## Commissioners Vote To Call Bingo Election

In response to a petition from the Southside Lions Club, commissioners voted Monday to call an election to determine whether or not to legalize bingo. The election date has not been set, but the election must be held within 60 days of the court action.

If legalized bingo is approved by the voters, groups or individuals wanting to conduct bingo games here will have to be licensed through the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

The court voted to deny dedication of road by Steve Kenley to extend existing County Road No. 104 as they are not building any new county roads at this time.

A motion was made to approve action to rectify the county's expansion and paving of road approximately 20 feet onto property on Ramos and A Streets belonging to Guadalupe Castro. Upon execution of easements, dimensions of Castro's lots will be corrected and a retaining wall built to rectify placement of drainage tin horns on his property.

Approval was given to expend \$1,000 to build a flower bed at the north corner of the South Pool where pipe rail is located. Citizens have of-

fered to donate plants if the county will build the planter area.

Commissioners also voted to renew a contract with Prichard & Abbott for on-line data processing and approved Rural Community Hospital project as the new workman's comp insurance carrier for the hospital and care center.

After a budget workshop in which they considered all requests for 1994, the court voted that they are not in favor of increasing taxes by more than three percent.

A copy of the proposed budget is on file for public inspection in the office of Debbi Puckett, county and district clerk.

The proposed budget (which will be trimmed considerably before it is approved next month) includes salary increase requests (including benefits) amounting to \$141,000. Some departments had asked for 10 percent increases, some for 15 percent and some included no salary increases in their 1994 budget proposals.

County employees have received two raises since 1985. In 1986 there was a five percent across the board increase. In 1991, salaries were averaged and a raise given equal to five percent of the average salary. This amounted to approximately \$70 per month.

Monthly reports were heard from Garland Young, civic and youth cen-

ter director; Louise Ledoux, librarian; Gerry Phillips, hospital and care center administrator; and Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent. Written reports were read from Helping Hands and Ozona Fire Department.

Mary Jo Mason, president of the library board, attended the meeting with Mrs. Ledoux. She asked that commissioners consider a salary increase for Mrs. Ledoux. At the time of the 1991 salary increase, no additional pay was given to the librarian or civic center director.

Commissioners will meet Aug. 23 at 6 p.m. for a final review of the budget.

Tommy Calhoun of Calhoun Property Management told commissioners he would like to get 25 more HUD rent allocations in Crockett County and have the allocations administered directly between the county and HUD. Calhoun Property Management currently has 15 allocations for its Crockett Apartments and Ozona Seniors Apartments.

Under the present Federal rent subsidy program, HUD contracts with the state and Crockett County gets \$4 per unit each month for doing the paper work on the program. If the allocations could be directly administered and an area office set up to serve several counties, a larger payment figure could pay for an office and fulltime employee.

