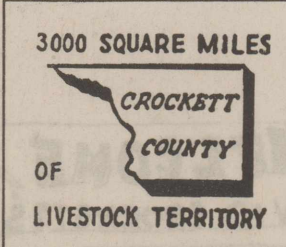

School Registration Begins Today

Student registration begins today for approximately 925 students who will be attending Ozona Public Schools this year. Classes registering today (Aug. 3) include prekindergarten, third, sixth, students who are new to the district and who will be entering high school, and high school football players.

Registration dates and times for Ozona High School are: seniors - Aug. 4 from 8 a.m. until noon; juniors - Aug. 4 from 1 until 5 p.m.; sophomores - Aug. 5 from 8 a.m. until noon; freshmen - Aug. 5 from 1 p.m. until 5; and, high school football players and new high school students - Aug. 3 from 1 until 5 p.m.

Senior portraits will be made on Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 3 and 4, and all high school seniors need to contact Mrs. Margaret Spiller to make an appointment time for these portraits.

At Ozona Middle School, registration dates and times are: sixth grade - Aug. 3 from 9 a.m. until noon; seventh grade - Aug. 4 from 9 a.m. until noon; and eighth grade - Aug. 5 from 9 a.m. until noon. Late registration for grades six, seven and eight will be on

Monday, Aug. 8, from 9 a.m. until noon.

Ozona Intermediate School will register students according to the following schedule: third grade - Aug. 3, from 9 a.m. until noon; fourth grade - Aug. 4 from 9 until noon; and, fifth grade - Aug. 5 from 9 a.m. until noon. Late registration for all grades in Ozona Intermediate School will be on Monday, Aug. 8, from 9 a.m. until noon.

The schedule for registering students in Ozona Primary School is: prekindergarten - Aug. 3, 1 until 4 p.m.; kindergarten - Aug. 4 from 8 a.m. until noon; first grade - Aug. 4 from 1 p.m. until 4 p.m.; and second grade - Aug. 5 from 8 a.m. until noon.

To be eligible for enrollment in prekindergarten, a child must be at least four years of age on or before Sept. 1 and must be unable to speak or understand the English language or from a family whose income is at or below subsistence level.

Parents of kindergarten students are reminded that even though their children participated in the screening clinic that was held last April in Ozona Primary School, it will still be necessary enroll them in kindergarten.

Weekend Filled With Activities

The 38th Annual Ozona Lions Club Youth Rodeo and the Ozona Chamber of Commerce sponsored David Crockett Birthday Festival promise an entertaining weekend.

Two nights of rodeo, beginning at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday will end with a dance at the fairgrounds pavilion Saturday. The rodeo parade is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Saturday and will begin near the Hillcrest Restaurant.

Photographs of past rodeo queens are on display in the hall at Crockett County Museum. These photos will be exhibited for 10 days if you are unable to see them during the weekend.

Sunday's 11th Annual Jay Miller Memorial Roping will see the

adults get into the act beginning at 1 p.m. A cowboy church service at the arena begins at 10 a.m.

Descendants of David Crockett will be welcomed at a reception in the Crockett Room at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

Activities on the square will be varied. According to chamber of commerce manager Sharon Farmer, 35 booth spaces have been reserved.

Woodcrafts, cakes, pies, apples, face painting, pictures, balloons, cartoon train, pottery, painted T-shirts, skirts, barrettes, potpourri pies, crochet, purses, toys, baseball cards clothing, jewelry, fajitas, C.D.s, perfume, hats, funnel cakes, quilt racks, shelves, dried flowers, computer prints, barbecue ribs, watermelon,

Contests include a costume parade, old fashioned fruit pie contest, sidewalk drawing, cake decorating and washer pitching.

Tae Kwon Do students will give a demonstration at 3:30 p.m., there will be a fashion show at the gazebo at 4 p.m. and a rodeo parade at 5:30.

Postmaster Ernie Jones and other representatives of the U. S. Postal Department will be on the square with a special David Crockett commemorative cancellation.

Local Ranch Gains National Attention For Hunting

An out-of-state hunter draws a bead on an eight-point buck, takes careful aim and squeezes the trigger. The buck jumps three feet in the air, runs off 15 yards and drops to the ground. The hunter grins and knows that he has his trophy deer. This scenario is an everyday happening during hunting season on the Penn Baggett Ranch.

Baggett started a commercial hunting business in 1975 named "TrophyHeart Outfitters, Inc.". Baggett is aided by his wife Lara Sue, daughter Leana, guide Lyndon English, Lyndon's wife Laurie and their sons Logan and Lane. TrophyHeart Outfitters caters to the serious hunter who is interested in a good quality trophy-type animal.

