Bill Clinton carries Crockett County

Bill Clinton took Crockett County in the general election Tuesday, receiving 653 votes to 624 for incumbent president George Bush. Ross Perot received 368 votes. There were 1631 total votes cast in the county.

Ballot placings were: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Libertarian Party and Independent. Races and local results follow.

State unemployment reaches 7.5% for September

The Texas Employment Commission released figures Oct. 20 showing that unemployment rose in Texas from 6.7 percent in August to 7.5 percent in September.

"There were 651,000 jobless Texans in September, an increase of more than 64,000 from August," said Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers. "We know there are going to be fluctuations each month when we look at unemployment rates, but a 7.5 percent rate represents quite an increase, especially when you think of this number as being men and women trying to find work."

Crockett County's unemployment figure for September was 6.9%. From a civilian labor force of 1,766, 121

were unemployed.

In Crane County, 159 of the 1,764 C.L.F. were unemployed for a rate of 9%. The 916 C.L.F. of Irion County had 56 people unemployed, amounting to 6.1%.

Reagan County's unemployment percentage was 6.0 with 116 of the 1,948 C.L.F. out of work.

Schleicher County had a low 4.6% unemployment with 72 of the 1,580 C.L.F. not working.

Sutton County's unemployment was 7.1%. There were 157 of the 2,210 C.L.F. unemployed.

Terrell County had 58 persons unemployed from a possible 957 workers. The unemployment rate there stood at 6.1%.

A low 5.9% was the unemploy-

ment figure for Tom Green County. The report there showed 46,038 in the C.L.F. and 2,706 unemployed.

The unemployment rate was also low for Upton County, 5.8%. Figures show 111 unemployed from a C.L.F. of 1,926.

In Val Verde County, unemployment was 11.1%. There were 1,643 unemployed from a work force of 14,773.

Hospital receives grant money

Crockett County Hospital is pleased to announce that it has received \$52,165 in grant money from the Health Care Financing Administration. This Rural Health Transition Grant for year two is from September 1992 through September 1993. Three areas of need that have been identified for these grant monies are physician recruitment, emergency room upgrade and hospital staff inservices and educational training.

The physician recruiting effort continues with the firm of Harris, Kovak and Alderman, now out of regional offices in Dallas. This firm has demonstrated a high success rate for rural communities and satisfied placements in West Texas. Approximately \$24,000 is still left from grant

year one in this area, and the recruitment process is not expected to culminate until sometime during this second year of the grant.

Emergency room upgrade has been allotted \$12,665. With the high volume of trauma/transfers it is necessary to maintain a well-equipped emergency room. Working with Doctors Owensby and Sims, the administrator and the board of directors shall identify new or replacement equipment to be purchased.

Hospital staff inservice and educational training has been allotted \$8,000 in grant year two. Specialized training in trauma, cardiac care and inpatient care are needed to help maintain a high quality of care. Since Crockett County Hospital is Medicare certi-

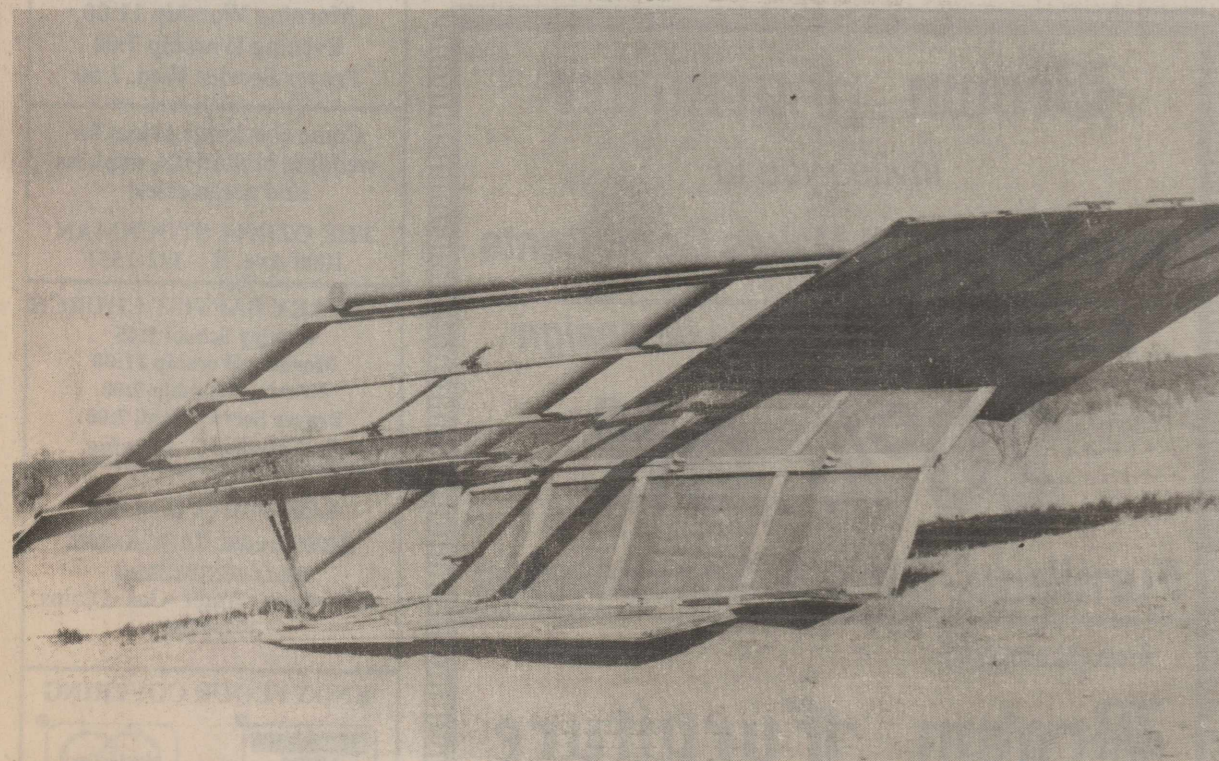
fied, special attention will be given to geriatric directed care. The need to send staff long distances or bring the hospital specialized trainers is costly. This grant is expected to help finance the expense.

