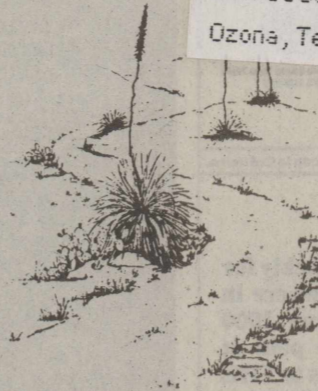

Hamlin Next -- This Friday In San Angelo

Lions Knock Off Van Horn In Bi-District Win

The Ozona Lions kept the play-off caravan rolling as they conquered the Van Horn Eagles 36-7 in a bi-district match last Friday night in Odessa's Ratliff Stadium.

This win advances the District 6-2A runner-up Lions to the area round of the playoffs in San Angelo on Friday, Nov. 19. There they will face Hamlin, a perennial state playoff contender, at 8 p.m. in San Angelo Stadium.

Although the scoring got off to a slow start, the Lions ended the bi-district contest with a big fourth quarter—scoring 22 of their 36 points. Both teams started out with a defensive battle in the first half of the game, and the first points were scored by the Lions with only 1:07 left in the second quarter.

The Lions did have one major loss Friday, as Anthony Sanchez went out early in the first quarter with a broken collarbone. Sanchez ran three plays for a total of 45 yards, even though he was actually injured on the first play. He did not realize the injury had occurred until several plays later. Sanchez ended his season with 686 total yards on 123 carries, averaging 5.3 yards per carry.

Matt Ortiz, after regaining his academic eligibility last week, came into the game to replace Sanchez. Ortiz, a 5-foot-8, 170-pound junior, rushed for a game-high 153 yards on 23 carries and two TD's. According to Coach Don Payne, "Matt Ortiz did a great job stepping in for Anthony, with only three days of practice."

The Lions did move the ball in their first series of downs with a 34-yard run by Anthony Sanchez and a 21-yard pass to Jesse Garza, but were unable to continue due to a fumble. Other drives early in the first half were similar to the first, except the Lions were forced to punt three times in the half.

It seemed the Lion defense was more than equal to the task as they kept the Eagles from scoring and forced them to punt four times. Talking about the Lion defense as well as the team in general, Payne said, "I'm proud of our kids, especially their showing a lot of character in the second half. Our defense rose to the occasion—we shut

Van Horn out on our end of the field.

"Our linebackers—Travis Davidson and Juan Trujillo—played exceptionally well with ten tackles each. Andres De La Garza stepped in at defensive tackle and did a good solid job, particularly since he hasn't played that position since last Tuesday, Nov. 9. Adam Carroll played defensive end and hadn't played in six weeks," said Payne.

Other Lion players having a good game on defense were Chris Sanchez, Robert Bryson, and Julio Martinez with eight tackles each. Ryan Morris had seven tackles, and Jesse Garza garnered two tackles, a pass interception and a fumble recovery. Tony Valencia made one tackle, which resulted in a Lion safety, and snatched one interception for Ozona.

Justin Moran, who made three tackles and a fumble recovery for a touchdown in the end zone, was "the

icing on the cake," according to Coach Payne. Payne also added Ozona had good punts (5 for 38.4 average) and good coverage on punt returns.

Offensively, Ortiz started off running well in the second quarter, rushing 48 yards for eight carries—including a 1-yard touchdown plunge for the first score in the game, leaving the Lions leading 7-0 late in the second quarter.

In the second half, the Lions were not able to advance the ball and were forced to punt. The Eagles, receiving on their own 21-yard line, started moving the ball with short yardage plays. They then connected on a 35-yard run and ended up with a 28-yard TD pass from QB Roy Stroman to Ty Taylor, to tie the score at 7-7 with 7:29

left in the third quarter.

Joe Esparza returned the kickoff to the Lion 32-yard line, where the Lions started moving the ball with short runs and two passes of 25 and 5 yards to Adam Carroll. Unfortunately, a Castro pass was intercepted on the Van Horn 13-yard line, stopping the drive.

