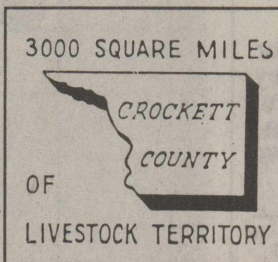
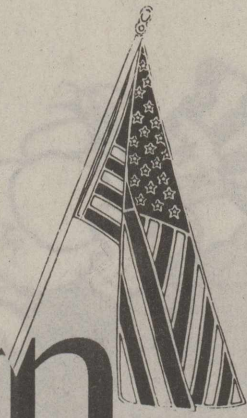


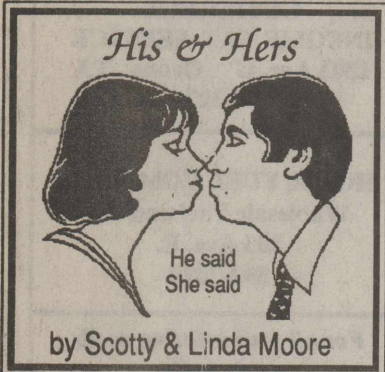

Have you ever wondered what happens when you vote early?

The question keeps coming up, what happens to my ballot when I vote early?

- (1) You fill out an application for ballot by personal appearance which consists of: your voter certificate number, precinct number, name and address.
- (2) You are then handed a ballot which has the county clerk's name on the back.
- (3) You are then directed to a voting booth and instructed to vote your ballot and place it in the proper ballot box.
- (4) You then exit the polling place.

The law provides for secrecy of casting your vote. No one will ever know how you voted. The ballot box has two locks on it. One set of keys goes to the sheriff, except that in a year which the sheriff is regularly on the ballot then the presiding judge shall deliver the keys to the county

judge. The second set of keys stays with the clerk for safekeeping. The ballot box is sealed at the end of each day. Each seal is serially numbered. This detects any unauthorized opening.

The county clerk does not count the votes. The ballots are delivered on Election Day, March 10, 1992, with both sets of keys to one of the following persons to be counted:

- (1) an early voting board, which consists of a presiding judge, alternate judge and one or more clerks.
 - (2) or the ballots can be delivered to a designated polling place on election day to be counted.
- The results of the early voting votes and the counted votes (which are locked) are then delivered by proper authority to the county clerk's office for storage.
- The law provides for several check and balances for early voting.

Accident injures four on Hwy. 163 south

Four Ozonans were slightly injured Monday in a 2:40 p.m. accident just south of Fierro Shell on Hwy. 163.

David Longoria, driver of a 1982 Chevrolet Camaro, reached down for a cassette and crossed the center stripe, he told officers.

Miss Veronica Vasquez, who was

southbound on 163, swerved to the left, then back to the right when she saw the car coming into her lane.

Her vehicle, a 1983 Oldsmobile Delta 88, and the Camaro collided left headlight to left headlight.

Longoria received a cut lip and broken teeth in the accident. His pas-

senger, Lonnie Martinez, complained of an injured left shoulder.

Miss Vasquez and her passenger, Robbie Rodriguez, both received minor head injuries according to investigating officers Jr. Bilano and Ben Macias, DPS troopers.

The injured were taken to Crockett County Hospital.

Dr. Owensby honored as Citizen of Year by C of C

Dr. Robert Owensby was lauded as the Outstanding Citizen of the Year last week at the 28th annual chamber of commerce awards banquet. The doctor was recognized along with Teacher of the Year Dena Porter, Outstanding Young Person Haley Carson, Organization of the Year Crockett County Historical Society and Unsung Heroes, the Ozona servicemen who served in Operation Desert Storm.

Robert Owensby was born to Dr. and Mrs. O. M. Owensby in Pittsburg, KS. He graduated from Manhattan Kansas High School in 1936. He wanted to study medicine, but his father discouraged him because of the long hours away from his family, etc., so he entered the University of Oklahoma in Norman and graduated with a degree in geology. Owensby worked several years as a geologist, but the strong desire to study medicine remained with him. He spent two and one-half years in military service and received an honorable discharge. He finally entered Hahnemann Medical School in Philadelphia and received his M.D. April 3, 1947.

