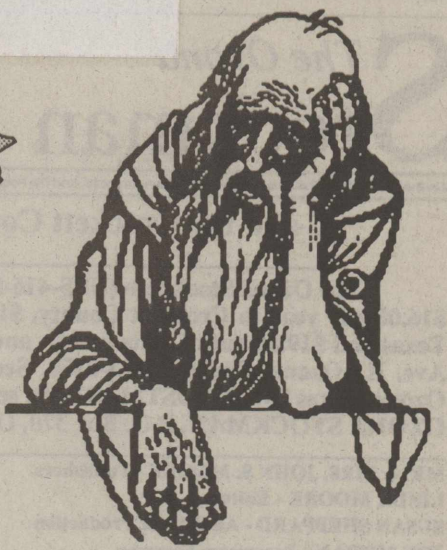
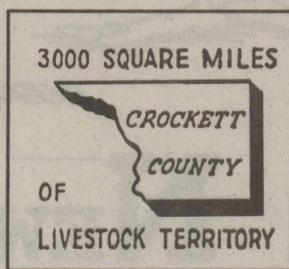
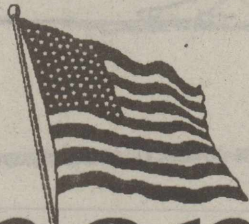

Livestock Show And Sale Jan. 6-8

The 47th Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be Jan. 6-8 at the county show barn. Some 83 4-H members will be exhibiting 200 market lambs, 16 pair of commercial ewe lambs, 15 Angora goats, 36 meat goats, 20 market swine and 98 rabbits.

A showmanship clinic will be held Wednesday, Jan. 5, at 7 p.m. for all market animals. All market lambs must be in the barn by 8 p.m. on Wednesday with shearing beginning at 8 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 6.

All rabbits need to be in the barn by 5 p.m. Thursday evening, with the rabbit show beginning at 5:30 p.m. Richard Fuchs of Big Spring will judge the rabbits and showmanship.

All ewe lambs, Angora and meat goats need to be in the barn by 8 p.m.

Thursday, Jan. 6. Ewe lambs will be weighed Friday morning starting at 8 a.m., and market swine will be weighed in the afternoon. Activities for the evening will begin at 5:30 p.m. with the commercial ewe lamb show, followed by the first-year feeder lamb show at 6 p.m., the meat goat show at 6:30 p.m., the Angora goat show at 7 p.m., and the market swine show at 7:45 p.m. Marvin Ensor, county Extension agent from Seminole, will judge the market and breeding animals and showmanship.

Saturday morning at 8 a.m., the market lamb show will begin with finewood classes, followed by crossbred classes.

A barbecue lunch will be served at noon featuring brisket with all the trimmings. Takeout plates will be

available.

The awards presentation follows the lunch at 1:30 p.m., with the premium sale beginning at 2.

The concession stand will be open Thursday and Friday evenings at 5 p.m. and Saturday morning at 7:30. Barbecue sandwiches will be served Thursday, and burritos will be served Friday evening along with the usual soft drinks and sweets.

Henderson Retires From ONB

New Year's Eve will have a special meaning for Sonny Henderson from this year forward. December 31 is the date of his retirement from Ozona National Bank.

Henderson began work at the bank on March 6, 1969. He has been employed at ONB since that time except for a period of some 16 months when he left the bank to attend ranching interests.

"I started by filing checks," Henderson said. "There were no account numbers then and we had to know customers' signatures." He became a teller, advanced to assistant cashier, assistant vice-president, vice-president and retired as executive vice-president.

Upon becoming a director of the bank in 1985, he assumed the status of senior lending officer.

The banking industry has changed considerably since 1969 due to regulatory requirements. "It's not as simple to make a loan as it used to be. It was a lot more fun to make those loans back then," Henderson said. "Now we have to have more documentation."

