## Superintendent Jim Payne To Retire

In a special meeting that was held at noon on Tuesday, Sept. 14, the members of the Ozona School Board reluctantly accepted the resignation, effective on December 31, of Superintendent Jim Payne. Mr. Payne, who is in his fourth year as superintendent of schools, said that he had originally planned to retire at the end of the 1993-94 school year; however, due to personal reasons, he was submitting his resignation that will become effective at the end of December.

Following the acceptance of Mr. Payne's resignation, the trustees met separately with three consultants who offer employee search services for school districts needing to employ school superintendents. At the conclusion of the meeting, the members voted to hire Mr. E. C. Leslie, consultant for the Texas Association of School Boards Superintendent Search Services, to conduct the search for a new school superintendent.

According to the agreement between the school district and Mr. Leslie, he will be responsible for making a public announcement of the superintendent vacancy through letters and publications and developing an application form. After the application form has been developed, applications will be sent to all persons requesting to become a candidate, and once the completed applications have been received and processed, Lesley will assist the local school board in evaluating candidates and selecting the semifinalists to be interviewed. After the semifinalist process has been completed, the board will select the top three candidates for final interviews. After these interviews, the trustees will make and announce the selection of a new superintendent of schools.

Time lines for the selection of a superintendent will be developed by the school board; however, the trustees hope to have a new superintendent report to work by the end of December. If this is not possible, Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton will serve as interim superintendent until Mr. Payne's replacement can arrive. Mr. Cotton, who has served as Ozona's assistant superintendent for ten years, several months ago requested that he not be considered for the superintendent's position when Mr. Payne retired; however, he has expressed his willingness to assist the district in this position until another superintendent can be employed.

During the regular monthly meeting of the school board that was also held on Tuesday, the trustees reviewed the school district's 1992-93 Academic Excellence Indicator Report. The local report, prepared by the Texas Education Agency, makes a comparison of each school district and school campus to the performance of other school districts and school campuses across the state.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton explained that for the purpose

of comparing school districts, the State Board of Education assigned each district to a group based upon its enrollment, wealth, and percentage of economically disadvantaged students.

Calculation of this data by T.E.A. produced sixteen different groups of school districts, and Ozona was placed in the "enrollment under 1,000 students; district wealth above the state average" group. This group is composed of 100 school districts with a total enrollment of 29,097 students.

After the district groups were formed, each district was compared against its group on nine Academic Excellence Indicators for the 1992-93 school year. The indicators were: (1) Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results; (2) percentage of students in average daily attendance; (3) student drop-out rate; (4) percentage of students enrolled in advanced courses; (5) high school graduation rate; (6) percentage of graduating seniors with advanced seals on their transcripts; (7) percentage of students

who are ready for college-level studies as defined by the Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) and measured by the high school TAAS exam; (8) results of college admission tests (S.A.T. and A.C.T.); and, (9) percentage of students retained in their prior grade level.

The report also compares each campus in the district to a group of 100 other school campuses who are the most similar in characteristics and contains student information, financial information, and school program information on both the district and campus level.

Following discussion of this report, it was approved as presented. A public hearing on the 1992-93 Academic Excellence Indicator Report will be held during the school board's October meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 12. Copies of the report are now available in the administration building and at the school campuses for public review and inspection prior to the public meeting.

## Suspect Arrested In Motel Robbery

Alert clerks are responsible for the prompt arrest of a suspect in an armed robbery Sept. 17 at Circle Bar Motel. The 6:20 a.m. robbery at the truck stop motel netted the robber a little over \$400 according to Sheriff Jim Wilson, but at the same time, the desk clerk got a good description of the man.

"I knew you were going to want to know that, so I kept looking at him and tried to memorize what he looked like," Melissa Ybarra told the sheriff.

"Although we had a good physical description, we didn't have a vehicle description," Wilson said, "so we couldn't put up a roadblock."

The man's physical description was broadcast by the DPS, and at 7 a.m., Susie Caldwell, the clerk at the Pecos River Store, called to say a man answering the description had bought gas there. She provided a vehicle description including the fact that the

pickup had Florida license plates.

At about 10 a.m., Lewis Bruce Kimble of Marathon, FL, was arrested in connection with the robbery at a roadblock just east of Fort Stockton. The 47-year-old Kimble was brought back to Ozona where he remains in Crockett County Jail on a charge of aggravated robbery. Peace Justice Jim Hearne set bail at \$100,000.

Money believed taken in the robbery was recovered, the sheriff said. A crossbow pistol with the bow portion removed was found in Kimble's pickup.

