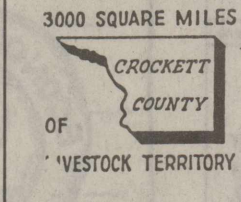

Three-year plan on track at hospital/care center

In December of 1990, the board of directors of the Crockett County Hospital/Care Center signed, and the commissioners approved, a three-year plan aimed at stabilizing and revitalizing the hospital/care center. At the same time, the board hired a fulltime, professional administrator to operate the facilities.

In the interest of continuing public information about the hospital/care center, a brief history and status of each point of the plan follow.

1. Employ one administrator for hospital/care center at a savings of approximately \$25,000.00.
2. Hire one professional administrator for both hospital and care center on Dec. 20, 1990.
3. Initiate and continue an accounts receivable program. This will result in a reduction of over \$200,000.00 presently due the hospital. Continued collection efforts will generate revenues reducing the amount of tax money presently supporting the operation of this hospital.
4. Status: Board has budgeted for computer system to handle this and other health care business functions and is awaiting action by the commissioners court.
5. Begin efforts to qualify the hospital for re-certification under Medicare.
6. Status: On March 9, 1992, the administrator received word that Crockett County Hospital had been re-certified for Medicare effective Jan. 17, 1992.
7. Locate all physicians in the county-owned clinic building.
8. Status: Both physicians began operating out of the clinic building in May of 1991.
9. Begin preliminary steps to recruit an additional physician to the community.
10. Status: The Board is presently consulting with a physician search team.
11. Establish specialty clinics where selected medical specialists (urology, internal medicine, cardiol-

ogy, etc.) will be available locally by appointment and referral by your local physician.

Status: Specialty clinics begin June 11, 1992, when Dr. Price Burdine, M.D., orthopedic surgeon will be in the Crockett County Hospital.

7. Upgrade five patient rooms to provide a more pleasant and professional setting for patient care.

Status: Completed and open house held April 9, 1992.

8. Provide inside parking for ambulances.

Status: With the leadership of John L. Henderson and the help of the Deerfest Association, Lions Club, West Texas Utilities, Lilly Construction, Carroll Richardson Memorial Fund, private individuals and county funds, this building will begin construction in the immediate future.

9. Promote community awareness of the extent of care available at the local hospital. Improve community awareness of equipment available locally to enhance treatment. Encourage in-put from the community to improve hospital equipment and services.

Status: This is and will continue to be an ongoing exchange between all of your health-care providers, physicians, administrator, and board of directors. The community survey is meant to reach and to involve each adult in the county. This survey is vitally important to you and your family's health. Please be looking for it in the mail the first week in June.

The hospital/care center is one year and five months into the original three-year plan and eight of the nine points of the plan have been implemented or started. What the hospital/care center begs the public to understand is that it is going to take more than the short length of time we have had to actually show how your health-care unit is changing for the benefit of all Crockett County.

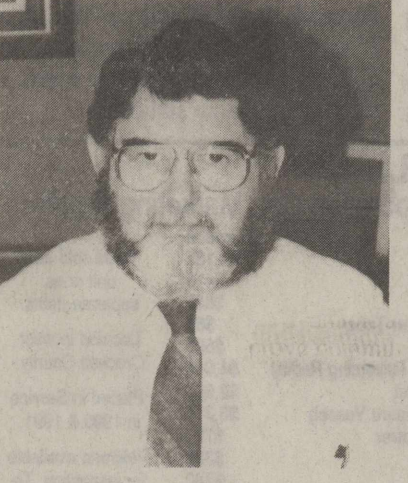
Pullen named to ONB Board

Seventy-six attend town hall health meeting

A town hall meeting to solicit input on the future of health care in the community was attended by 76 persons last Tuesday. Of those 76, 30 had a direct relationship with the hospital, said administrator Bob Denson. "This meant that less than two percent of the county population cared enough to come out and learn about health care."

If those attending expected easy answers and instant solutions, they were disappointed. Speaker Marvin

Cole, a vice-president with the Texas Hospital Association, began by stating that the goal of the meeting was to create a vision of what the community wants to accomplish in health care.

Cole advised that the hospital should be kept open with serious discussion on options.

"Take yourself out of the crisis mentality," he suggested. "Major repairs are a normal process."

Texas has led the nation in hospital

closings for five years (49 hospitals). The economic impact of any hospital closing has a domino effect. Cole estimated that the annual payroll at the local hospital/care center has a four million dollar impact on the community. This was based on a three to four time turnover before the money leaves the community.

