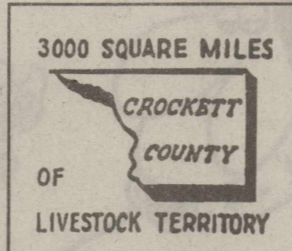

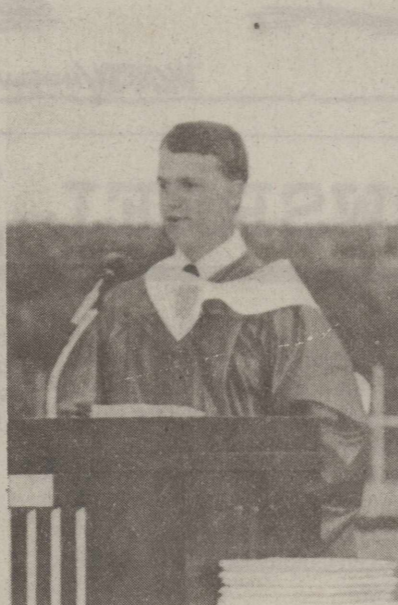
Morris also received the Woman's League scholarship which was presented by Becky Childress.

Steffy Sutton received the Dan Bean 4-H Memorial Scholarship from David Bean and the Family and Community Education Association

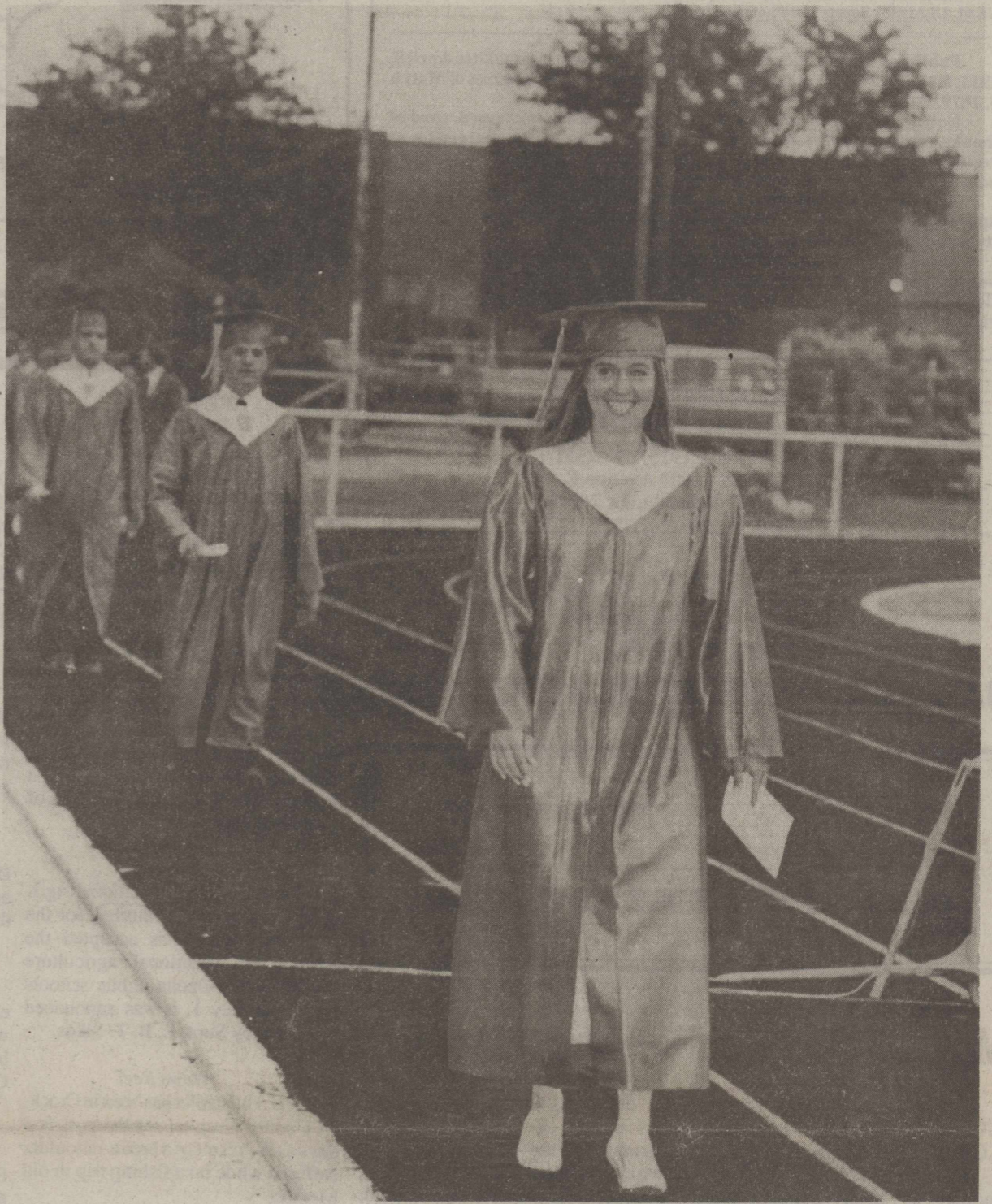
scholarship presented by Tedra Ulmer. Jimmy Ortiz presented a scholarship from the Knights of Columbus to Frankie Moran Jr.

