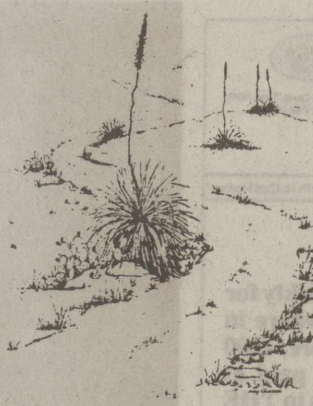
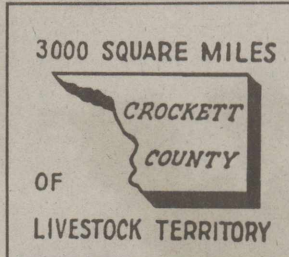

Sharp In San Angelo For Hearing

Michael Eugene Sharp, convicted in Ozona in 1983 of the death of Brenda Kay Broadway, was in San Angelo Jan. 25 for an evidentiary hearing. Three dates for execution have been set for Sharp for the June 11, 1982, abduction and stabbing murder of Mrs. Broadway, and he was also sentenced to life in prison on a first-degree murder

charge in the killing of the woman's 8-year-old daughter, Christie Elms.

Sharp appeared before U. S. Magistrate J. Q. Warnick Jan. 25 at which time his attorneys submitted evidence of conversations between Sharp and officers, a part of which is a tape recording, just prior to a line-up in the Winkler County Jail in 1982. Sharp was given the opportunity to submit any evidence regarding the authenticity of the recordings, witnesses and conversations surrounding the line-up and warnings he was given prior to the line-up.

Judge Warnick limited the hearing to factual considerations of evidence within the time frame just prior to the lineup.

As a result of appeals, Sharp's case has been in the San Angelo court since 1989. He was in San Angelo in March of 1992 for a two-day hearing to determine whether attorneys and judges made mistakes during his 1983 trial.

Accident Causes Oil Spill

Approximately 75 barrels of oil spilled following a two vehicle accident Jan. 26 south of Ozona. Low visibility caused by heavy fog prevailed at the time of the 8:45 a.m. accident on Hwy. 163.

Alejandro Castaneda of Sheffield was the driver of the 1994 Western Star truck tractor rig transporting 149 barrels of crude oil from the Hunt Ranch to the Texas New Mexico Pipe-

line location six miles south of Ozona. The Trailmaster tank on the rig was struck in the side by a 1991 Ford pickup driven by Eddie Vinton.

Half the load of oil was transferred to another truck. The portion which spilled was cleaned up by product owner Kerr-McGee of Houston under the supervision of the Texas Natural Resources and Conservation Commission. The tanker truck was owned by Eott Energy of Houston.

UIL Rearranges District To Include Van Horn

The University Interscholastic League last week released its biennial district alignments for the 1994-95 and 1995-96 school years. Ozona will now be included in a new district, which is 5-2A.

Ozona's present 6-2A district includes Eldorado, Wall, Coahoma, Iraan, Stanton and McCamey. The new district, 5-2A, will include Ozona, Iraan, Eldorado, McCamey and Van Horn.

Originally, Anthony was included

in the new 5-2A district, but they have officially appealed the U.I.L. district assignment. Anthony, located 371 miles northwest from Ozona, is requesting independent status in football and AAA status in all other U.I.L. events.

Parents, players, fans and students may ask how far will we travel? Actually, according to Ozona High School principal and coach, John Curry, "Our school's total travel will be less in the new district than the past district. Given that situation, it will not be that bad."

Usually, coaches accept the long distance travel as part of the job. "Van

Horn has to play someone, and they (U.I.L.) can't leave them out," said Coach Don Payne.

Ozona may play a Saturday afternoon football game. The schedule will not be set until Feb. 22.

School trustees met in a special board meeting Monday, Feb. 7, at noon. The agenda was to consider the appealing of the U.I.L. district assignment.

