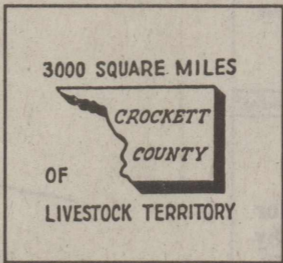

## International Mohair group visits Childress Ranch



People from diverse backgrounds came together in San Antonio last week with a common goal, the promotion of mohair.

The International Mohair Association conference received high praise from international visitors who came to Ozona Friday. Forty guests extended their stay in Texas to travel through the Hill Country with stops at the Robin Giles Ranch near Comfort, the Joe David Ross Ranch at Sonora, Sonora Wool and Mohair and the Bob Childress Ranch south of Ozona.

Childress, who has just stepped down after two terms as chairman of the International Mohair Association, his wife Jodie, and Carmen and Jeffrey Sutton entertained their guests with an evening meal served outdoors.

Visitors were also given the opportunity to see varied age groups of Childress' Angora goats. The goats

were brought before the visitors by Childress and a stock dog.

Among the guests was Michael Grobler of Jansenville, South Africa.

Grobler is the new chairman of IMA. Grobler was elected chairman and

Jeffrey Sutton vice-chairman at the San Antonio meeting. Peter Halstead of Bradford, England also continues to serve as vice-chairman.

"People are more positive and committed since the conference," Grobler said. The world's top mohair exporters, processor and manufacturers of mohair products were in attendance along with U. S. mohair trade representatives who sponsored conference events. Sponsors included 11 buyer firms, four processors, nine shippers and brokers, 17 warehouses, 12 banks, three producer organizations, a state agency, insurance agents and animal health suppliers.

A fashion show featuring an international collection for the winter holiday market and an international trade show were among the highlights of the conference.

Brian May, executive director of the Mohair Council, was appreciative of media attention the conference received. Five newspapers and three television stations gave firsthand coverage. Front page coverage from Woman's Wear Daily also resulted from the event.

"I know for sure that some sales were made (during the June 7-10 conference)," May said.

The U. S. produces 42 percent of the world's mohair with South Africa

producing 40 percent. However, that country has had about a 50 percent reduction since 1990 because of drought Grobler said. Animals that are producing are producing considerably less, according to Grobler.

Worldwide cuts in mohair production from 57.2 million pounds in 1988 to 36 million now have resulted in reduced revenues of firms contributing to IMA, Grobler said. The association will continue to use its resources for product development and policing the use of the IMA mohair label in garments.

"We have the trademark in 36 countries and people are constantly trying to cheat and use the label," said M. S. Binns, who is sales and marketing director for Sirdar of West Yorks, England.

IMA labs test the qualities of IMA labeled products around the world to ensure the quality of the items and preserve the integrity of the label.

IMA, headquartered in Ilkley, England, was organized in 1974. The San Antonio conference was the first held in the U. S. since 1984. Approximately 430 delegates attended from the United Kingdom, Australia, Japan, South Africa, Germany, India, Lesotho, Taiwan, Turkey, Switzerland, New Zealand, France, Argentina and China.

## Court selects architect for roof replacement

Commissioners chose Jack E. Meek as the architect for replacement of hospital and care center roofs Monday. The action was taken in an 8 a.m. called meeting.

In his proposal, Meek stated that he believes a new metal roof (Standing Seam Galvalume) and resulting sub-structure will cost about \$118,000 and the plumbing, electrical and mechanical will cost about \$82,000. His fee will range between 7 and 10 percent depending on responsibilities according to the proposal dated May 11.

Meek estimates eight months until the project is completed.

Two motions were approved in connection with the roof replacement.

Fred Deaton moved, seconded by Dick Kirby, to use an architect firm to design roof for medical facilities and

draft specifications based on demonstrated competence and qualifications.

Sostenes De Hoyos moved and Fred Deaton seconded to select Jack Meeks, architect, at cost plus 10 percent.

