



The 1994 4-H Livestock Show is not the first time hogs have been shown in Crockett County according to a former student and a parent of 4-H'ers who raised the animals.

As Wade Beasley remembers, the 4-H swine program ended his senior year and County Agent Billy Reager swore then that hogs would never be shown here again. Sounds like there might be an interesting story there somewhere.

We're glad swine production has been added to the 4-H program. From personal experience we can vouch that raising hogs in a youth program is interesting, fun, hard, exasperating, scary, challenging and rewarding.

Anyway, sorry we didn't know the program had been in Ozona before and apologies to all you previous hardworking swine producers and parents.

Towns north, east and west of Ozona are lobbying for the proposed extension of I-27 from Lubbock to I-10 to come through their communities. A \$2.7 million study approved by the Texas Department of Transportation will decide the best way the highway should take on into Mexico. The engineering firm doing the study proposes that a preferred highway corridor be identified by Aug. 31, 1994, and that the preferred highway route be determined by Aug. 31, 1995.

Chambers of commerce in Junction and Menard are going to meet this week with other interested towns regarding a coalition to try to get the extension to route from San Angelo through Eden, Menard and Junction. San Angelo is working to have the highway extension through there.

Midland and Odessa have been joined by Fort Stockton in an attempt to pull the route that way. Community leaders along the border have been asked to join the Midland-Odessa alliance, and a meeting is planned for Wednesday in Alpine.

Crane is also working to have the highway its direction. A Lamesa, Stanton, Big Lake, Ozona route sounds good, too. A connection with I-27 here or west of Ozona could benefit the area greatly. An eastern connection will not.

Ozona Chamber of Commerce members talked about the extension at their meeting Monday night. Commissioners need to add the item to a future agenda, too, without much delay.

Golf Teams Resume Practice On Local Course

During the Crockett County Consolidated Common Independent School District's regular scheduled board of trustees meeting held Wednesday night, interim superintendent Ted Cotton announced that he had made an administrative decision to allow the high school golf teams to resume its practice sessions at the Ozona Country Club.

"Superintendent Payne, several months ago, administratively made a decision to not allow golf students to use the Ozona Country Club facilities until legal council could render an opinion," Cotton said. Payne's decision was a result of Section 21.9205 of the education code passed by the 73rd Legislature in regular session in 1993 which barred public school children from using the facilities of discriminatory athletic clubs. The code was in part engineered by local Crockett County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos. Cotton presented to the board a copy of a letter written by Rep. Libby Linebarger, chairman of the Committee on Public Education, to Dan Morales, Attorney General of the State of Texas, asking for his opinion regarding Sec. 21.9205 of the education code. The letter reads as follows:

Dear General Morales:

Section 21.9205, Education Code, added by Chapter 191, Acts of the 73rd Legislature, Regular Session, 1993, provides:

Sec. 21.9205. EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES; USE OF DISCRIMINATORY ATHLETIC CLUB.

Time To File For 1993 Incentives

Ranchers are urged to go by the ASCS office and file for their 1993 wool, mohair and unshorn lamb incentive. Producers are encouraged to file by Jan. 31, 1993. Late filed documents can no longer be accepted by the County ASCS Office.

Monday was the first official day on the job for new Crockett County DPS sergeant Pete Lozano. This is Sgt. Lozano's first time as an adult to live in a small town, and he is enthusiastic about the prospects.

not hearing the roar of traffic is a pleasure. The town's turkey flock and deer have also joined the citizens in making him welcome.

As a child, Lozano lived on a farm near Big Foot, TX, then the family farmed in Colorado for a short time before moving to San Antonio. He spent eight and one-half years in the U. S. Army including a tour of duty in El Paso and a three year stint in Italy.

Sgt. Lozano and his wife, Ludi, are the parents of a 13-year-old daughter, Analisa. At present, Mrs. Lozano and Analisa remain in San Antonio. Mrs. Lozano is a district sales manager for Avon products.

The family will join him in Ozona on spring break and some weekends, Lozano said. The entire family has been impressed with the friendliness of Ozona. Sgt. Lozano was also enthusiastic about the facts that bicycles could be left in racks at school and not disappear and that cars can be parked and left unlocked.

He subscribes to the theory that one should shop at home and plans to do as much as possible in Ozona. City conveniences such as late shopping are something he can forego in return for the advantages Ozona offers according to Sgt. Lozano.

CLUB. (a) An extracurricular activity sponsored or sanctioned by a school district, including an athletic event or an athletic team practice, may not take place at an athletic club located in the United States that denies any person full and equal enjoyment of equipment or facilities provided by the athletic club because of the race, color, religion, creed, national origin, or sex of the person.

(b) In this section, "athletic club" means an entity that provides sports or exercise equipment or facilities to its customers or members or to the guests of its customers or members.