During his senior year of medical school he worked volunteer on weekends at a hospital in north Philadelphia. This section of the city was full of crime, and when he was scheduled to work nights he had to be escorted to the hospital by the police. He received valuable experience there. Many nights were spent in the emergency room, sewing up knife wounds and treating gunshot wounds and such.

On April 7, he married Helen Corle who was working as an R.N. at the hospital where he was in medical school. Their honeymoon was spent driving from coast to coast to Orange County Hospital in Orange, CA, to begin a 15 month rotating internship. He started his internship April 15, 1947, and completed it July 1948.

He was interested in a rural family practice, so the Owensbys drove back to Kansas and found out through his brothers-in-law there was a desperate need for a doctor in a small town (Mankato, KA) close to the Nebraska border. When he inquired into the situation he was invited to set up a practice there. The first office was a small house. The dean of the medical school, Dr. Murphy, along with Kansas State Governor Carlson was developing the Murphy Medical Plan to get doctors to locate in small towns.

Under the plan, the people would loan money to build a clinic for a doctor to use without interest or payment for seven years. The clinic was then owned by the doctor when he paid for it. This plan worked, and the people received all of their money back and the doctor owned the building after the seventh year. The project was duplicated in other parts of Kansas, and the project received publicity in the Saturday Evening Post and the Reader's Digest.

When Owensby opened his office, he had a special plaque made and it has been a part of his office equipment since. The plaque reads, "Man dresses the wounds, God heals them".

He practiced at four hospitals which involved drives of 28 to 45 miles one way. Due to the long distance to the hospitals, he did home deliveries. The people loved this, but his o.b. practice grew, and the winters were so severe he had to have the snow plow open the county roads for him to get to the farm homes to deliver the baby. He finally had to give this up and deliver the babies at hospitals. There again, many times the snow plow would have to open the roads so he and his patients could get to the hospital. With the distance involved when a patient went into labor he escorted them to the hospital and stayed with them until they delivered. He also did some minor surgery and assisted with many major surgeries on

his patients he sent to the hospitals.

The Owensbys had three children born in Kansas. The family belonged to the First Christian Church and Dr. Owensby served as chairman of the Board of Deacons the 13 years they were there.

In the spring of 1961, he was invited to join a former intern in a partnership practice in California. After much prayer the Owensbys decided to make the move. On June 1, 1961, he went into a partnership practice in Chino, CA, (pop. 10,000).

When the children were in college and the eldest son, Mike, in law school at the University of Texas at Austin, the Owensbys decided to get back into a rural area to practice. They had driven through Ozona many times when going to see their son in Austin and were impressed with the town. In May 1974 they stopped to see what the doctor situation was. They met Dr. Blanton who told them they needed another doctor in Ozona. He introduced them to the hospital administrator and some board members. After a number of meetings and the necessary preparation, they were asked to go into practice in Ozona. He opened his office here Feb. 1, 1975.

"We've never regretted any moves we've made and have had many years of much happiness and some sad times," said Mrs. Owensby. "Namely on March 17, 1982, when our eldest son, Mike, died of a brain tumor after being ill for 14 months. He died in our hospital here. The love and concern shown us at this time by so many friends and patients will never be forgotten; the many kindnesses helped through this difficult time."

The Owensby's son Mark lives with his wife in San Diego, CA. He is a doctor of clinical pharmacy and has his own business in computer software. Sue lives in Austin and works in the ER, ICU, CCU. She has her master's degree and is a certified social worker but doesn't have a lot of time to pursue this career due to the heavy nursing demand.

On April 7, 1992, the Owensbys will celebrate 45 years of marriage. They are both convinced that the Lord has blessed them tremendously during those years together. "Our past has been full of many beautiful memories as we still hear from former patients and friends from every place we lived and practiced," said Mrs. Owensby.

"Ozona has been a special town in which to live and practice medicine, and due to the many friends and patients has been 'home' to us for 17 years."

The Outstanding Citizen award was presented by Doug Meador, chamber president.

This year the chamber board of directors asked for nominations for teacher of the year from each school campus. The nominee's names were submitted along with a letter of rec-

ommendation from their respective principals. The board then voted by secret ballot to determine the winner, Dena Porter.

