the 1992 budget. According to Mr. Henderson the facility has long been needed to protect the ambulances and the newly purchased ambulance. A meeting room for the EMT's also has been proposed.

Bob Denson, hospital administrator, reported that the hospital and care center were overbudget for the month of December \$23,999. The facilities were overbudget for the year \$110,779. Because of discrepancies between the reports of Sandy Stokes, county auditor and the hospital, it was suggested that more frequent audits be made. President Martha Gries stated that the 1991 budget was unrealistic;

the 1992 budget is more in line with what it should be.

Discussion was held regarding the manner of reimbursement of meals for EMTs. The decision was made not to use the proposed vouchers but use tickets signed and turned in to Mr.

Denson. A vote was passed by the board that they meet a second time each month to review the tickets before passing them on to the commissioners for payment.

Countywide personnel policy approved

Commissioners approved a countywide personnel policy Monday, retroactive to Jan. 1. The policy, which has been in the works for months, was completed and approved with the addition of a policy Monday for personal time off and extended illness.

The additions, previously presented to the court by Bob Denson and reviewed by Denson again on Monday, are designed to put all employees under equal benefits.

Under the plan, employees who have worked 0-5 years will earn 23 paid days off per year. This will include time for vacation, sick leave, holidays, bereavement and personal business days.

Individuals are not automatically paid for holidays. Under this plan, they have to earn time off by working. For every 80 hour pay period worked, they earn 7.08 hours of personal time

off. At the same time, they are earning 2.77 hours to be credited to an "extended illness bank". This EIB earned time is used when employees have long term illnesses. Before the extended illness bank time is used, employees must use 40 hours of personal time off.

Employees who do not use sick time will accrue the extended illness bank time up to 480 hours. At that

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

San Antonio	Capitol, Medical Center

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

Certification requires a minimum of a bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited college or university and a passing score on the national home economics examination. Ulmer must complete 75 Professional Development Units (PDU's) every three years to remain certified.

The American Home Economics Association, which serves as an advocate for home economists and represents the field to external constituencies, was founded in 1909. As one of the oldest professional organizations in the United States, the association has spearheaded the certification effort to: affirm the knowledge-base of individuals practicing in the field of home economics; provide assurance to consumers that Certified Home Economists are well prepared for professional practice; foster more

uniform standards of good practice in home economics; encourage increased continuing education within the profession; assist employers in recruitment and selection of home economists; and enhance professionalism within the field of home economics through increasing accountability to other professionals and the public.

Dear Mr. Deaton,

It was my intention to attend the Commissioner's Court meeting on Monday, January 13th but a doctor's appointment was changed from 3:00 P.M. to 8:45 A.M. This change precludes my attending the meeting.

Since we residents of Precinct 3 are unrepresented at Commissioner's Court I am asking that you represent me in this case as well as your constituents (indeed Crockett County in its entirety). I must protest the inactivity of the court as relates to the assessment of monies to pay for the installation of the 911 emergency service which has twice been voted

down by the commissioners-unanimously, I believe.

At fifty cents per phone number approximately \$2000.00 per month is being charged to the citizens of Crockett County for no service received. I believe that late in the 18th century, there was a tea party hosted in Boston for similar activities.

I spoke to Mr. Jim House about this while he was still a commissioner. He responded that "nothing can be done." In November I spoke to the Commissioner's Court at open meeting and was advised by Judge Mayfield that "we're looking into it." I have just paid my phone bill through January 22nd and the charge is still being assessed.

May I suggest that the court may wish to bring suit against whatever authority is assessing this unjust charge? The alternative is, of course, that the Crockett County Commissioner's Court may incur an unnecessary expense defending themselves against such a suit.

I have no objection if you wish to read this letter to the court. My only purpose is to generate some positive action to stop the 911 service fee assessment.

One year ago it happened to me. I was told I had cancer in both breasts. My symptoms were unusual in that I was experiencing pain in the breast area. (Yes. Cancer can hurt.) Evidently anxiety over the pain caused a difficulty in breathing. These symptoms and a slight irregularity in an EKG were enough to send me to San Angelo for a heart catheterization.

My heart and lungs were perfect. I was dismissed even though I told the attending doctor that I was still experiencing the same pain I had felt on admission. Terribly frustrated I came home. I complained enough that my daughter, an RN in a hospital known for its diagnostic work, asked me to come there and be checked out. I do not like to think of what may have happened if I had not gone to that hospital. (If one person won't listen when you are in pain, see another. Don't give up. It is your body.)