The hospital generates 1.2 million from services with an average of 1,000 outpatients a month through the doctors' offices and from 90-100 emergency patients. Eight to 10 percent are true emergencies, administrator Bob Denson said.

Staffing for an emergency room only would require 18-20 people plus billing personnel (includes four nursing personnel around the clock and relief workers).

The hospital and care center employ 55 fulltime equivalents (63

people). Successful hospitals have administrators in place at least four years, Cole said. He strongly recommended a change in the board member appointment system from two year rotation to 4-6 year terms.

Cole suggested several improvement measures already implemented through the board's three-year plan. A status report on the plan is in this issue of The Stockman.

He commented that the hospital/care center board and the commissioners' court set-up, is "probably the most cumbersome governing system out there".

Persons attending the meeting were given a 32-page manual outlining options which included: rural health clinics, hospital districts, emergency services districts, hospital closure/reopening after closure.

Murdered man identified

The body of a man found murdered in Crockett County in 1990 has been identified, Chief Deputy Alton Davis said Tuesday. The identification resulted from posters distributed in El Paso by the man's parents.

A Texas Ranger there who was familiar with the Crockett County case, notified Ranger Danny Rhea. Dental records obtained from the F.B.I. confirmed the identity of Douglas Scott Zyskowski of Normandy Park, WA. Zyskowski was 26 when he left Washington in November of 1989 with Patricia Candace Walsh, also of the Normandy Park area.

The two were traveling as evangelists of The Everyday Church, Davis said, and had given away their luggage and identification.

Zyskowski's parents last heard from him by phone from El Paso in mid-January of 1990.

The victim's body was sighted alongside the road by a truck driver

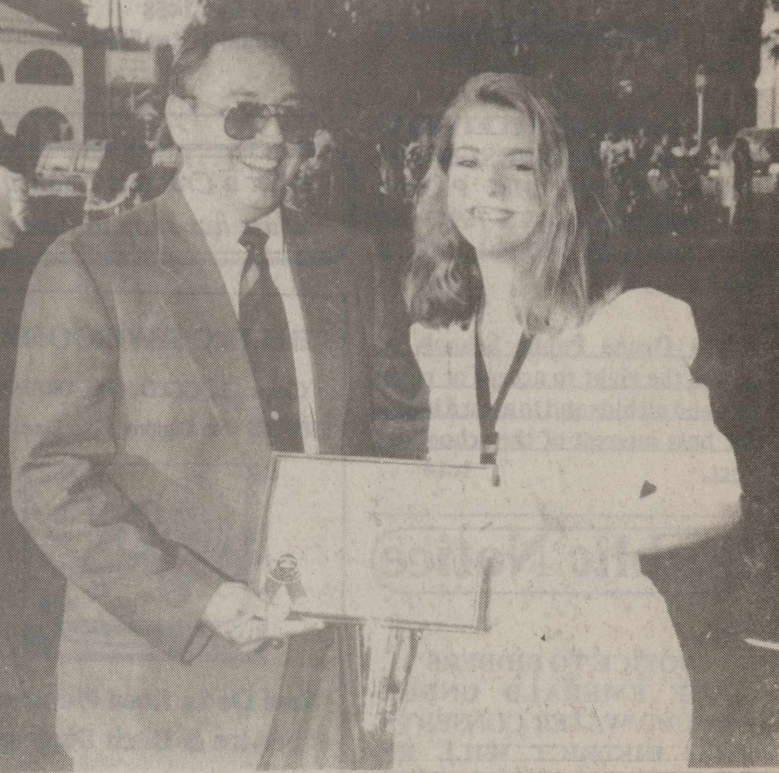
three miles east of the Pecos River in Crockett County Jan. 21, 1990.

Investigation into the murder will continue with interviews of the parents and church members who were his last known associates, Davis said.

Miss Walsh, who is still missing, is described as a white female, age 24, 5'7", 150 pounds with blue eyes and red hair.

