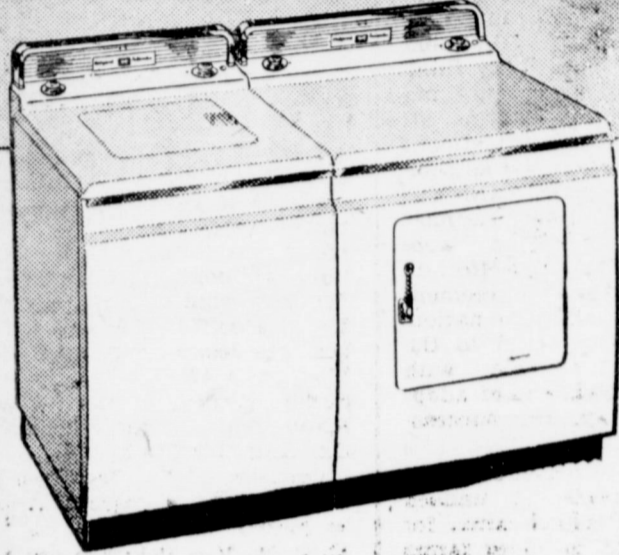

### Parmer County Farm Bureau News

8,719.178 acres of cotton will likely be planted in Texas this year under revised legislation. 7,376.858 acres, the original allotment figure under which you received your allowable figures, were 1,342,320 under the new figure.

We were not aware until recently, of the fact that some farmers thought the allotment they received was possibly final. The Secretary of Agriculture and all legislators were stating almost daily that some adjustment would have to be made as soon as congress convened. Farm Bureau leaders, knowing adjustments would be made, were working steadily in an effort to reach an equitable agreement with cotton growers of the nation that could be presented to the Agricultural Committee with reasonable expectations of adoption. The effort was very successful.

Included in the provision is the privilege of release of unused acreage of individual farms for reapportionment to other farms

in 1954 and 1955 without the individual being penalized when future allotments are calculated.

Farm Bureau recommendations were: 1. One per cent of the national acreage reserved as relief acreage on small farms. 2. Authorization for the Secretary to count underplanting and abandonment in determining the minimum national marketing quota. (As a consequence of rejection of the last recommendation, it is likely that the national allotment for 1955 will be around 17.9 million acres.) However, with the opportunity of distributing allotments on a history basis and with both county and state reserves to relieve hardship cases, the difficulties of 1954 will not be encountered in 1955.

We hope to be able to reduce the lines devoted to COTTON after this week.

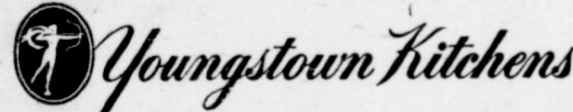

**Farmers Return Cotton Burrs And Waste From Gins Back To Soil**

(From Amarillo Daily News) "This is the best thing that ever happened to the land in Bailey County," said J. K. Adams as he surveyed a field that had just received an application of five tons of cotton waste — burrs, stems, waste and dirt. In Bailey and several other Plains cotton counties, a growing trend to return cotton wastes from the gin to the soil has been noted. The trend was accelerated by reports of increased yields on irrigated land by as much as one and one-half bales per acre.

Once regarded as a bothersome and expensive nuisance to be disposed of by burning, gin wastes are rapidly gaining recognition as the way to better soil and bigger yields.

But returning the material to the soil at first posed a big problem. Equipment to spread the burrs evenly at a rate of four, five or more tons per acre was not available. Labor for doing the job by hand was scarce. Specially built spreaders, ordinarily operated by custom spreading firms or individual ginners, have recently been built to perform the job. Custom spreading rates in most areas have been established at \$1.50 per ton, with rates slightly higher for long hauls.

Pink bollworm restrictions in the past have heavily curtailed the return of cotton wastes to the soil. This year, however, the Bureau of Entomology has approved the practice provided the burrs are either composted or hammermilled at the gin. And ginners report that there aren't enough burrs to meet the demand.

The decomposed burrs improve land two ways. The soil is improved by the addition of organic matter and takes and gives up water to plants more readily than does untreated earth. And with a mineral content equal to that of feed lot cattle manure, considerable amounts of nitrogen phosphate and potash are returned to the soil, according to Adams.

Studies of moisture penetration recently conducted at the Spur Experiment Station on test plots covered with cotton residues showed that at rates of 4, 8 and 10 tons to the acre, cotton burrs increased moisture penetration to 28, 30 and 39

inches, respectively. Untreated plots showed moisture depth only to 16 inches.

