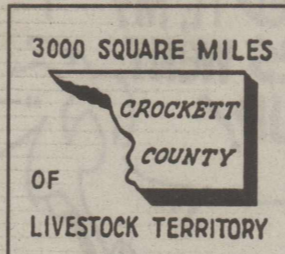

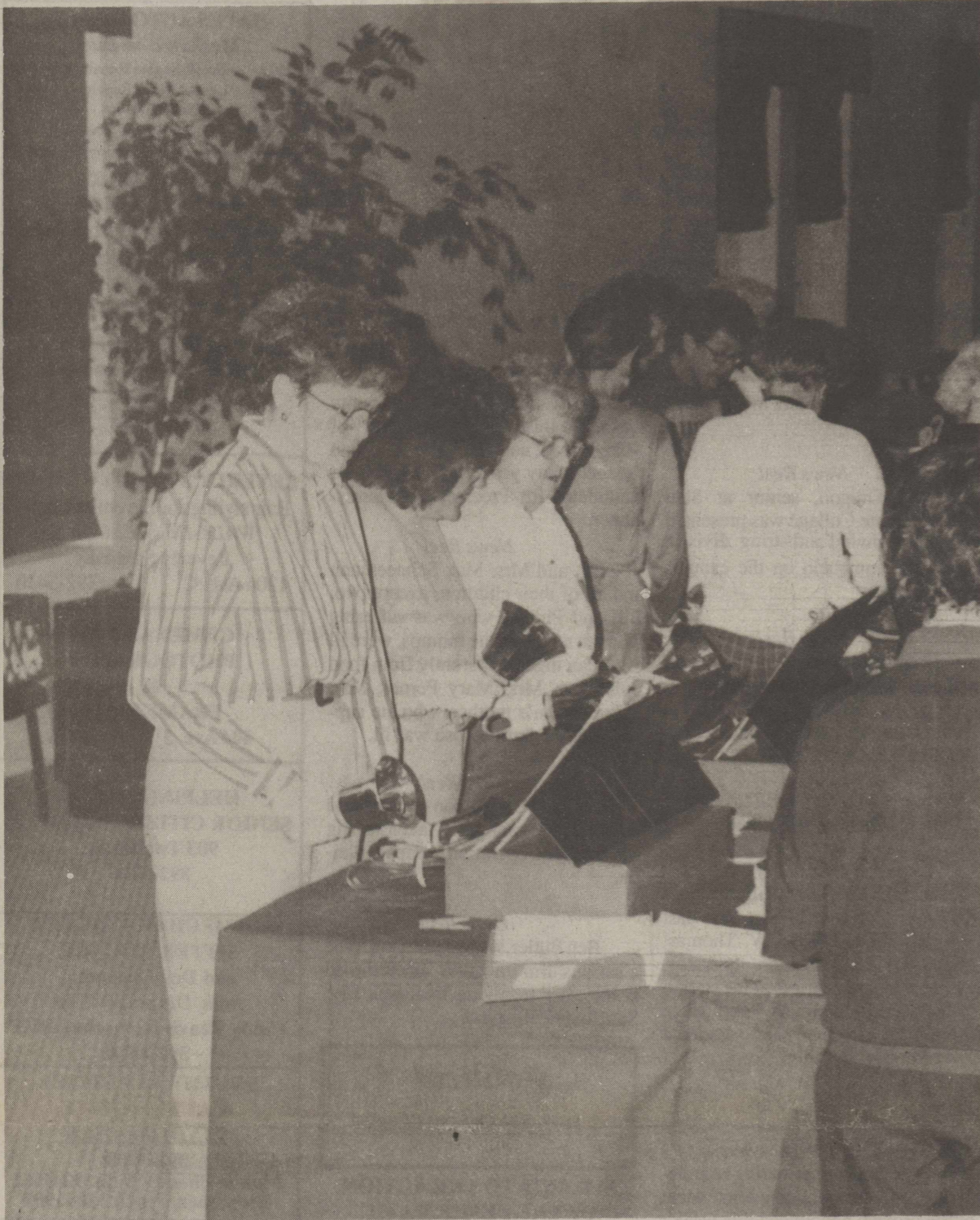

Hospital Board Votes To Decertify From Medicare

Hospital board members voted to decertify from Medicare last week at a noon meeting Thursday. The meeting was scheduled at a time believed convenient for public attendance.