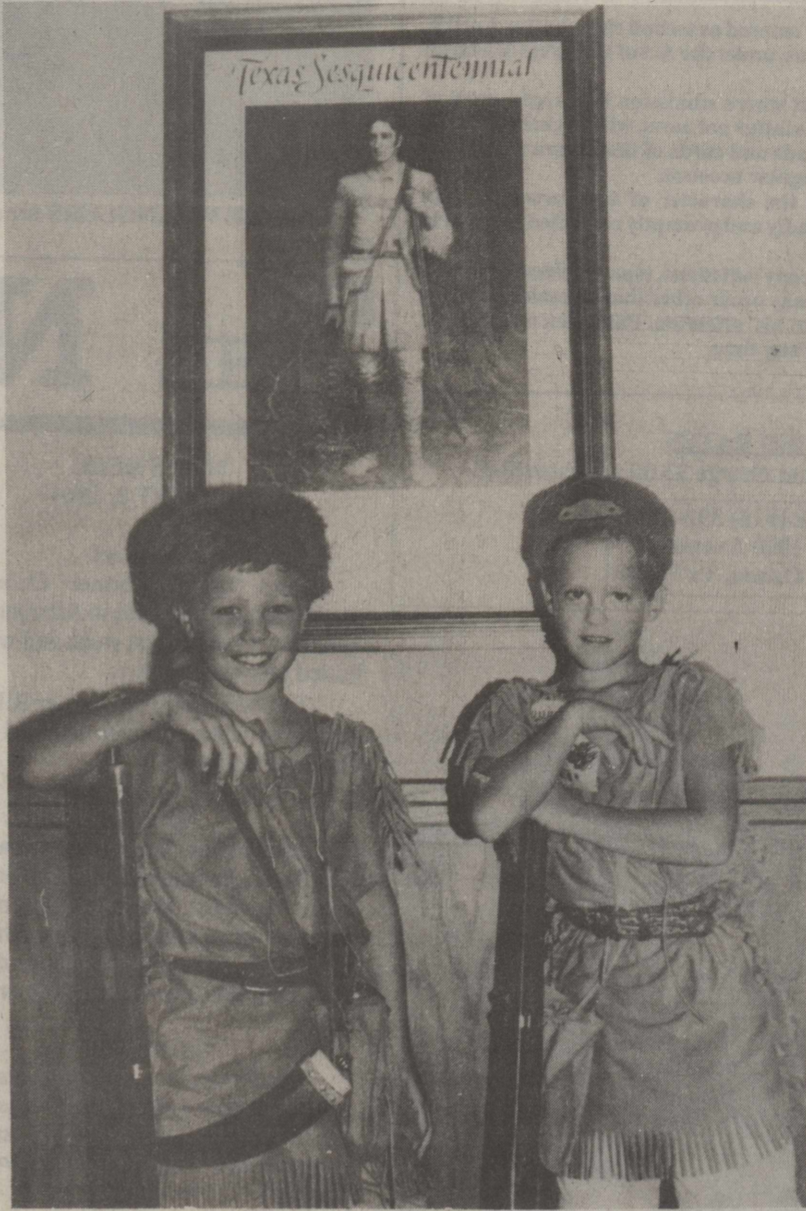

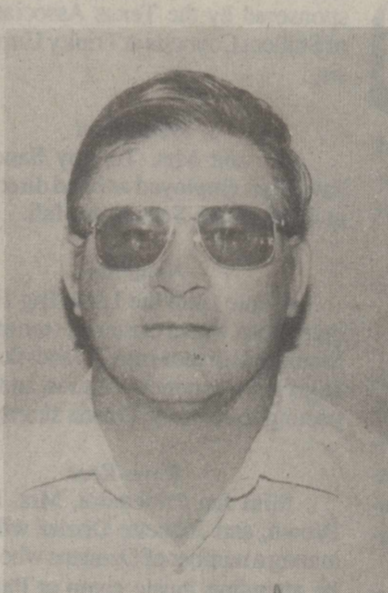

Will the District 6-2A football race be a highly, heated contest? Well, it sure could be! according to head football coach Don Payne, "This year I look for it to be a tight district race! Right now Wall has the 'inside track' with a returning all district quarterback and an all district running back. I feel like we should be better this year but at the same time so will Coahoma, Eldorado, and Stanton! It looks like whoever is the healthiest down the stretch will have the best chance to get into the playoffs!"

In looking at the '93 Lions schedule we see them starting off with three tough teams that made it into the playoffs last year. Coach Payne sees this year's schedule as being three seasons instead of one. First, he says, "the Lions face a real tough non-district schedule with Big Lake, Garden City, and Sonora." 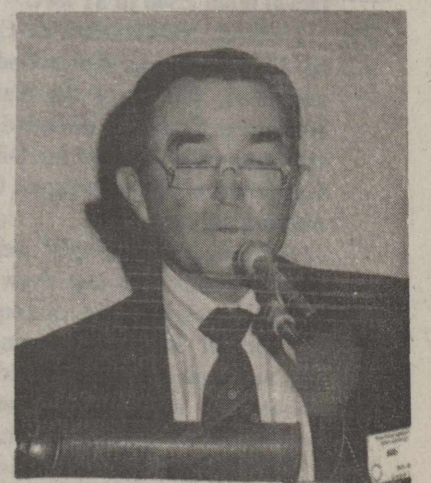