"The board took no action in appealing the U.I.L. decision," according to Ted Cotton, interim superintendent.

Kathryn Jean Williams Mayfield, age 40, died Saturday, February 5, 1994, in Angelo Community Hospital.

Services were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 8, 1994, at the First Baptist Church in Ozona with Dr. Glenn Edwards of San Angelo officiating, assisted by Rev. Bill Fuller, Pastor of First Baptist Church of Ozona, and Rev. Wayne Woody of Harvest Time Christian Center of Ozona. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Freddy Funeral Home.

Kathryn was born May 2, 1953, to Troy D. and Estelle Williams of Ozona. She was a lifelong resident of Ozona where she graduated from high school in 1971. Kathryn graduated from Angelo State University in 1979 with a B.S. in Biology. She graduated from Texas Tech School of Law with a Doctorate of Jurisprudence in 1982. Upon being licensed by the State Bar, she worked for Legal Aid in Lubbock for a year prior to establishing private law practice in Ozona in 1983. She was elected to the position of Crockett County Judge in 1988 and still held that position at the time of her death.

In her accomplishments as a civic leader, she served as Chairperson of the Concho Valley Council of Governments, President of the Far West Texas Judges and Commissioners Association and as a member of the Tomorrow Committee of the Texas Association of Regional Councils. She was proud of her 4-H roots and served as an adult 4-H leader for more than 10 years. In 1993 she was presented the Texas 4-H Alumni Award. She also served on the Board of Directors of South Orient Rural Rail Transportation District.

Accident fatal To Californians

A Los Angeles, CA, couple died in Crockett County Feb. 2 in a one-vehicle accident about 12:45 p.m. The wreck happened on I-10 approximately 26 miles west of Ozona.

Driver Janie E. Sandoval, age 61, apparently went to sleep according to DPS Trooper Keith Olive. The 1991 Honda occupied by Mrs. Sandoval and her husband Reuben, age 65, veered off the highway into the center median. The driver evidently awoke and over-corrected causing the vehicle to cross both eastbound lanes, go into a broadside skid and roll over five times.

Mr. Sandoval was thrown from the vehicle during the fourth or fifth roll. Mrs. Sandoval remained in the vehicle. Both were wearing automatic shoulder straps but not their lap belts.

Assisting Trooper Olive in investigating the accident were Trooper Junior Bilano, Trooper Steve Torres of Mertzon and Cpl. Buster Lamb of Eldorado. Justice of the Peace Jim Hearne conducted an inquest at the scene.

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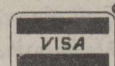
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LET'S GET ACQUAINTED!

I have been talking with you in these articles about the teachings and practices of Harvest Time Christian Center, Assembly of God. In the last one, I talked about water baptism. Today, let's look at the second ordinance which we observe, "The Lord's Supper" or "Holy Communion".

We are not told in the Bible how often we should partake of His holy Communion. Some partake each Sunday. We, along with many other evangelical bodies observe Communion once a month, guarding closely lest this most holy event become routine and commonplace.

We do not have closed communion. Any who have been converted may partake of communion when we serve it.

We have experienced some outstanding healings during Communion as we honor his broken body and acknowledge with the prophet, "With his stripes we are healed" Isa. 53:5.