Several short runs by the Eagles got the ball to the Ozona 38-yard line, where the Lion defense dropped the runner for a 10-yard loss and forced them to punt. Chris Sanchez received the punt and took off on a spectacular 92-yard run for a Lion touchdown. The score came with just 36 seconds left in the third quarter and the extra point conversion was good as the Lions took the lead 14-7.

Coach Payne said, "The turning point of the game was when Chris Sanchez ran the 92-yard TD punt return. Then the defense got back on the field and recovered a fumble deep on Van Horn's end of the field. This helped change the momentum in our favor."

Following the Sanchez TD punt

return, the Eagles received the ball and returned it to their own 37-yard line. A few plays later the Lions forced an Eagle fumble and Ozona's Jesse Garza recovered the ball on the Eagle 23-yard line.

Matt Ortiz carried the ball four times, reaching the end zone on a 3-yard run. The extra point was good and the Lions zoomed ahead 21-7 with 10:08 left in the game.

On the next set of Van Horn downs, Jesse Garza again came up with the football on an interception at (Continued on pg. 8)

TWDB Reports Ample Water For Dairy Operation

As a spinoff of several unanswered questions that were brought up during the dairy economic impact meeting held Thursday, Nov. 4, a summary report of ground-water around the proposed dairy site was requested by Rep. Bob Turner and prepared by Darrell S. Peckham, geologist for the Texas Water Development Board.

Rep. Turner asked for a geologist's interpretation of the data, to determine if there is enough water present to support a dairy farm and what effect if any on nearby irrigation pumpage. The following information is from the summary of the report and is listed at the beginning of the report as a whole:

The data used in this report is derived from TWDB report 47 "Occurrence and Quality of Ground Water in Crockett County, Texas" and

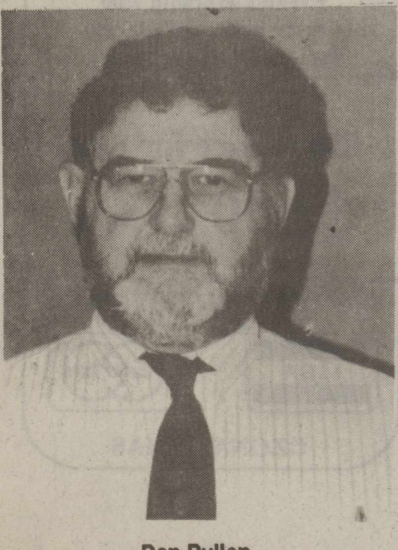
Tax Rollback Fails

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Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

Imagine the reaction at Texas Stadium one Sunday afternoon if Troy Aikman, Emmitt Smith and the rest of the Cowboys strode out of the tunnel in the standard football gear of the 1930s - leather helmets, little or no padding, and stiff, clunky cleats. Worse, suppose Jimmy Johnson had decided to use the play book from that era. No matter how the opponents lined up, he set his strategies based on what worked way back then. It doesn't take much to figure out the results would be disastrous. What worked yesterday won't cut it today when the rest of the teams are improving and changing strategies.

When the North American Free Trade Agreement goes before Congress in a few short days, our representatives will make a crucial decision on how the United States will compete in a global economy that's changing far more quickly than any football game. If our country is going to succeed, NAFTA needs to be part of the play book.

NAFTA's 15-year plan to open the borders to free trade between the United States, Mexico and Canada will create jobs and position us to compete in a world economy rapidly becoming based on trading alliances. The European Community and Pacific Rim trade blocks already are making an impact on the world's economy by pooling their resources. If the United States misses its opportunity to lead North America into a similar agreement, our business and industry won't be competing on a level playing field with our counterparts in countries like Japan.

Of course, change is unsettling, and every policy shift has its drawbacks as well as its advantages. But many of the arguments against NAFTA are rooted in fear, not facts.

Some low-skill level jobs may be lost as companies move to take advantage of Mexico's lower wage scales. We are losing those jobs now. But most economists agree that the United States will gain jobs from NAFTA. Gary Hufbaker and Jeffrey Scott of the Institute for International Economics predict a net gain of 171,000 American jobs over the next five years as we gain expanded opportunities for

trade with Canada and Mexico. And the jobs we gain will be better, higher-paying jobs than the ones we lose. American jobs related to trade with Mexico pay about 17 percent more than the average U. S. job, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce.