Mrs. Porter was born and reared in Ballinger. She graduated from Ballinger High School in 1966, then earned a bachelor of science degree in 1970 from Angelo State University in 1970. She completed her master of education degree at Angelo State in 1976. She has 15 year's experience teaching at various grade levels.

Dena and her husband David are parents of three children, Kelly, Jamie and Ty.

Other nominees include Debbie Arrott, Jill Crawford, Fred Jones and Debbie Glascock.

Susie Childress presented the teacher award on behalf of the chamber.

Haley Carson, the Outstanding Young Person for 1992, is an athlete and has been the editor of the school yearbook for two years. She is a member of the National Honor Society and was elected to Who's Who Among American High School Students twice. She is a competitor in University Interscholastic League literary contests.

The honoree is a member of Ozona United Methodist Church and its youth fellowship program and has been involved in the Dare to Care program.

Other nominees for Outstanding Young Persons were: Marandy Keith, Courtney Childress, Randal Wilson and Mark Ramirez.

Tom Anderson made the presentation of the Outstanding Young Person award.

Chosen as Organization of the Year was Crockett County Historical Society. When the Ozona Woman's League had its first meeting of the year in September, members were asked to answer roll call with their favorite centennial experience. There were lots of memorable experiences shared that night, but the answer most often given was "the pageant". These references were to the historical pageant produced by the Crockett County Historical Society. The Historical Society contributed to the centennial