After 26 years in teaching, 18 of those years in Ozona, Darla Jones has retired. The vivacious Mrs. Jones brings the same enthusiasm to retirement that she exhibited in the classroom.

High on her list of priorities is to do volunteer work in the community. "I want to do volunteer work because Ozona's given a lot to us," she said. This is one way to say thanks to the community.

Yard work, cooking - "I love new recipes" - and later a part time job will fill some of the hours no longer devoted to teaching.

"I have so many good memories." Together with parents, teachers and students can accomplish so much, Mrs. Jones said. She is a firm believer in departmentalization of studies for young students. This benefits the teachers as well as students.

Her teaching career includes schools in Abilene, Austin, Corpus Christi, Pasadena, CA, and Honolulu, HA, in addition to Ozona. Grades one, two, six and four have benefitted from her teaching through the years

A native of Abilene, she is a graduate of Abilene High School and earned a degree at McMurry in Abilene. She has done additional studies at the University of Texas at Austin, New York University and Penn State.

An end of school party honoring Mrs. Jones gave co-workers opportunity to say their farewells. Their gift to her was a huge basket filled with items such as potpourri, picture frames, cook books and stationery.

"I'm going to miss my comrades," she said.

Her husband, Fred Jones, is a teacher at Ozona Junior High. Their daughters are Lisa and Jennifer Colin. Lisa lives in an Angelo where she is studying toward a master's degree in psychology at Angelo State University. She is employed at Concho Valley Home for Girls. Jennifer, an English/Spanish major at Texas Tech in Lubbock, plans to go to law school.

Regional Airport Meeting Has Some Good News For Ozona

In an area meeting May 25 in Ozona, groups from Sonora, Eldorado, Big Lake and Ozona met with representatives of the Texas Division of Aviation, a department of the Texas Department of Transportation. Representing TxDOT were: David S. Fulton, director; George Dresser, Michelle Hanna and Charles Riordon.

The TxDOT personnel discussed the Aviation Facilities Development Program as it concerns each community and reviewed and updated information presented by citizens and elected officials concerning the airports, communities and resources.

Speaking for Crockett County was commissioner Fred Deaton who is a pilot. Jimmy Thompson of J. Cleo Thompson, owner of one of the jets which uses the local airport on a regular basis, gave an upbeat statement regarding the area and the oil and gas industry. Lisa Branch spoke on behalf of Union Pacific Resources. This company has two jets using the Ozona airport.

In addition to these jets, there is other business and travel related air traffic into Crockett County. Also, there are 29 planes based in Crockett County at present.

The request for a grant for airport improvements at Ozona Municipal Airport was discussed. "We were sad to learn that actual work would probably not be until fall of 1996 or even into 1997," said Jim Hearne. "However, the good news was that progress was being made, and there was a slight chance of relief in the form of legislative change in both the amount of money available and in applying aid where it was most needed. There was also good news concerning the approval of an instrument landing approach for Ozona in the near future.

