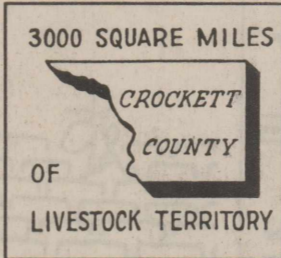

Ingham spends lifetime preserving county history

"There is an art to arrow head hunting," stated B.B. Ingham, Jr, long time rancher in Crockett County. "Just face the sun. They will shine like glass."

It appears that Mr. Ingham and his wife Phyllis have perfected this art. Two walls of the Ingham home are covered with cases of arrowheads and other artifacts...most of which were recovered from the Fort Lancaster area throughout the years.

The Ingham ranch joined the Howard Cox ranch on which Fort Lancaster is located. Ingham and many others throughout the county had permission to hunt "as much as our hearts desired". The Inghams hunted and their efforts were rewarded with an extensive collection of arrowheads and other Indian and soldier artifacts.

In one showcase there were 24 sacrament spoons which testified to the arrival of church clerics on the Pecos. Dr. Tunnell, state archeologist and Dr. Jelks, state anthropologist at SMU, who helped in the excavation when the fort became part of the State

Parks System, told Ingham that they had never heard of that many spoons being found together.

The pride and joy of Ingham's collection is a corner tang flint knife which measures approximately five inches long. This knife was used by the Indians to skin various animals. Mrs. Ingham noted that on this particular "dig" she also unearthed a buffalo head a few feet from the tang flint knife. The Inghams had the head only a few days before it crumbled to dust. Archeologists have a special preparation which now preserves these remains. There were other skinning knives, ceremonial points which had jagged edges, and rock hammers.

Other Indian artifacts of which the Ingham's are proud are a pair of moccasins woven from grasses, a medicine man's pouch made from a prickly pear leaf, a set of fire sticks, a manna metate used to grind corn and a moccasin "last" of stone on which moccasins were made.

Mr. Ingham's love of arrowheads led him to try his hand at making them. His tools are simple, but with good flint and patience he can turn one out

in a maximum of 10 minutes. A case of his arrowheads hangs in the Fort Concho Museum in San Angelo.

Other prized possessions from the Fort area include two cases of old buttons found in refuse near the barracks, one of which is a Navy button. There is an extension to the tongue of the old Fort Lancaster stagecoach used

Citizens question firing of director

Perry Hubbard said he was the spokesman for care center residents at commissioners' court Monday when he asked for the reinstatement of Marylee Robertson as director of nurses. Hubbard and others attended the meeting to question the firing of Mrs. Robertson from the center last week.

Others speaking for Mrs. Robertson were her husband, Gus Robertson, and Sue Denney, dietitian at the hospital/care center. Al Fields, former county judge, spoke regarding rules and regulations to do with dismissal of an employee.

Commissioner Sostenes DeHoyos advised that Mrs. Robertson should file a grievance complaint as quickly as possible if she believes she has a complaint.

Hospital and care center administrator Gerry Phillips and board president Martha Gries appeared before the court to present the monthly report.

Commissioners voted to have the board go out for bids on a five year plan for the new nurse call system and telephone update for the hospital if this can be worked into the budget.

Board members had voted last month to go with a lease/purchase type plan over 63 months, but commissioners requested information on a cash purchase. This information was brought to the Oct. 12 meeting.

Court members also voted to approve the purchase of a Hobart industrial size garbage disposal for the kitchen. The disposal there has gone out and is beyond repair.

During the hospital/care center report, Phillips read minutes from the Oct. 8 meeting. Included in the minutes was the information that Dr. Stan Naramore, a possible new doctor for Ozona, will be here this week. Commissioners also were informed that the hospital will be receiving an application packet from the Texas Department of Health to begin a home health care program through the hospital.

During a report from Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent, commissioners voted to adopt a resolution for a quit claim to the Texas Department of Transportation for right of

Mental retardation programs are designed to provide services to individuals who have been diagnosed with mental retardation, autism or pervasive developmental disorders.

Scoggins honored at Sixth Annual Garland Sports Hall of Fame Sept. 26

Ozona resident Jerry Scoggins was honored at the Sixth Annual Garland Sports Hall of Fame in Garland on Saturday, Sept. 26, 1992, as a member of the 1956 Garland High School State 3A Championship Team. Of the 34 on the roster when the Garland Owls won the state title, 19 took the stage to be recognized.