Renovations in works to accommodate handicapped

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Monday, Oct. 19, approved a contract with Ron Barbutti for architectural services on the Ozona High School Handicapped Accessibility Project. Barbutti is the current architect on the construction of additional classrooms at Ozona Primary School and was the architect on the renovation of the Ozona Heritage Building. He will begin immediately to prepare plans to renovate existing buildings on the high school campus to accommodate physically handicapped individuals.

The employment of Barbutti is the result of a plan prepared by Nobe and Associates in San Angelo and presented to the local school board in April of last year. During March 5 and March 7 of that year, Nobe and Associates conducted a field survey at the request of the school district to document handicapped accessibility deficiencies, and in the April report, the firm noted that the high school library, Ozona Heritage Building, and the main high school building were in need of renovation to correct these deficiencies.

Although it is not known when a contractor will be employed to begin repairs on these buildings, the cost will be paid for out of the district's fund balances.

In other actions, the trustees ap-

proved 1992-93 school year budget amendments for a payment to N. C. Sturgeon for work performed on the Ozona Primary School Construction Project and for property appraisal services, and they approved a transfer of \$257,783 from the district's general fund into a separate account for educational technology.

Mr. John Curry, principal of Ozona High School, met with the board to give the members information concerning the addition of choral music and a rodeo team to high school activities. Following discussion of these two items, trustees approved the addition of a rodeo team which will be under the supervision of Mr. Rod Miller. The team will be self-supporting, and no school district funds will be allocated for rodeo with the exception of funds for student letter jackets.

During the discussion concerning the addition of choir to high school activities, Mr. Curry reported that only 12 out of 270 students had expressed an interest in choir, according to a survey that had just been completed. Because of a lack of interest among the students, the members voted to not offer choir in the high school at the present time.

During the meeting the board went into executive session to hear separate complaints from two district employees, but no action was taken.

Postmaster Hokit retires with 45 years of service

"There have been good times and bad times," said Floyd Hokit, newly retired postmaster. "But the good times outweigh the bad ones."

Mr. Hokit, a native Ozonian, retired October 2, 1992, after serving almost half a century with the United States postal department. His postal career was served in Ozona. Hokit began his career in January of 1951 at age 26 following his graduation from the University of North Texas where he received a degree in business. Prior to attending the university he had served three years in the military during World War II.

The post office was in the old J.R. Kersey Building when Hokit began his career. The postmaster at that time was Eddie Bower. Mr. Hokit served as a clerk until October 1953, when he was permanently appointed to the position of postmaster. At that time the office was a political appointment.

During his tenure as postmaster the office was housed in two other buildings before the present building was established at the corner of Avenue F and 12th Street in 1963. This was the first government controlled and specially built post office in Ozona.

Mr. Hokit has seen the new post office added on to three times and the number of postal boxes grew from 1100 to the current number of 1883. Back in the "boom" of the early 1980's, newcomers to Ozona were put on a waiting list to rent a box. Over 1600 are rented at this time.