Michael Sharp Case Continues

An order withdrawing the stay of execution of Michael Eugene Sharp was filed May 12, 1994, in U. S. District Court in San Angelo. The order by U. S. District Judge Sam R. Cummings withdraws a stay entered July 11, 1990. The stay originally entered indefinitely staying any orders for execution was also withdrawn.

Sharp was convicted and sentenced to death by a Crockett County jury for the June 11, 1982, stabbing murder of Mrs. Brenda Kay Broadway of Kermit. His first execution date was set for March 24, 1988.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeal granted Sharp a 60-day stay of execution only seven days before he was scheduled to die.

An appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court was rejected later that year and a second execution date set for May 10, 1989. Two days before the May execution date, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals granted an indefinite stay.

Sharp's third execution date was set for July 18 of 1989. A stay of execution resulted when an appeal lawyer asked for a federal habeas

corpus petition. In a March 1992 hearing on the petition, attorneys claimed Sharp did not receive a fair trial.

The case was assigned to a U. S. Magistrate Judge for findings, conclusions and a recommendation, which he filed on Sept. 8, 1993. Sharp's attorney was allowed to file a supplemental pleading and a supplemental evidentiary hearing was held.

Supplemental findings, conclusions and recommendation were filed by the judge April 28, 1994, and objections were filed May 11 by Sharp's attorney.

A judgement was filed the following day dismissing with prejudice Sharp's petition for a writ of habeas corpus and denying all relief sought through the petition.

Sharp's attorneys filed a motion to alter and amend this judgement on May 26.

Ozona Wool & Mohair Sells 212,000 Pounds Of Spring Short Wools

A private treaty sale handled by Ozona Wool and Mohair involved 212,000 pounds of spring short wools. It brought 88¢ to \$1.04 per pound, averaging 96¢ a pound

At the American Wool and Mohair Association sale held May 23 in San Angelo, 1.3 million pounds of wool was sold from warehouses in Ozona, Mertzon, Eden and Sonora. Approximately 200,000 lbs. was offered from

Ozona. Most of the wool was sold clean with prices for three inch staple wool with bellies out. Prices ranged from \$2.426 to \$3.426 per pound clean. Wools that were table skirted and classed are included at a 15¢ per pound clean premium over these prices.

Grease prices for this wool ranged from \$1.20 per pound to slightly over \$2.00 per pound.

5-27-94...Elizabeth Clark reported the theft of a mobile telephone from her vehicle while it was parked on Beall Street.

