



Parents-A Key To Children's Success In School

teachers, improved texts and challenging curricula have each played a role in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is parental

Since 1965 parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children living in single parent families and the proportion of married mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's schools.

When 24,600 eighth graders were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their parents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the importance of education, kids tend to do what they want to do. Few of them choose educational activities. This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. 

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
