County Wins Big At 4-H Roundup

The Sheep and Goat Demonstration contest at Texas 4-H Roundup belonged to Crockett County last week, as the team of Stefny Sutton and Jennifer Evans took first place with their promotional talk on mohair, and a talk on embryo transfers in Angora goats by Whitney Vannoy placed third. It is very unusual for a county to win two places in a contest, and this was a first for Crockett County.

Chris Cornett took first place in the Consumer Life Skills Activity with his talk on buying tennis rackets. Jo Lynn Vannoy and Katharine Durham represented Crockett County in the Public Speaking and Family Life categories. Their placings were unavailable at press time.

In the Texas 4-H Food Show, Julie Childress placed second in the Nutritious Snacks and Desserts category, while Whitney Vannoy placed in the top half of her class in the Main Dish category.

In the Texas 4-H Fashion Show, Crockett County was honored by two second-place wins by JoLynn Vannoy. One was in the Dressy Buying division, and the other was in the Cotton Division, with 33 other contestants vying for the honor. Addi-

tional recognition for Crockett County 4-H'ers came with Stefny Sutton's being chosen one of four fashion show narrators during a statewide competition.

State Teen Fashion Board chairman Katharine Durham was also recognized during the show for her three years' service leader of that group. Durham, Julie Childress and Whitney Vannoy served as peer judges for the state fashion show, and Carmen Sutton was co-chairman of the staging committee for the show, held for the first time in conjunction with Roundup.

The Crockett County wool judging team placed fourth in their contest. Members are Anthony Sanchez, Adrienne Dickerson, Casey Upham and Tara Wilkins. Coach Donnie Laughlin was heard to remark, "We'll be back." The rifle team of Justin Southern, Gary Thompson, Robert Bryson and John Baker made its debut at the state contest this year, as did a new Range Judging team, made up of members John Clayton Childress, Lynne Haire, Slate Williams and Chad Upham. Although non-placing results for those teams were not known at press time, they represented Crockett County well and have vowed to

return next year.

"This was one of the most successful years we've had at roundup," said Tedra Ulmer and Billy Reagor, County Extension Agents, "and the credit goes to the 4-H members who performed beautifully under pressure, the 4-H leaders and parents who helped them prepare, and the friends and family who gave them support."

The agents expressed appreciation to the coaches of the teams and the parents who accompanied the group and provided transportation to Roundup. Coaches were as follows: Sheep and Goat 1st Place Demonstration -- Carmen Sutton; Consumer Life Skills 1st Place Demonstration -- Neal Ulmer; Sheep and Goat 3rd Place -- Gary Vannoy; Public Speaking, Fashion Show & Food Show -- Nancy Vannoy; Food Show -- Sadie Davidson; Range -- Vaden Aldridge; Rifle -- Ben English; Wool -- Donnie Laughlin. 4-H'ers Win \$32,500 In Scholarships

Three 4-H members from Crockett County walked off with \$32,000 at this year's Texas 4-H Roundup, adding to the county delegation's winnings in every phase of last week's competition.

Whitney Vannoy, daughter of Gary and Nancy Vannoy, received a San Antonio Livestock Exposition scholarship worth \$12,500, while Chad Upham and Julie Childress each received Houston Livestock Show scholarships worth \$10,000 each. Upham is the son of Randy and Elizabeth Upham,

and Julie is the daughter of Pleas and Sandra Childress. The scholarships are administered through the Texas 4-H Foundation. This year more than 300 applicants vied for 123 scholarships with a total value of \$880,000.

"This brings scholarships received by 4-H members from our county in the last five years to a total of \$52,000," noted County Extension Agents Tedra Ulmer and Billy Reagor. "We hope in future years the total will grow even

further as more people become aware of and work towards 4-H Foundation Scholarships," the agents said.

The trio of scholarship winners plans to attend Texas A&M University where Whitney and Julie will major in biomedical science and Chad will major in agri/business.