One of the outstanding yield increases has been reported from Bailey County's Maple Community, where Delbert Richardson harvested 40 bales from 20 acres that had been fertilized with 300 pounds of nitrogen and super phosphate and 20 tons of cotton burrs on each acre.

Eight of 18 gins in Bailey this season composted their burrs, using methods recommended by Extension Service technicians. As a result some 24 million pounds of cotton residue will be returned to enrich about 2,500 acres. An application of super phosphate fertilizer is being applied to further decomposition after the burrs are spread on fields. Ginners usually make no charge for composting, but ordinarily charge \$1 per ton for hammermilling.

Fred C. Elliott, cotton work specialist for the Texas Extension Service, said that gins can operate their own spreading equipment to the benefit of the ginner and grower. He points out that the best burr incinerators cost \$8,000 to build and \$1,000 a year to maintain. "An \$800 hopper is cheaper than an \$8,000 burner", Elliott reasons, "and the soil needs the organic matter".

Composting, the cheaper process for preparing the material for return to the soil, results in the burrs decomposing to a soil returnable stage. Temperatures in the burr piles rise to the 150 to 180 degree range—enough to kill the bollworm larvae.

Two methods are in use in composting. Spraying water to high piled burrs gives satisfactory results, but bacterial solutions have been added at some gins to speed decomposition.

USDA ginning technicians and pink bollworm control workers are reportedly working to perfect methods of killing the dangerous pests by use of special equipment in gins. Perfection of a positive method of ending the menace is expected to increase the use of cotton wastes as an important soil builder on the Plains.

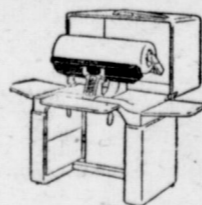

**A TIME FOR ALERTNESS**

Any program as extensive as the recent drouth relief hay shipments to Texas can have mixed results. It can do a lot of good and yet still have some harmful after-effects.

One danger lies in the spread of noxious weeds or plants to areas where they did not exist before. When hay is brought in from distant points, it is inevitable that some foreign plants are mixed with that hay. And they can be a real bother if they get a foothold in Texas fields.

There are several precautionary measures a farmer or rancher can use to prevent this spread. When practical, only one area of the pasture or barnyard should be used as a feeding site. This area can be watched closely, and if weed seeds are present in the hay, it will be a simple matter

to eradicate the resulting plant growths.

Caution also should be used when using barnyard fertilizer in the fields. Many undesirable weed seeds can pass unharmed through the digestive tracts of livestock and germinate in the ground.

If this fertilizer is used, it should be spread in designated areas and a close watch kept on it. Any new or unusual plants found in the field is a potential threat to the land.

Studies show that the shipment of agricultural commodities from one state to another is the prime cause of weed and insect spreading. The opportunity is especially ripe in Texas this year.

Although only about 81 counties have received these disaster shipments this winter, the facts

are that foreign plants can spread alarmingly in a new area in a very short time.

This coming spring is the time to begin a sharp lookout for strange weeds that might have slipped into the state in drouth relief hay. The farmer who takes the necessary precautions protects not only himself, but also his neighbor, and his state as a whole.

**Grain Storage On Farm May Be Carried 5 Years**

Taxpayers farmers may choose to "write-off" over a 60-month period the cost of building or reconstructing a grain storage facility. This ruling, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, was provided by recent tax law changes and may be used instead of the regular depreciation rate based on the useful life of a building.

Bates gives this example to further clarify the new ruling. Instead of depreciating a \$3,000 building at \$100 per year for 30 years, he says a new storage building may be "written-off", or depreciated out, in 60 months, five years. Figuring it this way that's \$600 per year for five years. But, continues the specialist, at the end of this time the building value is fully depreciated and may not be reported thereafter.

Under the new law, a grain storage facility includes any corn crib, grain bin or similar structure suitable for the storage of grain crops. Adapting another structure for grain storage or enlarging an existing building is also considered construction. The ruling is effective if the building is erected within the calendar years 1953-56, inclusive, he says.

If a taxpayer decides to "write-off" the cost he must include in his income tax returns a statement of his actions. Likewise, continues Bates, he may discontinue the rapid write-off rate at the beginning of any month specified in a notice filed with the Secretary of Treasury. The farmer will thereafter be entitled to use the normal ratio of depreciation on the remaining building cost.

Bates says competent accountants and representatives of the Internal Revenue Service have additional information on grain storage "write-offs" and he advises interested farmers to make further investigations into this new law.

**Hog Prices May Dip Slightly**

Increased hog marketings caused by expanding pig crops form a prediction that raisers may receive slightly lower prices for hogs in 1954.

