

Your support in this matter will be greatly appreciated.





# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company recently filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to redefine the location of the demarcation point, or demarc. The demarc is where Southwestern Bell Telephone wiring connects with customer-maintained wiring.

This request will not increase customers' service rates. This request simply changes the point within the wiring where Southwestern Bell's maintenance responsibility ends and the customer's maintenance responsibility begins. As before, customers will be able to connect their own wiring directly to Southwestern Bell's network at points up to the new demarc.

Southwestern Bell is seeking approval of this new demarc location to bring its tariff into compliance with a Federal Communications Commission Order in CC Docket 88-57.

# to ignore nursing home hit list

Officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) are advising the public to ignore a recently released list of 403 nursing homes which were characterized as having a history of non-compliance with quality of care standards.

"The list has been referred to as a 'hit list' or a list of 'bad homes.' This is just not true," Janice Caldwell, chief of TDH's Bureau of long Term Care, said. "It was the first stab at compiling a list to be used for TDH review and evaluation, but the list had not been reviewed for accuracy at the time of its release," she said.

"As a result, the list includes many reputable nursing facilities. Some of the facilities on this list had relatively small problems-long since corrected— and some actually had no problems at all," Caldwell added.

"We do not want families and friends of residents in these facilities to worry needlessly. They should visit the home or call us for a more complete report about the facility's record," Caldwell said.

The public may call 1-800-252-9106 to find out about any recent regulatory actions against a nursing home or to register a complaint about a nursing home.







# EMT update school to be Carr Scholarship applications being accepted at ASU

seniors and junior college students scheduled to graduate in 1992 are being ing (915)942-2103. accepted by Angelo State University for initial Carr Academic Scholarship awards for 1992-93.

Over 600 Carr Academic Scholarships will be awarded to high school and junior college students for 1992-93, ranging in value from \$1,000 to \$5,000. More than \$2 million will be available for Carr Academic Scholarships during 1992-93, bringing the total awards made in the program to \$17.5 million since the initiation of the program in 1981-82.

During the current year over 900 students from throughout Texas and the nation, as well as numerous foreign countries, are attending Angelo State University on Carr Academic Scholarships.

As a general rule, high school studenis must be in the top 15 percent of their class, have a high school average of 90 or above, and present a combined math and verbal score of 1000 or higher on the SAT or a composite score of 25 or higher on the Enhanced ACT Assessment.

Applicants enrolled in junior college must normally have a 3.4 or better grade point average on all college work attempted to be considered for a Carr Academic Scholarship.

Supported by a rapidly growing \$28.6 million trust established by the late Robert G. and Nona K. Carr of San Angelo, the undergraduate scholarships may be renewed annually by the University for students who maintain the required academic record.

During a four-year course of study at ASU, Carr Academic Scholarships can be worth from \$4,000 to \$20,000. Students receiving Carr Academic Scholarships may also apply for and receive any other scholarship or financial aid for which they qualify.

The priority deadline for submitting applications and all supporting materials is March 1, 1992, although completed applications from outstanding students will be considered up until June 1, 1992, to the extent that funds are still available.

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