"No words can express the pride we feel in these young people and their accomplishments, and we are pleased that they will be representing 4-H as they attend college on these scholarships," the agents stated.

Survey Part Of Grant Application

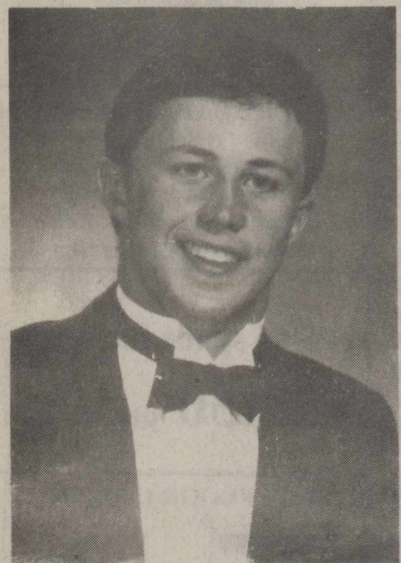
Persons willing to help with a door-to-door survey to be conducted at all Ozona homes south of the interstate are asked to meet June 22 at 7 p.m. in the Parish Hall. The survey is an important part of efforts to obtain a \$150,000 Texas Community Block Grant for Ozona.

Everyone contacted needs to answer the survey so Ozona will have a better chance of receiving the grant, said Commissioner Frank Tambunga. If you are bi-lingual and willing to help conduct the two-page survey but cannot attend the meeting, contact Tambunga or Commissioner Rudy Martinez.

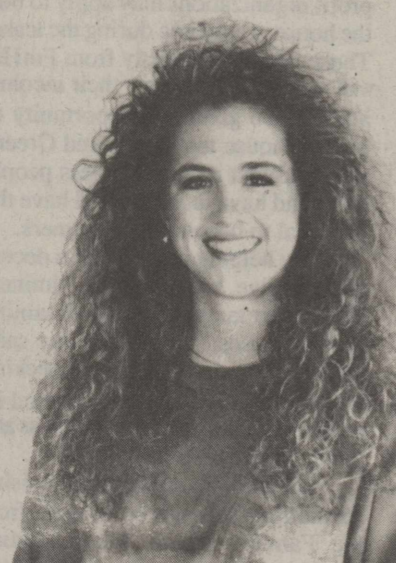
The grant is being sought through joint effort of Crockett County and Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1.

A needs assessment is also part of the survey and will give residents opportunity to indicate what their priorities are for the area. Listed on the needs assessment sheet provided by the state are: water system, sewer system, housing rehabilitation, road and street improvement, handicapped accessibility for public buildings, drainage improvements, fire protection, community/senior/social service centers, demolition and clearance and solid waste disposal/landfills.

Tambunga said he expects the survey to be completed by the end of June or early July at the latest.

Ozona Site For First Logo Sign

The state's first business logo sign will be unveiled Thursday just east of Ozona. The blue signs advertising nearby gas stations, restaurants, lodging and campgrounds will be similar to those in 37 other states.

The Texas Transportation Commission in September approved the state's first logo signs for placement along Interstate highways in counties with fewer than 20,000 people. Interstates cross 35 such counties in Texas. Ozona's first sign to be unveiled

(there will be one at two interstate exits) will be in the westbound lane of I-10 just east of Ozona. The public is invited to attend the 9 a.m. ceremony. TxDOT officials and Sen. Bill Sims are expected to be present for the unveiling along with local merchants whose businesses are featured on the sign.

Logo signs were authorized by the Texas Legislature in 1991. Businesses pay a rental fee to display their logos, and TxDOT will receive five percent of these fees.

Mountain Lion Sighted In Town

Connie Bentley doesn't usually have guests for breakfast, but she almost did Wednesday.

As is her custom in warm weather, she settled down on a chair in her open doorway about 7 a.m. with a breakfast tray on her lap. When she looked across Live Oak Street into the pasture there stood what she first believed to be a bobcat.

