## Dudley closes books on 42 year career

The entire method of operation has changed in the county treasurer's office since Jim Dudley took office in 1951, and more changes are on the way, he says. Dudley retired from the post at the end of December after 42 years.

When he took office Jan. 1, 1951, the treasurer's salary was \$2,500 annually, and for the first four or five years, he was paid only once a year. At that time all the checks were written out of the county clerk's office and there really wasn't much to do, Dudley said. There was no social security, insurance or retirement plan to be dealt with. The office did act as a collection agent for county employees' individual life and health insurance, collecting and sending in payments. This practice was eventually stopped.

Jean North came to work with Dudley as his assistant after check writing became one of the duties of the office in the late 1970s. She retired in September of 1990 after 24 years in the clerk's and treasurer's offices. Nancy Hale, former Extension Service secretary, was selected to replace Mrs. North as assistant treasurer.

The position of assistant treasurer is unique in that she is not allowed to sign checks. Only the treasurer may do so. In other county departments assistants may sign documents for the office holder, he explained.

Dudley ended his career as treasurer in the same office where he began, in the basement of what is now the courthouse annex. In 1951, the building (originally the Methodist Church) was the hospital.

"People would come to my office streaming blood looking for the emergency room," Dudley recalled. Babies were being born upstairs and a variety of illnesses treated.

Actually, Dudley moved into the basement quarters in 1948 as a partner in the Ozona Audit Company. Owners Houston Smith, George Russell and Leta Powell sent word to Dudley, who was working for the IRS in Amarillo, they would give him one-fourth of the company if he would come home and run it.

"I was going to come back here anyhow," said Dudley who later bought out his partners. He has continued to operate his tax service. "Me and some guy in Midland are the only ones

I know who don't use a computer to make out income taxes."

Computerization of the treasurer's office will make everything easier, and Dudley expects this change to come to his former office as it has to other county departments.

Through the years the treasurer's office has had many neighbors to its basement location. When Jim Dudley came to the building, Madye's, a well-known house slipper manufacturing company, was there. Then Pete Jacoby became county agent and space was made for him. When Madye's left the building, a doctor, dentist and optometrist followed. The ASCS also located in the basement.

"There was not that much room; they'd just build another partition and squeeze them in," he recalls.

For years every time it rained water came up into the basement through holes which had been drilled to treat for termites. Dudley made do by placing boxes of records on wooden blocks in the storage closet.

After many attempts to cure the problem and countless hours of sweeping water from his office, the hall, and the museum (now the only two basement tenants), the water stopped coming in when the driveway adjacent to the building was paved.

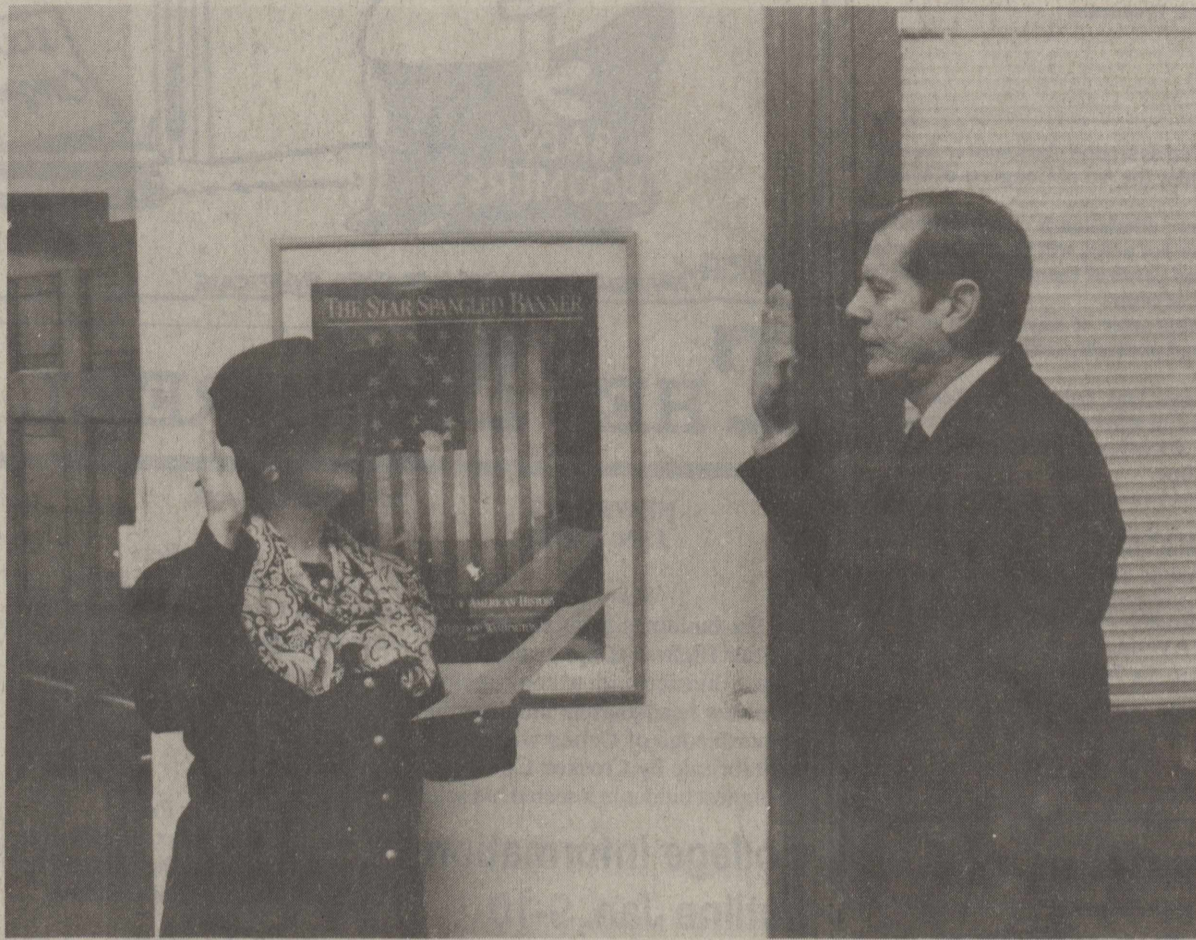
The same tile covers the floor that was in place in 1948. "Oh, a piece would come up now and then, and they'd replace that," Dudley said.