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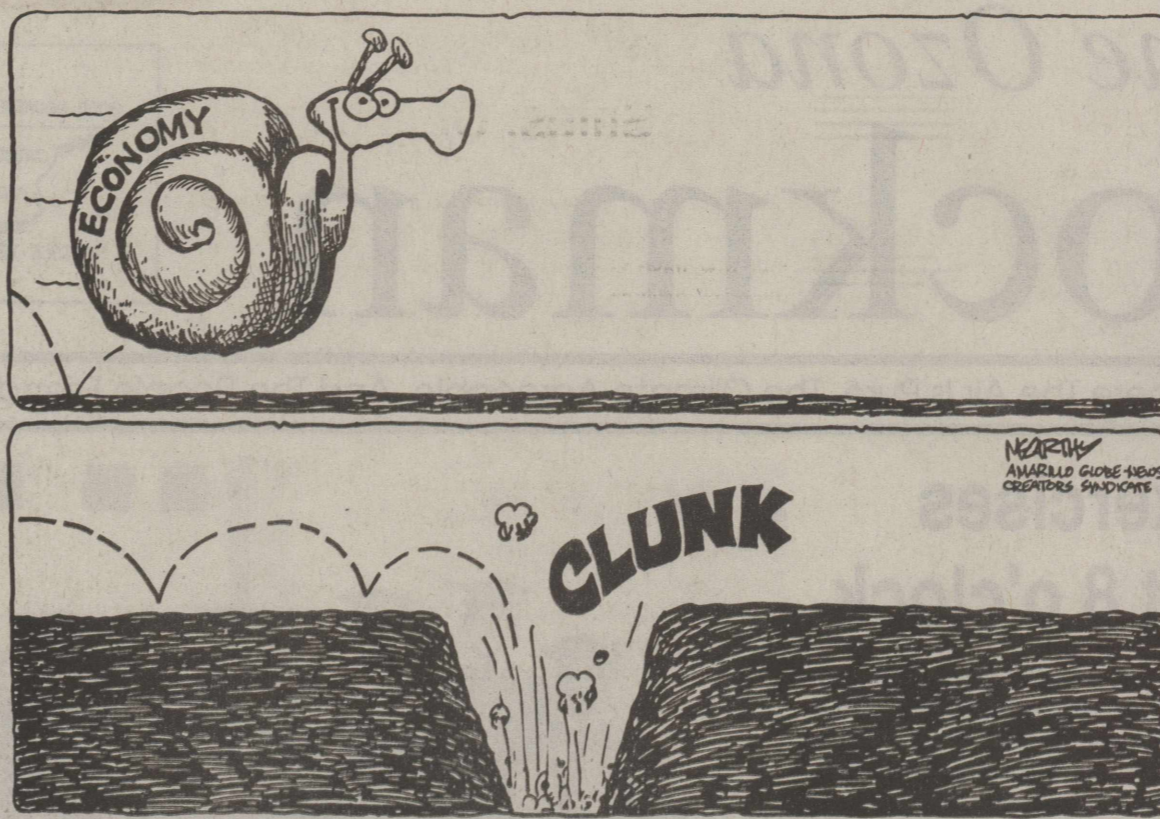

You are hereby notified of the opportunity for written public comment concerning the Permit Application No. 21434 by Amax Oil & Gas, Inc. to install two internal combustion gas engines. One engine will drive an electrical generator set and one engine will drive a gas compressor. The proposed installation is located on RM 2083 (Pandalde Road) about 28 miles southwest of Ozona, Texas. This facility proposes to emit the following air contaminants: Nitrogen Oxides, Carbon Monoxide, Sulfur Dioxide and Unburned Hydrocarbons.  A sale at Wool Growers Central Storage May 13 offered 267,398 pounds of wool. Firm prices resulted in satisfied customers according to Eddie Stewart, warehouse manager. The sale included 180,615 pounds of 12-month, 85.117 pounds of eight-month, paint-free wool, and 1,666 pounds of eight-month paint wool. Prices on the bulk average were from \$1.21 to \$1.38 on a grease basis. Don Dunlap produced the top selling bag of 12-month wool. The 1,711-pound, 13-bag clip sold to Anodyne Inc. for \$1.50 1/8 on a grease basis. Stewart commented that Dunlap shears his own sheep and skirts the wool before bagging it.

