## Crownover Begins Another Siberian Oil Field Working Tour

Siberia is the world's worst place, right? Taint so according to Ozona's Ralph Crownover who is in his third year of working in Russia. As project manager for Gloucester Ventures Company, Ltd., Crownover has responsibility for an oil field operation which employs 50 Russians and 40 non-Russians. Gloucester is one of many foreign companies in Russia to repair oil wells.

Crownover estimates that 40 to 50 percent of the country's wells are down due to lack of parts such as pumps, rods and tubing which Russia does not have.

Once the world's largest oil exporter, Russia now uses the major part of what it produces. "These are the best oil fields in the world," said Crownover. "They haven't even touched the surface of what they've got over there, and they're still the world's largest oil producer. The Middle East is way behind them."

Gloucester bought Russian rigs and two big western rigs for their operation. The western equipment was rebuilt by Gregory Rig Service in Odessa in preparation for the trip to the cold country.

Crownover, who works 28 days on and 28 days off, explained that temperatures were 40 below for 20 days out of the last six weeks at his work site. Special equipment warms the rig structure and cable to keep the metal from breaking.

If Siberian winters have their problems, summer is worse in his line of work, Crownover said. The country is made up of tundra which becomes swamp once it thaws. Mosquitos, flies and the sand used to build drilling locations make life miserable three months of the year.

Large amounts of sand are used for the drilling pads which may have from 15 to 30 directional drilled wells. The rigs are all on rails and so closely spaced that workover units have to "wobble" into the spot where they are needed. At times, adjacent wells have to be shut off so the work can be done.

Living conditions are good, Crownover said. "We built our own Arctic quarters," and food, which is flown in, is prepared by hired cooks.

The living facility has its own water treatment plant.

Medical attention is provided by medics out of Canada. A worldwide group out of Geneva, Switzerland, S.O.S., provided help for one of Crownover's men who needed care elsewhere.

"We called Moscow, a plane came from Helsinki, and 9 1/2 hours later he was in Helsinki for surgery," Crownover said.

Sunrises and sunsets in Siberia are the most beautiful in the world, Crownover said, "and the Russian people are very generous. They would give you the shirt off their back."

Ralph's first trip to Russia coincided with the beginning of the Iraq war. His wife, Glenda, had a son stationed at Homestead A.F.B. in Florida at the time, and she spend many hours worrying about Ralph's safety and also the possibility her son would be among the troops sent to Saudi.

"Things were a little tight the first time we went in," Crownover said, he was also there just before and after the coup, but at no time has he been restricted in his activities or the things he photographs.