Only three persons not employed by the hospital or care center made statements following administrator Gerry Phillips' explanation of decertification results.

According to Phillips, services at the hospital will remain basically the same. Medicare patients will still be served and there is no longer a 23-hour limit on the time Medicare patients can be hospitalized in a non-Medicare facility, he said. When the hospital decertified in 1986, Medicare would not pay on patients hospitalized more than 23 hours.

"We will become a non-participating emergency services hospital," Phillips said. Medicare will pay as they would if the hospital was Medicare certified "as long as physicians can justify and document the need for hospitalization. The Big Lake hospital has been decertified almost a year and the administrator there says Medicare pays better than before," Phillips said.

Dr. Marcus Sims said, "It is going to be on my shoulders to justify that it's an emergency if they stay three or four days. I want to make sure when we take the step that Medicare's not going to balk on our admissions."

The return to certification in 1992 did not bring in more money, and the patient ratio did not go up. Use of the hospital has been stable for the last 10 years, Phillips said.

Decertification will reduce staffing requirements and some of the paperwork at the hospital.

Shannon Hunnicutt talked to the board about expenses her father incurred when he was hospitalized in Ozona for a lengthy time while the hospital was not Medicare certified.

"If you're going to decertify, don't sugar coat it," Mrs. Hunnicutt said. "People deserve to know the conse-

quences of decertification."

The choice to bring her father to Ozona rather than have him stay in a San Angelo hospital was one the family made, she said, but they expected insurance to cover what Medicare did not.

Jack Baggett Jr., president of the hospital and care center board, said, "The bottom line is we didn't gain any patients when we certified, and we can't afford Medicare any more."

Prior to calling for a motion to decertify, Baggett told the board, "We can sit here and act like we're making a decision, but the decision has already been made (by commissioners)."

Decertification is effective March 20.

The board also voted to approve physician contracts which are effective March 1, 1994. Both doctors were present at the meeting and signed their contracts at that time.

Brady Bill Meeting Scheduled For Crockett County Friday, March 3

Sheriff Jim Wilson announced a meeting for Thursday, March 3, in the District Courtroom at 3:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting will be for the Sheriff to meet with Crockett County gun dealers to explain the Brady Bill and its enforcement in Crockett County.

Under Federal statute, Sheriff Wilson will be responsible for doing background checks on all handgun purchases involving Crockett County residents. It is his intention to meet with local firearms license holders to establish reporting procedures within

the county. At this time, the Brady Bill only involves the sale of handguns and establishes a 5-day waiting period which allows for background checks of the purchaser.

"It is my hope that, by working together, we can follow the law and still not place undue inconvenience on the honest gun owner and purchaser," Sheriff Wilson said.

The March 3 meeting is especially for gun dealers in Crockett County. However, gun owners and other interested persons are welcome to attend.

March 5 Ceremony To Pay Tribute To Former Postmasters

The Ozona Post Office will have a ceremony Saturday, March 5, at 1 p.m. to honor the families of former postmasters and to pay tribute to these 13 previous postmasters who served the community since its beginning in 1891.

"The significance behind the ceremony is to remember and reunite all of our postal families, and to let them know that they will always be a part of our U. S. Postal Service," said Postmaster Ernest Tijerina Jones.

The families of the previous postmasters were asked to donate a picture of the postmaster from each family. The pictures will be dedicated to the Ozona Post Office and will be displayed in the main lobby. A brass plate on the picture frame will indicate the name of the postmaster and his family, and the time frame he or she served as postmaster of Ozona. "As family members visit the post office,

they will be reminded that they belong to the U. S. postal families," said Jones.