There have been many changes in the postal system since Hokit began his career. The computer and automation age has been the biggest change. In May of 1991 the local post office received three computerized IRT (Integrated Retail Terminal) machines. Two of the computers are located at the windows and one is in the back. Mr. Hokit confessed that he was apprehensive about "going computer", but once he got used to it, he appreciated their value. "By 1995", he stated, "we are to be 95% automated. First class mail will come presorted from

Abilene to the box sections. This is the reason for the new zip-plus-four coding system."

When asked if you still could send baby chicks through the mail, Mr. Hokit laughingly responded, "People can ship almost anything by postal service. We have had dogs, chickens, fishing worms and bees...even hazardous material...if packaged properly." He added with a smile, "The bees can really be a problem."

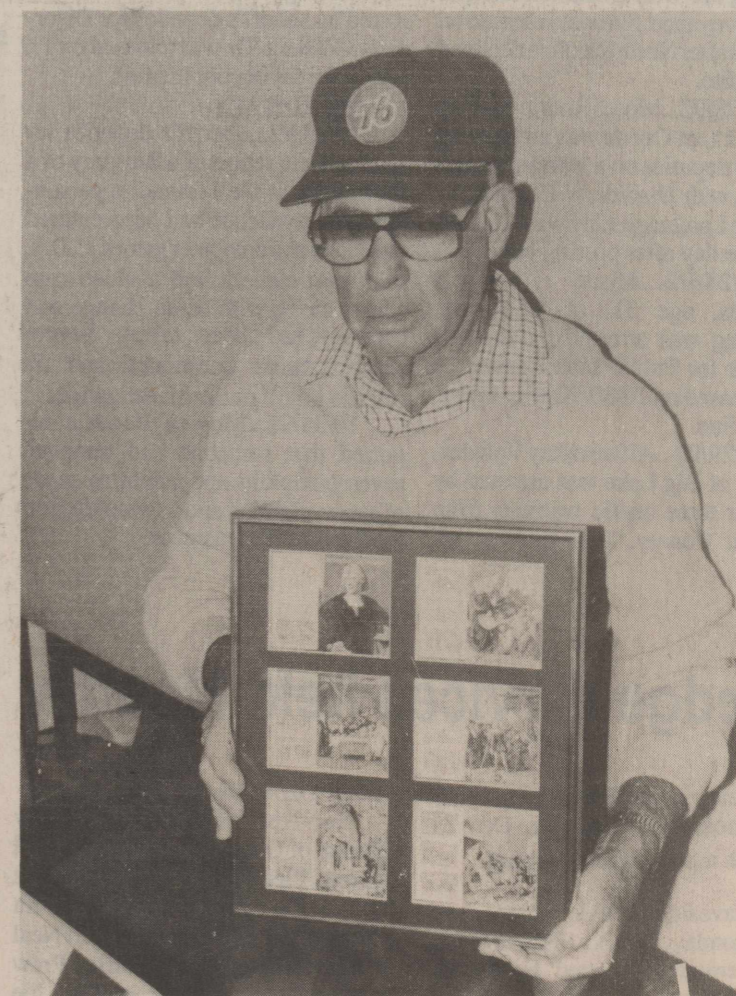
Hokit, who is one of 34,000 postal workers retiring this year, is retiring under the optional plan with 43 years nine months and 21 days of actual service plus three years of military service and an accumulation of one

year nine months and 28 days due him in sick leave.

He and other retiring postmasters received a framed commemorative of stamps depicting the 500th anniversary of Columbus' voyage to America. The commemorative was given by the "769" postal area, a leadership sharing organization which meets periodically. He is also a member of NAPOS, the professional organization of postmasters.

Mr. Hokit, whose hobbies are barbecuing and golfing, plans to spend more time on the golf course.