The ranch recently gained national attention by hosting Gary Sitton, a well-known writer and hunter. He was invited by fellow writer Crockett County Sheriff Jim Wilson to hunt Rio Grande turkey in a spring hunt on the ranch.

Wilson is one of several persons who have helped earn Ozona and

Crockett County national recognition as a prime hunting spot. A nationally recognized author, Wilson has written articles on shooting, guns, ammunition and other related subjects, including articles for Petersen's "Hunters", "Guns and Ammo" and "Handloader". Currently, he is a field editor for "Guns and Ammo" and "Handloader" magazines.

Through his writing and meetings with other writers, the sheriff has been able to promote hunting in Crockett County. This spring, Wilson assisted in setting up a hunt on the Baggett Ranch for Sitton. As an accomplished shooter, handloader and firearms authority, Sitton is a frequent contributor to "Guns and Ammo", "Hunting" and "G&A's Specialty Publications". A field editor for "Petersen's Hunting", Sitton mentions his spring turkey hunt at the Baggett Ranch in his "Backtracking" column in the August '94 issue of the magazine.

By reading his column, one gets the feeling Sitton was completely satisfied with his hunt. As quoted from his article, "I told Penn I'd likely return in December, with a new set of turkey tags. The fact is, I'd go back if they closed the season, for I like the

people and places and things I saw there".

Ranchers in Crockett County have been catering to hunters for generations; however, the highly successful DeerFest and other activities have been developed within the last 20 years because of a local desire to cater to trophy hunters and advertise the wealth of wildlife available in Crockett County. This effort to diversify the economy has paid off for several area ranchers, including Baggett.

Ranching 11 sections of land with abundant wildlife like whitetail deer, Rio Grande turkey, javelina, quail and dove can be quite a job to manage. Baggett's primary knowledge has come from 20 years of "on the ranch experience", living on the land. Constant care of the land through proper range, livestock and wildlife management keeps the animals here according to Baggett. "We have no high fences to keep them in," said Baggett about the whitetail deer on his land.

One of the keys to good wildlife management is good nutrition. Past experience and studies have shown that deer on good nutrition produce better antlers, heavier bodies and better fawn crops than deer on low nutrition. The ranch provides supplemental feeders year-round. Water troughs, feeders and deer stands are regularly maintained.

Proper range management is another key to good wildlife management. The Baggett Ranch adjusts stocking rates according to the range conditions. Baggett said the range condition on his ranch is good but not plush. It appears the deer will be in good condition at hunting season. "We utilize any cost-effective conservation plan that takes wildlife resources into consideration," Baggett added.

In discussing the economy and his product, Baggett said "there are a whole lot of people out there that have a real good demand for something that we have here in this area. Our shortcomings in the past have been the marketing aspect, where we did not seek out those persons properly and they really did not know we were around."

Sitton's hunt and resulting article should help accomplish that goal even more successfully, bringing further attention to the prime hunting on the Baggett Ranch and other Crockett County ranches. "The significance of the editorial mention," said Baggett, "is that it's going to give our area an extreme amount of publicity" geared toward the serious hunter.

"The guys from out-of-state appreciate going on a hunt on private land. We can't understand how valuable our resource is to them, and therefore to us," Baggett said. "If we conserve our wildlife, it's a very significant renewable resource for this area -- and becoming more significant each year."