"I'm glad I finally got out of that old building before the thing blew up or fell down!"

During his tenure Dudley worked under eight county judges, Houston Smith, Ralph Jones, Brock Jones Sr., Bernice Jones, Troy Williams, Johnny Jones, A. O. Fields and Kathryn Mayfield.

In commemoration of his retirement, the county presented him with a desk set made from a Crockett County core sample.

Jim Dudley and his wife, Maridel, who is a retired teacher, are the parents of two sons, Bill and Mark. Bill makes his home in Addison and Mark in San Angelo. Mr. Dudley is the author of two books, "A Journal of World War II" published in 1983, and "A Private's View of World War II" published in July of 1992.

## Myers appointed to treasurer's post

Burl Myers was sworn-in as the eighth treasurer of Crockett County Jan. 4, 1993, by Judge Kathryn Mayfield. Myers was appointed at a Jan. 1 meeting of the new commissioners' court to fill the unexpired term of Jim Dudley. Dudley resigned effective Dec. 31, 1992, after 42 years in office.

Myers, a certified public accountant, came to Ozona in October of 1977 to work for Tom Mitchell as comptroller of Circle Bar Truck Corral. He opened his own accounting office in the old Ozona National Bank Building in 1984.

The Lohn native earned a bachelor of business administration degree from Southwest Texas State University at San Marcos. He is a member of the Texas Society of CPAs and the San Angelo Society of CPAs.

Myers and his wife Diane, who is employed at Crockett County Care Center, are members of First Baptist Church. They have one daughter, Robin, and a grandson, Jonathan Zachery.

"I wish to serve the county with integrity and in the good fashion Jim has in the past," Myers said. "I hope to be able to follow in his footsteps."

## Home health care services being studied

## 4-H livestock show and sale Jan. 7-9

The 46th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be held Jan. 7-9 at the County Show Barn. Some 94 4-H members will exhibit 242 market lambs, 54 commercial ewe lambs, 20 Angora goats, two steers and 114 rabbits.

Market lambs will be brought into the barn on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 6, with shearing beginning at 8 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 7. Commercial ewe lambs and Angora goats will move into the barn on Thursday.

Judging will begin on Thursday afternoon at 5:30 p.m. with the rabbit show. Mary Lindsey of San Saba will judge the rabbits and showmanship.

Friday's activities begin at 5:30 p.m. with the steer show, followed at 6 p.m. by the first year feeder show. Commercial ewe lambs will be shown at 7:15 p.m. and Angora goats will be shown at 8:15 p.m.

The market lamb show will begin at 8 a.m. on Saturday morning, Jan. 9. Dr. Carl Menzies of San Angelo will judge the steers, ewe lambs, Angora goats, and market lambs. He will also judge showmanship.

The concession stand will be open Thursday and Friday evenings at 5

p.m. and Saturday morning at 7:30. A barbecue lunch will be served at noon by the 4-H Parents and Leaders Association. The lunch will feature barbecue brisket with all the trimmings. Take-out plates will be available. Barbecue lunch tickets may be purchased ahead of time at the concession stand or in the serving line at noon.

Presentation of awards will begin at 1:30 followed by the premium sale at 2 p.m.

## Reward offered

Announcement was made this week of a reward offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer of Dean Phillips. His widow, Peggy Phillips, has authorized a \$5,000 reward.

Anyone with information is asked to call or go by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department. The telephone number is 392-2661.

Phillips was brutally murdered on Christmas night in 1990. The 83-year-old motel and laundromat owner was beaten when he went to lock the

laundromat adjacent to the Redwood Motel about 9 p.m.

A soft drink machine in the building had been pried open, leading officials to believe that Phillips possibly walked in during a burglary. No weapon was found at the scene of the crime.

Crockett County grand jury indicted a suspect who was seen in the area prior to the murder. A federal interstate flight warrant was issued on the suspect, first name unknown, last name unknown.

cuss recommendations for hospital board membership.