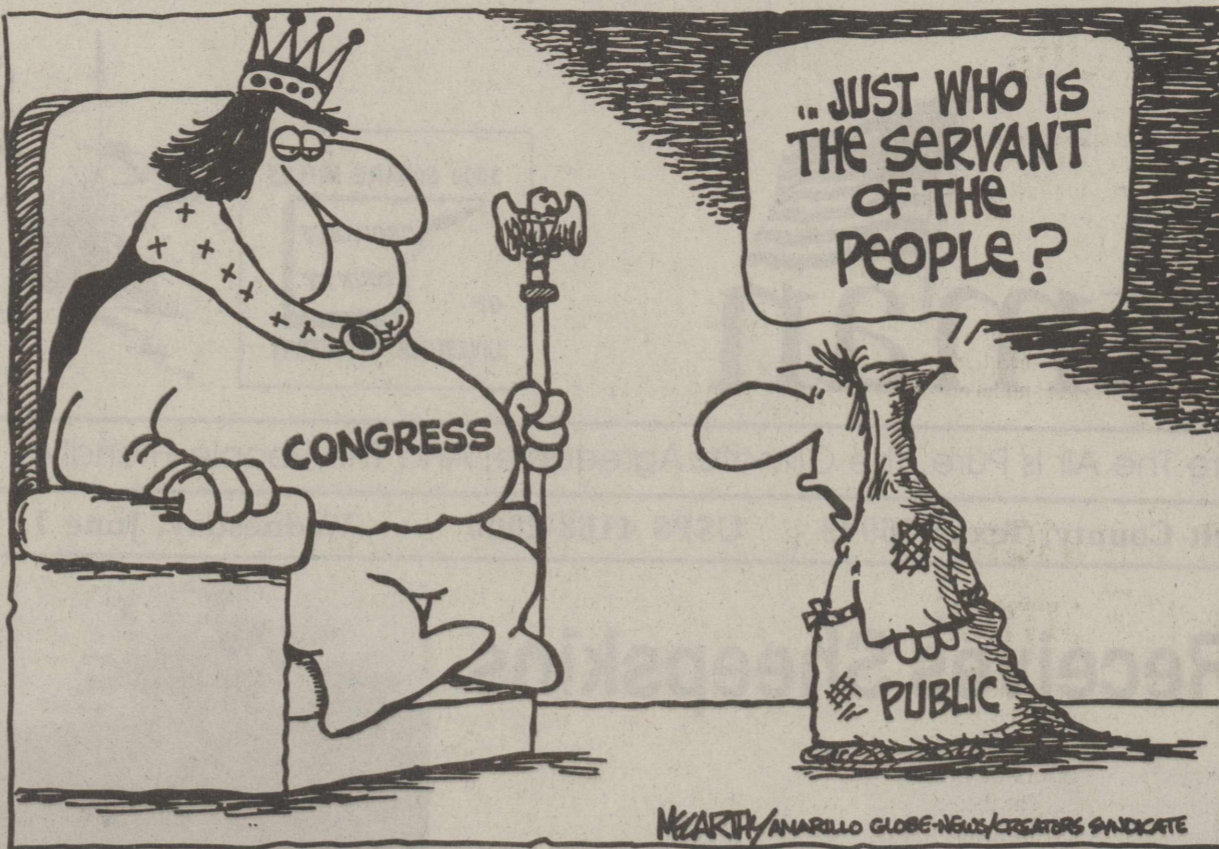
5-27-94...Glenn Burns reported the theft of two coats and a calculator from his vehicle while it was parked on Angus Street.

He was hired in Kerrville Feb. 13, 1994, and is on patrol from 5 p.m. to 3 a.m. Friday through Monday.

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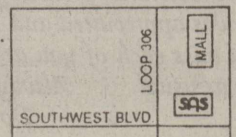


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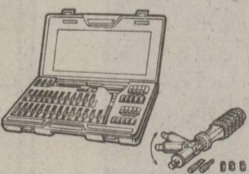
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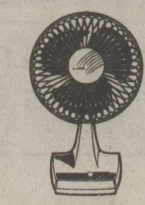
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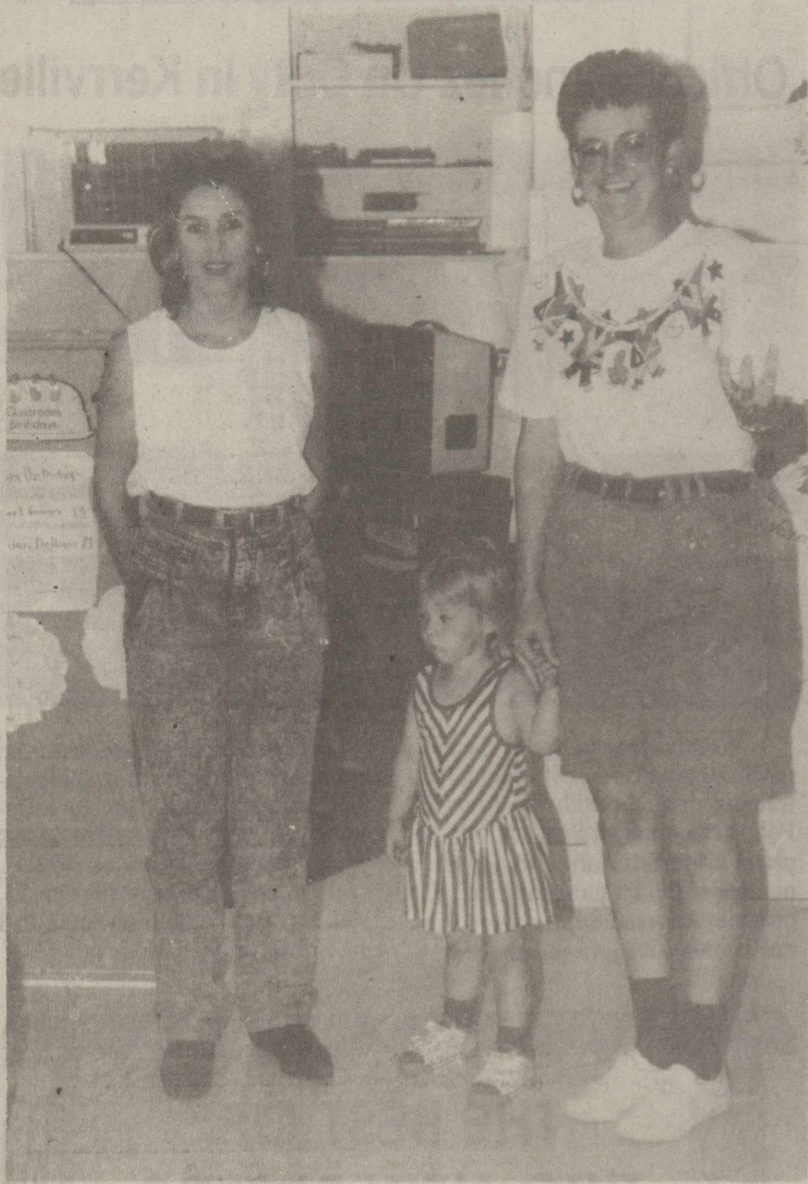

