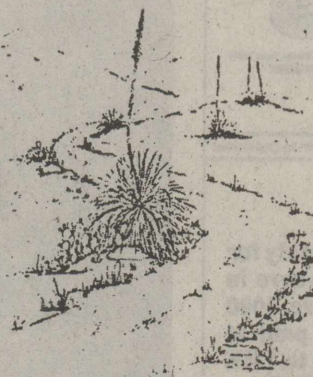
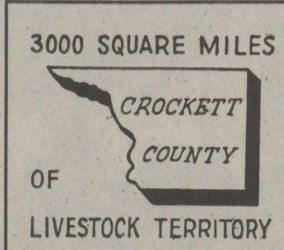

## Mountain Lion No Joke To West Side Residents

Commissioners responded to a petition from west Ozona citizens asking for action against a prowling mountain lion at a meeting Monday. The court voted to hire Eddie Moore for two days to take his hunting dogs, with landowners' permission, and look around the area where the cat has been reported. At the next sighting of the animal, he and the dogs will take up the chase. The motion also included hiring a trapper to work the area with the landowners' permission.

A mountain lion has been sighted by residents in an area bordering town from Chandlerdale West to near the homes of Bill Mason and Gary Mitchell. One report was of a lioness and two cubs.

Mrs. Connie Bentley and Mrs. Gerry Pesson attended the court meeting with Lucy Humphreys to ask that something be done about the mountain lion. Mrs. Bentley first sighted the animal across from her home June 9. Mrs. Pesson saw the lion three weeks ago when she went in her backyard to bring in the family's cat. Others have seen or heard the animal.

Mrs. Humphreys, who brought in the petitions, said turkeys, rabbits and stray domestic animals are no longer seen in the west part of town.

During a report by civic and youth center director Garland Young, they reviewed bids for two 10-ton air conditioning units for the civic center. The bid was awarded to Johnnie Ramirez of Texas Heating and Air Conditioning. Other bidding were SilverHawk Mechanical of Ozona and Reese Heating and Air Conditioning of Sheffield.

Melinda Hokit attended the meeting to talk about financial needs at Fort Lancaster. She was told that Texas Rural Communities needs to write the court and explain how any donations from the county would be used.

Road and street repair projects are almost complete for the season, according to Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent. Cracks in the airport runway were being sealed Monday in preparation for coating the paved surfaces there. Work was also being done on Santa Rosa Street Monday in preparation for seal coating.

Court members approved use of leftover asphalt to complete repairs to an area north of the truck stop.

Use of pens at the fairgrounds for private enterprise was discussed. "We need to look at several issues and coordinate them into a parks and recreation policy," Judge Kathryn Mayfield said.

Court members voted to approve easements on the Guadalupe Castro property at Ramos and AA Streets where the county had installed tin-horns on the back of the property.

Librarian Louise Ledoux reported that the library board cannot apply for several grants for building funds until

they receive information from architect Jack Meeks.

A recent workshop on government funding provided much valuable information on applying for grants, she said.

The library, during the first eight months of the year, has already served more people and checked out more books than all of 1992, Mrs. Ledoux said.

The facility will add a fax machine to its equipment in January. The Big Country Library System will provide an IBM computer early in 1994.

Garland Young, civic and youth center director, was present to give a monthly report. He presented his board's recommendations for new members. These will be voted on by the court at the November meeting.

Commissioners approved a line item change in the treasurer's budget, approved the outside audit for 1992 heard a financial report for the county auditor and examined written reports from Helping Hands and the hospital and care center. After discussion, the court agreed not to have an employee banquet in December.

## District 6 Gold Star Recipients Honored

Youth who achieved the highest statewide honor awarded to a 4-H member were honored at the 1993 District 4-H Gold Star luncheon on Saturday, Oct. 9. Midland College's Road Runner Hall was the scene as the City of Midland's Mayor J. D. Faircloth welcomed the honorees, and City Manager Bill Clanton addressed over 120 4-H members, parents and County Extension Agents.