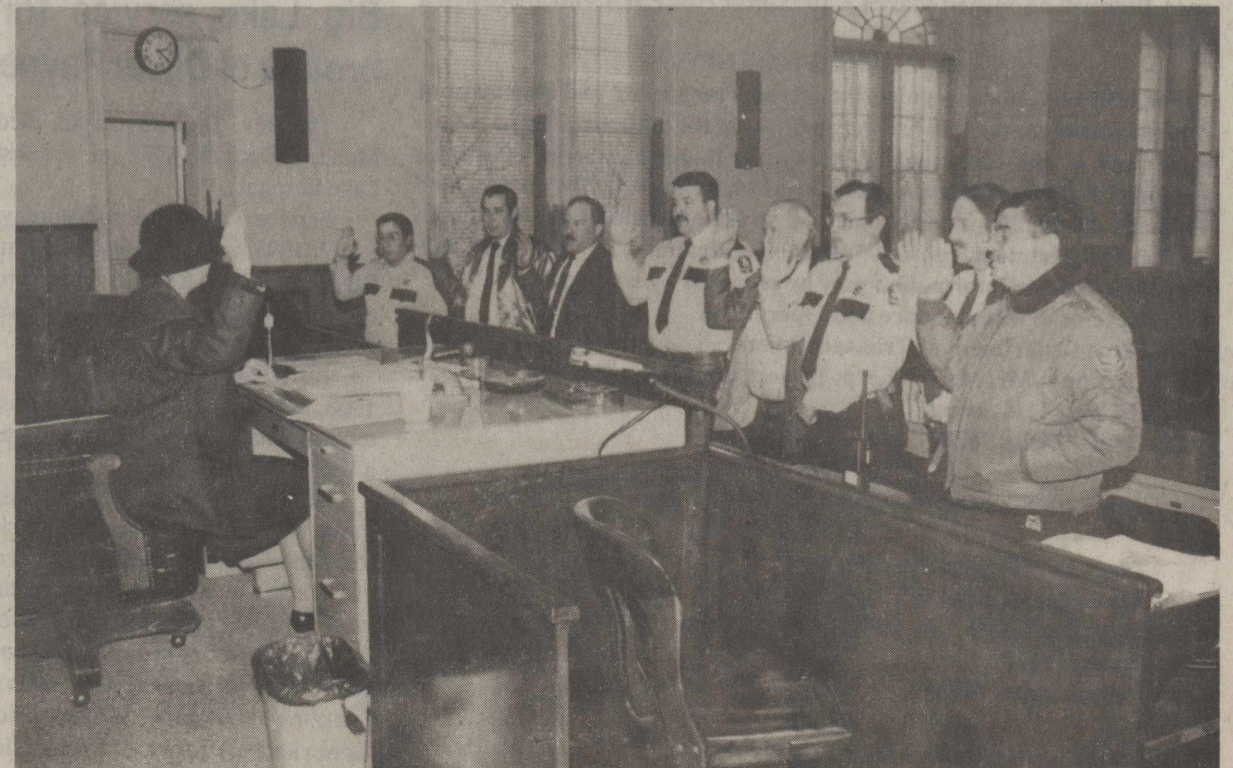
The court voted, in open session, to appoint Burl Myers as treasurer to fill the unexpired term of Jim Dudley.

### TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION PUBLIC NOTICE AWARD OF CONTRACT AND REQUEST FOR STATEMENTS OF INTEREST FOR THE Texas LOGO Sign Program

In accordance with Texas Civil Statutes, Articles 6674a et seq. and 4477-9a, Section 4.07, and Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Sections 25.400-25.408 (43 TAC §§25.400-408), the Texas Department of Transportation is seeking statements of interest from a person, firm, group, or association in the State of Texas for the award of a contract to erect, maintain, lease and market signs and sign space to commercial establishments for the purpose of giving specific information of interest to the traveling public including specific brand names, at appropriate locations along interstate highways in each county with a population of less than 20,000.

A previous notice was published beginning the week of October 7, 1992, advertising the award of contract and request for statements of interest for the Texas Logo Sign Program. Subsequently, prospective contractors were prequalified and bids received. On December 22, 1992, due to unforeseen circumstances, the Texas Transportation Commission found it necessary to reject all bids. This notice is for the re-letting of the contract for the Texas Logo Sign Program. Those prospective contractors that were prequalified to submit bids at the time of the initial letting, remain prequalified for purposes of this reletting; however all others must meet the requirements of prequalification as stated below. All prospective prequalified contractors are required to attend the pre-bid conference to obtain bidding proposals.

Prospective contractors will be required to meet the prequalification requirements as provided by 43 TAC §§25.400-25.408 (published in the June 9, 1992 issue of the Texas Register, 17 TexReg - 4167; correction of error published in the June 19, 1992 issue of the Texas Register, 17 TexReg 4481; final adoption was published in the October 9, 1992 issue of the Texas Register). These sections were adopted by the Texas Transportation Commission on September 29, 1992 and became effective October 21, 1992.

Statements of interest will be used to determine if a person, firm, group, or association in the State of Texas is prequalified for bidding on the Texas LOGO Sign Program contract. Any party interested in becoming prequalified to bid on this contract will be required to submit an introductory letter and a statement of interest. Introductory letters and statement of interests may be sent by registered mail or hand delivered, but must be received at the office of Mr. Mark Thorp, Project Engineer, by 5:00 PM, Central Standard Time, February 22, 1993. Mr. Thorp's address and telephone number may be found at the end of this notice.

Introductory letters and statement of interests will not be accepted if submitted by facsimile messages or telegrams.

Each statement of interest will be reviewed and only those parties meeting the prequalification requirements as prescribed by 43 TAC §§25.403 will be issued bidding proposals and invited to a pre-bid conference. Bids will be opened March 3, 1993 after 1:00 PM, Central Standard Time.

## Mobile Cancer Detection Clinic to be in Ozona Tuesday Jan. 12

Breast cancer cannot be pre-  
vented, but early detection can save  
many lives. Breast cancer will strike  
one in nine American women. The  
American Cancer Society predicts that  
about 44,000 women will die of breast  
cancer this year. Experts estimate that  
if every woman had regular mammo-  
grams according to guidelines estab-  
lished by the American Cancer Soci-  
ety, nearly a third of the women who  
die of breast cancer would survive.