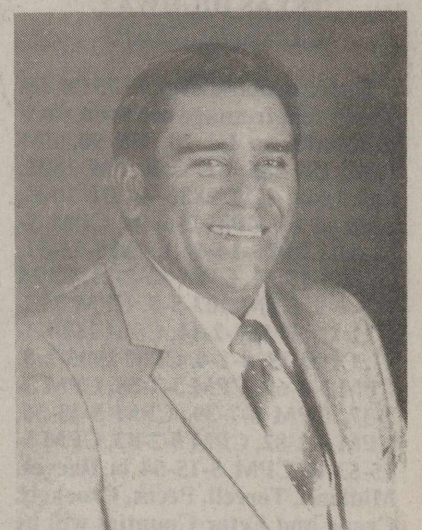
Ybarra announces for school board

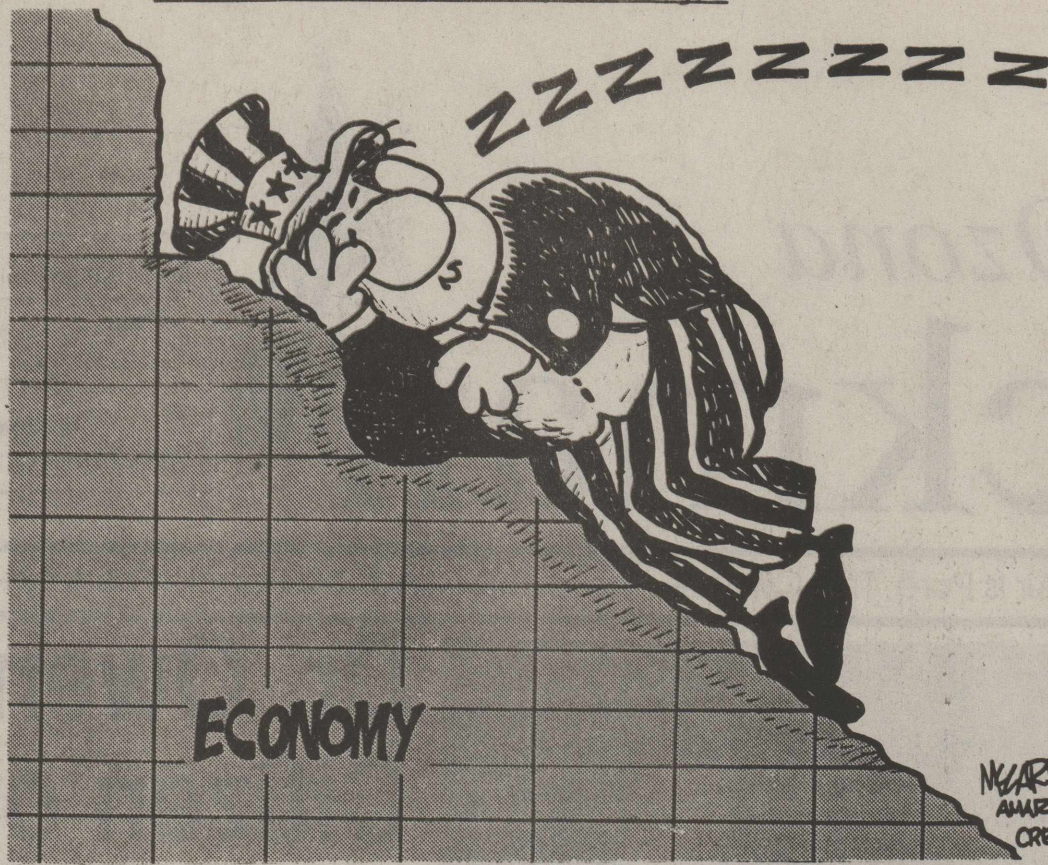

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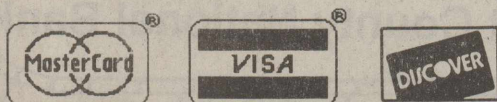

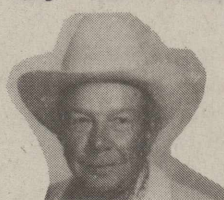

His word is that ye be perfectly joined together. This same spirit of independence is the cause of many marriages now being broken up by divorce where immature people choose to live for themselves and their own pleasure rather than to submit and make adjustments, and through the lessons to be learned in the relationship of husband and wife, arrive at a greater maturity.

God designed marriage for the good of the individual involved to help them mature. It is a divine institution, even as Church is. For a marriage to remain intact requires more

Commissioners approve doctors' contracts

Commissioners held a called meeting Friday, Feb. 28, at which time they approved contracts for Dr. Robert Owensby and Dr. Marcus Sims. The contracts specify that the doctors receive 95% of physician fees they charge. Fees are collected by the hospital.

The hospital provides buildings, clinics, exam rooms, waiting areas and other facilities reasonably necessary for conducting medical practice. Also furnished are personnel, furniture and equipment reasonably necessary to provide services.

At a minimum the hospital is to

provide the doctor a receptionist and two physician assistants, one of whom shall be a licensed vocational nurse provided that the trained personnel is available and approved by the hospital and physician.

Malpractice insurance, not to exceed \$7,500 annually, is paid for each doctor. Dr. Owensby receives \$200 per month as x-ray director and Dr. Sims receives \$200 per month as lab director.

Every third weekend is contract weekend. An out-of-town doctor is brought in to relieve the local doctors, or a local doctor is paid to work the weekend.

At the meeting commissioners also voted to accept the Behren's Drug Plan for prescription cards.

Two registered nurses and one paramedic from Crockett County attended and passed the Advanced Cardiac Life Support course offered by Shannon Hospital on Feb. 22-23 in San Angelo.

Nurses Penny Shoush and Peggy McWilliams, along with paramedic Doug Meador, went through intense training in emergency situations and passed with flying colors. "If you failed a section, you failed the course," stated Doug Meador. "We passed because we studied for about a month before attending the course. You had to have at least an 84 to pass."

ACLS is affiliated with the American Heart Association and participants were graded and evaluated by a cardiologist. The rigorous course included training in arithmia, air-way maintenance, drug therapy, megacode and much more.

"This course is right along with what we are trying to do at the hospital. In a rural area like we live in, the staff does not have the opportunity to practice some of these skills and tech-

niques on a daily basis. They could brush-up on their skills and learn new techniques. I feel that it will upgrade the quality of care in the ER as well as on the floor," stated Crockett County Hospital administrator Robert Denison.

The course was budgeted by the hospital board and was not a part of a grant.