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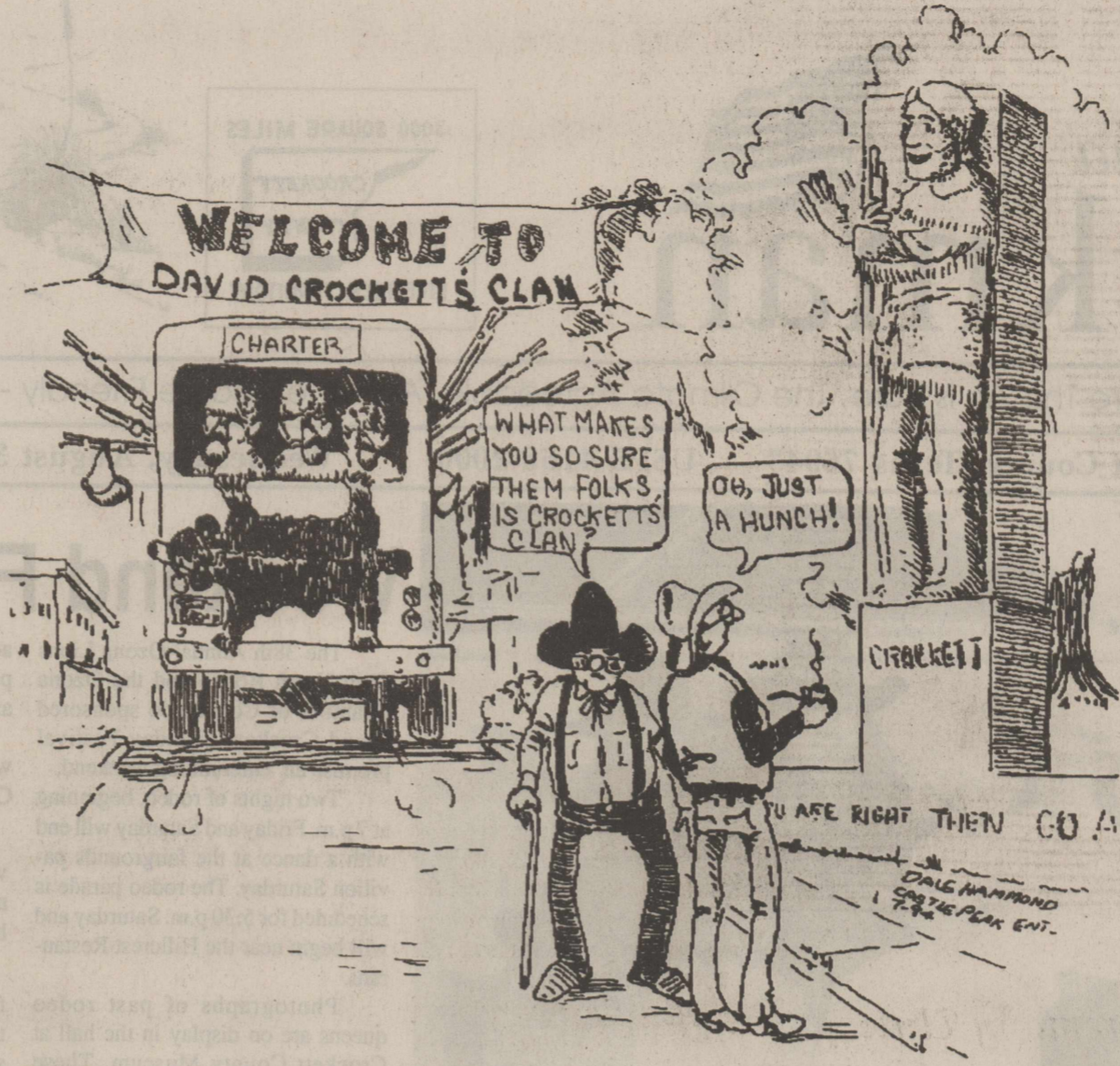

According to Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent for Crockett County, the show was originally slated for airing Aug. 11. "We have not heard whether or not that will still be true, but we hope everyone will watch and enjoy our lovely singing!"

The segment was filmed on the closing night of this year's state roundup in June at Texas A&M University. Ozona residents may spot a familiar face, as State 4-H Council member JoLynn Vannoy was on stage directly in front of the cameras.

"For that shot, we had to stand in the center of Kyle Field and form a giant clover - in 100 degree heat at 6 p.m. for about an hour while we tried to say 'Good Morning, America' in unison!" 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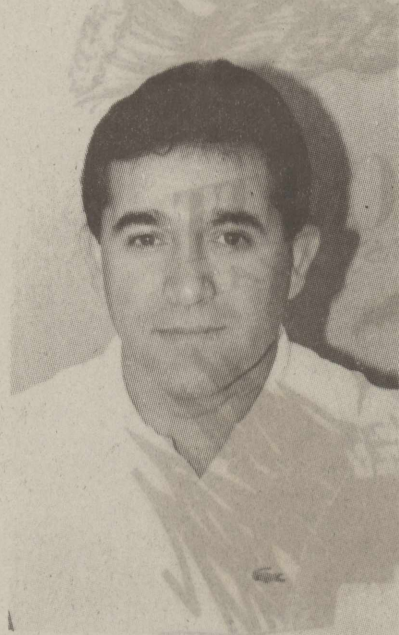
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Suchil Pastor of Spanish Church of Christ

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Forums Scheduled To Reinvent USDA-Soil Conservation Service

TEMPLE - Nearly 60 years ago, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service was created to address a national resource crisis called the Dust Bowl. Since then, the agency has undergone a number of changes, resulting in the agency now known as the Soil Conservation Service or SCS. In its reinvention process, the agency aims to create the natural resources agency of the future.

To do this, the SCS in Texas has scheduled six forums around the state to solicit recommendations on the agency's future direction.

The first forum will be held in Stephenville on Aug. 2 at the Stephenville High School J. C. Helm Auditorium. Other forums are as follows: Kenedy on Aug. 4, Plainview on Aug. 9, San Angelo on Aug. 11, Nacogdoches on Aug. 16 and McAllen on Aug. 18.