The guidelines are:

- A) Begin mammography by age 40
- B) Age 40-49 mammogram every 1-2 years
- C) Over age 50 annual mammo-gram
- D) Monthly breast self-examination
- E) Regular breast exams by a physician

for early detection of breast cancer.

### More help for medicare beneficiaries

On Jan. 1, 1993, the government will expand a program that helps people eligible for Medicare who have limited income and few resources pay for some of their Medicare-related expenses. With the inauguration of the "specified low-income Medicare beneficiary" (SLMB) program, the State will pay Medicare's Part B monthly premium for people whose income is slightly more than the national poverty level. The Part B premium is \$36.60 per month in 1993.

A similar program is already in place for people whose income is at or below the national poverty level. According to Social Security sources, under that program, called the qualified Medicare beneficiary (QMB) program, the State not only pays the Part B premium, but also Medicare's Part A premium and any deductibles and coinsurance charges.

To qualify for the QMB program in 1992, an individual's annual income cannot exceed \$6,810; for a couple the limit is \$9,190. Annual changes in the Federal poverty levels generally are announced in February and the income limits for 1993 will be published at that time.

To qualify for Medicare Part B premium help under the SLMB program in 1993 and 1994, an individual

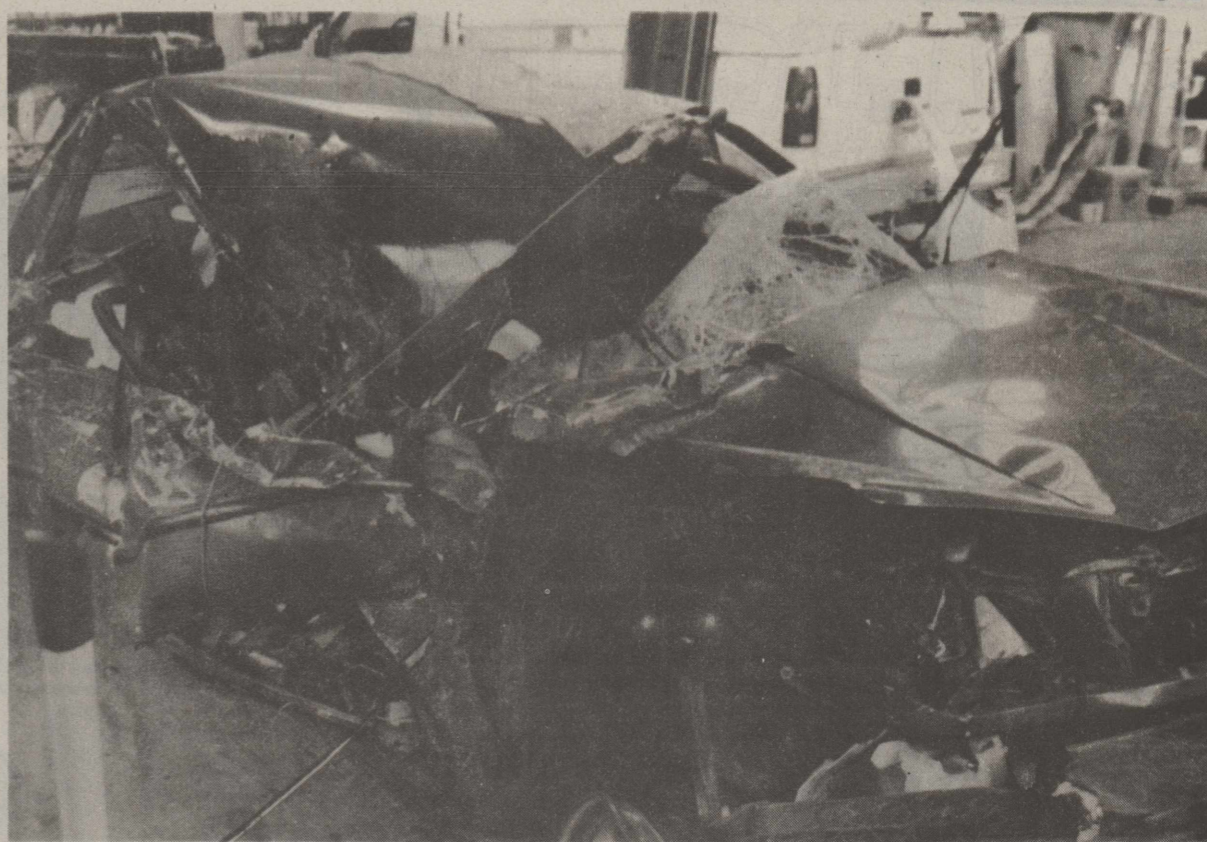

**Thousands seek free screenings for breast, cervical cancer**

Texas Department of Health (TDH) officials urge Texas women to schedule cancer detection checkups, either with their own physician or with public health care providers.

Women who cannot afford preventive or early detection health care services can take advantage of TDH's new no-cost program to screen for breast and cervical cancer.

An estimated 10,000 women sought the free clinical breast exams, mammograms (X-rays of the breast) and Pap tests (tests for abnormal cells in the cervix) between January and June of last year. Of these, at least 21 were diagnosed with cancer. They have undergone, or are undergoing, treatment. Because many diagnostic results are still pending, the number of women found to have cancer probably will increase.