"The two women broke the case," Sheriff Wilson said. "They led to the speedy arrest. Normally if someone does a crime and gets back on the interstate without being seen, we're just sunk."

Wilson also praised the Fort Stockton police and Pecos County deputies for their work in the case.

## County Seventh In Gas Production

Crockett County was ranked seventh in the state in natural gas production for the month of June with 10,539,333 Mcf (thousand cubic feet).

Crude oil production in Crockett County for the period was 290,553 barrels.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 449,967,430 Mcf of gas in preliminary production for June, up 5.32 percent compared to June 1992's gas

production total of 427,233,253 Mcf. Texas gas production in June came from 175,883 oil and 46,002 gas wells.

Texas preliminary June crude oil production averaged 1,547,041 barrels daily, down from the 1,616,225 barrels daily average of June 1992.

The preliminary Texas oil production figure for June is 46,411,234 barrels, down from the 48,486,742 barrels reported in June of 1992.

# Lions Break The Broncos 28-14

Riddled with 14 penalties costing 115 yards and 2 turnover fumbles, the Ozona Lions, engineered by 150 pound senior quarterback Justin Castro and his golden arm, downed the Sonora Broncos 28-14 on Sonora turf Friday night.

Castro, who threw 19 times and completed 12 of them with only 1 interception totaling 183 yards, also rushed for 82 yards and a touchdown. He gave the Lions the momentum they needed to overcome the mountain of negative yards from penalties to beat the Broncos.

An intercepted Bronco pass by Julio Martinez set the Lions up for their first scoring drive of the night. A 21-yard pass from Justin Castro to Chris Sanchez and Andreas De La Garza's sure-footed kick with 3:27 left in the first quarter gave the Lions the lead 7-0.

Excellent defensive action by the Lions stopped the Broncos on their next series of downs plus taking ownership of the ball on Sonora's 38 yard line by Chris Sanchez on a Sonora Chris Scott fumble late in the first quarter.

Ozona's next scoring drive came early in the second quarter from a J. J. Lozano 1 yard run. De La Garza's kick missed its mark increasing Ozona's lead to 13-0.

Sonora gave up ownership of the ball with a Gabriel Perez kick return fumble turning the ball back to the Lions on their own 40-yard line. After two short pass plays from Castro to Chris Sanchez and Travis Davidson and a good run by Travis Davidson, the Lions were put into scoring position at Sonora's 1-yard line. Ozona increased their lead to 21-0 with 6:38 left in the second quarter from a Justin Castro quarterback keeper and a 2-point conversion pass to Tony Valen-

cia. Once again Ozona's hard hitting defensive squad put the brakes on the Broncos' scoring drive with tackles from Chris Sanchez Julio Martinez, Justin Moran, Robert Bryson and Justin Castro forcing them to punt. But, riddled with two holding and one

offside penalties the Lions were also forced to punt, giving Sonora back the ball on their own 37-yard line for a series of downs before the half ended.

In second half action Ozona was unable to rack up the necessary score-

## Ozona Runners Win Angelo Meet

The Ozona cross country boys' team brought home the championship trophy from the San Angelo meet Sept. 18, outdistancing the rest of the field consisting of AAA, AA and A teams.

Placings were: Ozona 23, Merkel 47, Water Valley 74, Eldorado 126, Reagan County 128, Mason 153 and Robert Lee 183.

Ozona's top five scoring runners finished in the top 10. John Ramirez was third overall with a time of 17:20. Bryan Valdez came in fourth with a time of 17:28, and Charles Villarreal was sixth with 18:01. Codie Porras came in seventh with 18:05 and Johnny Porras was eighth with 18:06. The time for Pete Castenada's thirteenth place was 18:32. There were 74 runners in this division.

This is the second week in a row that all six runners have finished in the top 15.

Others competing from Ozona were J. J. Lozano, Elliott Barrera and Justin Moran.

"The boys have learned from the past two meets that winning is fun and that they can support each other throughout the race," said Coach Pete Maldonado. "This will be a key in winning big cross country meets to finish in a pack. Our goal as a team is to be able for all six runners to run under 17:30 for the 3.1 course."

There were only two girls com-

peting for the Ozona cross country team. They ran their personal best of the year with Dana Bishop running a 15:29 for the two mile course and Jamie Porter finishing at an 18:25.

The next cross country meet will be held in Mertzon on Saturday, Sept. 25. Junior high girls will run at 10 a.m. and the boys at 10:30. Varsity girls run at 11 and the boys at 11:30.

Ozona is the defending champion in both of the junior high divisions and the high school boys' division.