Representatives of TU Electric, Texas-New Mexico Power Company and West Texas Utilities, which sponsored the event, were on hand to present recognition awards to youth from the twenty-three counties in the District 6 area. The youth, who were selected by awards committees from their respective counties, have spent several years participating in project work which develops their skills and technical knowledge through hands-on activities.

4-H enables youth to utilize classroom knowledge and real-life experiences through an array of projects and multi-generational contact, using adults and older youth such as those honored at the luncheon, to teach. Throughout the 4-H experience, members are constantly exposed to activities designed to develop citizenship, leadership and responsibility.

The youth who reach the Gold Star Award level have developed skills which will serve them throughout adulthood in their personal, business and professional lives. Only a select few are chosen for this high honor, as each county has a quota of Gold Star recipients they are limited to, based on the number of members who are categorized as senior 4-H'ers (age 14 or

older).

JoLynn Vannoy and Adrienne Dickerson are this year's Gold Star award recipients from Crockett County. They were honored by Kit Horne of West Texas Utilities Company. Adrienne and JoLynn received framed certificates symbolizing this honor and pins to be worn for recognition. Both young women have excelled in developing life skills which have enabled them to assume leadership roles in the community, district and state.

The luncheon and recognition were sponsored by the three electric companies which serve the Extension 6 Far West District. LuAnn Morgan of TU Electric along with Bobby McCorkle of Texas-New Mexico Power Company and Kit Horne, West Texas Utilities, all played key roles.

The commitment the electric utility companies exhibit in support of 4-H youth extends far beyond this single event and are much appreciated. Each company has a special reason for wanting these Gold Star youth to be recognized and held up as examples for other youth and for parents seeking involvement in a worthwhile, family oriented youth organization. A large portion of the prestige associated with this award is due to these companies' support.

The recognition program was conducted by members of the District 4-H Council, including District First Vice President JoLynn Vannoy. Accompanying the local winners to the award banquet were Terry and Peggy Dickerson, Dr. Gary and Nancy Vannoy, County Extension Agent Tedra Ulmer and Neal Ulmer.

## OHS Boys Win Cross Country Meet

The Ozona High School boys' cross country team won its own meet for the first time during competition held Saturday, Oct. 9. There were 83 runners in the division, and Ozona won by placing three in the top five finishers and five in the top 11.

Freshman Charles Villarreal came in second with a time of 17:31 behind Joey Rendon of Rocksprings who ran a 17:28. Other individual finishers for Ozona were: 3 John Ramirez, 17:53; 4 Bryan Valdez, 17:59; 9 Johnny Porras, 18:33; 11 Pete Castaneda, 18:41; 13 Codie Porras, 19:03; 28 Rene

Tambunga, 20:09; 32 Freddie Ybarra, 20:33; and 61 Patrick Sanchez, 22:22. Ozona won the meet with 24 points followed by Rocksprings with 67, Eldorado with 108, Central J.V. 130, Iraan 131, Comstock 138, Junction 141 and Coahoma 186 for eighth place.

"The Ozona boys' team will be looking forward to winning the district championship, which they have not won since 1991," said Coach Pete Maldonado. The Ozona boys have won the district championship five out of the last eight years and are

looking forward to making it six.

The top two teams in the district compete at the regional meet in Lubbock Nov. 6. The boys compete in Eldorado Oct. 16, and the district meet is scheduled for Oct. 26 in San Angelo.

Rocksprings girls won their division of the third annual Ozona cross country meet with 52 points. They were followed by Stanton with 55, Sterling City with 64, Eldorado with 112, Junction with 135, Wall with 178, Junction II with 216 and Comstock eighth with 219 points.

Individual finishers for Ozona were: 24 Heather Hall, 13:50; 37 Dana Bishop, 14:37; 51 Amanda Ortiz, 15:21; 81 Jamie Porter, 19:26. Sabrina Hernandez of Rocksprings won first with a 12:29.

The high school/junior high meet included 39 teams from 22 towns and more than 300 runners.

