Sutton Wins Democratic Primary

Jeffrey Sutton won the Democratic nomination for the November General Election Tuesday when voters gave a 959 vote show of support to 449 votes for the late Kathryn Mayfield.

In the district and county clerk's race, incumbent Debbi Puckett won a clear victory over challengers Nora Madris and Barbie Myers. Puckett received 873 votes, Madris 235, and Myers 331.

The Precinct 4 county commissioner's race went into a run-off between incumbent Rudy Martinez and Richard Vargas.

Martinez received 185 votes for Armando Robledo, 107 for

Richard A. Vargas and 72 for Jimmy Ortiz.

Fred Deaton, unopposed Pct. 2 commissioner, received 292 votes. Results of other unopposed local races were: Burl Myers, County Treasurer, Unexpired Term, 1038; James N. Hearne, Justice of the Peace 1071.

112th Judicial District Judge Brock Jones received 1091 votes.

In the write-in precinct chairman slots, numerous people received votes. These results will be "sorted out" Wednesday according to A. O. Fields, county Democratic Party chairman. The new committee members take office 20 days after the April 12 run-off election.

Trustees Renew All Teacher Contracts

Contracts were extended or renewed for all teachers in Ozona Public Schools when trustees met Monday night. Also renewed were the contracts for intermediate school librarian Donnie York, high school counselor David McWilliams and high school librarian Sherry York. In addition, one year contract extensions were approved for all coaching personnel.

School board members voted to release René Schulze from her teaching/coaching duties effective May 15. Ms. Schulze had asked to be released from her contract in order to accept a position as principal in Bandera.

The resignation of Coach Brad Brevard was accepted effective at the end of the 1993-94 school year. Brevard, who married Jan. 1, will move to Grapevine.

Architect Ron Barbutti met with the board and discussed arbitration being considered in connection with work done by N. C. Sturgeon company at the Ozona Primary School addition. Trustees voted to proceed with arbitration.

Barbutti's recommendation that the school pay Sturgeon \$2,200 for solar screens was approved.

Maintenance supervisor Ray Don Myers presented information on a security system for the junior high. The board asked that information be obtained from several companies for all school buildings.

Athletic director Don Payne told the board that Davidson Gym needs a face-lift. Many of the seats need replacing, and the type in the gym is no longer available. Payne suggested that the board consider replacing with fold-up seats. He also cited the need for re-tiling and for handicapped accessibility. A dropped ceiling to improve acoustics and mercury vapor lights were other improvements he mentioned.

Board president Gary Buck Mitchell agreed that the board needs "to bite the bullet and paint and re-

Filing Underway In May School Trustee Election

Crockett County's new method of electing school trustees by single-member districts goes into effect with the May 7 election. The county has been divided into six single-member districts and also has one at-large position.

The change will be implemented on a staggered basis as the terms of current trustees expire over the next three years. The two positions up for election this year are Districts 3 and 4.

Both board members whose terms expire, David Bean and Gary Buck Mitchell, live in District 4. Bean has already filed for a place on the ballot. Mitchell does not plan to seek re-election.

March 23 is the final day to file in this election. Applications for a place on the ballot are available at the school's administration building during regular business hours Monday through Friday. During spring break which is March 14-18, applications

will be available at the county judge's office. Applications may also be returned to that location during the week of spring break.

Maps of these two districts are on page 7 of this week's Stockman. Large maps are on display for public viewing at the school administration building and at the tax office.

A candidate must have lived in the trustee district he or she seeks to represent for six months prior to the filing deadline. During the term of office, he or she must continue to reside within the district he or she represents.

Voter registration cards are being prepared for this election and will be mailed to registered voters. April 7 is the last day to register to vote in the May 7 election.

The number of registered voters in each district as of March 7 is: Dist. 1 - 369, Dist. 2 - 529, Dist. 3 - 455, Dist. 4 - 434, Dist. 5 - 417, Dist. 6 - 469.

Persons wishing to file for a place on the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1 board have until March 23 to do so. Prospective candidates may contact Dee Keilers at the water district office for more information. Filing is also done at the district office.

Board members whose terms expire are Dan Davidson, Harold Shaw and Gene Perry. Other board members are Louis Bunger and Dennis Clark.

Early voting in the election begins April 18 and ends May 3 for the May 7 election. Early voting will be held at the district office at 511-11th Street from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m.

On May 7, voting will be at the courthouse between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Past Postmasters Honored In March 5 Ceremony

Past postmasters of Ozona were honored Saturday, March 5, at a 1 p.m. ceremony in the post office. At that time, framed photos of the postmasters were hung in the window service area after being presented to family members by Postmaster Ernie Tijerina Jones.