New Prison Ministry In West Texas

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice forecast a dramatic increase to 143,000 inmates, which is up from 65,000 in only 700 days. TDCJ Director of Chaplains Jerry Groom, along with Kathy McVey, assistant direct of Treatment and Program Services, gave those statistics. "There are many who are non-violent or who are property offenders," McVey said. "We are going to do something that is new, and we have strong support from the governor on this. We have 12,000 additional substance abuse beds that are funded. There will be 22,000 beds in that state jails division which is a new concept for the State of Texas. These will be located mainly in urban settings and 6,000 of these beds will be used for probationers." In other expansion plans, the state will build some 10,000 new state jail transfer facilities. The state transfer facilities are a method of keeping inmates out of county jails. They can stay there for up to a year.

In 1986, Jerry and Tommie Hatfield of Iraan had a revelation that there would be many prisons in the West Texas area, and they would be a part of the work in this area.

"The Bible does not say to condone criminal behavior, nor do we," said the Hatfields. "There are indeed criminals, game players and convicts in prison. But in the last eight years, we have grown to know many of those that truly have had their lives mentally, emotional and spiritually changed. We have worked side by side with hundreds of them in all phases of ministry."

The Hatfields have gained experience over the years, and they have been educated in prison life first-hand. They have worked in almost every state unit, and some federal units in Texas. They have directed and coordinated many different programs within

the prison system and outside their community.

One of the most productive programs in the system would be the marriage seminar. This was their main focus in the last six years while working in a former ministry. They have witnessed and been a part of the powerful effect of a family program. They plan to continue that family focus as Southwest Texas Prison Ministry & Family Outreach, and they would like to target the southwest Texas area.

Southwest Texas Prison Ministry & Family Outreach is a non-profit Christian organization devoted to ministering to the special needs of inmates and families who suffer the heartbreak of separation - those who have a deep desire to rebuild that which has been tragically torn apart by social deviation resulting from human error. Chaplain Groom said the volunteer says to the offender that "We the

community want to be here, and we believe that you are a worthwhile creation of our Lord. And, we want to help you reintegrate back into the community."

As part of Southwest Texas Prison Ministry & Family Outreach's fundraising efforts, a half of beef will be given away at Alley Oop Park June 4, 1994. The Dangers Of Lightning

A typical summer day begins with clear and sunny skies. By late afternoon a rapidly developing thunderstorm approaches. Electrical storms may be fascinating to watch, but they also can be extremely dangerous.

West Texas Utilities Company and the National Safety Council recommend the following important safety measures to follow when encountering lightning during severe thunderstorms.

The most dangerous place to be during a storm is in an open area - a field, a golf course, on a boat or in the water.

Whether you are swimming or in a boat, you are surrounded by water, which is a very good conductor. Get out of and away from all water when a storm is approaching.