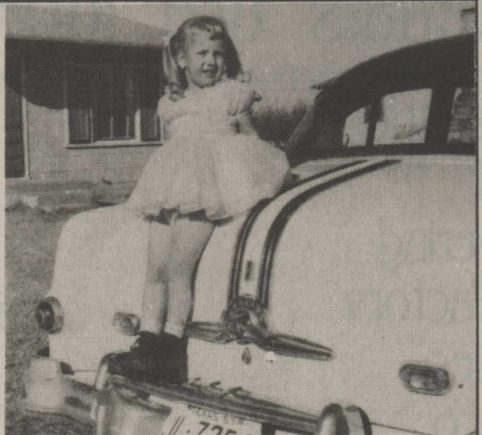

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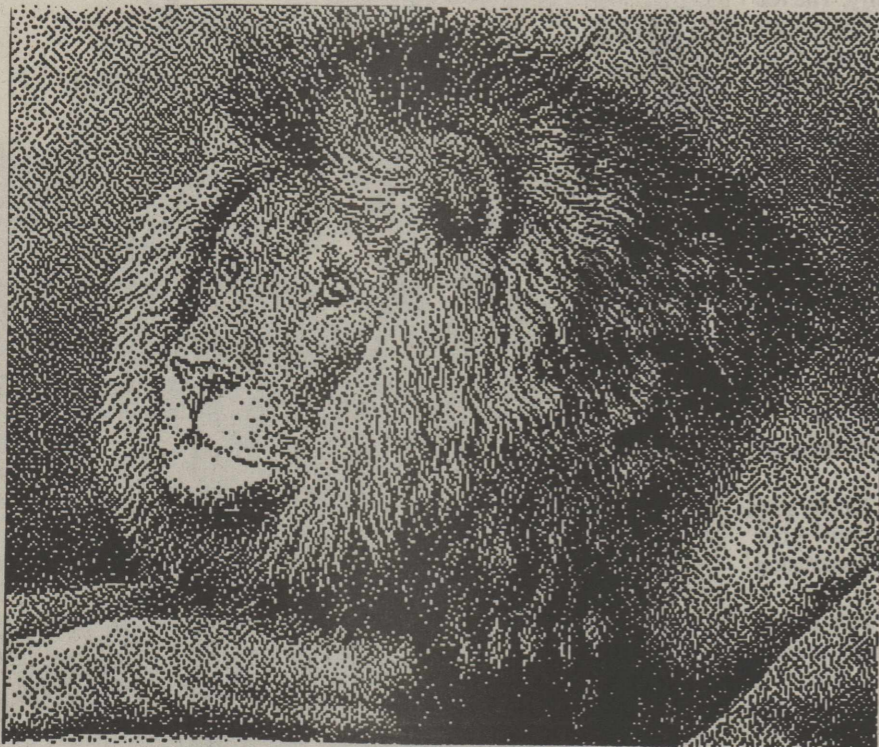