There were no calculators in the bank when he started, Henderson recalls. Record keeping was done by

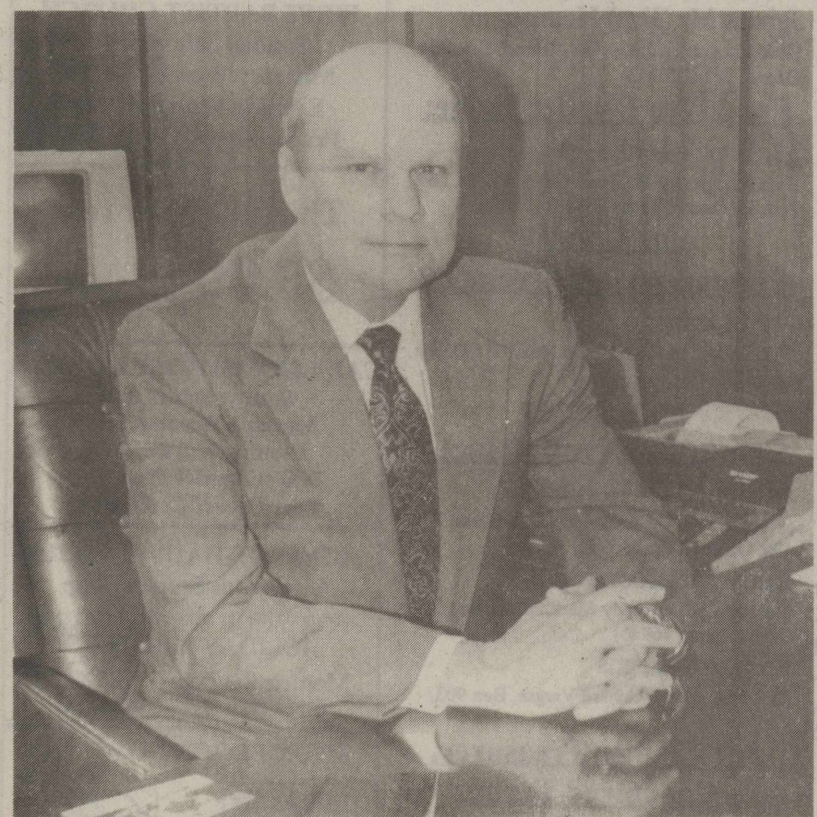
hand or with a posting machine. "That was a big day the day we had a calculator here."

Enlargement and complete remodeling of the bank during his years there are also remembered with pride.

Through the years, Henderson was a member of the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, Ozona Rotary Club, the school board and administrative board of Ozona Methodist Church. He served as president of the fire department and Rotary Club and was chairman of the church board for two terms.

Instead of being a parttime rancher and fulltime banker, Henderson plans to devote all his time to ranching after retirement. Ties with Ozona National Bank will not be severed, however. He remains on the board of directors.

Sonny and his wife, Glenda, now make their home at the ranch. Their children are Virginia Howell of El Paso, John L. Henderson III of Ozona and Ty McKinney who is an accountant with a Fort Worth television station. Grandchildren are triplets George Ross, John Stewart and Andrew Stephens Howell, William Thomas Howell, all of El Paso, and Jenna Leigh and Julia Leanne Henderson of Ozona.

Keep Your Holiday Safe Don't Wreck Your Life

December is Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention month.

Every year, the holiday season ends in tragedy for some, tragedy that is avoidable.

Last December, 90 people were killed on Texas roads in alcohol-related crashes. This year, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) wants that number to drop by at least 5 percent.

"Of course, we'd like to see that number be a zero," said Gary Trietsch, director of TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division. "But every year, people who don't normally drink are going to parties and drinking more alcohol than they're accustomed to. Unintentionally, they became impaired drivers—and that's when they endanger themselves and others."

The safety message for TxDOT's December campaign is, "Texans Don't Let Friends Drive Drunk." The message encourages others to be responsible for themselves and others.