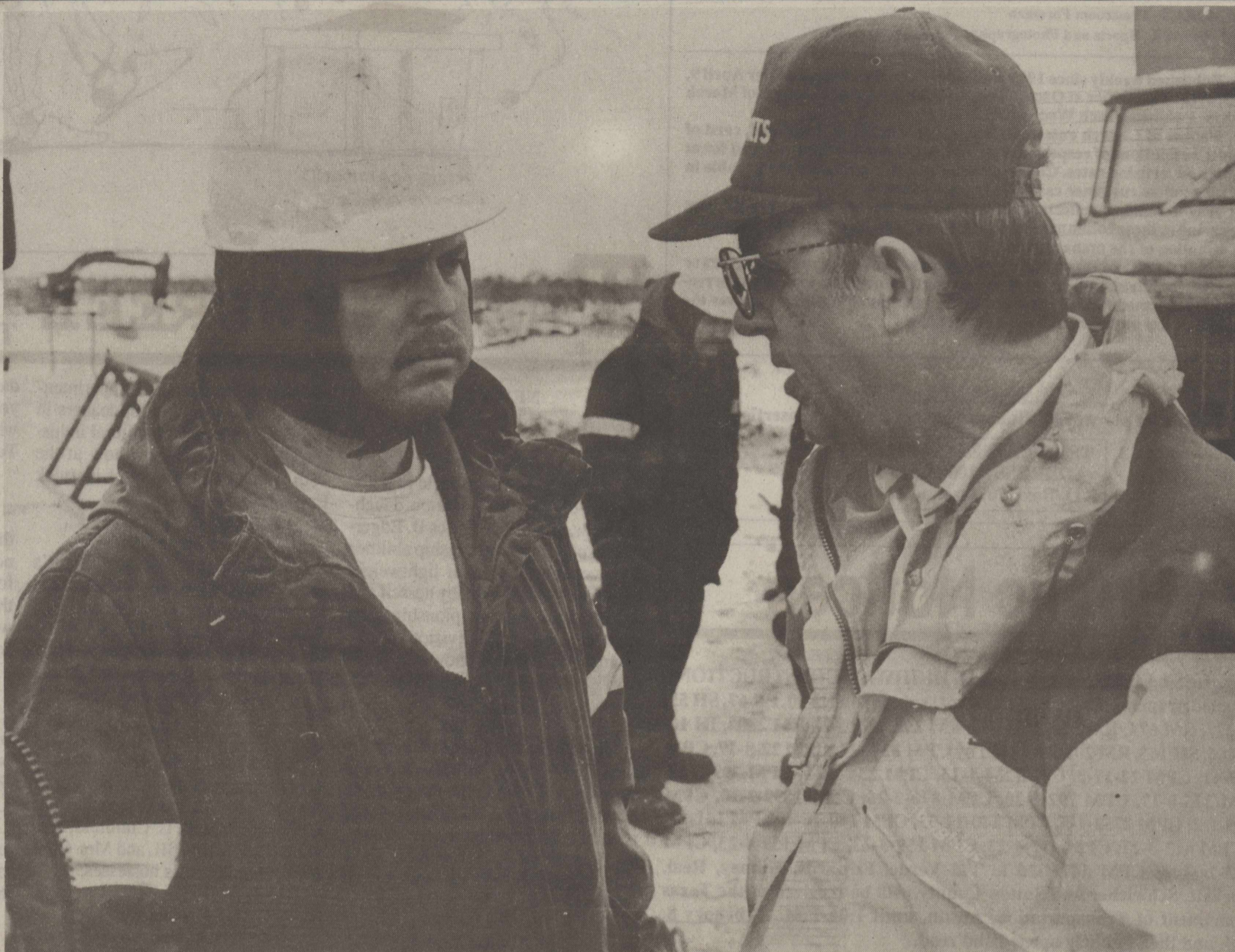
"We've never had a problem, even with the hardliners. What goes on in Moscow we never see out there (in the field)."

Many nationalities live and work in Siberia, and there are more than 2,000 different dialects spoken in Russia alone. Interpreters make the work possible.

"I know what they're talking about, but I can't converse. I've done a lot of graphics in the sand and snow."

"This is going to be the last oil boom, I think. I don't know where they'll find another one that they haven't found already." At present there are a few joint drilling ventures in Siberia, and Gloucester expects to start one in a year or so. For now, "we're just repairing their wells."

Last Thursday Ralph Crownover left on the first leg of the 11-hour return flight to Russia. His next commute home will only take four hours, however. Glenda accompanied him as far as Nicosia, Cyprus, where they plan to make their home for a year.

## Odessa Firm Successful Bidder For Ozona Trash

Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 directors accepted the bid of Waste Management of Odessa for trash removal when they met last week. There were four companies bidding, including Pack Rat of Andrews, Trashaway of San Angelo and BFI, a national company with an Abilene office.

Contracts are being prepared now according to Doug Meador of the water district. Waste Management will begin operating here April 1.

The new company will provide its own dumpsters and the rollout trash receptacles will also still be in use according to Meador. A convenience station for disposal of large appliances and other oversized items will also be part of the system. According to Meador, the receiving station will have an attendant.

Rates and regulations will be published at a later date, Meador said.

## Judge Paul McCollum Seeks Court Of Appeals Seat

Governor Ann Richards' office has announced the appointment of long time Odessa attorney and judge, Paul McCollum, to fulfill a vacancy in the 8th Court of appeals in El Paso. Judge McCollum is a graduate of Odessa High School and Baylor University. He served as County Judge of Ector County from 1953 to 1955 and as District Judge of the 70th District Court from 1955 to 1960, at which time, he resigned from the bench and joined the firm of Shafer, Davis, McCollum, Ashley, O'Leary & Stoker. He has been with this firm since that time.

The Judge was born in Comanche, Texas. While in infancy he moved with his family to Texon where his father was employed as a dentist by the Big Lake Oil Company. He attended elementary school in Texon and Reagan County High School through his sophomore year. He has been active since its inception in the annual Texon Reunion held in Big Lake.

Judge McCollum in World War II served with the 15th Air Force in Italy. He was awarded the Air Medal with an Oak Leaf Cluster. He received a European Theatre Ribbon with a Battle Star and a Presidential Unit Citation.

