## Dairy May Relocate In Crockett County

The Ozona/Crockett County Economic Development Group is in the final stages of negotiations for the relocation of a California dairy to Crockett County according to Robert Bryson, local manager of West Texas Utilities. The factors are in place for a dairy including land at reasonable cost, supply side availability (feed stocks, utilities and such), water, proper soil type and general quality of life here in Ozona.

The relocation process was prompted by the urban encroachment in Southern California where accelerated growth is forcing agriculturalists from the area. The establishment of one dairy in Ozona/Crockett County will have a significant economic impact not only in local income, but the addition in opportunities for new or expanding spin-off services.

Members of the development

group contracted with Gary Loid, a consultant with Dairy Waste Management, to work toward obtaining a state permit for the dairy. An undisclosed site has been selected. Representatives of the Texas Water Commission and Texas Air Quality Control Board have inspected the location. Soil samples are being tested.

The permitting process takes six months with stringent rules to be met. Laws and regulations pertaining to Crockett County and Ozona are being reviewed.

The first phase of construction will cost an estimated \$1,500,000.00, Bryson said. The dairy is expected to employ 50 to 60 people, both male and female, in skilled and unskilled jobs. In addition to cutting the unemployment rate, the dairy will add tax dollars to the county treasury.

County commissioners voted at

their July 12 meeting to extend appreciation to the Ozona/Crockett County Economic Development Group for its work toward getting a dairy here and to welcome dairy companies considering the area.

Economic Development Group members are: J. B. Miller, Robert Bryson, Oscar Kost, Johnny Childress, Fred Deaton, Jeffrey Sutton, Gene Lilly, Steve Wilkins, Gary Vannoy and Donnie Laughlin. Advisors working with the group on the dairy project are: Billy Reager, Crockett County Extension Agent; Dr. John Sweeten, Texas A&M; Gary Loid, Dairy Waste management; Tommy Stokes, Dennis Clark and Dan Davidson.

The Ozona/Crockett County Economic Development Group places the highest priority in recruiting industrial or commercial manufacturing and production companies, Bryson explained.

"While traditional economic development programs exist for industry, manufacturing, commercial and processing, there was little effort for a comprehensive program that deals with production and supply of this form of agriculture," he said. "Agriculture has been a major part of the economic base in Crockett County. This effort to attract a dairy will only strengthen the economic base by attracting this new agricultural investment."

"The current prospect will have a possible employment impact in Ozona of between 50 to 60 people. Ozona will benefit from the dairy relocation; these benefits will be long-range and varied. Quality of life is enhanced because of the family orientation of the business and their personal emphasis on church, school and quality of life factors."

## Friday Last Day For Early Voting In Finance Election

As of Tuesday morning, 70 people had voted by personal appearance in the school finance special election, according to Mae Lay. Friday is the last day to vote early at the school administration building, Mrs. Lay reminds. The Aug. 3 election will be held in the courthouse from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Voters are able to mark their ballots for or against allowing the local school district to send money to the state to help finance other schools. This is the method selected by the board of trustees as the best option for Ozona to comply with the state education bill.

Ballot wording is "Authorizing the board of trustees of Crockett County Consolidated Common School District to purchase attendance credits from the state with local tax revenues."

## Lions Club Youth Rodeo Aug. 2-5

Ozona Lions Club's 37th youth rodeo performances are planned for 7 p.m. Aug. 6 and 7. Slack will be run after the Friday night performance. Books close Aug. 2 at 5 p.m.

Contestants may enter no more than four events. Girls may enter boys' events, but boys cannot enter girls' events. Younger children may enter older classes, but cannot enter the same event in two different age groups.

There will be an 8 and under division including barrel and flag races for boys and girls.

Contests for girls 9 to 13 include barrel and flag races, pole bending and goat tying. In the boys' 9-13 division,

events are: barrel and flag races, pole bending, breakaway roping and ribbon roping.

Events for girls ages 14-19 are: barrel and flag races, pole bending and goat tying. Boys may compete in team roping, calf tie-down, ribbon roping and goat tying.

Buckles will be awarded to all-around performers in each age division. To qualify for all-around, contestants must place in at least two events.

The rodeo parade begins at 5:30 p.m. Saturday. A dance with music by Sugar and Sam will follow the Saturday night rodeo performance.

## School Provided \$5,579 Per Student In 1992, State Averaged \$5,284

Despite a 1.2% drop in property values, school trustees raised tax rates to produce 9.5% more revenue last year. School budgets were increased \$1.5 billion last fall for a total of \$18.7 billion. The total budget averaged \$5,284 per student. Classroom teachers received one dollar in four of the additional spending. Schools added 17,007 employees--an average of one new employee for each 4.8 additional students.

The figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks 1992-93 School District Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$4,255 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$602 for capital outlay.

Crockett County Consolidated Common SD's budget provided \$5,579.94 per student for current operations, \$0 for debt service, and \$650.11 for capital outlay based on 962 students enrolled in October 1992.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Crockett County schools in October 1992 was \$29,229 plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$43,193, and \$30,375 for other professional support employees.

## Cyprus Minerals, AMAX To Merge

NEW YORK - Allen Born, chairman and chief executive officer of AMAX Inc. and Milton H. Ward, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Cyprus Minerals Company announced on May 25 the intention to merge the companies to create Cyprus-Ammax - one of the world's largest natural resources companies, with leading or significant positions in copper, coal, oil and gas, gold, lithium, molybdenum, iron ore, and worldwide exploration prospects. The company will be headquartered in Denver.

Prior to the merger, AMAX will spin off its aluminum company, Almax Inc., into a publicly-held independent company, distributing tax-free all Almax shares to AMAX shareholders. Also prior to the merger, AMAX will distribute an approximately 28 percent interest in Amax Gold Inc. to AMAX Inc. shareholders. Approximately 32% of Amax Gold is publicly-held at this time.

The newly merged Cyprus-Ammax

will have assets of approximately \$5 billion, and pro forma 1992 revenues of approximately \$2.8 billion. It will be the second largest copper company and the second largest coal company in the United States with significant positions in oil and gas, gold, and lithium. Almax, the third largest aluminum producer in the United States, currently has assets of approximately \$2.7 billion and had 1992 revenues of \$2.4 billion.

Milton Ward, who will become co-chairman, president and chief executive officer of Cyprus-Ammax, said, "Combining Cyprus and AMAX in this manner will create the critical mass and opportunities that neither company could achieve separately. Cyprus-Ammax will be well-positioned not only as an excellent copper company, but also as a modern resource-rich company, with a solid capital structure, able to compete vigorously in

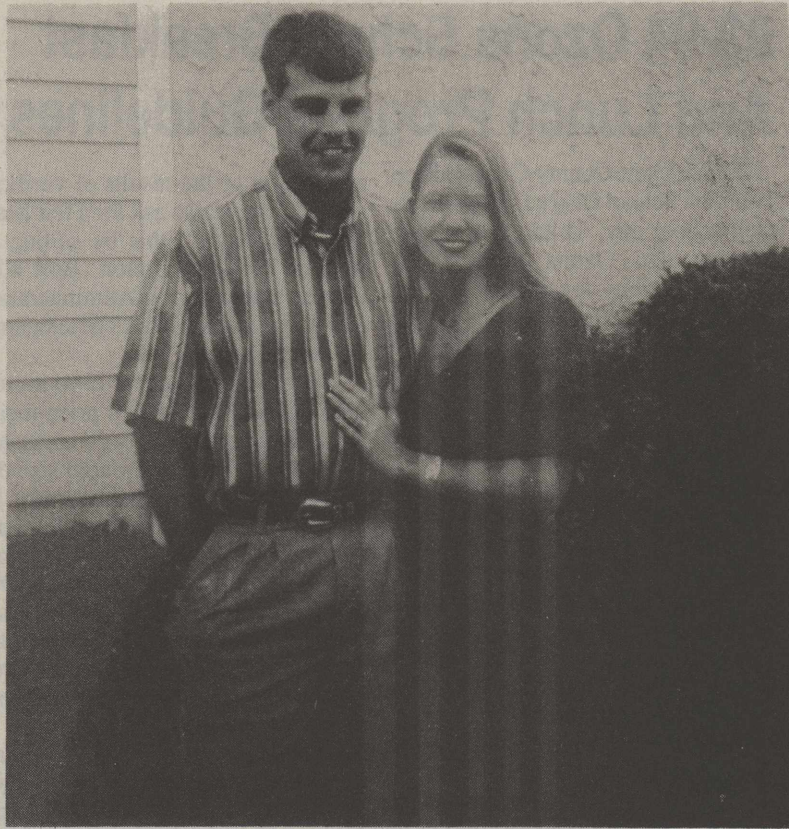

## Veterans Of The Battle Of The Bulge To Hold 12th Annual Reunion in September

The Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, Inc. (VBOB), will hold its 12th Annual Reunion in Bismarck, North Dakota, September 15-18, 1993. Reunions are held annually to honor the Americans who served in the Battle of the Bulge and remember those who sacrificed their lives in this great battle. VBOB is an international non-profit organization which is composed of members who served in the World War II battle which rebuffed Hitler's strongest offensive and turned the tide of the war, their friends and family members, and history buffs. In its 11 year existence VBOB has enrolled over 11,000 members. It affords members the opportunity to renew and develop friendships, exchange information, and assist in initiating efforts to see that this battle is never forgotten. The Battle of the Bulge has been called by many "America's greatest battle." It was fought during the bitter cold and snow of the heavily-forested Ardennes area of eastern Belgium and northern Luxembourg from December 16,