"It came out into the open and walked real slow," said Mrs. Bentley. The animal seemed to look right at the door. He was close enough that she could see his black whiskers, Mrs. Bentley said.

When the big cat downed his head and walked away into the thicket, she saw the long curved tail and knew her visitor was not a bobcat at all but a mountain lion.

"I was very quiet; I didn't make

any racket," Mrs. Bentley said.

She described the animal as poor and weighing 50 to 75 pounds.

Mrs. Bentley said she was grateful for the early hour and the fact that there were no children up riding their bikes in the area or over playing in the pasture as they often do.

"When I go outside, over there is the first place I look. I don't water flowers at night any more," she said.

Another possible sighting of the animal was made by Cade Clark one afternoon last week. Cade told his mother, Elizabeth Clark, he thought he saw a bobcat in the pasture as they drove along a road parallel to the pasture near their home on Boyd Street.

Mrs. Clark said she had not heard about the mountain lion at that time and told her son he probably saw a large housecat.

Court Plans For Emergencies

Court members adopted an emergency preparedness and management program at their meeting Monday. The program was developed by Steve Kenley at the May meeting of the court. The comprehensive plan provides for an emergency management director

and a coordinator, identifying an operational organization and granting the powers to cope with all phases of emergency management which threaten life and property in the county.

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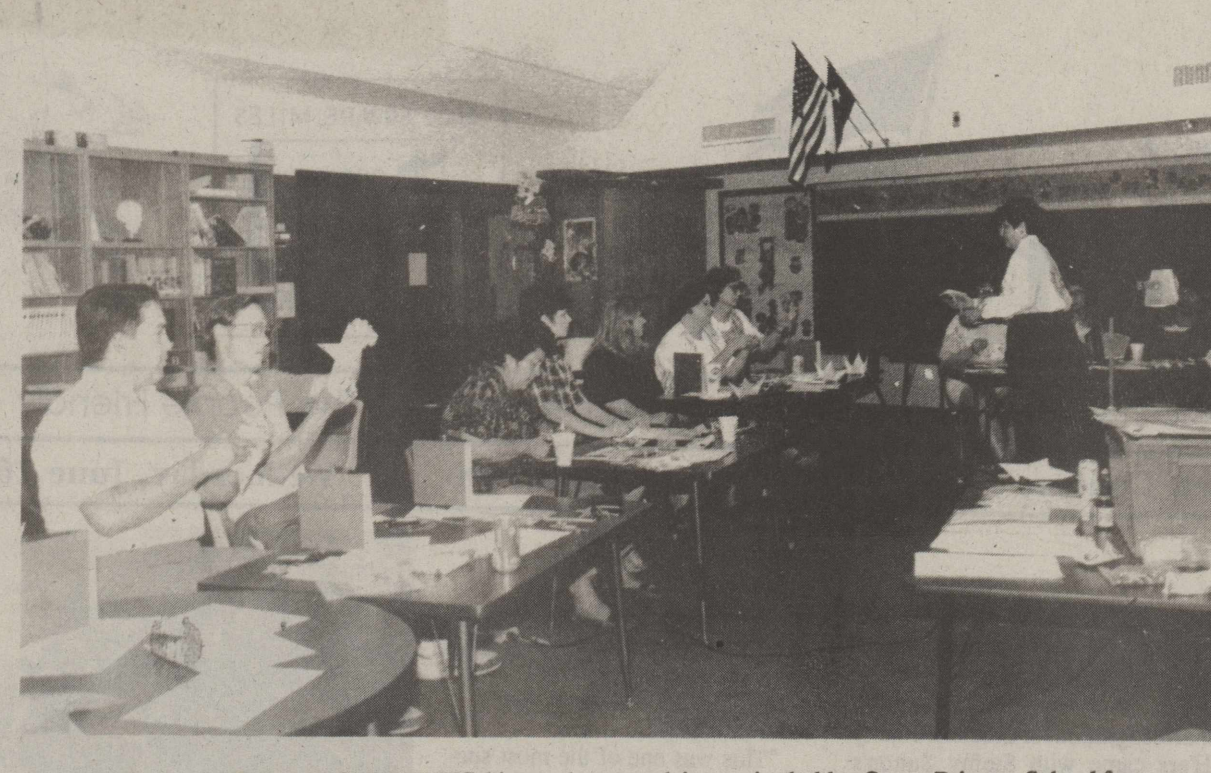