Former postmasters A. O. Fields and Floyd Hokit were in attendance. Fields, who was postmaster one year beginning in 1948, commented that before becoming postmaster he was in retail sales and he could see no point to buying stamps for three cents and selling them for three cents so he resigned.

Of Ozona's 15 postmasters, Floyd Hokit served the longest. He was postmaster from 1953 until his retirement in 1992.

J. R. Kersey became postmaster in 1922 and served until 1948. Madye Jo Humphrey, granddaughter of J. R. Kersey, was present to accept his photo. She recalled sitting in the stamp window at the post office many times as a small child. By doing so, she knew everyone and everyone knew her.

A comment by Mrs. Humphrey that this would be frowned on today drew a response from John Howard, manager of Postal Operations in Fort Worth. Mr. Howard said the postal service is working to achieve the friendly community-oriented atmosphere of the past.

The idea of displaying photographs in the post office originated with a comment made by Mrs. Humphrey, Postmaster Jones said. Jones' suggestion for the project to supervisors in the Fort Worth office was so well received that it was sent on to Washington and may be approved for implementation in post offices

Six Ozona High School students were inducted into Ozona's National Honor Society chapter Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

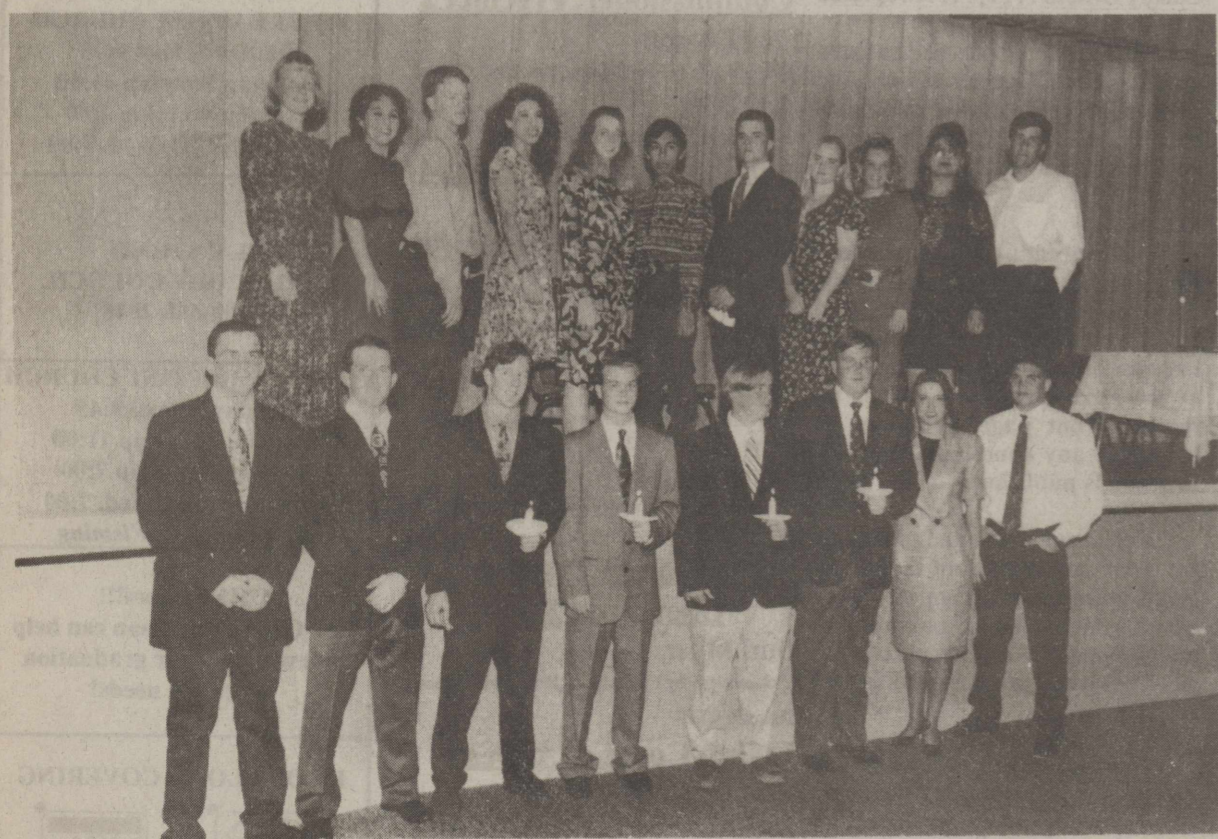

Totsy Hagelstein Service Held Tuesday

Totsy Hagelstein, a longtime Crockett County rancher, died Sunday, March 6, 1994, at her home. Funeral service was at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Ozona Church of Christ with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery directed by Preddy Funeral Home.