"I would like to thank everyone who helped in putting on the meet, especially Crockett County Road Department for helping in preparing the course," said Coach Maldonado. "The meet was a success and everyone was pleased with the way the meet was run."

## De Hoyos Named New TxDOT Supervisor

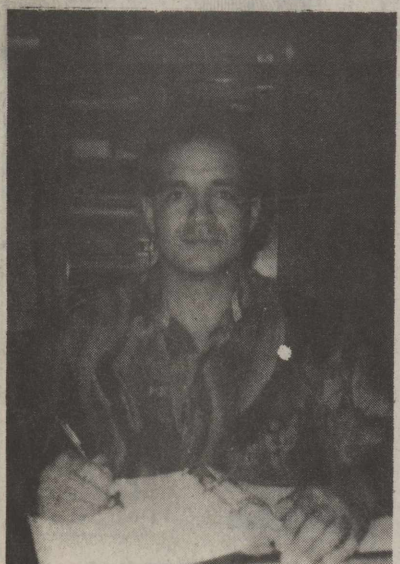

Borrowed from her mother were the pearl earrings the bride wore and the penny from the bridegroom's mother.

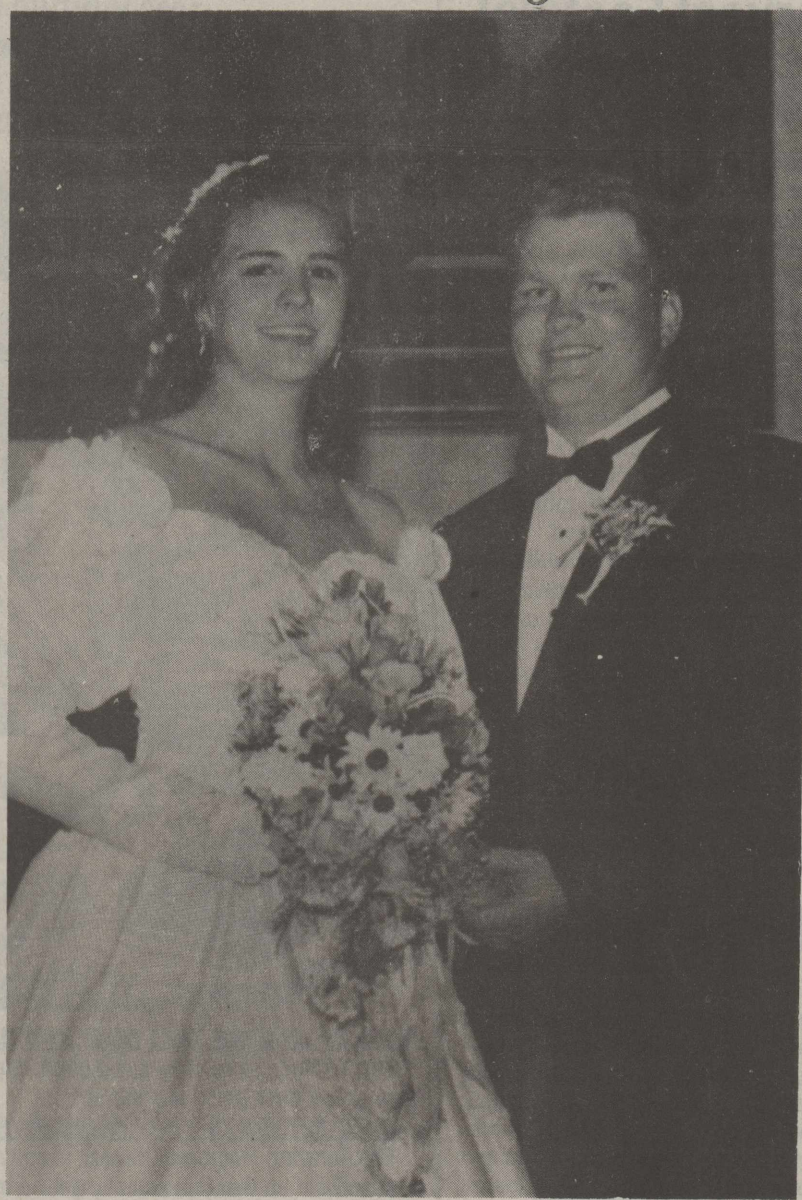

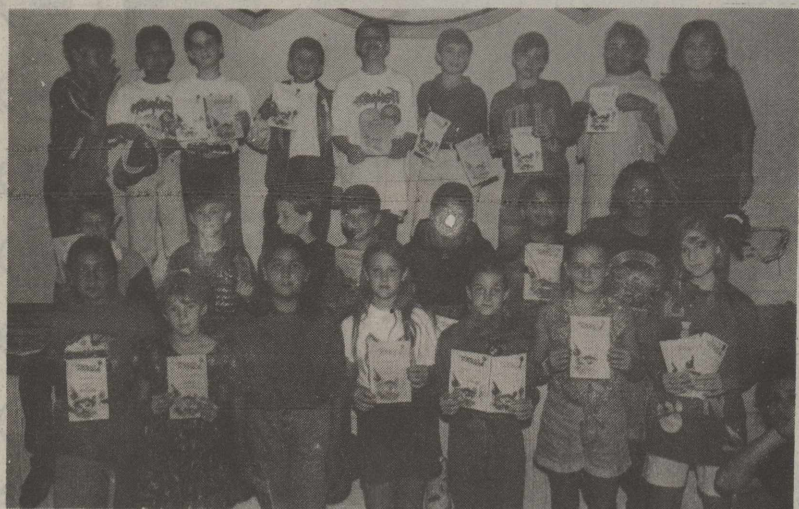

### Football Fans Need To Know New Rules

When the action gets hot and heavy on the football field, a lot of the screaming and yelling from the stands comes from fans who don't understand new rules or rule changes. In fact, rules for sports are re-evaluated each year for various reasons.

This year, 15 major rule changes were made by the NCAA football rules committee. "But we're high school," you say--well, we play by the NCAA rules, and to be an up-to-date fan, you need to know about at least some of the most important changes.

One rule that was changed last year involves fumbles. A player may advance a fumble, except on a fourth down--in which case the fumble is dead when caught by players on the team which fumbled, other than the fumbler. Got that? Sure, you did.

Another rule change is that a player who is bleeding must leave the game and receive proper treatment. He cannot return to the field until approved by medical personnel.

Next, on dead-ball fouls after a series of plays have ended, the penalties will be assessed before placing the yardage chains for the new series.

One change involves the field itself. The inbound (hash mark) lines

are 60 feet from the sideline and the center section is 40 feet wide.

On offensive pass interference there will be a 15-yard penalty assessed from the line of scrimmage. In the past this foul included a loss of down.

The next rule change involves a sneak play. The quarterback can no longer lay a loose ball at the feet of a lineman with the intention for the ball to be picked up and advanced by the lineman. This was at one time called the "Fumblerooski", for all you old codgers.

At least four players must be on each side of the kicker when the ball is actually kicked during a kickoff. Therefore, you will not see nine or more players on one side of the kicker anymore, unless they forget the rule has changed. This rule is to keep the defending team from getting players injured--or severely squashed.

There are several other rule changes that get a little hard to understand for the average fan. If you are lucky, there may be a chance to politely ask an official about a rule interpretation--however, we wouldn't suggest doing this during a game! Rules are mainly added to clarify a situation, allow the game to be played at an even pace, and to keep the game more competitive.

