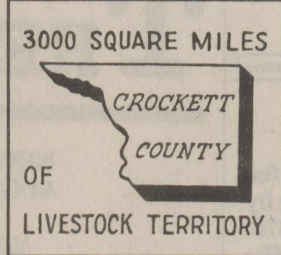

Firemen battle well blowout Sunday night

Ozona volunteer firemen responded with two trucks and the emergency van Sunday evening at 6:54 to a fire at Tucker Drilling Company rig #11 operating for Enron on Henderson Lease #2701 southwest of Ozona. The glow of the fire could be seen as far away as 20 miles as reported by a mobile amateur radio operator traveling I-10.

The well, which blew out with tremendous force around 6 p.m., knocked the flow line loose, causing the gas to exit near the substructure and ignite. When firemen arrived at the scene at 7:19 p.m., residue oil on the engines and substructure was on fire and there was concern that a butane and a diesel tank on location were in danger of exploding.

Fire marshal Steve Kenley, after arriving on the scene, decided that the fire was too large for the department to put out, and Pool Company was called to bring as many trucks as they could spare with as much water as they could get. Haliburton services were also called to the location with a pump kill truck.

"After the water trucks arrived, Ozona volunteers pumped an estimated 38,000 gallons of water over a four hour period using 1-1/2 inch lines to cool the substructure, the 1000 gallon propane tank and the 3000

gallon diesel tank," said Kenley. "The tanks were really never in any danger of exploding," he said.

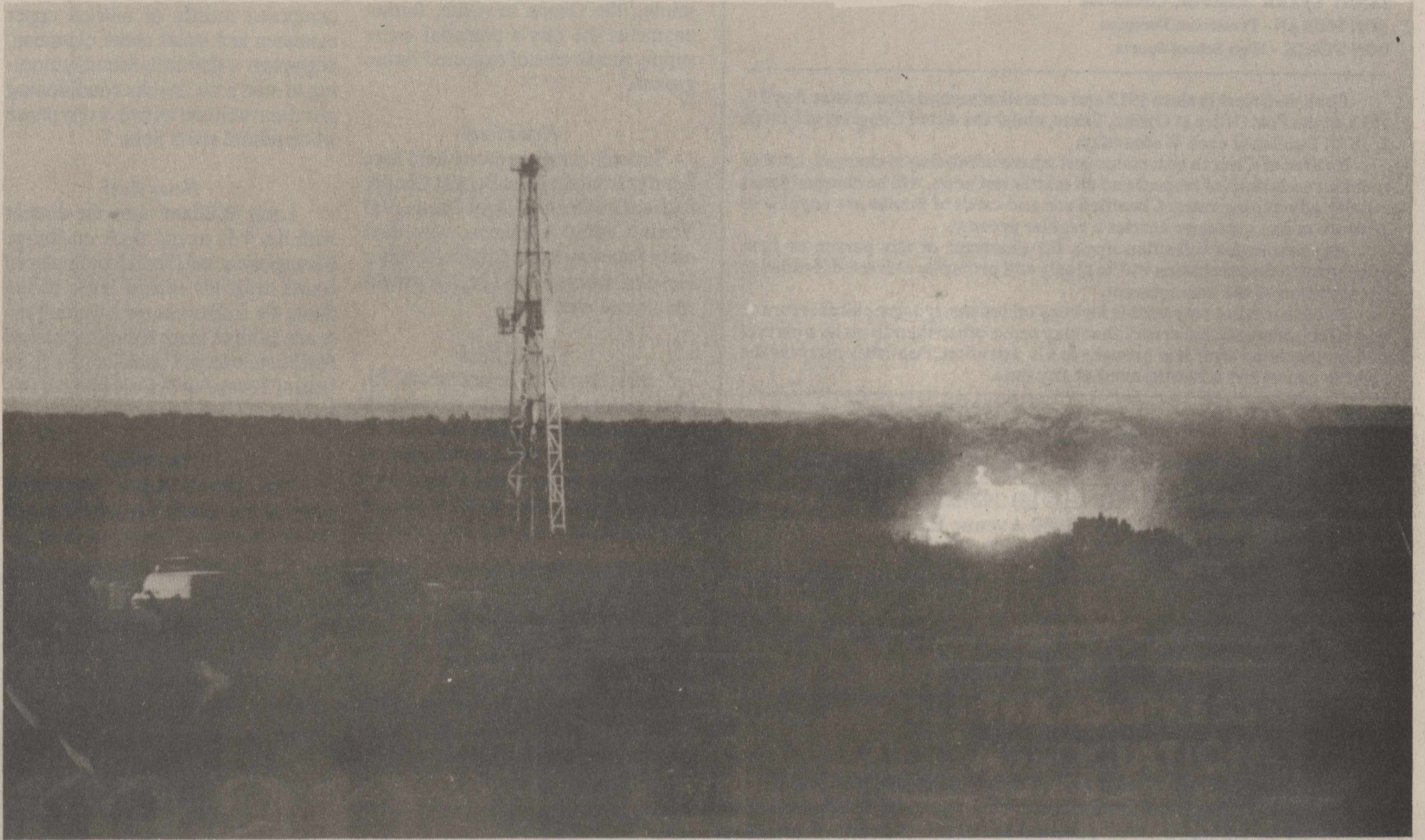
The resulting roar produced by the escaping gas and fire caused the ground to tremble. "The roar was so loud that you could shout directly into a person's ear, and he couldn't hear you," the marshal reported. "I finally learned from one of the rig hands that they had ear plugs and muffs in the dog house which I got for the firemen to wear."