USDA Helps Homeless

Rural residents who are homeless or inadequately-housed families may now have a chance to become homeowners under a plan being adopted by the Farmers Home Administration, Fred Greenway, FmHA county supervisor, said.

Under the plan, special emphasis will be given to homes that have been in FmHA's inventory at least 18 months. Inventory homes will be offered to public bodies, including housing authorities and nonprofit community-based organizations, for rent to the homeless, or in some cases, FmHA will rent directly to the individuals, Mr. Greenway said. In addition, homes which were recently acquired by FmHA into inventory but have not yet been repaired will also be offered for lease to the homeless.

The families who obtain the housing from the public bodies or non-profit organizations may apply to buy the house at any time during the lease. Those who rent directly from FmHA will pay rent based on their income and will be given the opportunity to buy the house they rent. Fred Greenway said that many homeless people work and have incomes, and have the potential to become homeowners.

"By helping people find a decent place to live, we also help eliminate the cost to taxpayers of maintaining vacant houses," Mr. Greenway said. FmHA officials in Texas are seeking organizations which are interested in providing housing to the homeless and to inadequately-housed families.

Information concerning housing for the homeless may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located at ASCS Bldg., Concho Street in Eden, Greenway said. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

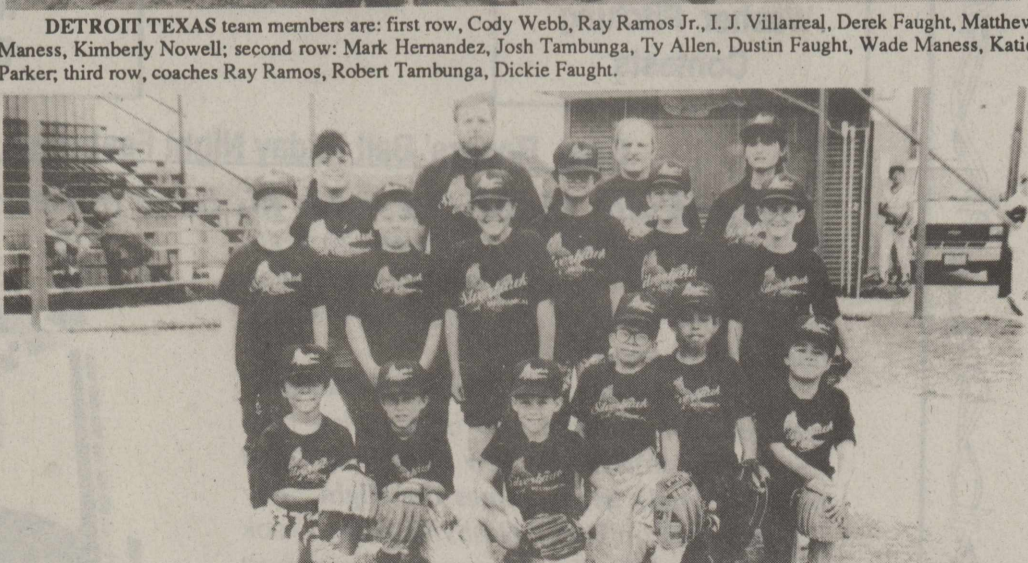

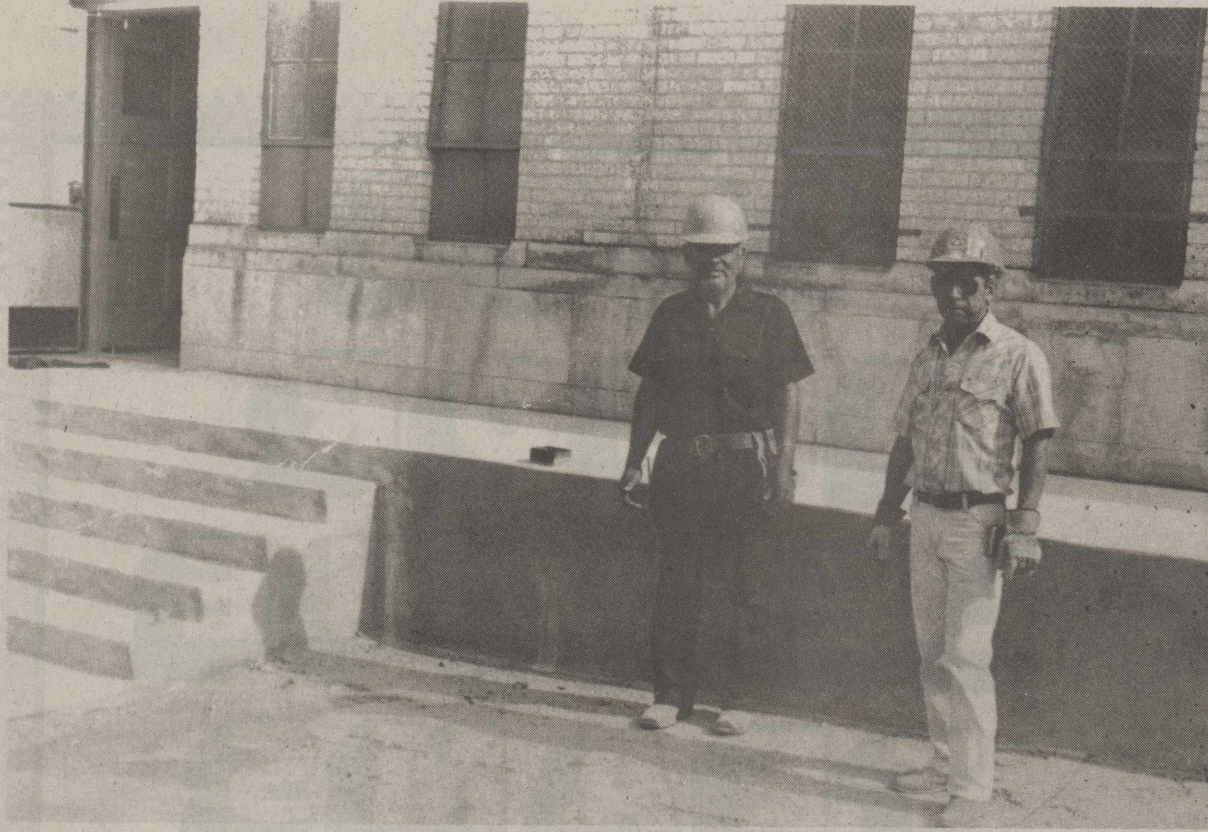

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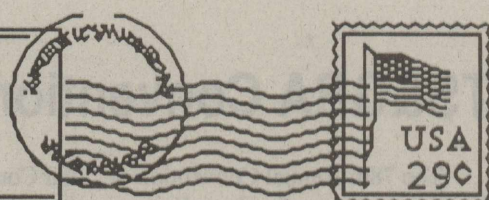

Three E's Important In Bone Health

Estrogen, exercise and extra calcium are important in keeping bones strong.

Estrogen, exercise, and extra calcium are like independent legs of a three-legged stool, they all work together, but they cannot substitute for one another," according to Dr. Robert Heaney, M.D., professor of internal medicine at Creighton University in Omaha. A recent Australian study of postmenopausal women found that a combination of exercise, plus calcium, slowed bone loss, while a combination of exercise plus estrogen actually increased bone. But exercise alone was not effective.