1944, through January 25, 1945. Six hundred thousand American soldiers fought in this great battle with 81,000 resulting casualties, including 19,000 killed. General Patton, while speaking to his generals on the strategy for the battle, said, "If we live through this one, be forever grateful that you have brought with you, one of life's greatest moments!" December 16, 1994, will mark the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. Many plans have been made for this observance. 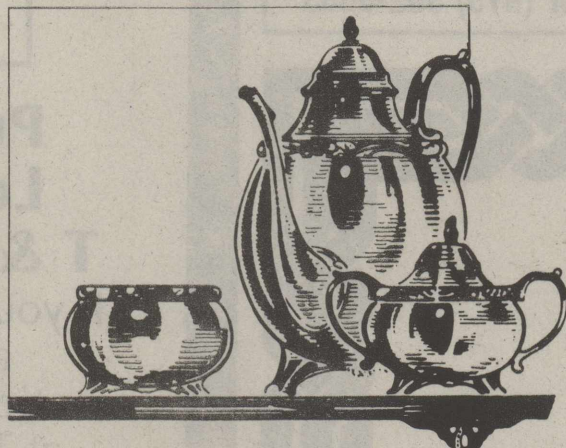

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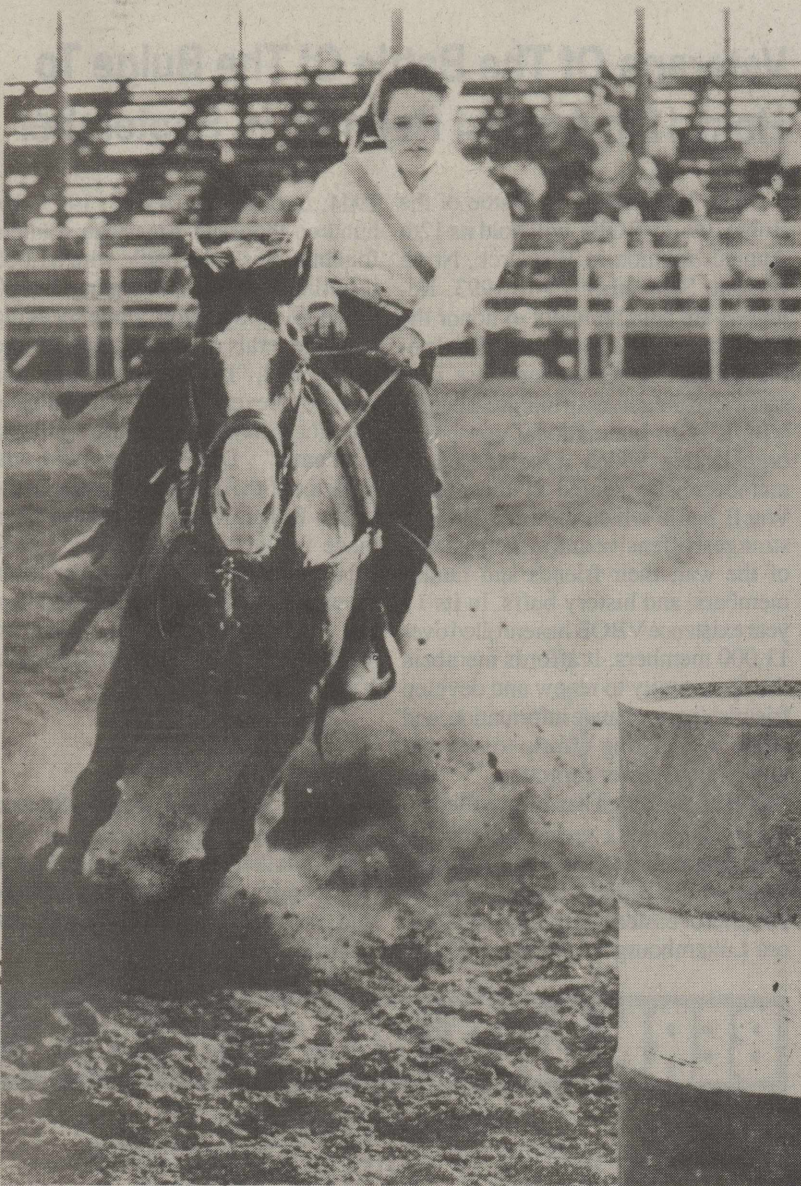