Anodyne also purchased the second-highest selling lot, a 2,044-pound, 17-bag clip. The G&L Livestock Co. wool was bought for \$1.45 3/8 on a grease basis. 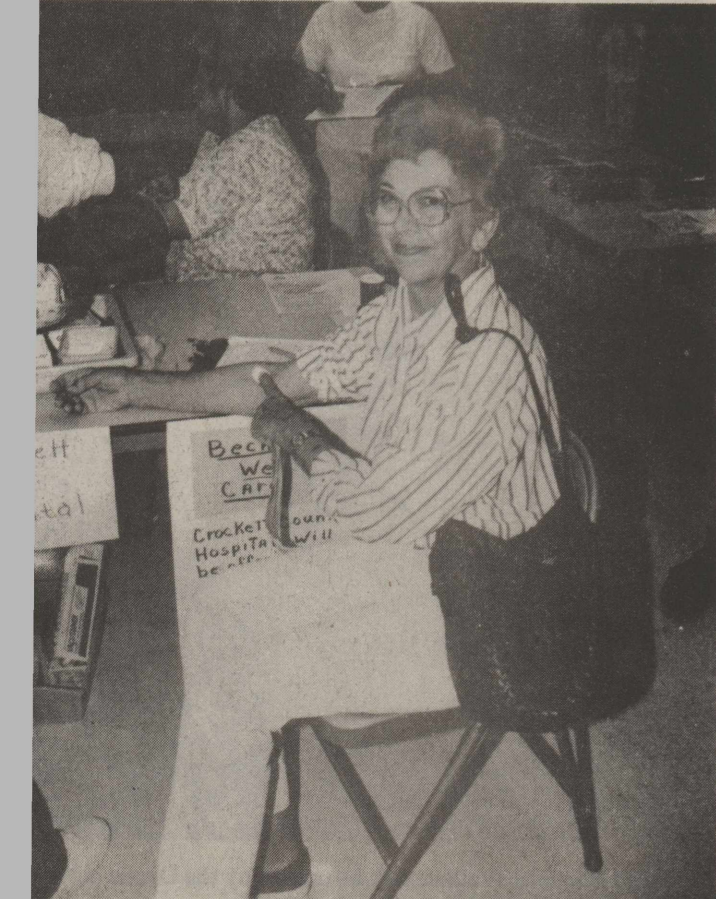

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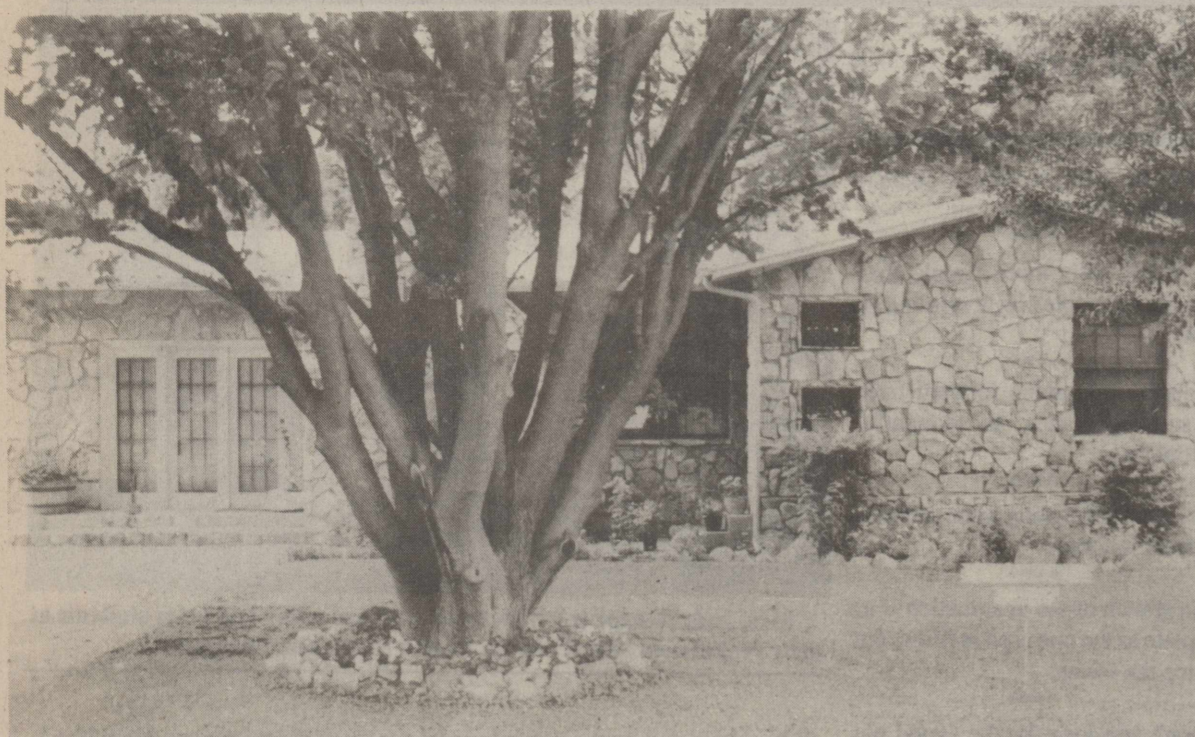

take that old saying seriously. "There is no rest for the wicked."