## Reagor Ending Term As TCAA President

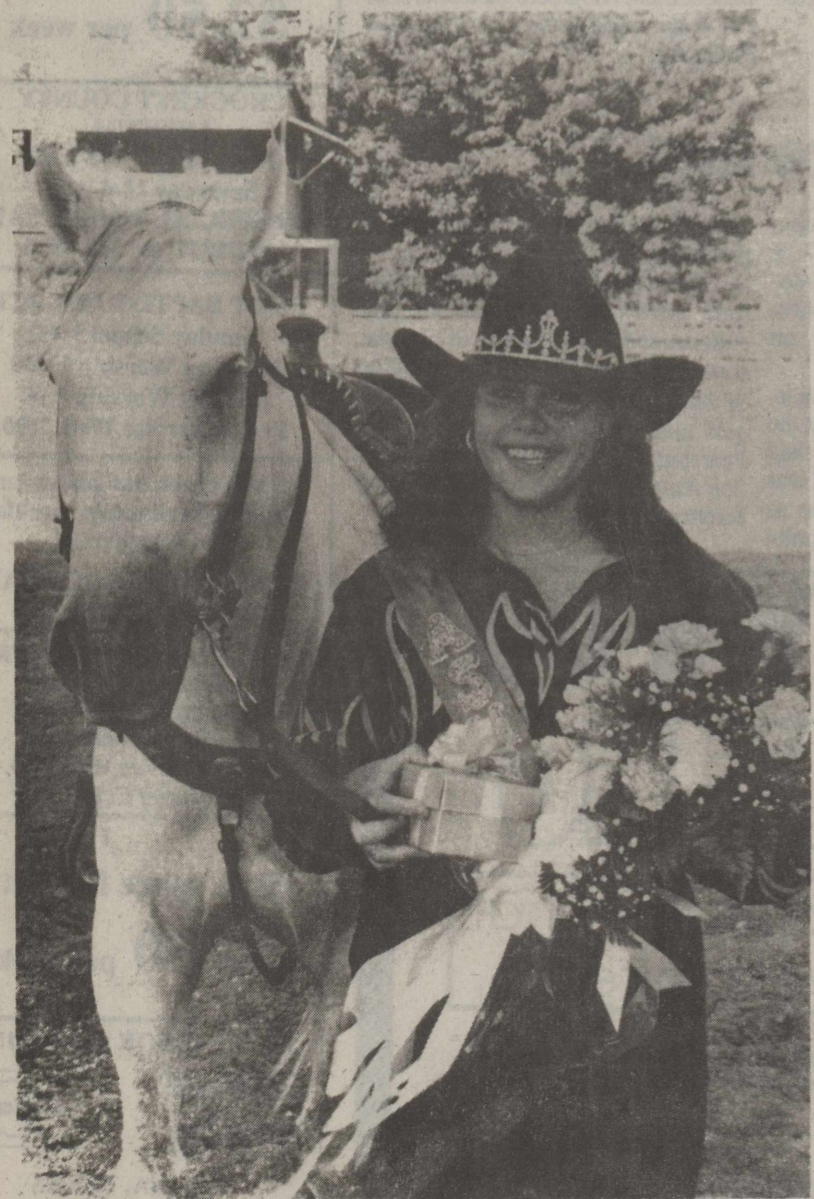

groups to call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 to request a list of program ideas or ask for a specific topic. It's also best to call several weeks ahead if possible, to avoid scheduling problems, but the agents said they do their best to meet urgent requests throughout the year.

"We're also happy to provide individuals with training and information so they can present a program to their group or class," said the agents, who noted that the Extension Office is provided with a wide variety of educational resources through the Texas A&M University system.