But when it comes down to it, estimates and predictions are just our best guesses of what will happen. For concrete evidence of what happens when rich and poor nations join forces in a trade zone, we need a real-life example. Fortunately, we don't have to go far to find one. In 1986, when the European Community brought Spain and Portugal in to their common market, they were in a similar situation. Just like the opponents of NAFTA are today, Europeans in the richer northern nations feared the flight of jobs to the nations with low wages. The results proved different. Wages and economic growth exploded in Spain and Portugal, with the per capita Gross National Product in both countries more than doubling in five years time. And the wealthier nations of the north, in addition to gaining profitable export markets, also saw their job-creation rates accelerate. Stanford University professor Anne Krueger, a former chief economist for the World Bank, summed the situation up pretty succinctly: "Ahead of time, people said terrible things would happen. And then, of course, nothing terrible happened."

Every businessman or woman knows that success involves taking risks. But when we weigh the pros and cons, and look at it in a fact-based, not fear-based light, NAFTA is clearly a step the United States needs to take. We can't stop the changes in the world economy any more than the Dallas Cowboys could make every team in the NFL run 1930's plays and wear 1930's equipment.

What we can do is learn the new strategies, sign the new players, and do what it takes to win on today's playing field. One thing is certain, our economic future is too important for anyone to sit on the sidelines. If you feel strongly about this issue, write your congressional representatives today.

"Dr. Self was a member of the original CVHG board of directors," according to Carmen Sutton, Crockett County representative on the home's regional advisory council. "And he has continued to be very much involved with the home right up to the present. For all these years, he has contributed dental services for all the residents - even now, when we have three homes accommodating 23 girls instead of one home with seven girls."

The tea is sponsored every fall by Philia Club of San Angelo as a fundraising event. The homes are located on Preusser Street - McCaw at 444, Haby at 404 and Tucker at 331 - and all three will be open from 2 to 5 p.m. The award presentation will take place at 3 p.m. at Haby Home.

Blood Drive Nov. 18

Xi Sigma Omega will host a community blood drive at the EMS Building from 1 until 7 p.m. tomorrow, Nov. 18.

This will be the fifth and final blood drive of 1993 and the last chance for "3 in '93" T-shirts. Those who have already donated blood twice this year may pick up their T-shirts after making their third donation on Thursday.

United Blood Services picks up the blood from the drive and delivers it to the San Angelo blood center laboratory so that it can be made into components. If the blood gets to the laboratory within six hours of the time it is collected, it may be separated into several different components used to treat specific patient needs.

The red blood cells are used in surgeries and to treat anemia; cryoprecipitate is used to treat hemophilia; plasma can be used for a shock or burn patient; and platelets are needed by cancer and leukemia patients.

Blood that reaches the blood center laboratory more than six hours after collection time may be separated into red blood cells and recovered plasma, which is used in the manufacturing of sera and medications for laboratory and patient use.

that superintendents stay longer on the job and fit in with the community better when applicants are considered that have the same view points and ideas that the general public, teachers, school board members, students and etc. feel they should have," said Leslie.

The superintendent search time calendar:

- Open applications - Dec. 1, 1993

- Consultants review applications - Feb. 24-28, 1994

- Interview semi-finalists - Mar. 4, 1994 (names will be released at this time)
- Review references with board - 7:00 p.m., Mar. 22, 1994
- Interview finalists - Mar. 23-25, 1994
- Board visits home site of candidate - Mar. 29, 1994

The following statements were made by interested parents, business and civic leaders attending the Nov. 11 meeting held in the Crockett Room at 10:00 a.m.:

"I think we should run a credit check on each applicant." "We have good kids. They just need some one with the leadership to motivate them." "The applicants should have kids of their own. Ozona is a good place to raise children." "We are able to pay more because the Ozona economy is doing well." "There should be a long term commitment on his part." "We have plenty of money to attract new teachers which makes it easier on his part." "I would like for him or her to take a look at the principals and teachers." "I think he should visit each school and take the time to make adjustment as he sees fit." "Failures in high school concerns me. I think he should take a closer look at why students are failing. He should evaluate instructional and test scores and make

a fair decision." "I think he should be man enough to make decisions and not feel like he is going to get fired." "I think communication between teachers and parents should be open without fear." "I think the principals need to be more honest with the parents." "He needs to be a good listener and have an open door policy." "He should meet leaders in the community and teachers and knock down any rumors that may be spreading." "He would spend more time visiting each school and the general public. He should from time to time walk down the street and visit with the general public." "They should have a strong background in financial matters concerning the budget and ways to cut it."

The consultants told the audience that they have a 96-97% success rate. Superintendents stay where they are placed and are liked by the public. "We would not hire a superintendent from a much larger district unless he or she is super qualified and meet the profile standards that we are gathering with these meetings set by you and the board. These applicants from the larger districts usually don't fit in with the small town way of life," said Leslie.

"How many people apply?" asked a local business man. "We will have probably 40-50 applicants apply with 5-8% not being considered." "What about hiring former principals?" asked by local business man. "A principal would have to be exceptional before we would consider him. We look for the experienced applicants with a good track record," said Leslie.

Leslie indicated that they find out

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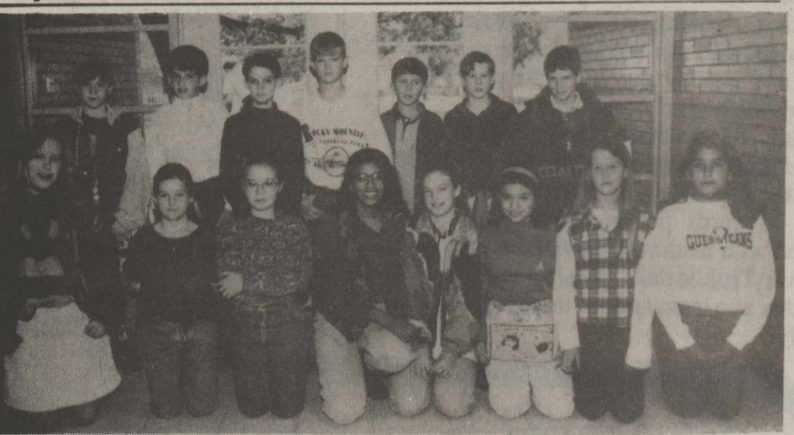