Children, teens and women in their thirties can lay down bone and build an early defense against osteoporosis by increasing physical activity and getting enough calcium.

Experts believe that intake of calcium should be higher than the RDA recommendation of 800 milligrams a day for adults to reduce the risk of osteoporosis. The National Institutes of Health and the National Osteoporosis Foundation recommend that adults consume 1,000 milligrams of calcium daily. Because estrogen conserves calcium, the recommendation for postmenopausal women who don't take supplemental estrogen is 1,500 milligrams.

Drinking three to five 8-ounce glasses of milk daily is the best way to meet recommendations, according to experts. Eating calcium-rich non-dairy foods and low-fat dairy products can help women who do not like milk, are lactose intolerant or are concerned about calories, fat and cholesterol.

Studies show that most women do not get enough calcium-rich foods to meet the RDA. Therefore, a calcium supplement may be needed.

When selecting a calcium supplement, there are a few things you should know:

- Many supplements do not dissolve enough to be absorbed by the body. Most calcium tablets now meet disintegration or dissolution

standards. The U.S. Pharmacopoeia (USP) that set federal standards for the composition and quality of drugs and vitamin supplements.

- Stick with brand name products or large chain-store brands. Look for labels stating the supplement meets USP standards or has passed a 30-minute dissolution test. Avoid supplements made with bone meal or dolomite. These may be contaminated with lead.

- Dosage -- The number of tablets you'll need to take depends on the type of calcium a supplement contains. Calcium carbonate is the most widely used supplement because it contains the most calcium per tablet--more than other sources, such as calcium lactate, calcium gluconate or calcium citrate. Calcium carbonate is more convenient and less costly. Check the label to find out how much calcium each tablet contains.

- Timing -- How well you absorb calcium may depend on when you take it. Calcium is best absorbed when it's taken in divided doses rather than all at once. If you're taking calcium carbonate, be sure to take it with meals. Stomach acids secreted while you eat help to absorb the calcium.

It is never too early to help prevent osteoporosis from developing later in life. You can help deter this disease by:

- Eating foods rich in calcium as part of a well-balanced diet. Consider a calcium supplement or fortified juice to meet your daily needs.

- Exercising regularly, emphasizing weight-bearing activities such as walking, aerobics or racquet sports.

- Not smoking or drinking excessively. It can reduce calcium absorption.

The court approved: a request by Ozona Woman's League to build a second sand volleyball court at the fairgrounds, repair of channel side slopes on Johnson Draw where an approximate 70 foot section of soil has been removed, and taking action under the Litter Abatement Act for removal of debris from properties on A Street, AA Street and Ramos Street.

Placement of 10 lights along Highway 163 South to the Crockett Apartments was approved as was a request presented by Ginger Perner that the court ask General Telephone to certify the area in the southwest corner of Crockett County for telephone service for those residents wanting it.

Court members approved purchase of the Jose Aguirre and Bernadina Gonzales properties for back taxes owed when they come up for sale on the courthouse steps.

Commissioners voted to write a letter to the gas company requesting that specific meters be moved behind county guard rails.

Election returns for the special run-off election were canvassed, and commissioners heard monthly reports from Eddie Moore for the road and parks department, county auditor Sandy Stokes, Garland Young for the civic and youth center, Louise Ledoux

for the public library and Gerry Phillips for the hospital and care center.

Reports from the fire department and helping hands were read by Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

In relation to the hospital and care center report, the court voted to approve: participation in the Texas Tech Health Net education program, extension of Dr. Robert Owensby's contract through Aug. 1, award of scholarships to Connie Nelson, Roxanne Ramon and Luella Jones, and to accept the board's recommendation of a replacement to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Tim Brewer. Donnie Laughlin accepted the appointment.

Study Links Reduced Infant Deaths To Benefits Of Texas WIC Program

A recent study has credited participation by pregnant women in the Texas WIC Program (the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children) with reducing deaths of babies born to Medicaid mothers. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) administers the WIC Program.