During storms (or even when the skies look threatening, since lightning often strikes during the calm before a storm) stay off hilltops and out of open fields. Golf courses and baseball fields are extremely dangerous places to be in a storm.

When seeking refuge, choose it carefully - bad shelters can be worse than no shelter at all. Seeking shelter under a tree might seem like a good idea, but it's not. Trees are tall and attract lightning.

Since dry wood is not a good

conductor, an electrical current may jump from a tree to a nearby person before reaching the ground.

When caught in a storm, get rid of all metal objects such as golf clubs, fishing rods and tennis rackets. Get off golf carts and bicycles. Stay away from conductors of electricity such as wire fences, power lines, clothes lines, metal pipes and railroad tracks.

A large, grounded or steel-framed building is the best place to be in an electrical storm. A metal top car or truck with closed windows is also safe because the vehicle's frames will deflect the lightning charge to the ground.

A common misconception people have is that you are safe from lightning once inside the home. The home is full of objects that act as conductors. Keep away from windows, fireplaces, stoves, sinks, bathtubs and plugged-in electrical appliances.

If you are caught out in a field or golf course far from adequate shelter and your hair begins to stand on end you may be about to be struck by lightning. Immediately drop to your knees, bend forward and place your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat. This position, although providing a higher profile than lying flat, has the advantage of minimum contact with the earth.

Lightning is one of nature's spectacular showcases, but it is unpredictable and can pose a serious threat to our safety. Respect the dangers of lightning and always take precautionary measures during a thunderstorm.

Ozona Intermediate School Library News Update

The 1993-94 school year has seen lots going on in the library at the Ozona Intermediate School. The library has done a "booming" business this year. Over 11,500 books were checked out! This averages to approximately 58 books per student. These astounding figures can be attributed to the Accelerated Reading program which was begun in the library last year. This program rewards the students for their reading efforts. Students earn rewards by taking tests on the computer over books they have read. The children choose from over 1570 AR titles which have tests in the computer. When a child takes a test and earns points, he or she is immediately rewarded with a prize of candy or gum. Larger prizes are earned when various points are achieved.

Other prizes included class trips to eat pizza when everyone in the class earned 12 points, trips to Seminole Canyon, the Y-O Ranch in Kerrville and the BIG trip to Fiesta Texas in San Antonio. The program is helping the children to appreciate reading and improve their reading ability as well. The top ten readers in the school with points earned during the entire year are: Yvette Ortiz-381.1, Josh Tambunga-210.1, Codi Richardson-177.6, Cody Webb-170.4, Laramie McWilliams-168.3, Jason Davis-140.3, Rebecca Phillips-140.0, Paige Tambunga-117.5, Roman Castaneda-114.8 and Pablo Reyes-112.8.

Several people deserve recognition for continued support of the library as we put technology to use more and more. These include Jane Richardson for her help in setting up and maintaining the Accelerated Reading program and donating her time as well as money to help things run smoothly. The students especially appreciate all the treats donated as prizes from Dairy Queen. Also deserving recognition are Mr. Holmes, who has "found" money for needed items from time to time, the entire faculty who have been very supportive and helpful, and the board mem-

bers who have given their approval overwhelmingly, as well.

The library sponsored two book fairs this year. Book fairs give students access to quality books at reasonable prices without leaving town. They also benefit the library because profits are used to buy books or other needed items.

At this time, librarian Donnie York and library aide Kathy Hall, are bar-coding and changing call number labels on all library books to prepare for automation of the library. By next fall, students will check books using the computerized system. Plans are in the works to have a computer catalog in operation some time next year.

In May the planned library automation project for the Intermediate School Library was begun. The first phase of the library automation project was started with the purchase of a computer with CD-ROM drive, printer, barcode reader, bar codes, and library circulation software. Funding was provided by the school's site-based committee from award money received from the Texas Education Agency for excellent T.A.A.S. performance. Equipment and software for the second phase of the automation project will be purchased with Chapter 2 funds.

The Intermediate School Library is one of three in the Ozona Public School district fortunate to be connected with an interactive telecommunications network in our library. This network, known as TENET, was set up to help schools get on-line for a small fee. (This program is similar to America On-Line and Prodigy.) Teachers may log on and get an email address and password for only \$5.00. This opens a whole world of possibilities for sharing ideas with students and teachers in other districts, obtaining information of all kinds and provides access to the Internet, which is worldwide.