## 93-94 Ozona School Breakfast And Lunch Program Guidelines

The Crockett County Consolidated Common School District serves meals each school day. Children in Ozona Primary and Ozona Intermediate School may buy lunch for \$.85 and breakfast for \$.40. Children in Ozona Junior High and Ozona High School may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for \$.40. Children also may get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$.40 for lunch and \$.30 for breakfast.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application form and return it to the school. The district cannot approve an application that is not complete. Parents/Guardians will receive free or reduced lunch application forms during student registration at the district's four campuses; however, if anyone wishes to obtain application forms in advance, they are now available in the office of the campus principal.

**Verification:** Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced meals.

**Fair Hearing:** You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your

application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing Mr. Ted Cotton, Box 400, Ozona Public Schools Administration Building, Ozona, Texas. The telephone number is 392-5501.

**Reporting Changes:** If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because they get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

**Confidentiality:** School officials use the information on the application to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

**Reapplication:** You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, complete an application then.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., 20250

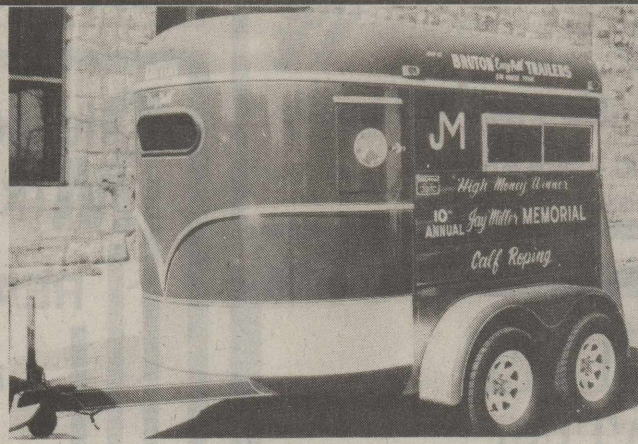

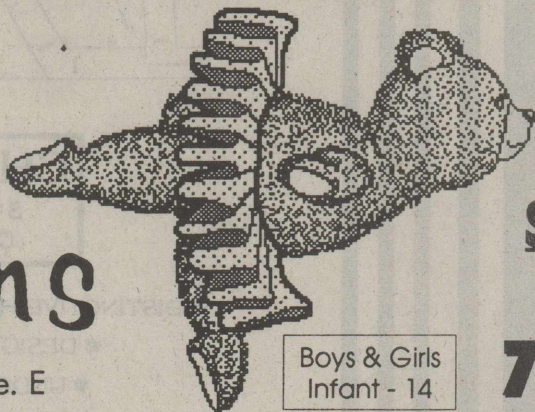

## Report From Congressman Henry Bonilla

### It Is Time To Restore Integrity And Public Faith In Our Congress

Over the last few years, scandals have rocked the U.S. House of Representatives because public officials have abused their offices and the trust of the people who elected them. This trend hit close to home for the people of the 23rd District just recently. And now, the dust is being swept off last year's House Post Office scandal as that unresolved episode comes to light.

Last week, the former House Postmaster pleaded guilty to conspiracy and embezzlement charges related to activities in the House Post Office. He implicated several members of Congress who apparently were involved in swapping official expense vouchers and stamps for cash. An internal House task force investigated this matter last year, but its report has remained a secret. And last week, the House voted along party lines not to release the information on the Post Office scandal.

This episode is an embarrassment to all members of Congress, especially those who have not done anything wrong but are under suspicion simply because they are members of Congress. And this is an embarrassment to the institution of Congress, which has been the model of democracy for nations around the world. But most importantly, this is an embarrassment to all Americans whose trust has been violated by corrupt, entrenched politicians.

People in the towns across my district tell me time and time again they are tired of seeing the image of this wonderful institution tarnished by secrecy, back-room deals and the self-enrichment of long-serving politicians. What kind of a message does this send to our young people?

It is time for Congress to come clean. This internal investigation has been going on for a year and a half

without any indictments against members of Congress. We must lift the cloud that is casting a dark shadow over Congress and restore honesty and integrity to the "People's House". The American public has a right to

know how its tax dollars are being used, especially if those dollars are being misused. We must settle this controversy once and for all, so Congress can get to work on the important business that desperately needs attention.