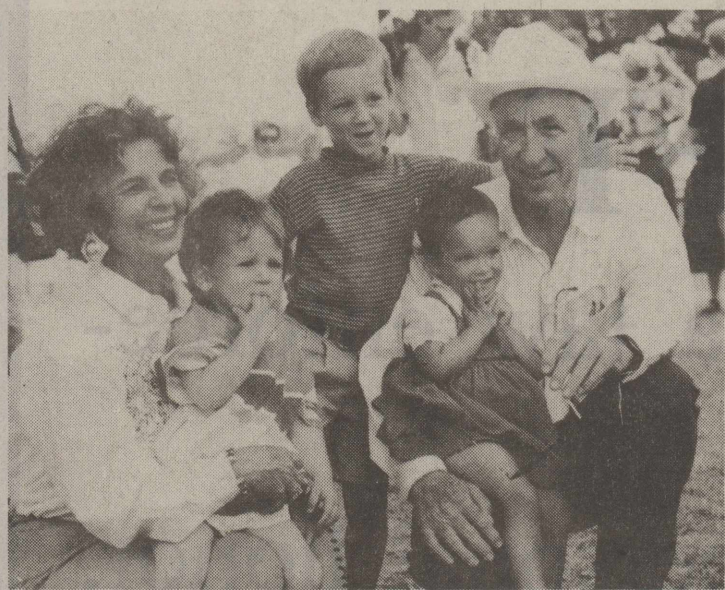

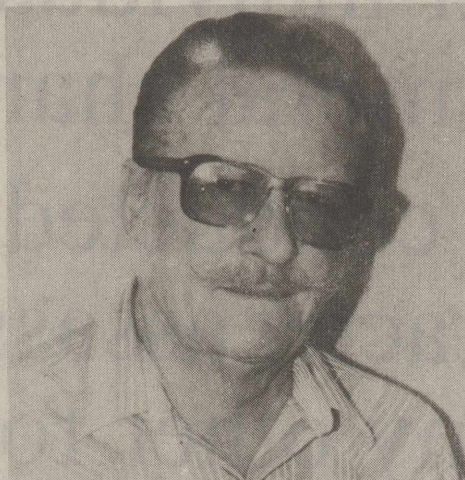

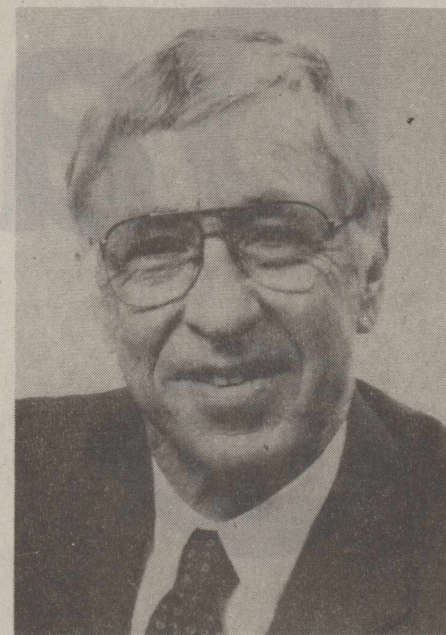

COLLEGE STATION - The Internal Revenue Service is giving up to \$2,000 to low-income families who qualify for Earned Income Credits (EIC) on their tax returns. The trouble is that many just don't apply.

"Many families miss the opportunity to receive this tax credit because they don't make enough money to owe taxes, so they don't file an income tax return," said Joyce Cavanagh, family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Also, people don't know the EIC is available or how to file for it."

It is believed that more than 12 million families now qualify for the EIC. It is available to working parents who earned an adjusted gross income of less than \$21,250 in 1991, and who have at least one child who has been living at home for more than six months, Cavanagh said. Both married and single parents can qualify.

The EIC is a refundable credit, she said, which means that eligible working families can receive it even if they owe no federal income tax or have no income tax withheld from their paychecks. Those who owe no income tax receive a check from the IRS in the amount of their credit.

"If a family does owe income tax, the EIC reduces the amount of taxes owed," Cavanagh said. "If the family's credit is greater than the taxes owed, the family's tax bill will be reduced to zero and the IRS will send the family a check for the remaining amount of its EIC."

To receive the EIC, a person must file a federal income tax return, either 1040 or 1040A, and a new form called "Schedule EIC". A Taxpayer can fill out both sides of the form or fill out only the first side and allow the IRS to complete the rest and calculate the credit.

Cavanagh said that those families who use the "married couple filing separately" status should check with the IRS to see if they qualify to receive the EIC.

The amount of refund families receive, according to Cavanagh, depends on how much income was earned and whether they qualify for two extra EIC benefits that are now available:

-The Basic EIC for 1991 for families with one child is worth a maximum of \$1,192. The maximum is \$1,235 for those with more than one child. Most families who earned between \$6,000 and \$13,000 last year should receive at least \$1,000.

