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




ELINORE R. SOUTH

I have been working lately with Don Jackson, warden from Sheffield, and Fielding Harwell, biologist from Kerrville, and some of our local ranchers doing a spotlight count. The ranchers have requested assistance in proper management of their deer herds, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has cooperated to offer the advice and technical guidance of Fielding Harwell. Mr. Harwell will assist you in harvest, supplemental feeding and management of your deer herd.

In the spotlight counts that we

have made, Fielding is trying to help the rancher to determine the population per acre, the buck/doe ratio and the number of bucks and does that need to be harvested.

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


