Commissioners voted to designate a site behind the cemetery as the location for the leaves and limbs. The location is not open to the public. For those who want to haul their own leaves and limbs, the county site on 14th Street still accepts this type mate-

Inocente Castro was the successful bidder to lease the county's Ingham Trap property. A motion to reject the two bids received failed, and a second motion, to accept Castro's \$800 bid, passed with Commissioners Frank Tambunga and Rudy Martinez and Judge Kathryn Mayfield voting for and Commissioners Fred Deaton and Freddie Nicks voting against.

The hesitancy to accept the bids stemmed from the fact that a dumpground on the property is not fenced off from the pasturage. Neither the dumpground or the shooting range are included in the area to be leased.

Fire Chief Bob Falkner appeared before the court with an end of year report and a request to purchase six new radios. The new radios, used to signal firemen at their homes, will replace six that were purchased in 1972 and are currently not working. The court approved the expenditure of \$2,650 of interest money from certificates of obligation for the radios.

Court members voted to approve purchase of a vehicle for the Sheriff's Department through the state purchasing contract. This is the same vehicle that was previously budgeted and approved.

A set of rules for use of county property including parks, fairgrounds and rodeo arena was reviewed and approved. The information will be published in a separate story.

Mrs. Schwertner reported that there were 125 emergency room cases in December compared to 71 in November. Of the 125, 15 were transfers.

The possibility that advanced cardiac life support training and certification will be required for all licensed LVNs and RNs will be required in the future was mentioned by Mrs. Schwertner. Using grant money for this education is being looked into.

Administrator Gerry Phillips gave board members a list of tests that will be run on the new Cobas Mira lab equipment beginning Jan. 10. Completing the tests here is expected to save money for the hospital and speed

During his financial report, Mr. Phillips stated that the combined county funds transferred to the hospital and care center for 1993 was \$1,061,458. This included health care benefits for the first three months of 1994 amounting to \$71,272. The facilities were \$165,839 over budget at the year end. His figures showed that the amount over budget had decreased from \$299,381 over budget in 1992.

The new workman's comp rates for the hospital and care center are expected to decrease these costs markedly in 1994. However, if the county is required to carry the doctors as employees, an additional \$20,000 to \$40,000 could result from that change, Phillips estimated. An IRS revenue ruling may require the county to consider the doctors as employees.

The most calls occurred on Thursdays and Saturdays with 23 each. Mondays and Fridays accounted for 20 each with 21 on Tuesdays, 19 on Wednesdays and 13 on Sundays.





Getting Rid Of Winter Skin

It's one of the facts of winter life: dry, scaly, itchy skin that doesn't seem to get better, no matter how much moisturizer you use. The solution to the problem isn't more moisturizer, it's using the right one properly.

"Moisturizers don't work right if you just slather them on," says Dr. Amit Pandya, assistant professor of dermatology at The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas. "For best results, use them right after a shower while the skin is still moist."

To prevent dry winter skin, Pandya recommends shorter showers with lukewarm water and a pH-neutral soap as well as a moisturizer. Pat your skin dry, then put on the moisturizer. And the thicker the moisturizer, the better, Pandya says. If you experience a lot of itching or a rash, or if the skin on your hands and feet cracks, splits or becomes infected due to scratching, see your doctor.

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




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Successful Area 4-H Horse Show Is Open To All

A horse show program born three encouraging young people to get involved showing horses at the county and district level has worked.

The program was geared where it would provide a place for all ages to ride and compete, and to offer a horse activity for the 4-H youngster who had never even seen a horse show, all the way up to the experienced AJRA barrel racer.

As a matter of fact it worked so well that after the first year the Tri-Countys (Ward, Winkler and Reeves), opened the shows to any 4-H or Cloverbud member from anywhere after other interested parents began asking if their children could bring their horses to the shows. Originally the shows were only for 4-H'ers in the three counties.

Parents and county agents in the "founding" counties had become concerned as participation at the District Horse Show continued to drop off- finally one year to less than 20 contestants.

Particularly since the District VI show once attracted upwards to 200 or more equestrian contestants year-after-year.

In the tri-county program, awards are presented to the top six places in each of the five divisions at all of the shows and then at the awards banquet following the series, all-around highpoint winners are recognized.

While the shows follow 4-Hregulations-one of the rules has intentionally been disregarded.

Exhibitors do not have to own their own horse. In fact, the 4-H leaders encourage the youngsters to "beg, borrow or 'steal' a horse to use at the shows.

And 4-H has got to be one of the most economical activities a youngster can belong to-since there are no fees to be a member. Any youngster age 9 to 19, enrolled in school, is eligible to be a member. Cloverbuds are for those kiddos under 9 years of age. Enrollment forms are always available at the shows for new mem-

Divisions are broken down into Pee Wee (age 8 and under); Sub-Junior (9-10); Juniors (11-13); and Seniors (ages 14-19). (Ages are as of January 1st).

And a Novice division is offered years ago with the express intent of in all the judged events for youngsters who have never had the opportunity to show a horse before. All ages compete together in the novice events.

To be eligible for a year-end award, contestants must show in at least four of the shows, and enter at least three classes in either the judged events, timed events, or both.

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
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


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


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
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