## Trustees hire basketball coach

In a special meeting of the Ozona School Board on Monday, June 1, trustees approved the employment of Dickie Faught as head girls basketball coach in Ozona High School. Faught is a 1980 graduate of Angelo State

University and has coaching experience in Klondike, Brownfield and Hereford. While at Brownfield, his girls' basketball team won the Class AAA state championship in 1988. (Continued on page 7)

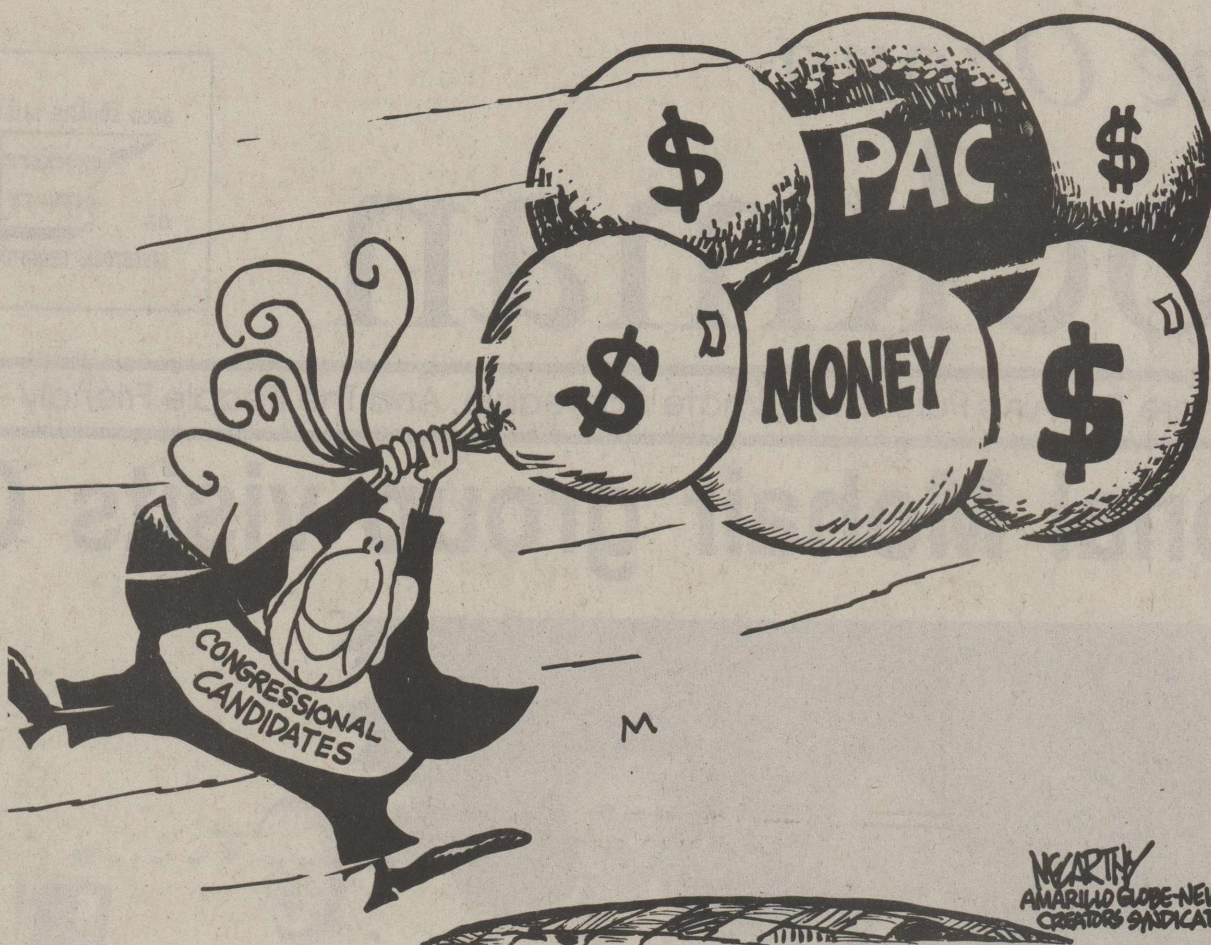

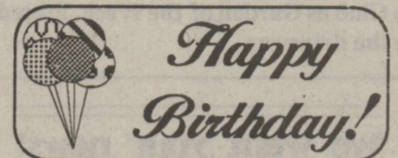

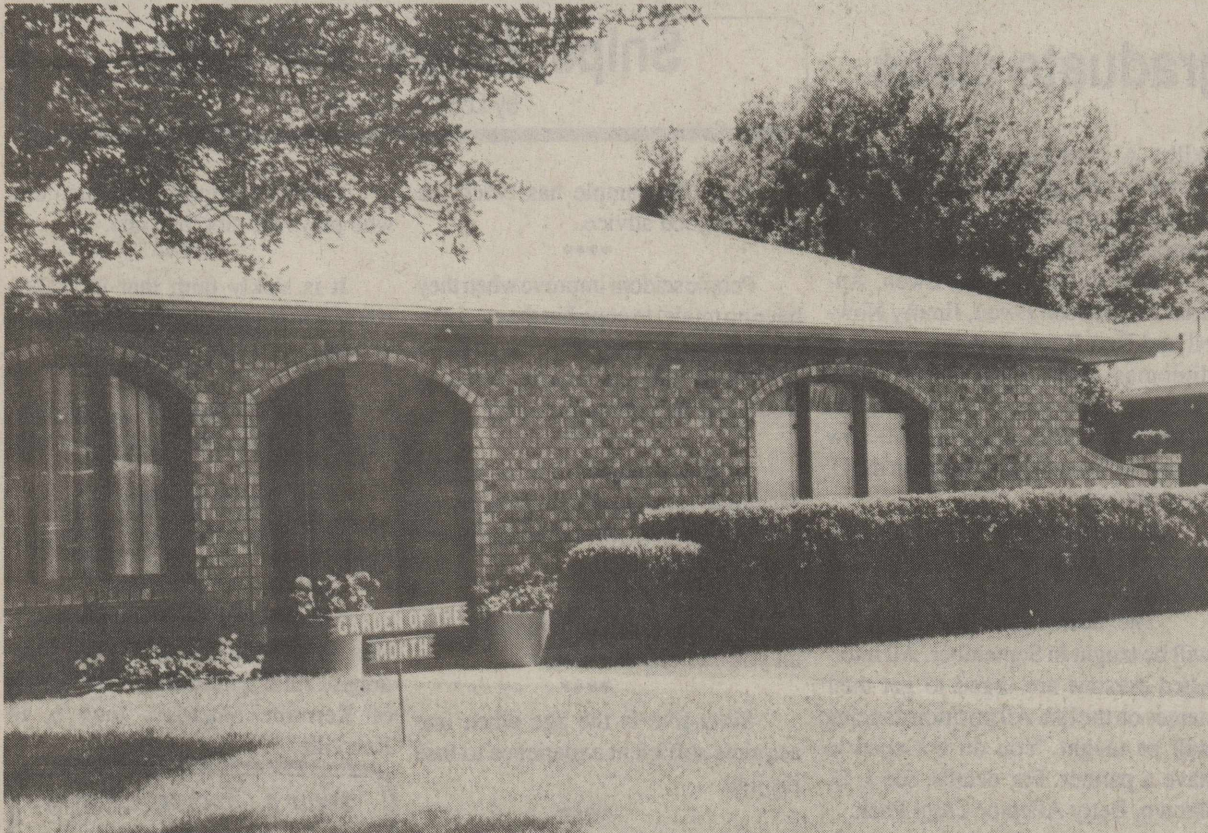

## Betrayal Of The Cross

"While I was with you, I was determined to know only Jesus Christ and Him nailed to a cross" - I Corinthians 2:2 (AAT)

In chapter one, the Apostle Paul indicates that a proud and boastful spirit was taking hold of the Corinthian Christian's hearts. Their claims: "I belong to Paul," "I belong to Apol-

los," "I belong to Peter" (Verse 12), expressed their thoughts of belonging to a greater and wiser teacher than others. They probably still used words about the Cross, but according to St. Paul, this wasn't enough. It WAS the Cross - not Paul, not Apollos, not Peter - who determined who they were: redeemed children of God. The power of God is found in the word of the Cross (Verse 18), not in skills, oratory, or charisma. Had they forgotten this - and so betrayed the Cross?

Have we done the same? The power of God for changing lives lies in the Gospel (Romans 1:16) - the

Word of the Cross, not in distinguished qualities, talents, or showmanship of a certain leader. One thing lies at the root of a truly new and lasting relationship with God. It is the act of faith by which we throw aside all human pretensions, and not trust in our wisdom but in that strange and mysterious power of God revealed in Jesus Christ crucified for our sins - and risen for our justification (being declared righteous before God).