Two sessions will be held at each location with identical agendas. Registration begins at 1 p.m. and 6:30 p.m., and the sessions will start at 1:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. Each session will last approximately two hours.

"The SCS is at a crossroads, and we and our customers have an unprecedented opportunity to anticipate future needs and refocus the agency's mission," said Texas SCS State Conservationist Wes Oneth.

"Predicting the future is a difficult task. However, we believe that one of the best ways to prepare for tomorrow is by looking at the past and by asking our customers and employees what they anticipate will be needed in the future," Oneth said.

Anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation is invited to participate. A survey form is available for those who are unable to attend the forum(s). More information and copies of the survey may be obtained from local SCS offices. They are listed in telephone directories under U. S. Government, Agriculture Department.

Here And There

I will continue writing my impressions of the trip Zelma Johnigan and I made recently to Germany, Austria and Switzerland.

Munich is the capital of the German state of Bavaria. The morning of the fourth day of this trip we took a sightseeing drive to acquaint us with this beautiful city. We saw the area built specifically for the 1972 Olympic Games, including the stadium, famous for its uniquely shaped roof. The former Olympic village now provides accommodations for university students.

Heading southeast from Munich, we passed through alpine villages and small towns that beckon travelers with the beautiful flowers and chalet-style homes and everything so neat and clean. We saw lush green farms growing wheat, corn and barley. Mountains and deep forest so dense that you couldn't ride a horse through.

The charming city of Salzburg is best known in the United States for its connection with Julie Andrews. Historical and cultural significance, its architectural treasures and location make Salzburg one of Europe's great cities. But it was a motion picture that elevated Salzburg to the ranks of the most popular destination.

In the afternoon, on a walking tour through the heart of the city, we saw two locations used in "The Sound of Music". The towering fortress Hohensalzburg that dominates the entire area, and lovely Mirabell Gardens.

Mirabell Gardens were laid out in the early 18th century, with formal beds and striking colors.

We walked through a narrow street in the oldest part of Salzburg. It's lined with 300 year old, five or six story buildings - including one where Mozart was born. The influence of W. A. Mozart is responsible for the picture which Salzburg presents to the modern visitor; his inspiring music envelopes the town in an atmosphere of magical gaiety.

We took the funicular railway up to the fortress. Now this railway shot straight up so fast we didn't have time to take a breath. We were high above the city and we made pictures from there. I had to put in a new roll of film and Zelma did also. It was here that we parted company with our tour group. We turned around and they were gone! So we walked back to the funicular railway and I held up my name tag and said that we were part of the tour group - so the man waved us on to the railway. We dropped to street level and walked out to a narrow little street. Our group was not there - in fact there was no one around. We were two Texas ladies lost in old town Salzburg. We walked around a building and this took us to a large courtyard. In the center was a water fountain - Huge gold leaf covered horses, standing on their hind legs were spouting water from their nostrils. I knew we had not