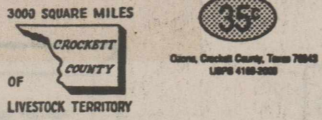

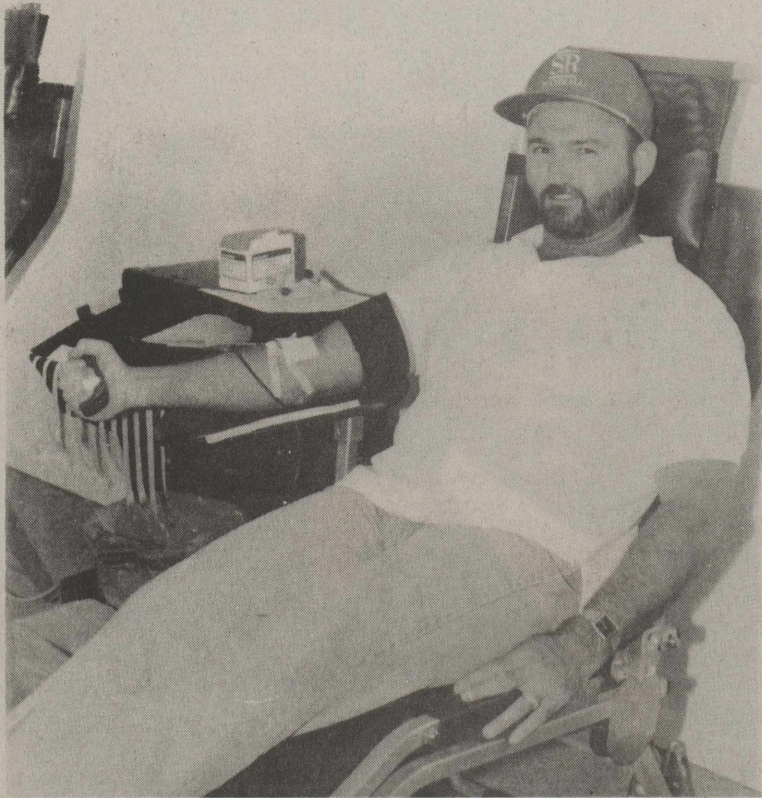

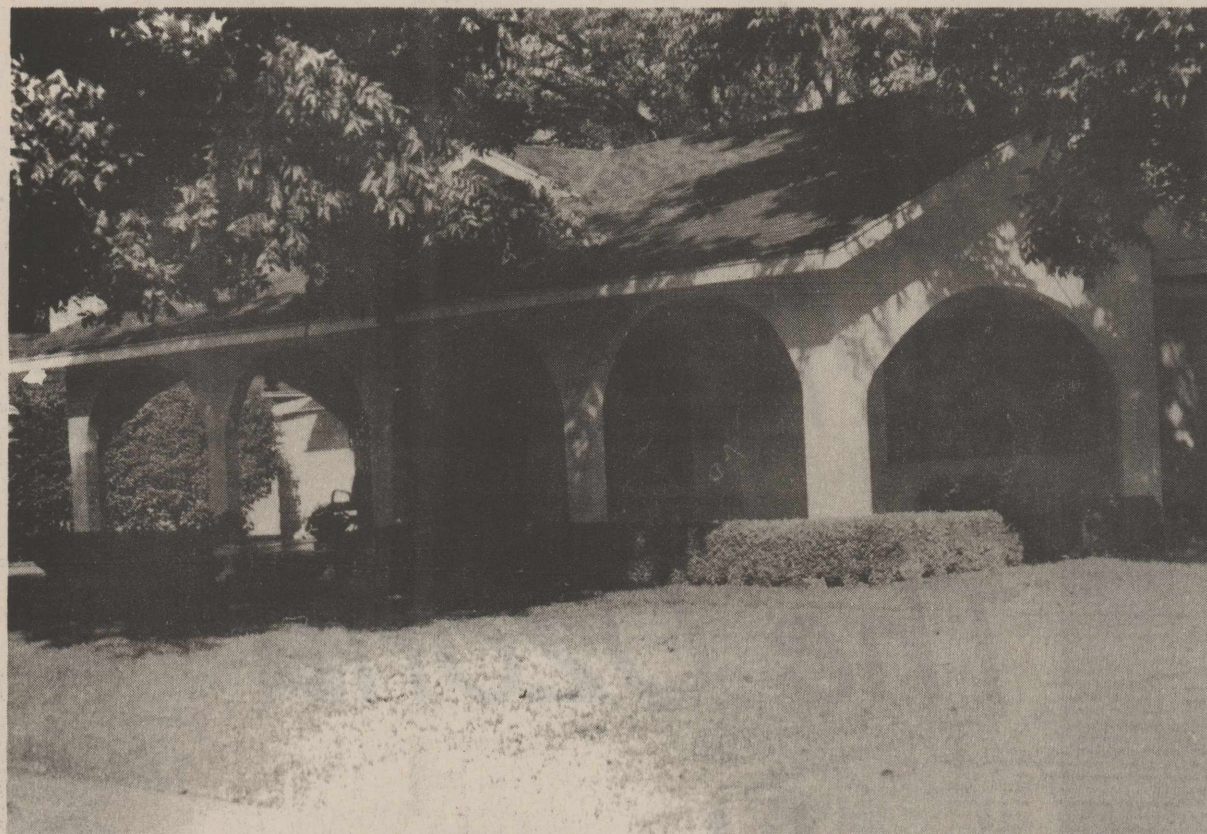

Wheel virus could affect young children this winter

The flu bug is not the only virus parents should watch for warns an expert in gastroenterology. The rotavirus plays havoc with young children each winter.