## Black Bear Sightings Continue

AUSTIN--A black bear killed in a collision with a vehicle in May near Pecos and several recent sightings in the Kerrville area have some ranchers concerned about their domestic livestock, especially sheep and goats.

Increased sightings may be expected for the next couple of years and black bears should be left alone, said Rick Taylor, a bear specialist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Uvalde.

Black bears are on the endangered species list in Texas and cannot be killed or harassed.

"Black bears are attempting to reestablish in Texas. Sightings may increase the next couple of years in areas up to about 150 miles from the Rio Grande," Taylor said. "There has been good reproduction in Mexico and in Big Bend (National Park) the last several years. There is a good chance people will be seeing more bear activity. The majority probably will be juvenile males."

Earlier this week, a sow and cub were spotted near Mountain Home, a

community northwest of Kerrville in Kerr County. A couple of weeks ago a black bear was spotted near Mountain Home by two TPWD employees of the Heart of the Hills Research Station. The recent sightings probably are the same bear, Taylor said.

In late May, three men from Tennessee driving home from a vacation in California hit and killed a 300-pound male black bear on I-10 in Jeff Davis County.

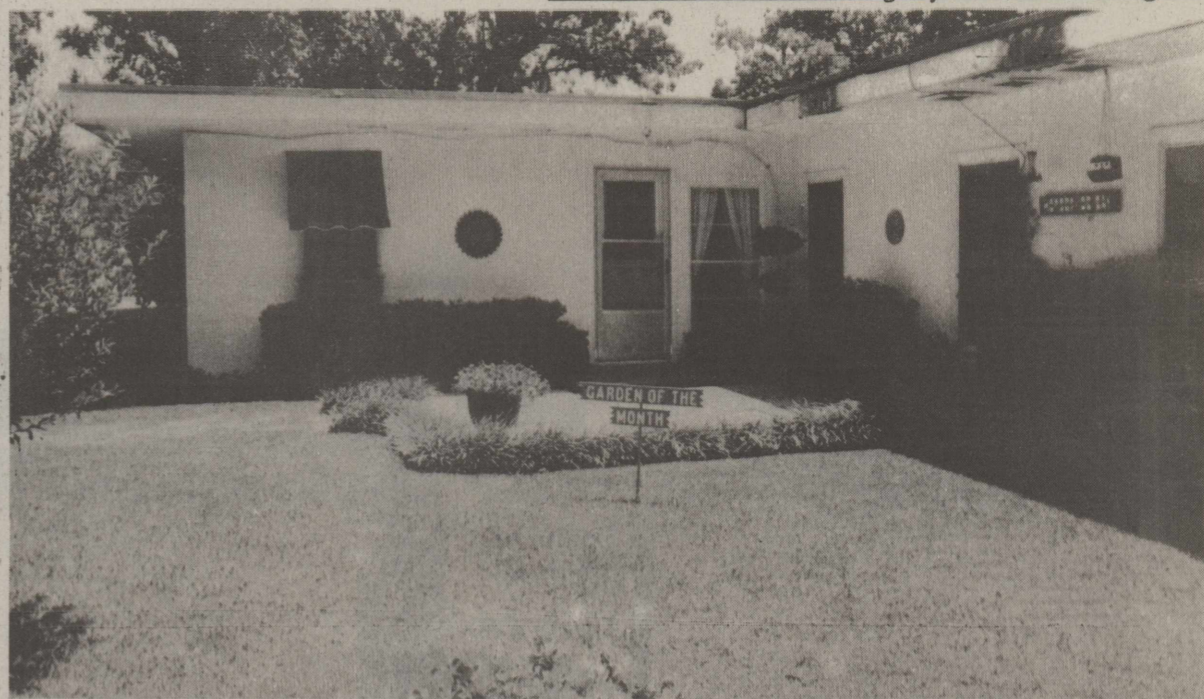
"We want to make people aware of the presence of black bears in Texas," he said. "Don't be afraid of them. They pose little threat to humans. They're scared of us. They are pretty shy creatures."

Black bears are omnivorous animals, meaning they eat almost anything, including plant and animal matter. However, they are opportunistic and will eat insects, carrion and possibly sheep and goats. Taylor said at least 80 percent of their diet is vegetation.

Taylor recommends not confining livestock in large groups where a bear can get to them. In a pasture, they might get one; if they're penned up and a bear passed by, more could be killed.

"It's against state law to kill or harass black bears in Texas, so please don't shoot them. Notify us," he said.