It has been an exciting year at the library, and library personnel, teachers, and students are looking forward to another year of reading and more assistance from computer technology!

Boating Safety Urged

June 5-11 is National Boat Safety Week. Game Warden Chuck Cosper offers the following tips to make your boating safer.

Be sure to wear a life jacket. Even an expert swimmer is not safe without one.

Overloading a boat can be fatal. Don't do it. Check the U. S. Coast Guard load rating stamped on your boat.

Alcohol and open water don't mix. Drinking can dull the judgement and ability of any boater, swimmer and other water recreationist.

Tell someone onshore where you're going and when to expect you back. File a "float plan".

Ensure your safe return. Check fuel and equipment before leaving shore. Make sure everything is in good working order.

Never ignore weather warnings or signs of unexpected bad weather. Check the forecast.

Guard against fire onboard. Carry a fire extinguisher, and air the boat thoroughly before start-up, especially after fueling.

Frequently check your wake to see how it affects others in the water, and adjust your speed accordingly. Pay close attention to "No Wake" areas.

Understand that the skipper is responsible for the safety of all on board, and it is his or her duty to see that everyone knows and complies with safety measures.

Never start your engine until you have visibly checked to see that everyone is well clear of the prop and out of danger.

Stay with the boat if it capsizes. Most boats will float swamped, and you will be easier to spot in the water.

Avoid swimming areas, and keep a sharp lookout for swimmers, divers, and fallen skiers.

Follow navigation rules for boat traffic from the pocket guide "Boating in Texas", available from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

Ozona High School senior Anthony Sanchez competed in the Great Southwest Classic Track Meet in Phoenix, AZ, May 28. The junior and senior invitational track meet was represented by one to two members in each of the 17 events from the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado.

Sanchez was chosen to compete in the 300m intermediate hurdles by a Texas committee. As a Texas representative, Sanchez was one of four members on the 400m and the 1600m relay teams. The Texas team was composed of senior Henry Hollins of El Paso Eastwood, senior Willie Mata of Pecos, senior Anthony Sanchez of Ozona and junior Kevin Ross of Temple. This team placed second in the mile relay with a time of 3:15.76. Sanchez started the relay by running the first leg in 49.6 seconds. Ross was replaced by another runner from El Paso Eastwood in the 400m relay. This Texas team placed sixth with a time of 42.8 seconds.

Some fine and speedy athletes represented Texas. Sanchez said Willie Mata of Pecos is one of the top five runners in the 400m dash in the Nation. "Two out of the four guys I ran with were nationally ranked in the 400m dash," said Sanchez.

Accompanying Sanchez from El Paso to Phoenix were Dan Cook, Willie Mata, David Mata and Coach Victor Torren of Pecos.

Sanchez will be competing in the 300m hurdles at the West Texas Area Track Meet in Iran on Friday. This is a junior master meet which includes ages 8-18.

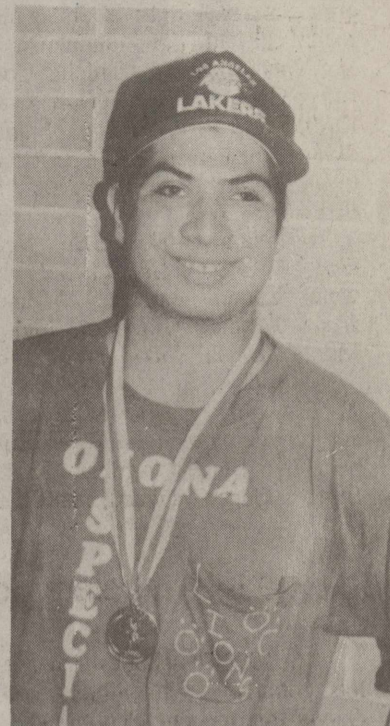
Fierro Wins The Gold In Austin

The TAHC's June 22 meeting is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. and will be held at the commission's offices at 2105 Kramer Lane in north Austin.