"Usually, children are hit between November and March," said Dr. Mark A. Gilger, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "The rotavirus causes vomiting and diarrhea and is commonly transmitted at daycare centers."

The rotavirus, literally "wheel virus," is so-named for its hub- and spoke-like appearance under the microscope. It is the number one cause of viral diarrhea in infants, a condition that can lead to dehydration and, in some rare cases, death.

"This can be very serious—and fast," he cautions parents. "Typically, 12 to 24 hours after they are exposed to the virus they begin vomiting. This is followed within 6 to 24 hours by diarrhea."

Gilger says that most children are not severely affected by the virus.

"Only about five percent get ill enough to be admitted to the hospital. Most kids don't get that sick, but they are still miserable, with their symptoms lasting up to a week," he said.

Rotaviruses strike children ages six months to three years most often. Typically they experience repeated episodes of vomiting followed by loose, watery diarrhea.

"Parents usually call their pediatrician at this point," Gilger said. "They are generally told to give plenty of fluids."

When the bug hits harder, Gilger cautions parents to waste no time in getting their child to the emergency room.

"The real danger is dehydration from severe diarrhea," he said. "It is then vital to replace those fluids and the body's electrolytes through oral rehydration therapy."

Oral rehydration uses a special solution that restores fluids while replacing electrolytes, naturally occurring salts that are necessary for bodily functions.

The best treatment, however, is prevention. Gilger says that while no one is completely safe from contracting rotaviruses, certain precautions can be taken.

"The virus is transmitted through the fecal-oral route, so good hand-washing is the best defense. Also, check out your child's daycare center carefully to ensure that proper hygienic standards are followed," he said.

Vaccines are being developed, but none are currently available.

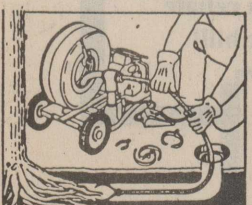

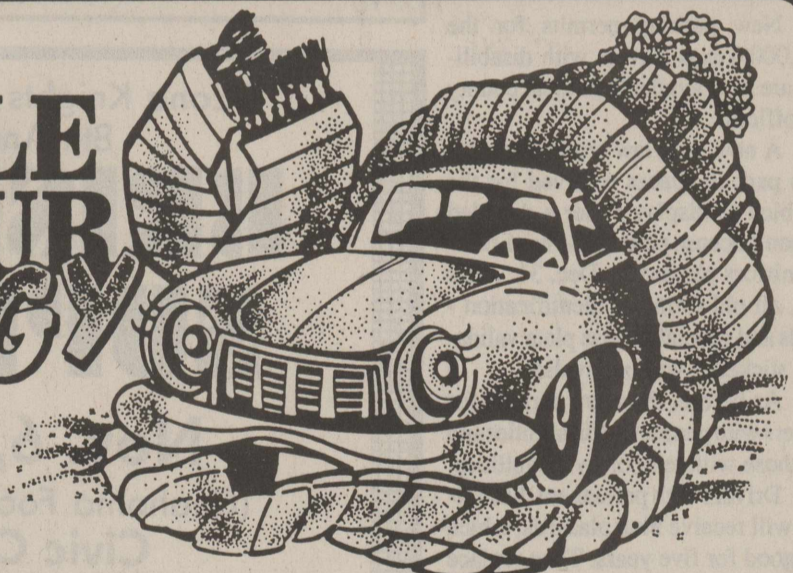

New auto ID for disabled

New parking permits for the 250,000 Texas drivers with disabilities are now available at local county tax offices.

A new state law requires people who park in spaces reserved for the disabled to display either a disabled person's license plate or the hard-plastic mirrors placard by Dec. 31. After that, all old forms of identification - cards and special license plate validation stickers - will be invalid.

As before, there are permits for drivers with permanent disabilities and for those with temporary disabilities.

Drivers with permanent disabilities will receive blue placards, which are good for five years. They replace the red identification card, which should be exchanged for the new placard at the local county tax office. Exchanging as many as two cards is free.

Red placards, for those with temporary disabilities, are valid for six months. Drivers with temporary disabilities need not exchange their white identification card.

Placards will cost \$5 each if no ID card is exchanged. Drivers may request no more than one set of disabled-person license plates and one placard, or no plates and two placards.

The Texas Legislature made the changes to comply with federal rules making vehicle registration uniform for people with disabilities.