Prices for hogs were higher in 1953 than in any year, excepting 1947 and 1948. The primary reason for this, explains John G. McHaney, assistant extension economist was that hog production had declined for two years and the 1953 pig crop was the smallest in five years.

Production now, however, he points out, is trending upward. Farrowings last fall were above a year ago. And, a five to 10 per cent increase is expected this spring. By mid-1954, McHaney foresees slaughterings above the 1953 rate.

From the consumer standpoint, this means that pork supplies will be greater late this year and prices may drop—but only slightly.

A slight decline in sheep and lambs on farms was noted at the beginning of the year. As a result, the economist says fewer sheep and lambs will be put on the block this year and mutton prices should stay about in line with those of '53.

**Soil Testing Time Here Again**

High crop yields at lower cost in 1954 are possible for farmers who follow the example of many successful growers and use the free soil testing service at Texas A & M College.

When money becomes tight, some farmers are inclined to re-

duce their expenditures for fertilizer, says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist.

This isn't the best reasoning, he points out, because food and fiber, especially at this time, must be produced more economically. Experiment station tests show much greater financial returns from crops properly fertilized than from crops supplemented with little or no plant food.

Thornton continues that this is the time to collect soil samples and send them to the laboratory. It gives the lab enough time to analyze the sample and return recommendations so the farmer may use the information in buying fertilizers. About three weeks should be allowed for a reply.

Thornton says the laboratory in 1953 analyzed and made recommendations on 7,989 samples.

A soil analysis determines organic matter and mineral content in soil. Upon knowing these levels and the crop to be planted on the field from which the sample was taken, the lab can make the correct recommendation.

Forms for submitting samples, together with sampling instructions are available at any county agricultural agent's office.

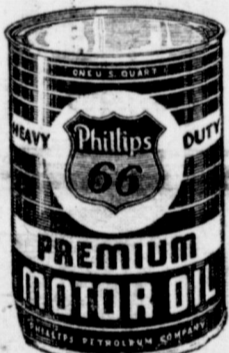

economy, the first real victims are farmers and small businessmen. That is why we must keep a close watch for economic danger signals.

The present is being called a period of "transition", of "readjustment". In dealing with resulting problems, I want to make sure the transition is not from economic sunshine to economic gloom—that we do not readjust ourselves into a recession.

### FARM INCOME:

Cash income of Texas farmers was 17 per cent less in the first 11 months of 1953 than in the same period of 1952, reports the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. That was a decline of close to a quarter of a billion dollars.

We had a drought, of course, but falling farm prices were mainly responsible for the drop in income. Overall prices for all farm products went down by 14 per cent during the year.

When farmers receive less total income—and when prices paid for their products keep going down—those are danger signals in any language.

### SAFEGUARDS:

Fortunately, we have machinery for combatting a recession if the threat of one should become imminent.

Many economic safeguards have been set up by the Government during the last 20 years. We have the know-how—gained from experience—to fight the threat of depressed economic conditions, and to fight it successfully. We must be ready to use this know-how if the neces-

## Farmers With No Established Cotton Allotment May File Application Now

An owner or operator of a farm for which a cotton acreage allotment has not been established for 1954 may file an application for such a cotton allotment under certain conditions, H. E. Schuster, Chairman of the Bailey County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said today.

All such applications will receive careful consideration, the Chairman explained, but to be eligible for the allotment, the owner or operator in such a case

must meet the following conditions: He must depend upon his farm operations for a livelihood, he must not have any other farm which already has a cotton allotment, and he must not have on file in the County ASC Office a similar application for a cotton allotment on any other farm in the County which he owns or operates.

Applications for such "new" Cotton Acreage Allotments must be filed in the County ASC Office not later than February 5, 1954, Mr. Schuster said.

Under the 1954 cotton marketing quota program, approved by growers in a national referendum last December, all cotton farmers are subject to the quotas, which operate through acreage allotments. Farmers who comply with their cotton allotments may market free all the cotton they grow. Cotton grown by farmers who do not comply with their allotments will be subject to a penalty on each pound of their "excess" cotton.

**SOCIAL SECURITY:** President Eisenhower's Social Security message was sent to Congress just three days before the nineteenth anniversary of the day in 1935 when the idea was first proposed to the lawmakers. President Roosevelt told Congress in 1935 that the job could not all be done at once, that there would be continuing need for improvements in the program. President Eisenhower said in his message, "The human problems of individual citizens are a proper and important concern of our Government." That is the policy upon which the program has stood from its beginning.

Some 30 million persons were covered when the first Social Security Act was passed. Now 70 million persons are covered. President Eisenhower has proposed a substantial addition to that number.