"Totsy" Hazel Nell Robison was born in Fort Stockton and educated in Ozona Public Schools. She was the daughter of P. T. Robison and Pearl Miller Robison, daughter of the Jones Millers, pioneer ranch couple of Crockett County. She attended Texas Tech in Lubbock her freshman year and transferred to Abilene Christian College where she graduated in 1938.

Totsy married Fredrick Baggett Hagelstein on June 17, 1941, in the Ozona Church of Christ.

Ranching was not new to Totsy since her parents had been ranchers always. But living 16 miles from town necessitated many adjustments for the newlyweds. The family lived at this ranch until they moved into Ozona when their son Rick started high school in 1961.

Fred and Totsy's main interests were improving their Rambouillet

sheep, Angora goats and Hereford cows. Most of all they enjoyed their family and friends.

Totsy has always been interested in civic affairs, and has served on the hospital board, as director of the chamber of commerce and was a member of the Crockett County Historical Commission, Bi-Centennial Committee, and a Planned Parenthood volunteer, past president of Crockett County Historical Society, and served on the board of directors of Crockett County Museum. She was a member of the Ozona Woman's Forum since 1938, serving as president in 1942-44. She was also a member of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. She was an active member of the Church of Christ for more than 60 years.

After Fred died in 1968, Totsy assumed the full responsibility of operating the ranch and continued to do so until the late 1980's. Her hobbies included photography, traveling, enjoying her Ozona friends, and those from college days, and especially being a grandmother, or as she was called being her grandchildren's "Great".

She was preceded in death by her husband, Fred, in 1968, and her daughter, Peggy Holden, in 1984.

She is survived by one son and daughter-in-law, Rick R. and Thomas Hagelstein of Waco; one son-in-law, Deene Holden of Ozona; one brother and sister-in-law, Miller and Eda Robison of Coleman; one sister and brother-in-law, Blanche and Lefty Walker of Ozona; five grandchildren, Ashley, Robby, Amber and Aubin Hagelstein of Waco and Haley Holden of Ozona; several dear nieces and nephews and countless friends across the country.

Nutrition Messages Not Always Reliable

It's National Nutrition Month—are you ready? Many of us may be trying to learn more about nutrition and health—for ourselves and our families. But where do you get your information? If you read it in a national magazine, it must be true, right? Maybe not! Some recent studies have shown an overall increase in nutrition claims in both magazine advertising and articles—particularly in what we consider "women's magazines".

One particular study found there were more claims in advertising within women's magazines mentioning lower fat, sugar or cholesterol in food and beverage products. Many of these claims were related to the U.S.D.A. dietary guidelines recommendations, and all were designed to appeal to consumer concerns about taste, convenience and quality.

Why are these particular magazines so full of nutrition information? Women tend to be more interested in nutrition information—after all, many of us are concerned with weight control, not to mention keeping our families healthy—and we get this information more from magazines and other forms of print media such as newspapers.

Some of the leading women's magazines have nutritionists, dieticians or home economists responsible for their nutrition articles of food/recipe sections. When they use research-based information, this certainly increases their reliability. However, readers need to beware of nutrition-related articles not written by qualified people such as those listed above.

Articles written by "popular" writers may make weight loss claims or claims for the use of certain nutrition supplements that are not true. One example is the publicity for chromium picolinate—touted for weight control. This substance hasn't been approved by the FDA for weight loss, and as usual, the claims aren't backed up by sufficient research and are simply "too good to be true." In fact, any claim that

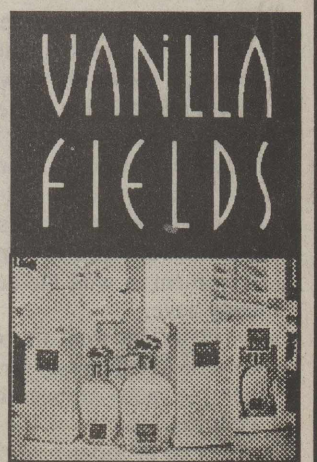
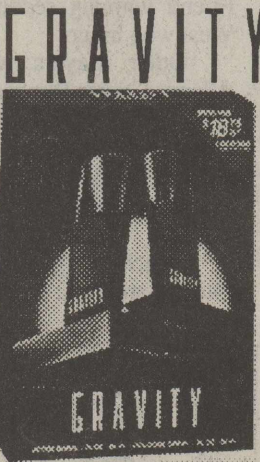

The team played 18 holes each day and shot a 401 on the first day. The Ladies shot a final round of 392 and finished with a two-day total of 793.