As chairman of the House Committee on Public Education, I request the opinion of your office in regard to the following questions concerning the application of Section 21.9205, Education Code:

(1) Who has the obligation to determine whether an athletic club used for school district sponsored extracurricular activities denies the use of its facilities to a person because of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, or sex of the person?

(2) What standard should the entity that has the obligation to make the determination use to determine whether an athletic club denies the use of its facilities to a person because of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, or sex of the person?

(3) If a school district has received or is aware of an allegation that a particular athletic club denies the use of its facilities to a person because of the race, color, religion, creed, national origin, or sex of the person, what steps, if any, must the district take to comply with the statute?

Many school districts use facilities provided by private athletic clubs. It would be helpful to these districts to receive your answer as soon as possible so that appropriate arrangements may be made for the spring athletic season.

Thank you for your assistance in this matter.

Comments Sought On Park Operation

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is requesting public comment on a decision to renew a contract with Texas Rural Communities Inc. to continue operation of five state parks.

Essentially, the department is exercising an annual option to renew its five-year agreement with TRC, which runs through 1998.

TRC, a nonprofit organization, began managing the five parks last spring after the department announced the parks faced severe budget cuts. The parks are Fort Lancaster in Crockett County, Eisenhower Birthplace in Denison, Fort McKavett in southwest Menard County, Starr Family Mounds in Marshall and Caddoan Mounds near Alto.

"The public lands division is pleased to extend our management agreement with Texas Rural Communities," said Ron Holliday, TPWD public lands director. "This partnership has allowed the department to provide continued public access to these sites while realizing substantial

an administrative decision to allow golf participants to resume use of these facilities until such time that the attorney general issues an opinion or guidelines for school districts covering this code," stated Superintendent Cotton.

Cotton further stated that, "If the board so approves, I plan to write three letters. The first one to Orlando De-

Hoyos, one to Rep. Gallegos and the third letter to Rep. Linebarger, stating my intentions, which is in line according to our legal council." The local golf teams resumed practice at Ozona Country Club Thursday morning.

May Lay, the district's bookkeeper, gave her report on monies owed to the state and informed the board that in addition to the \$1,241,802 paid to the state, in conjunction with Senate Bill #7, an additional \$119,240 was owed.

In other business the school district's attorney in the re-districting suit recommended paying Mr. Rios and Mr. Orlando DeHoyos \$5,400 to settle the suit against the school. Board member David Bean said "I would say we would be better off, as bad as I hate to agree, to the \$5,400 and be done with it." The board unanimously approved settling the single member



Children Have Rights Too!

The Psalmist said, "Children are a heritage of the Lord," Psalm 127:3. We live in a world where so many children fail to get what they have rights to. When we begin to consider what dependent children have a right to, we think of food, clothing, shelter, education, medical care, etc. These things are all vital to the welfare of a dependent child. However, some other extremely vital things are often overlooked:

1. Children have a right to friendship and companionship of their parents. In a fast moving, busy society, these rights are often denied children. We don't intend to let them grow up under our roof and not hardly know us, we were just so busy doing good things, we didn't notice until it was too late that we lived in two different worlds. Don't dare deny them the right of your very close friendship.
2. Children also have a right to discipline. God's Word recognizes how important loving discipline is for the welfare of our children. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it," Prov. 22:6. Also, "The rod of correction giveth wisdom, but a child left to himself bringeth his mother shame," Prov. 29:15. If they are not disciplined at home while young, when they leave home they will not accept discipline at school or in society. A forfeit of their rights to discipline helps make them ill-fit for life as an adult.
3. Children have a right to spiritual training at home. Millions are denied this right. Their empty, restless lives though they may have all the material things one would ever need, yet something is missing. The spirit of man can only be complete when he has a personal relationship with the One who breathed into man when He created him. Paul said, "Fathers provoke not your children to wrath, but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," Eph. 6:4. Don't deny your child that right to know God, whom to know is peace.

Constructed in 1540, the church is still an active religious center for the Mayan Indians. While there they went to the wonderful market and here they could barter for colorful blankets, jewelry and leather goods.

Georgia reported that she enjoyed the trip very much. A good group of travelers from all over, she was the only one from Texas. And visiting with daughter, Barbara, made this a wonderful holiday.

district suit brought against Ozona Schools by Orlando DeHoyos and his attorney Rios for \$5,400.

The board agreed to amend the school budget by \$20,000 to take care of extra legal fees incurred from the Sturgeon and DeHoyos disputes. "Right now we are over \$8,950 on our budget for legal fees, but this didn't include all of these other fees that have just come in," said bookkeeper May Lay.

"Right now the initial expenditures in legal fees for DeHoyos in the redistricting and golf course issues have totaled \$43,976 which did not include the redistricting settlement to DeHoyos and Rios for \$5,400," said superintendent Cotton.