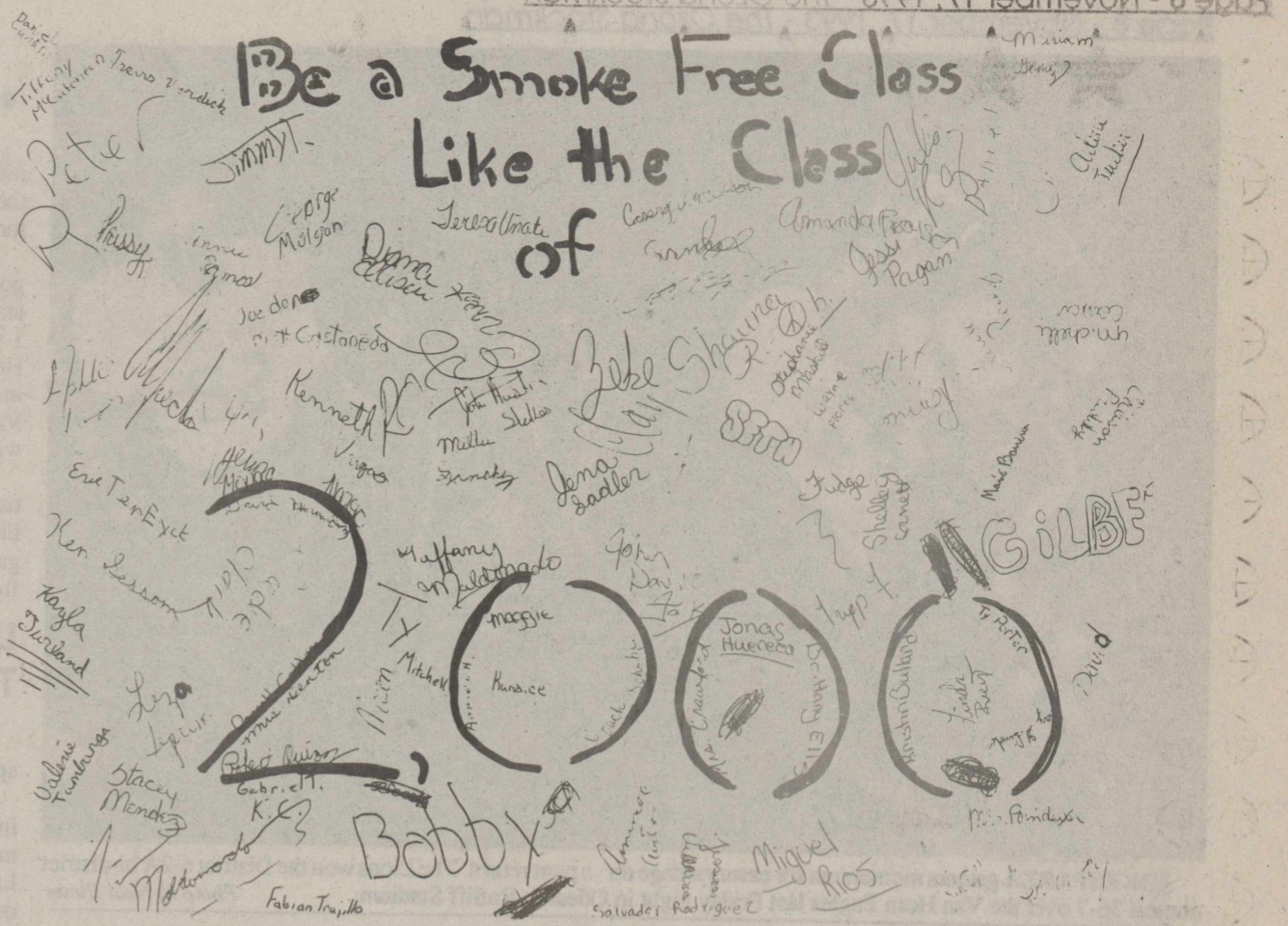

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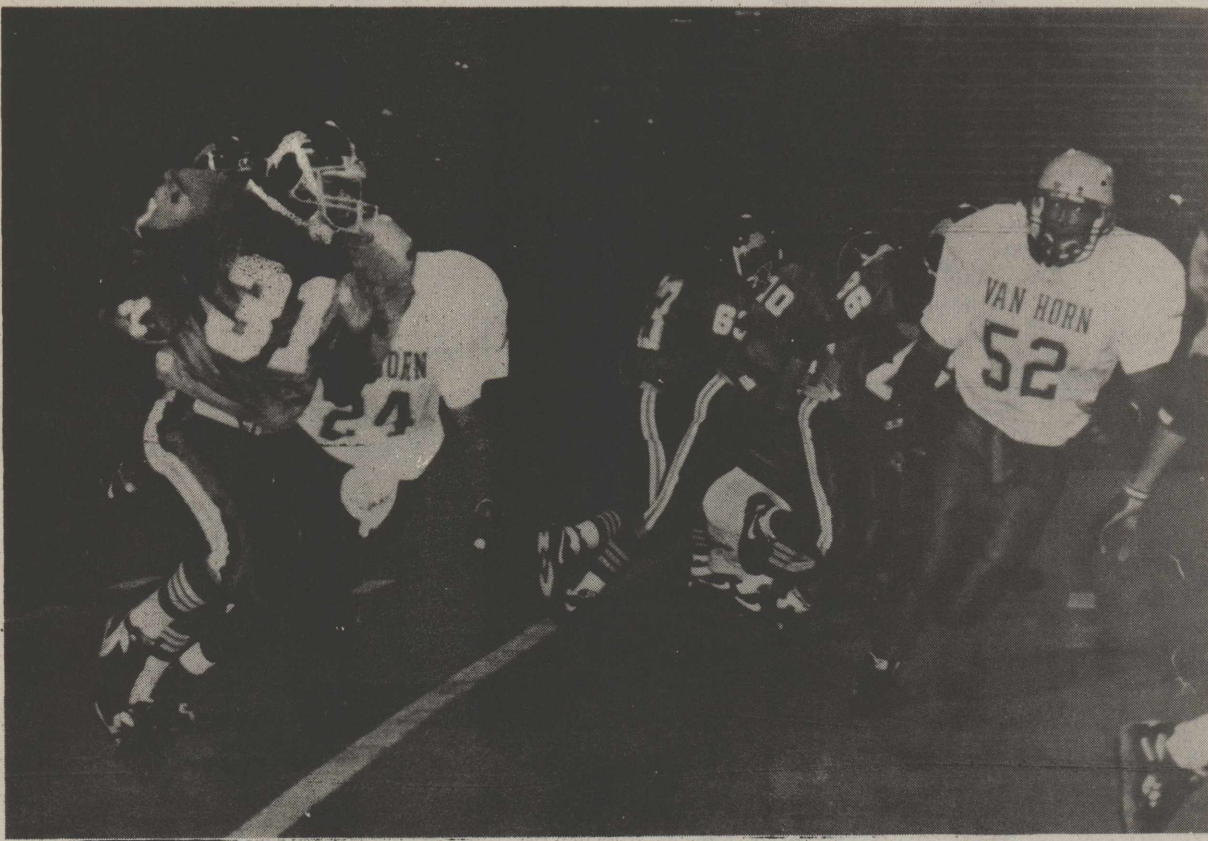