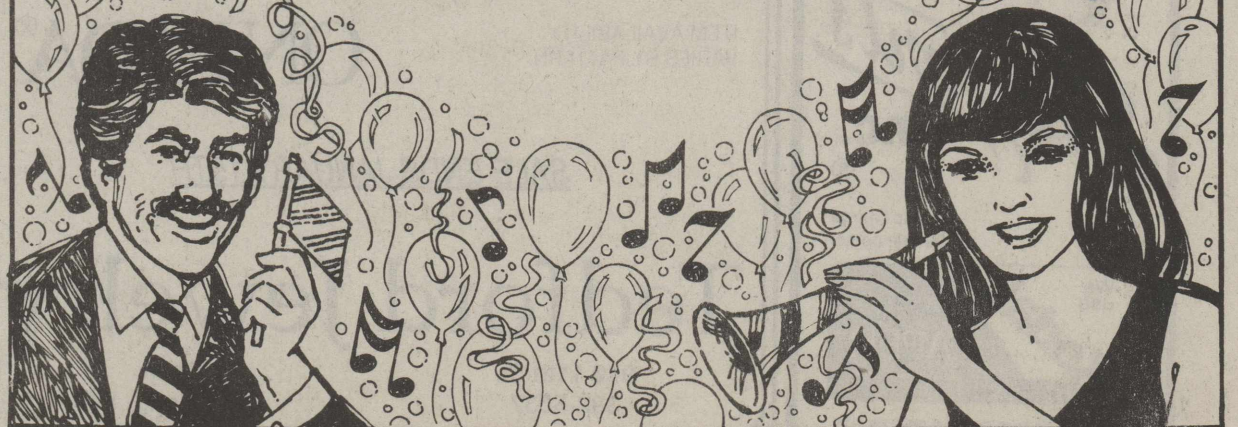

Family Community Education, formerly known as Extension Homemakers, is for the citizens of Crockett County as an opportunity for continued learning, Ulmer said. New Year's resolutions are an interesting testimony to the fact we recognize our need for change. Suppose for example you have an alcohol problem. You may resolve to stop drinking in the coming year. This is your New Year's resolution.

Now let's look at this New Year's resolution in the light of the Bible. The Bible does speak about change. But the Biblical requirement for change is

the call to repentance. "Repent therefore and return, that your sins may be wiped away" (Acts 3:19). Repentance involves changing your mind about certain activities and turning away from them. And notice the Bible speaks of repentance in terms of sin!