-Families with a child born in 1991 can receive an extra benefit of up to \$357.

-Families that pay at least part of the premiums for a health insurance policy that includes health care coverage for a child may receive an extra credit of up to \$428.

Low-income parents with a foster child also may qualify for the EIC, Cavanagh said. However, the foster child must have lived with the family for that entire year.

More information on the EIC and free assistance is available in most areas at Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) clinics, Cavanagh said. Call the local IRS office or (800) 829-1040 to find out the location of the nearest VITA clinic in your area.

Top rams to sell at experiment station

The Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale is March 12 at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), between Rocksprings and Sonora.

Dr. Maurice Shelton, test coordinator, said more than 250 rams from some of the world's top finewool flocks are now completing the 140-day test.

"Only the top 30 percent of the animals finishing will be eligible for the sale," said Shelton. "By sale day, each ram will have been kept or culled on such critical traits as breeding soundness, rate of gain and wool characteristics."

The day begins with an informal ram inspection period ending at 11:45 p.m. for lunch. The "dutch-treat" meal is catered annually by the Sutton County 4-H Club.

At 1 p.m. the formal educational program will start under the guidance of Dr. Carl Menzies, San Angelo TAES resident director. The session will open with Uvalde-based Extension sheep and goat specialist Dr. Frank Craddock speaking on using performance data to improve sheep. Shelton will follow with some personal thoughts and suggestions concerning the test and his long association with it.

Commenting on the 1991-92 test will be Dr. Chris Lupton, TAES wool and mohair laboratory head at San Angelo.

Prior to the sale, Ross Appleton, chairman of the American Rambouillet Association, Breed Improvement and Registry of Merit Committee from Eden, will award the certified ram certificates.

The day will conclude with the sale of performance test rams under the direction of Dr. George Ahlswede, San Angelo-based Extension sheep and goat specialist.

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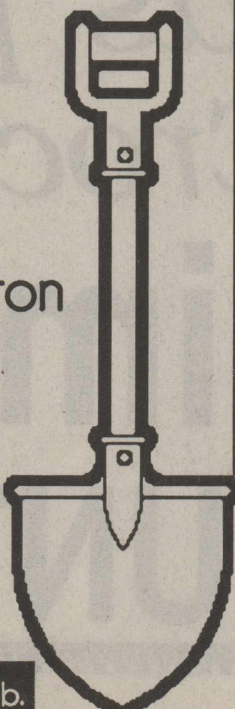
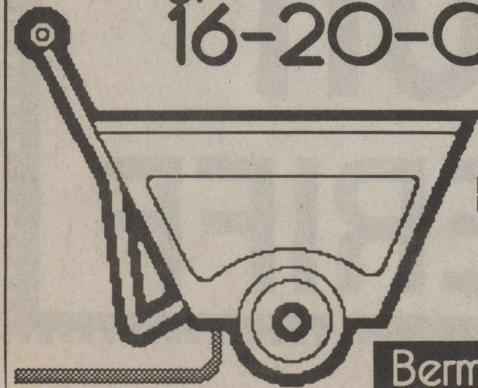

Harris hosts political conference Feb. 27

Pct. 1 commissioner candidate Bill Harris held a conference Feb. 27 to present his views and accept questions from voters in Pct. 1.

The candidate began by discussing county revenues and expenditures. Preparing and sticking to a realistic monthly budget with a monthly review of figures, identifying and controlling expenses and finding additional ways to increase revenues without a tax increase were his suggestions.

Streamlining the county work force, increasing productivity and eliminating overtime were other suggestions from Harris.

Overseeing vendors to the county and stringent inventory controls monthly with supervisors to be held responsible for department shortages would also trim expenses.

Economic development of land owned by Crockett County south of the interstate could bring jobs to the community, Harris said.

Agreeing that top quality medical care is needed in Crockett County, Harris suggested monthly inventory there, improved collections and operating more one a one day at a time basis.

In short, run the county and the hospital like a business, Harris said "We must first determine what the county's income should be, then we know what we can do."