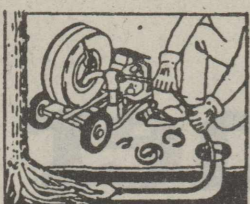

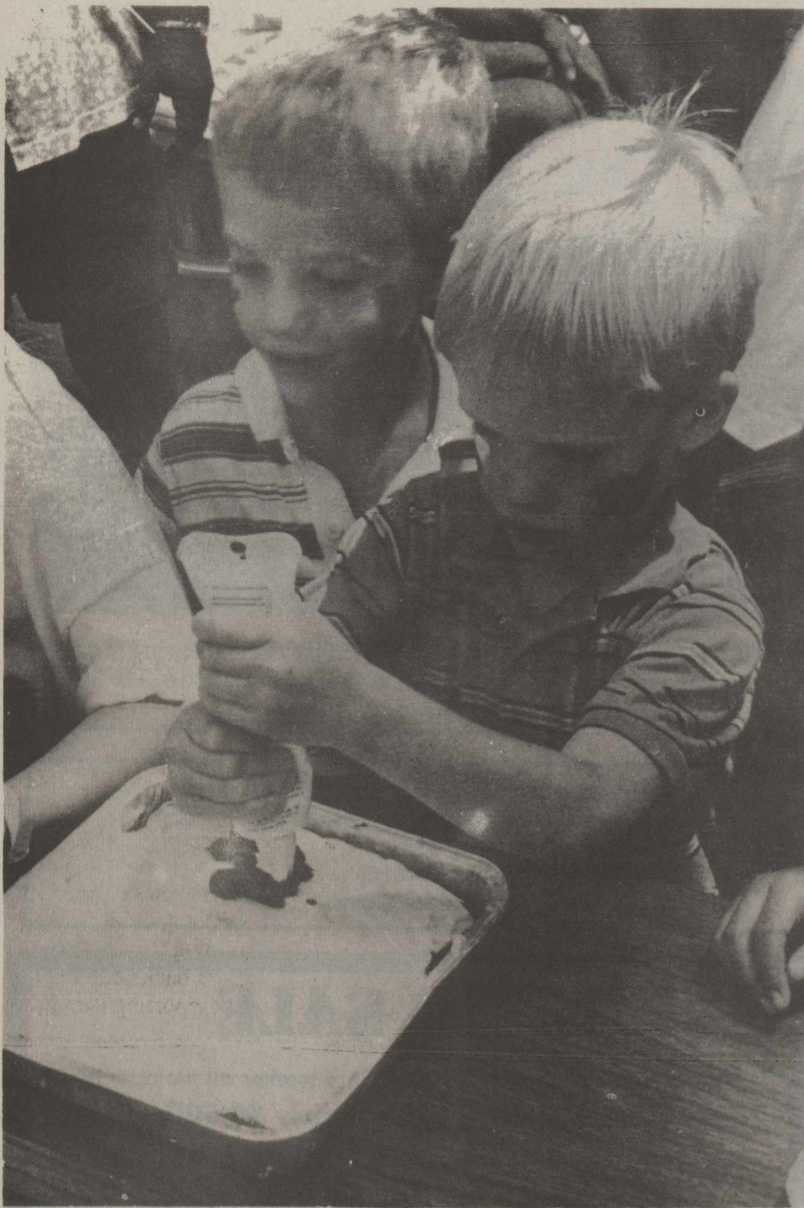

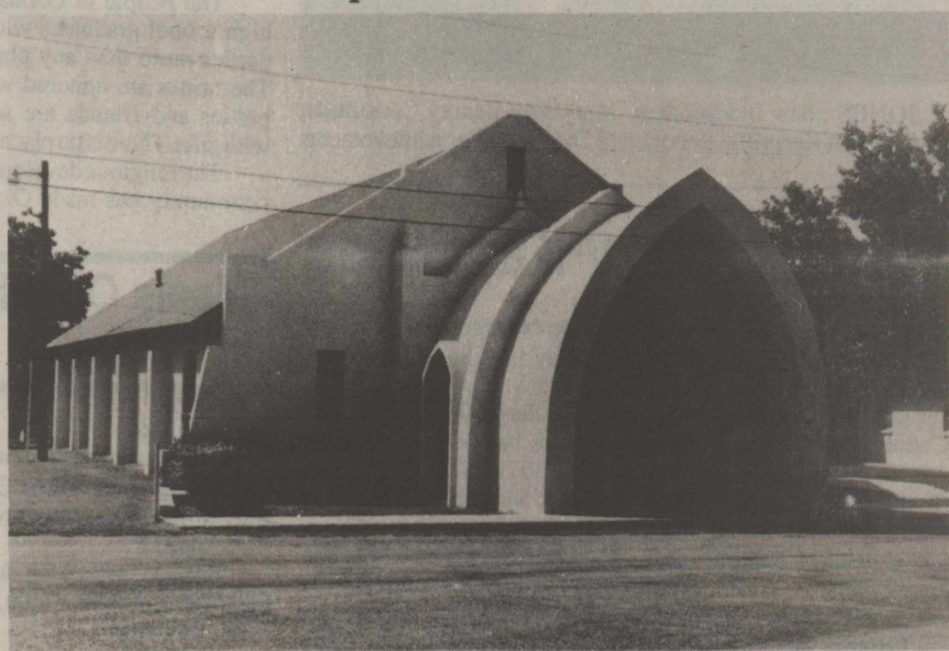

The religious development in this community has made Ozona a good

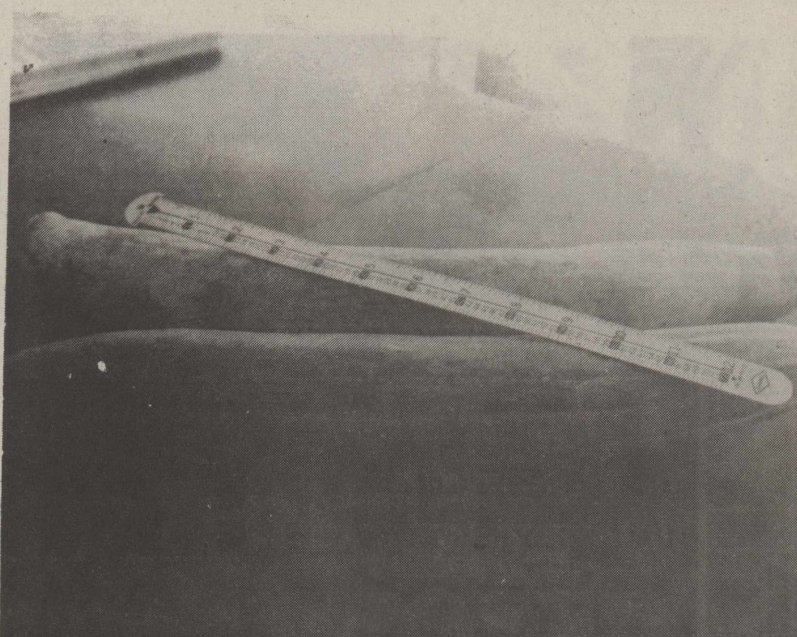
place to live.

Presenting the 25" Magnavox and VCR were League members Karen Huffman and Jeannine Henderson. The equipment is a valuable training tool for the EMS, hospital and care center staff.

EMS coordinator Doug Meador reported to the board that EMT students passed their state tests after completing the course held in Ozona. Upgrading from