"Many of the women we see, even those in their 50s and 60s, never have had a mammogram because they can't afford preventive health care or health care designed for early detection of disease," said Charlene Lara-

mey, director of the TDH Chronic Disease Prevention Division. "The response we've seen clearly demonstrates the pent-up demand for these life-saving health care services which many of us take for granted," Laramey said.

**Social Security bulletin**  
Age 70 and still working

If your answer to these three questions is "yes", Social Security has important information for you:

- (1) Are you age 70 or older?
- (2) Did you enroll for Medicare when you were 65?
- (3) Did you continue working when you were eligible for Social Security retirement benefits and therefore never collect them?

If so, there's a good chance that you were one of the more than 12,000 people who got a letter from Social Security in November. It reminded potential beneficiaries that when they are 70 years old, they can work, earn any amount of money, and still receive full Social Security benefits. After age 70, there's no limit on your earnings for Social Security purposes. Nothing is deducted from your monthly check even though you continue to work.

Social Security has launched a major effort to contact people 3 months before their 70th birthday. Letters will be mailed each month to potential beneficiaries reminding them that no matter how much they're earning now, they should get in touch with Social Security if they want to begin collecting benefits.

Too often people who continue to work don't realize they can collect their Social Security benefits. That's why letters were sent urging them to contact Social Security about their eligibility.

If you think you're eligible, you can arrange for an appointment by calling Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., or you can call or visit the local office.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

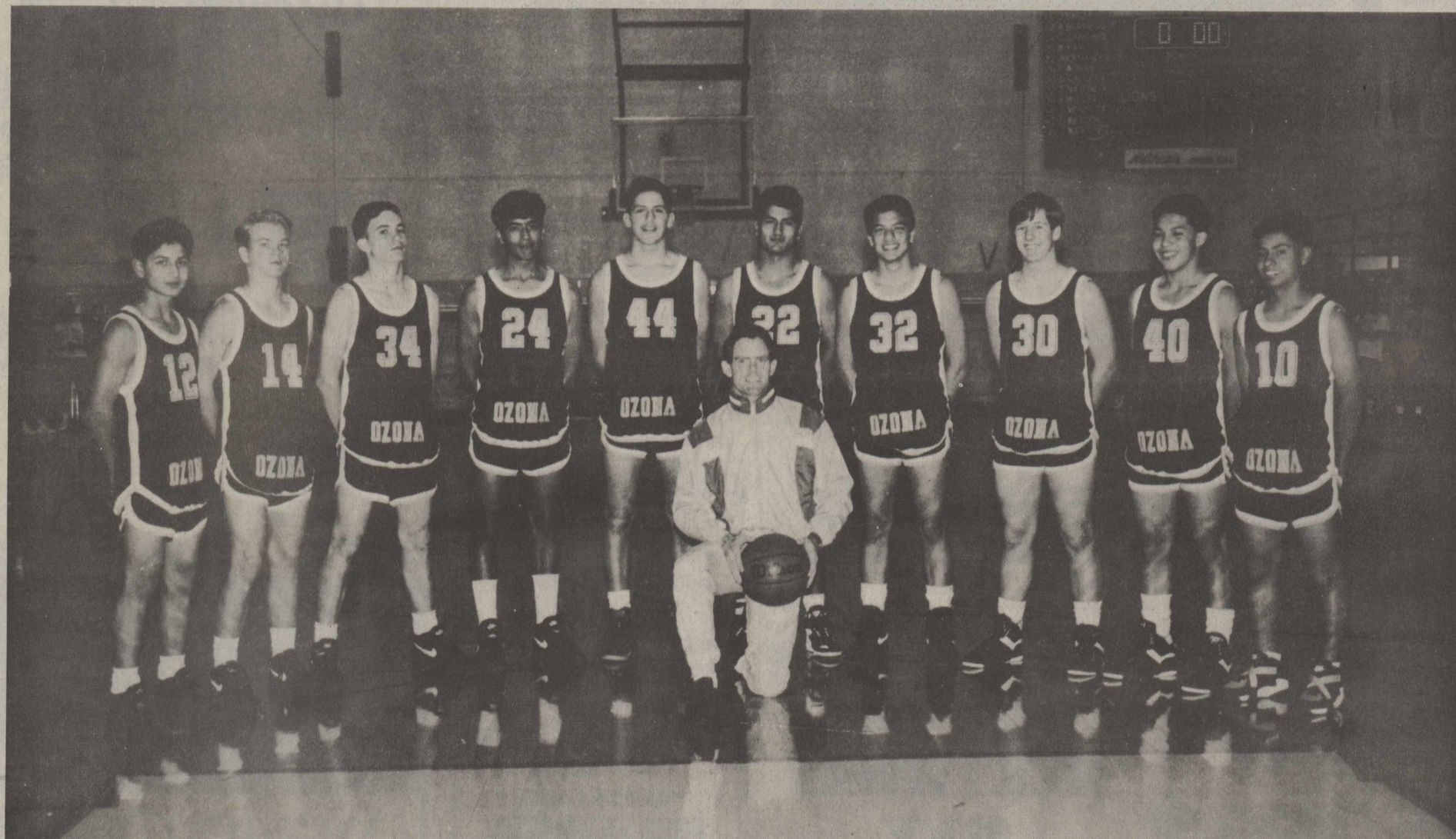

# Panel holds HIV/AIDS discussion

To educate one's self is the key to educating others. With this thought in mind, parents and teachers met in the high school auditorium Monday night to learn how to educate their children and students about HIV/AIDS.