Iron and heart disease--is there a connection?

The September issue of the American Heart Association's scientific journal reported on a Finnish study which concluded the amount of stored iron in the body could rank second only to smoking as the most significant risk factor for heart disease and heart attack. Several networks and popular magazines have picked up on this study, and you may wonder how this information will affect you or someone else who is concerned about diet and its relationship to heart disease. Actually, it's probably too early to take any action towards changing your diet to fit the recommendations of this study.

It's important to recognize that American research scientists are unwilling to agree with this research until there is more clinical evidence. There could be a number of variables or factors that differ between the people who were studied for this research and the American population

as a whole. Also, even if continued research confirms the recent iron/heart disease connection, a great deal more research would be needed to determine if lowering iron levels actually prevents heart disease.

In fact, iron deficiency is still an important public health problem for infants and women from low-income families, although most of us probably get enough iron if we eat a balanced diet. Taking iron supplements is not recommended except for people diagnosed with anemia or pregnant women.

Also, as a nation, we should follow the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for Americans. They are as follows:

- Eat a variety of foods
- Maintain a healthy weight
- Choose a diet low in fat, saturated fat and cholesterol
- Choose a diet with plenty of vegetables, fruits and grain products
- Use sugars only in moderation

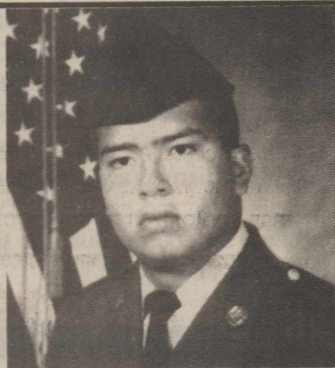
-Use salt and sodium only in moderation

-If you drink alcoholic beverages, do so in moderation

So until further notice, follow the dietary guidelines and eat a sensible diet from all the major food groups: 6-11 servings of breads, cereals or pasta daily, 2-4 servings of fruits, 3-5 servings of vegetables, 2-3 servings of dairy products (preferably low-fat versions), and 2-3 servings from the meat group, which includes red meat, poultry, fish, dry beans and peas, eggs, nuts and seeds. Remember to choose lean meats and avoid frying foods.

SS ID necessary for driver's license

AUSTIN--Beginning Nov. 1, Texans applying for a driver's license and persons renewing their license or seeking a duplicate will need to show their Social Security card, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for commercial driver's licenses, which the DPS began issuing in September of 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license," explained DPS driver's license inspector John Hall. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where a fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it much more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards issued by the federal Social Security Ad-

ministration will be accepted, Hall said.

"I realize almost everyone knows his Social Security number by heart, but we need to see the actual card issued by the U.S. government, not a commercially-produced metal or 'flea market' card," the inspector said. "If you do not have the government-issued card, income tax documents, W-2 forms, payroll or other employer records may be presented."

Applicants for DPS identification cards also will be asked for a Social Security card, but it is not a requirement for the ID card, Hall said.

The inspector said Social Security numbers would not be printed on driver's licenses and were for DPS internal use only.

Signs explaining the new policy will be posted in DPS driver's license offices across the state.