Scoggins played right guard on the team which posted a record of 13 victories and a single loss in winning Garland's first state championship. Included in the state title run were playoff victories over a Gainesville team coached by Buddy Ryan (39-0) and a state championship 3-0 win at Nederland, where Bum Phillips was the head coach. Garland's coach, Bill Ellington, went on to become athletic director of the University of Texas at Austin.

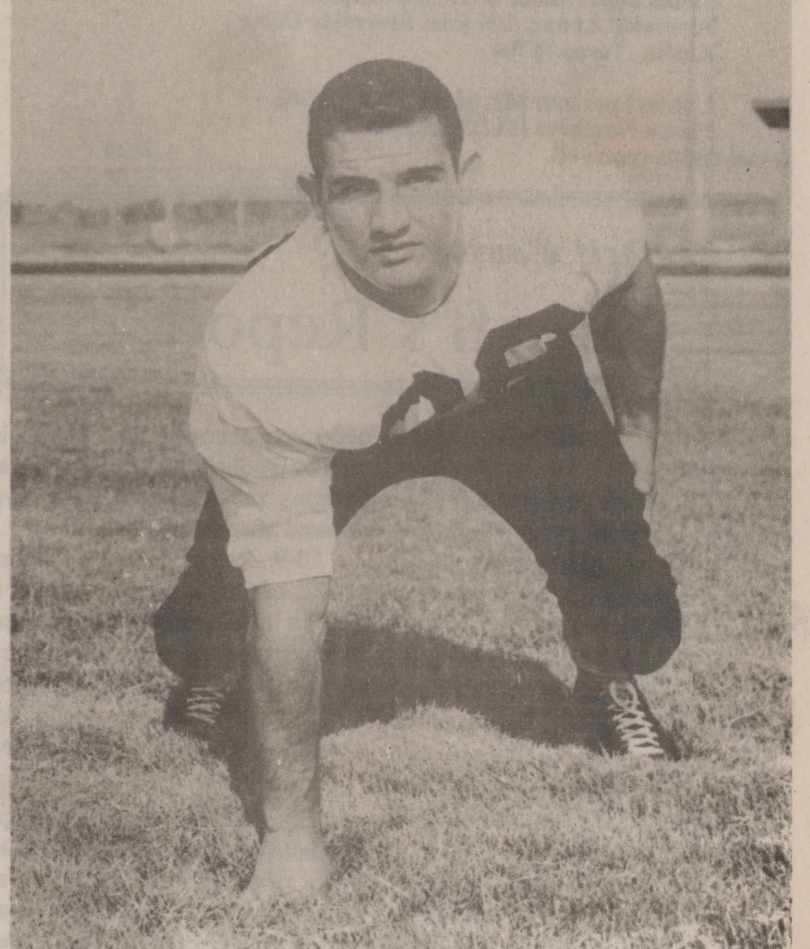
Names will be drawn from the meal tickets for door prizes donated by local merchants, and the winners will be announced at the football game.

Prizes will be awarded to band students selling the greatest number of tickets for the meal. Profits from the supper will go toward the band's spring trip.