Judge McCollum makes his home in Odessa with his wife, Alice. They have two children. Their daughter, Kathleen McCollum McCulloch, is a member of the firm of Shafer, Davis, McCollum, Ashley, O'Leary & Stoker. Their son, Rector Choc McCollum, is a Sergeant with the Dallas Police Department.

The Governor's appointment will be for the unexpired term of Judge Richard Barajas who has been appointed also to fulfill the vacancy existing by the resignation of Chief Justice, Max Osborn.

Simultaneously with this appoint-

ment, Judge McCollum announced his candidacy to seek a full six-year term to the Court.

He has appointed Odessa C.P.A., Mr. Howard Purvis, as Treasurer for his campaign.

Judge McCollum is a member of the First Baptist Church of Odessa; the Ector County Bar Association; State Bar Association of Texas; American Bar Association; Fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation, and a Fellow in the International Academy of Trial Lawyers. ## USDA Announces 1993 Wool And Mohair Support Prices

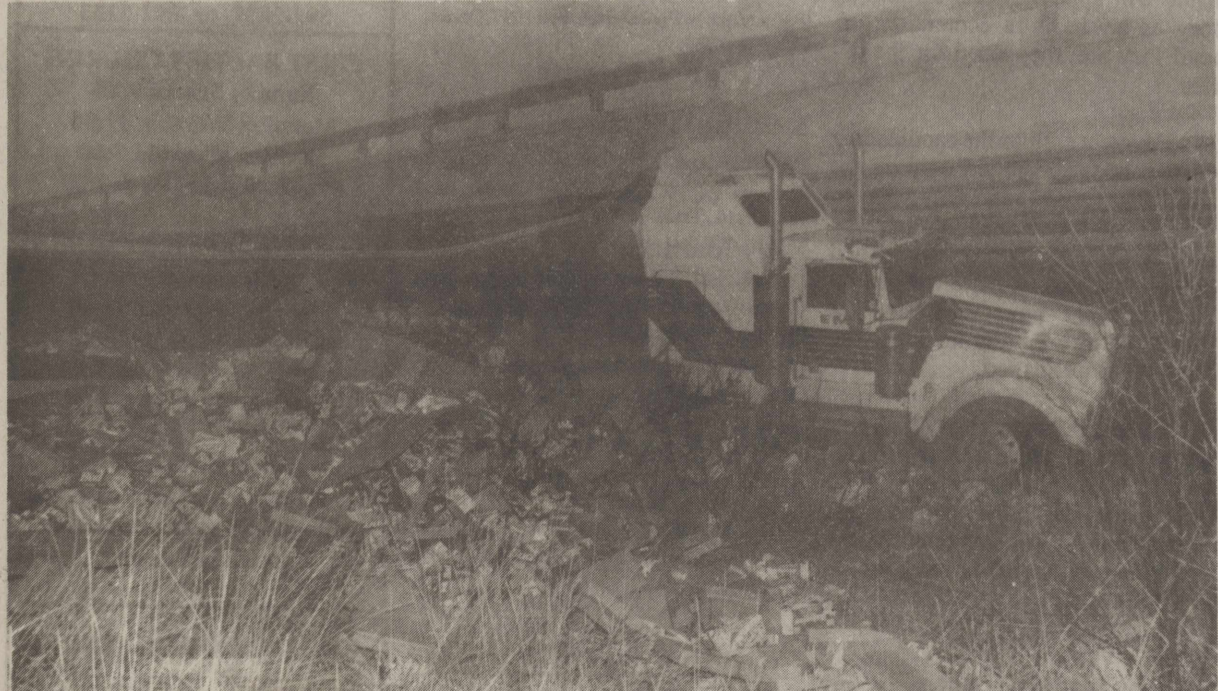
The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced on Jan. 24 that support prices for wool and mohair for 1993 marketings will be \$2.40 per pound for shorn wool and \$4.738 per pound for mohair.

Mohair is being supported at 85 percent of the percentage of parity at

which shorn wool is being supported.

Wool on unshorn lambs will be supported, as in the past, at a level determined by a formula based on the hundredweight of live, unshorn lambs marketed.

Further details appeared in the Federal Register on Jan. 14.