Emergency Care Attendant to Emergency Medical Technician were Beverly Preddy, Barbara Meador and Melissa Glosson. New EMTs are Diane Womack, Dana Cowen, Curtis and Evelyn Keith. Felix Trujillo and Dee Keilers recertified as EMTs.

Meador asked the board to consider purchasing used pagers for the EMS. At least 10 more are needed at this time, he said. No action was taken.

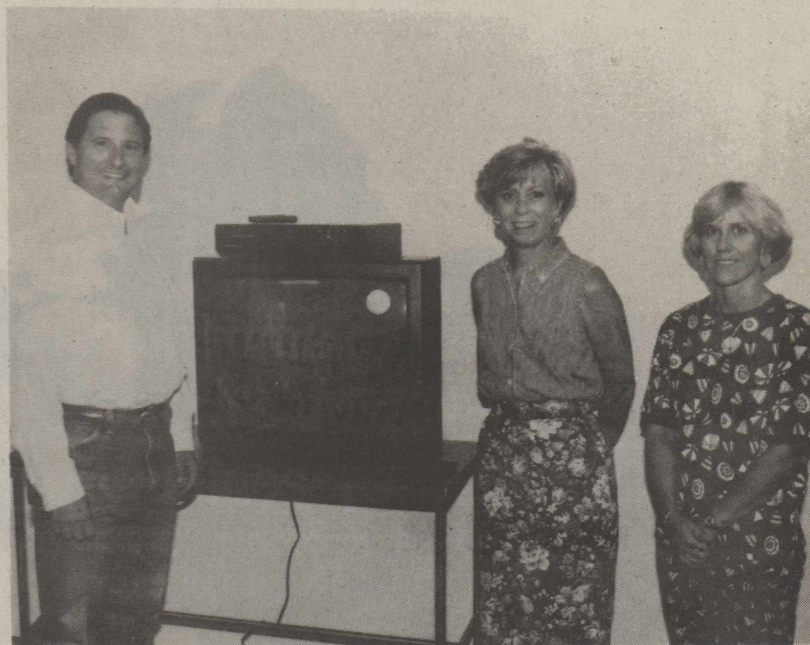
Directors voted to change the hospital and care center workman's compensation carrier to the RCH program which is expected to save \$15,000 per quarter for the county.