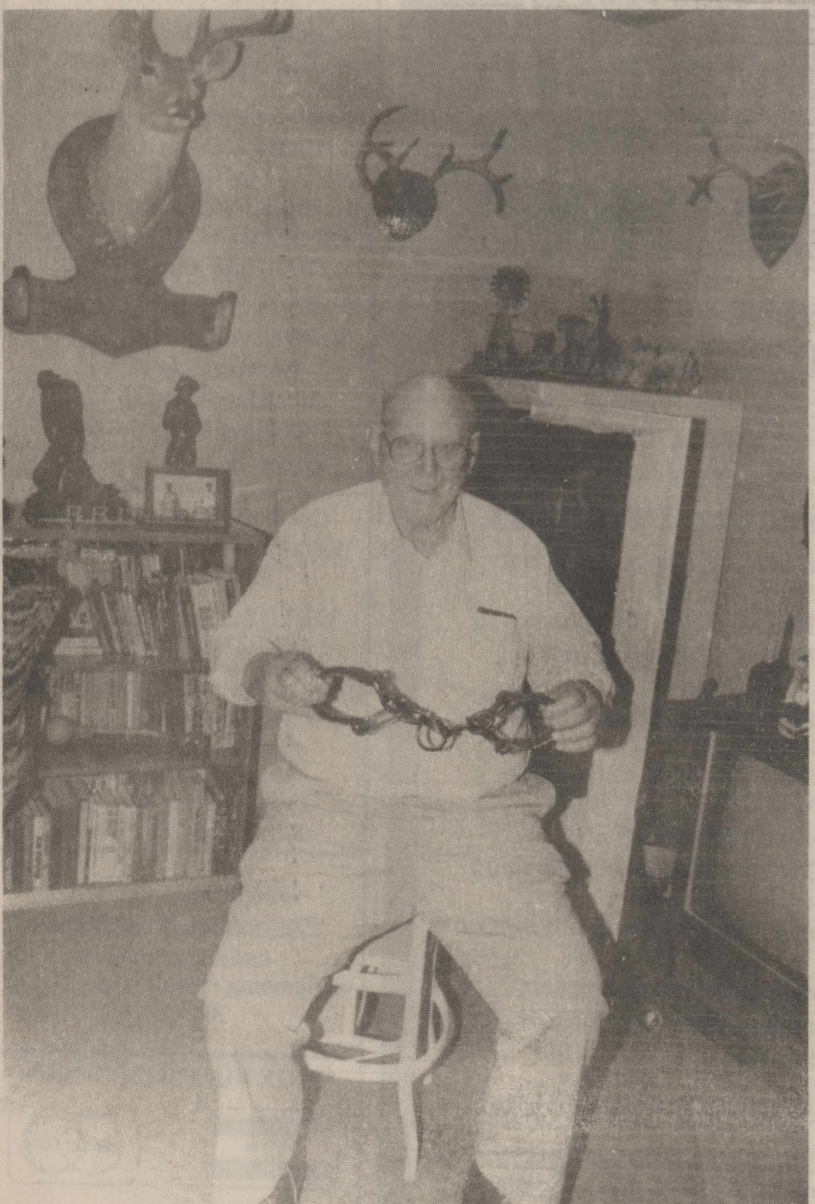
ing individuals who have contributed to athletics in Garland, and to stimulate continued interest in sports participation and activities." This is the first year for the "Honors Team" presentation.

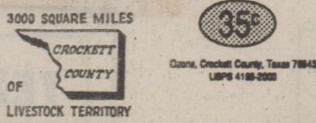

In accordance with Texas Civil Statutes, Articles 6674a et seq. and 4477-9a, Section 4.07, and Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Sections 25.400-25.408 (43 TAC §§ 25.400-408), the Texas Department of Transportation is seeking statements of interest from a person, firm, group, or association in the State of Texas for the award of a contract to erect, maintain, lease and market signs and sign space to commercial establishments for the purpose of giving specific information of interest to the traveling public including specific brand names, at appropriate locations along interstate highways in each county with a population of less than 20,000.

to hitch up a second team; a 50-70 Springfield rifle used by a Confederate soldier during the War Between the States and given to his father by J.W. Scott who was stationed at Fort Lancaster during the Civil War; various cutlery and ironstone ware used at the Fort; square nails, horseshoes and uniform buckles; various bottles, which contained aromatic schnapps bottled by Adolf Howolf, Dr. J. Hostetter's Stomach Bitters and one heralding the use of "triceratops for the skin and hair."

One item of particular interest was the iron hobbles used to hobble horses and keep the Indians from stealing them. They worked so well that many times the horses' legs were cut

off and the hobble taken so that the Indians could study the mechanics of the hobble and practice working it so they might later steal the horses.

At one time in Mr. Ingham's life he had started a barbedwire collection. He had collected 74 different kinds, but gave up on pursuing them when he learned that there are 432 patents for barbedwire in the United States. The wires collected are displayed on a wall.

Mr. Ingham can tell some very interesting stories about "happenings" in the county. While showing his father's pistol Mr. Ingham told how it was lost during the '54 flood. It seems his father, B.B. Ingham Sr, had loaned his pistol (.45 Colt single action) to

B.O. Earnest. Mr. Earnest had wrapped the pistol in a red mechanic's rag and laid it atop a footlocker at the end of his bed. The flood hit Ozona that night and all was swept away. No one expected to ever see that pistol again. Not so. It was recovered four miles down the draw still lying atop the footlocker where Mr. Earnest had placed it.