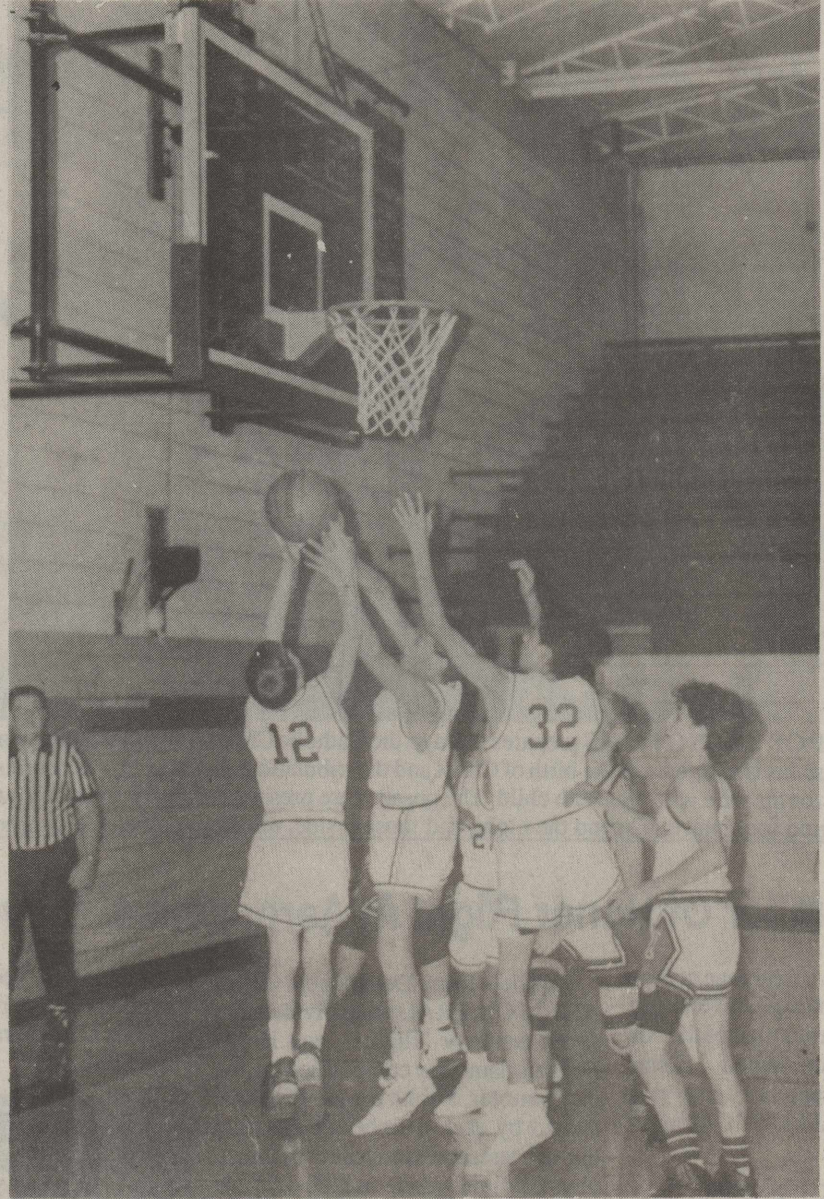

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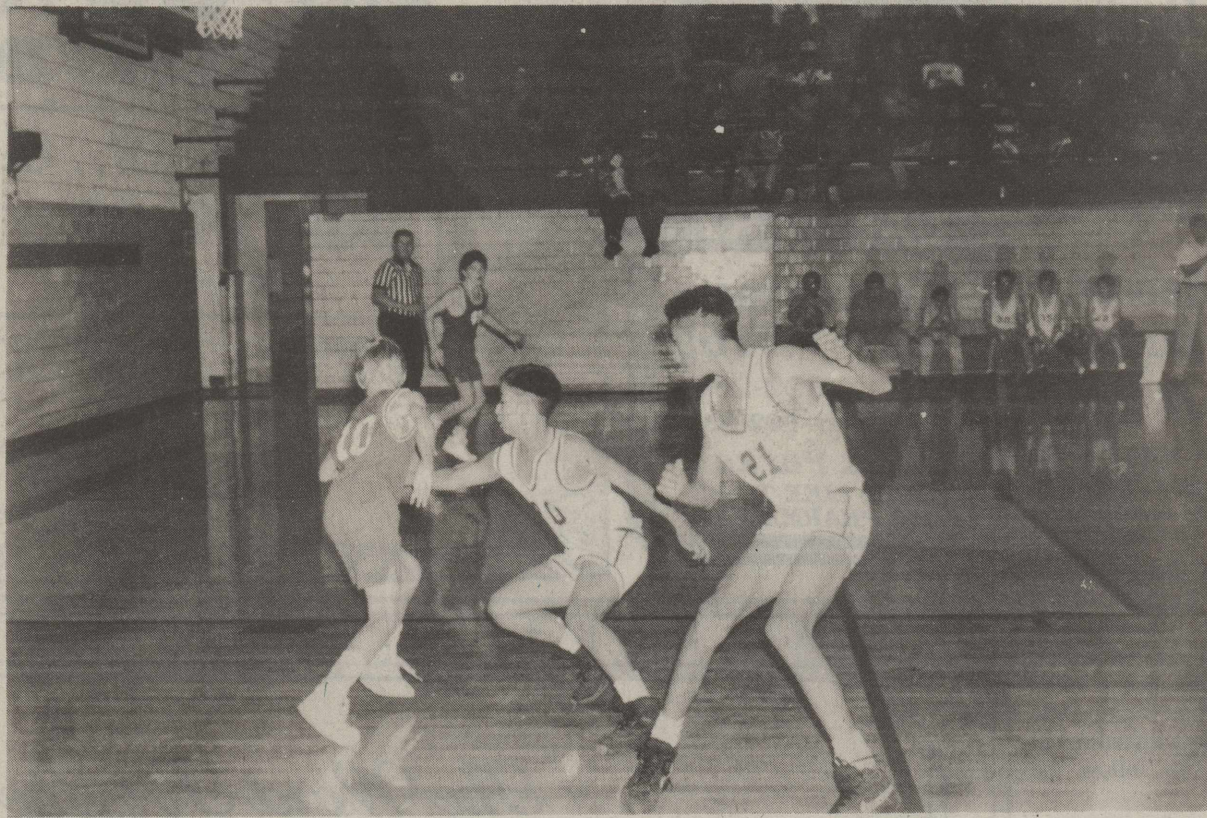