from the current information in the TWDB Ground Water Data Base. TWDB report 157 "A Survey of The Subsurface Saline Water of Texas" was used to determine the quality of water in the San Andres Limestone.

The primary source of ground water is the Edwards-Trinity (Plateau) aquifer. The majority of the wells in the vicinity are completed in the Edwards Limestone. The underlying "Trinity" sands are virtually undeveloped and present a potential for water. In 1967, it was reported that "generally the wells yield only small quantities of water, 1 to 20 gallons per minute, although yields of up to 2,000 gallons per minute have been reported in both aquifers. The water in the aquifer is from precipitation which falls upon the land surface and percolates downward to the water table. Although large quantities of ground water are available for development in Crockett County, the development of limestone aquifers such as the Edwards presents some special problems. Unlike most sand aquifers, the occurrence and movement of ground water in a limestone aquifer is dependent primarily upon secondary porosity, consisting of cracks, solution channels, and cavities in the limestone. Consequently, the yields of wells are likely to vary greatly even in short distances, depending upon the chance interception of large openings in the limestone by the well bore."

Based on the regional ground-water conditions and the quantity of water necessary for successful operation of the dairy farm the following opinions and recommendations are formed.

1. Sufficient quantities of ground water appear to exist. Well yields may be low which would require an innovative multi-well water supply program. Development of such a plan would require a localized study, to determine optimum well completion and utilization.

2. The production of 153 gallons per minute (gpm) should not have a noticeable impact on the irrigation wells in Block U. This is based on regional aquifer characteristics, the amount to be produced and the distance from the wells (over 3 miles).

3. The "Trinity Sands" should be tested if a pilot well is drilled. A local driller may be able to supply information if other wells have been completed and/or tested recently in this zone. The estimated depth to the base

of the Trinity is 590-630 feet. The top of the Trinity is estimated to occur at a depth of 500-525 feet. Estimates are determined from a land surface elevation of 2480 feet above mean sea level.

4. Concerns should include the potential for contamination from surface sources (i.e. high concentrations of waste or waste waters) that can reach the water table through sink holes, fractures, joints and other solution channels. Water-level declines may become significant during periods of extended drought, but should rebound rapidly during high rainfall events.

4. The San Andres limestone yields large quantities of salt water to oil wells in Crockett County. The freshest San Andres (in Crockett County) water listed in Report 157 contains

38,000 parts per million (ppm) total dissolved solids (tds). The average value being 43,000 with chlorides around 23,000 ppm. Due to the high salinity of this water it is not recommended for discharge at the surface.