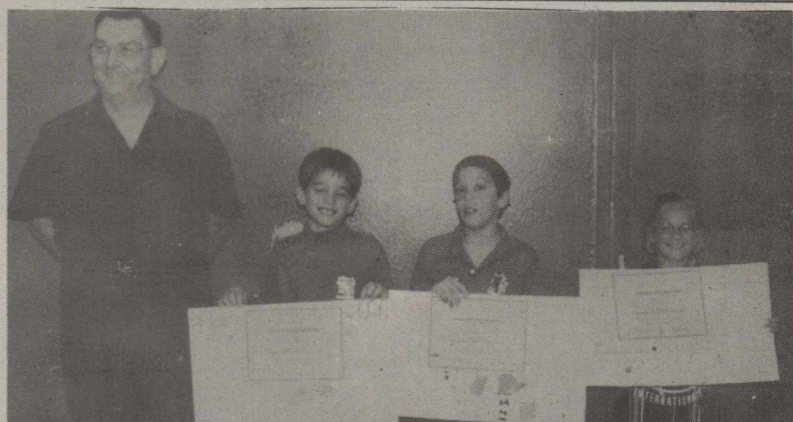

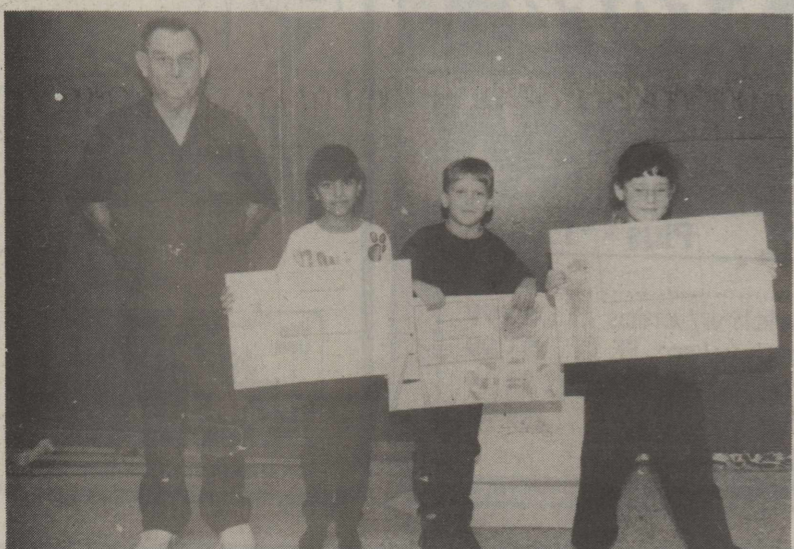

### Wool Sales Held Oct. 7 At Local Warehouses

Wool consigned by Terry Dickerson brought the top price of .81 5/8 at Wool Growers' fall sale Oct. 7. The 160,100 pounds of fall paint free ewe wool brought prices ranging from .40 to .81 5/8.

The Bob Wilkinson Ranch, Inc. of Menard sold wool at .8125, and wool from the Tony Allen ranch brought .80 3/8.

Lamb wool averaged .62 3/8 with 13,927 pounds sold. Average price for 12-month wool was .5950 on 23,774 pounds.

Volume buyers were: Anodyne with 63,125 pounds; Bollman Industries, 57,269 pounds; and Forte, Dupree and Sawyer, 48,961 pounds.

At a sale held that morning at Wool Growers in Sanderson, the Tommy Hayre Ranche received the high price of .81 1/8 for paint free ewe wool. 157,000 pounds were sold.

The average for lamb wool was

.6425 on 10,000 pounds. 12-month wool brought an average of .6525 on 39,000 pounds.

Ozona Wool and Mohair had a second wool sale on Oct. 7. 12-month original bag wool brought an average of .5950 with 4,400 pounds sold. Fall lamb wool amounted to 3,900 pounds with the average price being .65. Paint

free short wool brought an average of .76 from the 101,000 pounds sold.

Anodyne was the high bidder of .80 3/8 for wool from the Lamota Ranch.

Several lots sold in the .80's with the rest in the .70's.

Anodyne and Bollman Industries were the volume buyers.

### \$66,359 Delinquent County Taxes Still On Rolls

Tax statements for the 1992 year, in the amount of \$9,284,167, were mailed on October 5, 1992. For people still owing 1992 taxes, additional statements were mailed in February and in May, 1993. McCreary, Veselka, Bragg and Allen, delinquent tax attorneys for Crockett County, mailed notices to all persons owing taxes on August 3, 1993.

