Football Fans Need To Know New Rules

When the action gets hot and heavy on the football field, a lot of the screaming and yelling from the stands comes from fans who don't understand new rules or rule changes. In fact, rules for sports are re-evaluated each year for various reasons.

This year, 15 major rule changes were made by the NCAA football rules committee. "But we're high school," you say--well, we play by the NCAA rules, and to be an up-to-date fan, you need to know about at least some of the most important changes.

One rule that was changed last year involves fumbles. A player may advance a fumble, except on a fourth down--in which case the fumble is dead when caught by players on the team which fumbled, other than the fumbler. Got that? Sure, you did.

Another rule change is that a player who is bleeding must leave the game and receive proper treatment. He cannot return to the field until approved by medical personnel.

Next, on dead-ball fouls after a series of plays have ended, the penalties will be assessed before placing the yardage chains for the new series.

One change involves the field itself. The inbound (hash mark) lines are 60 feet from the sideline and the center section is 40 feet wide.

On offensive pass interference there will be a 15-yard penalty assessed from the line of scrimmage. In the past this foul included a loss of

The next rule change involves a sneak play. The quarterback can no longer lay a loose ball at the feet of a lineman with the intention for the ball to be picked up and advanced by the lineman. This was at one time called the "Fumblerooski", for all you old

At least four players must be on each side of the kicker when the ball is actually kicked during a kickoff. Therefore, you will not see nine or more players on one side of the kicker anymore, unless they forget the rule has changed. This rule is to keep the defending team from getting players injured--or severely squashed.

There are several other rule changes that get a little hard to understand for the average fan. If you are lucky, there may be a chance to politely ask an official about a rule interpretation--however, we wouldn't suggest doing this during a game! Rules are mainly added to clarify a situation, allow the game to be played at an even pace, and to keep the game more competitive.







Record Books Necessary For Hunting Leases

"Hunting season is just around the corner again, and we need to be thinking about what the land owner is going to need to get ready for his hunters," said Game Warden Chuck Cosper.

According to state law, the owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive as a guest for pay or other consideration another person engeaged in hunting unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The law reads as follows:

43.0485 Hunting Lease Records (a) The holder of a hunting lease license shall keep a record book supplied by the department and shall register each guest. The registration of a guest must include:

(1) the name and complete address of the guest;

(2) the hunting license number of

(3) the number and type of game animals and game birds killed each day by the guest.

(b) A guest who fails or refuses to supply the licensee with information required by Subsection (a) of this section commits an offense.

(c) The record book required by this section shall be kept at the hunting lease and may be inspected by game

(d) Not later than Aug. 31 of a important this week, as Ozona takes license year, the holder of a hunting lease license shall deliver the record book to a game warden in the county in which the hunting lease is located. The record book must include information required by the department on the license year's hunting activity on the hunting lease.

Game Wardens the past year filed several cases against landowners for not obtaining their hunting lease license and keeping the record book.

"If you need an application for the hunting lease license, see me," said Cosper. "I will also have plenty of record books because a record book needs to be kept in each camp."
