

Lions Capture District Track And Field Trophy

The Ozona Lions ended their (3rd)

regular track season with a district championship Friday, April 16, in Lion Stadium. The Lions used a blend of upper and lower classmen in a team (6th) effort to topple the past district champs and much talented Stanton track team.

Much of the Lions' success came from the running events where depth 11:11.76 (4th); John Ramirezplayed the winning part. The Lions 11:18.96 (5th) won only two running events, 110 M high hurdles and the 300 M intermediate hurdles, but still had enough 2:11.62 (5th); Rene Tambungadepth to score in every running event 2:12.08 (6th); Michael Mitchellexcept the 100 M and 200 M dash. 



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The couple was united before an altar decorated with candelabra and greenery. White satin bows served as pew markers.

Prior to the beginning of the ceremony, parents of the couple approached the altar area to light candles representing the two families and their children's lives up to this point. Tamel and Jason completed the lighting of the unity candle at the end of the ceremony, signifying the combining of their lives and the two families into one

Rendering preceremonial music was pianist Mrs. Barbara Burger of Ozona. Wagner's traditional "Bridal Chorus" and Mendelssohn's "Wedding March" were played by organist Fred Baker of Ozona. Keeping the bride's book in the vestibule prior to the ceremony was Myra Sanchez of Ozona.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride was lovely in a formal gown of white satin. The fitted bodice featured a Queen Anne neckline edged with dainty pearls and Schiffli lace. unfunded mandates to be carried out by the school districts of Texas. The burden of funding the educa-

tion of the children of Texas has unfairly fallen on the shoulders of the State of Texas property owners.

The "Robin Hood" constitutional amendment plan is nothing more than the same unfair funding of education

by property taxes. I have noted that the state government has made the statement that there are no other alternatives. That is a very unwise and simple statement coming from the representatives that we have elected to serve us.

With the experience of funding budgets in our district and serving as director on our CED, I do not understand why the state has not explained how the money is going to be collected and how it is going to be divided. I think this is a fair question of our state government, and they very definitely will not answer this question. Is it a secret?

For the benefit of Crockett County, we will definitely suffer if propositions 1 and 3 are passed, and therefore we estimate that we will lose approximately one-third of our tax income to the state. We would have to raise taxes considerably in order to offset the deficiency caused by the increased amount sent to the state for other schools.

A question to which no one knows the answer is, who is going to be the collection agency? Possibly the County Education District which serves Ozona, Iraan, Brackettville, Del Rio, Fort Stockton, Imperial, Marfa, Fort Davis, Valentine and Comstock would be the organization that votes on the amount of taxes for each county. So, if this district above needed more money, then the directors of the above districts would vote on an increase. This part of the amendment has not







> Norris said that Midland College is currently offering courses in Big Lake, Ft. Stockton, and Iraan under two different arrangements. In Big Lake, the courses are offered at night, and each class meets twice each week. In Ft. Stockton, about twenty courses are being offered, and while the majority of the classes meet on a twice a week basis in the evening, courses in English, social studies, and several other areas are also offered to high school students concurrently.

In explaining the concurrent high school-college enrollment concept, Norris said, "College students have reported for years that certain college courses were simply repeating high school courses. In recognition of this, the State of Texas granted, by law, permission for a public school district and an accredited college to enter an agreement whereby a high school student can earn both high school and college credit for selected courses." Norris remarked that concurrent courses are more difficult to establish because the teacher must meet college teaching criteria (a master's degree and eighteen advanced hours

College's area, which stretches north- what courses to offer. "Some of the more popular courses such as freshman English, social studies, or government might be a starting point," he said. "It all depends on the response that we get."

"I would recommend that we begin these courses in September on a two-night per week basis at first, then add to them as needed," Norris said. "The only thing that we need from the school district is permission to use your facilities and a small amount of clerical help when we begin enrollment. Since we are just starting the program, I would not recommend considering the concurrent option at the present time.

The trustees also approved two requests for two middle school field trips. The seventh grade will make a trip to the Nimitz Museum and LBJ State Park as well as eating in an German restaurant in Fredricksburg. Students eligible for the trip are all seventh grade students who have successfully turned in all classroom assignments on time and have followed all class rules as agreed upon prior to the school year. Approximately 35 students and three teachers will make the trip. Eighth grade students will be making an educational trip to the Witte Museum in San An-

Texas Wool Production Increased, Mohair Production Declined During 1992

AUSTIN - Slightly higher wool prices during 1992 encouraged Texas wool producers to shear a few more sheep and lambs which led to an increase in wool production. Significantly lower prices for mohair were discouraging to mohair producers, leading to a decrease in mohair pro- tion during 1992 was 83.4 million duction.

According to the annual report released by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, wool production totaled 17.60 million pounds, five percent above the previous year's to-

tal. Texas producers sheared 2.45 million sheep and lambs during the year, five percent more than they did during 1991. The average fleece weight was 7.2 pounds - the same as last year.

Total value of the state's wool the previous year to \$16.90 million. United States on Jan. 1, 1993. Price per pound averaged \$.96, up from the average of \$.83 during 1991.

Texas mohair production during 1992 totaled 14.20 million pounds, down four percent from a year ago. Producers clipped 2.00 million Angora goats with an average clip of 7.1 pounds. 