A 16-person panel was available to discuss and to answer questions. The panel, introduced by Lu Ingram, school nurse, was led by Jose Lopez, Brent Johnson and pediatrician Dr. Carl Wehner, members of the San Angelo AIDS Foundation; Anita Wheeler, Region XV Education Service; and Peggy McWilliams, Crockett County public health nurse.

Other panel members were: school counselor Bill Green, high school science teacher David McWilliams, junior high school science teacher Lloyd Winkley, intermediate school teacher Janis Graham, Rev. Dr. Tim Brewer of Ozona United Methodist Church, and school principals John Curry, Tom Humber, Manley Holmes and Walter Spiller.

During the course of a meeting lasting over one and a half hours, questions were fired at the panel members. Much pertinent information was given.

"Ways you are most likely to contract AIDS are through sexual behaviors and IV drug use," said Dr. Wehner. "One is not likely to contract AIDS through everyday contact with the people around you, in school or other casual contact."

"What makes HIV so different is that once it is diagnosed it will eventually be fatal - whether it be a month or five years - unless a cure is found. Early diagnosis is needed so it will not be spread. Also, the patient needs to be placed on medication and a proper diet," Wehner said.

A test for antibodies to the virus averages \$22. The test is free through the AIDS Foundation.

Mr. Lopez pointed out the need of emphasizing to students that those who drink alcohol - even beer - and who use other drugs will be altering their minds. In that state, sexual acts are often committed when they would not be if they were thinking more clearly.

Mrs. McWilliams reported that Crockett County will not show any AIDS cases until there are 10. There could be any number of cases less than 10 and the county would still be shown as having no AIDS cases. The reason for this is to keep actions of prejudice down against the patient. It was also pointed out that if a Crockett County resident was diagnosed with the disease in another county, the case would go on that county's record. Irion County will never have a case since there is no diagnostic site there.

Tom Green County now has 88 HIV cases and 19 cases of full-blown AIDS recorded. Nationally there are 230,000 cases. For everyone who has been diagnosed, there are 10 persons who are undiagnosed. As of Sept. 18, 1992, there were 16,667 cases recorded in Texas, 10,955 known deaths from the disease, 16,505 adult cases (persons over 13) and 172 pediatric cases.

A parent who would like his or her children to be given EVERY bit of information available can rest more easily now. Anita Wheeler with the Education Service Center reported that the Texas Education Agency is in the process of creating a curriculum for grades K-12 which will educate for self-responsibility. There will be 440 lessons which can be taught from the curriculum and they will work in all subject matter. Most AIDS education is now being taught in science classes. This curriculum by TEA has caught the eye of the nation. Other states are viewing it and will possibly model their curriculums after it.

Tom Humber, principal of Ozona Junior High, summed the session up by stating, "We must assume it (HIV/AIDS) is here and act accordingly."

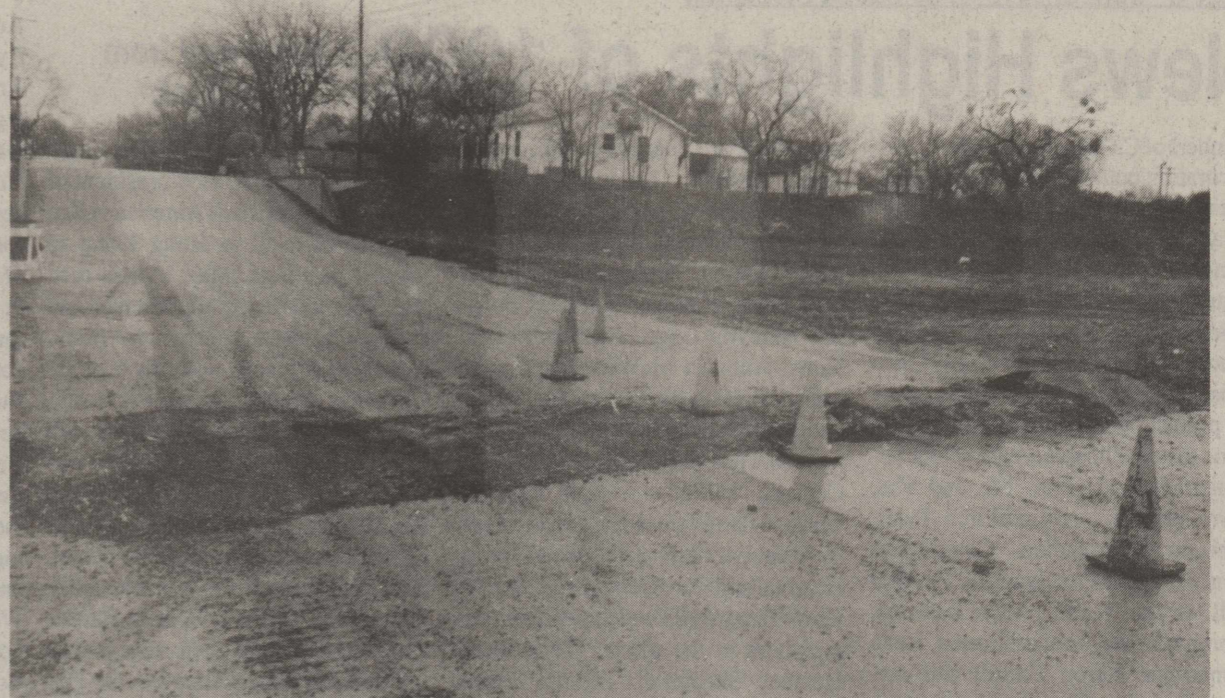

# Texas ranks among nation's top destinations according to study

Texas ranked second as a state travel destination, with nearly 139 million visitors in 1991, according to 1991 Report of Travel to Texas, a recently released study commissioned by the Texas Department of Commerce Tourism Division.