"Right now what you actually need is an additional \$20,000 for these fees?" asked David Bean.

Cotton explained, "With the legal fees of \$7,554 for the school equity funding bill #7, the Sturgeon litigation legal fee of \$984.81, DeHoyos' single member district suit settlement of \$5,400 an additional \$20,000 above the above the budget would probably cover it."

After paying the bills and unanimously approving Ted Cotton as interim superintendent of schools, the board heard comments from several primary and intermediate teachers which included chapter reading teacher at primary school Rose Whitehurst, Tommie Flores, Ellen Lipsey, Connie Fowler, Darla Jones, Charlotte Laughlin, Terra Laughlin, primary principal Walter Spiller and intermediate principal Manley Holmes regarding Dr. William Rupley's reading assessment proposal for Ozona Schools.

Dr. Rupley who has been working with primary and intermediate teachers on the reading assessment testing has been drawing a daily fee of \$550 for his services. "We were under the assumption the Doctor would be working on this assessment himself, but as it is, we, the teachers, have done all of the work ourselves during regular class hours," said Rose Whitehurst. "We feel that the assessment plan should be geared toward our Ozona children, and not assessing our kids with the whole state. Our kids are unique and are not like other kids around other parts of the state," Whitehurst said.

One teacher asked board members if Rupley's fee was negotiable and the board all concurred that the fee was set. Another intermediate teacher, Darla Jones, stated, "It isn't so much the cost, but who has been doing the work." Teachers have been working on the assessment test during regular classroom time, requiring the hiring of substitute teachers to conduct their classes.

Board president Gary Buck Mitchell responded that "The board as a whole feels that the assessment program needs to be implemented as fast as possible, but we also need to make sure it is engineered to suit our needs."

The board decided to call Dr. Rupley in a conference call and discuss teacher's concerns and his plan for Crockett County Schools. Principal Manley Holmes recommended that teachers be paid during the summer to work on the assessment instrument. He stated that the teachers have done an outstanding job with their work on the plan and are proud of it. Most of their questions have been on how much money Rupley is earning.

Pete Maldonado, bus maintenance supervisor, requested that cellular phones be installed in the buses. The

request came after one lady bus driver hit a deer early one morning several miles from town. "She was really upset and frightened, because she had no means of communication out there by herself," said Maldonado. The board voted and approved the acquisition of nine cellular phones for the school buses.

Middle school principal Tom Humber gave a report on recent key entry thefts of the computer room at middle school where several pieces of computer equipment and supplies were stolen on two different occasions. One board member asked if all the teachers had key access to the computer room. Humber stated, "No, they only have key access to the building, his or her classroom and to the office." Several thefts occurred last year.

In the next order of business maintenance supervisor Curtis Keith reported on several items including the contract dispute between the school system and Sturgeon Company with the new building project at primary school.

"We come up with Medford's suggestion: based upon the facts as they exist, my suggestion will be to write a letter to Sturgeon's attorney and make the demand for arbitration under the terms of the contract. If Sturgeon refuses to arbitrate we then now have the right to file application for arbitration in District Court in Crockett County," said Keith. Medford is the school's attorney in the dispute.

"Arbitration would be to our best advantage rather than going to the courthouse with it. With arbitration you have trained personnel. We pick someone, a building, engineer etc. Sturgeon picks someone and the state arbitration board picks one as a third party. If you go to the courthouse with it the jury will probably decide on what they think is fair rather than what

our contractual agreement was with Sturgeon," said Keith.

Board member David Bean asked Keith, "Who is supposed to pay the arbitration bill?" and Keith responded that he really couldn't answer that question. "I bet we will have to split it," Keith said.

Keith also reported that the school needs additional trunk telephone lines to relieve the traffic use of the lines. As it stands you can hardly get an outside line out of the system," stated Keith. "I argued up and down with the telephone company that six lines were not enough when they installed the system and sure enough, it wasn't," said Keith.

Board member Wade Richardson said it was a waste of manpower and teacher time to have to set around waiting on an outside phone line. Intermediate school principal Holmes stated, "If we had a bad accident and couldn't get an outside line we would just have to load them up ourselves and carry them to the hospital." The board unanimously approved three additional trunk lines to the existing six.

In other maintenance business the board decided to wait until a later date to replace the boards in the grandstands at the football field. After receiving estimates it was found that replacing the boards with aluminum would cost approximately \$52,000.

Keith said, "I guess we can replace those boards that are bad, and it will cost a lot of money to do so." He further stated, "we have already replaced about a third of them anyway. The cost of the boards is rising everyday plus they are getting hard to find." Keith said.

Keith reported to the board that 36 applications have been received for the maintenance supervisor's job. The three top applications were reviewed Tuesday at a called noon meeting.

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