PRAYER: O God, keep us from evaluations which are worldly and have no place in the Christian community - and keep our eyes upon the Cross of Christ. Amen.

## Rabies remains a danger

Through the first five months of this year, 64 rabid animals have been reported from 10 of the 36 counties in Public Health Region 3. From January through May of last year, these same counties had reported 48 rabies cases.

Nearly one-half of this year's rabies cases have been skunks. Other reported wild animals with rabies have been foxes, bobcats, raccoons, a ring-tail and a bat. Twelve rabies cases have been reported in domestic pets and livestock.

Reported cases for Crockett County remain at one skunk and one bobcat. In Sutton County, there were reports of rabies in eight skunks, two foxes, one goat and one llama.

Other counties with rabies cases in Region 3 are: Coke, one cat; McCulloch, one bovine; Pecos, two foxes, one skunk, one dog; Concho, four skunks; Kimble, three skunks, three foxes, two bobcats, two goats, two cats, one dog and one ringtail; Menard, three foxes; Schleicher, three skunks, two bobcats, one raccoon, one cat, one bovine; Tom Green, 10 skunks,

In the preceding 10 year period, rabies in these counties occurred most frequently during March, April and May. The number of rabies cases rapidly decreases beginning in June and continuing through September. While fewer cases of rabies can be expected for the remainder of the year, the outbreak is not over. Rabies in both livestock and wild animals has already been reported this month from Schleicher and Kimble counties.

Pet owners are reminded that all dogs and cats must be vaccinated against rabies every year. People should avoid contact with any unfamiliar or strange acting wild or domestic animal.

Anyone with questions about rabies is urged to contact their physician, veterinarian, local health department or the Public Health Region 3 office of the Texas Department of Health (915-774-6243).

Two former 4-H members from Crockett County received some good news at Roundup. It was announced at the Tuesday night opening assembly that Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H scholarships will be in-

creased from \$8,000 to \$10,000 beginning this year and this will be made retroactive for students currently attending school on these scholarships. Both Tamie Reagor and John Williams attend Texas A&M University on Houston scholarships, and will receive additional amounts because of this decision.

This announcement brought the total for 116 scholarships given through the Texas 4-H Foundation this year to a total of \$977,000. Ulmer and Reagor said, "We expect to have several recipients next year."

## Kids participate in hunter education course

The annual Texas Parks and Wildlife Hunter Education Course was held at the Gene Perry Ranch June 5, 6 and 7. The main goal of hunter education is to produce safe, knowledgeable, responsible, and involved hunters.

Effective Sept. 1, hunters whose birth is during the period Sept. 2, 1971, through Aug. 31, 1975, must have successfully completed a hunter education course to hunt in Texas.

Activities began with registration at 8 a.m., Friday. Game Warden Robert Newman from Marfa explained that the two objectives of this course are "to increase your awareness of hunter education in Texas and North America and to give information relative to hunting opportunities, administration and management efforts in Texas."

Sutton County Chief of Police Brent Gesch spoke to the students about firearms and ammunition. His objectives were to give a firm understanding of the right and wrong way to handle and care for modern-day firearms. He also gave a review of firearm and ammunition parts and functions.

Marksmanship and big game vital areas were taught by instructor James Montgomery. He spoke about vital shots and vital areas of white-tail deer. Field demonstrations were performed by game wardens Joe Wallace, Robert Newman, Al Vielma, instructors James Montgomery, Bob Harris, Dorris Haire, and Parks and Wildlife Biologist Mary Humphrey. Hunting videos were shown and also a demonstration on the care of game and proper field dressing was presented by Mr. Montgomery and Warden Vielma.

Slide presentations on wildlife management principles and a range tour were conducted by Mrs. Humphrey. She also spoke about

snakes and endangered wildlife. Mr. Doug Meador spoke about snake handling and also demonstrated how to handle a rattlesnake.

The handling of handguns, private ownership of firearms and firearm responsibility was discussed by area chief Dr. Beir of Del Rio.

Sunday morning devotional was brought by Rodney Hamon of Ozona Church of Christ.

Students were assigned first aid stations to get a basic understanding of how to avoid, prepare for, or handle a survival or first aid situation in the outdoors. Students learned that the key to survival is being prepared and staying calm. Subjects covered were

bleeding, broken bones, burns, carbon monoxide poisoning, cardiac arrest, chest wounds, cold and hot weather hazards, cuts and scratches and fish hook removal. The use of maps and compasses was also learned.