After the Haliburton truck arrived, volunteers kept the area and the company employees cool with water spray as they connected their lines to pump sludge into the hole.

"Haliburton pumped for at least an hour before the sludge started making any difference," Kenley said. The fire stopped at 12:12 a.m., and it took about an hour longer before the gas was shut in, Kenley reported.

The volunteers were back at the station at 1 a.m. and one truck was back in service at 2:15. The second truck was taken to the county shop for pump repairs.

Kenley reported that a Haliburton man said the fire department "did a heck of a job" keeping things safe for them during the hook-up and pumping operation.



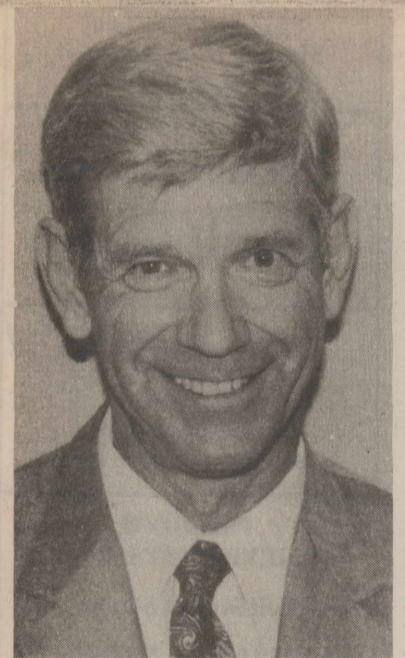

Hospital-care center survey responses prove valuable

The Crockett County Hospital-Care Center has received 438 responses from the approximately 1,800 community health care surveys mailed to Crockett County residents the week of June 8, 1992. This response was higher than anyone had anticipated and shows the genuine concern for health care in Crockett County. The survey is proving to be extremely valuable to hospital-care center management in providing the care and services that the citizens of Ozona deserve and expect. Several changes have already been initiated as a result of the survey and several more are in the planning stages.

The vast majority of the respondents were positive about the services provided by the hospital and care center, although there were many suggestions for improvements. Only 3.4 percent suggested closing the hospital. Respondents ranked the

ambulance and nursing services good to excellent. The majority of the people thought the hospital displayed general concern for the community. This same majority, however, were concerned with the business office, billing and insurance processing, and ranked these services low.

There was a number of respondents interested in specialty clinics. Those which ranked highest were cardiology, ear-nose-throat, general surgery, internal medicine, urology and orthopedics. Food services was considered to be good to excellent. The emergency room rated good to excellent and the overall evaluation of the care center was overwhelmingly positive and the suggestions for change were primarily for renovation and expansion.

Changes suggested in this community survey have already begun. Three Medicaid certified beds have been approved, bringing the care cen-

Sostenes DeHoyos presides in absence of county judge

Commissioners voted Monday night to make senior court member Sostenes DeHoyos presiding officer in the absence of Judge Kathryn Mayfield. Judge Mayfield is a patient at Community Hospital in San Angelo.