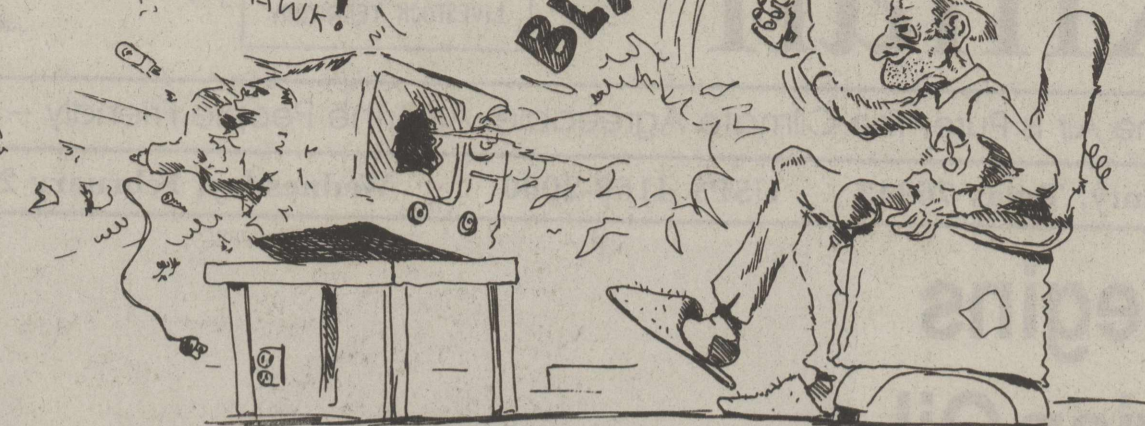
## Feb. 6 Last Day To Register To Vote

## LET'S GET ACQUAINTED!

(Series #5)  
(Harvest Time Christian Center)

Last week I talked to you about what we teach about entering into the family of God. I tried to show you through scripture that it happens through a spiritual birth. We are now a believer. However, this is only the gateway into the great family of God and the joyous Christian life. Now that our sins have been cleansed by faith in the shed blood of Christ at Calvary, where do we go from here?

Again, we must go to His Word (Bible) for guidance. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..." Mark 16:16. Thus, water baptism is not an option but a command of our Lord. Moments before Jesus ascended back to heaven, he told his disciples, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost" Matt. 28:19. Here, the Lord gives us the formula for water baptism. At this

important moment in the believer's life, the name of each person of the Holy Trinity, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit is to be acknowledged for each of them had a definite part in his salvation.

Our mode of water baptism is immersion. Most all Bible scholars agree that immersion was the original mode, but for convenience sake, other modes have been substituted. We feel more comfortable by burying them in baptism. Rom. 6:4,5; Col. 2:12. Records of baptisms in scripture reveal: 1. Water was required Acts 8:36; 2. Much water was mentioned, John 3:23. 3. They went down into the water, Acts 3:8; 4. They were buried in water, Col. 2:12; 5. They came up out of the water, Acts 8:39. So, we teach water baptism should follow conversion.

