





The Great Flood

By Dennis J. Prutow

The great flood of 1993 has dominated the news. Our insurance policies once called such events, "acts of God." We've gotten away from that terminology. But all of this rain and flooding ought to cause us to look at the power of God. By contrast, we are also seeing our own inabilities. Many scientists thought the Mississippi River basin could be successfully engineered. Dams and levies were

supposed to contain the flood. But all our expertise failed. We could never cover all the contingencies. The task is too big. Besides, God rules and over

This was true of the great flood in the time of Noah. He and his family were bitterly ridiculed by snickering mobs because of the ark. No one imagined the proportions of the flood which came. The devastation was awesome. The old world was de-

stroyed. But why? Answer: "The

earth was filled with violence" (Genesis 6:11). God responded by cleansing that old world with water.

Is there any connection to our present situation? We rightly hesitate to make too precise a comparison. But this one thing is sure. The amount of violence in our world is escalating exponentially. Horrid "ethnic cleansing" and civil strife are on the rise. Street violence in our cities is expanding. Is it time to examine the meaning of the "acts of God" all around us?