The order of the agenda was suspended to hear Mrs. Lucile Harrell's comments regarding Austin hearings next week on the fate of Fort Lancaster. The historic site has been slated for closure by the State Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Commissioners Fred Deaton and Dick Kirby plan to attend hearings to speak for continued state operation of the fort. Mrs. Harrell said she and Mrs. Geniece Childress will also attend.

Doug Meador and Nancy Moore will represent the Ozona Chamber of Commerce at the hearings.

Petitions circulated in the community asking that the state keep the park open have been signed by 979 people, Kirby said.

Dist. 65 State Representative Robert Turner of Coleman called The Stockman Friday to stress the need for

Ozonans to appear at the hearings despite a second proposal released that day calling for Lancaster's closure.

Commissioners discussed, then approved three rules concerning the fairgrounds pavilion and park. The court voted that there will be no dances or musical programs permitted on Sunday evening at the pavilion, no dances may be held past midnight, and the park area will be closed at 11 p.m.

A clarification of the pay policy for jail matrons was also put to a vote. Commissioners approved overtime pay for women matrons.

Judge Jim Hearne spoke to the court requesting an increase in the salary of his clerk, Nell Davee, to that equal to senior clerks in the court-house.

After discussion, the court agreed to follow through on a promise made at budget time last year to give a partial raise then and the remainder in the 1993 budget.

Entertainer George Strait roped in the event for the third year. There were 430 teams competing.

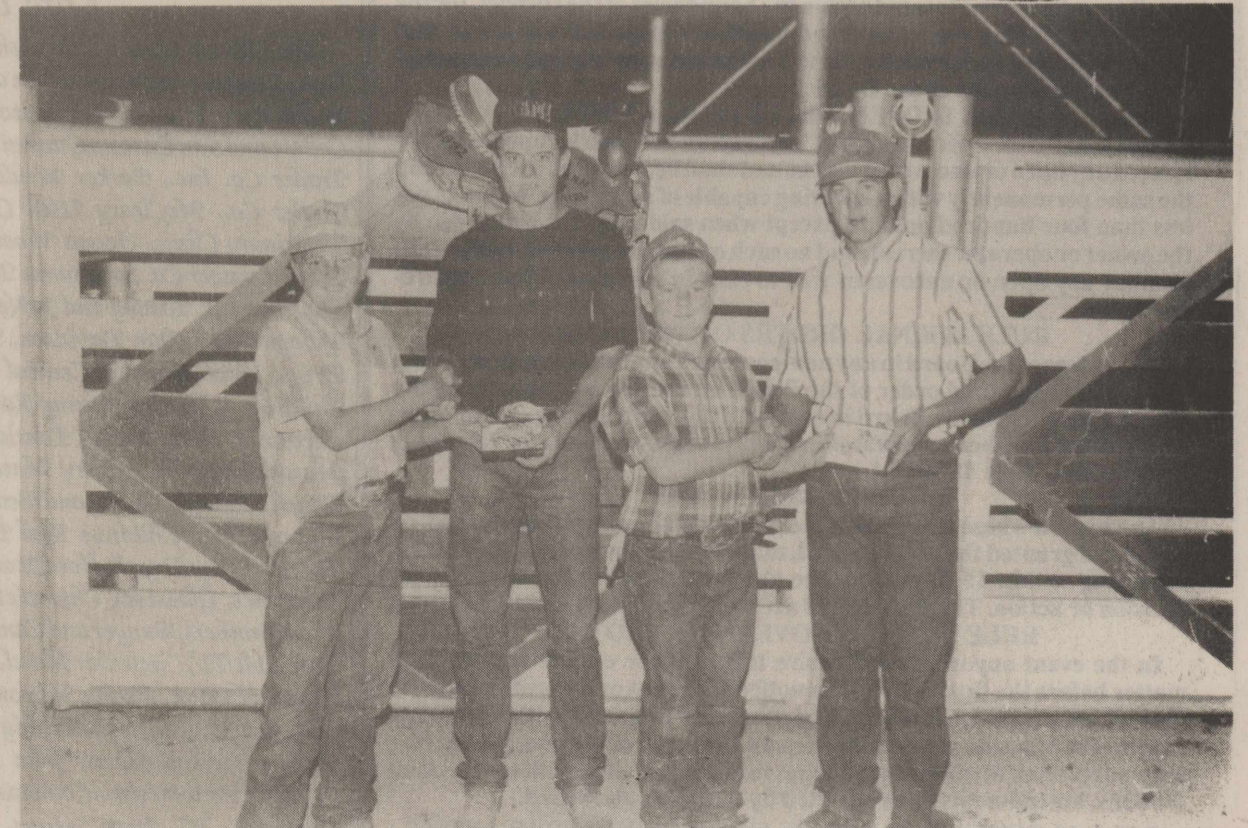
Proceeds of \$725 from the event went to the Crockett County Hospital