The team will have a picnic lunch afterward, and all parents are invited to participate.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

There's a lot of wild talk by uninformed politicians and the media going around about mohair ranchers getting rich from government subsidies. The truth is the U.S. Treasury and American taxpayers have actually benefited from the mohair program. The wool and mohair program has been self-supporting and self-financed since 1954, when a tariff was imposed on all imported wool and mohair products to protect U.S. producers against unfair foreign competition. Up to 70 percent of these tariffs are supposed to be used in payments to wool and mohair producers. But ranchers have actually received only about 30 percent of the tariff revenue. Most of the revenue collected goes to Uncle Sam, who has kept more than \$5 billion of the total \$7.4 billion in earnings for purposes other than mohair and wool production.

The people involved in agriculture have always been willing to do more than their share for the good of the country, and we all applaud any efforts to make government more efficient. But no one group should be asked to carry a heavier burden than others. Agriculture in general - particularly Texas Angora goat raisers, who produce 60 percent of the world's mohair - make an easy scapegoat in the quest to cut our deficit. But don't be fooled. Cutting or eliminating mohair subsidies will not reduce the deficit because the tariff will either be eliminated, or if it is still collected, this money will be spent by federal bureaucrats elsewhere. Meanwhile, cutting mohair subsidies will devastate an important part of our state's rural economy and put people out of work.

## Here and There

Barbara Malone and Mary Leigh Kerby flew to Arkansas Labor Day weekend. They were guests in the home of Barbara's aunt and uncle near Eureka Springs. While there they drove to Branson, Missouri, and saw the Wayne Newton Show. Also, they visited other relatives in Fayetteville. Barbara reports a very enjoyable trip.

Sibyl Howell and I recently returned from a tip to the British Isles - so I will continue writing my impression of this wonderful trip.

After our sightseeing tour of London to view some of the most famous landmarks in the world - we got our first look at the English countryside on our way to Stonehenge, described as "the finest prehistoric monument in all Europe".

It's believed that sun-worshipping ceremonies were held at Stonehenge as long as 4,000 years ago, but construction of the stone circle was completed only about 1250 B.C. It retains a powerful atmosphere of mystery and awe - a magnet for the imagination. How were the stones transported 200 miles over land, and water to this spot and how were they erected? Even more fascinating is the question - "why?" Experts still do not have all the answers to questions posed by this giant relic of a bygone age.

Our next destination was Bath. Even the Romans appreciated the curative effects of the mineral springs that gave Bath its name. Succeeding generations have come to Bath in the hope of a cure for all kinds of ailments. But it reached the peak of popularity in the 18th century. It became mandatory for anyone who wished to be someone in London high society to relocate to Bath for "the season". Elegant balls were organized for them. They made Bath a byword for style and fashion. Some were having a glass of this spring water. But I took the word of Charles Dickens who wrote that it tastes "like warm flat-irons".

There are quaint shops and the Georgian architecture was impressive. Gorgeous flowers were everywhere.

The next morning we head for Stratford-upon-Avon through the very beautiful countryside. We saw many sheep and cattle in this area and they were so fat and pretty. Hay baling was in progress. We saw purple heather in bloom everywhere and hedgerows trimmed so neat. Looking across the rolling mountains it looked like a patchwork quilt. Many rock walls built of field stone. Stratford is one of England's most famous of all locations, forever linked with the name William Shakespeare. We saw the house where he was born, and we visited the cottage where he courted Anne Hathaway, who became his wife.

Sibyl and I had lunch at a neat little tea shop and a couple asked if they could sit at our table. They had

come to Stratford for a little holiday. We enjoyed visiting with them. They had a little trouble understanding our Texas drawl and we had to guess at some of the remarks they made - we all smiled a lot.

This is foxhunt country - many good looking horses, villages with narrow streets, rock buildings and thatched-roofed cottages. Beautiful, beautiful country.

We stopped briefly in the city of Coventry for a look at its new cathedral. The Nazi bombed 40 acres of the center of this city, including the centuries-old cathedral. The city was rebuilt and a new cathedral finished in 1962. The blackened shell of the old cathedral was left standing as an approach to the new one. Two blackened roof timbers form a cross on the original altar bearing the words - "Father Forgive" carved in the wood.

Our next stop was at Chatsworth House, built between 1687 and 1707. It's rated the most grand of England's "stately homes".

From Chatsworth we drove to York where we stayed the night. York is a walled city built by the Romans. Six of us enjoyed a lovely evening in the 300 year old home of Don and Mary Louise Fritzgerd. They were a charming couple - very friendly and most interesting. Don picked us up at our hotel and then took us back. This was a highlight of the trip. These people are not paid to let us visit in their home.