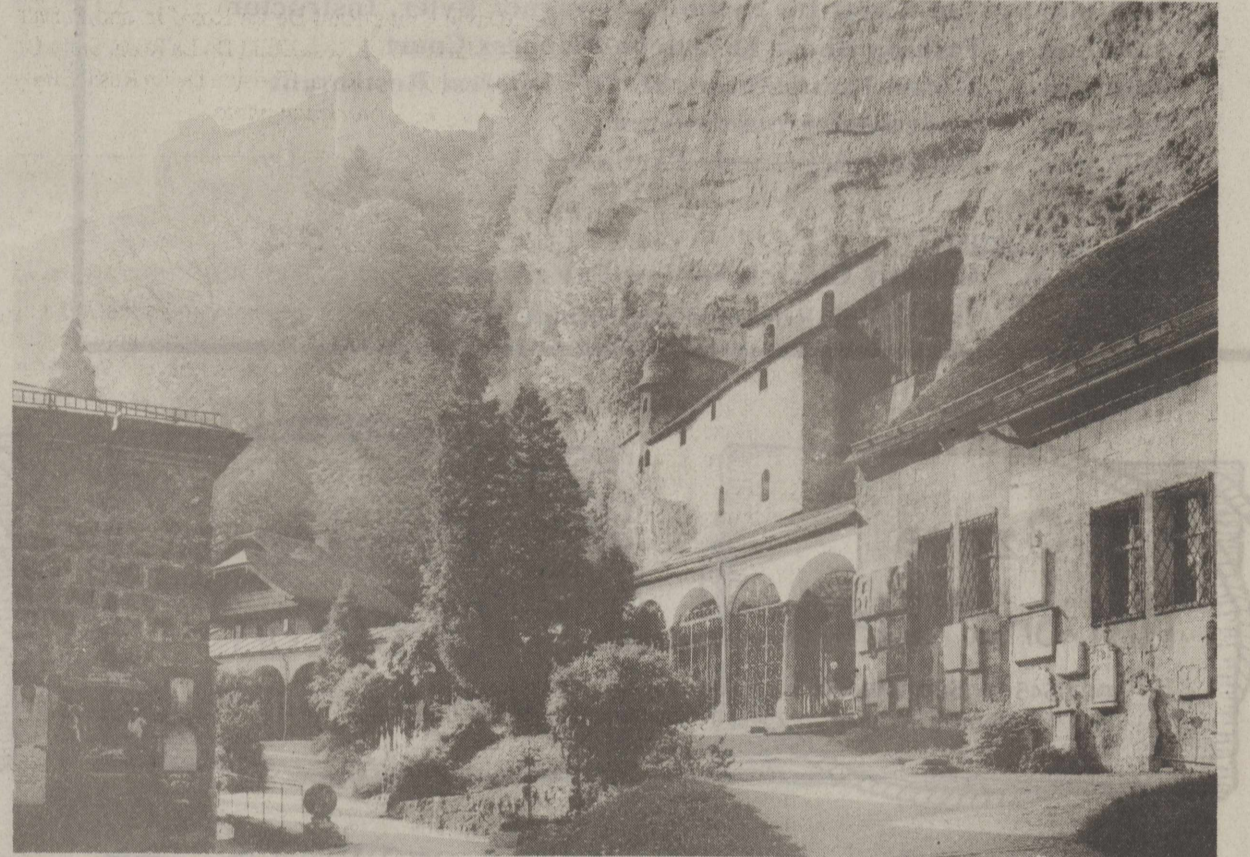
been there before! There were no people around - only a few shady looking characters. I looked to the left and through a narrow archway I could see people. We walked in that direction and left that courtyard PDQ.

This took us back to St. Peter cemetery and the catacombs and people all around but not our group. We walked on and even through we were lost - we took time to shop - I bought earrings and I'm sure I'll never forget where I purchased them. We crossed another courtyard and could see the Danube River. After crossing the bridge, we were looking for a taxicab. Then we saw our local guide waving both arms and rushing to us. She apologized and asked what happened to us. I don't recall what we said, but we probably didn't look like happy travelers. She got a cab for us and upon reaching our hotel we found our tour group waiting and asking questions.

The next morning, the first part of our drive to Vienna, capital of Austria, is through a resort area with beautiful

lakes, mountains and flowering meadows. Leaving the modern freeway, we took a scenic route eastward via the road that runs beside the Danube River. At the little town of Melk, we board a rivership for a downstream cruise through the most beautiful part of the Danube valley. The Danube is a swift stream moving 13 feet in one second, we were told. The banks are punctuated by little towns and villages of centuries old houses. Green-domed bellies cap the ancient churches. Castles are perched on rocky crags to our right and left. Above the left bank the terraced vineyards produce Austria's best wines. Near the riverside there are fields of wheat, corn, and apple, peach, plum and apricot orchards.

At the little town of Kerms, we disembark and then board our motor coach to continue eastward. We soon find ourselves in the most lovely of cities - Vienna. The very mention of the name makes us think of violins and waltzes. I will write more about Vienna next week.

Shoot 'Em Up Cowboy

Given the amount of violence in many of our cities, we might have the mistaken notion the old cowboy towns were something to behold. Our minds conjure up blazing six-guns and shoot 'em up cowboy. We may get this idea from television. But it's a tainted picture of the old rowdy cattle drive days. A Wichita State University history professor says, "Homicide in cattle towns was rare, and homicide by gun-

play was almost non-existent." The fact is, nineteenth century cowboy towns were not as dangerous as our cities are today.

Why? For one thing, gun control was strict. In many towns, trail hands had to check their guns at the city limits. And guns that slipped through were confiscated by peace officers, no questions asked.

On the other hand, people recognized the authority of the Bible. And they accepted the perspective on violence taught in the Bible. They understood the root cause of violence is not guns. But put a gun in the hands of anyone who is inclined to use it because hatred fills his heart and the mix is deadly. Jesus makes this very plain, "From within, out of the heart of men, proceed the evil thoughts, fornications, thefts, murders, adulteries" (Mark 7:21).

What is the solution to violence? The answer is radical change of heart produced by God. Nothing less will do.