"If you have family members who served under any of the previous 13 postmasters, they too are a vital branch of our postal family. Please bring me a picture and they, too, will be recognized for their contribution to the community of Ozona."

"It is most important that as many family members attend to show support for their family's contributions. The Ozona community is invited to show your support of the families who have served you and are serving you now. Invited guests are Mr. and Mrs. John Howard (he is manager of Post Office Operations) and Mr. Schelski of the Fort Worth District, other postmasters from the surrounding area, families and friends of the Ozona postal family and the community of Ozona," said Jones.

Refreshments will be served.

Former Ozonan Wins \$41 Million

Most adults have, at some time or another, even before Texas had a lottery, dreamed of being the winner. This dream came true last week for former Ozonan Wanda Wilson who claimed the single biggest payoff in Texas.

Wilson matched all the numbers to win a \$41.48 million lotto jackpot Feb. 24.

The happy winner had no plans to continue working as a bus driver for the Houston Metropolitan Transit Authority after claiming her prize. The first installment of her winnings is \$2,075,094.36. She will receive another \$2,074,000 annually for the next 19 years.

Her immediate plans, as outlined in a news conference with her mother and Nora Linares, executive director of the Texas Lottery Commission, were to spend more time with her 11-year-old daughter Tia, pay off her mother's house, buy a house for herself, open a trust fund for her daughter and buy a car for her father, William "Willie" Wilson of Ozona.

In a telephone conversation with Mr. Wilson Sunday, he said his daughter was very excited over her good fortune and he was excited for her.

The county precinct chairmen could play a key part in determining whose name is placed on the November General Election ballot for county judge. In that race, voters have a choice of casting their ballots for Jeffrey Sutton or incumbent Kathryn May-

field who died Feb. 5. If the late Mrs. Mayfield should be elected, the county's Democratic Party committee, made up of the county chairman and precinct chairmen, will select the name to be on the November ballot.

Several factions are campaigning in the community to have their candidates elected precinct chairmen.

County commissioners, who will appoint someone to fill the unexpired term of judge, plan to wait until after the March 8 Primary Election to do so.

As of early Tuesday, 344 votes had been cast by personal appearance and 77 ballots mailed out for a total of 421. Election judge Jean Conner said this is a heavy early turnout.

"When we had our sheriff's race it was heavy, and this is about like that," she said.

4-H'ers Collect School Supplies For Mexico

Community service projects are a big part of 4-H, as youth learn to help those who are less fortunate than they. This year's senior 4-H community service project focuses on a group of students who live quite close to Ozona but who are desperately in need of help.

In the poorest part of the city of Acuña, Mexico, a school exists which is made of cardboard. As one 4-H'er put it, "We complain when the air conditioning here isn't cool enough - I can't imagine wanting to attend school so badly that I would go in circumstances like that." However, to get an education, the children in that section of Acuña do just that - and this project is designed to help.

Collection boxes have been made and distributed around Ozona by senior 4-H members. The deadline for donations of new or slightly used school supplies, good clothing or other items such as magazines with photos suitable for the classroom is March

15. Donations of items or cash to purchase new school supplies may also be made at the County Extension Office from 8 a.m. until noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. The office is located on the second floor of the courthouse annex.

Planned Parenthood Funds Mammography In Three Towns For Low Income Women

During 1993, Planned Parenthood of West Texas, Inc. provided funding to almost 400 low income women for breast cancer screening. Recipients of a grant from the Texas Department of Health, PPWT is part of a national effort to increase access to mammography screening for older, low-income women. Not only does risk for breast cancer increase with age, but low-income women between 40 and 50 are likely to fall into a healthcare service "gap". They are not old enough to qualify for Medicare, have limited incomes and insurance, if any at all, and can't afford preven-

tive health screenings such as mammography.

Planned Parenthood provides free breast cancer check-ups to women who qualify. The check-up includes a breast examination by a health care professional and a mammogram. To qualify for these services, a woman must be over 40 or older and meet certain income requirements.