### OPEN-MINDNESS:

We hear a lot about the wisdom of looking at everything with an open mind. It's a good policy, all right. But we must be careful not to confuse an open mind with a vacant mind.

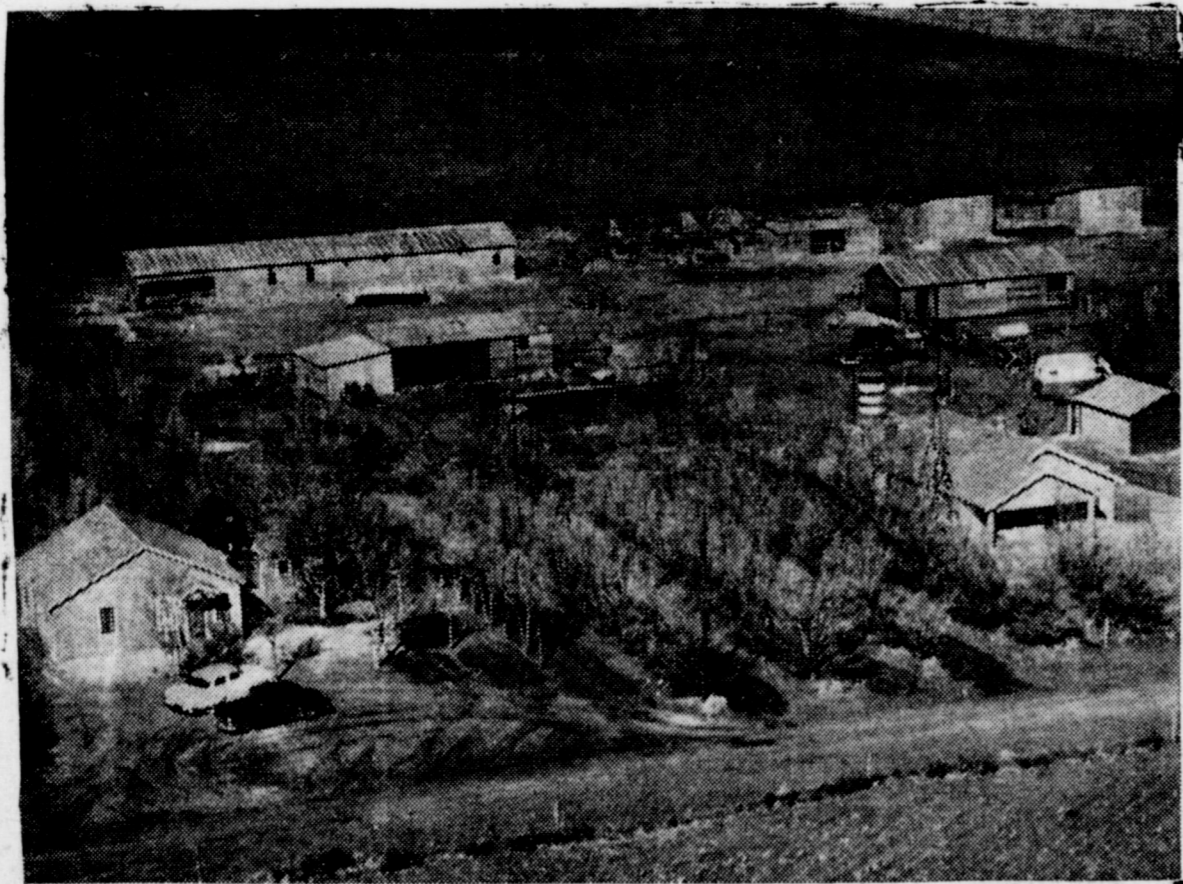

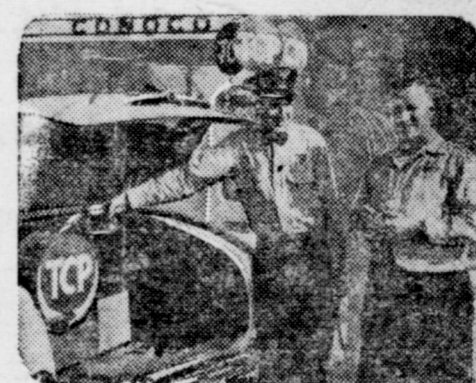

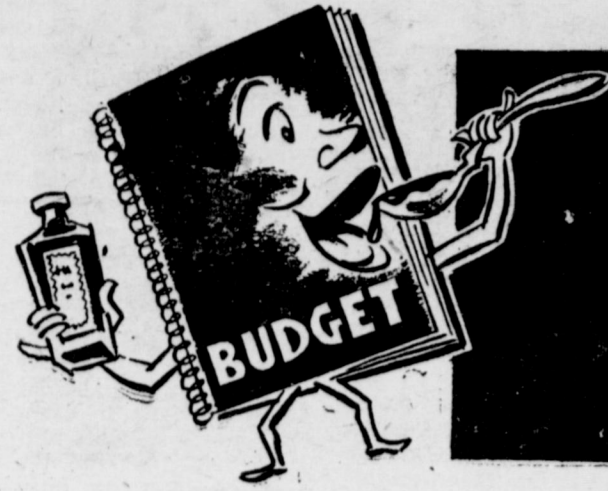

### Good Neighbor Program Praised In Farm Magazine

The good neighbor policy of Bailey County cotton farmers is described in the February issue of the Progressive Farmer magazine.

In the article "Water, Neighbors, and Gardens", Mrs. Louise Allen tells how farmers in the southern half of the county hardly made crops last year, but in the irrigated section the cotton averaged about a bale per acre. Under the leadership of presi-