As of September 30, 1993, the 1992 taxes still due totaled \$66,359. The Crockett County Tax Office has collected 99.3% of the total 1992 levy.

As an additional means of collecting taxes still delinquent, the Crockett County Tax Office is considering publishing a list of persons still owing 1992 taxes as of October 22, 1993 in the *Ozona Stockman*.

## Ranchers Asked To Nominate ASC Committee

"Ranchers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by Nov. 1 to be on the ASC Crockett County committee ballot," says Herb Schwertner, county executive director.

The ASC county committee election will be conducted from Nov. 26 to Dec. 6 by mail ballot.

ASC committees are responsible for managing federal ranch programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, Schwertner said. In Crockett County ranchers have the opportunity to nominate people they feel would best serve the ranch community. Ranchers have received petition forms by mail and are now submitting them to the county ASCS office.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions, he said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve if elected, must be signed by at least three eligible ranch votes in the ASCS community, and must be received in the county ASCS office by the Nov. 1 deadline.

Ranchers may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many

candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a rancher for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for office holders.

Ranchers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as a member of the ASC committee. The election of concerned ranchers to positions on ASC committees is essential in the administration of ranch programs," Schwertner said.

He further explained that the county ASCS office welcomes all valid petitions. The opportunity to nominate, vote and be elected to office is guaranteed to all ranchers regardless of race, color, religion, sex, age, marital status, handicap or national origin.

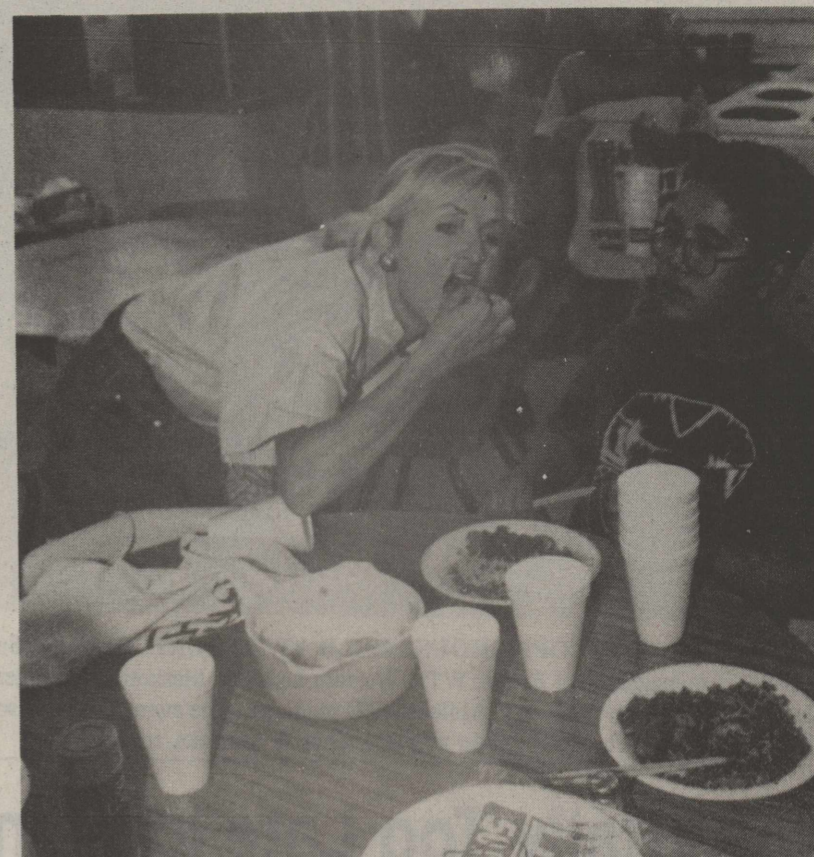
Dr. Paul Breen of Midland provided an informative program on acupuncture.

### Record Books Necessary For Hunting Leases

"Hunting season is just around the corner again, and we need to be thinking about what the land owner is going to need to get ready for his hunters," said Game Warden Chuck Cosper.