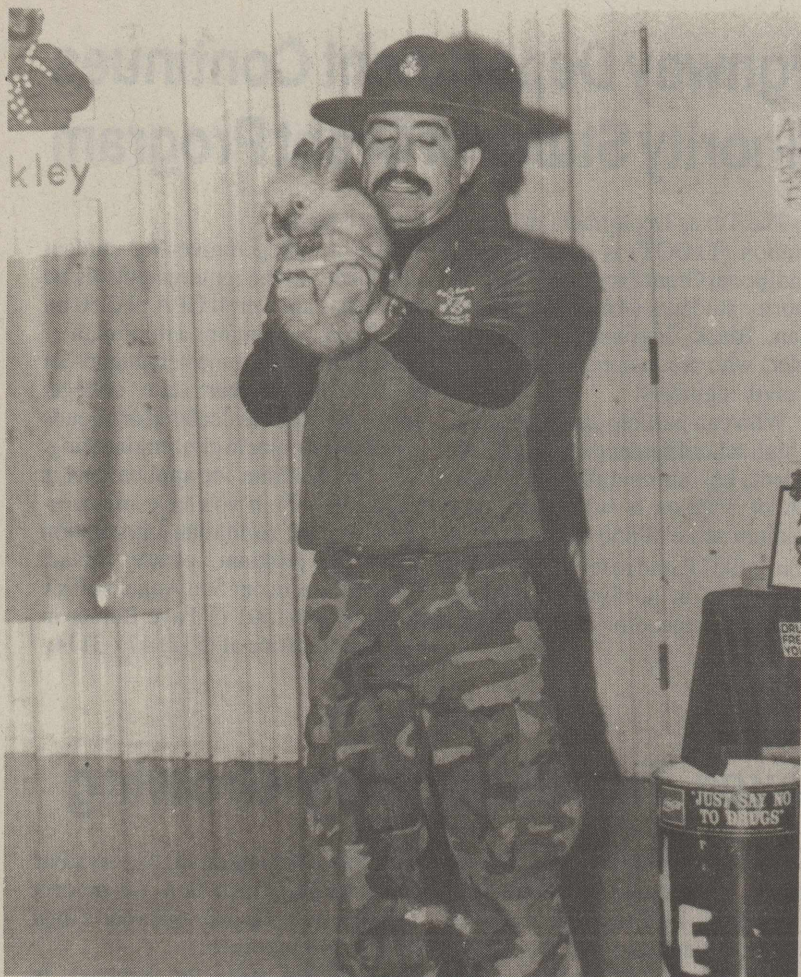

Powerlifting - "What is powerlifting?" fans might ask themselves. Powerlifting is a contest which includes three different types of weight lifts. These lifts are squat, bench press and dead lift.

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OHS Students Washington Bound

John Clayton Childress and Travis Davidson will participate in The National Young Leaders' Conference in Washington, D.C. from Feb. 15 to 20. The National Young Leaders Conference is a "hands-on" leadership training program for high school students who have demonstrated leadership potential and scholastic merit. John Clayton, a sophomore, and Travis, a senior at Ozona High School, will be among 350 young leaders from across the nation attending the conference.

The theme of the National Young Leaders Conference is The Leaders of Tomorrow Meeting the Leaders of Today. Travis and John Clayton will interact with key leaders and newsmakers from the three branches of government, the media and the diplomatic corps.

Highlights of the leadership conference include welcoming remarks from a member of Congress on the floor of the House of Representatives. Students participate in a panel discussion with distinguished journalists at the National Press Club and visit a foreign embassy for an international policy briefing. Students may also meet with their elected senators and representatives or designated congressional staff.

In addition to the Washington briefings, they will participate in activities designed to enhance each student's individual leadership style. In one activity, Foreign Policy and the

President, students role-play the President and members of the Cabinet who must respond to an international crisis in the Balkans. The culminating activity of the conference is the Mock Congress on National Service, in which students roleplay members of the United States House of Representatives by debating, amending and voting on proposed youth service legislation.

Highway Department Continues Minority Student Grant Program

Texas Travel Industry Growing

The Texas travel and tourism industry grew by an estimated \$800 million from 1991 to 1992, according to information listed in Texas Travel Facts, a quick reference guide to statistics and current travel trends in Texas. Texas Travel Facts is distributed by the Texas Department of Commerce Tourism Division.

In the 1992 calendar year, total travel expenditures in Texas were \$21.4 billion, an increase from \$20.6 billion in 1991, and represents a 5.9 percent gain over the previous year. Of the \$21.4 billion expenditures during 1992, \$18.8 billion came from domestic visitor spending, and international visitor spending amounted to \$2.6 billion.

Texas was second in the nation, among states, for domestic travel in 1992 with approximately 151 million visitors, an increase of 12 million visitors from 1991.

Another indicator of Texas travel activity is the number of inquiries for Texas travel information. During fiscal year 1992, (Sept. 1-Aug. 31) there

were 991,870 inquiries for Texas travel information, which is a 7.6 percent increase over the previous year's total of 921,513 inquiries.

Coupled with the increase in overall expenditures was a one percent increase in employment in the Texas travel industry. An estimated 405,900 persons were employed during 1992, versus 402,100 for 1991, according to figures listed in the guide.

Domestic pleasure travel is far and away the largest component of travel in Texas, accounting for 73 percent of all travel activity in the state. Business travel accounted for 27 percent of all travel in the state during 1992, according to information listed in Texas Travel Facts.

