Lions Sweep Ozona Relays

The Ozona boys track team won their third team championship for the year by capturing the championship of the 40th Ozona Relays held Saturday, March 20, in Lion Stadium. Ozona totaled up 148 points to defeat eight other surrounding area teams. The final standings are as follows: Ozona-148, Greenwood-95, Iraan-85, Sonora-78, Reagan County-64, Ballinger-47, Wall-47 and McCamey-46. Ozona was led by the efforts of both seniors and underclassmen who provided the depth leading to a decisive victory.

"The Ozona track team will use these last three weeks, which are very important, to prepare for the district track meet on April 16th. The team is getting better in most of the events and we will prepare to do our best effort at the district meet which will be held here in Ozona," said Coach Pete Maldonado.

"I was really pleased with the efforts of both of our relays and our hurdlers, especially in the intermediates," said Coach Maldonado. "Aaron Carroll and Anthony Sanchez both ran 40.3's to put them as one of the top times in the region and the San Angelo Relays," stated Maldonado.

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry during the Ft. Worth Stock Show and Rodeo. Farmers and ranchers from 26 different areas of agriculture were chosen the best in their respective fields from over 1100 nominees.

Richardson and Jernigan were cited by the Telegram as pioneers in Artificial Insemination of Sheep in the U.S. In 1987 they traveled to Australia where Jernigan learned the technique. A. I. is common practice in other types of livestock, but was not used in sheep because very little research had been done in the U.S. for

"For years we would get a good ram and not get very many lambs out of him. When you found out he was a good sire, the rascal was already dead," Richardson said.

"Using A. I. gives us the capability of producing hundreds of lambs from one sire or small group of sires that have been selected for their wool, meat, and reproductive traits," Jernigan said.

In 1992 rams produced by A. I. on the ranch topped the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Ram Test in Sonora, with the number one ram and three others in the top six of the spring born group. In all, 10 rams out of 14 were in the Certified group, which is the type 30%.

Using A. I. and selective breeding will continue to place Richardson and Jernigan among the top sheep producers in the state and nation.



Funding Information Center

I have just returned from a twoday workshop on funding and proposal writing at the Funding Information Center in San Antonio. The center is one of the independent cooperating collections of the Foundation Center. This is a nation-wide organization established by foundations to provide an authoritative source of information on philanthropic giving. There are 12 centers scattered across Texas. These are comprehensive collections of information on foundations and grants and the centers offer a wide variety of services and resources for nonprofit organizations. Individuals may use the centers but most foundations only fund 50lc(3) nonprofit organizations.

I received a very comprehensive orientation on the center in San Antonio and learned what materials and resources were available for research into foundations and corporations that fund projects like our library building expansion. Research comprises 90% of the funding process and actual writing of the proposal only 10%. I was able to find some very promising foundations that do fund building and have decided to concentrate on Texas

foundations. Before I'm through I hope to know more about each foundation than they do. It is a very important to know who the trustees are, the interests of each trustee and the foundation. It wouldn't do much good to scholarships when we need building

I also attended a great proposal writing workshop. We covered everything from an overview of philanthropic giving, who gives and why, to the nuts and bolts of a winning proposal. 88.9% of funding comes form individuals, with only 6.2% coming from foundations and 45.9% coming from corporations. There are literally hundreds of thousands of non-profits competing for these funds, so research is more important than ever to make sure we apply to foundations that will

Public school finance—what do the constitutional amendments mean? What do they do to our district? How should we vote? What happens if these amendments, or at least, the first one of the three were to fail in the May 1st election?

These are the type questions that we are receiving in my office daily, and the following is intended to help inform you, and make you more knowledgeable in the matter. There will be three amendments on your May 1st ballot pertaining to public education. The first of these will deal with the authority to recapture and redistribute property tax wealth from one district to another. The top 10% of the school districts in property wealth would have money recaptured among the other the state. This is simply authorization to redistribute local property tax dollars, and is not a school finance plan, heard to the contrary. The second issue on the ballot for constitutional amendment will preclude the state sending further mandates to the local funds for their implementation. This is for you to decide. On first look, it sounds extremely good—but—had there been no state mandate, it is highly possible that the teacher/student ratio could be 1 to 35 or 40, rather than the mandated 1 to 22. 

would have, of course, would be consolidations of school districts, which is within the constitutional power of the Legislature. Creating new taxing systems are not within the authorized capability of the Legislature, without the vote of the citizens of the state. For consolidations to work, and solve the court's mandate that all children have access to an equal amount of tax wealth per student, would necessitate the consolidation of rich and poor districts, or some method which would make each district have a similar level no matter what you might have read or of tax wealth per child. This could mean consolidating with the county, or within the CED, or in the event of all poor districts in a given geographic area, or all rich districts within a given geographic area, could call for consolidating two schools, or more, in widely different areas of the State—a





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
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
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