### Try Nutritious Quick Bites

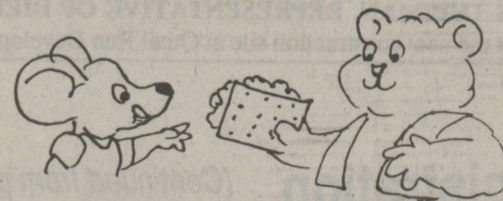
HOUSTON - Taking the children out for a quick bite does not have to mean forsaking good nutrition.

Although fast-food outlets are notorious for fat, salt and empty calories, parents can steer children to more nutritious offerings, said Dr. Corinne Montandon of the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Instead of a cheeseburger, try a grilled-chicken sandwich or broiled lean-meat hamburger. Add lettuce and tomato, but hold the bacon, mayonnaise and special sauce.

If the clan opts for pizza, Montandon recommends a thin-crust version topped with ground beef or mushrooms, green peppers or other vegetables rather than sausage or pepperoni.

If the choice is Mexican food, chicken fajitas, rice and green salads are healthy choices. Avoid high-fat taco salads.

## 4-H'ers Attend Clothing Camp

Tie-dyeing, making vests from recycled jeans, and accessorizing hints for all ages were features of the 1993 Texas 4-H Fashion Roundup held July 9-11 at the Texas 4-H Center on Lake Brownwood. Crockett County 4-H members Katharine Durham and Stefny Sutton helped to plan and coordinate the camp, which was attended by 100 members, leaders and agents from across the state, including Jo-Lynn Vannoy, also of Crockett County, and Agent Tedra Ulmer.

Durham, past chairman of the Texas 4-H Teen Fashion Board, and Sutton, board member, helped plan the camp at meetings of the advisory group this year. Both 4-H'ers were on hand to introduce speakers and Sutton

co-presented a session highlighting her experiences at the Southern Regional Textile Symposium in North Carolina last summer.

The 4-H members at the camp enjoyed many experiences related to all phases of clothing and fashion, including a "newspaper" design contest, where garments were fashioned out of newspaper and modeled by 4-H members. They also learned to tie-dye sheets and then braid them into rugs, and to make the currently popular denim vests from old blue jeans. Both also took part in a computerized figure and wardrobe analysis program which resulted in a personalized plan for a flattering wardrobe.

Of course, much fun and recreation was scattered in with educational sessions. One important event was the "Focus Group" held with representatives from Wrangler. Wrangler, a major sponsor of the 4-H clothing program

in Texas, conducted such a group at the first camp two years ago. Input from 4-H members resulted in some changes in merchandise and marketing strategies helpful to the company. 4-H members were shown clothing by Wrangler and other manufacturers, then asked their opinions about the items. They also completed surveys about their favorite and least-favorite clothing. This focus group activity was a valuable way for the 4-H members to gain insight into the manufacturing and marketing process.

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,439 per student, as compared to \$4208.88 in Crockett County. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 12.6 students in Crockett County while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.1 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.405 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.6% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.385 statewide. Locally, Crockett County imposed a rate of \$1.069 including \$.919 by the county education district. Property was appraised at 102.9% of its market value making the true rate \$1.100 per \$100 of market value (selling price). The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Crockett County would have been \$686. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$496. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,078 and \$854 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Crockett County's revenue from the property tax increased by 6.8% for 1992-93 as compared to a 9.5 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4,564 per student last year and was \$3,793 in Crockett County schools. Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the

foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$822 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$433 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by Crockett County was \$772; the state guarantee added \$0.

For the coming school year, the local share is increased from the 82-cent rate by county education districts to an 86-cent rate levied by school districts. The percentage homestead exemption and freport goods exemptions voted for CEDs will terminate. The legislature increased state aid an average of \$3,990 for each additional student as compared to an average of \$1,825 for all students last year.

Registration for ages 3 and 4 (pre-kindergarten) will be Wednesday afternoon from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. To be eligible for enrollment in prekindergarten, a child must be at least four years of age on or before September 1 and must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language or from a family whose income is at or below subsistence level. To be eligible for enrollment in the three-year old program, a child must be at least three years of age on or before September 1 and meet the same guidelines as prekindergarten.

Parents of kindergarten students are reminded that even though their children participated in the screening clinic that was held last April in Ozona Primary School, it will still be necessary to enroll them in kindergarten. Students enrolling in Ozona Primary School for the first time must bring birth certificates, immunization records, and Social Security numbers.