In the field events, results were

as follows: triple jump, Chris Sanchez 2nd with 37-2, Johnny Porras 3rd with 35-8.5; long jump, Anthony Sanchez 2nd with a 17'1/2"; pole vault, David Browne tie for 5th with a 9'6" vault; discus, Adam Carroll 6th with a 113'4" throw; and shot put, Justin Moran 4th with a 39'10 3/4" throw.

The Lady Lions' track team also did some flying in the track meet. Six Ozona ladies placed sixth with 48 points out of nine teams represented.

The six Ozonans competing in the Fort Stockton meet were: Jamie Porter, Amy DeHoyos, Dana Bishop, Heather Hall, Amanda Ortiz and Mel Lozano.

In the second half, Ozona was able to make some points and caused several turnovers. Eldorado really shot the hoops, making approximately 90 percent from the field to put the game out of reach.

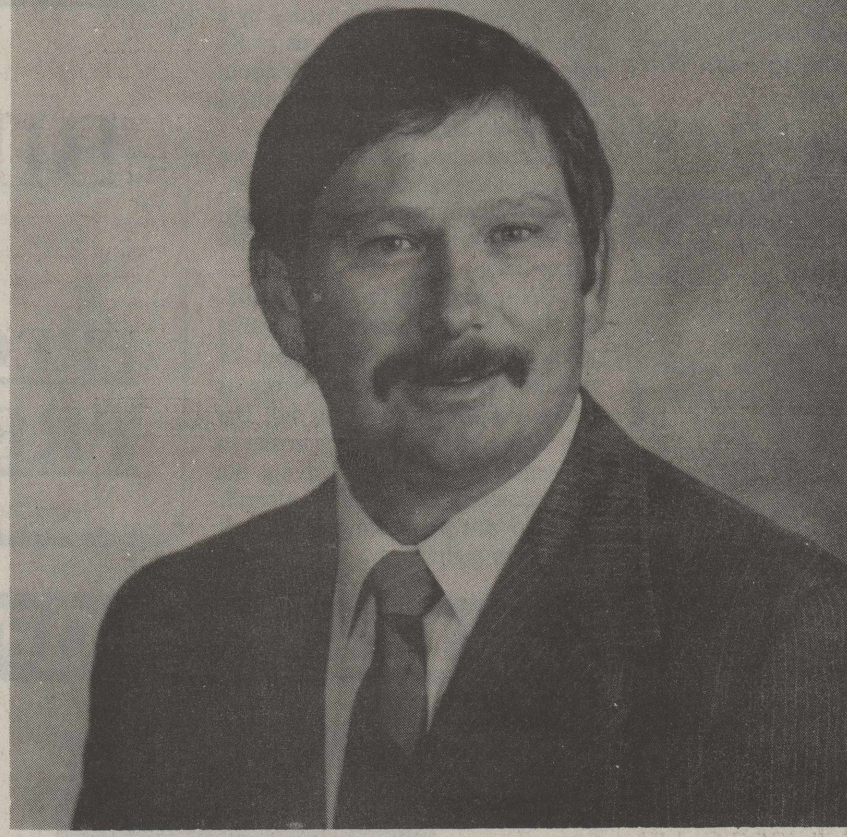

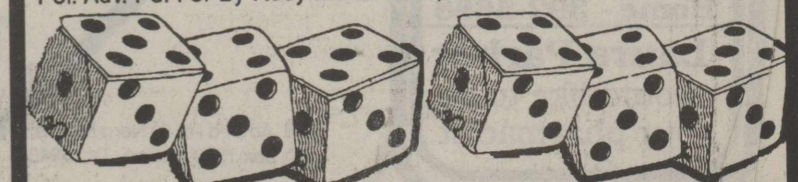

Perner Completes SWCD Director Training

The training course was conducted at the headquarters of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, the state agency responsible for coordinating the programs of