Archery and bow hunting was discussed by Mr. Montgomery. Black-powder and muzzle loading was taught by Mr. Dennis Clark. Field demonstrations were held and the students were given a chance to try their hand at each station.

An examination requiring a score

of at least 70 was given and following a short swim students, instructors, and guests enjoyed a delicious goat barbecue prepared by Neal Ulmer, Justin Moran, Chief Cook and Deputy Harvey Hill and Mrs. Virginia Gotcher.

Awards and certificates were given and students were dismissed. Twenty-three students attended. Del Rio, Marfa, Pandale, San Angelo, Sonora and Ozona were cities represented. Certification is good for life and accepted in other states and Canadian provinces.

The board discussed the employment of a high school counselor to take the place of Jack Probst, and the members voted to go outside the school system to employ an experienced high school counselor for this position.

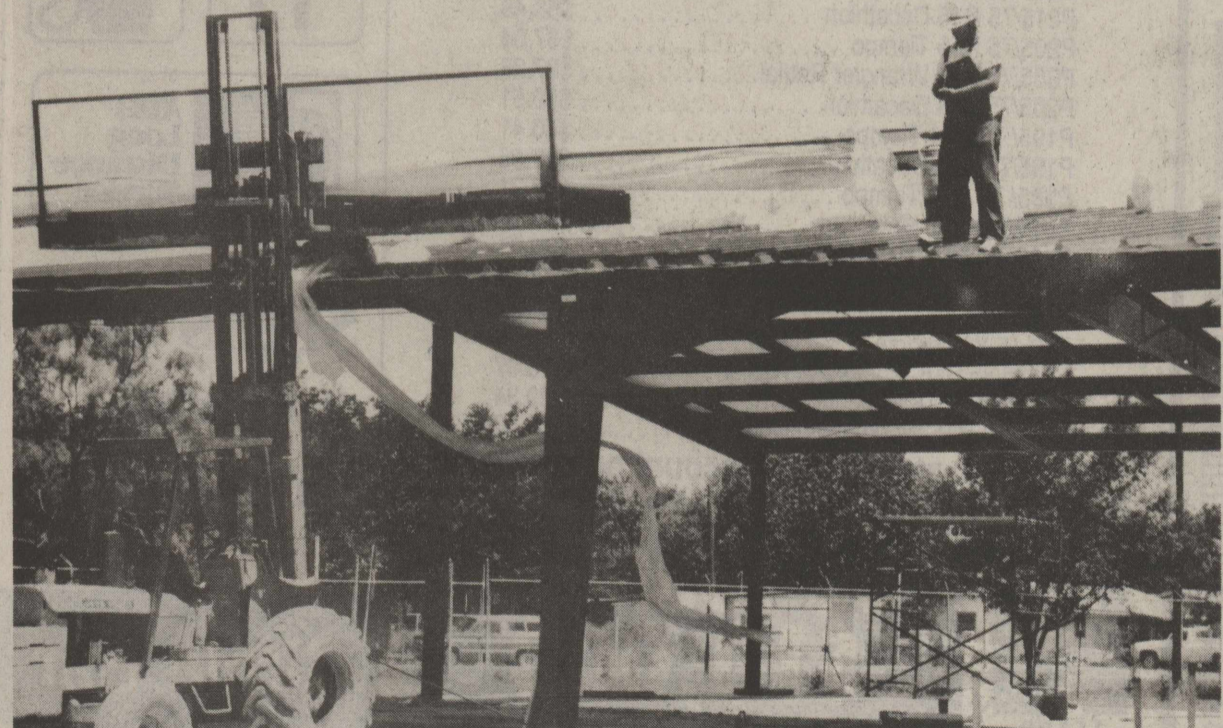

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

## Cholera advisory issued for travelers

Public Health Region 3 of the Texas Department of Health is issuing an advisory to persons anticipating traveling into Mexico, Central or South America. These areas are experiencing cases of cholera and travelers are advised to take special precautions to help avoid exposure to this disease.