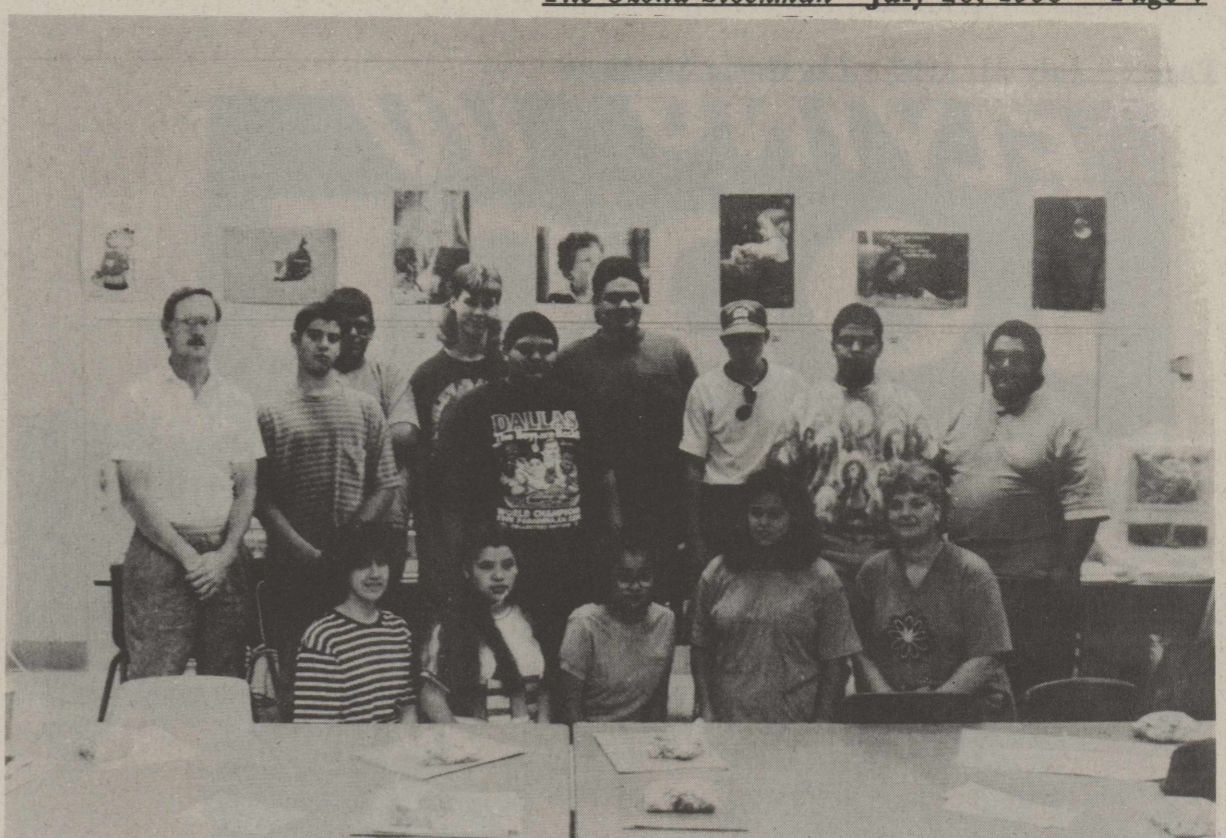
## Students Receive Awards July 22

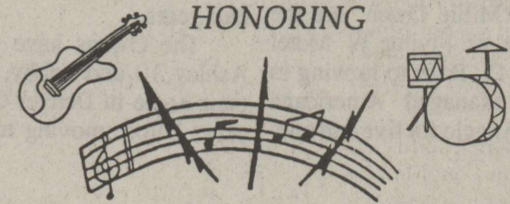

## TO THE RESIDENTS OF CROCKETT COUNTY:

We would like to take this opportunity to remind citizens of Crockett County that early voting by personal appearance for approval of Option Number "3" will end on Friday, July 30, at 4:00 p.m. Early voting is currently being held in the Ozona Public Schools Administration Building, and the election will be held on Tuesday, August 3, from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. in the Crockett County Courthouse.

Voters are asked to remember two important facts when casting votes in this election. First, you will not be voting to approve giving up funds or property. That has already been decided by the Texas Legislature with the passage of Senate Bill 7. ## One year Later: Fort Lancaster Remains Open

Fort Lancaster -- "The good news is that we're still open. The bad news is that not many folks know that we're open," says Melinda Hokit, park manager of Fort Lancaster Historic Site.

"One year ago, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced the shut down and curtailment of operations of over two dozen state parks, most of them in rural areas," says Ms. Hokit (pronounced Ho-Kit).