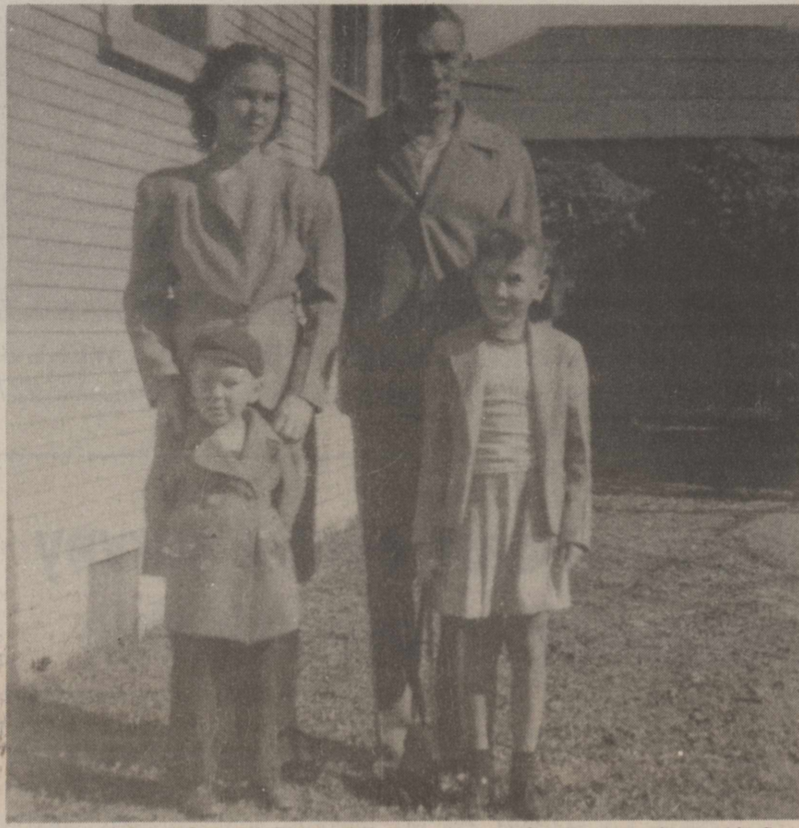

appear in person or by attorney or both. Evidence will be admitted if it is of that quality upon which reasonable persons are accustomed to rely in the conduct of serious affairs. The testimony shall be confined to the subject matter contained in the application or contest.

RULE 19 GENERAL RULES
RULE 20 WELL VALIDATION

The Board will provide for the validation of existing water wells that are subject to the rules and regulations of the Emerald Underground Water Conservation District provided that such wells were not drilled, equipped and operated in such a manner as to violate any other rules and regulations of the District.

RULE 21 WELL REGISTRATION

Application for Registration is required for all existing and future wells in the District and shall be filed with the District on a form and in the manner required by the District.

RULE 22 TRANSPORTATION OF WATER FROM THE DISTRICT

Every person must obtain a permit from the District for the transporting of water by pipeline, channel, ditch, watercourse or other natural or artificial facilities, or any combination of such facilities, if such water is produced from wells located or to be located within the District, and if all or any part of such water is used or is intended for use outside the boundaries of the District.

RULE 23 WELL DRILLING, COMPLETION, CAPPING AND PLUGGING

All well drillers and persons having a well drilled, deepened, or otherwise altered shall adhere to the rules prescribed by the District pertaining to location of wells and proper drilling, completion, capping, and plugging of wells.

RULE 24 REPORTING UNDESIRABLE WATER

Each licensed well driller shall immediately inform the landowner as well as the District when undesirable water has been encountered. 2c27

EMERALD

UNDERGROUND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

The Board of Directors of the Emerald Underground Water Conservation District on August 3, 1992 adopted the below mentioned proposed rules to facilitate the administration of groundwater laws of the State. Each rule as worded herein is a brief summary of the original rule. Any comments regarding these rules will be heard on September 14, 1992 at 6:00 PM at the District's office at 1102 Ave. I.

