

Management Area concluded that weaning at 60 or 90 days of age had no adverse effect on future body weight or antler development at age 1 1/2. In fact says Nelle the yearling bucks weaned at 60 days had higher average weights and antler development than did the bucks that stayed with does

The other study, in South Texas orphaned 13 fawns from Oct. 15 through Nov. 8. These fawns were compared to 11 fawns that remained with does. There was no effect on body weight or antler growth on bucks a year later as yearlings. Half of the orphaned does actually bred as fawns indicating nutrition and body devel-

The practical application of this research is that ranchers can encourage hunters to harvest does heavily early in the hunting season. Hunters can be sure that harvesting does with fawns will not endanger the survival or health of the orphaned fawn. Har-

Today, the traditional day of counting blessings taken for granted throughout the year, we give our thanks for the blessings we enjoy as citizens of a free democracy.