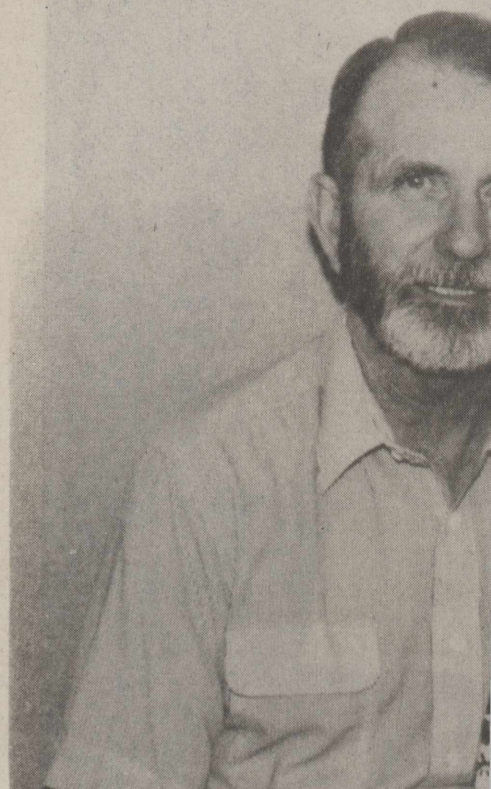

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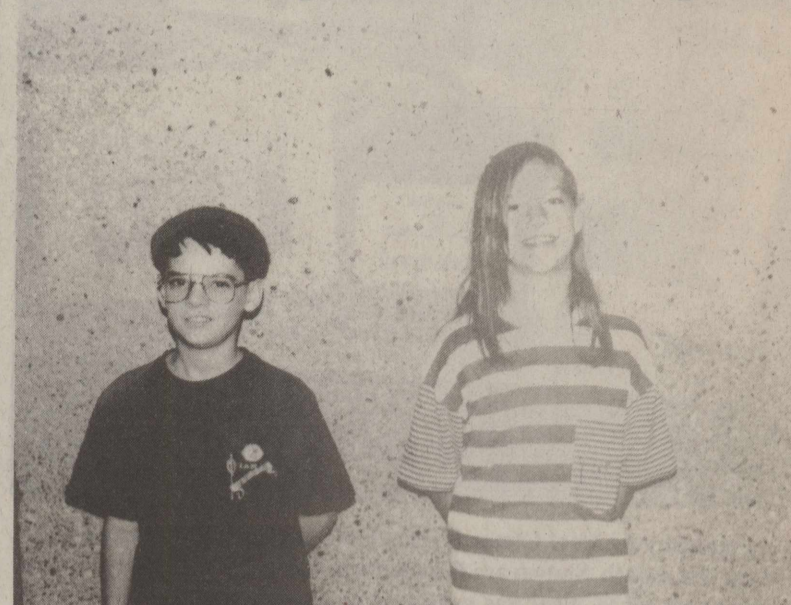