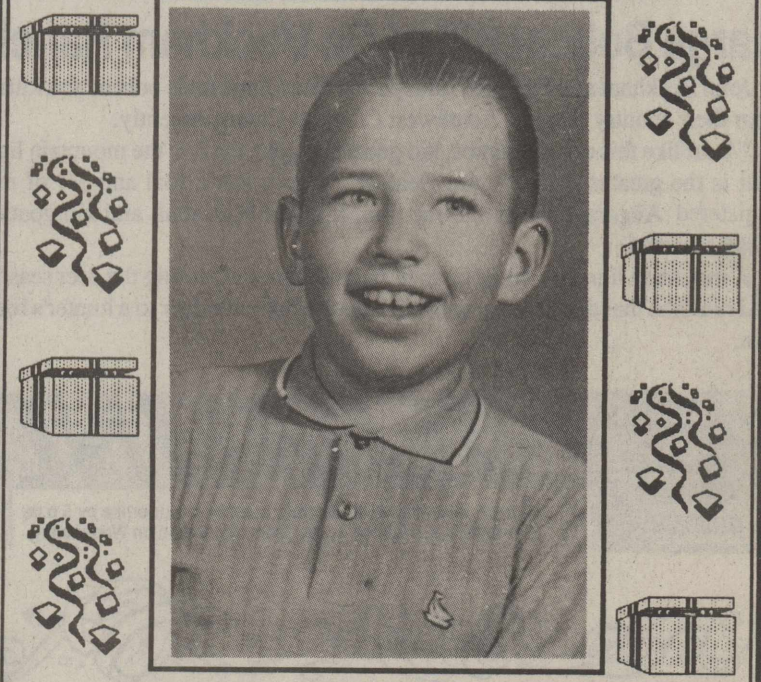

Basketball Fans Need To Know New Rules

When the action gets hot and fast on the basketball court, a lot of screaming and yelling from the bleachers comes from the fans who don't understand new rules, rule changes, or even old rules. In fact, rules for sports are re-evaluated each year for various reasons.

This year, eight major rule changes and seven editorial revisions were made by the National Federation of State High School Association's rules committee. Although you do not need to know all of the technical rule changes, you do need to know about some of the most important changes.

One rule that was changed involved the excessive swinging of arms or elbows, most often used to position for a rebound or to clear a position after gaining control of the ball. In the past the penalty was a violation and the ball went to the opposing team; however, the penalty has now been changed to a technical foul.