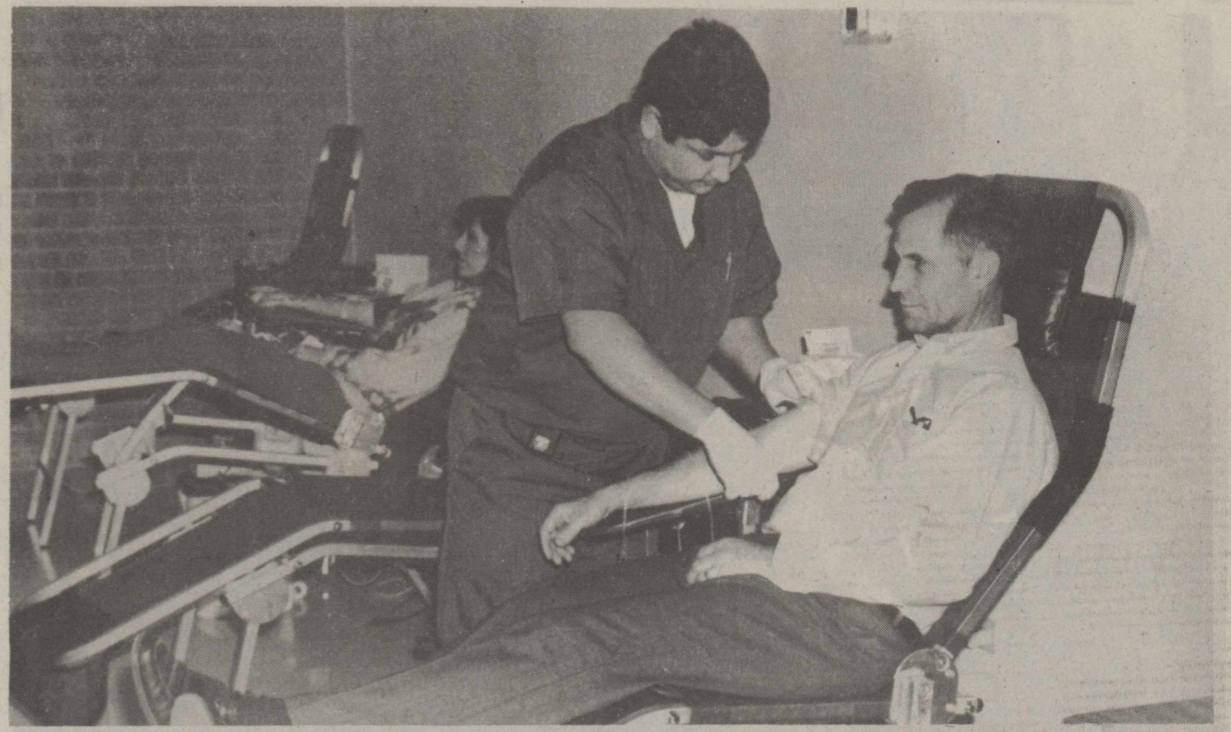

 Dear Ozona,  
 It's been a little over a week of quiet existence here in the San Joaquin since last Monday morning at 4:30 a.m. We didn't remember Martin Luther King's Day being nearly as exciting last year. The only description of the whole event that I can really give you is that at first it felt like a strong wind from a thunderstorm had hit, but when the shaking intensified and became more prolonged, it didn't take a rocket scientist to figure out

what was going on. Kathryn and I gathered up the girls and we centered ourselves under the doors and waited for it to end. We keep our 4-Runner stocked with water, perishable goods, and lots of other stuff, so I went ahead and rolled it out of the garage, as we knew that after-shocks would be rolling in soon and at the time didn't know where the epicenter was located. Once we knew where the quake had happened from listening to the television, we pretty well went about having a normal day.

Northridge and the San Fernando Valley are approximately eighty miles to the south of us, and most of the terrain separating us from them is mountainous. We have traveled under the Freeway 14, Antelope Valley interchange countless times, and have visited friends in the San Fernando Valley countless times, also, and for now it seems that the man above has smiled on us with favor. What really has everybody in awe out here is the land mass that was affected, and the way that the shock waves traveled after the fault fractured. From what we've seen, heard, and read, most of the shock waves moved vertically instead of horizontally. The San Gabriel Mountains that are on the northeast side of the San Fernando Valley actually increased their size vertically by two feet!

Since we moved out here, we have experienced the Launders Quake, we've seen the L.A. Basin deluged with 28 inches of rain, we've seen the firestorms created by the Santa Ana winds in the L.A. Basin and have now seen and felt a 6.6 magnitude earthquake down here in what we call the Southland. We have been very fortunate here in the Southern End of the San Joaquin Valley. Life's a beach here, folks, but you had better be prepared for any kind of adventure that might crop up.

Kathryn and I wanted to thank those of you who showed so much concern for our well-being and want you to know that even though there are many miles between us and ya'll, we think of you all the time.