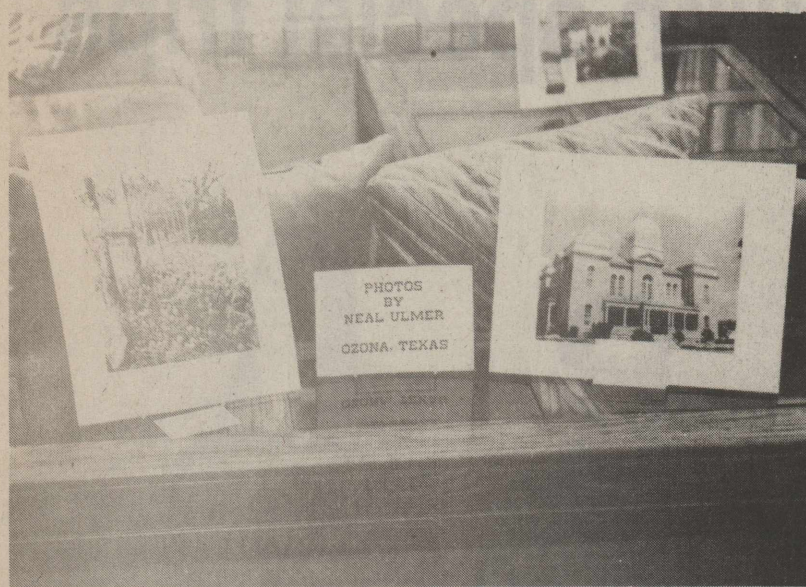

Pecos River Rock Art book autograph party May 26

"Pecos River Rock Art" is a new book by Jim Zintgraff and Solveig Turpin that is filled with full color photographs and information about the Indian pictographs found along the Pecos River. The authors spent several years exploring and photographing these sites, some of which are lost today because of the Amistad Flooding Project. A collection of the original photographs is currently displayed at Ozona National Bank lobby. Solveig A. Turpin holds a doctoral degree from the University of Texas at Austin where she is the Associate Director of the Texas Archaeological Research Laboratory. She has devoted the majority of her career to tracking the elaborate Native American rock art of Southwest Texas and Northern Mexico.

Following in his father's footsteps, Jim Zintgraff has been a commercial photographer since childhood. In 1953, while on a hunting trip to the Pecos River, he first saw the ancient pictographs that were to become his life's work. School board discusses junior high counselor

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, May 12, 1992, discussed a recommendation made by Don Howard, principal of Ozona Junior High School, to consider the employment of a junior high counselor with an area of specialization in psychology for the 1992-93 school year. Howard explained that his recommendation was based on a series of meetings held at the Catholic Parish Hall and First Baptist Church with parents of junior high age students. Common to all of the meetings was a similar theme of concern in the areas of junior high children's self-esteem and, specifically, availability of counseling/psychologist services.

Howard said that counseling, as a support service, is also recommended by the Texas Task Force on Middle School Education. According to the Task's findings: "One of every four Texas youngsters under the age of 18 lives in poverty. In 1988 more than 70,700 youngsters between the ages of 10 and 17 were referred to the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission and 1,907 Texas 10-17 year olds were referred to the state's juvenile correction system. The state leads the nation in pregnancy rates for teens under the age of 14 and has the second highest pregnancy rate for teens aged 15 to 19. Three out of every four 14 to 15 year old mothers rank in the bottom fifth of their age group in basic mathematical and reading skills."

"When the sixth grade students come to us, they are fairly innocent and have not had the exposure to pregnancies, abortions, alcohol use, and other related experiences. During these trying times, many of our students have their first contact with the realism of pre-adolescence. Occurrences of vandalism, theft, fighting, pregnancy, and low classroom performance also reflect and support state-wide and national findings. This recommendation is being made with full awareness of the financial uncertainties and restraints of the Crockett County schools," Howard said.

After discussing Mr. Howard's recommendation, the board voted to agree with the concept of a counselor/psychologist at the junior high school and appointed a committee of Gary Vannoy, Wade Richardson, Marcus Sims, Jim Payne, Ted Cotton, Don Howard and John Curry to determine responsibilities of the position and to make a report to the board at its next regular meeting.

The members voted to approve the conversion of a school bus to serve physically handicapped children in the district. Installation of equipment to assist these children will be completed this summer, and the vehicle will be available in time to be utilized at the beginning of the next school year. Superintendent Jim Payne was appointed as the district's representative

on the Region XV Education Service Center Advisory Committee, and Jeffrey Sutton was elected as the board's representative to the County Education District #18.

Also during the meeting, the trustees re-elected Jeffrey Sutton as president, Gary Buck Mitchell as vice-president and Elliott Barrera as secretary. Wade Richardson was elected as the board's delegate and Marcus Sims as alternate to the Texas Association of School Boards-Texas Association of School Administrators Joint Annual Convention, which will be held in Houston in September. The members also approved the 1992-93 school calendar.

Hospital board to advertise for administrator

Hospital/care center board members voted to advertise for an administrator in the Sunday San Angelo Standard Times when they met in called session May 15. Administrator Bob Denson will be here until June 30. He has accepted a job as administrator at Ward Memorial in Monahans.

A job description for administrators will be drawn up by the board. Directors further discussed a physician recruitment contract with Harris, Kovack and Alderman. The contract will be on the agenda of a 6:30

p.m. meeting May 21. Denson notified the board that fire inspector Steve Kenley had examined the automatic digital dialer to verify that it is in place and operational. He will notify the Midland fire safety inspector of the verification. Midland will then notify the Texas Department of Health and request that the nursing home certification automatic cancellation clause be discontinued. The first specialty clinic will be held June 11 with Dr. Price Burdine, sports medicine, orthopedic surgery.