I will share with you the desert Mary Louise served.

### Fruit Trifle

Peaches, strawberries, apples and grapes - all sliced bite-size. Fold in some sugar and yogurt or sour cream. Top with brown sugar and then macarons - let set in icebox 3 or 4 hours. A light delicious desert. She layered this in a crystal bowl.

## Blood Drive Thurs., Sept. 23

Xi Sigma Omega will host a blood drive at the EMS Building from 1 to 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 23. Donations made that day will replenish blood used by Byrl Allen following a recent tragic accident. During the blood drive, the ladies of Xi Sigma Omega will serve homemade refreshments to donors.

"The typical low donor response during the summer months has put United Blood Services of San Angelo in a crisis situation," said Connie Jennings, local drive coordinator. "Some patients in San Angelo hospitals have recently had to have surgery postponed due to the blood shortage, and response in San Angelo to pleas for blood donors was disappointing. This is our chance to help replenish this area's blood supply as well as make our community shine, as it always does in situations such as this."

T-shirts will be given to those who are making their third donation this calendar year. "3 in '93", as the program is called, is hosted by United Blood Services and Xi Sigma Omega.

United Blood Services is the nonprofit community blood provider serving patients in 16 hospitals throughout the West Texas area. Since blood cannot be manufactured or synthesized and can be stored only 42 days, a safe and adequate supply of blood must be available to meet the

needs of local hospital patients. Currently, more than 1300 units of blood must be collected each month to meet area demands.

Blood used by patients in the U.B.S. system is freely provided by volunteer blood donors, so there is no charge for blood itself. U.B.S. charges a processing fee to recover the operational costs of the blood center, including collecting, testing, processing, storing and delivering blood and blood components. Health insurance usually covers this fee.

Healthy people over 17 may donate blood. In Texas, state law requires 17 year olds to have written parental or guardian permission before they can donate. Each donor receives a thorough pre-donation interview, including a careful review of medical history and a check of temperature, pulse, blood pressure and blood iron level. After the blood is collected, it is typed and tested for diseases which could be transmitted to the recipient. Should any of these tests indicate the need for medical attention, the donor is notified.

The actual donation takes about 10 minutes. The donor relaxes in a comfortable chair while one unit (about a pint) of blood is collected in a special container. Afterward, donors will be treated to a dessert before returning to their normal routine.

## World War Two Shipmates Hold 50 year Reunion In Ozona

Bonnie Warth hosted a 50 year reunion with two of her World War II shipmates, Dee De Poali of Denver, CO, and Silvia Runnals of Boston, MA. The three girls served together for four years at St. Albans Naval Hospital on Long Island, NY. Although staying in close touch and visiting each other through the years, their dream of all being together had never been fulfilled until Dee and Silvia arrived at the Midland Airport for a five day visit in Bonnie's home in Ozona.

They brought multiple pictures and mementos from their Navy days. With the ones Bonnie had, they recalled and exchanged many memories, some funny, some sad, but all cherished experiences of their Navy years together.

The guests fell in love with Ozona and couldn't say enough about the uniqueness, the hospitality and the peace and tranquility of the area. They definitely want to return. One of several special treats was being guests of the Woman's Forum for the first meeting of the year. Silvia Runnals is a member of a Boston Federated Club founded in 1900. Dee De Poali spent two years in Washington, DC, in the Health and Education Services Division before she obtained a transfer to the legal department of St. Albans Naval Hospital on Long Island, NY. There she was responsible for many improved changes in the education and development program for service personnel. These contributions helped all men and women be of better service to their country and to better readjust to civilian life after their tenure of service, Mrs. Warth said. Later Dee stayed on

in the Naval Reserve in Washington, DC, then transferred to Denver where she retired in 1985.

Silvia Runnals was Bonnie's most challenging student when she joined her staff at the Electro-enchology Laboratory of St. Albans Naval Hospital. ## Tax Practitioner Workshops For Area

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service and the Texas Extension Education Foundation, Inc., is once again offering the tax practitioner workshops across the state of Texas in the fall of 1993. These workshops are led by CPAs and attorneys who are experienced in the field of income tax reporting and planning. They provide valuable continuing education opportunities for tax professionals seeking CPE and MCLE credit.

This year 24 general tax workshops, designed for practitioners who work mostly with individuals and small businesses, are offered in major Texas cities. The nearest ones will be in Midland on Dec. 6-7 and San Angelo on Nov. 8-9. Fourteen advanced tax workshops are also offered. They are directed at the practitioner with substantial experience with individual returns, who does some businesswork, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in San Antonio on Nov. 1-2; another is slated for Abilene Nov. 29-30.