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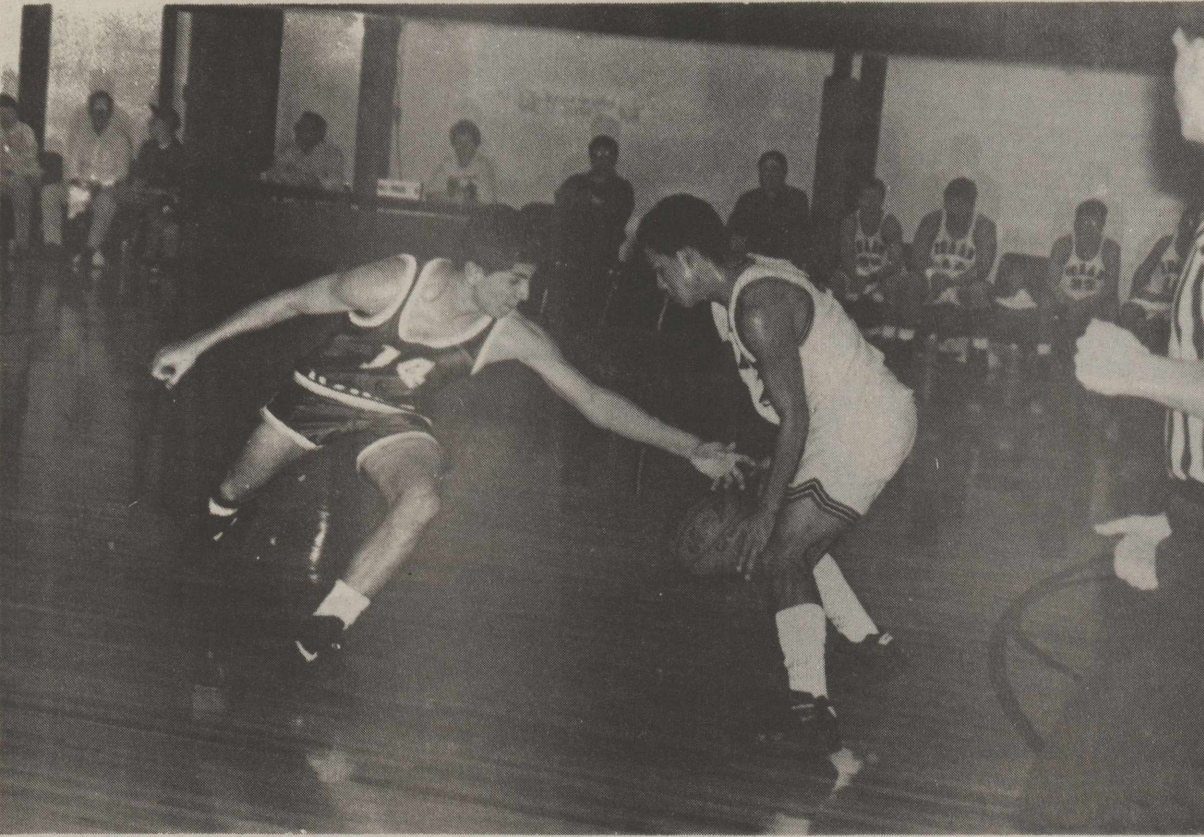

## TAAS Preparation Classes in Math

The TAAS math preparation classes are in full swing at Ozona High School. These classes are offered to help students remediate or acquire advanced math skills used on the Texas Academic Assessment Test.

These classes are open to any student wishing to enhance chances of meeting the requirements necessary for graduation. The classes begin at 7:15 each morning. Tutorials are held in Mr. Hall's and Ms. South's classes. Sophomores who are preparing to take the exit level TAAS for the first time may go to Mr. Hall's class. Juniors and seniors retaking the TAAS may go to Ms. South's classroom in the Heritage Building.

These classes were offered last fall, and those who actively participated had a much higher success ratio on the TAAS math section. Students who participated in the tutorials and were successful in post Algebra I math classes all passed. The students who participated but were presently in Algebra I or just beginning geometry had an 88% success ratio. Those students who did not participate in the tutorials and were Algebra I level or below dropped their success chance to 7%.

"We would like parents to encourage their students to take advan-

tage of these tutorials," said a representative of the school. "Attending tutorials on a regular basis has proven to be the most important factor in succeeding other than achievement in post Algebra I math classes. Meeting the minimum objectives on the TAAS tests is a requirement for graduation. The importance of preparing for these tests cannot be overstated."

## Commodity Registration Feb. 3, Senior Citizens Building

Commodity registration for 1994 will be Feb. 3 at the Senior Citizens Building. Time is from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. and the location is 903 12th Street. Guidelines for commodity applications follow.

You need to bring proof of residence such as a utility bill that shows your street address. You also need to bring identification such as a driver's license or birth certificate.

If you receive food stamps, bring the letter that you receive. It will have the number 1009 in small print at the bottom of the page.

If you receive any other financial aid, you must bring proof at the time of application.

You will need to bring a current check stub if you are employed. If you are on Social Security, bring a bank deposit slip or write the amount on a piece of paper.

No one under the age of 18 is permitted to pick up food. If you are unable to pick up your food, send a note and your card with the person picking up your food.