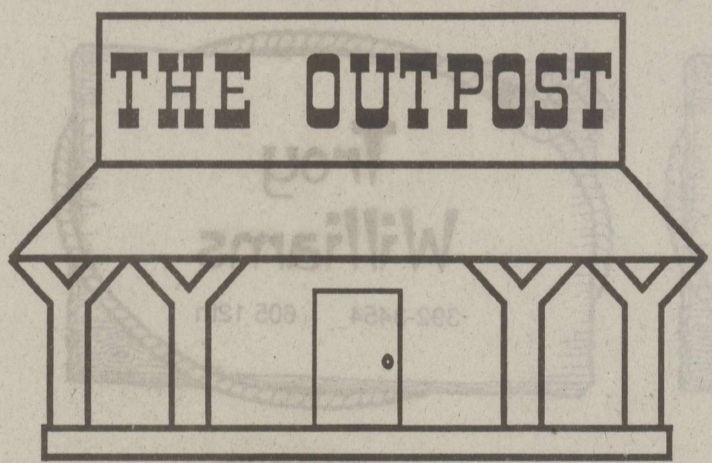

The coverage of the school board meeting in the July 20, 1994, issue of the Stockman did not give your readers a clear enough view of what is happening to Crockett County residents who, by necessity, must rely on other school districts to provide education for their children.

The members of the Crockett County Consolidated Common School board have stated by their actions that they are unwilling to cover the full cost of educating Crockett County children who must transfer to other districts. What will this do to future good neighbor relations with other

counties and school districts? Good neighbor relations are important to those of us who look to Pecos County for our fire department, ambulance, hospital, deputy sheriff and other services.

Pecos County and Iraan have welcomed us and served us well in the past. But I feel that the action taken by the Crockett County school board will cause us to be about as welcome as refugees in the future.

Since Crockett County appears unwilling to fully fund the cost of educating our children, then I feel, for a short term solution, that we should accommodate the Iraan Sheffield Independent School District by establishing residence in Iraan, since they have placed our educational needs above their financial loss.

For the long term, if this issue cannot be resolved, then the north and western Crockett County residents should start moving toward secession from the county. It seems only logical

and fair that the counties that are willing to serve the north and western extremities should be allowed to annex the land for tax purposes especially since Crockett County is unwilling to reimburse for services rendered.

The Crockett CCCSD board members need to remember that what is legal is not always right.

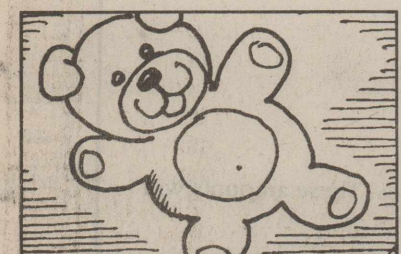

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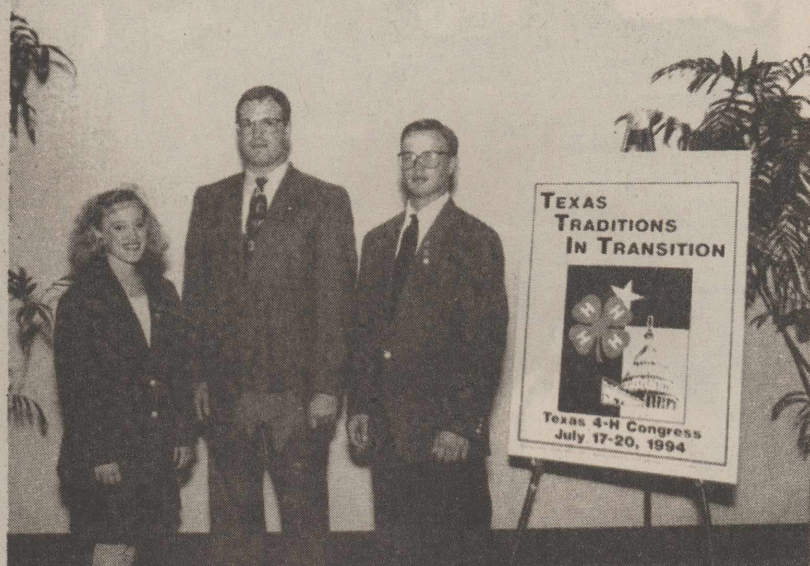

Casey Upham also attended State Congress as a delegate from Crockett County. Upham and Vannoy were delighted to have a bill they wrote for Congress passed and presented to Governor Ann Richards.

Two From Ozona Attend State 4-H Congress

Two 4-H members from Crockett County were lucky participants in the four-day Texas 4-H Congress held in Austin July 17-20. JoLynn Vannoy, a State 4-H Council member, and Casey Upham, District VI 4-H parliamentarian, gained valuable legislative experience during a mock congress with approximately 400 4-H members from around the state.