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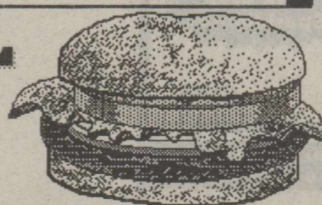
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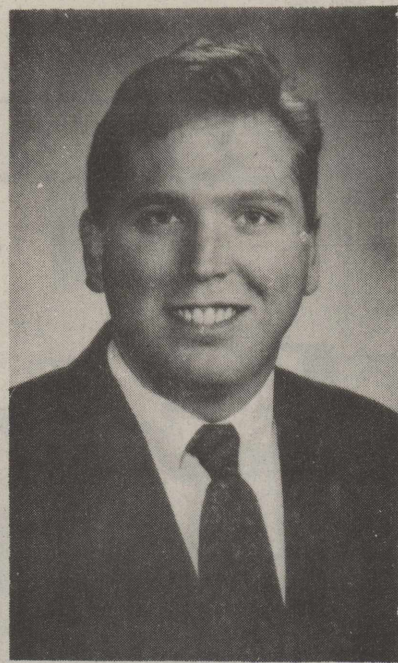
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Sutton In Washington For Internship

FCE Club Program Features Jacket Techniques

The Family Community Leadership Club's next meeting will feature a demonstration on a new technique for making appliqued jackets from sweatshirts. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend one of the two free classes to be held at 10 a.m. on Thursday, Feb. 24, and at 7 p.m. the same day. The groups will meet at the Crockett County Civic Center.

"Participants will receive step-by-step instructions and patterns for appliques during the program," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent - Home Economics, who will be teaching the lesson. "These jackets are so simple that almost anyone with minimum sewing skills can make one," the agent added.

The jackets feature blanket stitching around neckline, cuffs and front opening, as well as around the appliques. Bright prints and unique buttons are utilized to add interest to the applique designs. "These jackets might sell for over \$50 at a craft show or boutique, but you can make them for less than \$10 if you purchase your own sweatshirt and use your own fabric scraps for the appliques," Ulmer said. The agent added that an old sweatshirt can even be recycled in this manner, making the cost even less.

The secret to making the jackets, Ulmer noted, is the use of fusibles to

apply the appliques and stabilize the cut edges of the sweatshirt. "Fusibles are a great tool for the non-sewer, and once you've mastered the basic techniques for using them properly, you can create many home decor items as well as embellishing your family's wardrobe," she said.

Many of you may be familiar with FCE under another name - either Home Demonstration Club or Extension Homemakers. Although the program has undergone several name changes since the first club was organized, the main purpose for its existence has remained the same - continuing education for women from all backgrounds, races and ages.

Home Demonstration work began in Texas around 1914, and really came of age in the 1930's, when County Extension Agents taught skills to women that they in turn used to get their families through the Great Depression - money management, food and clothing production, health and nutrition and much more.

Through the years, clubs began to reach both rural and urban women, and the name was changed to Extension Homemakers in the 1970's. The current name change, made in 1993, reflects the mission of the organization.

That mission is to work with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to strengthen and enrich families through educational programs, leadership development, and community service. The Texas Family Community Education Club serves as a coordinating organization for the statewide activities of FCE Clubs, including scholarships for 4-H youths and for adult members of the FCE organization.