People who are eligible to participate in the program must not be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or political belief.

Senior parents and parents desiring to know more about post secondary financial aid cannot afford to miss this opportunity. Learn how to fill out the necessary forms for student financial aid. 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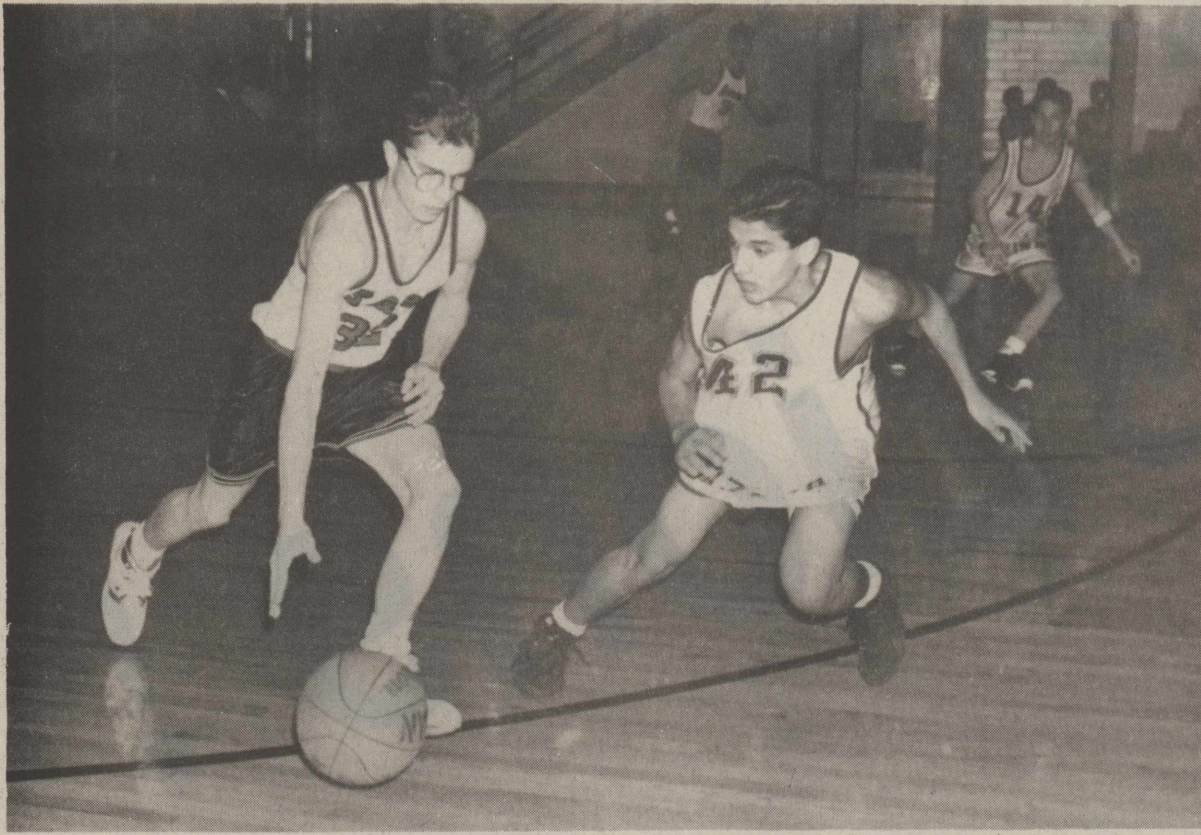

Highlights of the program included welcoming remarks from The Honorable Rahm Emanuel, White House Political Affairs Director, and

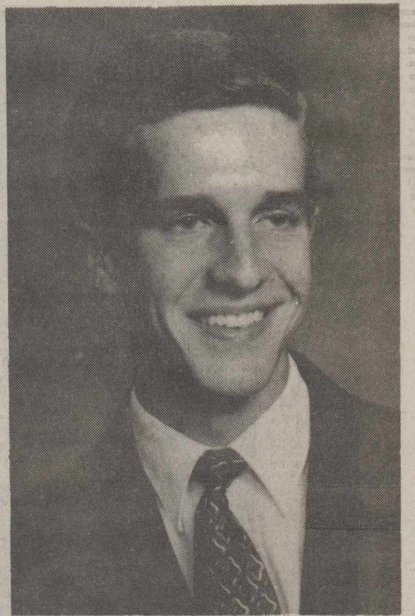
a panel discussion with prominent journalists at the National Press Club. Students visited foreign embassies and received policy briefings from senior government officials.