Following a meeting in executive session, board members voted that "RNs and LVNs of the nursing service of Crockett County Hospital will receive a weekend differential at the rate of \$1.00 per hour beginning at 3 p.m. on Friday and ending at 7 a.m. Monday. This rate adjustment reflects the shortage of nurses at the hospital, the financial burden of using registry nurses and Medicare regulations that dictate staffing patterns at the hospital. This policy will be in effect for a trial period and reviewed in three months. Effective date is Aug. 6, 1993."

The board agreed to approve Dr. Robert Owensby's contract through February 1994.

The board discussed possible savings by having an in-house laundry. They are currently accepting bids for commercial washers and dryers and linens. No action was taken. At a meeting of commissioners court Aug. 9, hospital/care center administrator Gerry Phillips said it is expected that one fulltime and one parttime worker would be required to run the laundry.

Phillips discussed with the board the purchase of a reconditioned chemistry analyzer for the hospital. The facility pays out approximately \$2,000 per month to have these readings done elsewhere. Phillips would like to use grant money from Year 3 to purchase the equipment. No action was taken pending further review of the maintenance contract, warranty and interest

rate. The administrator told the board he is still waiting for official approval to use grant money for durable medical equipment for a home health care program for Crockett County. He said he has been informed verbally that no problem is anticipated.

Applications are being accepted for the position of director of nurses at

Crockett County Hospital. Since the resignation of Sheila Griffith, Diane Schwertner is filling in as director of nurses.

During the care center meeting, the board received a copy of a five-year plan for review. The plan must be reviewed and signed by the board and the medical staff as a requirement of Medicare.

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## West Texas Utilities Selected For Major Wind-powered Research Program

(August 5, 1993) West Texas Utilities Company said today that the Renewable Energy project it is hosting will also participate in a nationwide program. The local utility's parent, Central and South West Corporation, is one of three electric utilities selected by the U.S. Department of Energy and the Electric Power Research Institute to participate in a nationwide wind-power testing program.

During the next five years, the \$40 million program will evaluate advanced wind-turbine technology that is expected to make wind power competitive with electricity generated from fossil fuels.

Central and South West will receive a \$2 million grant toward construction of a wind farm near Fort Davis in the WTU service area. EPRI will provide an additional \$3 million of funding through a dollar-for-dollar cost-sharing program. The grant will allow expansion of the project to 6 megawatts from an originally planned 2-megawatt facility costing \$3 million. Six megawatts of electricity can serve approximately 2,000 homes.

Central and South West began its Fort Davis project in 1992 to investigate the viability of wind power and other renewable energy resources throughout its 152,000-square mile service territory.

E.R. Brooks, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Central and South West, said the CSW system expects to invest \$10 million by 1997 to study how renewable energy technologies could benefit the customers of its four electric utility companies. "Research and technological

advances could help make wind and solar power affordable alternatives for our customers early in the 21st century," Brooks said. "We're committed to being good stewards of our environment, and we're proud that EPRI and the DOE endorse our efforts."

Brooks pointed out that research studies indicate wind power in Texas alone could supply approximately 10 percent of the electrical needs of the United States. He said the CSW project will help determine how much of this resource can be practically used as well as the environmental effects of renewable technologies.

A primary goal of both DOE and EPRI is wind-power research to lower the cost of wind power from the current 7 to 9 cents a kilowatt-hour to 4 cents a kilowatt-hour by the end of the decade.

The new wind turbines to be tested in the DOE/EPRI program incorporate many improvements, including more efficient blades, lighter materials, streamlined designs and fewer parts for reduced weight and cost.

The other two utilities selected for the program are Green Mountain Power Corporation in Vermont and Central Maine Power Company. The selections were based on the companies' progress in wind power development. Other factors included geographic diversity and weather conditions. EPRI and DOE plan to select two or more projects for funding in the second phase of the program, beginning in 1994. Twenty-one utilities have expressed interest in the second phase.

Central and South West Corporation, a Dallas-based public utility holding company, owns West Texas Utilities Company and three other

electric utilities. These subsidiaries provide electric service to 1.6 million customers in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. Central and South West also owns Transok, Inc., an Oklahoma intrastate natural gas pipeline subsidiary, and four other subsidiaries.