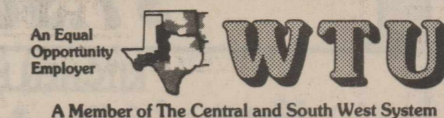

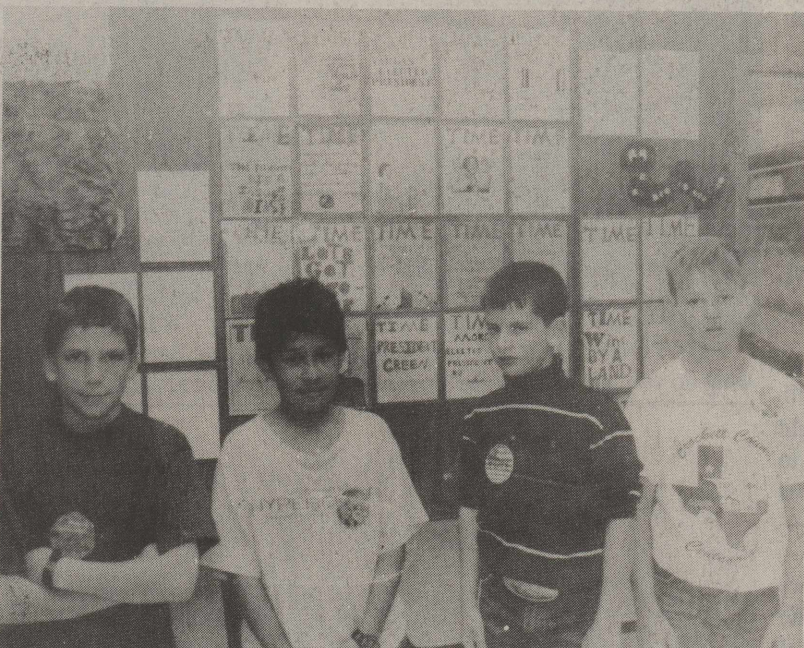

November is national diabetes month

HOUSTON—(Oct. 20, 1992)—Diabetic women who want children may reduce some of their pregnancy risks by consulting a doctor familiar with their special needs before they conceive.

According to Dr. Karolina Adam, assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, a diabetic needs to be sure of her own health and in "good control" of her sugar level before she gets pregnant.

"If her sugar is too high or fluctuates too much, her baby could be harmed even before she knows she is pregnant. She is also risking a miscarriage," Adam said.

A diabetic must also be in good health overall so she can tolerate a pregnancy physically, said Adam, a Baylor specialist in maternal/fetal medicine and high-risk pregnancies.

"She needs to be able to withstand the demands of providing nine months of life support to her developing child without jeopardizing her own health," Adam said. "We want her healthy after she delivers so she can enjoy being a mother."

Before conceiving, a diabetic should make sure her kidney function is good and that she does not have high blood pressure or heart disease — conditions diabetics are at higher risk for. Problems like these should be treated before a pregnancy begins, Adam said.

Adam also has patients checked for diabetic proliferative retinopathy, a condition affecting the retina of the eye that can cause permanent damage or blindness if left untreated. Pregnancy can increase that risk, Adam said.

Once she has conceived, a diabetic will be monitored throughout her pregnancy, Adam said. The obstetrician will keep a close watch on the baby's growth and development and on the mother's blood pressure and blood sugar.

"We want to keep her sugar levels steady in the normal range to keep her baby from growing too large," Adam said. "In addition to causing a woman problems during labor and delivery, a baby that is too big can be injured during birth and suffer from low blood sugar after birth."

Adam recommends that pregnant diabetics eat three meals and three snacks daily. Each meal should contain 25 percent of the day's total calories. Snack calories should be divided

into 5 percent at mid-morning and at mid-afternoon and 15 percent at bedtime.

"Although some diabetics would be advised not to attempt a pregnancy, many can have healthy pregnancies and healthy babies if they take care of themselves properly," Adam said.

"I will be in the library from 1:30 to 3:15 p.m. every day. If anyone would like to come at that time, they are more than welcome," said Mrs. Cervantez.