Another story pertaining to the flood was as follows: There was this large cedar tree in the county on which people had for years carved their names. Mr. Ingham's father had carved his initials on the tree in 1899. Several weeks following the '54 flood the part on which the Ingham initials were carved was recovered and returned to him. That part of the cedar tree hangs in a place of honor over his desk at this time.

way on 3.7 miles of County Road 208. The state will assume maintenance of this roadway which goes to the Reagan County line.

The court also voted to approve the request from J. Cleo Thompson for a permit to lay pipelines under streets in Johnson Draw. Commissioner DeHoyos abstained on this vote.

Other action by the court included approval of an amendment to the 1993 official budget to add \$100,000 for landfill acquisition. Commissioners had voted to do this at their last meeting, but a new vote was taken because it was not on the agenda at that time.

Commissioners also voted on Monday to contract with Tom Green County for detention of juvenile offenders and to approve an interlocal governmental contract with Emerald Underground Water Conservation Dis-

trict to collect their property taxes.

Jack Meek, the architect for the hospital and care center roof project, gave the commissioners an update. He estimated that they would be able to go out for bids in November. Construction should require about 90 days, Meek said.

A proposal from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for operation of Fort Lancaster was briefly discussed. The proposal was "not what I expected," Judge Kathryn Mayfield said. The proposal specifies no dollar amount, asks for an additional employee and for the county to do the publicity/marketing for the fort.

Commissioner Fred Deaton, chairman of the Save Fort Lancaster committee, believes that no agreement should be made with the state until legislators meet in their next session.

The state's proposal and others will go before the committee at a meeting this week.

Reports were heard from Garland Young for the civic and youth center and from Louise Ledoux, county librarian. Written reports were received from Helping Hands and from the fire department.

Helping Hands served 1,013 meals in September and commodities were given out to 88 families repre-

senting 180 individuals.

The fire department responded to four structure fires, 23 grass fires, one mutual aid grass fire and one investigation in September.

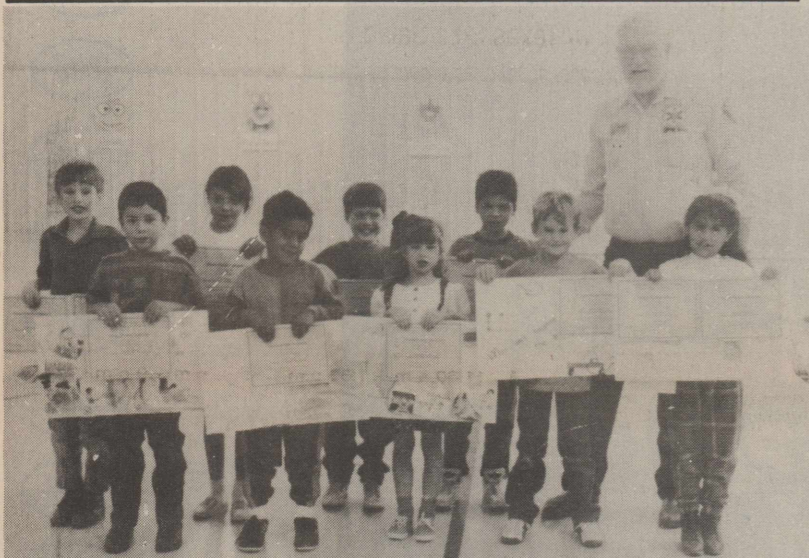

The Middle School has completed eight exciting weeks of school. 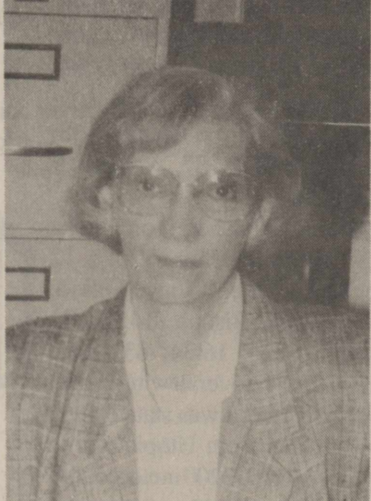


MARY HERYFORD

When asked about her hobbies Mrs. Heryford listed drawing, painting, sewing and involvement with the youth programs in the First Baptist Church of Sonora.