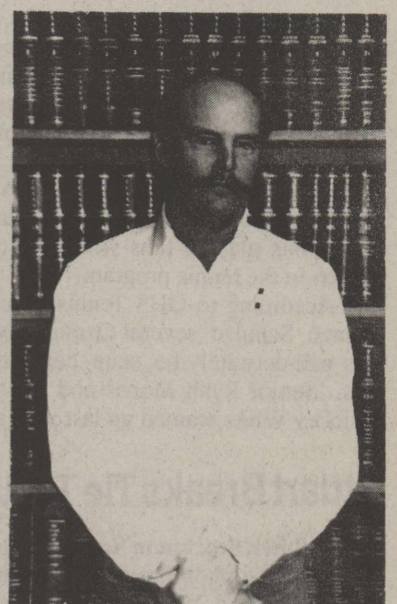
Texas' 212 Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Training sessions enabled directors to become familiar with the history of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District programs as well as with legislation granting statutory powers, duties and responsibilities to SWCDs.

"The primary responsibility of a soil and water conservation district is to assist farmers, ranchers and local communities with solving soil, water and related resource conservation problems through voluntary programs," said Robert Buckley, executive director, TSSWCB.

"A district board of directors identifies primary conservation problems within the district and decides the best method of solving those problems," Buckley added.

Key topics presented at the training conference included discussions of the various soil and water conservation programs available to SWCDs through coordination efforts to the TSSWCB. Legal concerns relative to the operation of a SWCD as well as SWCD fiscal and employee responsibilities were additional topics ad-

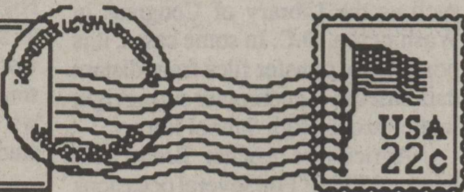

For awhile I could just forget the local politics - the attempt to elect someone who is deceased, the attempt at a "power grab" and all that. What poor taste. What absurdity! The same idea applies to the County Chairman - he can control the precinct chairmen. This is why it is very important to be aware of what is happening, unless the voters are made aware and STOP IT.

It is my understanding that should Kathryn's name be chosen and should her proponents control the precincts, then you can be assured who your next County Judge will be. Now you know what happened to that warm fuzzy feeling!

Voters need to be educated - they need to understand the process by which their leaders are nominated and elected. Not to understand this process is to allow incompetent leadership to prevail and I believe you will all agree that we've got enough of that to go around. That is why I must recom-

ment that we choose a person who is alive and well and capable of making decisions that will effect all of us.

Powerlifting Team Wins Third In Alpine

The Lions really roared as they lifted their way to a third place plaque in the Sul Ross University Powerlifting Meet held in Alpine Saturday, Feb. 26. The Ozona group placed third among eight teams competing.

The host team, Alpine, won the meet with a total score of 34 points; Kermit placed second with 31 points; Ozona placed third with 24 points; and Crane placed fourth with 12 points.

Lifting 420 pounds in a deadlift, Travis Davidson placed first in the 181 pound division. The 420 pounds which Davidson lifted is just five pounds less than the regional record. Davidson is also ranked fourth in the region.

Justin Moran, ranked fifth in the region, placed third in the 198 pound division.

In the 220 pound division, Luis Longoria, ranked ninth in the region, placed second, and Clay Westmoreland placed third.

Robert Bryson qualified as an alternate to the regional meet by placing third in the 148 pound division.

Stephen Montes placed fourth in the 168 pound division.

"Travis and Justin lifted way beyond what they have ever done before (their personal best)," said Coach Rod Schneider. "Luis did an incredible job after coming off an injury."

Schneider explained that Robert Bryson lifted 365 pounds from a deadlift position, which was his personal best lift. This, his second lift of three tries, qualified him for a chance to compete in the regional meet with a total lift weight of 875 pounds.

Schneider continued to explain that he said to Bryson, "Robert, you can assure yourself a berth in the regional meet by lifting 20 pounds more or just go with the weight you just completed." Robert replied, "I didn't travel here just to play it safe."