"Texas Rural Communities and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department entered into an innovative 'public-private' partnership that kept Fort Lancaster (and historic Fort McKavett) from closing, and the park is now open seven days a week through Labor Day, and will continue to be open five days a week after Labor Day."

### Commodity Board Predator Control Money Approved

The newly organized Texas Sheep and Goat Commodity Board, approved in a state-wide producer referendum late last year to raise funds for predator control, has had its proposed budget approved and can now seek ways to implement programs.

In a meeting held last week in Uvalde, board members decided that 85 percent of available monies would go toward "unique and specialized control" procedures that could be accelerated as funds permit. Of particular interest is more aerial hunting as well as increased ground level trapping personnel, reported Perry Bushong of Mountain Home, board chairman.

In a special report to members of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association during its annual convention, Bushong said the board would consider program recommendations at its next meeting on Aug. 24. He asked producers to send in program ideas or call the board's San Angelo office with suggestions. The mailing address is TSGCB, Box 3543, San Angelo, Texas 76902, or telephone (915) 659-8777.

"We need producers to give us ideas. This is their board and we want them to have input in our decisions," Bushong said.

Bushong reported that the board has received in excess of \$100,000 in assessments since the board was set up earlier this year. Producers contribute 20 cents per head at the point of sale.

Bushong said the board would soon be able to contract with the U.S. department of Agriculture's Animal Damage Control program for additional flying hours and additional trappers.

"We want our money to enhance their work," Bushong said.

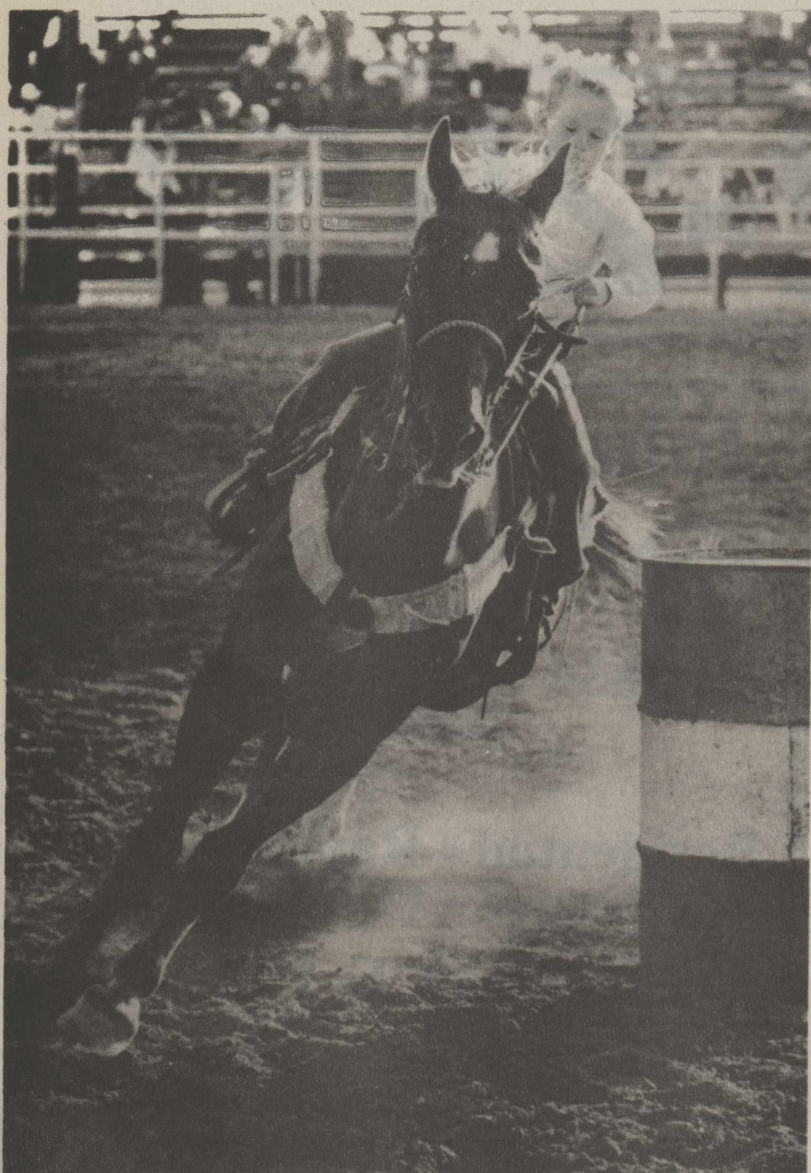

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
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