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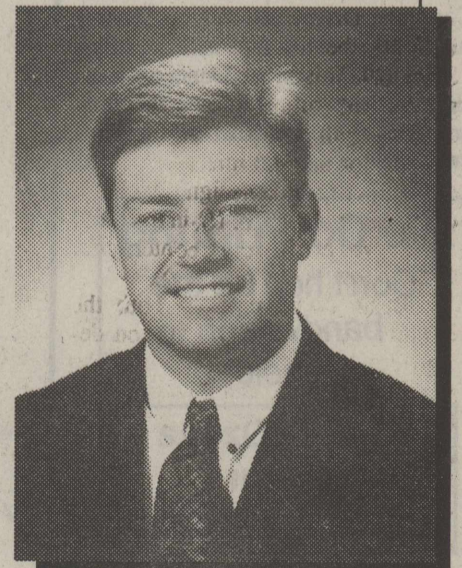
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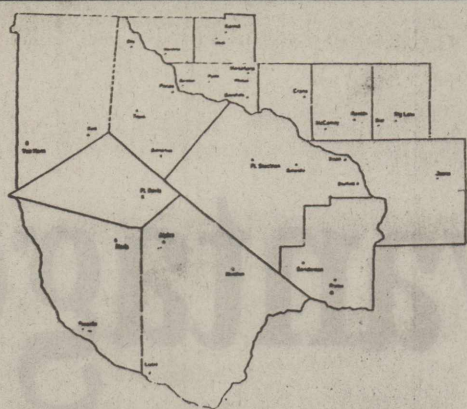
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## 4-H Photo, Clothing and Demo Activities Begin

A wide variety of opportunities for young people ages 8-19 exist in the 4-H program, including projects which will begin soon.

4-H photography will begin classes on Thursday, Feb. 10, at 7 p.m. in the civic center's small meeting room. 4-H'ers need to bring a camera to participate, but it can be any type, from an inexpensive 110 automatic to a 35 mm, Polaroid or Disc camera.

The purpose of the project is to teach 4-H'ers how to operate a camera and take good photos - and cost can be governed by how much the 4-H'ers - and his or her parents - wish to spend. For more information on the photography project, contact adult leader Neal Ulmer at 392-5443.

4-H members have already begun signing up for method demonstrations, public speaking, judging teams and share-the-fun skits. "There are a number of different contests and team events to choose from," said Tedra Ulmer, county 4-H coordinator, who noted there are 28 demonstration categories and 10 judging or team evaluation events to choose from.

4-H members who participate in demonstrations, public speaking or share the fun will travel to Fort Stockton on April 30 for their contest. "We can have two teams or individual entries in each contest, so it is a first-come, first served situation as far as categories and teams are concerned - we encourage you to sign up immediately so we can begin work as soon as possible," said Ulmer.

The District 4-H Fashion Show will also be held April 30 in Fort Stockton. This year's show has been greatly streamlined, and a kickoff meeting will be held in Crockett County for anyone interested in the clothing or fashion design projects at 6 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 10, in the small meeting room of the civic center (prior to the photography meeting).

Basic information on both the clothing project and the fashion design project will be provided at the meeting. The clothing project and fashion show include two major divisions - buying or construction. "If you don't want to sew, buying is for you," noted Ulmer. "Everyone - including guys - must buy clothing at one time or another, and this part of the project eases us to be good consumers."

The fashion design project involves designing an original garment, fabric or accessory. The participant uses creative skills to come up with a design - but doesn't have to make the item. "This is perfect for both young men and young women who like art and like to express themselves creatively," said Ulmer.

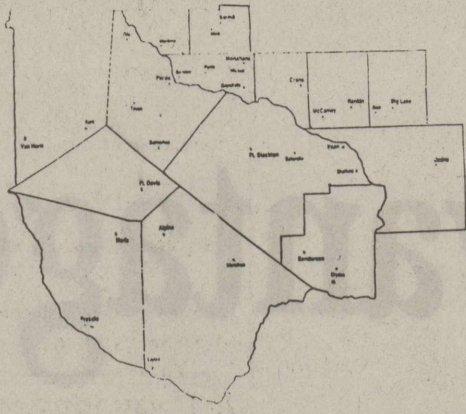