RULE 1 DEFINITIONS

RULE 2 WASTE

The flowing or producing of wells when the water produced therefrom is not used for a beneficial purpose or the pollution or harmful alteration of the character of the underground water reservoirs of the District.

RULE 3 PERMIT REQUIRED

No person shall hereafter begin to drill or drill a well, or increase the size of a well without first having applied for a permit.

RULE 4 DEPOSITS

Each application for a permit to drill a well shall be accompanied by a \$50.00 deposit. Said deposit will be returned to the applicant upon proper completion of the well and the return of the properly completed registration forms and well logs to the District office.

RULE 5 ISSUANCE OF PERMITS

The Board shall issue or cause to be issued a drilling permit for a well properly spaced upon proper application executed and filed by the owner with the District.

RULE 6 REQUIREMENTS OF DRILLER'S LOGS, CASING AND PUMP DATA

Complete records shall be kept and reports thereof made to the District concerning the drilling, production potential, equipping and completion of all wells drilled.

RULE 7 MINIMUM SPACING OF WELLS

No well shall be drilled such that said well shall be located nearer than 660' feet from the nearest property line nor shall there be more than a cumulative of 16 wells permitted per section.

RULE 8 EXCEPTION TO SPACING RULE

In order to protect vested property rights, to prevent waste, to prevent confiscation of property, or to protect correlative rights, the Board may grant exception to the above spacing regulations.

RULE 9 PLACE OF DRILLING OF WELL

After an application for a well permit has been granted, the well, if drilled, must be drilled within ten yards of the location specified in the permit, and not elsewhere.

RULE 10 REWORKING OR REPLACING OF WELL

No person shall rework, redrill, or re-equip a well in a manner that would increase the rate of production of such well without first having made an application to the Board, and having been granted a permit by the Board to do so.

RULE 11 TIME DURING WHICH A PERMIT SHALL REMAIN VALID

Any permit granted hereunder shall be valid if the work permitted shall have been completed within four months from the filing date of the application.

RULE 12 CHANGED CONDITIONS

The decision of the Board on any matter contained herein may be reconsidered by it on its own motion or upon motion showing changed conditions, or upon the discovery of new or different conditions or facts after the hearing or decision on such matter.

RULE 13 RIGHT TO INSPECT AND TEST WELLS

An authorized officer, employee, agent, or representative of the District shall have the right at all reasonable times to enter upon lands upon which a well or wells may be located within the boundaries of the District, for the purpose of making reasonable and necessary inspections and test that may be required or necessary for the information or the enforcement of rules and regulations of the District.

RULE 14 OPEN WELLS TO BE CAPPED

Every owner or operator of any land within the District upon which is located any open or uncovered well is, and shall be, required to close or cap the same permanently with a covering capable of sustaining weight of not less than four hundred pounds, except when said well is in actual use by the owner or operator thereof; and no such owner or operator shall permit or allow any open or uncovered well to exist in violation of this requirement.

RULE 15 FINAL ORDERS OF THE BOARD

The orders of the Board in any non-contested application or proceeding shall become the final order of the Board on the day it is entered by the Board. All orders of the Board in contested applications, appeals or other proceedings shall become final after 15 days unless a motion for rehearing is filed under Rule 18 hereof.

RULE 16 REHEARING

Any person whose application is denied, whose contest is overruled, or who is not granted the relief desired, may file with the Board a motion for rehearing within 15 days from the announcement by the Board of its decision or action. The Board shall act thereon within a reasonable time.

RULE 17 RULES GOVERNING PROTEST

In the event anyone should desire to protest or oppose any pending matter before the Board, a written notice of protest or opposition shall be filed with the Board. Protest shall be submitted in writing with a duplicate copy to the opposite party or parties. In the event of a contested hearing each party shall furnish other parties to the proceeding with a copy of all motions, amendments or briefs filed by him with the Board.