dent W. T. Millen, the Bailey County Farm Bureau put a good neighbor plan to work. Those with cotton donated seed to be distributed in the drought-stricken areas of the county. About 1,200 bushels of cotton seed was donated. Gins agreed to catch the seed in trucks and to "swap" donated seed for stormproof seed if requested.

The seed, stored at a warehouse in Enochs, will be distributed at planting time according to the needs. It should provide for the planting of 1,200 to 2,400 acres of cotton in the southern half of the county this year.

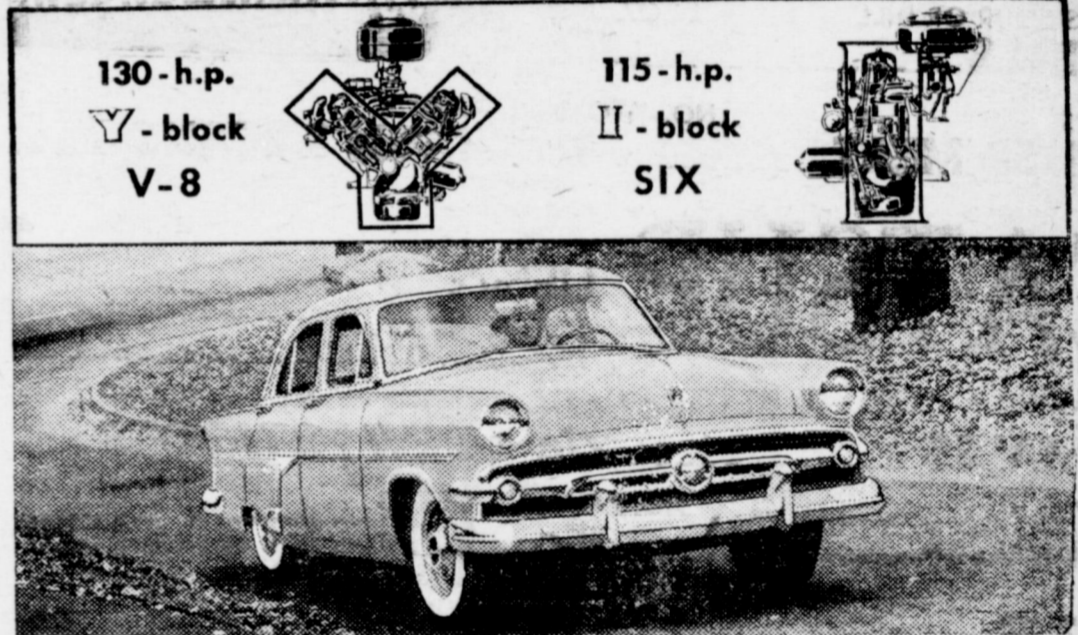

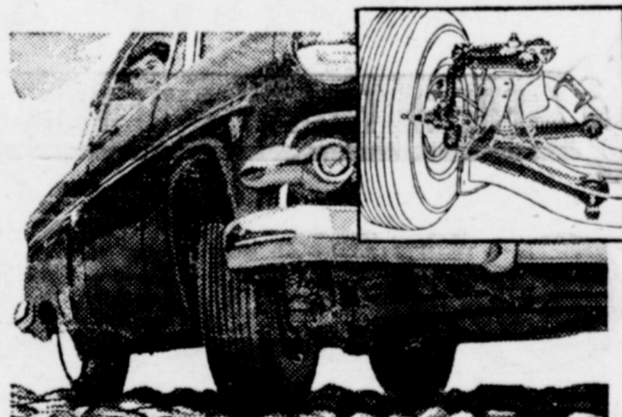
The next meeting will be at the home of Helen Gardner, and she will be in charge.