"ICA needs to be well represented at the TAHC's June 22 public meeting," said ICA President Wayne Dierlam. "If you can't attend personally, please send our State ICA office a letter voicing your opposition, and we will see it gets to the right people."

Special Education Program Going Strong

The Special Education Program has served 11 students during the 1993-94 school year. The new guidelines for special education put out by TEA are changing the format in which we attack the learning needs of these children. TEA is mandating that these children be mainstreamed in a regular classroom for the majority of the school day. They are also mandating that 90% of all the special ed population take the TAAS and that 90% of the 90% must pass one portion of the test. Therefore, next year a large amount of time will be spent teaching test taking skills and the skills required for the TAAS.

This year we have focused on the basics of reading, writing and arithmetic. We have also helped these students in science, health, and social studies by highlighting text, modifying both class work and test; and taping the textbooks. April Barrera and

James Swearingen have taken several field trips to local merchants to practice skills they were studying and to practice them in real life situations.

Several students have excelled in the Accelerated Reader Program. Pablo Reyes, James Swearingen, and Maria Mata all earned enough points to attend the Y.O. Ranch trip on May 2. Pablo Reyes earned 100 points, and earned the "Big Trip" to Fiesta Texas on May 6. Pablo also won the Ice Cream Challenge to read at least 50 points from January to May and was taken to Dairy Queen for a banana split by Mrs. Hearn. The most improved reading award was given to Johnny Rodriguez. Most improved language was given to Lucy Alcaez. Most improved math was given to April Barrera and most improve overall was given to James Swearingen.

All the students have worked very hard to do their best and Mrs. Hearn is proud of their diligent work and effort.

Mastery Lab Helping Slow And Fast Learners

The Content Mastery Lab or the Lion's Den has been in operation since the spring of 1993. At that time the program consisted of an idea to assist all students to achieve their potential and to help those students in particular who were struggling in their work.

In the fall of 1993 the school district hired a Chapter I instructional aide, Sylvia Lara, to help implement the program. Through the help of Mrs. Lara and other staff members the Lion's Den has served almost all the students at the intermediate school in one way or another. The struggling students were assisted by a multi-sensory approach of reteaching, modifying materials, highlighting text

books and modifying tests. The gifted students were allowed to help in the tutoring process and given fun projects to do. Morning and afternoon tutorials were available whenever a student needed them.

Although the program has been successful there is always room for improvement. Plans are being made at this time to provide better communication between the lab and the parents of the at-risk student. Better communication between the teachers and lab is also needed. The purchase and implementation of the sensational CEI Reading Lab, which is a program that neighboring school districts are using with 2 to 6 years' reading growth in one school year, would be a real asset to the continued betterment of our program.

Railroad Commission Discusses Open Pit Regulations With Schleicher Commissioners

Schleicher County Commissioners met recently with Paul Mohle of the Texas Railroad Commission and discussed new regulations regarding open caliche pits and the Texas Quarry And Pit Safety Act adopted in 1993 by the State legislature.

Mohle told the commissioners that the act requires owners of open and sand, gravel, rock or caliche pits located within 200 feet of a public roadway to construct barriers or slope the sides of the pit in such a way as to prevent automobiles from entering the pits. The act stems around a fatal accident in South Texas in which a school bus collided with a truck, veering off the road and into a pit filled with water killing several school children.

Mohle stated that owners and operators of open pits within the 200 feet limit will be assessed a fee of \$500 and \$350 for counties and cities for every inactive pit. Failure to comply with the act could result in a first time fine of up to \$1000 with additional violations drawing fines of up to \$5000.

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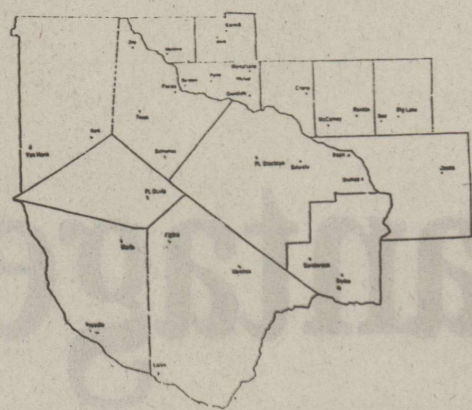