RULE 18 GENERAL RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR HEARING

Hearings will be conducted in such a manner as the Board deems most suitable to the particular case. Any party at interest in a proceeding, may

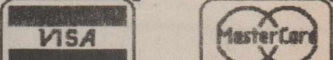

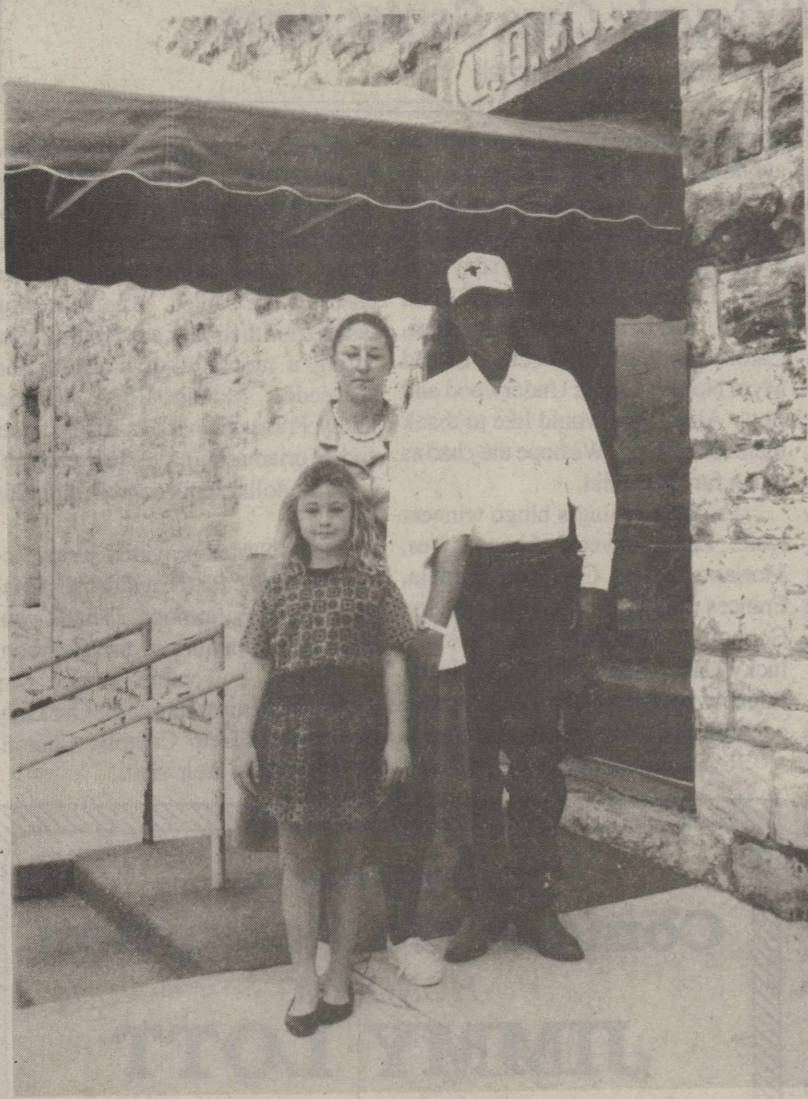

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Limbaugh appointed to Missouri Supreme Court

Steven N. Limbaugh Jr. of Cape Girardeau, MO, was appointed to the state's supreme court Aug. 5. Announcement of the appointment was made by Gov. John Ashcroft on Aug. 7. Limbaugh is married to the former Marsha Moore, daughter of Kirby Moore of Ozona.

In making the announcement of the appointment, Gov. Ashcroft said of Limbaugh: "His experience, intellect, honesty, integrity, hard-work ethic and commitment to excellence will only enhance an already outstanding court."

"As a trial judge, he is highly regarded by the attorneys who practice before him and by the individuals who work with him. He consistently is described by those in the legal community as one of the best judges in the state. I have not heard of anyone who has anything but praise for Stephen Limbaugh."

Limbaugh was elected prosecuting attorney of Cape County in 1978 at the age of 26. He did not seek reelection but went into private practice instead, taking over his father's

caseload when the senior Limbaugh was appointed to the federal bench.

In September of 1987, Ashcroft named Limbaugh circuit judge of the 32nd Circuit. He was elected without opposition in 1988 and 1990.

Limbaugh is the son of U. S. District Judge Stephen N. Limbaugh and grandson of Rush Limbaugh Sr., the state's oldest practicing attorney at 100. A cousin, Rush Limbaugh, is the host of a conservative talk show on the radio.

Crockett County CCSD budget bench marks for 1991-92

AUSTIN—Despite widespread reports last Fall of school budget cuts, trustees across the state adopted the largest spending increase in history—\$1.8 billion more. Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending.