The Mathematica Policy Research Inc. studied infant mortality among Medicaid recipients' newborns in Texas, Florida, Minnesota, North Carolina and South Carolina. The babies of Medicaid mothers who also participated in WIC were less likely to die in infancy than were the babies of Medicaid mothers who did not have WIC's help.

"This study is further proof that WIC works, that WIC is a win-win program for kids and for taxpayers," Debra Stabeno said. Stabeno is chief of the TDH Bureau of WIC Nutrition. "Earlier studies have shown that

taxpayers save \$2.44 in Medicaid costs for every dollar we spend on WIC in the first two months of a baby's life," Stabeno said. "This new study shows that the WIC Program not only ensures the health and development of our most vulnerable infants and children, it actually saves lives."

Among the babies of Medicaid recipients, the study estimated that infant deaths of WIC participants occur about one-fourth to two-thirds as often as infant deaths of non-WIC participants. In comparing infant mortality in the two groups, the greatest difference appeared among the babies' deaths occurring within the first 28 days.

In Texas, the study tracked all Medicaid births from January through June in 1988. The statistics suggested that 103 more Medicaid infants during that period might have died had their mothers not had WIC assistance

What a summer in Ozona, fun and more fun. There seem to be things for everyone. What a great time to live in this community.

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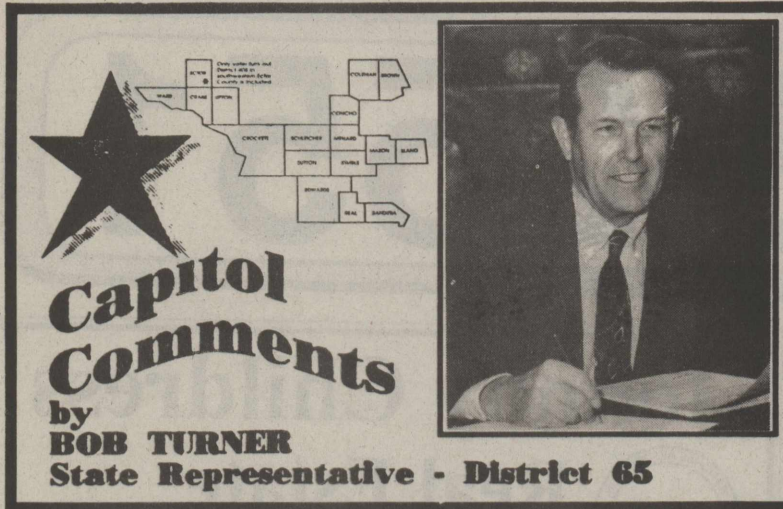
Don't miss the World Championship Goat Roping June 25 & 26 in Ozona!

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The regular session of the 73rd Texas Legislature is now history. Due to the new rules that were adopted in this session of the Texas Legislature, the recent session ended on May 31st in a much more orderly and well-organized fashion compared to past State Legislatures. I feel that the overall session was very successful and accomplished a number of important goals that will be worthwhile to residents of the 73rd District and all of Rural and West Texas. I will attempt to address what I feel to be some of the most important accomplishments of this session, as well as point out a few of the disappointments that normally go along with any legislative session.

The rewrite of the Texas Penal Code was a very important piece of legislation. It created what is known as a state jail felony offense, as well as increased the level of the offense for a lot of other crimes. A prohibition against homosexual sodomy was retained in the code. A number of provisions that were included in the House version of the Penal Code such as - theft from the elderly - solicitation of a child - discharging a firearm at a habitation, building, or vehicle, leaving a child unattended in a vehicle and injury to pregnant women - were all left out of the final version of the Penal Code redraft. The Conservative Coalition played a major part in an attempt to have these aforementioned items included in the final version, but did not succeed.

There was a passage of the School Finance Bill that will enable Texas schools to remain open, even though I did not vote for the bill. The bill has already been signed by the Governor and was subsequently determined valid by Judge McGowan. A number of the property rich districts have already prepared a suit against the state in the case, contesting its validity and contending that it is still a statewide property tax, which is prohibited by the Texas Constitution.