Cholera is caused by bacteria which are transmitted to people by food or water which has been contaminated with the feces or vomitus of persons with the disease. Symptoms of cholera include large amounts of very watery diarrhea, vomiting, muscle cramps, shock, severe dehydration and, without prompt treatment, possibly death.

Travelers should take these precautions:

1. Use only boiled or properly chlorinated water for drinking, cooking or brushing teeth. Beverages containing water or ice cubes should be avoided. Carbonated beverages in clean dry containers are usually safer than drinking untreated or unboiled

water.

2. Eat only well-cooked foods which are still hot when served. Do not eat raw or undercooked seafood or any food from a street vendor.

3. Wash hands after every trip to the bathroom.

Most cases of cholera in the current outbreak have been reported from Central and South America. A few

cases have occurred in the United States.

Anyone who develops symptoms of cholera while traveling or within one week after returning to the United States should seek medical attention promptly.

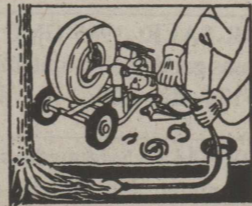

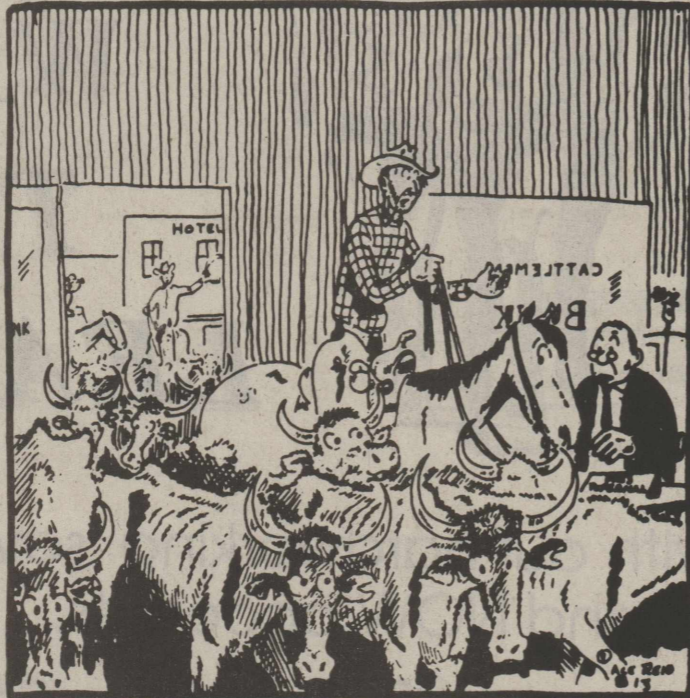

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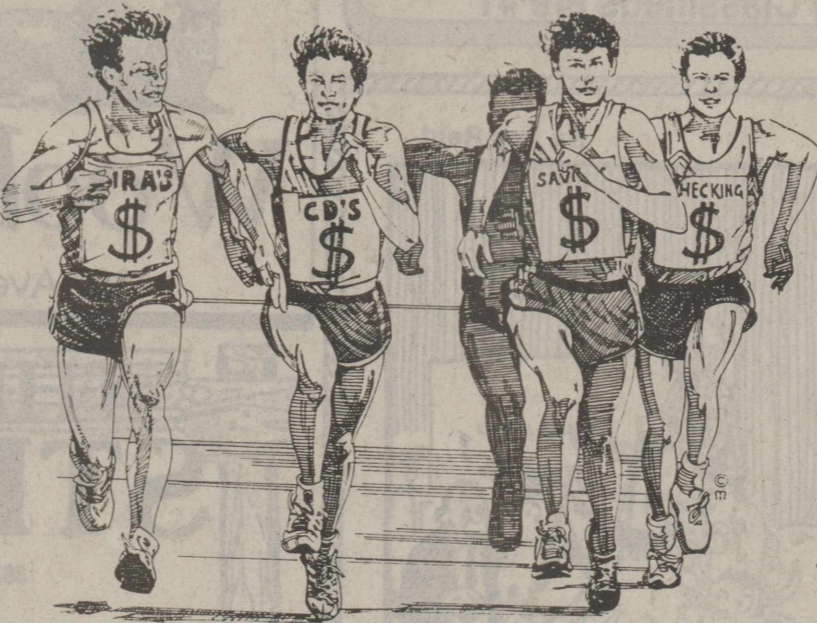