Heather Hill had the Ladies' low score for the tournament. She finished with a 94 and 92 for a total score of 186.

Special funding was available for this event, including a partial scholarship from the Crockett County Adult Leaders Association for two 4-H'ers, so the total cost from Friday evening through Sunday morning (meals included) will only be \$25 per person.

Free transportation will be provided to and from the leadership lab, but each county can only send two 4-H members, so space is on a first-come, first-served basis.

To register, 4-H members need to come by the Extension Office to complete the registration form and pay their \$25 before noon this coming

Friday, March 11th. Registration information and forms were mailed out in February, but more are available from the Extension Office.

"Even if you haven't been very active in 4-H in the past, we encourage you to attend. The results we've seen from our graduated senior 4-H members who attended the labs in the past speak for themselves about what in-

fluence activities of this type can have," said Ulmer.

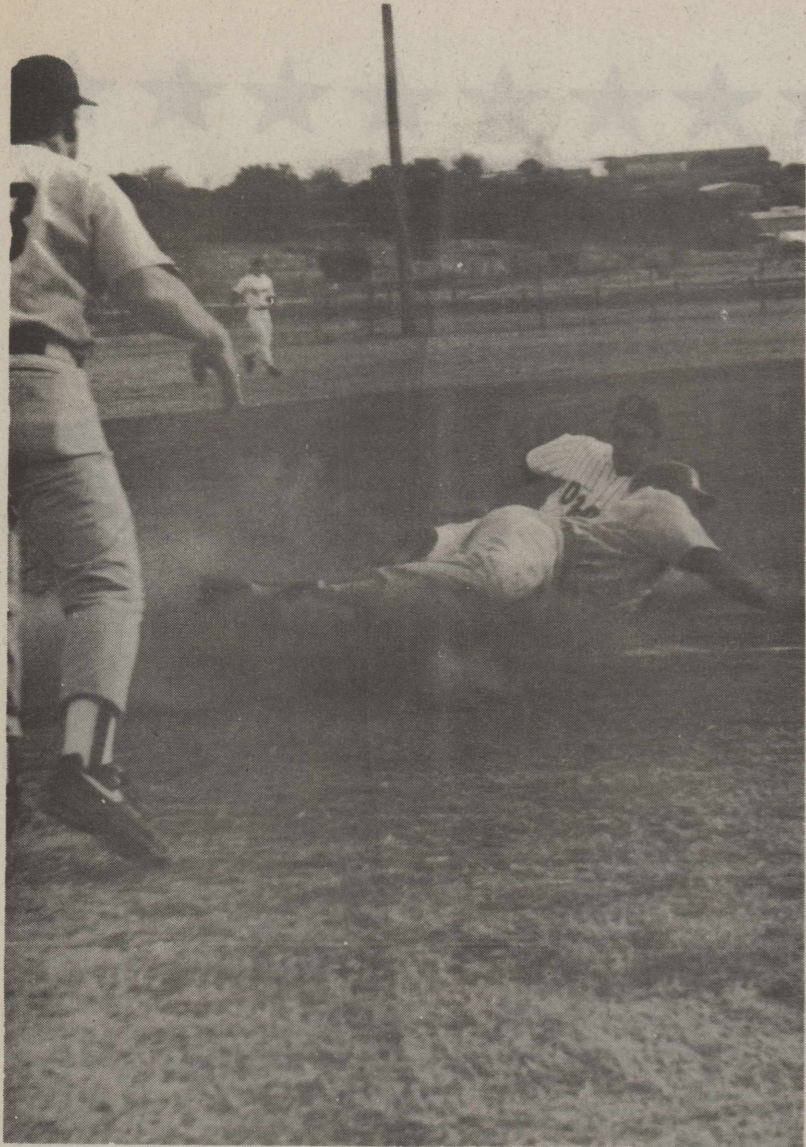

place seats". Myers was asked to look into paint, seats and handicapped accessibility.

Teacher Tamara Jones met with the board to recommend hiring a third reading teacher for Ozona Junior High School. The recommendation was made on the request of teachers' academic teams from all three grades at the school. Mrs. Jones said the school's two reading teachers "have to prepare for three separate grade levels with five content areas at each level; in effect, 15 separate areas in which to work."