Teachers claim many new education reforms have not worked

Many of the education reforms passed by the Texas Legislature in 1984 have not worked, according to a recent survey of public school educators.

The random survey of 1,638 members of the Association of Texas Professional Educators shows that 81 percent of those surveyed say state mandated teacher evaluations consume too much administrative time; and more than half say the suspension period under the no-pass, no-play rule should be reduced from six to three weeks.

"No-pass, no-play was designed to make students work harder and maintain passing grades, but instead, students are opting for less-demanding courses," said Beverly Sinkey, ATPE state president.

The mandated 22:1 teacher/pupil ratio for kindergarten through grade four received the most favorable response of all the 1984 reforms. Twice as many teachers said the ratio in their

classroom had improved, compared to those who said conditions had worsened.

Three-fourths of those surveyed say school violence is on the increase in their district. "This is the most alarming response in the survey," said Sinkey. "Incidents of violence against students and teachers are becoming much too common. Learning cannot take place in an atmosphere of fear."

Sixty-four percent favor year-round schooling if they are compensated accordingly, and only 28 percent favor consolidation as a solution to the school finance issue.

The survey was conducted for the association by M. Lee Williams of Southwest Texas State University.

With a 1991-92 record membership of 54,600, ATPE is the largest non-union educators' association in the United States. ATPE's membership consists primarily of classroom teachers but also includes administrators, paraprofessionals, retired educators and public members.