A less than five minute breast exam revealed the much feared "lump". (Yes. I did routine breast exams, but fibrocystic breasts often "hide" lumps...lumps that a mammogram will pick up!) Mammograms showed lumps in both breasts. (Yes. I should have had a mammogram last year. But I had missed only one!) A lot can happen in one's body in that time.

Things moved fast. A frozen tissue biopsy revealed that the lump was cancerous. Three days later I had a double mastectomy. What had been so much a part of me was stripped away in a matter of hours. I felt naked. I was told by the oncologist that three of 22 lymph nodes were affected. (It could have been much worse had I not persisted in getting help.) Although I was given the "choice" of taking six-months of chemotherapy, it was strongly recommended that I do so.

Three weeks later chemotherapy was underway. My hair was gone and I was now wearing a wig or a scarf. I had been told that some tolerate chemo well enough to be able to keep working. I would have loved to have been one of those people. Words cannot describe the waves of nausea I felt

following each treatment. A friend who had taken the treatment for a year described it as "little worms crawling through your body". That was a close description for my experience.

I quit my job. No one can hold a job open for six months. And always there was the spectre of "what ifs" and "what next" around each corner.

My veins could not accommodate the chemo. A port was placed in the vein in my neck to make administration easier for me and for the oncologist nurse.

I have been told that I have "handled it all very well", and even that I was brave. No. I was not brave. We all just do what we have to do at that time. We have the resources to deal with more than we think we can when we must do so.

One year later I am one of the luckier ones. The chemo is behind me and I have a job once again. My hair has grown back and I am beginning to hope again. I am beginning to believe that I may be able to live a productive life. However, in the back of my mind I do wonder "why". What caused the cancer? Was it the artificial sweeteners I used for so many years? The yo-yo dieting? Radiation from many X-rays throughout the years? Lack of green vegetables and those with carotene in my diet? Having had only one child at

age 29? The air? The water? There are many theories but no one knows the answer at this time.

There are many "perhaps", but the fact is that I did have cancer and that my life and that of my family will never be the same. Hopefully the chemotherapy has prevented the spreading. Still with each checkup—with each bone scan—with, yes, each X-ray—there is the possibility that it might have returned. This time we will be looking for it. I pray it will not be there again.

ASCS urges filing for 1991 wool, mohair and unshorn lamb incentive

Ranchers are urged to come into the ASCS office and file for their 1991 wool, mohair, and unshorn lamb incentive. The deadline to file is Jan. 31, 1992. Persons signing will need to bring in head counts, shearing dates, grading charges, freight charges and any unshorn lamb purchases. Those who purchased unshorn lambs will need the sale sheet showing the number of head and weight of the lambs purchased.

Laurie Hale and Herb Schwertner of the Crockett County ASCS office want to remind producers of Payment limitation requirements for this year and deadlines for filing wool and mohair documents. Farm bill provisions require that person determination forms (CCC-502) or annual update, highly erodible and wetland certifications (AD-1026), and related forms be completed at the time a program application is made.

For 1991 incentive, the required AD-1026(s), and CCC-502 are now due for the county committee to review. Program payments cannot be made until required forms and determinations are complete.

National program deadlines for filing prior year sales documents was Dec. 31, 1991 for 1988 sales and March 2, 1992 for 1989, 1990, and 1991 sales. The final date to submit sales documents to the ASCS office for normal processing for 1991 is Jan. 31, 1992.

ACP - CONSERVATION SIGN UP

Under the continuing sign up provision for the annual program for conservation work, producers may apply for cost sharing at any time throughout the year. Practices available to county producers include bursh control, livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks, and cross fencing. Application may be made by coming to the ASCS office.

LONG TERM AGREEMENT

The county committee has established the LTA (long term agreement) sign-up for Jan. 15 through Jan. 31, 1992. If you are interested in long term conservation work on your ranch in the county, please contact the ASCS office and the Soil Conservation Service.

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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.
Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.
A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.
Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.
I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.
A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.
A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
The charge for the screening mammogram is \$60.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

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

point the excess time will be converted to personal time off.

Personal time off moves from 23 days to 28 for those employed six to 10 years and to 33 days per year beginning in the 11th year.

Under the personal time off plan it is up to individuals to budget their time. They must have the hours accumulated before they can use them, he explained. If a person chooses to use all the allotted personal time off and a "paid" holiday occurs later, that person will not get paid for the holiday.

This plan was in effect for four years while he was with a Cortez, CO, hospital and worked well according to Denson.

At the present time there are two aides caring for 42 residents. A third aide would give a higher level of care for the residents. The board voted to create this position.