The Electric Power Research Institute, headquartered in Palo Alto, California, is the research arm of the electric utility industry. EPRI manages the technical research and development programs for the industry to improve power production, distribution and use.

Myra Wilson and Whitney Vannoy have been awarded two year \$3,000 Abell-Hanger Foundation scholarships by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation. This year the Abell-Hanger Foundation awarded 60 grants to students who have participated in the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet contests and who have compiled an outstanding record of academic and extracurricular achievement.

This year TILF awarded 354 new awards and renewed 250 awards for a total of 604 scholarships for 1993-94 with a value of \$775,000. Recipients may attend any approved college or university in Texas.

Miss Wilson qualified for the UIL Academic State Meet in 1991 in persuasive speaking, in 1992 in Lincoln-Douglas debate and in 1993 in Lincoln-Douglas debate and persuasive speaking. She was a member of the National Honor Society, Student Council, varsity basketball team and marching band where she was drum major.

She plans to attend McMurry University and major in communica-

tions. Miss Wilson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Wilson and Sherrie Richardson.

She plans to attend Texas A&M University and major in biomedical science. Her parents are Dr. and Mrs. Gary Vannoy.

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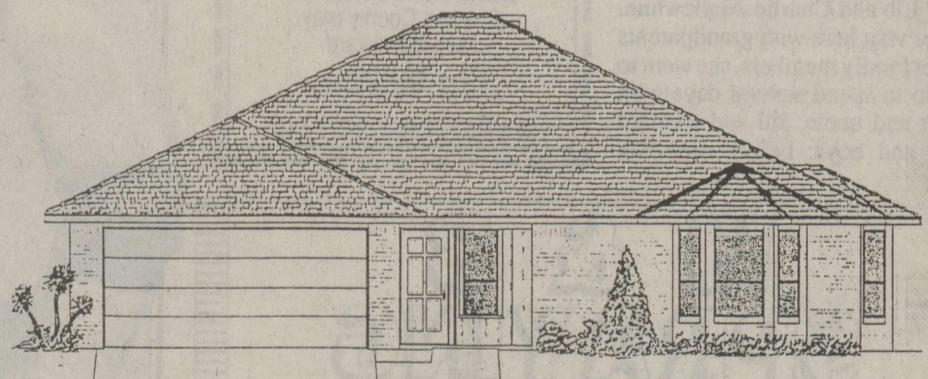

### Parents-A Key To Children's Success In School

In the war against declining student achievement, many solutions have been tried. A quest for better teachers, improved texts and challenging curricula have each played a role in major battles. Yet achievement falls. Perhaps, the answer is parental reform.

Since 1965 parental involvement in education has been a victim of societal changes in America. The divorce rate, the ratio of children living in single parent families and the proportion of married mothers of young children working outside the home have all doubled. As a result, 70 percent of the parents never volunteer to participate in their children's schools.

When 24,600 eighth graders were polled, half of them reported that they rarely discuss school with their parents. Half of the parents of these eighth graders reported rarely having contact with their children's schools.

When parents fail to stress the importance of education, kids tend to do what they want to do. Few of them choose educational activities. This same group of eighth graders reported that they spent 21.4 hours a week watching television, but only 5.6 hours doing homework. Only 1.8 hours were spent on outside reading. Sixty-three percent of the parents reported they rarely or never set television viewing restrictions.

Here are some things parents can do to help increase their child's success in school:

The first step is communication. Talk regularly about current school experiences. Students who

never talk to their parents about school are three times more likely to drop out of school than those who do talk with their parents.

Restrict television viewing on school nights. Students with television restrictions are 9 percent less likely to drop out than those with restrictions.

Finally, provide adequate after-school supervision. Let students know what is expected of them in terms of education. Parents who expect more of their children educationally have children who perform at least adequately in school.

One of the most important skills a parent can have is knowing how to communicate more effectively with both children and spouse. The Texas

Agricultural Extension Service offers classes on parent-child communication. This program, called "Systematic Training for Effective Parenting" is offered in two versions--one for parents of young children and one for the parents of teens. It's been found to be very effective, especially when both caregivers participate, and it's also great for single parents.

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
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