Spending was \$1.4 billion more than budgeted revenue, and trustees increased school taxes by a billion dollars. However, when the beginning balance of \$4.2 billion is included, resources far outpaced expenditures.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1991-92 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,979 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$617 per student for capital outlay.

Crockett County Consolidated Common SD's budget provided \$5392.67 per student for current operations, \$0.0 for debt service, and \$411.10 per student for capital outlay based on the 905 students enrolled in Oct. 1991.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Crockett County Consolidated Common SD in Oct. 1991 was \$29015 plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$42321, and \$29571 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,236 per student, as compared to \$4165.32 in Crockett County Consolidated Common SD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 11.1 students in Crockett County Consolidated Common SD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.3 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.274 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.8% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.259 (\$1.274 times 98.8%) statewide. Locally, the Crockett County Consolidated Common SD imposed a rate of \$900 including \$.743 by the county. Property was appraised at 95.5% of its market value making the

ter to full capacity of 45 beds. Three rooms are in the process of renovation, painting and adding new window covering. The Ladies Auxiliary has purchased new dining room chairs and is in the process of recovering and refinishing the furniture in the front room. Two specialty clinics have begun with two more to start in the near future. Business office personnel are training on the new computer and business services will begin to improve over the next few weeks.

The Board of Directors and the Administrator of Crockett County Hospital and Care Center want to thank the citizens of Crockett County for their interest and help in making this survey and these changes possible. The hospital staff wants the citizens to remember that this is health care facility which belongs to the community. Input is always welcome.

true rate .859 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Crockett County Consolidated Common SD would have been \$494. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$350. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$998 and \$793 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Crockett County Consolidated Common SD revenue from the property tax decreased by -10.5 percent for 1991-92 as compared to a 12.0 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4559 per student in Crockett County Consolidated Common SD as compared to \$3,969 statewide.

The state and the county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program, which averaged \$2,784 per student last year and was \$3639 in Crockett County Consolidated Common SD. Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$831 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$354 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by the Crockett County Consolidated Common SD was \$920; the state guarantee added \$0.

For the coming school year, there will be \$1.3 billion more for 1992-93 school budgets without any tax increase by school trustees other than the 10-cent increase by county education districts. That will consist of \$627 million from the county tax plus \$684 million more state aid already appropriated by the legislature, the report concludes.

Brewer new hospital board member

Tim Brewer was welcomed as a new member of Crockett County Hospital and Care Center at a board meeting Aug. 20. Other members attending were: Martha Gries, Diane Schwertner, Jack Baggett, Carmen Sutton and Concha Zapata.

The board will recommend that commissioners appoint Lupe Sanchez to take the place of Mrs. Schwertner who begins as a staff nurse in the hospital Aug. 31.

Almost 3,000 patients have been entered in the hospital's new computer. Operators began putting in August charges earlier in the week.

Doug Meador, ambulance coordinator, reported that the EMS has three new care attendants.

During his comments on progress at the EMS building, Meador

stated the need for guidelines for use of the building by the public. Myrtle Post Garden Club will plan the landscape for the facility, Meador said.

Martha Morrison of Houston was to be here four days this week regarding marketing the hospital, Mrs. Gries said. The project is to be paid for through grant money.

Physician recruiting continues. A Canadian doctor who recently visited Ozona with an interest in coming here chose El Campo instead according to Mrs. Gries. The recruiting firm hired by the board is mailing information about the hospital and area to doctors throughout the country.

Specialty clinics are to continue at the hospital with plans for a cardiologist to come to Ozona soon.