The question of a public golf course could be addressed through a poll of voters and a study made to determine whether a course would generate income and or bring people into the

community. Improvements needed in the south side of the precinct as seen by Harris include repair and widening of streets, hiring an engineer to study drainage problems and installing more street lights.

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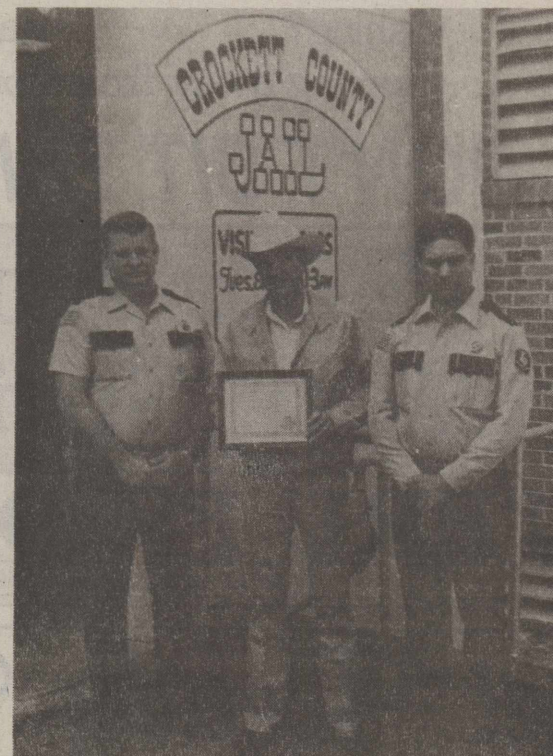
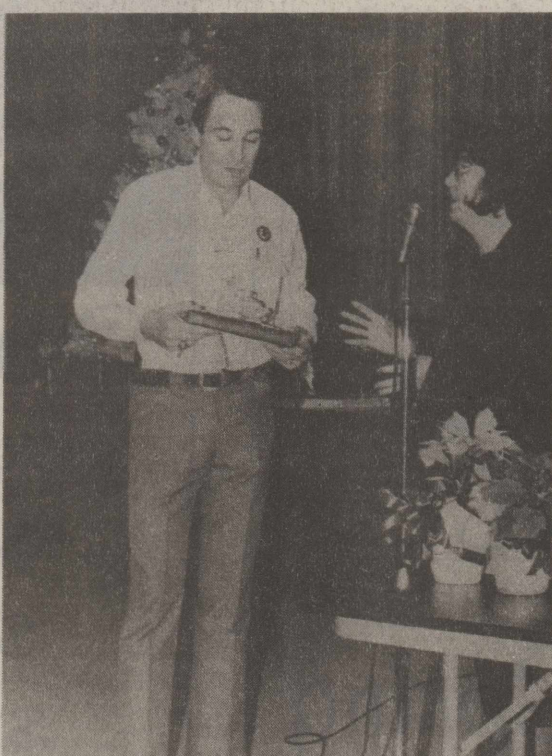

Need for proper grazing use

One of the basic decisions facing livestock producers is how close to safely graze plants on their range and still maximize productivity from their livestock and range. When you take into account varying climatic factors, growth habitats of different plants, and animal preferences, it can be a difficult decision at times.

The benefits of proper grazing are numerous; plant vigor and reproduction increase, plant litter increases, which reduces soil erosion, range condition improves or is maintained, the plant community can withstand longer droughts, and more water enters the ground increasing our water supply.

In order to make knowledgeable decisions with regard to proper grazing, one needs to remember how plants grow. The more leaf surface a plant has, the more food it is able to produce. Through the process of photosynthesis, water and minerals brought up through the root system combine with energy from the sun to produce food for the plant to live and grow. Any extra food is then transported back to the root system where it is

stored. This food reserve is what the plant calls upon to initiate plant growth following droughts, grazing or at the beginning of each growing cycle. Constant overgrazing continues to deplete these reserves leaving weakened plants.

There is a direct relationship between the amount of leaves and stems to roots. There is a rule of thumb that conservationists go by; take half, leave half. Plants are able to maximize root and leaf growth when no more than half of their leaves are removed by grazing. However, when 60-90 percent of the leaf surface is removed, approximately the same amount of root growth stops. If overgrazing continues, the root system decreases limiting the ability of the plant to capture water and minerals. The results of continuous overgrazing are obvious and dramatic. As the plants become weakened, vigor and reproduction decrease, and plant litter is reduced causing more soil erosion; therefore, plants cannot recover from droughts as quickly and may eventually die. This removal of the more desirable plants leads to range deterioration, consequently the vegetative composition changes to include more undesirable or lower quality grasses, brush and poisonous plants.