Among the findings from the survey is that 138.8 million people traveled in and to Texas during 1991, ranking the state second, as compared to all states in the U.S. California ranked first with 242 million travelers, and Florida was third with 128.1 million travelers.

Texas ranked third in 1991 in the category of percentage of total travel days with 5.5 percent of the total number of travel days, based on the report's estimate that there were approximately 5.563 billion travel days in the entire U.S. during 1991. This estimate includes both business and leisure travel. California ranked first and Florida was third.

The average stay in Texas, according to the report, was 1.5 days. Texas residents' leisure travel averaged 5.5 days, and Texas resident business travel averaged just over 5 days. Non-Texan leisure travel to Texas averaged 4.5 days, and non-Texan business travel to the state averaged 3.6 days, with an overall average of 4.2 days. For Texas residents, there were 66.6 million single-day trips.

The report estimates that an average of \$70.70 is spent per person per day. Texans spend slightly less, \$58.70 per person per day. Non-Texans average spending is \$86.30 per person per day.

Texas' top feeder (household ori-

gin) states are California, Oklahoma, (with a strong business pull) and Louisiana. During the colder seasons of the year, leading northern feeder states are Michigan, Minnesota and Ohio.

Another interesting statistic in the report is that of all Texas travel, 44 percent comes from non-Texans and 56 percent from Texans. Texas and California are the only two states in the nation where more than half of the travelers to that state are their own residents.

Destinations to Texas also are ranked in the report, along with the percentage of the total that destination represents. The top 10 destinations for 1991 were Dallas at 16 percent, Hous-

ton at 14 percent, Waco at four percent, Corpus Christi at four percent, Brownsville/Harlingen at three percent, Amarillo at two percent and Rural at 16 percent. Rural is defined as counties not part of a Metropolitan Statistical Area.

The travel survey includes data for both business as well as leisure travel, and the research includes both Texas residents and non-residents. Travel is defined as any trip of 50 or more miles one way, or an overnight trip for either business or leisure purposes.

The report, compiled for the Tourism Division by D.K. Shifflet & Associates, analyzes the travel behaviors of 30,000 families each month.

The Lions opened District 6-2A action Tuesday night in Iraan and will host the Stanton Buffaloes on Friday, Jan. 8.

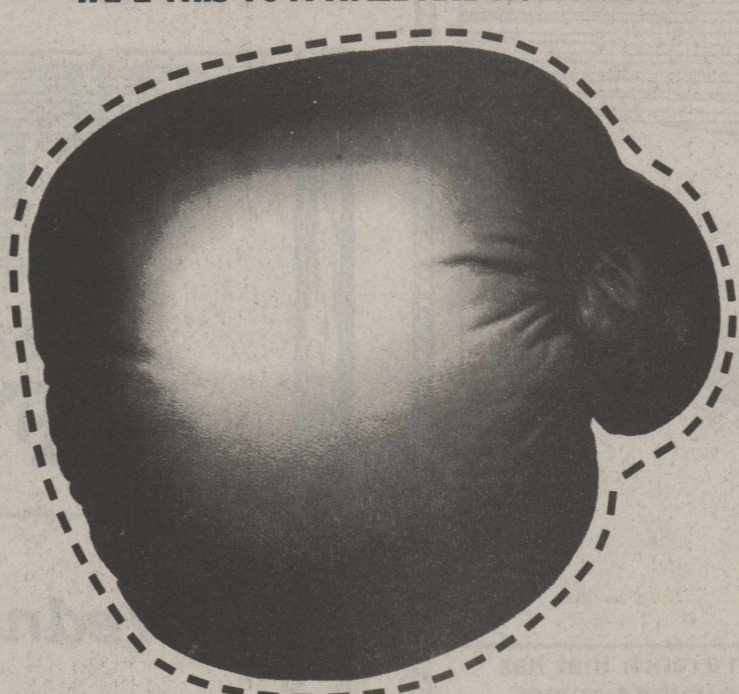

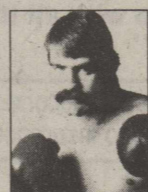
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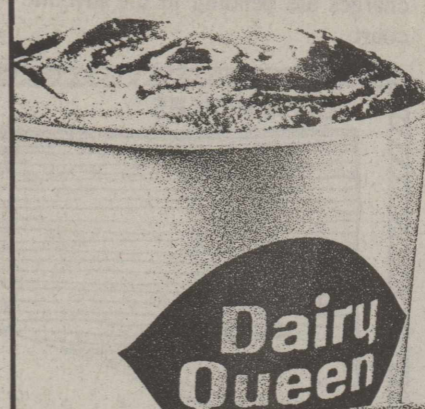

## Changes loom for SCS, ASCS

Crockett County Soil Conservation and Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service offices are among 320 offices in the state at risk for closure or change as the Department of Agriculture moves to streamline operations.

"There's a good possibility all offices capable of doing it will be co-locating within the next two or three years," said Vaden Aldridge, SCS conservationist who received some information from the state last week. Aldridge expects some transfers but no reduction of personnel as changes are made across the state. Co-locating, sharing an office with other departments, will reduce the number of offices.