There was the passage of the Automatic Drivers License Revocation Bill. If an individual is apprehended and refuses to take an alcohol test, he may have his drivers license actually taken by the officer and automatically suspended. Numerous attempts had been made in previous legislative sessions to have this type legislation passed, all of which had failed before. This time it passed.

Enacted was a Health Insurance Availability and Accessibility Bill that will make insurance portable when an employee changes place of employment. This bill provides a buying cooperative where small employers may obtain cheaper rates, through cooperative buying power. The bill did finally exclude guaranteed issue, regardless of the current health condition of the applicant. This for a two-year period, in which studies are to be conducted as to the feasibility of such practice. A provision of this legislation will call for a study of health insurance mandates to determine their cost, impact on premium and possible cost effectiveness.

There was a non-binding referendum in the form of a Resolution which would allow the voters of the State of Texas to go to the polls in November of '93 to determine if they want the

right to carry a pistol for self protection and property protection. If approved by the voters, this law would be coordinated through the Texas Department of Public Safety, where the rules and provision would be written and enforced. This bill was passed by both the House and Senate, but according to media report, will be vetoed by the Governor.

If you remember, product liability legislation was killed in a Senate Committee, after having passed in the House during the last session of the Texas Legislature. It is common consensus that small merchants and distributors need relief from liability for products over which they have no manufacturing or packing responsibility. Senate Bill 4, by Senator Carl Parker was one of the first bills to pass during this session of the Legislature and it concerns the topic of product liability. This bill will require a manufacturer to indemnify and hold harmless a seller against loss arising out of a product's liability action, unless the loss was caused by the seller's negligence, or intentional misconduct, or the product was negligently modified or altered. This is important legislation for sellers of products who do not manufacture or alter those products before selling it to the consumer.

Funding was authorized for the additional prison bed spaces in an attempt to ensure that criminals serve longer periods of their prescribed sentences. This is an important attempt to keep repeat offenders off the street, and behind bars, where they belong. This subject has been frequently discussed in the media.

The Legislature created a plan for managing the Edwards Aquifer. The federal courts have mandated that the Edwards plan must be prepared with consideration of water conservation and water usage of the Edwards and it must be tied to the Endangered Species Act. Complications in creating this plan centered around the conflicts between the farmers in the

Uvalde/Medina County areas, versus the City of San Antonio, who depends totally on the Aquifer for their municipal usage. The Aquifer supplies water to the springs at San Marcos and New Braunfels and even concerns the down stream users below the Aquifer that includes the rice farmers in the Columbus and Victoria areas. This has been a festering conflict, and a problem that has been in court for years. Hopefully this plan will satisfy the court and be equitable to all, to the extent that fairness is possible.

A Resolution was passed in this session that will call for a statewide referendum for a Constitutional Amendment concerning prohibiting an income tax in the state, with certain restrictions. It will decree that an income tax could only be approved in the state by the vote of the people. It would have to clearly state the tax rate and that the proceeds would be dedicated to public education and it must be tied to definite property tax relief in the area of public school funding.

The Public Utility Commission was simply extended as it currently is for a period of two years. This was done instead of reauthorizing the PUC for the usual twelve-year period, as prescribed in the Sunset Provision. A lot of publicity has centered around the "Phantom tax" that utility providers charge to users, but supposedly do not actually pay in the way of income tax to the federal government. This is related to the structural procedures of utility providers and the various components of their corporate structuring methods. The PUC will be revisited in the 74th Legislature, in 1995.

This gives you an idea as to some of the major statewide, legislative issues that faced the 73rd regular legislative session. This in no way describes all of the area, or local concern issues which are truly major to us.

As I have previously said, there were 3,000 House Bills, and 1,559 Senate Bills, some of which were identical, or companion bills, which were filed in both Chambers.
