Local Ranch Gains National Attention For Hunting

An out-of-state hunter draws a bead on an eight-point buck, takes careful aim and squeezes the trigger. The buck jumps three feet in the air, runs off 15 yards and drops to the that he has his trophy deer. This scenario is an everyday happening during hunting season on the Penn Bag-

Baggett started a commercial hunting business in 1975 named "TrophyHeart Outfitters, Inc.". Baggett is aided by his wife Lara Sue, daughter Leana, guide Lyndon En- and firearms authority, Sitton is a freglish, Lyndon's wife Laurie and their sons Logan and Lane. TrophyHeart Outfitters caters to the serious hunter who is interested in a good quality trophy-type animal.

The ranch recently gained nahunter. He was invited by fellow writer Crockett County Sheriff Jim Wilson to hunt Rio Grande turkey in a spring hunt on the ranch.

Wilson is one of several persons who have helped earn Ozona and

Crockett County national recognition as a prime hunting spot. A nationally recognized author, Wilson has written articles on shooting, guns, ammunition and other related subjects, including articles for Petersen's "Handguns", "Guns and Ammo" and "Handloader". Currently, he is a field ground. The hunter grins and knows editor for "Guns and Ammo" and "Handloader" magazines.

> Through his writing and meetings with other writers, the sheriff has been able to promote hunting in Crockett County. This spring, Wilson assisted in setting up a hunt on the Baggett Ranch for Sitton. As an accomplished shooter, handloader quent contributor to "Guns and Ammo", "Hunting" and "G&A's Specialty Publications". A field editor for "Petersen's Hunting", Sitton mentions his spring turkey hunt at the Baggett Ranch in his "Backtracking" column in the August '94 issue of the maga-

By reading his column, one gets the feeling Sitton was completely satisfied with his hunt. As quoted from his article, "I told Penn I'd likely return in December, with a new set of turkey tags. The fact is, I'd go back if they closed the season, for I like the people and places and things I saw there".

Ranchers in Crockett County have been catering to hunters for generations; however, the highly successful DeerFest and other activities have been developed within the last 20 years because of a local desire to cater to trophy hunters and advertise the wealth of wildlife available in Crockett County. This effort to diversify the economy has paid off for several area ranchers, including Baggett.

Ranching 11 sections of land with abundant wildlife like whitetail deer, Rio Grande turkey, javelina, quail and dove can be quite a job to manage. Baggett's primary knowleage has come from 20 years of on the ranch experience", living on the land. Constant care of the land through proper range, livestock and wildlife management keeps the animals here according to Baggett. "We have no high fences to keep them in," said Baggett about the whitetail deer on his land.

One of the keys to good wildlife management is good nutrition. Past experience and studies have shown that deer on good nutrition produce better antlers, heavier bodies and better fawn crops than deer on low nutrition. The ranch provides supplemental feeders year-round. Water troughs, feeders and deer stands are regularly maintained.

Proper range management is another key to good wildlife management. The Baggett Ranch adjusts stocking rates according to the range conditions. Baggett said the range condition on his ranch is good but not plush. It appears the deer will be in good condition at hunting season. 'We utilize any cost-effective conservation plan that takes wildlife resources into consideration," Baggett

In discussing the economy and his product, Baggett said "there are a whole lot of people out there that have a real good demand for something that we have here in this area. Our shortcomings in the past have been the marketing aspect, where we did not seek out those persons properly and they really did not know we were around."

Sitton's hunt and resulting article should help accomplish that goal even more successfully, bringing further attention to the prime hunting on the Baggett Ranch and other Crockett County ranches. "The significance of the editorial mention," said Baggett, "is that it's going to give our area an toward the serious hunter.

Forums Scheduled To Reinvent USDA-Soil Conservation Service

TEMPLE - Nearly 60 years ago, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service was created to address a national resource crisis called the Dust Bowl. Since then, the agency has undergone a number of changes, resulting in the agency now known as the Soil Conservation Service or SCS. In its reinvention process, the agency aims to create the natural resources agency of the future.

To do this, the SCS in Texas has scheduled six forums around the state to solicit recommendations on the agency's future direction.

The first forum will be held in Stephenville on Aug. 2 at the Stephenville High School J. C. Helm Auditorium. Other forums are as follows: Kenedy on Aug. 4, Plainview on Aug. 9, San Angelo on Aug. 11, Nacogdoches on Aug. 16 and McAllen on Aug.

Two sessions will be held at each location with identical agendas. Registration begins at 1 p.m. and 6:30 p.m., and the sessions will start at 1:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. Each session will last approximately two hours.

"The SCS is at a crossroads, and we and our customers have an unprecedented opportunity to anticipate future needs and refocus the agency's mission," said Texas SCS State Conservationist Wes Oneth.

"Predicting the future is a difficult task. However, we believe that one of the best ways to prepare for tomorrow is by looking at the past and by asking our customers and employees what they anticipate will be needed in the future," Oneth said.



Munich is the capital of the German state of Bavaria. The morning of the fourth day of this trip we took a sightseeing drive to acquaint us with this beautiful city. We saw the area built specifically for the 1972 Olympic Games, including the stadium, famous for its uniquely shaped roof. The former Olympic village now provides accommodations for university students.

Heading southeast from Munich, we passed through alpine villages and small towns that beckon travelers with the beautiful flowers and chaletstyle homes and everything so neat and clean. We saw lush green farms growing wheat, corn and barley. Mountains and deep forest so dense that you couldn't ride a horse through.

The charming city of Salzburg is best known in the United States for its connection with Julie Andrews. Historical and cultural significance, its architectural treasures and location make Salzburg one of Europe's great cities. But it was a motion picture that elevated Salzburg to the ranks of the most popular destination.

In the afternoon, on a walking tour through the heart of the city, we saw two locations used in "The Sound of Music". The towering fortress Hohensalzburg that dominates the entire area, and lovely Mirabell Gar-

Mirabell Gardens were laid out in the early 18th century, with formal beds and striking colors.

We walked through a narrow street in the oldest part of Salzburg. It's lined with 300 year old, five or six story buildings - including one where Mozart was born. The influence of W. A. Mozart is responsible for the pic-

and I made recently to Germany, envelopes the town in an atmosphere of magical gaiety.

We took the funicular railway up to the fortress. Now this railway shot straight up so fast we didn't have time to take a breath. We were high above the city and we made pictures from there. looking characters. I looked to the left and through a narrow archway I could see people. We walked in that direction and left that courtyard PDQ.



Given the amount of violence in many of our cities, we might have the mistaken notion the old cowboy towns were something to behold. Our minds conjure up blazing six-guns and shoot 'em up cowboy. We may get this idea from television. But it's a tainted picture of the old rowdy cattle drive days. A Wichita State University history professor says, "Homicide in cattle towns was rare, and homicide by gun-

play was almost non-existent." The fact is, nineteenth century cowboy towns were not as dangerous as our cities are today.

Why? For one thing, gun control was strict. In many towns, trail hands had to check their guns at the city limits. And guns that slipped through were confiscated by peace officers, no questions asked.