The USDA has recommended 75 Texas field offices be closed. State directors with Texas SCS, ASCS and Farmers Home Administration offices

Under the plan to be submitted to Madigan, the SCS is authorized to have 321 offices to serve the state according to Wes Oneth, executive director of the Texas SCS. There are currently 233 SCS offices in operation.

Herb Schwertner, ASCS director, said his biggest concern has been the possible loss of the office. An argument out of West Texas is that consolidation of five or six counties would create distances too great to conduct business, Schwertner said.

"Until something happens in January, we're not even sure what will take place if the plan is put in place," Schwertner said.

## Selective Service says men age 26 not eligible for draft

Young men who will turn 26 in 1993 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1993, men who were born in 1967 and were required to register with Selective Service in 1985, will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Men ages 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the

risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison or both.

A man is exempt from registering while he is on full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces. Cadets and midshipmen at the service academies are included in the exemption. Members of the National Guard and Reserve Forces not on full-time active duty must register unless they have reached age 26 or are already registered.

Those who are unable to register due to circumstances beyond their control for example, those who are hospitalized, institutionalized or incarcerated-do not have to register until they are released. After release, they have 30 days in which to register. Handicapped men who live at home must register if they are reasonably able to leave the home and go into a public place. A friend or relative may help a handicapped man to fill out the form if he is unable to do so by himself.

## History of Fort Terrett published

Fort Terrett Ranch of Sonora and Texian Press of Waco announced the release of **From Muskets to Mohair: The History of Fort Terrett**. A must for readers of Texas lore, the 300-page book includes the first complete history of both fort and ranch. Over 200 drawings and photographs depict the military and agriculture heritage of West Texas.

This comprehensive history documents the Indians, the Army and the ranchers. It chronicles Spanish exploration, pioneer settlement and twentieth century livestock methods in West Texas.

The hard-bound, limited edition of only 1,500 copies is available by mail, from Fort Terrett Publishing, P. O. Box 3908, Odessa, Texas 78760-3908 for \$25 including tax and postage.

The U.S. Army built Fort Terrett in 1852 to protect the frontier against Comanches and Mexican invaders. It stood in the far western outback of the unsettled hill country in what would become Sutton County. Within two years the military abandoned Fort Terrett and it reverted to open range. The site, which encompasses the

headwaters of the North Llano River, soon passed into private ownership as part of the German Immigration Company's colony. Because of Indian marauders and an arid climate, thirty years intervened before it became a working ranch in 1882. For the next seventy years Fort Terrett Ranch sprawled over 90,000 acres in Sutton, Edwards and Schleicher Counties.

Several notable Texans who held interests in Fort Terrett included Samuel Maverick of San Antonio, Charles Schreiner of Kerrville, J. M. West and Colonel E. M. House of Houston.

Noted as a massive sheep raising operation since the 1880s, it was owned in succession by Massachusetts entrepreneur P. H. Wentworth Jr. and Sutton County pioneer E. E. Sawyer. The J. T. Evans family possessed Fort Terrett for nearly forty years beginning in 1910.

Owners restored the old fort's stone buildings and adapted them as ranch headquarters and work buildings. Remnants of five structures remain on today's 4000-acre ranch which raises mohair, cattle, exotic game and pecans.

## ACP-Conservation sign up

Under sign up provisions for the Annual Program (ANA) for conservation work, producers may now apply for cost sharing. Applications are approved on the basis of "Need" to correct a conservation problem. Practices available to county producers include brush control, livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks and cross fencing. Application may be made at the ASCS office.

The County Committee has established application review dates for ACP-annual practices. Applications received in the ASCS Office beginning Jan. 11 and before Feb. 12 will be reviewed at the March County Committee meeting.

## Wool and mohair program

Producers are urged to report 1992 wool and mohair "sales" documents before Jan. 31, 1993. Late filed documents can no longer be accepted by the County ASCS Office. You will need to bring in head counts, shearing

dates, grading charges, charges for freight to the warehouse - if any, and any unshorn lamb purchases. If you have purchased unshorn lambs we will need the sale sheet showing the number of head and weight of lambs you bought.

Producers who have not done so must come to the ASCS office to fill out the required CCC-502, Payment Limitation forms and AD-1026's, Land Determination forms before Jan. 31, 1993, so that required determinations may be completed.

Program payments cannot be made until required forms and determinations are complete.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, marital status, disability or national origin.

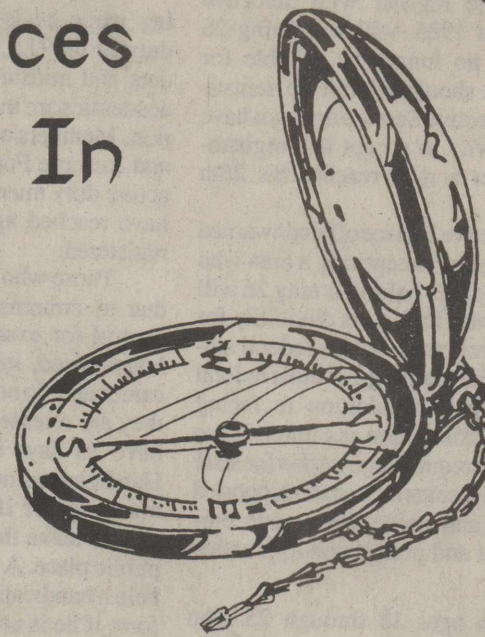

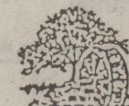