Miss Vannoy had the honor of serving as calendar clerk for the Senate in the Texas 4-H Legislature. Upham served in the House and was active in offering debate for and against various bills. The duo were fortunate to gain passage of their own bill, which was designed to implement drug testing for student athletes in Texas. The bill, along with others passed during the session, was presented to Governor Ann Richards' office for review following congress.

During congress, 4-H members ages 15-19 assume the roles of senators, representatives, lobbyists and

press corps to gain a first-hand understanding of the legislative process.

Bills written and sponsored by 4-H members focus on issues concerning Texas youth. The bills are assigned to the appropriate committee and debated in committee meetings, House and Senate. If a bill is successful in negotiating the legislative debate in all three stages, it is delivered to the governor of Texas 4-H Congress - who is also the State 4-H Council president - for his/her signature or veto. If passed, the bill is then presented to Texas' governor.

Texas 4-H Congress is a leadership program planned and implemented by youth. The Texas 4-H Council, which consists of elected delegates from each district in the state, assumes the major leadership responsibilities for carrying out congress and other activities throughout the year. Congress is held every other year; the next 4-H Congress will be held in 1996.

NOTIFICATION TOTAL COLIFORM VIOLATION

The Crockett County Water Control District #1 water system collected 1 water sample during the month of July, 1994, that contained Coliform bacteria. The Crockett County Water Control District #1 water system is required to submit a minimum of 4 samples each month for bacteriological analysis.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliforms is a possible health concern. Total coliforms are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. The presence of these bacteria in drinking water, however, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or

the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possibly jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water. The TNRCC has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliforms to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than 5.0% of the samples collected during a month can contain these bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples/month that have one total coliform-positive sample per month are not violating the standard. Drinking water which meets this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.