At the recent Texas Middle School Conference in Houston, some of Ozona's 8th grade teachers attended a lecture by a Texas Education Agency representative which included statistics on high and low performing schools with the same demographic make-up. Schools with greater success rates had 5-member academic teams at each level which included reading teachers to be a facilitator in teaching of content reading and core vocabulary in all academic core classes.

The board agreed to take a close look at the request.

The school district has received \$3,947.93 as additional reimbursement for Severe Need Breakfast for 1992-93. This money must be spent in food services, and the board voted to amend the budget to allow cafeteria manager Evelyn Keith to purchase two toasters, a heated cabinet and microwave.

A budget amendment was also approved to pay for tennis court repair.

Trustees voted to call an election on May 7. Places up for election will be in districts 3 and 4. (see related story).

Following a textbook committee report, trustees voted to adopt all titles as recommended.

Board members were given the finalized basketball schedule for next year. The schedule will reduce travel by playing games at most distant sites on a Friday-Saturday arrangement. As an example, Ozona would play at Anthony on Friday and Van Horn the next day, thereby eliminating one long trip.

Jose Flores met in executive session with the board regarding an incident in Davidson Gym Feb. 18 during the Ozona-Coahoma basketball game.

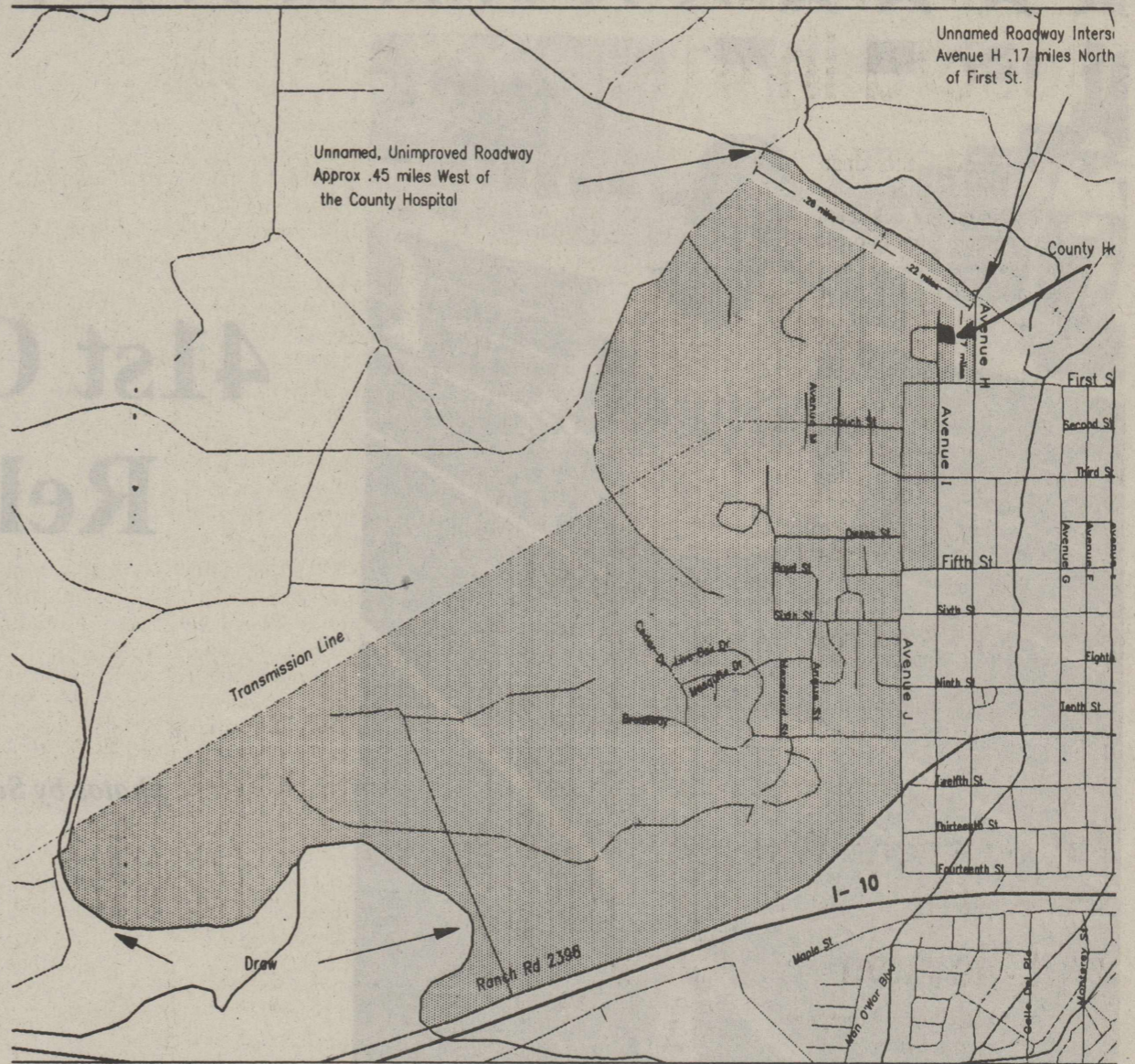

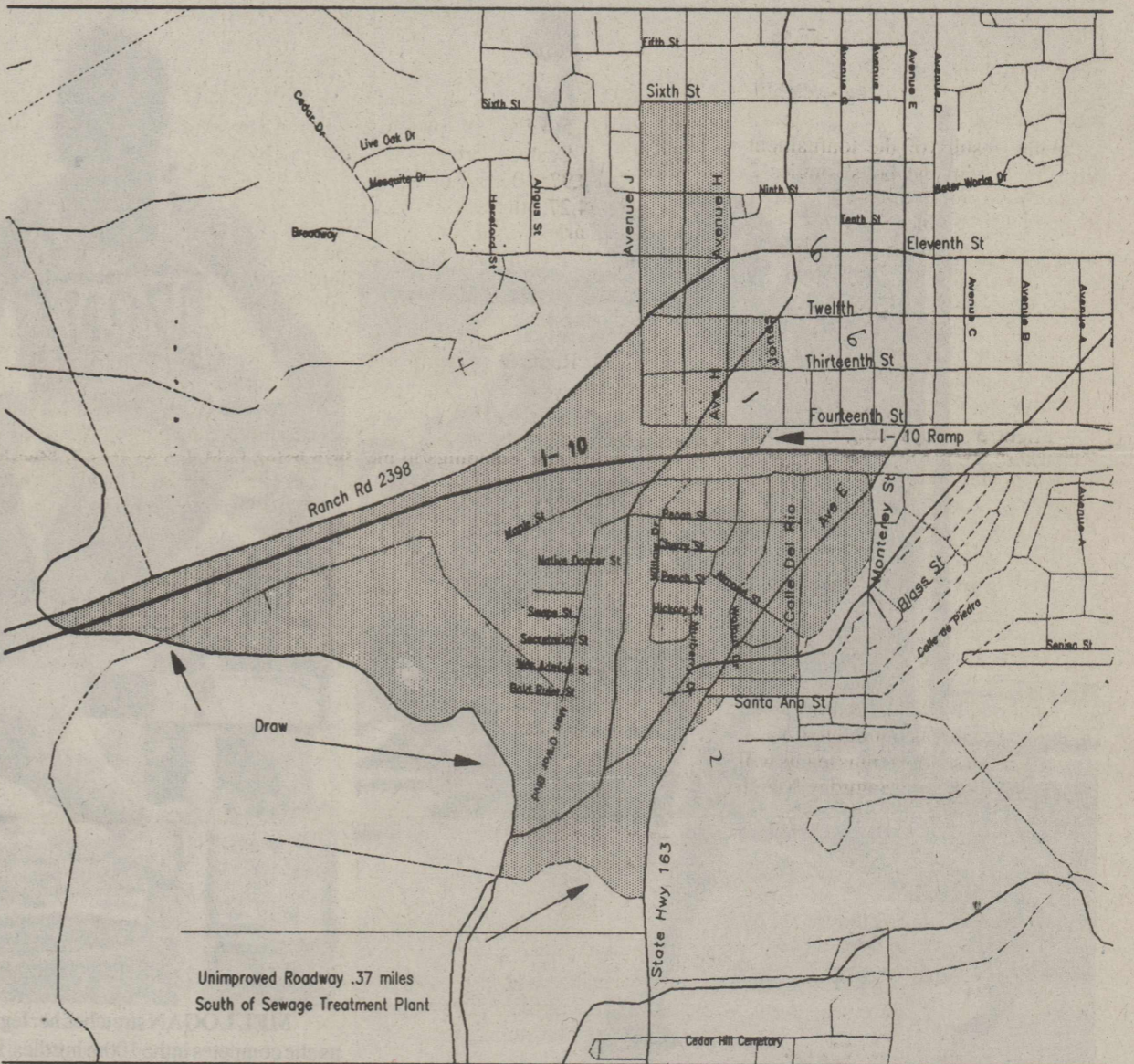

SHADED AREA SHOWS SCHOOL TRUSTEE DISTRICT 3

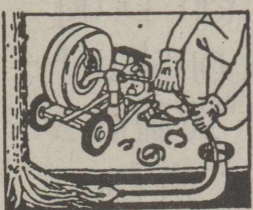

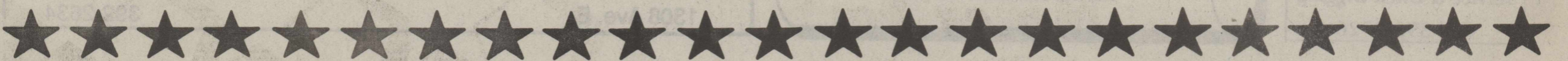

Career Day Set For Junior High

Ozona Junior High School seventh and eighth grade students will have the opportunity to examine a number of career options in-depth during the first annual Career Day on Thursday, March 10th.

Co-sponsored by the school and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the career day is designed to give Ozona students a personalized look at the world of work.

Speakers from seven different career areas—of which students will attend three—will be featured during the afternoon-long event. They include:

*Computers—Steve Paz, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Computer Specialist from San Angelo. A graduate of Texas Tech, Paz has taught at the university level and has been with Extension for two years.

*Military—TSGT Daniel C. Day, US Air Force Recruiter from San Angelo, whose primary specialty is military police. He is a trained arson investigator, hostage negotiator, and special weapons team leader who has traveled to nearly all the continental United States and seven countries overseas.

*Social Services—Phyllis Velez, Child Protective Services Specialist, is a graduate of Angelo State University with a degree in sociology. She's been with the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services for five years, since graduation.

*Medical—Joyce Duncan, staff recruiter with Shannon Medical Center, has a B.S. in nursing from Texas Woman's University and currently recruits for Shannon in areas such as physical therapy, occupational therapy, and nursing. She will give a presentation on health careers.

*Engineering—Paul Chevalier of the Texas Department of Transportation in Sonora will discuss how a career day helped him discover his eventual career in engineering, plus the options students may find in various areas of engineering.

*Dental Hygiene—Personnel from Howard College's Dental Hygiene program will discuss opportunities in this field. Amy Burchett, Dean of Students from the college, also plans to discuss how she arrived at her present position after graduating with a degree in psychology, to emphasize the many options people have in choosing a career.

*Agriculture—Art Roane of the Double T Ranch in Ozona will discuss career options for both men and women in agriculture, and the many skills used every day in running an agricultural enterprise.

"The idea behind the sessions is to expose the junior-high age youth to new ideas and new career opportunities they may never have thought about," said Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent-Home Economics, who was involved with a team of seventh-grade teachers and the school administration in developing the course and contacting prospective speakers. The agent added that each speaker will emphasize the kinds of

skills and abilities common to every job or career, and encourage the students to set goals for themselves in both their education and chosen careers.