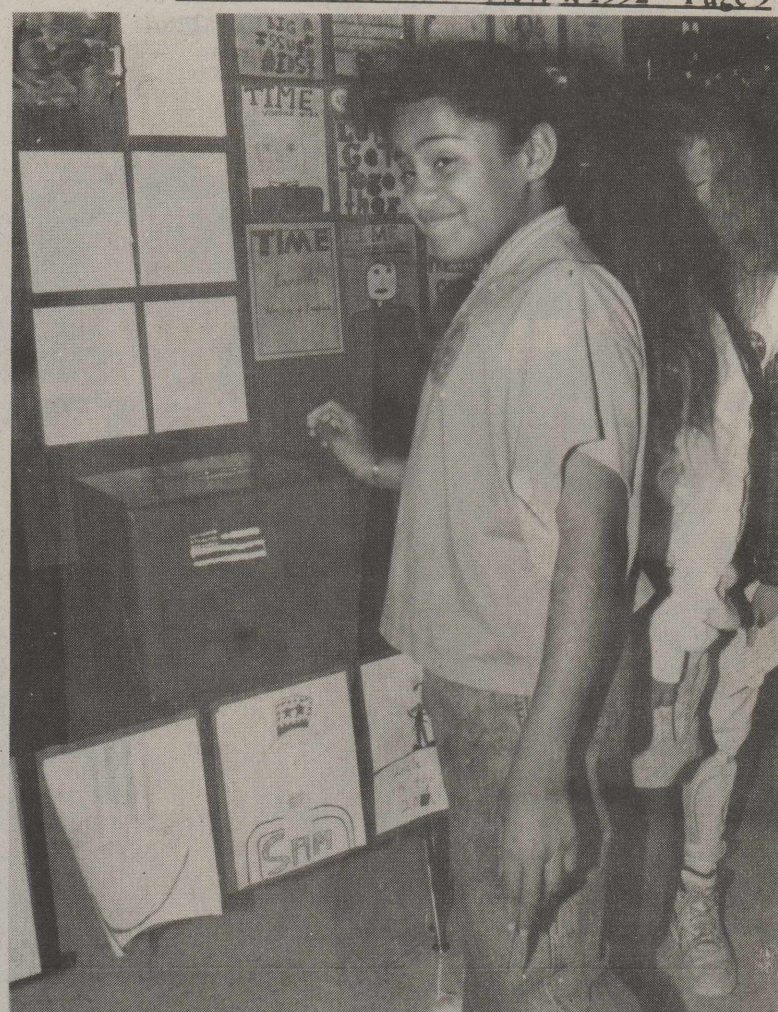

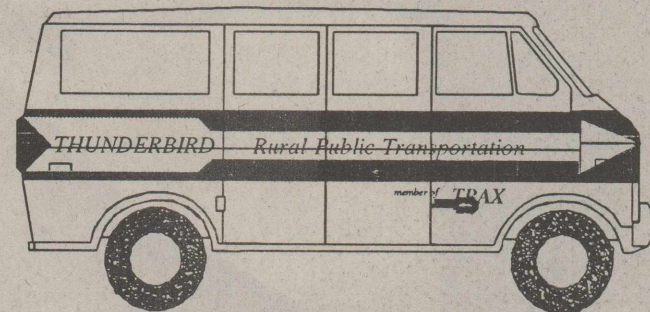

Postal service warns against refund scams

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers to beware of a notice in the mail that says the IRS is holding a refund check in your name.

To claim the money the notice says all you have to do is send ten dollars to an address in Florida. Those who send in ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form—something the IRS gives away for free.

Millions of notices have been sent to addresses throughout the U.S., and Postal Inspectors have seized almost \$1 million from accounts belonging to the scam operators. There have been numerous complaints and inquiries in the Texas and Oklahoma areas.

"The postcards are designed to look official," says Paul Griffo, national spokesman for the U.S. Postal Inspection Service. "The bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo makes it appear as though disbursement has been approved."

"But customers who send in their ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim form—something the Internal Revenue Service gives away for free."

Linda Weiskopf, Assistant Director of the Taxpayer Service Division for the Internal Revenue Service, says there is never a charge to claim a refund.

"If a taxpayer is due a refund, all he or she has to do is call our 800 number, and we'll send them a claim form free of charge."

The IRS has a fully staffed 800 number for people who have questions about their income tax returns, including question about tax refunds.

Meanwhile, Postal Inspectors offer tips to keep you from getting stung by scam artists who make bogus offers through the mail.

"Any offer that requires you to pay a certain amount up front should

be looked at dubiously," says John Brugger, a Postal Inspector in Washington, DC. "Be willing to check them out. Make a few phone calls and verify the truthfulness of the offer."

But, one phone number you should not call is the 900 number printed on the postcard. Scams that employ this method usually charge high fees to victims who respond by calling.

Finally, postal inspectors offer this advice for those who get a postcard promising a big tax refund for a small fee: throw it away.

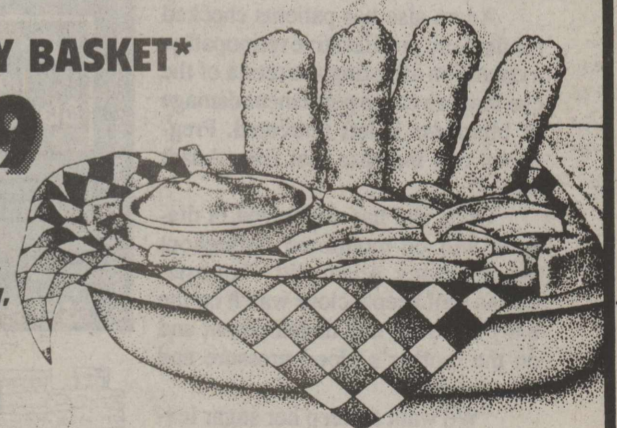

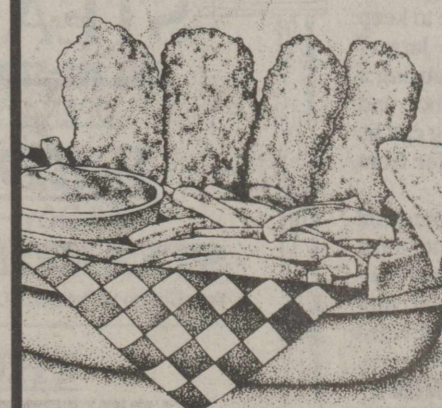