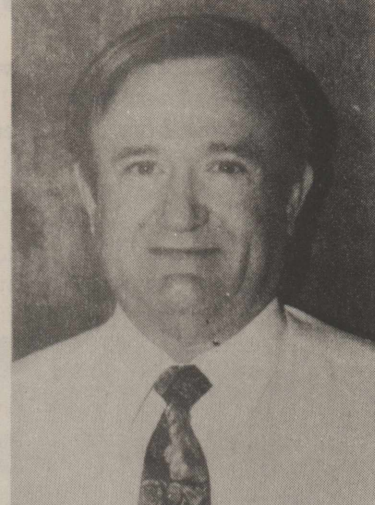
ELINORE R. SOUTH

WTU offers new service

Boosting the area economy just got a little easier. West Texas Utilities Co. now has available a new economic development service designed to offer significant incentives to new or expanding businesses. The service option was approved Sept. 30 by the Public Utilities Commission of Texas.

"The Economic Development service is a rate that offers a discount on electricity to qualifying businesses such as manufacturing and industrial facilities," said Paul Brower, vice president of marketing and business development for WTU. To qualify a new business would have to locate in WTU's service territory. An existing business would have to, among other things, add more employees and equipment to their operation and be served by WTU.

The amount of the discount a qualifying company could receive depends on the number of new jobs they create. An industry that adds 21

or more employees would enjoy the greatest discount.

The new rates will not mean higher costs for other customers. "Actually other customers will benefit from improved economic opportunities which this service can help produce," Brower said.

The discount for a new or expanding business will gradually be phased out over a four year period, allowing time for the business to establish itself.

The service allows any community industrial development program within the WTU service territory to include the new Economic Development service rate in their portfolio to attract and encourage new business and promote growth in existing business.

For more information, contact your local WTU office. The electric utility serves a 52,000 square mile area of West Texas that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

Sheep and goat referendum groundwork underway

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association is sponsoring an October sheep and goat referendum for predator control. If passed by producers during an Oct. 29 ballot election, the referendum will provide funds solely for predator control. Funds are to be raised through a per-head-sold checkoff of not more than 20 cents per head.

Any sheep and goat producer whose operation lies within 111 designated Texas counties is eligible to vote. Crockett County is in District 1. There are three districts.

Ballots will indicate: First, whether or not the voting producer is interested in supporting a referendum dedicated to area-wide predator control, which would be additional control on predation to any program now in place, and second, producers will vote for three directors to represent

their district on the commodity producers' board, provided the referendum passes.

Prospective board member candidates must contact the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association office for necessary paper work. They also need 10 producer names on a petition to be listed on the ballot.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will conduct the election with local county Extension offices serving as the voting sites in each of the designated counties.

Producers can learn more about the referendum by attending an educational program scheduled for Oct. 19 in Ozona at the civic center at 3 p.m.

ASCS election process begins

Forms for nominating Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service committee members by petition were mailed last week. Nov. 2 will be the last day for nomination by petition.

A petition signed by three eligible voters is needed to nominate a rancher-candidate. A statement must be included that the candidate has agreed to serve if elected.

Almost anyone eligible to take part in a county ASCS program may be a candidate for the committee.

One of the committee's nominees must be from a minority group or a female (or both) if the county has five percent or more minority or female eligible voters, and none were nominated by petition.

Those who can vote are ranch owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers of legal voting age who are eligible to take part in any ASCS program. Check with the ASCS office for voting requirements.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters Nov. 27, and Dec. 7 is the last day to return voted ballots. New committee members/alternates take office on Jan. 1.

Programs administered by county ASC committees include: commodity price support loans and payments; establishment of allotments, yields, and marketing quotas; grain reserve; conservation cost-sharing; incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities; other farm/ranch disaster assistance.

Deer season is upon us

have made, Fielding is trying to help the rancher to determine the population per acre, the buck/doe ratio and the number of bucks and does that need to be harvested.

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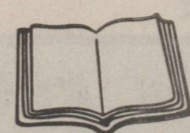
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Crockett County Public Library News

Sanchez begins law enforcement training

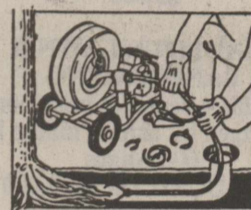