"We want to thank the Ozona Woman's League for providing special funding, and the Ozona Chamber of Commerce for providing their super Ambassadors to greet each speaker and make him or her at home," said Ulmer.

"Special recognition should go to Principal Tom Humber and his staff, particularly the seventh-grade team who helped to plan and carry out the event," said Ulmer. She noted that the students were originally surveyed about what career areas they were interested in; the suggestions were developed into a master list, then Ulmer was able to contact people who could discuss a wide number of career opportunities related to those fields.

The teachers also handed out a final survey, and students were asked to rank their choices. The students were put into sessions as much as possible in their first, second, and third choices, with eighth-graders the first to be assigned. Except for preference to the eighth graders, student surveys were collected and students assigned in random order.

"We hope the career day and a college day can become annual events for our students here in Ozona," said Ulmer, who noted a special "Leadership Ozona" course for selected youth will be held in the fall. The purpose of these activities is to develop leadership and life skills among Ozona's youth, and to give them the ability to set high goals for their future.

"This is just one example of what can be accomplished when we all work together for the good of our young people," noted the agent.

Let's Fix Our Welfare System

Welfare. Just hearing that word brings mixed images to mind: hopelessness, depression, dependency. The word also brings thoughts of frustration and resentment to the minds of the taxpayers who are forced to pay for a bad government system.

While there needs to be some kind of temporary welfare assistance for people who are out of work and need help getting back on their feet, the welfare system unfortunately has become a permanent "solution" for too many people who have lost all hope for the future. At least 65 percent of people who receive any welfare remain in the welfare system for eight years or even longer. Something must be done to fix this system that traps generations of families in a cycle of despair.