In addition to the general and advanced workshops, there will be four of the estate planning workshops, and three each of the fiduciary income tax and agricultural tax problems workshop. A new workshop for 1993 will be the forestry taxation workshop held in Nacodoches and Longview.

It is an optional activity, said Ulmer, "which means that youth can complete the project without being in the food show; however, we encourage them to be in the show because it is an excellent learning activity on its own."







In recent years, the Strutters gained international fame with performances in Mexico and Korea and were the first to perform in the People's Republic of China.

There were more than a thousand in attendance for "Barbara Tidwell Day", which is the largest alumni attendance in the history of Southwest Texas. Seventy-five of the first year Strutters attended.

Governor Ann Richards declared Sept. 18 as "Barbara Tidwell Day". Mrs. Tidwell has also been nominated for the Texas Women's Hall of Fame.

The Reagors also attended a dance reception in Mrs. Tidwell's honor.

### Banned Books Week

Words. Ideas. The freedom to read them, without censure or limitations. The right to choose what to read. These freedoms are among the most difficult to legislate - whether court of law, in our homes, schools, churches, or in the workplace. What one person considers threatening, another finds exhilarating. In nations populated with diverse cultures, races and lifestyles, free expression can be the powerful dose of medicine that can heal or hurt.

Winston Churchill said: "Everyone is in favor of free speech. Hardly a day passes without its being extolled, but some people's idea of it is that they are free to say what they like, but if anyone else says anything back, that is an outrage." Fifty years later, Churchill's words are still true. Sept. 25 through Oct. 2 is Banned Books Week. This annual observance celebrates the freedom to choose what we read. It is an official acknowledgment that says that because we think differently from others does not empower

us to force them to think as we do.

Reading stimulates a thinking mind. Censorship destroys the ability to discover the differences and the commonalities in our fellow humans. Civilization has progressed because all viewpoints are allowed to exist. They can and should be debated, but only if they are allowed to be heard.

The freedom to read tests out basic constitutional rights, just as the freedom of speech and the freedom of the press test those same rights. This week we should reflect on those rights and think of them as the price of democracy. Perhaps a high price, but one that is well worth its cost.

The older campers are eager to lend a hand whenever they can to younger children who may at that time be undergoing treatment for their disease.

"It really makes you feel good to help someone," said Michele.

Michele is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Marshall. She has a sister, Terren, an 8th grader, but through Camp Discovery, "I have a lot of little brothers," Michele said of friends from camp. She is very close

to several of the children and has numerous pen and phone pals. One is 9-year-old Jason from San Antonio who calls her every Thursday.

"The hardest part is losing one of your friends," Michele said. Last summer one of the camp's junior counselors died. The previous summer one of the camp's teenage counselors died, someone who had attended every year.

The one-week camp is a much looked-forward-to event. There are crafts, swimming, sports and movies for older kids the last two days of camp. The older kids also get to camp out under the stars the last two nights.

At the end of each season, the 100 or so children who attend Camp Discovery at the Hermann Sons Hilltop Camp in Comfort get a remembrance packet filled with photographs and information about the week's activities.

One of the activities which took part of Michele's time this year was helping decorate for the camp's dance.

## Prescribed Burns Require Proper Planning

**Tom W. Payton, Range Conservationist Soil Conservation Service**

Believe it or not, this is the time of the year to begin planning for your prescribed burn. The burn season normally falls in the period of December-March, but the previous growing season may be one of the most critical times of the burning process.

The amount of fuel present is critical in determining how well a fire will perform and if it will achieve the intended goals. It is recommended that at least 1500 to 2000 pounds of fine fuels (mostly grasses) be available. If you are planning to burn and you do not have this amount, then deferment during the next growing season is necessary to produce the fuel required.

As part of the overall brush management goal, fire is a very useful and inexpensive tool. When used properly, undesirable plants such as small junipers and mesquite, pricklypear and tasajillo can be suppressed or controlled. Suppression of these plants over a period of years, and the

development of a more open canopy where more desirable vegetation can grow will cut down the number of dollars spent on other, more expensive brush control measures.

There are two other advantages to prescribed burning. One is the improvement of forage quality. Plants such as tabosa grass become coarse and unpalatable after a short time. Periodic fires will maintain the palatability of this plant for a longer period and therefore increase utilization. The other benefit is the stimulation of resprouting of desirable browse plants such as liveoak and elbow bush. Most liveoak motts in this part of the state have very little or no resprouting because of the grazing by goats and deer, but with proper stocking in conjunction with a fire and deferment, desirable woody plants will come back and provide additional forage.