According to state law, the owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive as a guest for pay or other consideration another person engaged in hunting unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The law reads as follows:  
43.0485 Hunting Lease Records  
(a) The holder of a hunting lease license shall keep a record book supplied by the department and shall register each guest. The registration of a guest must include:

- (1) the name and complete address of the guest;
  - (2) the hunting license number of the guest; and
  - (3) the number and type of game animals and game birds killed each day by the guest.
- (b) A guest who fails or refuses to supply the licensee with information required by Subsection (a) of this section commits an offense.

(c) The record book required by this section shall be kept at the hunting lease and may be inspected by game wardens.

(d) Not later than Aug. 31 of a license year, the holder of a hunting lease license shall deliver the record book to a game warden in the county in which the hunting lease is located. The record book must include information required by the department on the license year's hunting activity on the hunting lease.

Game Wardens the past year filed several cases against landowners for not obtaining their hunting lease license and keeping the record book.

"If you need an application for the hunting lease license, see me," said Cosper. "I will also have plenty of record books because a record book needs to be kept in each camp."

### Hospital/ Care Center Board Members Discuss Grant Money Expenditures

Hospital/care center board members agreed to use grant equipment money to buy a new refrigerator for the facility at an Oct. 6 meeting. The old refrigerator will be put up for sale at the next county sale.

A vote was taken to approve Doctors Price Burdine, Nick Jackson and Steve Sessom as staff physicians at the hospital.

Home health care continued to be an agenda item. Administrator Gerry Phillips said five oxygen concentrators could possibly be purchased with grant money if the decision is made to go with the program. Grant funds remaining which may be spent on durable equipment are \$32,433.11.

During a grant expenditure update, Mr. Phillips said that \$100,259.07 of the \$147,900.00 in grant money remains to be spent. Duration of the grant is from Sept. 15, 1991 through Sept. 14, 1994.

Combined operation of the hospital and care center was under budget by \$12,529 for September, Phillips said. He shows an overage of \$112,375 for the year to date.

Director of Nurses Diane Schwertner reported that more than 100 people had used the flu clinic Wednesday.

A prospective doctor was in town to meet with the board during executive session at this meeting.

### Lions Rally Too Late In Stanton Loss

Rallying in the second half of Friday's game, the Ozona Lions still fell short of a tie and possible win on penetrations in a heart-stopping 22-20 loss to the Stanton Buffaloes.

"It was like two separate games," said Coach Don Payne. "Stanton dominated the first half with 11 first downs, and we dominated the second half with 16 first downs."

Stanton's All-State running back, Ricky Lucas, ran the ball 19 times for 234 yards. Jerle Lee, another Stanton All-State fullback, helped lead the team to a 16-0 halftime score.

Lucas ran for 84 yards in two plays, scoring on the third play of the game, a 31-yard touchdown run. The extra point attempt was not good.

On the Lions' first possession, a fumble on the third play was recovered by the Buffaloes. Stanton took the ball down to the Ozona 2-yard line, where the Lions' defense put up a good stand.

Early in the second quarter the Buffaloes kicked a 24-yard field goal to lead 10-0. A Castro interception on the Stanton 20-yard line set the stage for a Buffalo TD after a 51-yard run by Lucas, and seven plays later the Buffaloes scored on a 10-yard pass play with the extra point good. Halftime ended with the score Stanton 16, Ozona 0.

Changing game plans at the half, the Lions proceeded to move the ball down the field, as QB Justin Castro led his team from their own 32-yard line with a combination of passing and running plays.

A 35-yard run by Castro, a 13-yard pass from Castro to Tony Valencia, and good running by backs Anthony Sanchez and Julio Martinez moved the ball to the one-yard line. Anthony Sanchez then took the ball in for the score; however, the extra point attempt failed and the Buffaloes still led 16-6.

Good defense by the Lions--led by Julio Martinez, Travis Davidson, and Robert Bryson--forced the Buffaloes to punt. Again, the Lion offense was able to move the ball down the field, but the Buffalo defense thwarted the Lions' chances for a late third-quarter score.