One solution is to require people who are on the welfare rolls for more than two years to work for their benefits. Earning the checks will promote self-sufficiency and self-worth.

In addition, we should emphasize the responsibility of fathers to support their children. There should be new standards for establishing paternity, as well as requirements for mandatory

work or a full-fledged job search by unemployed fathers.

We also need to establish tough new standards to combat illegitimate births. Unmarried mothers under the age of 18 should stay with their parents and off the welfare rolls. We should also encourage states to reduce cash welfare benefits for families that do not assure that their children attend school regularly.

Moreover, non-citizens of the United States should not be eligible to receive welfare.

We need to do everything we can to establish a more effective welfare system that will provide incentives to get off welfare - education, work skills training, work experience and job search assistance - while saving taxpayers' money. Instead of propelling welfare recipients into the downward spiral of expensive government handouts and permanent desperation, we should reform the system to help welfare recipients gain self-reliance, keep their self-respect and climb the ladder to successful and independent lives.

Texas Gas Production At 5-Year High Says Nabers

AUSTIN, Texas, March 1--"Texas not only led the nation in gas production in 1993, the state produced more gas than any year since 1988," Railroad Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said today as she released natural gas production statistics.

"We are at a five-year high and that is good economic news," Nabers said.

"We improved the 1993 volume of gas 3 percent over last year and that total may even increase as late production reports are filed," said Nabers.

"At \$2 for each MCF (thousand cubic feet) of gas, the 158 million additional MCF in 1993 is worth \$316 million dollars more for Texas. More than \$40 million in additional taxes will be collected and the total economic impact is over \$1 billion dollars."

Nabers said the Railroad Commission's programs to encourage

the use of natural gas and other clean burning fuels are beginning to kick in.

"Here's the proof," said Nabers. "In 1993 total domestic consumption of natural gas in all sectors was nearly a trillion cubic feet higher than it was as recently as two years ago. "Promoting use of our rich Texas resources such as natural gas and propane means everyone in Texas reaps the rewards."

Texas Cattle Women Encourage Texas Entries For Beef Cook-Off

Texas amateur cooks have until June 1 to enter the national Beef Cook-Off and be selected as one of 15 finalists who will compete for \$45,000 in cash prizes and the title of the nation's top beef cook. Each of the 15 finalists also will receive an all-expense paid trip to the national competition Sept. 22-23 at Little Rock, Ark.

Entries must be postmarked by June 1, 1994, and received by June 7, 1994. Anyone except food professionals is eligible to enter. For more specific rules, contact the national Beef Cook-Off at P. O. Box 3240, Chicago, IL 60654.

No one from Texas has ever won the National Beef Cook-Off even though it is the nation's largest beef producing state. It's time for that to change, says the Texas Cattle Women, one of the contest's sponsoring organizations.

"We came close to winning it all with a third place finish in the indoor competition at the 1993 national competition," says Texas Cattle Women President Anita Brown of Wheeler. "As thrilling as that was, it now is time to go for the top award. The home kitchens of this state have more original beef recipes than any other state in the nation. Let's get those recipes out and compare them to the best of the other states."

The rules for entries must be followed exactly. A recipe must be original. It must use no more than eight ingredients (excluding salt, black pepper and water). Garnishes must be made from those ingredients. Preparation and cooking times, including marinating time, must be less than 60 minutes. The beef cut selected must be appropriate for the recipe. It must use at least 1 pound and no more than 2 pounds of beef.

HOUSTON - If your child claims to be allergic to school, it may be the truth.

Many youngsters are exposed to allergens in school, and the allergens can trigger asthma attacks, said Dr. Benjamin Interiano of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Asthma is the leading cause of school absenteeism, Interiano said. It accounts for 10 million lost school days per year.

Asthma attacks can be caused by allergies to dust and mold. Chalkboards, plants, dusty carpets and chemicals used for art and science projects can also be culprits.

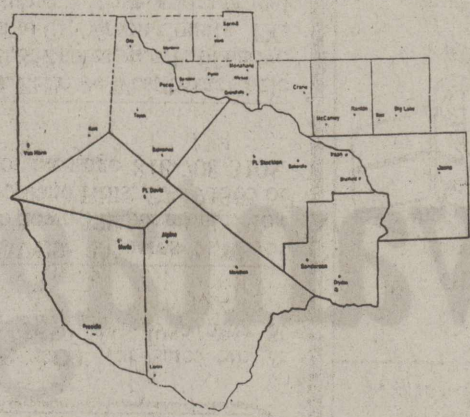
