

# ICD Family Shelter defines domestic violence

"Domestic Violence: Understanding a Community Problem," printed by the Department of Human Services.)

Domestic Violence - is the use of abusive and violent behavior among people who are married, living together, or have an ongoing prior intimate relationship. Approximately 95% of the victims of domestic violence are women.

Domestic violence can involve pushing, punching, slapping, choking, stabbing, forcing sexual activity, or using the threat of violence to control another's behavior. It can lead to serious injury or death.

Typically, the first response to domestic violence is to ask why women stay in abusive relationships. Many women do leave their abuser. Other women endure the violence for a variety of reasons.

\*Because of religious, cultural, or socially learned beliefs, a woman may feel that it's her duty to keep the marriage together at all costs.

\*Some women will endure physical and emotional abuse to keep the family together for the children's sake. Very often, it is when the violence is directed at her children that she will take them and leave.







# Earnestly Contending For The Faith

By Rev. Miguel Jimenez **Church of God of Prophecy** 

Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints (Jude 3).

Brethern, I believe it is important for us to note a number of things. In contending for the faith, there are things about any group, there are times in the development and the dynamics of any organization where changes are inevitable.

There are times where we are inclined to look back and say, "my, those were the good old days". We sometimes wonder at what we have lost and look at what we have gained. Sometimes our hearts are a bit saddened, but this was not what prompted Jude to write the Church. He saw a danger that went beyond the mere passing of traditions.

Can you think of something more beautiful to write about than the common salvation, the redemptive power of Jesus Christ and His blood which has been applied to the heart? The

basic problem being addressed by Jude concerned a certain manner of life and not a certain type of doctrine. The faith we are talking about is the recognized teaching and doctrine that emerged from the Apostle Peter's early sermons which began to crystalize in the writings and teachings of Paul and the other apostles.

The expression "the faith" as commonly used in the New Testament can be taken to mean the broad tenents of Christian truth and practice. This has survived the times of the church's greatest declination and by it we live

This body of truth is a permanent trust delivered by God - not discovered by man. In writing to the Corinthians, Paul made it clear that he had received of the Lord what he was delivering unto them. Concerning how they should partake of the Lord's Supper, he said, "For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you." (I Cor. 11:23). Concerning the resurrection, he said, "For I delivered unto you first of all that which I also received. (I Cor. 15:3) In Philippians 1:27-30, Paul captures the type of contending in which we should be engaged.

While we may be contending for other things, we are told of two basic denials. The first one is that we can deny grace by turning it into lasciviousness. It is possible to be so caught up with freedom as the consequence of salvation that we even allow for those who advocate sexual promiscuity and perversion, thereby degrading Christian liberty to the level of pagan license. Tolerance is not always Christian. There are things we can permit in our minds that should not be there. Jude warned against that.

On the other hand, we see many who can live only by rules - do's and don't's, relying on their ability to say "I have" or "I can" or "I have" measured up - thereby establishing their own particular version of righteousness. We are denying the grace of God by following either of these rather extreme views. The principles of grace we should hold to are consistent with the faith once delivered to the saints. Paul wrote to Titus, "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men. Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lust, we should live soberly, righteously and godly in this present world. (Titus 2:11-12)





Prevention of alcohol, drug abuse among youth starts with parents

Peer pressure to try alcohol and other drugs can begin as early as the fourth grade, and by the sixth grade more than 40 percent of children have used alcohol. But children who have strong bonds with their family and school are far less likely to try alcohol or other drugs. When parents work with their children, the school, and the community in a prevention program, the use of alcohol and other drugs by young people declines sharply.

According to a survey by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the high-risk years for children's first use of illegal drugs begin at age 12. And approximately 100,000 10 and 11year-olds reported getting drunk once a week.

The 1990 Texas School Survey of Substance Abuse, conducted by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, reported that only onethird of the Texas secondary students remained drug-free during the 1990 school year; the remaining two-thirds used either alcohol, tobacco, inhalants and/or an illicit drug.

To help Texas youths abstain from the use of alcohol and other drugs, parents need to be positive role models. Teens often will tune out lectures, but they watch their parents' every action. Following are suggestions for parents to help combat their children's use of alcohol and other drugs:

-Show the value of freedom to think and act independently, that one doesn't have to do something because "everyone is doing it". This helps teens see that negative peer pressure can be

-Demonstrate a sense of self-respect and self-esteem. For example: taking care of your health through exercise and diet offers a strong model for your child.

-Show respect for your child's concerns by being a good listener.

-Be cautious in using prescription or over-the-counter medicines as a quick fix for pain or stress. Your example can counter or reinforce the media message that any problem be cured by chemicals.

-Be aware of how personal use of alcohol can influence your teen. Avoid using excuses for drinking, like having a rough day.

-Talk honestly about personal stress or conflict. Children need to know that such struggles are a normal part of life. They have a good model when they see parents coping with problems without relying on alcohol or other drugs.

#### Crockett County Library use reaches all-time high

Statistics contained in the 1991 report for Crockett County Public Library show use and number of books checked out at an all-time high.

In 1991, 12,435 patrons checked out 20,288 books. These figures compare with 18,431 books and 11,951 patrons in 1990.

Use of the library actually dropped some in 1990 from the previous year when 18,551 books were borrowed by 12,048 readers.



Cholesterol in the body for good health

Everyone has some level of cholesterol in their body. Without cholesterol, a person couldn't survive - as a building block for cell walls and hormones, it serves other important

Heart attacks due to high blood cholesterol are brought on when the supply of cholesterol is more than the body needs. This "extra" cholesterol builds up in the bloodstream and clogs arteries, instead of being eliminated by the liver. The saturated fatty acids in the food you eat can slow down this elimination process.

While median ratios are useful, many taxpayers find their property valued at another level. The preliminary data indicates that the average property varied from the median ratio by 16.4%. For single-family houses, 59 out of 100 were appraised within plus or minus 10% of the average; the other 41 were over or under-valued by 10% or more.

Intracounty variations among property categories are the more critical concern of an individual taxpayer. Variations simply mean that some taxpayers paid more or less than their fair share of local government costs.

Statewide the market value of taxable property was up slightly for the second consecutive year following four years of decline. However, the 1.4% preliminary increase may disappear after appeals are heard. Preliminary values were down in 517 school districts.