- Education as a life-long learning process

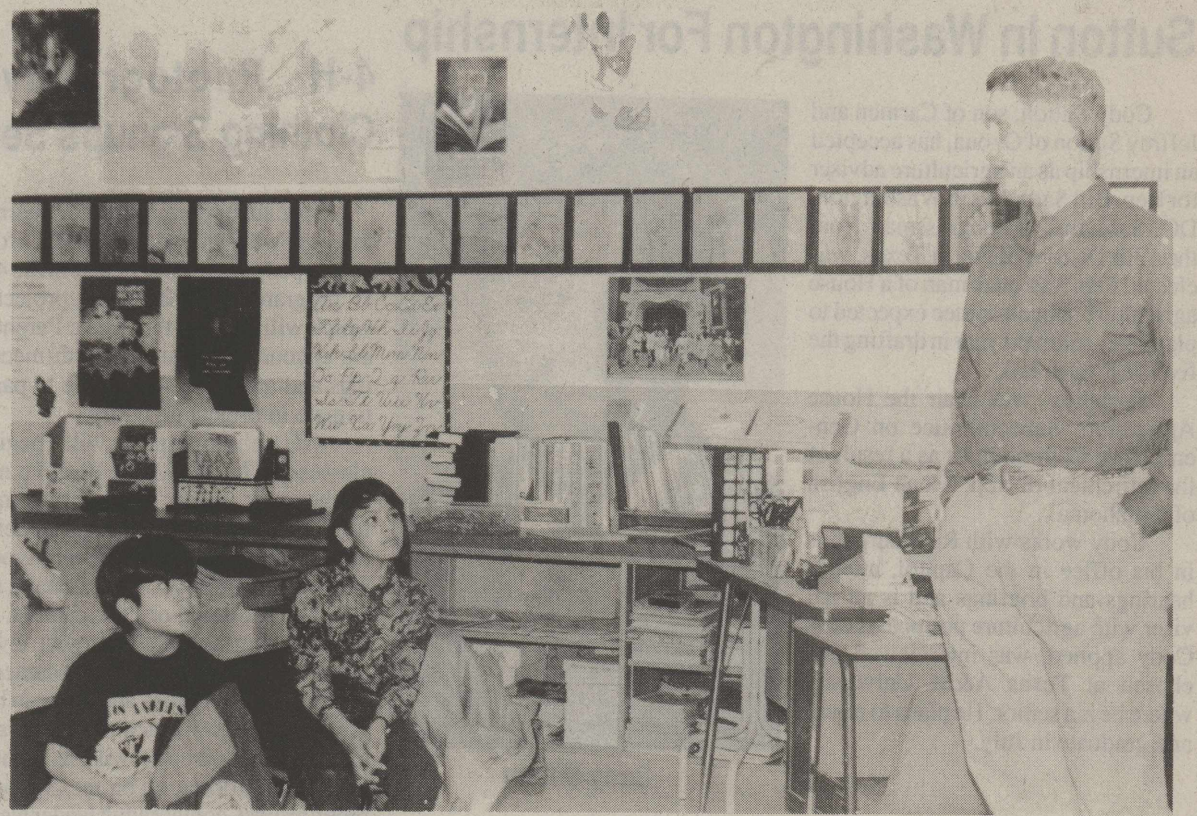

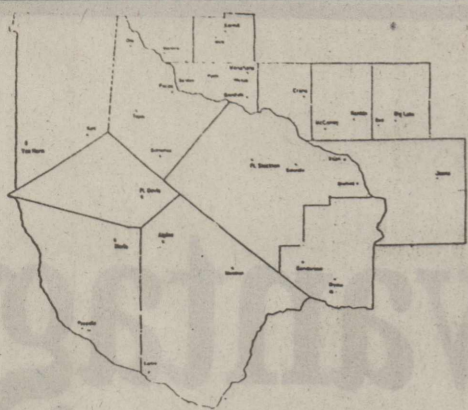

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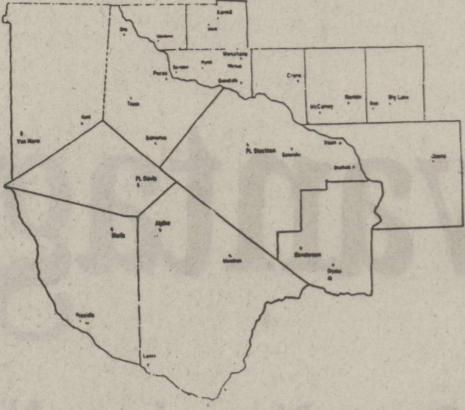