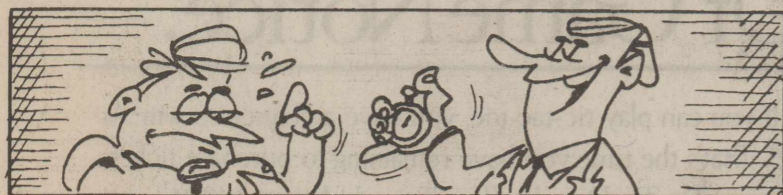

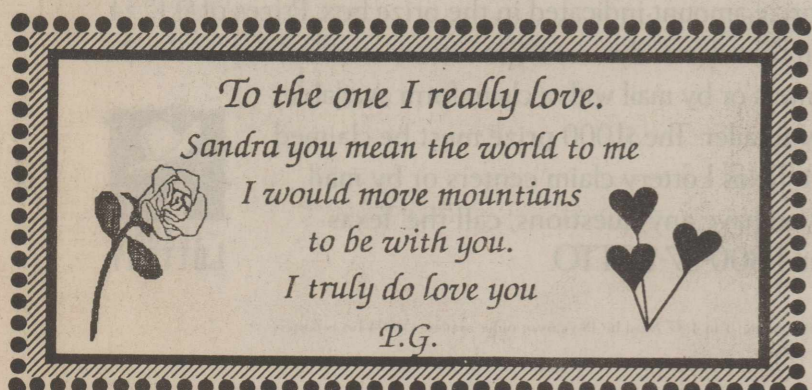

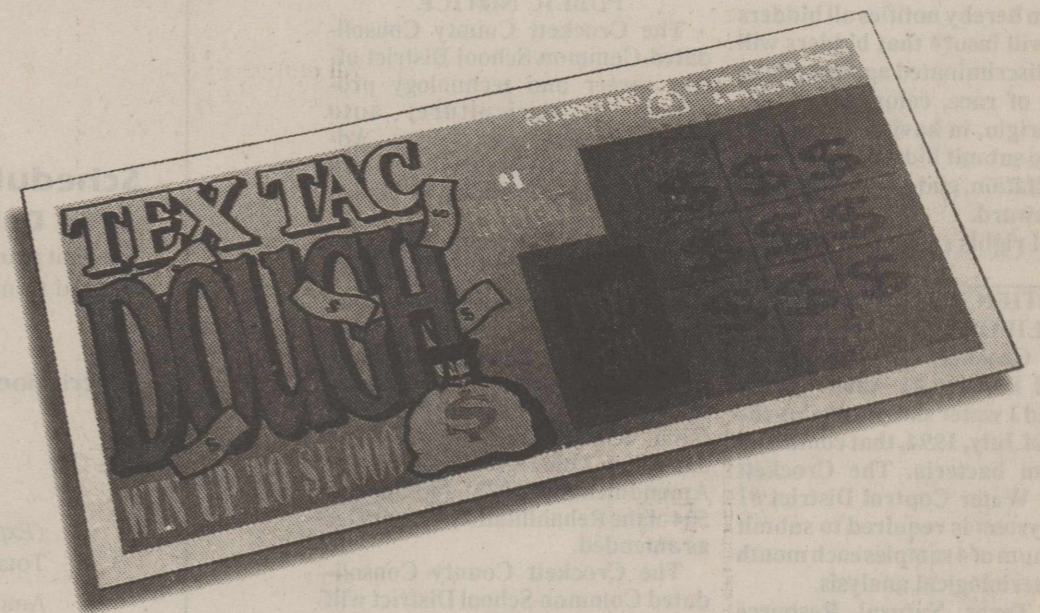

School Shopping Can Teach Children To Buy Wisely

School is almost here - even if you hadn't seen a school calendar, you could tell by the "Back to School" sales and ads you see on television, in stores, newspapers and everywhere else! Most of us take our children school shopping so they can have some input into colors, styles, etc. - and this is a great chance to develop their skills in finding the best buy for the money.

Start off by setting a budget. If you have only \$50 to spend for back to school clothes and supplies, let them know up front. Sometimes it helps if they see the actual cash - you may want to put each child's allotment in a separate envelope and see how long it lasts.

Before you hit the stores, sit down with Junior and make a list of what you're going to be shopping for. This is a great time to discuss the difference in "needs" and "wants" as well as looking over flyers and ads to check out typical prices for different items. Have your child prioritize his or her list...what is the most important item they must have for this school year at this time? Continue until everything on the list is in order of "must have" according to need.

If you're shopping for clothing, let them compare the cost of name brand items with the cost of store or generic brands. Let them figure out if

it's more important to have more items at a lower price, or fewer at a higher price. Which is more important, and what trade-offs are they willing to make to get what they want.

One of the things we do in the 4-H Consumer Buying activity in the clothing project is to go to a really expensive store, then to discount outlets to see what we can find for similar quality - but usually much lower prices. Kids see the differences - and similarities - quickly.

And don't forget sources like garage sales, flea markets and the good old Salvation Army - for kids who will outgrow items in a few weeks, this may turn up some real bargains. Point out that the money they save on items like basic jeans, sweaters and shirts can be used for those "name brands" they think they must have! In other words, turn your kids into real bargain-hunters!

Teach kids to look for quality. In clothing, this may include sturdy hems and seams, buttons sewn on correctly, and good quality fabric. In school supplies, look for durable and washable items that will last more than one year. Point out that fads fade quickly. Power rangers may be "in" today, but will they still be hot in January? Perhaps a plain notebook can be decorated with Power Rangers stickers at a lower price than the "official" notebook - at a much lower price.

School shopping is a great way to develop kids' resourcefulness - but remember a few things:

*Have a budget and stick to it. Overspending is a big trap when Junior just "has to have" the latest gadget

or notebook. Avoid it!
 *Remember that kids want to be fashionable - choose a few items that are trendy but mix them with lots of basics. Don't spend too much on fads.

*When buying for kids, durability is the key. Choose good fabrics and materials that can be cared for easily (and can be wadded up in a locker for months without being ruined).

*Consider alternative shopping sources for basics such as jeans, basic shirts, etc. You may find bargains of far greater quality than you can afford

otherwise.

*Consider kids' wishes whenever possible. A little discussion and pre-planning - and making a priority list - can save lots of hassle in the checkout line!

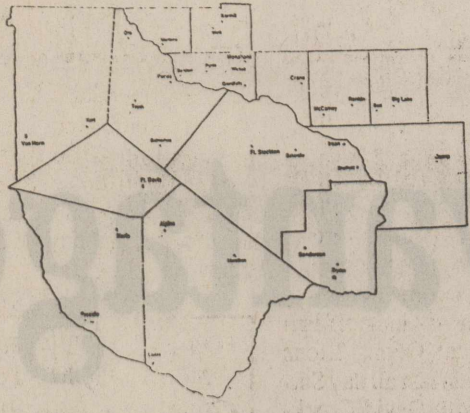

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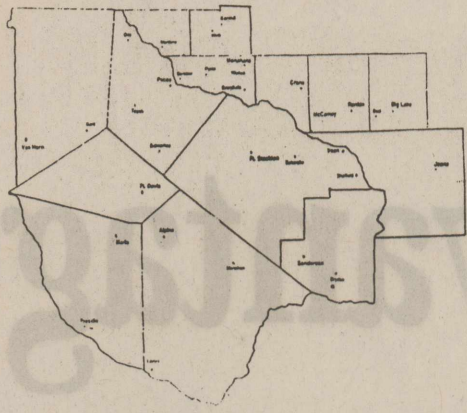