Continued productive use of our rangelands depends on careful monitoring of stocking rates and deferment periods during the growing season. Any grazing regime that allows continuous stocking and overgrazing will eventually leave your range in a less productive state.

For more information on proper grazing use or any other conservation practice, contact the Soil Conservation Service. Programs and assistance provided by the SCS are available on a nondiscriminatory basis regardless of sex, race, national origin, religion or color.

ASCS to administer crop disaster assistance program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disasters in either 1990-91.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane and tobacco; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. Farmers have received a special mailing with specific information on the program in February. "If a producer did not receive the disaster program informa-

tion in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office."

A producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

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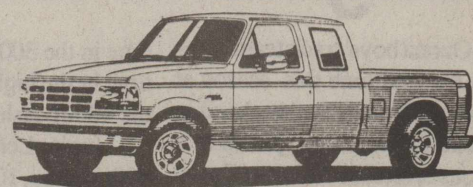
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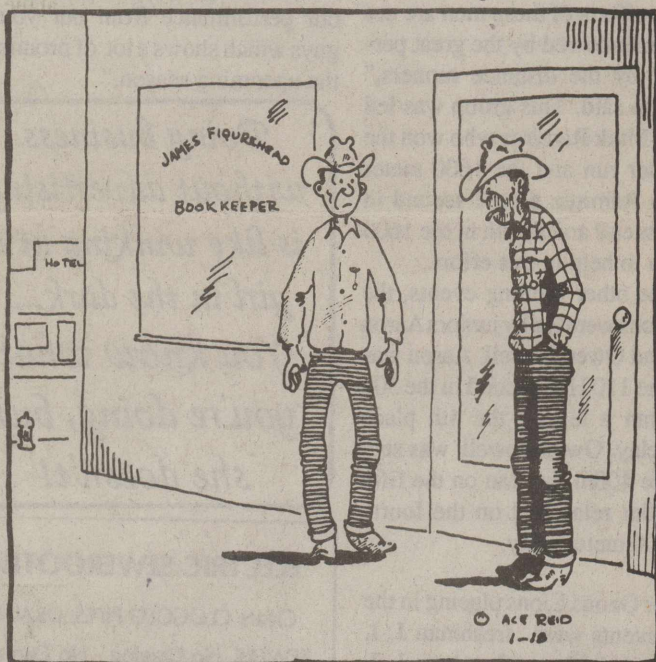

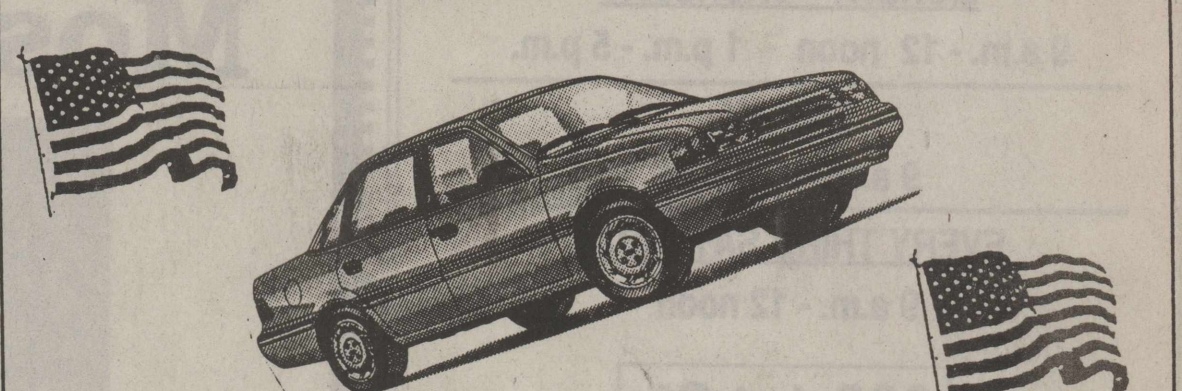