Next, there can be no player control foul during an interrupted dribble. What is an interrupted dribble? It occurs when the ball gets loose either after deflecting off the dribbler or the dribbler momentarily loses control. In addition, the three second count is not in effect during this time, and no timeout can be granted during an interrupted dribble.

Another change involves blocking out a player taking a free throw. A player occupying a marked lane spacer may move on release of the ball, but can't break the plane of the free throw line until the ball touches the basket's rim or the backboard, or until the free throw ends.

This rule is to keep defensive players from interfering with the free-throw shooter's ability to follow through on a shot—and in some cases, from intimidating the shooter physically.

Another change was the revision of the 6-foot coaching box rule. Instances of coaching box abuse began to increase, as coaches were standing in the box for purposes other than coaching—most often ending in a dispute with officials. Coaches may only stand for seven reasons:

- to confer with players and bench personnel during a charged time-out, or between quarters.
- to signal players to request a time-out.
- to confer at the scorer's table regarding a timing or scoring mistake, or alternating possession mistake.
- to confer at the table regarding a correctable mistake.
- to attend an injured player on the court when beckoned by the officials.
- to replace or remove a disqualified or injured player, or player directed to leave the game.
- to immediately react to an out-of-play.

If a coach receives a technical foul during the game, it results in the loss of coaching box privileges and the coach must stay seated on the bench for the rest of the game.

Another rule change is that a player who is bleeding or has an excessive amount of blood on his or her uniform must leave the game and receive proper treatment. He or she cannot return to game until the bleeding is stopped, an open wound is covered or an excessively bloody uniform is changed. The player may re-enter when a regular opportunity occurs during a dead ball.

A minor change allows the coach or team captain to decide which player will attempt a technical foul free throw. In the past, the team captain had this privilege.

One of the editorial revisions is

the definition of batting the ball. Batting the ball is intentionally striking it with the hand or hands. If an opponent bats the ball, it ends the dribble and the player may recover the ball and start a new dribble.

Another revision is the defining of a team foul. A team foul is any personal or technical foul which is changed to either team. All team fouls are counted to reach the bonus free throw.

Technical fouls can be called for administrative infractions—such as adding a name to the squad list in the books after the game begins—and now have a limit of one technical foul for bookkeeping type requirements at 10 minutes before the game and one thereafter. These infractions are to be penalized "when they occur".

A last important revision is when a substitute does not report to the scorekeeper and enters the game without being beckoned by the officials. In the past, a player was charged with two technical fouls, one for entering the game without reporting and another if the substitute was not beckoned in by an official. The new rule charges only one technical to the player.

Two of the most misunderstood rules are the ones regarding backcourt violations and the three-second count "in the lane" violation.

A backcourt violation occurs "when an offensive player touches the ball or is touched by the ball which is in team control" after the ball and players have been in their frontcourt. An offensive player dribbling the ball is still in his or her backcourt until all of the player's body and the ball is across the midcourt line. If a defensive player touches the ball and knocks it into the backcourt, and it is re-touched by an offensive player, there is no violation.

The three-second count has been misunderstood and misinterpreted by fans since it was added as a rule over 20 years ago. When a team is in control of the ball in its frontcourt, a player from that team can't stay in the lane over three seconds. The lane is bounded by the end line and the farther edge of the free throw line, and includes the lane lines.

To better understand this it is necessary to know when team control exists. Team control exists during player control, holding and dribbling inbounds, as well as during passes between teammates. It also lasts during an interrupted dribble.

However, the 3-second count does not begin during an interrupted dribble, and will also be ended during an interrupted dribble. Team control continues until the ball is in flight during a try for a goal, an opponent secures control, or the ball becomes dead.

Team control does not exist during a rebound, when the ball is loose following a shot, or during a throw-in. The three-second restriction is not in effect when there is no team control, and is terminated the instant team control ends.