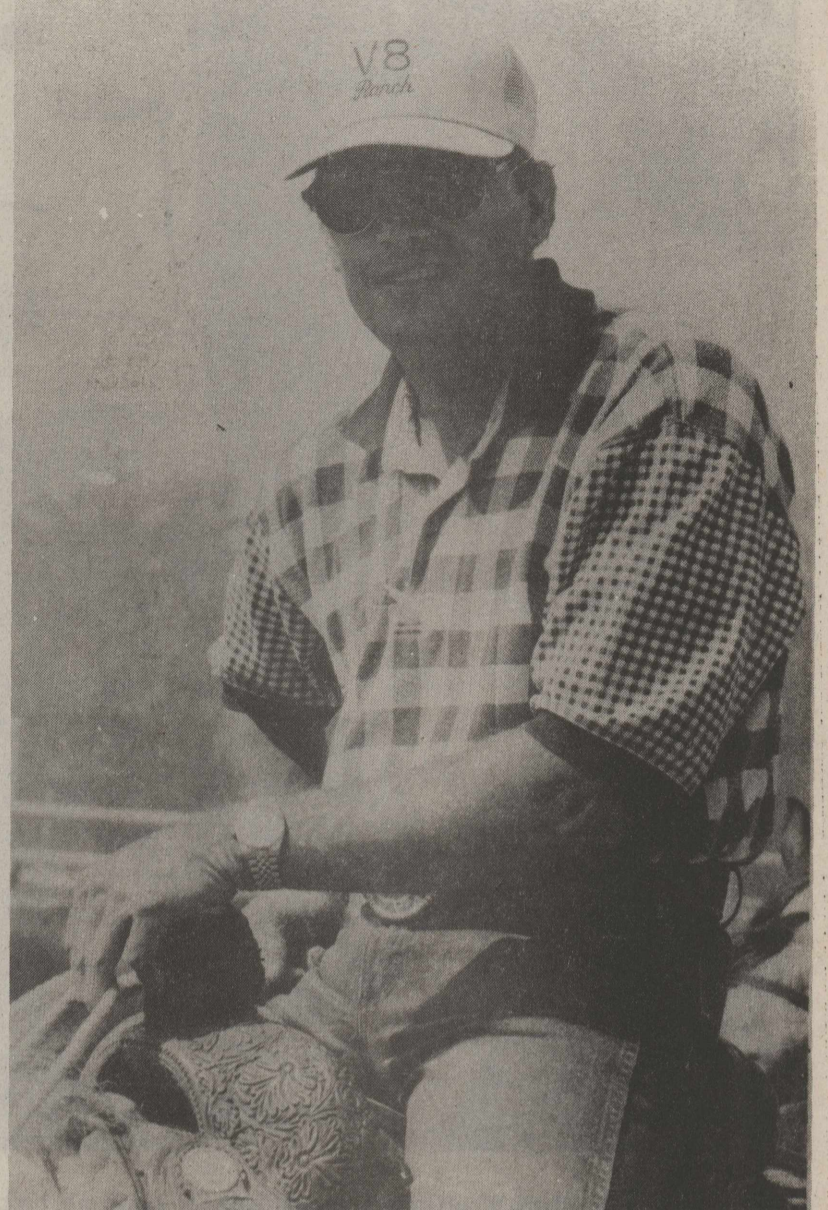

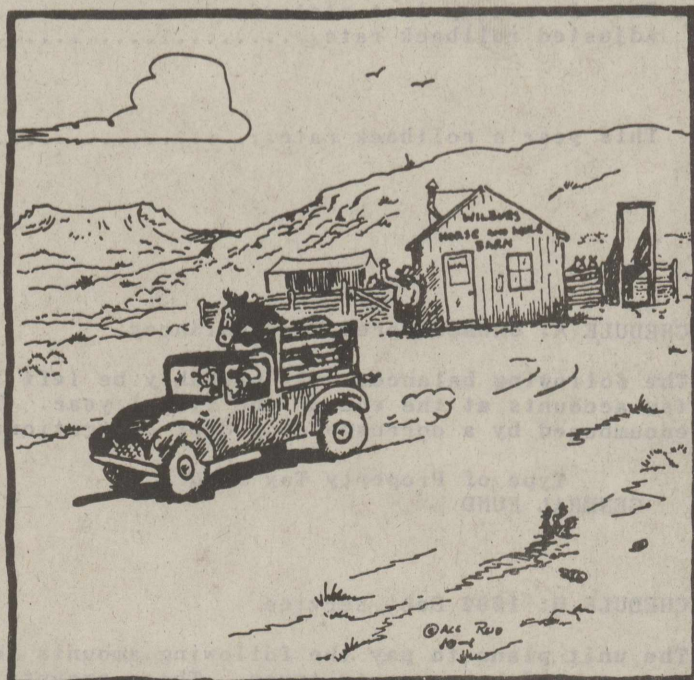

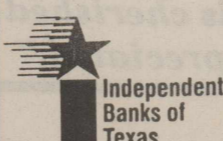


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