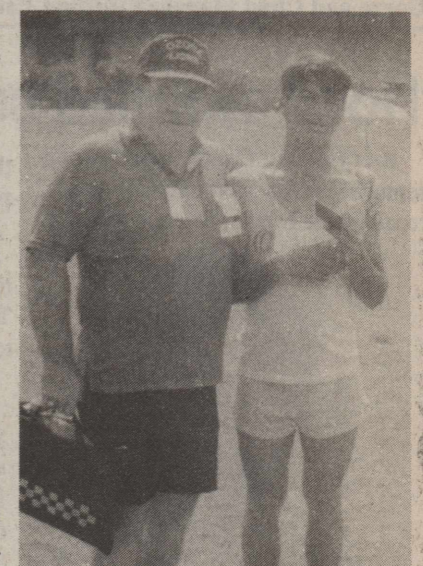
Leal places in state special olympics

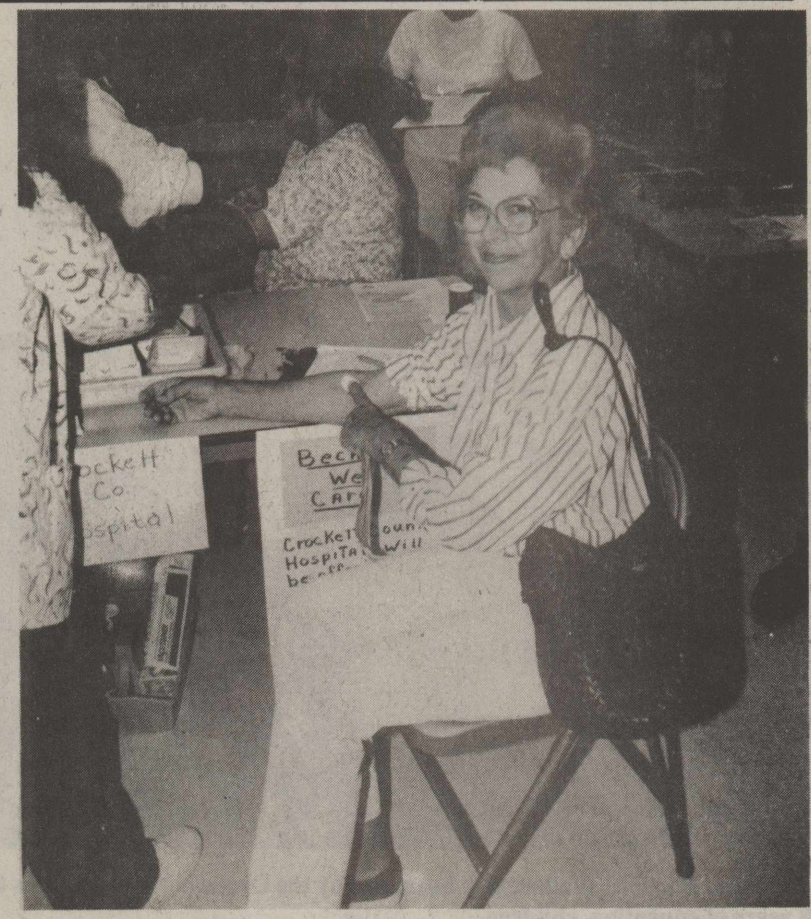

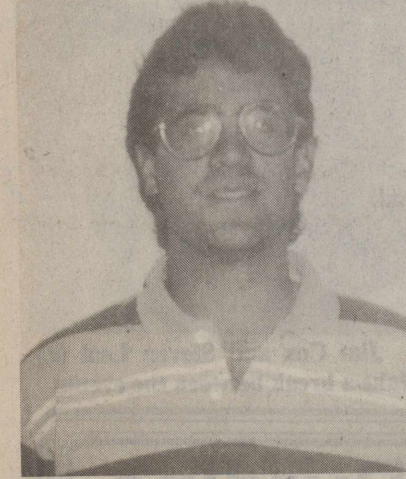

Wool Growers sells wool May 13

A sale at Wool Growers Central Storage May 13 offered 267,398 pounds of wool. Firm prices resulted in satisfied customers according to Eddie Stewart, warehouse manager.

The sale included 180,615 pounds of 12-month, 85,117 pounds of eight-month, paint-free wool, and 1,666 pounds of eight-month paint wool.

Prices on the bulk average were from \$1.21 to \$1.38 on a grease basis. Don Dunlap produced the top selling bag of 12-month wool. The 1,711-pound, 13-bag clip sold to Anodyne Inc. for \$1.50 1/8 on a grease basis.

Stewart commented that Dunlap shears his own sheep and skirts the wool before bagging it.

Anodyne also purchased the second-highest selling lot, a 2,044-pound, 17-bag clip. The G&L Livestock Co. wool was bought for \$1.45 3/8 on a grease basis.

Volume buyer in the 12-month wools, Anodyne Inc., purchased 101,500 pounds. Other buyers were: Prouvost, Lefebvre & Co. Inc., 53,500 pounds which included six line lots

offered at the end of the sale; Burlington Inc., 22,900 pounds; and Ford Oglesby, 2,500 pounds.

Eight-month wools sold for an average of \$1.18, grease basis.

Anodyne Inc. bought three lots which tied for top lot, selling for \$1.27 1/4, grease basis. The lots were: a 5,911-pound, 37-bag clip produced by Austin Mills; a 5,504-pound, 35-bag clip produced by J. B. Parker; and a 3,687-pound, 26-bag clip produced by Jim O'Bryan.

Both lots of eight-month paint wool sold to Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. for an average of \$1.00, grease basis. Texas International Mohair Inc. bought both lines of eight-month, paint-free wools for an average of \$1.05, grease basis.

Volume buyer of eight-month wools was A. H. Helmig & Co. Inc. with 38,700 pounds. Second was Anodyne Inc. with 38,300 followed by Texas International Mohair with 6,900 and Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. with 2,900 pounds.

Stewart said he was "tickled pink" with the results of the sale.

Three-year plan at hospital/care center

In December of 1990, the board of directors of the Crockett County Hospital/Care Center signed, and the commissioners approved, a three-year plan aimed at stabilizing and revitalizing the hospital/care center. At the same time, the board hired a fulltime, professional administrator to operate the facilities.

In the interest of continuing public information about the hospital/care center, a brief history and status of each point of the plan follow.

1. Employ one administrator for hospital/care center at a savings of approximately \$25,000.00.

Status: Hired one professional administrator for both hospital and care center on Dec. 20, 1990.

2. Initiate and continue an accounts receivable program. This will result in a reduction of over \$200,000.00 presently due the hospital. Continued collection efforts will generate revenues reducing the amount of tax money presently supporting the operation of this hospital.

Status: Board has budgeted for computer system to handle this and other health care business functions and is awaiting action by the commissioners court.

3. Begin efforts to qualify the hospital for re-certification under Medicare.

Status: On March 9, 1992, the administrator received word that Crockett County Hospital had been re-certified for Medicare effective Jan. 17, 1992.

4. Locate all physicians in the county-owned clinic building.

Status: Both physicians began operating out of the clinic building in May of 1991.

5. Begin preliminary steps to recruit an additional physician to the community.

Status: The Board is presently consulting with a physician search team.

6. Establish specialty clinics where selected medical specialists (urology, internal medicine, cardiol-