Hopefully, by becoming familiar

Sales Tax Report Shows Gain

Crockett County showed a 10.4% increase over the previous year in retail sales for the second quarter of 1993 and a 20% gain for all industries according to a recent report from the State Comptroller's Office.

In the second quarter of 1993, the county had 73 reporting outlets compared to 72 in 1992. The 1993 gross sales for the period were \$5,857,912 compared to \$5,306,384 in 1992.

For all industries, there were 112 reporting outlets in 1993 compared to 115 in 1992. 1993 gross sales for the quarter were \$9,256,237 compared to \$7,712,257 the previous year.

Second quarter retail sales for area counties include: Crane - 63 reporting outlets with \$5,798,366 gross sales, up 10.3%; Reagan - 51 outlets, \$4,390,805 gross sales, down 41%; Schleicher - 34 outlets, \$1,753,881 gross sales, up 4.1%; Sutton - 73 outlets, \$4,962,311, up 0.1%; Terrell - 27 outlets, \$838,652, down 20.6%; Tom Green - 1,336 outlets, \$205,143,419, up 13.8%; Upton - 68 outlets, \$3,365,850, up 5.6%; Val Verde - 485 outlets, \$62,253,139, up 8.9%.

Have Another Slice Of Pumpkin Pie

Pumpkin pie contains fewer calories and less fat per slice than other holiday pies. The frozen version contains seven grams of fat and 206 calories per slice while frozen pecan pie has 23 grams of fat and 510 calories per slice. One piece of homemade pumpkin pie, however, has 16 grams of fat per slice. Pumpkin pie also gets an A+ for its vitamin content. A single piece of homemade pumpkin pie has 3,700 International Units of vitamin A. One slice of frozen pumpkin pie contains 2,000 IU. The recommended daily allowance for vitamin A is 5,000 IU. A piece of pumpkin pie also has one gram of fiber.

If you want to lower the fat and calorie count of your pumpkin dessert even further, eat it as a custard, says Jo Ann Carson, director of the clinical nutrition program at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

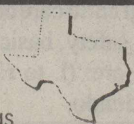
Another good source of vitamin A is the sweet potato, and sweet potato pie is nearly identical to pumpkin pie in its vitamin A, calorie and fat content, Carson says.

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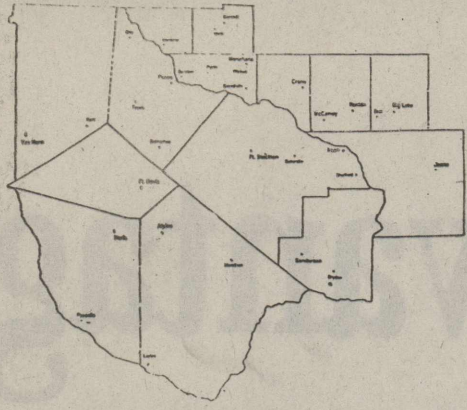

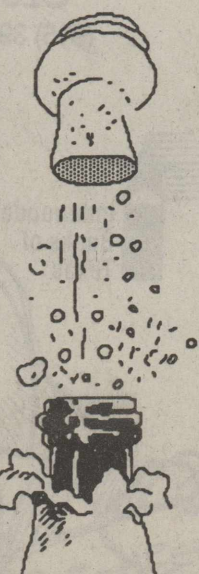

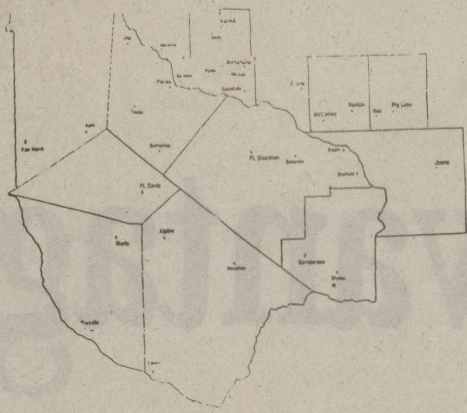