In the fourth quarter the Lions were on the move again with a 24-yard run by Anthony Sanchez and a 10-yard pass completion to Tony Valencia, who also had a 16-yard run. Chris Sanchez, double teamed all night, received an 8-yard pass in the drive, which was capped by fullback Julio Martinez' score on a 3-yard run. A pass to Chris Sanchez in the end zone was complete for the two extra points, as the Lions closed the scoring gap to Ozona 14, Stanton 16 with 8:14 remaining in the fourth period.

The Buffaloes wasted no time in getting the ball back down the field with a 60-yard run and a 15-yard TD run by Ricky Lucas. Fortunately for the Lions, the extra point failed. The score, with 6:19 remaining in the game, was Stanton 22, Ozona 14.

Ozona retaliated by mounting a 62-yard scoring drive. This time, passes of 9, 19 and 13 yards were received by Jesse Garza, and contributions by Castro and Valencia helped in getting the ball down to the 1-yard

line, where it was taken in by Anthony Sanchez.

The crucial attempt for two extra points--which would have tied the game--was just out of receiver Jesse Garza's hands. With 35 second left, Stanton took over the ball and ran out the clock for the victory.

Coach Payne was proud of the way the team pulled together in the second half, showing "a lot of character". The offensive line did a good job of blocking and executing the plays, the coach said, giving Castro plenty of time to throw and good holes for the runners. Ozona ended the game with 315 total yards on offense--174 rushing yards on 39 throws and only one interception.

Turnovers improved this week, with only one interception and one fumble, and penalties were much less, with the team only penalized three times for 30 yards.

Payne also noted the play of Tony Valencia, as the running back made key plays on third downs, and Anthony Sanchez, who has had knee problems up until this year but "gives it all

he's got" despite his inexperience and size.

"The leadership was better on the field this week," according to the coach, but he felt the team had not been getting ready mentally. Mental as well as physical preparation will be important this week, as Ozona takes on 5-1 Iraan on the Braves' home field. The Braves, who are "flying high" according to Payne, are a young team and really "get after it, play hard and tackle well".

With this loss, Ozona's season record is 3-3 for the season and 1-2 in district play.

## Crockett County Library News by Louise Ledoux

Well, it happened again today. In fact, it happened three times - a busy day, I guess. "It" is a fairly common occurrence, but one that makes librarians, especially me, go ballistic. I'm talking about those earnest, conscientious parents who do their kids' homework.

Do parents really think they're helping their kids by doing their schoolwork for them? Just what is your child learning from your labors? And how about you - do you really want to spend your valuable time photocopying pictures of fossils or making a chart of how a bill becomes a law?

I've been a librarian about 10 years, and I've heard all the excuses. "My son has football practice." "Jane has a dance class." "It seems like an awful lot of homework for a sixth grader." (Imagine a Japanese parent saying this!) Some do seem reluctant, but they still do their kid's work. Others are pretty unhappy about it, too, and often vent their wrath on hapless library staff, especially when the needed materials have been checked out by other students. Maybe they should just let their children take the F's for putting off the assignment until the last minute. Now, that would be a real learning experience.

I love for parents to come and help their children with assignments.

Library staff don't always have time to individually help each student with their work. But, I do grit my teeth and bite my tongue when an adult comes up and says, "My daughter has to do a report on..." Many of these parents don't even have a clear idea of what the assignment involves or exactly what information is needed.

It's scary when a high school senior complains that he can't find anything in the encyclopedia on Joseph Stalin. I discover they looked in the "J" volume. Students must learn how to do research, or they will be lost all through school. Students walk into a large university library, and they're overwhelmed by the vast array of resources. Academic librarians just don't have time to spoon-feed all of the baffled freshmen who line up at the reference desk. One wonders how they ever got to college without learning to use a library. I certainly don't know all the answers, but I do know how and where to look for those answers, and that is the key. Teaching people - like students - how to do that is a librarian's job. And we're glad to do it, if you'll let us. There are cultural treasures and vital information and just fun reading on library shelves. The need to know will never die. The future belongs to the information literate.