All of the recommendations and opinions expressed are generalizations and based on regional data. To determine the water resources for the property in question a local ground water study should be conducted. Aquifer tests should be performed before the determination of well locations and completions.

A copy of the report has been sent to each of the local citizens that had reservations and questions about dairy water useage and its effect on the water table.

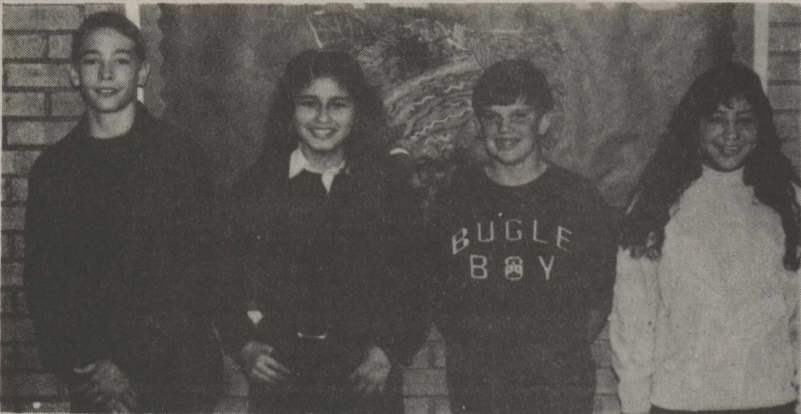

Primary & Intermediate Reading Program Progress Report Viewed At Regular Board Meeting on Nov. 10

During their regular school board meeting, which was held on Wednesday, Nov. 10, trustees heard a progress report from Dr. William Rupley, consultant from Texas A&M University, regarding reading program improvements at Ozona Primary School and Ozona Intermediate School.

Rupley, who has already completed twelve days of consulting with principals and teachers in the two schools, noted that since his first visit with Ozona Primary School teachers in the spring of last year, many positive activities to promote reading have taken place. Rupley said that the primary grade teachers have been allocated additional money with which to purchase library books for their own classrooms, and availability of these books serves to encourage student reading. In regard to specific grade levels, he said that the amount of classroom structure for three and four year old students has been reduced so that there is an increased focus on children's development of reading concepts, and in kindergarten, the teachers have begun to expand student writing opportunities in their classrooms.

In relation to his evaluation of the reading program at Ozona Intermediate School, Rupley said that his major attention has been directed to the development of a reading scope and sequence that will clearly define what should be taught at each grade level in kindergarten through grade five, and he has not yet had time to work with individual grades at the intermediate level; however, in his work with groups of teachers in the primary and intermediate grades, he observed several areas of concern that were included in the following recommendations:

"There is a severe lack of communication between the primary grade teachers and the intermediate grade teachers concerning the reading instructional program. More meetings involving all elementary teachers should be scheduled during the year to encourage interaction among the teachers about the reading program.

"There is an imbalance between the primary grades and intermediate grades related to students' mastery of learning that is assessed on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS). Intermediate level teachers feel as if most of the burden for students' acquisition of reading capabilities associated with the TAAS rests with them. A better balance between learning expectations for primary students and intermediate students needs to be established.

"There is no curriculum-based assessment program for reading that is

focused on the scope and sequence of teaching objectives that is being developed for the district. My major recommendation is that upon completion of this scope and sequence document, immediate attention be given to the development of a curriculum-based assessment testing program for grades kindergarten through fifth or sixth grade. A curriculum-based testing instrument would have a diagnostic feature that would allow teachers to determine students' reading strengths and weaknesses upon entry into a grade, and a summative feature that would allow teachers to determine end-of-year reading development for evaluating students' learning," Rupley said.

Following this report, the trustees approved a school budget amendment for a computer lab attendant to assist adult G.E.D.-E.S.L. classes offered by the district this year, and they approved members of the Ozona Textbook Committee for the 1993-94 school year. The members also voted to schedule their December regular meeting on Dec. 15 at 6:30 p.m.