On his final try, Bryson unsuccessfully attempted to lift 385 pounds, which was 30 pounds more than he had ever lifted.

"I'm real proud of Robert Bryson," Schneider said.

The next meet will be the regional contest to be held on Saturday, March 12, in Kermit. The top 10 lifters in each class of this meet will then advance to the state meet.

The state meet will be held on Saturday, April 2, in College Station on the campus of Texas A&M University. Schneider said that Davidson has a good shot to make the state meet.

If you can follow the bouncing ball, an easy-to-watch sport is tennis. However, if your eyes aren't fast enough to watch the ball, you can follow the players.

Ozona High School is producing some excellent athletes and there are numerous players fans will want to watch in the tennis program.

According to OHS Tennis Coach Renee Schulze several Ozona players will definitely be state contenders. Senior Ryan Morris and junior Mickey White teamed up last year as

the number one boys' doubles team at OHS. They won third place in state last year and have pledged to win the state championship this year. Coach Schulze said, "I believe they will do just that."

According to Schulze, "Morris has the best touch on the ball that I've ever seen from a high school player." She added, "White's ground strokes are hard, low, and solid off the forehand and backhand."

Schulze noted, "Their play complements each others' style to form one of the most consistent teams I've had in a long time."

Look for these ladies to be fighting for the state championship--as they never give up. Positioning is the key to doubles, and fans may notice that these two have perfected their movement on the court.

Three boys will be competing for two singles' spots. They are senior Chris Cornett and sophomores Slate Williams and Dario Porras. All three have some of the best strokes on the team. Sophomore David Martinez and freshman Matt Brewer show a lot of promise for traveling with the varsity this year. Sophomore Cassie Martinez will play one of the girls' singles spots.

The new automated library at the high school offers a number of interesting and useful programs. Previous articles have discussed the catalog search program and word processing. In addition, several other options are now available in the automated library.

A college selection program purchased by counselor David McWilliams is available on one computer in the library. This program, "Peterson's College Selection Service 1994", helps students through the process of selecting a college or university that will best suit them. The program contains information on both two and four-year colleges.

The college selection program allows students to choose from more than 600 characteristics of potential colleges. The computer program will form a pool of colleges meeting criteria the student has selected. It will print out reports, give brief outlines of colleges included in the final list, and give information about costs, financial aid, deadlines, etc. A personalized letter of inquiry to colleges can be printed.

The college selection program is available to all Ozona High School students. Students at all levels from freshmen up should start thinking about college plans. "It's never too soon to start planning," says counselor McWilliams. This program can help students start thinking about what college characteristics are important to them. It can also guide students as they move through the college entrance process.

Another interesting feature of the automated library is the CD-ROM Encyclopedia of Mammals. The program is installed on one computer in the library. It contains text, sounds, maps, and motion clips - all about mammals. If you haven't seen a CD-ROM before, it's amazing. Lots and lots of information plus sound and animation, and it's all found on one little compact disk.

Another feature available to high school teachers at the OHS library is a computer connected to a modem. By using this computer, teachers can dial

a toll-free 800 number and be connected to TENET, a computer network of educators across the state of Texas. By going through TENET, educators can also get into INTERNET, an international network of computer users. It is possible to communicate electronically with other computer users. It is also possible to locate information in distant locations such as the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. In some cases, it is possible to transfer files from distant data bases to the computer sitting right in the Ozona High School library.

Agriculture teacher Brent Pool has used TENET on several occasions to get current information from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for use in his classes.

Through TENET an educator can gain access to information literally

anywhere in the world. Can you imagine? While you are reading this, thousands of people are communicating electronically through computers over telephone lines. An invisible electronic network criss-crosses the entire world 24 hours a day.

According to librarian Sherry York, "Technology is changing our world. Our job as educators at Ozona High School is to prepare our students to succeed in this rapidly changing world. The automated library is only a small part of this huge picture, but we're trying to do our part for the students of Crockett County."

The high school library will host an open house on Thursday, March 3, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. The public is cordially invited to come to the library and see what's happening in technology.
